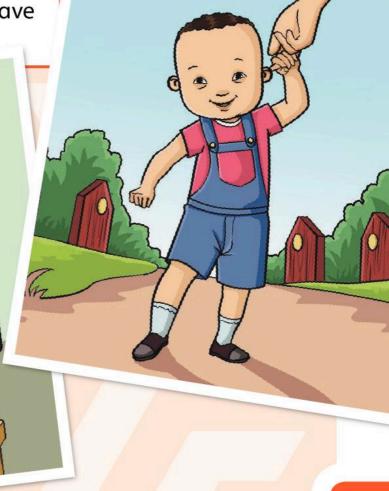


History is the study of what happened in the past. The past is all the time before now. Your history is the story of all the things that have happened to you and your family in the past. Everybody has a different history.

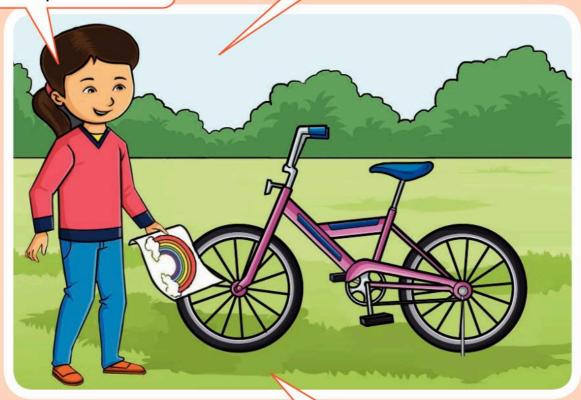

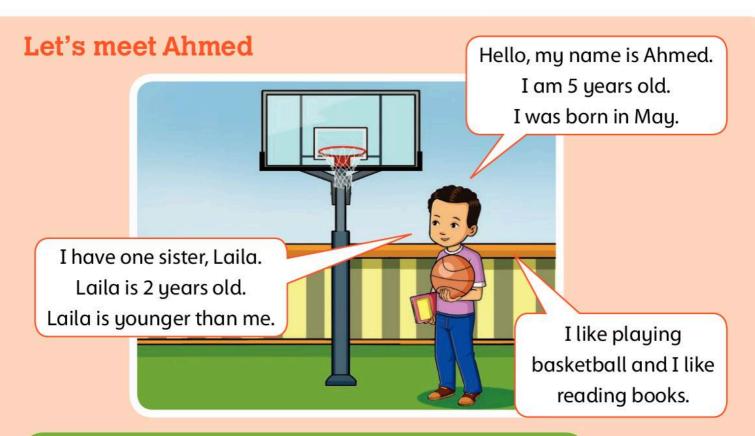

Mia lives with her brother Adam, her mother, her father and her grandmother.



Different generations

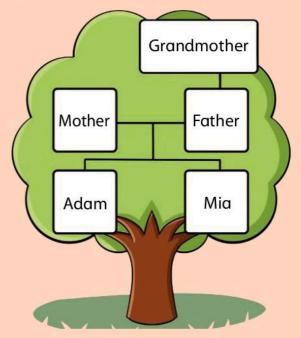
Families are made up of different generations.

A generation is all the people who are a similar age. Mia and Adam are from one generation.

Their mother and father are from a different generation.

A family tree

A **family tree** shows how people in a family are related to each other. Each part of the tree shows a different generation. This family tree shows the different generations who live in Mia's house.

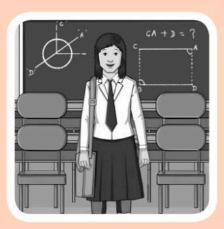
1.5 What can we learn from a photo?

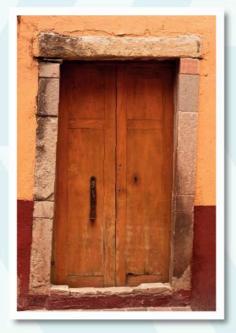
















2.1 Let's look outside

Chimneys

In the kitchen we prepare and cook food. What were kitchens like in the past? How did people cook food long ago?

An old kitchen



Look at the picture on page 22. It shows a kitchen in France more than 150 years ago.

The stove

The stove cooked the food. The kettle on the stove heated the water. The fire heated the stove. The bellows blew air on to the coal fire to make the fire hotter.

Lighting up the past

In the past, houses did not have the electric lights that we have today.



A candle

Some houses were lit by oil lamps. People have used oil lamps for thousands of years.



Some houses were lit by candles. The Ancient Egyptians used candles 5000 years ago.



This Roman oil lamp is 1800 years old.

Some houses were lit by gas lamps. The gas lamp was invented in 1792, about 225 years ago. An **invention** is something new that is made for the very first time.

Did you know?

This is a picture of the first electric light bulb. It was invented in 1879, about 140 years ago.



A gas lamp

Comparing bathrooms

What about water?

Pipes bring water into a modern bathroom. We turn on a tap and water comes out.

Be a good historian

Good historians know that some things stay the same over time. What is the same about both bathrooms in the pictures?



Many houses in the past did not have pipes and taps. People used water from different places.

Some people washed with water from a river.



Some people washed with water from a well.



Some people washed with water from a pump.



In some parts of the world, people still wash with water from a well, from a pump or from a river.

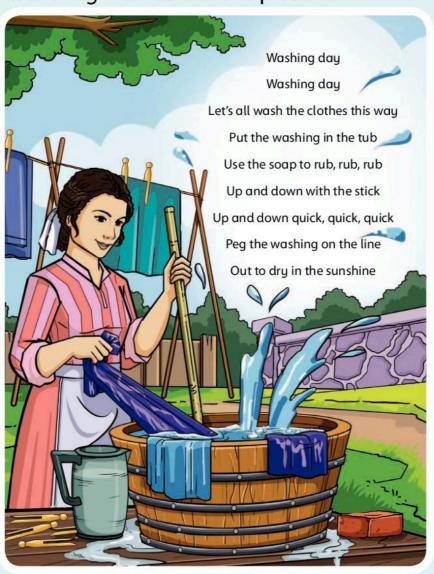

Ironing clothes

We use an iron to press clothes.

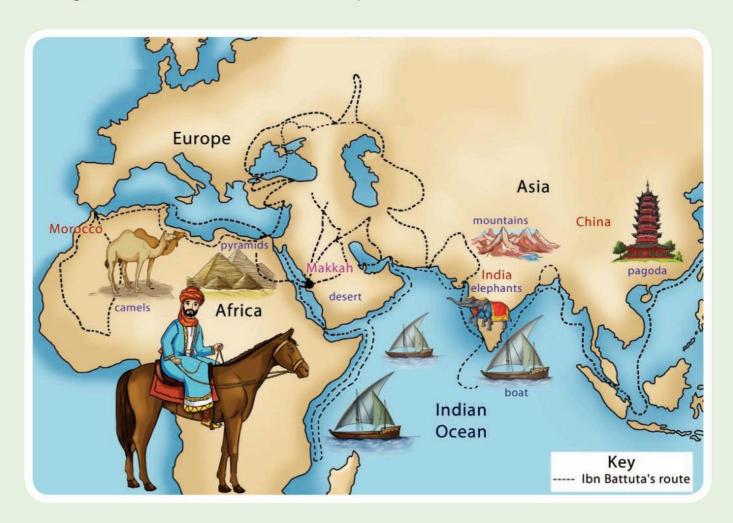

3.1 Ibn Battuta (1304–1368)

Ibn Battuta was an explorer. Ibn Battuta was born in Morocco. He lived 700 years ago in the 14th century.

Can you find Morocco on the map?



Where did Ibn Battuta travel?

Ibn Battuta travelled from Morocco to Makkah as a pilgrim. A pilgrim is someone who travels to a holy place.

Ibn Battuta travelled for many years. He went to Asia, India and China. He went to Europe. He went to Africa. He travelled across deserts, mountains and oceans.

Why did Ibn Battuta travel?

Ibn Battuta wanted to learn about different people and places in the world.

How did Ibn Battuta travel?

Ibn Battuta rode on horses, camels and elephants. He sailed on boats.

How do we know about Ibn Battuta?

Ibn Battuta wrote a book about all the places he visited. The book is called *Rihla*. This means 'journey'.

Can you find Italy on the map?



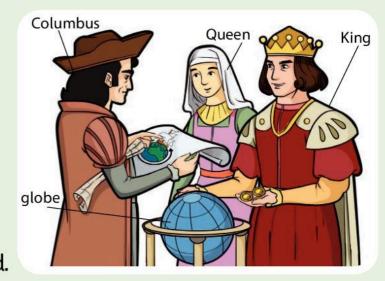
A voyage

In 1492 Christopher Columbus sailed from Europe across the Atlantic Ocean. He wanted to find a new

way to sail to India. The King and Queen of Spain gave him money for the **voyage**.

A voyage is a long journey.

Columbus sailed with 90 sailors and 3 ships. The voyage took a long time. There was little food and water. The sailors were scared.



Land ahoy!

After 70 days, the sailors saw land. Columbus thought it was India. But it was not India. It was a new land – America.

Did you know?

Columbus was not the first person from Europe to travel to America. Viking explorers sailed to America 500 years before him.

Columbus did not discover America. People were already living there.

Columbus returns

Columbus sailed back to Spain. He gave the king and queen a pineapple and a turkey from America.

Columbus sailed to America three more times. Other explorers also sailed to America.

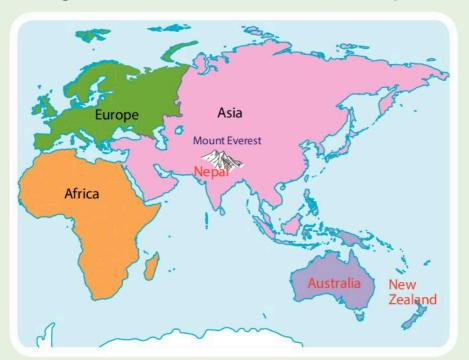

Mount Everest

Mount Everest is the highest mountain in the world.

Journey to the top

The two men started to climb Mount Everest. They climbed higher and higher.

There was snow and ice on the mountain. It was very cold and very dangerous.

At last, they climbed to the top. Hillary and Norgay were famous because they were the first people to climb to the top of Mount Everest.

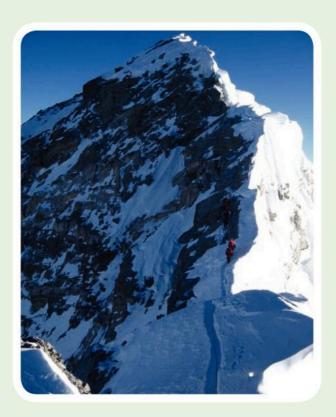
