INTRODUCTION

Isn't there something contradictory about the idea of a crochet robot? Aren't robots tough and unyielding? Not necessarily! Meet the crobots. The 20 little creatures in this book are all cute, soft, and useful. Each one can be given a job to do, whether it's keeping an eye on your desk (step forward, Geisha) or guarding your keys (meet the alert and sparky Dogbot), although you have to be careful that covetous people don't carry them off while they're hard at work.

> Best of all, you can make any or all of the crobots yourself. This collection represents the sweetest, tiniest trend in amigurumi since . . . well, since amigurumi was invented. Neatly crocheted in a host of colors ranging from the subtle to the brilliant, crobots demonstrate that even the smallest woolen creatures can have distinct personalities. Crobots make great confidentes (they're small enough to put in a

pocket or a purse, and tough enough to survive daily one-on-one sharing sessions). They make good gifts, too, and you can personalize them according to the needs and interests of each recipient, tweaking the color mix, adding a sequin or two, or

even mixing and matching characteristics between crobots to create entirely new characters.



If you're a keen crochet maven, you'll find that you can make even the most feature-laden crobot in a couple of evenings. If you've never picked up a crochet hook before, there are easy-to-follow instructions to guide you. We've arranged the patterns in order of difficulty, so if you don't have much crochet experience or are not used to working on a small scale, start with one of the patterns at the beginning of the book and work up to the (slightly) more challenging ones near the end. Picking one of the easier patterns will ensure that you finish it—successfully—while you're still practicing your crochet-hook skills.

Despite their tiny size, crobots are not toys. Make sure you keep them well out of reach of small children.

CROCHETING THE CROBOTS

Read these pages before you start!

Making the crobots isn't hard if you have basic crocheting skills. Even if you don't, it's quite easy to learn, and the basic steps are shown on these pages. Most of the crobots are worked in spirals, like all little amigurumi dolls. You do not have to join rounds, but if you want a foolproof way to count rows, use a stitch marker or a paper clip to mark the end of each round and move it up as you complete each round. The squared-off parts of the crobots are worked in rows—that is, you chain one, then turn at the end of each row.



WHAT YOU NEED

Each crobot has an ingredients list at the start of the pattern, which includes everything you need. The yarn used for the crobots is always light worsted weight (10 ply, or #3).

The patterns for the crobots do not give yarn quantities because the quantities for even the largest bot are very small and the amount needed will vary according to how loosely or tightly you crochet. For the main color of each crobot, you are likely to use no more than about half a 1.75 oz (50 g) ball of double-knit yarn. We suggest that you buy complete balls of yarn for your first couple of crobots and then, when you have a good idea of how much yarn they require, move on to some of your remnants from other knitting or crocheting projects.

All the crobot patterns use a C2 (2.75 mm) crochet hook. If you're an experienced amigurumi maker, you may want to choose an even smaller hook (the smaller the hook, the daintier your crobots will be), but if you're less experienced, a very fine hook may be too fiddly at first.

STARTING WITH CROBOTS


Each crobot is made in separate pieces—
heads, arms, legs, and so on. They are
usually joined together once the crocheting
is complete, but sometimes you'll receive an
instruction to stuff a body or head and close
up the gap as you go along. Be sure to follow
these instructions—they will make your crobot
easier to put together in the end.




The crobots are marked with one to four cogwheels to indicate how easy they are to make. Start with a single-cogwheel crobot and work up to the slightly more complex ones.

How to make a foundation chain

This is the starting point of all crochet patterns.








Start a foundation chain by bringing the yam over the hook from the back to the front, and grabbing it with the hook. Draw the yarn through the knot and onto the hook to make your first chain stitch. Repeat to add stitches to the chain.


How to increase

To increase, you need to work two stitches into the first stitch of a row. Work the first stitch as usual, then use your hook to pull an extra stitch through the loop beneath.



How to decrease

Draw up two loops onto your hook (adding to the stitch already on the hook) by feeding the hook through the next two stitches in line. With three loops on the hook, place your yarn over the hook and draw it through all three loops to decrease one stitch.



BASIC CROCHET STITCHES

Crobots use only three crochet stitches; slip stitch, single, and half-double.


Slip stitch (sl)

Slip stitch is the most basic crochet stitch of all. It is particularly useful for finishing off edges or joining pieces together.

- Start with a foundation chain. Insert the hook into the second chain from the hook, then pass it under and hook the yam.
- Draw through the chain and loop already on the hook to make one slip stitch
- Continue working into the next stitch in the row.









Single crochet (sc)

Insert the hook into the next chain, pass it under and hook the yarn. Draw the loop through the first chain on the hook. Then hook under the yarn again, and draw this through the two loops.




Half-double crochet (hdc)

Put the yarn over the hook. Insert the hook into the third stitch to be worked, then place the yarn over the hook again, and pull it through the loop. Place the yarn over the hook again, then pull it through all three loops on the hook. This makes one half-double crochet stitch.



Making a magic ring

Amigurumi dolls are almost always made this way: It's a method of crocheting a neat, tight, circle without leaving a central hole.



- Make a large circle with your yarn, leaving a trailing tail, then use the hook to draw the working yarn through both the circle and tail strand held together. This creates one loop.
- With this loop, chain one stitch to begin the magic ring.
- Continue making single chain stitches around the ring, following the number of stitches required for the pattern until you have worked a full circle. Pull the tail of yarn to close the ring and make a tight round.
- Begin your second round by crocheting into the first stitch of the first round, Use a paper clip or a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the new round.

MAKING UP THE CROBOTS

Putting a crobot together isn't difficult, but it can be detailed. Make some of the simpler models first—the book starts with the easiest and ends with more challenging models. A neat finish adds a lot to the charm of these little bots, so it's worth a little extra effort to give them as much polish as possible.

Stuffing amigurumi

Use a customized toy stuffing. These are light, soft, and easy to use—don't be tempted to go for cotton balls or any other options, as they may give lumpy or hard results. A properly built crobot feels firm but soft when you squeeze it. Pack the stuffing in bit by bit. Sometimes the gap is quite small, or you need to sew most of it up before stuffing the crobot; in this case, you may find it helpful to use a matchstick or a toothpick to pack wisps of stuffing into the corners.

Sewing together

You can use either yarn, sewing thread, or a single thread of embroidery floss to sew your crobots together. If you choose to use the tail of yarn, use a yarn needle. Otherwise, use sewing thread or a single strand of embroidery floss in

a color to match the bot. Sew the pieces together in the order suggested, knot the ends of the thread, and stitch the end through the crobot, cutting it off close to the surface.

Embroidery stitches

Standard embroidery floss comes in a small skein. The thread is made up of six separate strands, which you can pull apart to get the thickness you want (in most of the crobot instructions, floss will be used in single or double threads, although if you're embroidering French knots, use three strands). Cut a short length of floss (12 to 16 inches long) and simply separate the strands at one end, then separate the desired number of strands from the main piece. Use the size of embroidery needle you feel most comfortable with-it's easier to work on a small scale with a relatively small needle, but the tiniest embroidery needles can be hard to handle unless you're used to fine sewing. If you plan to add beads as well as stitches, use a beading needle-this is a narrow needle with an equally narrow head, made to pass through the holes of even the tiniest beads.

If you are embroidering facial features on a crobot and want to make sure you get the positioning just right, you may find an erasable pen useful. These can be purchased at craft stores and are used for marking on fabric—the lines will disappear completely after a few days.

You can either tie a small knot at the end of the floss or make a tiny cross stitch (one stitch laid over another) to anchor it before beginning to embroider. Finish off in the same way. It's worth practicing your stitches—French knots, in particular, can take a few tries to get right.




Some of the embroidery is done on pieces of felt and then attached to the crobot, while some is sewn directly onto the crocheted yarn. Embroidering directly onto crochet is a little

harder—you need to practice making neat, visible stitches, and starting and finishing your work while disguising any tiny finishing-off knots among the crochet stitches.

To overstitch

Overstitching is usually used to attach one piece of fabric to another—for example, a felt control panel to the crocheted body of a crobot. To overstitch, take a single strand of floss or thread, put the panel of fabric to be attached in place, then bring the thread up through both thicknesses (yarn and fabric) and make a small stitch at right angles to the edge of the panel. Push the needle through the yarn, then bring it up again through both crobot body and felt panel, and repeat the stitch.

This is a practical rather than a decorative stitch, so use matching thread and make it as neat and unobtrusive as possible.



To backstitch

This stitch makes a plain, solid line.

Thread a needle with either one or two strands of thread, as directed, then bring it up through the fabric at the point at which you want the line of stitching to start.

Make a stitch going the opposite way from the way you want your backstitch line to continue, and bring the needle back up through the fabric one stitch's length away in the direction in which you want your stitching to go.




Take the thread backward and push the needle through the point where the first stitch finished. Bring it out again the same distance (one stitch's length) in front of the thread. Continue in the same way until the length of the desired line of backstitch is complete.


To chain stitch

This stitch makes a decorative row of linked loops, rather like a row of crochet pressed flat.

Bring your needle up through the fabric, then bring the spare thread out in front of your needle and make a loop around it. Reinsert the needle in the fabric and bring it out again one stitch's length in front of your first stitch, and through the loop of thread.

Pull the thread tight to make an oval-shaped stitch. Repeat both steps to make a chain of looped stitches.






To satin stitch

This stitch is useful for filling small areas.


To cover small areas with colored stitching, the easiest way is to make single, long, parallal stitches (usually with two strands of thread) close together. This will make a solid area of threads.



To make a French knot


This stitch makes a small, decorative knot that stands above the surface of the yam or fabric.

Thread the needle with three strands of floss, fasten the end, and bring it out at the point at which you want to make your French knot. With your left thumb, hold the thread down at the point where it emerges from the fabric and wrap it twice around the needle.



Keeping your thumb in place on the fabric, bring the needle back to the starting point and put the point back through the fabric very near where it emerged (not in the exact same spot, though—or the thread will simply pull back through the hole).

Pull the needle to the back of the fabric and pull taut. This will leave a small, textured knot. Tie off the thread at the back or go on to make the pext French knot.



Beading

Always use a beading needle to add beads and sequins—if you forget and use an embroidery needle, there will be a moment of intense frustration when you find that the needle won't fit through the tiniest bead!


Beads are sewn on simply by bringing the needle through from the back of the fabric, threading the bead onto the needle, and then pushing the needle back through near the original place it emerged and pulling the thread tight.

To add a sequin, you can either bring the needle up through the fabric, threading the sequin on, and then securing it by taking a stitch over to the edge on each side (or more stitches, to make a decorative star shape on top of your sequin), or use a bead to secure it in the center, as shown below.

To secure a sequin with a bead

Thread a beading needle and bring it up through the fabric. Thread first a sequin, then a bead, onto the needle.

Take the thread back through the central hole of the sequin with the beading needle, pull it tight, and secure at the back of the fabric. The bead, larger than the central hole of the sequin, will hold it in place.



DOGBOT

Just like people, crobots have pets, too. You might mistake Dogbot for a regular doggy companion at first glance, but look closer and you'll notice a row of tirly green switches on his side. And although his expression is friendly. his eyes are set wider and more vertically than most common breeds. His upright tail and lively demeanor, though, are characteristically canine.

- crochet hook, size C2 (2.75 mm)
- stitch marker or paper clip
- 1 varn needle
- 1 embroidery needle
- toy stuffing to stuff the bot
- beige yam
- black yarn (a tiny quantity, for the paws)



TO ASSEMBLE DOGBOT

- Stuff the head firmly. Flatten the ears, pin them into place, and sew them onto the head using leftover tails of yarn.
- Cut a small rectangle of white felt for the face visor.
 Sew bead eyes onto each end of the panel, placing them carefully and using one strand of black floss.
 If you prefer, you may embroider the eyes instead, using long vertical stitches in black floss.
- Sew the visor onto the head, making small overstitches with one strand of white floss.
- Embroider the nose, using two strands of black floss to make a triangular shape with straight horizontal stitches.
- Stuff and close the body, then use one strand of beige yarn to sew on the three bead "switches."
- Stuff each leg. Using one strand of black floss, sew the paws onto the ends of the legs. Attach Dogbot's legs to his body using leftover tails of yarr. Pin Dogbot's tail into place and sew it on.
- Finally, pin Dogbot's head to his body and attach it, using the yam end to stitch it on.



BLUEPRINT



BOPBOT

This cool dude of the crobot world is dancing to a tune that only he can hear. He's big as these little creatures go, well over four inches, and his bold colors and assertive earphones tell you that he'll calmly deal with any obstacles that get in his way. Forget iTunes; just turn over your 'pod to this music-loving bot and he'll handle the all-important job of your selections.

YOU WILL NEED

- crochet hook, size C2 (2.75 mm)
- stitch marker or paper clip
- * 1 yam needle
- 1 embroidery needle
- 1 beading needle
- toy stuffing to stuff the bot
- blue yarn
- rust-colored yarn
- black yarn (for the headphones)
- gray yarn (for the headphones)
- black embroidery floss (1 strand)
- blue embroidery floss (1 strand)
- 2 black beads, about ½ inch (4 mm) in diameter
- 4 silver sequins
- 4 tiny clear beads to secure sequins in place
- 1 screw-clasp jewelry fastener
- 1 pen spring (dismantle a retractable ballpoint pen to obtain this)

TO ASSEMBLE BOPROT

- Sew Bopbot's head to his body using the tail of yam left from crocheting. Stuff firmly before stitching closed.
- Use one strand of black floss to sew the black bead eyes in place on the face, and one strand of blue floss to stitch the mouth. Attach the pen spring using small overstitches at either end to secure it neatly.
- Use a beading needle threaded with a single strand of blue floss to add the beads and sequins in an asymmetric diamond shape on the front of the body. Thread the needle through the body, then thread on a sequin and a tiny clear bead. Thread the needle back through the central hole of the sequin and back through the body. The bead is larger than the hole in the sequin, so it will hold the sequin in place.
- Stuff the headphones and attach them to the head with tails of yam left from crocheting. Unscrew the jewelry fastener and use one strand of black floss to sew one half of the clasp in the center of each headphone. Attach the cord to the headphones using leftover tails of yam.
- Stuff Bopbot's arms and legs and attach them to his body with leftover yarn.
- Shape your crobot firmly with your fingers. You can angle the arms to make him look as though he's dancing.



BLUEPRINT



ZOMBIEBOT

Just like people, crobots can get into trouble, too. No one knows what kind of accident this little bot has been in, but it was clearly a bad one. Someone has patched him up, rather roughly, but he still needs a lot of care to nurse him back to health. Even his silver cladding is rough and discolored, and one of his arms is hanging by a crocheted thread. He'll be so grateful for peace and quiet that all you need to do is find him a calm corner to call home-he'll be your friend for life.

YOU WILL NEED

- crochet hook, size C2 (2.75 mm)
- stitch marker or paper clip
- 1 yarn needle
- 1 embroidery needle
- toy stuffing to stuff the bot
- textured being yarn (a slightly spotty. tweedy texture is best to give your crobot an authentically distressed appearance)
- black embroidery floss (2 strands)
- beige embroidery floss (1 strand)
- 3 medium-sized screws, 1/4 inch (15 mm) long
- 1 small nail
- 2 small gray shirt buttons (mismatched buttons will give Zombiebot an even more disheveled look).
- 2 small springs (dismantle 2 retractable ballpoint pens to obtain these)





TO ASSEMBLE ZOMBIEBOT

- Stuff the head firmly, thread an embroidery needle
 with two strands of black floss, and embroider two
 scars on Zombiebot's face. Use the photograph
 as a guide to place them, and make each from
 one long straight stitch with plenty of tiny straight
 stitches crossing it at right angles. Using one strand
 of beige floss, attach the left eye to the head.
- To make the damaged right eye, take one of the pen springs and sew one end of it to the face, using the beige floss. Attach the other end of the spring low on the face, then add a button at the lower end with several stitches, so that the eye appears to be dangling loosely on the cheek.

- Stuff the body firmly and embroider it with a scar in black floss, using the same process as the face scars. Attach the second spring across the upper left torso, stitching it on at each end with beige thread.
- Attach Zombiebot's head to his body using the leftover tail of varn.
- Stuff the arms. Attach the left arm to the body by its tail of yarn. For the hanging right arm, leave the top open with some stuffing protruding.
- and attach it on a length of yam about one-half inch long, leaving it hanging loosely against Zombiebot's side.
- Stuff the legs. Embroider a tiny scar on the right leg, and attach both legs to the body with the tails of yarn left over from crocheting.
- Using the photograph as a reference, gently press the screws and the nail into position on Zombiebot's head.





MECHANOBOT

Mechanobot is a hard worker. His huge rectangular head contains enough wiring for him to remember how everything works and how it can be fixed when it's broken. And he's willing to help, whatever the problem. His chocolate-mint color combination is set off by little metal details, although most hail from the haberdashery counter rather than the hardware store.



TO ASSEMBLE MECHANOBOT

- Using two strands of black floss, sew the sequins in position on the front of the face. Next embroider the mouth and eyebrows, checking the photograph for placement. The mouth is simply one long, single straight stitch and the eyebrows are one small straight stitch each.
- Attach the face to the back of the head using the tail of yarn left over from crocheting. Stuff firmly before closing up.
- Thread a needle with one strand of brown floss and sew the large brooch backs to the sides of the head to make Mechanobot's ears. Stitch the small brooch back on top of the head to make a receiver.
- Stuff the body firmly and close up. Using a beading needle with one strand of brown floss, sew the beads in a row along Mechanobot's body. Add the screw to the center of the body with a few stitches. Use a single strand of brown floss to sew the pen springs onto the body, bending them in from the sides so it looks as though Mechanobot has a firm grip on the screw. Sew the springs down, with a few stitches at each end.
- Mechanobot's legs are made from little stacks of press fasteners. Stack three fasteners on top of one another and use two strands of brown floss to sew through them all, then stitch to the body around the edges. Repeat for the second leg.
- Finally, attach Mechanobot's head to his body using the leftover tail of yarn.

RETROBOT

If you've ever enjoyed a vintage movie featuring robots, then Retrobot may have an oddly familiar look. His more-than-passing resemblance to Robbie the Robot, star of comics from the 1950s, combined with his red, black, and orange color scheme, gives him old-fashioned appeal. Some modern crobots have few visible controls, but Retrobot has plenty of reassuring buttons and switches on his outer casing.



TO ASSEMBLE RETROBOT

- Stuff the head and body firmly, then sew them together around the center with the tail of leftover drange yarn. Just before closing the gap, add a little more stuffing so that Retrobot is a good solid egg shape. Thread a needle with orange yarn and backstitch a straight line down the center of Retrobot's belly.
- Cut a narrow rectangular piece of white felt for the eye visor, comparing it to the photograph and Retrobot's body to ensure that it is the right size. Attach the eyes to the felt by threading a beading needle with one strand of green floss, stitching it through the felt in the position of the first eye, then threading on one red sequin followed by a green bead. Feed the needle back through the center hole of the sequin (the bead will hold it in place) and back through the felt. Finish off at the back. Repeat for the second eye. When both eyes are in place, thread an embroidery needle with one strand of white floss and attach the eye visor to the face with tiny overstitches.
- Thread the beading needle with a single strand of cherry-red floss and sew three green bugle beads onto Retrobot's forehead, as shown in the photograph.
- Using a single strand of metallic gray floss, sew the washers in place on Retrobot's head—they're a combination of his ears and receivers. Gently press the screw halfway into the center point at the crown of Retrobot's head.
- Still using a strand of metallic gray floss, sew the two remaining washers into place on the body. Thread the beading needle with one strand of green floss and add the beads and sequins to the orange line on Retrobot's tummy.
- Stuff the legs firmly, then use the beading needle and one strand of orange floss to sew three green bugle beads onto each one. Attach the legs to the body with leftover tails of yarn.
- Use a piece of cherry-colored yarn to stitch the feet to the base of the legs.
- Using one strand of black floss, sew on the little valves to make Retrobot's arms.

BOXBOT

Boxbot isn't much larger than a matchbox, although he stands firmly upright on two button legs. His surprised expression and many small embellishments give him a typical crobot charm, but it's not quite obvious what his robotic job should be. As his creator and owner, you may have to invent a useful role for him.



TO ASSEMBLE BOXBOT

- Start by stuffing the body quite firmly. Sew the base to the body using the leftover tail of yam. (Note: There are 28 sc around for the body and 32 sc for the base, so skip one stitch of the bottom piece at each corner as you sew it on.) Shape Boxbot to a nice even shape, with a flat top to his head.
- Cut a small rectangle of gray felt for Boxbot's face, then place it against his body and compare to the photograph to ensure that it will fit. Thread the beading needle with one strand of gray floss and sew Boxbot's snap fastener eyes into place on the felt. Then add his eyebrows, which are made with black bugle beads sewn on at a jaunty angle. Finally, add his mouth, which is a red bugle bead sewn on horizontally between the eyes.
- Stitch the face onto Boxbot's head, using a single strand of gray floss and small overstitches. Gently push a screw halfway into each side of Boxbot's head, making sure that they are positioned evenly. Then sew the nut to the top of Boxbot's head using a single strand of gray floss.
- Thread the beading needle with one strand of red floss and sew six bugle beads vertically onto the red stripe on the body, alternating green and gold beads. Sew the red sequins onto the body, attiching through the center hole and making five stitches around the edge.
- Thread the beading needle with one strand of green floss and sew three dark beads down one of Boxbot's sides. Repeat on the other side. Next attach the brooch bar fastener to the center of the body with a few stitches. Add a row of small yellow beads below the brooch pin, referring to the photograph for placement.
- Use green yarn to sew the two buttons onto Boxbot's base: They will serve as his short but practical legs.

BIGBOT

Bigbot has a positively threatening appearance—for a crobot, that is. His antennae are made from trembling springs, his fuel dial hovers around the halfway mark, and his expression is inscrutable. Is that big claw-like arm raised in a salute or a more forceful gesture? We can only guess, but his cheerful orange-and-green color combination, sequin adornments, and stubby little fingers suggest that this desktop guardian is friendly enough.





TO ASSEMBLE BIGBOT

- Embroider the face on the front panel before assembling the body. Sew on the sequin eyes using one strand of black floss and placing them carefully. Embroider the mouth between the eyes, starting with two strands of white floss and making a rectangular shape with three or four long horizontal stitches. Change to black floss. Use tiny stitches to outline the edges of the mouth, then make a few tiny vertical stitches over the white area to define the teeth.
- Cut a little semicircle of white felt for Bigbot's control panel. With two strands of black floss, use straight stitches to embroider the fuel gauge. With two strands of red, straight stitch the dial needle. Overstitch the switch onto Bigbot with one strand of white.
- Add a gold sequin at the base of the control panel and secure it in place with a black bead. Add two silver sequins for switches on Bigbot's front, using one strand of gray thread and securing them with clear beads.

- Sew up the pieces to form the body, using orange yarn, and stuff firmly before closing up. Stuff the arms and attach to the body with tails of yarn. To add Bigbot's fingers, use a yarn needle and green yarn to make three French knots on each hand.
- Stuff the boot trimmings and attach them to the legs, then sew the legs onto the body with the leftover tails of yarn.
- You can either let the arms rest alongside the body or shape the right arm so it is making a robot salute in the air.
- Finally, use gray thread to attach the spring antennae on top of Bigbot's head with two or three tiny stitches.



BABYBOT

This juvenile robot still has a baby face, with long eyelashes and raised metallic eyebrows giving him a surprised expression. His square little head and body, the control panel on his front, and his three red receivers, however, make him a full-fledged robot. Embroider the face and the embellishments before assembling Babybot. A small metallic zigzag closure up his back adds the finishing touch.



TO ASSEMBLE BABYBOT

- Embroider the face and the embellishments before assembling the head. The eyebrows are made using the metallic gray floss, and formed using two French knots each. Check the photograph on the preceding page to place them correctly.
- Using a double strand of black floss, start by stitching squares for the eyes, referring to the photograph to place them on the face. They are made from long, overlapping single stitches, placed horizontally and arranged one above the other to make a solid square. The mouth is made in the same way, but in the shape of a long, narrow rectangle.
- The eyelashes are made with single stitches.
 Position them carefully.
- When all the features are in place, sew up the pieces to form the head. Leave a small gap for filling, then pack firmly with tiny pieces of toy stuffing. Stitch up the gap using the yarn needle, and squeeze the head into a neat, square shape.
- Sew on the combination receivers/ears, using the tails of yarn left from the crocheting.
- Cut a tiny square of white felt for the front panel.
 Make the controls with two chain stitches and two
 French knots in metallic floss. Then stitch it onto the front of the body using white sewing thread and a tiny overstitch around the edges.
- Stuff the body and sew the head onto it using the tail of yarn left from the crocheting.
- Finally, stuff and sew on Babybot's arms and legs.



COSMIC BEAR

If it's written in the stars, Cosmic Bear will be able to work it out for you. Were it not for the strongly stitched rivet that bolts the two sides of his head together, you might mistake him for a regular teddy, but he's much more hardworking. The levers in his stomach allow you to compute his astral predictions, and his gaze is cast slightly skyward for some practical stargazing.



TO ASSEMBLE COSMIC BEAR

- Stuff the head firmly. Using the metallic thread, chain stitch a line around the center of the head, from the base of the back of the head to the base of the front.
- Cut a tiny circle of white felt for the nose and embroider a small black inverted triangle in the center of it, using two strands of black floss and straight stitches. Use a single strand of white floss and tiny overstitching to attach Cosmic Bear's nose to his face.
- For the eyes, cut two tiny ovals of white felt, glue them in position on Cosmic Bear's face, then sew on two black beads for the pupils. Embroider the mouth in a straight single stitch, using black yam. Sew some little white beads on either side of Cosmic Bear's head rivet, using a single strand of white floss and the beading needle.
- Pin the ears into place and sew them onto the head with leftover tails of yarn.
- Stuff Cosmic Bear's body firmly and sew the levers to his front using metallic thread. Make the three vertical lines with chain stitch, then add three bugle beads for the levers, stitching them across the lines at three different levels with a beading needle and one strand of blue floss.
- Stuff the legs and sew them onto the body using tails of yam left from crocheting. Sew Cosmic Bear's head onto his body, and complete him by sewing his arms in place at his sides.

THINKER

There's nothing anthropomorphic about Thinker—he's all bot. His pure white body and decorative finishing touches give him a fresh, pristine look, and his large head and spindly embroidered arms offer a hint that this crobot's skill lies mainly in his analytic abilities. With his sweetly wistful face, he makes a peaceful desktop friend.



WHEELY

Wheely has no need for arms or legs—she has a pair of wheels to roll her out and about! She has a pleasant but minimal face, a rounded body, and a tiny, touching heart embroidered with minute red beads. Although she isn't as complicated as some of her crobot friends, her finishing and details must be immaculately executed to give her a characteristically clean and tidy appearance.




TO ASSEMBLE LIHEELY

- Use a single strand of black floss and a beading needle to sew on the bugle beads for Wheely's eyes. Place them carefully, looking at the position in the photograph. Use the same thread to embroider a little mouth between the eyes with a single, horizontal straight stitch.
- Attach the head to the body with the tail of yarn left from crocheting, and stuff Wheely firmly before closing her up. Cut two pieces of felt, one red, one blue. Attach these to the body using two strands of black floss and crossing the thread over the top of the felt pieces, using the picture for reference.
- Using the beading needle threaded with two strands of red floss, embroider a little heart on Wheely's front, placing beads around the edges and in the center as shown in the photograph
- Use the embroidery needle and two strands of red thread to sew the central line around Wheely's body. You can use small overlapping straight stitches or a chain stitch for this.
- Flatten out the wheels with your finger. Using two strands of gray embroidery floss, chain stitch the details onto the wheels—each has a small central circle and six straight spokes. Then attach the wheels to the body using leftover tails of yarn.
- Attach the screw to Wheely by gently pushing it about halfway into the center top of her head.

SPACE MOUSE


Space Mouse has a slightly pointed head, big satellite-dish ears, and a lavishly curly tail. Exposed wiring around her legs and the edges of her ears reveals her robotic status, and her keen black eyes can see a long way. Little ricrac and snap fastener details make up her unusual control panel, and her large, vertical eyes lend her an alert, ready-to-go look.





- Thread a yam needle with black yam and make Space Mouse's nose and eyes. Each of the eyes is one long, straight stitch, the nose is an inverted triangle of small horizontal stitches. Using backstitch, embroider the line down from the nose with a single strand of black floss.
- Stuff the body and sew on Space Mouse's controls with the metallic gray floss. Secure the braid first, using small stitches down the middle. Use the beading needle to attach the sequin and secure it with a bead in the center at the lower end of the ricrac braid. Add the snap fasteners, using only the lower half of each one.
- Attach the body to the head with the leftover tail of yarn.
- Stuff the legs. Wind a length of metallic gray floss around each leg, stitching it through the bottom, then winding it in five spirals around the leg before stitching through the leg and tying the thread off.
 Sew the legs to the body with the leftover tails of yam.
- Attach the arms to the body with the leftover tails of yarr. Bend the folded arm into position and fasten it into place at Space Mouse's side with a single stitch.
- Shape Space Mouse's head to a slight point at the top.
- Attach the tail to Space Mouse's lower back.

ALIENBOT

You can tell that this small crobot isn't from any nearby planet. Not only are those big, pointy ears a giveaway but—almost unheard of for a bot—her control panel runs across the top of her head. And her surprised—and slightly apprehensive—face lets you know that she wasn't expecting to find herself in her current surroundings, either. Maybe the best thing you can do is to make her a matching friend (in a contrasting color?) so that they can share their alien experiences.



Using a beading needle and a single strand of black floss, sew a black bead onto each of the felt circles, experimenting with positioning to give Alienbot her slightly apprehensive expression. Stitch the pieces of felt to the black eye circles using a small overstitch with one strand of white floss.
- Stuff the head firmly. Then sew on the eyes using the black tails of yarn left over from the crocheting.
- Cut a small, long rectangle of red felt, trying it against Alienbot's head for size. It should come down to the tops of her eyes at the front, and to about the same point on the back of her head. Thread a beading needle with one strand of red floss and sew multicolored bugle beads along it, alternating the colors. Then stitch it in position on the head, using tiny overstitches.
- Flatten the ears a little, then pin them in place and sew them onto the head with the tails of yarn left over from crocheting.
- Stuff the body firmly. Using the metallic purple thread, chain stitch a little arch in the middle of the body, and add a metallic bead just underneath it.
- Sew the head to the body using the tail of yarn left over from crocheting.
- Lightly stuff the arms and legs and attach them to the body with the tails of yarn left from crocheting.

Round and energetic, Bouncebot has gleaming, multifaceted eyes, a rich assortment of controls, and a rolling, bouncy walk. 

- Thread a beading needle with one strand of blue floss, and sew a row of five small sequins along Bouncebot's forehead. First thread a sequin onto the thread, then one of the tiny red beads. Thread the needle back through the central hole of the sequin, then back onto Bouncebot's head, and repeat with the other four sequins and beads. Use the same thread to sew a gold bugle bead for the mouth; to get the slightly quizzical expression, sew it on a little crooked. Stitch the valve firmly to the top of Bouncebot's head, using one strand of blue floss.
- Cut a triangle from the white felt, trying it against Bouncebot's body for size. Using a beading needle and one strand of red floss, sew on the row of red beads and the green sequin, secured in place with the green bead.
- Thread an embroidery needle with one strand of white floss and sew the triangle to the body with tiny overstitches.
- Using the beading needle and one strand of blue floss, sew three bugle beads onto the body, to one side of the triangle, lined up in a horizontal "block." Repeat on the other side.
- Using the embroidery needle threaded with one strand of gray floss, sew the nuts into position for the arms. Overstitch around the edges to secure them. Then place one bead-headed pin in the center of each nut.
- Finally, use the tail of yarn left from the crocheting to sew the black base to the underside of Bouncebot's rounded body.





MATRYOSHKA

Matryoshka is a housekeeping crobot par excellence. Her mother was a babushka and her father was a robot, which takes her skills into a high league of efficiency indeed. Her rivets, dials, and switches show that she's quite technical at heart, but her round, comfortable shape gives her a sturdy, cheerful presence. If you were hard-hearted enough to squeeze her tightly, she'd make an excellent stress ball.



TO ASSEMBLE MATRYOSHKA

- Begin by embroidering the face. Thread an embroidery needle with two strands of black floss and backstitch the zigzag line down the center of the face, following the photograph for positioning. Once you have sewn the main line, create a dotted second line with small running stitches, following the shape of the first. Stitch the eyelids and lashes with single straight stitches, then thread the needle with two strands of blue floss and embroider the inses with several straight, overlapping stitches.
- For the cross-shaped mouth, thread the embroidery needle with two strands of red floss and make two tiny straight stitches, one horizontal and one vertical.
- Thread the needle with one strand of white floss and use small overstitches to attach the face to the body.
- Use the beading needle and one strand of red floss to attach the row of sequins. Thread a sequin and a bead onto the needle and pull the thread back through the center of the sequin to secure it in place on Matryoshka's front. Sew the row of green beads under the sequin "switches."
- Cut two small round pieces of white felt for the dials and overstitch them onto the body with one strand of white floss. Embroider the dial details with two strands each of black thread and red thread, using neat straight stitches.
- Use the beading needle and two strands of red floss to attach the little valve antenna to the top of the head.
- Firmly shape Matryoshka's body into a neat, even oval shape.

BLUEPRINT



NINJABOT

Ninjabot is a pocket-sized crobot warrior. Spare yet elegant in a black matte finish, he carries his staff on his back and his heart—actually his secret weapon—in his hand. His minute headband is held in place by a sparkling sequin and his control panel is a neat red circle on his chest. His expression is bold but endearing—somehow you know that this little fighter will always be on the side of the good guys.

YOU WILL NEED

- crochet hook, size C2 (2.75 mm).
- stitch marker or paper clip
- 1 yarn needle
- 1 embroidery needle
- 1 beading needle
- · toy stuffing to stuff the bot



TO ASSEMBLE NINJABOT

- Embroider the face first. Thread the beading needle with two strands of black floss and sew on the two black bugle beads vertically, using the photograph as a guide to place them. Make a short straight stitch at an angle above each eye to make Ninja's eyebrows—they add to his determined look.
- Attach the face to the head using the tail of yarn left over from crocheting. Before closing up, stuff the head firmly, then shape it into a neat rectangular block.
- Sew the two black pieces that compose the neck onto the head with the leftover tail of yarr. Place them precisely in the middle of the head's underside, so that it rests on them in a natural position.



- Attach the body to the neck using a leftover tail of yarn or black floss. Stuff the legs firmly and pin them into place before sewing them onto the body.
- Stuff the arms, pushing the stuffing down to the ends with a toothpick to fill the gloves. Attach the arms to the body, shaping them in a slight curve to make it look as if Ninjabot is ready for action.
- Using one strand of red floss and the beading needle, stitch the silver star-shaped sequin onto Ninjabot's right hand. Thread the sequin onto
- the needle, follow it with a bead, and stitch back through the center hole of the sequin to secure it in place. Attach the round sequin to his headband in the same way.
- Squeeze Ninjabot's head gently into his headband (it should be a snug fit). Prepare his staff by wrapping a long tail of black yarn a few times around the small wooden stick, then use the end of the yarn to stitch the staff neatly in place on Ninjabot's back.



CATBOT

Catbot has an independent streak, but an affectionate owner can keep her in line with judicious use of her remote control, which is attached to her body with a gleaming metallic cord. She makes a good virtual pet, sitting quietly alongside you, but there's something about her unusual multi-pupil eyes that tells you she's got a mind of her own. If Dogbot is just too docile to suit you, try Catbot for size.



 Attach them in position on her face using a single strand of white floss and tiny overstitches.
- Using two strands of black floss and long, straight stitches, embroider Catbot's double pupils, her eyelashes, and her nose.
- When you have completed Catbot's face, sew up
 the pieces to form her head, using a leftover tail of
 yarn. Before closing up, stuff firmly, then shape into
 a neat rectangle. Attach the ears in place, stitching
 them on with their tails of yarn.
- Stuff the body, then sew the beads and sequins into position using one strand of blue floss. Refer to the photograph to place them neatly. You can either stitch a bead into the center of each sequin or use a contrasting color thread to stitch a star shape with five little stitches into the center of the sequin from the edge.
- Attach Catbot's head to her body using a leftover tail of yarn.
- Stuff the arms and legs and stitch them to the body using their tails of yarn.
- Make the front of the remote control by cutting a tiny piece of white felt to fit. Sew beads on with a single strand of white floss and a beading needle, then use tiny stitches to overlock the felt to the body of the remote control. Stitch the cord onto the remote control and attach the other end in position on Catbot's body.
- Finally attach the cord to the remote and the back of the body.



BLUEPRINT



GIRLIEBOT

Girliebot is well named—she's as feminine as a sugar-pink color scheme, Lurex detailing, and a handful of glittering sequins can make her. She makes a good companion for Geisha because they share the same impulse to be useful, allied with sweet and ingenuous natures. Consider making both of them and setting them up on a desktop together.



Thread a beading needle with two strands of black floss and sew the eyes in place, first threading on a sequin, then adding a bead and sewing back through the center of the sequin to hold it in place. Using two strands of black floss, embroider the eyelashes and eyebrows. The eyelashes are made with two tiny vertical stitches at a slight angle to the eyes, and the eyebrows are shaped from two short, straight stitches overlapping a little in the middle to create an arch. Use two strands of red floss to make a slightly pouting mouth from a French knot.
- Use pink yam to sew the small buttons in place on the sides of the head for ears. Press a red-headed pin into the center of each, so it sticks up slightly, like an antenna.
- Stuff the body firmly and secure each sequin with a colored bead as described above. Refer to the picture to place the sequins. Stitch between the sequins with purple metallic thread to complete the control panel. Use pink yarn to attach the silver "eye" to form a little handle to the right of the panel.
- Attach the head and arms to the body using leftover tails of purple yarn.
- Thread a yam needle with pink yam, thread two
 of the larger buttons onto it, and stitch them to
 the underside of Girliebot to make a leg. Repeat
 to make the second leg.

SUMO

Sumo has a wrestler's build and solid little red legs. His teeny beaded arms are the clearest hint that he's actually a robot (he's one of the few with no obvious control panel). His cheerfully upright crest of hair, sharp black eyes, and waistband all contribute to his name and his status as one of the heavy lifters of the crobot world, ready and able to bear a heavy load.

Depending on how tight you crochet and how firmly you stuff the body, you might want to adjust the length of the belt and crochet more or fewer stitches. If you prefer, you can use a piece of ricrac braid or a short length of ribbon.

TO ASSEMBLE SUMO

- First add the facial features. Thread the beading needle with two strands of black floss and sew the two black bead eyes into position on the head, making sure that they are level before stitching. Add small, straight stitches all around each eye to give Sumo his alert, surprised expression.
- Embroider the mouth by threading the sewing needle with two strands of white floss and making a rectangular shape with four or five horizontal straight stitches. Overlap them slightly to get a solid white shape. Thread the needle with two strands of black floss and use backstitch to outline the mouth in black. Then make a few separate vertical straight stitches to show Sumo's teeth.
- Once Sumo has his cheerful, stalwart expression, add his limbs. Thread the sewing needle with one strand of red floss and stitch the two parts of each leg together, then stitch them firmly to the body.
- Sew Sumo's arms to his sides using a leftover tail
 of yarn. His tiny bead fingers are made from two
 green beads on each side—thread the beading
 needle with one strand of green floss and stitch
 two beads into the center of each arm.
- Add Sumo's hair and topknot. Fold the topknot onto the hairpiece and stitch it into place using a leftover tail of yarn. Position the hair on Sumo's head and stitch it into place.
- Arrange Sumo's belt around his waist and between his legs, then thread a needle with a single strand of gray floss and use a few stitches to fix the belt in place.



GEISHA

Sweet, shy, traditional yet robotic, Geisha captures hearts whether she's perching on your desk or taking care of your keys. The fine details give this bot her charm—tiny sandals on her feet, a neat and elaborate hairstyle finished with carefully tied threads, and delicately drawn features. For such a tiny bot, you'll find it easier to assemble the pieces using sewing thread and a small needle, rather than yarn.



TO ASSEMBLE GEISHA

Make 2

- Getting the happy, tranquil expression of Geisha just right is important, so take care while stitching the face. Start by stuffing the head firmly with scraps of toy stuffing. To help you place the eyes, you can draw them with an air-erasable pen, making sure that they are level on the face.
- Using two strands of black floss, make a single straight stitch for each eye and go over it with a tiny stitch in the middle to give it an arch. Do the same with the eyelashes.
- Still using two strands of black floss, straight stitch the three little hairs of the fringe.
- Thread your needle with two strands of red floss and embroider the mouth, making a diamond shape with four tiny straight stitches. The cheeks are made with French knots.
- Gently squeeze the head into the hair cap. Stuff
 the buns and sew them onto the sides of the head
 with the leftover tails of yarn. Using black sewing
 thread, make a few tiny stitches around the hair
 cap to secure the hair to the head.
- Stuff the body firmly. Using the metallic gray floss, chain stitch the kimono belt and its diagonal closure. Stuff the head and sew to the body with the remaining tail of yarn.
- Stuff the feet and embroider the shoe details with two strands of white thread, using two straight stitches to make a V shape. Attach feet to body using black sewing thread.
- Stuff the arms and sew them onto the body with sewing thread in the color of the dress.
- Finally, tie threads that match the color of her dress around Geisha's hair buns.

CROBOTS

20 irresistible amigurumi creatures to crochet

A craze that began in Japan but has now definitely gone global, amigurumi—cute little stuffed dolls—are fun and fast to make, and can be customized easily to give every one a personal twist. The 20 original designs in this book are based around tiny mechanical creatures, crobots, each with his or her own qualities and abilities: from Babybot, who is just growing into his silver suit; to Geisha, with her downcast gaze, blushing pink cheeks, and efficient demeanor; and Dogbot, the crobots' best friend, who sports a natty white face mask and a jauntily upright tail. With the attitude of creatures 10 times their size, these little dolls are only 3 or 4 inches high, and are finished with a host of details, from switches and dials to improbably long eyelashes.

Easy enough to be made by a crochet novice, charming enough for you to want to complete the whole robotic menagerie, and curiously addictive both to make and to play with, crobots are bound to start plenty of crazes of their own.
