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ONOMATIC INDICES

MAY

AY is from the Greek Mala, mother of Merresponding to the Hindu Maya (illusion), the female who acts the part in the production of the universe, considered to have only an illusory existence. In Egyptian mythology, she appears as Maut, wife of Seb (Saturn).

The preservation of this root-word through the various languages is interesting. It is found in Icelandic mall, and in German mag, from Sanskrit mah, meaning great, hence out own word, may, expressing power. The Sanskrit verb mu means to make, measure or form-identical in idea with the substantive "ma" in our own language.

Maia, mother of Mercury, reappears as Maya, mother of Buddha, and as Mary, mother of Christ

Mercury, Buddha and Christ being but different tiames for the same idea.

This "mother" is simply a personification of Matter (mater), and the syllable MAT is the very synthesis of the world mystery itself. M expresses the fluidic substance through which the solar potency acts to produce all forms from A to T—the first and last letters of the ancient alphabet. AT thus represents all that exists, hence the origin of the old words, SAT, truth, TAT, existence. Transpose MAT, and you get ATM (atom or atma). The atom is an individualized entity, the form and dwelling-place of the living, immortal atma (soul).

The month of May is the season when the great miracle of atomic conception takes place. The wild boar Aper (April) has been slain by Hercules (Hermes), and Maia—who is no other than Venus, the shimmering goddess rising from the sea—commands the miracle through the witchery of her grace, to which all nature responds in a madrigal of love.

You remember the tale of Venus and Adonnis and the wild boar—it is the same tale, poetically told, of this old miracle-play of nature, enacted in the month of Maia.

Alchemically, we are nearing the birth of the sun, Horus—the infant son, Immanual, that comes to "redeem his brethren." This event was celebrated by all the ancient peoples on the first of May with loud rejoicings. Great fires were lighted to Hel, the sun-god, and many feasts were celebrated in anticipation of the happy event. In the rural districts of the British Isles the people still keep up these celebrations to some extent.

In England they dance the may-pole dance, in Ireland they light the bellain (fires of Bel), in Scot-

land they break the oat-cake, and draw for the tharred piece. The one to whom it falls has to leap through the fire thrice—a relic of Druid worship.

But the mystery of the ancient wisdom is singularly perpetuated in the parade of the chimney sweeps that takes place in London, or did formerly, on the first of May. The sweeps assemble in procession with their faces blackened, and dressed in red, blue, and yellow. In the center of the group there is a figure known as "Jack-in-the-green"—a sweep enclosed in a bower of leaves, made in the form of a pyramid some ten or more feet high.

It is true in nature as in art, that at this period all colors appear vividly, the principal tints being the primary colors, like the dresses of the chimney-sweeps—red, blue, yellow—through which the green is ever flashing, producing kaleidoscopic effects, all of which is the work of Maya—an illusory phenomenon which will soon pass, to make way for one more glorious and permanent.

The first period of this reign, Apr. 19 to May 3, is represented by the letter I, a positive symbol of solar action, corresponding to the tenth sephera of the cabalists—Malkuth, "the virgin." In the modern alphabet it is number 9, JESOD, the foundation; while J. JESUS, the structure, is the tenth referring to the latter part of this period—May 3 to Mar. 19—which is negative and receptive of the solar influences.

Contrast the forms of I and J. The straight line represents God, limitless and unending. The curve expresses Nature, circumscribing, limiting.

Nature—Maia—has the power to bend the straight line into FORM. This whole period is governed by Venus in Taurus.

The influence of Venus upon the disposition is well expressed by an old writer on astrology: "She is joyful, laughter-loving, and liberall; making pleasers, dauncers, entertayners of women, players, perfumers, musitions, messengers of love." Or, to quote a more modern writer, "She is the symbol of the beaux arts and a friend to culture and refinement, neatness, orderliness, sweetness, grace, beauty, convivality and virtuousness."

SECRETS OF SCRIPTURE. IV

THE CREATION

"And the Elohim said, Let the earth bring forth the living creature after his kind, cattle and creeping thing, and beast of the earth after his kind:...and it was so."

There is nothing in particular for the occult student to notice here except that the conditions for the great result are gradually perfected. The soft bodies of the molecules that dart through the water or fly up through the air like fishes or birds, have now become harder, denser, and their movements consequently slower. The things that flew, walk; those that swam, creep. The Sea is slowly

congealed into Earth, which, like choral, may truly be said to be made of the bodies of these "animals. That which is being represented here is the formation of a crystalline structure. The anima or life principle becomes more and more manifest, and bodies more shapely as the centripetal force obtains greater mastery, and the law of revolution is brought more into action.

"And the Elohim said, Let us make man in our image, after our likeness; and let him have dominion over the fish, the fowl, the cattle, and over all the earth and every creeping thing."

This is manifestly the crowning achievement of the work. It is, however, a question which commentators have long wrangled over, why the work should be finished in the first chapter as it is, and then taken up in the next and apparently begun over. The theory of two distinct accounts, that is, manuscript records, has been advanced to explain it. But the error of all the commentators and thinkers on this subject has been simply in not perceiving that this first chapter is entirely symbolical and does not refer to the creation of man, the human being, at all. The Hebrew word here translated "man" is ADM, from adamah, meaning simply, "red earth." This is an example of the many far-fetched conjectures of theologians put forward in explanation of things not understood. Why assume that man was made of "red-earth?" Why not of white or blue clay, or of black loam?

The term ADM is really an allegorical expression—and a very suggestive one—to represent the formation of certain elemental substances of a protoplasmic nature, through which the birth and development of man is, ages afterwards, made possible.

This entire genetic record is a secret hieratic document. It is the work of the priests or wise men of a very remote age. For untold centuries it was preserved through tradition, and when at last it was written down by the Cabiri (the priests of ancient Egypt), it was so composed as to appear like an ordinary narrative; and yet, in the original language (the old Hebrew), there are cabalistic keys revealing to the close student the meaning of the hidden mystery.

In theological schools, no student ever comes to suspect this fact. For one reason, every word that could arouse suspicion and lead to anything but orthodox conclusions has been carefully elided or mistranslated by the fathers of the church. Nor will the Hebrew rabbins aid in the solution of the mystery. For they are as jealous of their ancient writings as anyone could possibly be, though they have long since lost the key themselves.

I am well aware that it will seem singular that this creative act should refer to anything but man and woman; and yet observe, right in the next chapter, after all was finished, it distinctly states, There was not a man to till the ground! In truth, there was not. Some light concerning the character of the "Man" referred to in this primal narrative may be obtained by tracing out the root meaning of the word itself. The root of the word Man is formed by the two consonants, MAY, which comes out in man, men, moon, mind. In the old languages both letters relate to the element Water. In Hebrew MEM (M) is "water," and NUN (N) is "fish." Here we have the idea in a unt-shell. The "fish" belongs in the "water" is virtually, as we may say, a part of the water. The Fish (N) is the higher principle the spirit, the Water (M) is the lower principle the body. MN represents the spirit incorporate. If we apply sex to these principles, M is the feminine or antecedent principle, while N is the evolved masculine.

Biology teaches us that the male is slowly evolved from the original ONE, which for a long time exists in a virgin state and reproduces parthenogenetically. It is contracy to observed fact that the sexes in nature are created together in perfect form, which is another proof that this account cannot refer to man. That which is created here is manifestly perfect, being simply the expression of the energy of the solar (N) sphere becoming potential in the terrestrial (M) sphere.

There is but one creation knewn to man and that to exceedingly few men—which presents simultaneously a perfect male and a perfect !emale, having power over all things, transforming them to their own purity—One who knows this to be true, knows also that this ancient worthy, the writer of Genesis, whether he lived six thousand or six miltion years ago, must have been referring to, and describing this very thing, for there is no other thing that could possibly accord with the description.

This wondrons substance might well be named SOLLUNA, once it is a union of the clobistic potencies in FORM. The g Is are imaged in it, and through it as a vehicle, they do their perfect work. Thus IT truly hath dominion.

"And the Elohim said, Behold, I have given you every herb seeding seed, which is upon the

face of all the earth, and every tree, in the which is the fruit of a tree yielding seed; to you it shall be for meat. And to every beast and to every fowl and to every thing that creepeth, every green herb for meat. . And the evening and the morning were the sixth day."

This text has been the subject of much amusing interpretation. It has for one thing been used to clinch the argument in favor of a vegetarian and fruitarian diet. The truth is that nothing whatever is said here about either vegetables or fruit. If this text did relate to the animate creation, it would imply that all animals should be herbiverous, whereas nothing is further from the fact.

But really it has no reference to the nutrition of any living organic species. The "YOU" addressed in the first part of the text is the Supreme Creation, sol-luna (MN). The "herb" is the green ray—the vital ray—of the sun. It is in nature the substance chlorophyll, the green coloring matter in leaves. Surely it makes the "herb" to appear, and is the transmuting agent, the very door of life, where spirit (solar magnetism) passes into matter (lunar substance).

In one of the most ancient of languages (Zend, Persian), Word and Light are identical. This mysterious "Word" that has crept into theological thought, and which is universally considered to be a "Lost Word" is nothing more nor less than Light. The light itself is surely apparent, but that which is lost is the knowledge of the magical potency of light the rationale of its creative power.

The solar seed sown in the earth through the mediation of Light are fed with the milk of the Virgin Earth, till they develop into elemental spirits. It has long been a tradition that such spirits lived in the earth. Some have ascribed to them grotesque shapes, while others have conceived of them as being in pigmy human form. Their true form, rather, is spherical, and, though individually small, their combined potency appears superior to man's. At least, they can do a thousand things that man cannot do-things that he can hardly conceive of. They constitute the powers through which is created every form in Nature, the human form included. They represent the activity vaguely called "sub-conscious mind." They are at the base of all inexplicable phenomena. If man can come in rapporte with them, be becomes a magician, for the quality of his mind is such as to control them, within certain limits. He cannot change their action, but he can, if he knows how, divert it to his own advantage and utilize it at will. While these spirits are represented by two cutities, corresponding to the male and female sed they really embody four principles or states, which are imaged forth in the names, Earth, Water, Air, Fire; or Solid Liquid, Gaseous, Ethereal; or a gain in Carbon, Hydrogen, Nitrogen, Oxygen.

But science will never grasp the significance of these elements while it conceives of them as four. It must reduce them to two, and finally to one. It is the work of primal creation to create these two. One is evolved through the "herb," the green ray mirrored forth as Venus on the life plane, becoming concrete in the metallic form of copper; while the red ray, coming from the sun, and evolved through the "beast," becomes manifest as Mars, or iron. But the makers, farmers, of these and other metals are the elemental spirits of Sol and Luna, working together in close harmony in the Earth.

Both herb and beast feed on one thing, become one thing, leaving their dost as an heritage to future genera. In it lie concealed all herbs, all trees, all animals, all men. It is the wonder of

creation-the Virgin of the World.

COLOR MAGIC

INTRODUCTION

Color. While shades of color are almost infinite, the spectrum reveals only seven definite colors: Red, Orange, Yellow, Green, Blue, Indigo, Violet. Of these, Red, Yellow and Blue are the three foundational colors, which I shall denominate the Primary Trinity.

A Black color is caused by the absorption of all the color-rays of light; a White color, by the reflection of all. It is customary to speak of black as the absence of color, and white as containing all colors.

In dealing with the occult, it is manifest that we need to reverse all appearances, in order to arrive at a true conception of existing facts: Nature, the phenomenal, is the inverted image of God, the noumenal.

Thus, the body which appears Black, having absorbed all the rays of light, is occultly most luminous, while the whitest body is interiorly darkest.

The Sun, being the source of all light, itself is most intensely black; while the earth, though seemingly opaque, is perfectly white and transparent when viewed from within.

For the purposes of development, it is necessary to conceive of the Earth as the center of the universe, and to think of it as it appears—a dark mass. Surrounding this are to be imaged concentric Color Bands of increasing luminosity as we go outward toward the solar sphere, which forms the outermost band.

From time immemorial it has been the custom of the Magi to speak of these Bands as "planets"—a word meaning "little planes," and having no direct or special reference to the worlds in space. Astronomy borrowed the astrological names and applied them to these heavenly bodies, but originally the names meant something entirely different, as we shall see.

The true ancient wisdom has been preserved in the naries of the Days of the Week, in several languages, and from these we are enabled to form a basis for our study and investigation.

The days of the week go forward in divine order-involution and backward in human order—

evolution. This fact is a key to the sequence of color phenomena in the Great Work of Nature

It is with sincere regret that I chronicle the discontinuance of "The Social Spirit," edited and published by that brave and talented compatriot, Franklin H. Wentworth. In the closing number (February) the editor says:

"A year and a half of the sincerest effort has not demonstrated that the value of The Social Spirit is commensurate with the life that has been poured into it. It has always shrunk from capitalistic methods in securing subscriptions, making the deliberate experiment of ascertaining if the movement were able to sustain it at its actual value. . . . There has been no failure anywhere, but the editor believes he can give greater service to the movement in other directions than the publishing of a subsidized monthly."

I date say many of my readers do not understand the significance of the term "subsidized" as employed by Mr. Wentworth. It refers to the claim put forward by the operators of our Lawmaking Machine, that certain appropriations are necessary to conduct and carry on certain public necessities. One of these is the transportation of the mails. The "kick" made by the Department on conferring second class privileges is supported by their statement that the mails are carried at a loss.

Mr. Wentworth from time to time exposed this fraud in the government, showing that the subsidy in question went straight into the pockets of railroad and steamship corporations, which is simply equivalent to saying that subsidies are appropriations made by congress to meet the exorbitant dentands of transportation companies, who through unjust and corrupt legislation rob the people right and left.

To meet this subsidy-steal a whole lot of things are enacted and done. A nice little sum has already been realized through the clever manipulation of the postal lever controlled by Mr. Madden. I do not begin to know how much. Thus far they have taken only a few dollars from me, but enough so that if every inhabitant of the United States should be taxed as heavily, a fund of a billion dollars would be raised in six months quite enough, I think, to meet all subsidies up to date.

Mr. Shelton, Helen Wilmans, Henry Harrison, and many others have become large contributors to the same subsidy-fund already. Of course it is not policy to "touch" too many at once, but gradually one after another they are touched. In fact the whole affair is zery touching!

Russell Sage recently declared in the New York Journal that capitalists stood ready to take the Postoffice off the hands of the government at any time, under contract to run it far more economically and satisfactorily than it is now run. William Raudolph Hearst in speaking of the Speculative Trust as a get-rich-quick concern says, "Governmental connivance with these speculative trusts should be terminated, for it is just as vicious as the Postoffice promotion of the speculative racing scheme."
