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[Guide to Names](#)

All names are Sumerian, unless otherwise specified.

Anunaki: The judges of the Sumerian underworld.

Dionysus: Greek god of wine, the theater, and ecstasy.

Dumuzi: A mortal shepherd, loved by Inanna. She married him and made him a king.

Ea: A later name for Enki

Enki: God of crafts, mischief, and fresh water

Enlil: Lord of the Wind. The chief deity of the Sumerian pantheon.

Ereshkigal: Ruler of the Sumerian underworld.

Erra: *See Nergal*

Gugalanna: "The Great Bull of Heaven." Ereshkigal's first husband. He was killed by Gilgamesh's companion Enkidu while trying to defend the honor of Inanna/Ishtar.

Hecate: Greek goddess of magic and the crossroads, associated with the dark moon.

Inanna: "Queen of Heaven and Earth." Goddess of sex and war in the Sumerian pantheon, represented by the Evening Star. She was later called Ishtar.

Irkalla: A name for both the Sumerian underworld and its queen.

Kur: Literally "mountain." It came to mean both the underworld and a primordial monster that lived there who may have abducted Ereshkigal.

Namtar: An underworld messenger.

Nergal: God of pestilence. After first insulting Ereshkigal by refusing to honor her messenger, he was forced to descend to the underworld. Eventually he became Ereshkigal's husband and co-ruler.

Neti: Ereshkigal's steward, chief gatekeeper in the underworld.

Ninlil: “Lady of the Open Field.” Consort of Enlil.

Persephone: Greek goddess of the spring who was abducted by Hades, king of the Underworld. Although her mother Demeter demanded that she be returned, Persephone had consumed six pomegranate seeds, and so had to remain six months of the year in the underworld and six on the surface.

Introduction

Ereshkigal fixed Inanna with the eye of death
She pronounced the word of wrath against her
Inanna fell down dead
Ereshkigal had her corpse hung on a hook

For a great many people, this passage from “The Descent of Inanna” sums up everything there is to know about Ereshkigal, goddess of the Sumerian underworld: she is angry, jealous of her beautiful younger sister, vindictive, and vengeful. In literary terms, she exists primarily as the antagonist in the story of Inanna’s Descent. In psycho-spiritual terms, she embodies the Shadow Self: all that is marginalized, hidden, and devalued within us. Do an internet search on her name and what comes up are primarily references to her as the villain of “The Descent” or lists of underworld demons. Academic research doesn’t turn up much more. Ereshkigal is considered scary, mean, and dangerous – but ultimately a minor figure in myth and spirituality.

This devotional is a corrective to that perspective. Ereshkigal is not simply a bit player in someone else’s story, and while “nice” isn’t one of her attributes, there is far more to her character than rage and jealousy. She is a Goddess of Boundaries, refusing to be taken advantage of. She is a Companion in Grief, sharing the agony of losing a loved one. She is Goddess of Dealing With Your Shit, of facing all the things you would rather not admit about yourself, doing something about it, and becoming more than what you were. And yes, she is Mistress of the Descent: sometimes putting us through ordeals, sometimes simply there to help us through the inevitable dark places in life. She is one of the deities who operate the spiritual forges, those who help us be strengthened by hardship rather than destroyed by it.

In my experience of her, Ereshkigal is a tough but supportive boss who doesn’t accept excuses or quibbling, but who is willing to answer questions and respond to arguments – and she is quick to give praise when it’s been earned. She’s not cuddly, but she is compassionate, in a tough love kind of way. She won’t blink or flinch as she hangs you up on a hook, but she doesn’t do it just for fun.

The Ancient Texts

Ereshkigal's Arrival in the Underworld

Ereshkigal appears in three different myths from the Ancient Near East, where she was worshipped from approximately 3000 BCE into the Common Era. The texts which have survived into the present are fragmentary, and there are different versions from different eras, but what we have is sufficient to paint a complex portrait.

The “story” of how Ereshkigal entered the underworld is briefly mentioned in “Gilgamesh, Enkidu, and the Netherworld.” In the very first days of the world, the god An took the heavens for his domain, Enlil took the seas, and Ereshkigal ended up in Kur.

Samuel Noah Kramer, “the father of Sumerian studies,” originally translated the phrase that described Ereshkigal’s fate as “being carried off violently into the netherworld,”¹ and this continues to be the most familiar interpretation of the story. Kramer explicitly equated Ereshkigal with the Greek Persephone, a perspective shared by some of the authors of the Greco-Egyptian magical papyri who invoked the two goddesses together. More than one modern worshipper has also invoked them together, or as a conflated deity.

However Thorkild Jacobsen, an equally respected authority on Sumerian language and culture, asserts that Kramer’s translation was incorrect. “The verb-phrase *sag-rig-ga-se*. . . *rig* does not mean, as Dr. Kramer translates it, ‘to carry off as a prize,’ but literally ‘to present as a presented present. . . . [a phrase used typically] of (1) votive offerings, including votaries presented to a deity, and (2) the dowry given to a woman at her marriage.”²

Which interpretation is closest to the original may never be known. What we can say is that Ereshkigal did not begin as an underworld goddess, but once she entered that realm – called Irkalla or Kur – she never emerged again.

The Descent of Inanna

In this famous story, Ereshkigal’s younger sister Inanna, goddess of sex and war, called The Queen of Heaven and Earth, decides to pay a visit to Ereshkigal. Her stated reason is to share the funeral rites for Ereshkigal’s husband Gugalanna, The Great Bull of Heaven, but she is not welcome. Ereshkigal allows Inanna to enter, but as Inanna descends through each of the seven gates of the underworld she is forced to surrender a piece of her regalia. At the bottom, “naked and bowed low,” she enters Ereshkigal’s presence. Ereshkigal “utters the word of wrath against her” and “fixes her with the eye of death” and Inanna dies. Ereshkigal hangs her corpse on a peg, where it turns into rotting green meat. Inanna is saved through the intercession of her faithful servant and the god Enki, who creates two sexless creatures, the *kurgarra* and the *galatur*, and sends them down to the underworld. They find Ereshkigal on her throne, moaning in pain, and moan with her. Surprised and moved by their empathy, she asks them what gift they would like. They ask for Inanna’s corpse. Ereshkigal gives it to them, and they

revive Inanna with the food and water of life. Inanna ascends to the upper world, but must send someone down to take her place in the Great Below.

Ereshkigal's modern image and reputation are based almost entirely on this myth. She is portrayed as being jealous of her beautiful younger sister, and thus murderously bitter and vengeful. At worst, as indicated at the beginning of this essay, she is seen as little more than the villain of the piece, a foil to Inanna's beauty, daring, and triumph. Those who look deeper characterize her as a symbolic representation of the Shadow, those parts of our psyches which we deny, bury, and try to hide, but which can burst out and cause terrible damage. Some interpret Ereshkigal as Inanna's shadow self, to whom she must surrender in order to be born again out of Ereshkigal's birth pangs.

Many Neo-Pagans use "The Descent" as the basis for rituals. In "Ereshkigal's Visit," "The Dark Mother's Mysteries and Lessons," and "Ereshkigal Speaks," Priestesses Inara de Luna and Belladonna Laveau have contributed powerful accounts of what they learned taking turns embodying Ereshkigal and Inanna in a series of large group rituals.

The Marriage of Ereshkigal and Nergal

The least well-known of the ancient texts are two versions of how Ereshkigal came to marry Nergal, a god of pestilence. In this story, the gods are feasting in heaven and Namtar, Ereshkigal's messenger, goes to heaven to bring back her portion, for she is unable to ascend herself. While he is there all but one of the gods rise to do him honor for his mistress's sake, but Nergal does not. When Ereshkigal hears about this, she flies into a rage and demands that Nergal be sent to her to be punished. The gods comply, but Ea cautions Nergal about how to behave in order to survive the experience. He must not sit in the chair that is provided, not eat or drink anything given to him, and not give in to the temptation of Ereshkigal's body. The young god follows the first advice, but sees Ereshkigal preparing to bathe and is overcome by her beauty. He spends six days and nights with her, then sneaks out before dawn and returns to heaven.

Once again Ereshkigal rages against the injury done to her and demands justice. She threatens to raise the dead to devour the living unless she is given her due. Nergal descends again, but this time as an aggressor. He muscles his way through the gates, barges into the throne room, and seizes Ereshkigal by her hair. In the earlier version, the two go straight to bed. In the later version, Nergal prepares to cut off Ereshkigal's head. She weeps, offering him a share of her sovereignty. Nergal, surprised, instantly relents, kissing her.³

Lee Harrington gives voice to Nergal's love for Ereshkigal in his poem "To Stay a Seventh Day."

The Perspective of a Modern Priestess

For many years, I knew Ereshkigal only from "The Descent of Inanna," and had absolutely no interest in her. That changed radically in November of 2007 when a ritual I was participating in took an unexpected turn and I ended up lying in the dust at the foot

of her throne (see “Claimed by Ereshkigal”). Since then, Ereshkigal has been my patron, my teacher, and my mistress, and I’ve gained a far deeper understanding of her and her divine roles.

Goddess of Boundaries and Holy No

As I read and re-read the texts outlined above, I came to realize that Ereshkigal’s frequent anger was always the result of someone else violating her boundaries or transgressing against her person. Whether it is Inanna insisting on entering a realm where she has no business going or Nergal refusing the gestures of respect which every other deity offer, Ereshkigal refuses to let others take advantage of her or insult her. When she seeks justice, as in her cry to the gods to return Nergal to her, even her threats are phrased in terms of proper boundaries. Unless they return to her the one who is rightfully hers, she will allow the dead to re-enter the upper world and kill the living.

Ereshkigal herself remains within her boundaries. As the ruler of the dead she is ritually unclean and cannot approach heaven, nor can she walk the earth. Despite the loneliness and burden of her position (which she also describes in her cry for justice) she remains where she is.

When I was in my early twenties, I wrote an essay describing Inanna as the Goddess of Holy Yes. She is always acting according to her own will, always getting her way, always winning, always enjoying her sexuality. I have come to see Ereshkigal as the Goddess of Holy No. She is the one who helps us hold the line when others would take advantage of us. She is the one who encourages our righteous anger when our rights are violated, and who helps us say “I’m sorry, but no” when others ask for more than we can – or wish – to give.

The Goddess of Boundaries can also help us when we need to protect ourselves on the spiritual or psychic level, as Grace Barker describes in “Holding the Line.”

Mistress of the Descent

There are two kinds of descent: the voluntary and the involuntary. Ereshkigal can be a companion and guide to both.

The involuntary descent occurs when we are rocked by the worst of what life can bring, when we feel overwhelmed and helpless in the face of problems that can’t be fixed by a positive attitude or money or intelligence or friends. The descent can be due to the death or other loss of a loved one, injury or disease, employment problems, a dark night of the soul, or any of the countless other pains and sorrows of life. Ereshkigal can help us not just survive and endure these difficult passages, but find our way through to healing and transformation.

This was how I got to know her, as I struggled through three years of bitter grief over the death of my beloved partner. However warm the support of family and friends, nothing that anyone could say or do could bring him back from the dead or make it okay that he

was gone. I raged and cried and screamed – and Ereshkigal was there with me, never denying my pain but always helping me to accept the initiation of his death and begin to build something new out of it.

The voluntary descent is undertaken when we realize that we need a radical change, and that nothing less will do than to strip away those things which bind us to the past, to the people we've been, so something new can emerge. This can be done ritually, as Master Amazon describes in "Stripped to the Core," or in a systematic or radical lifestyle change. Ereshkigal is always ready to help us release or cut away that which no longer serves. What is released goes itself into the underworld to be composted, consumed, and transformed.

Queen of Swords / Merciful Blade

In the language of tarot, the sword signifies the intellect, discernment, and decision. Ereshkigal's cool, penetrating gaze acts as a psychic sword, cutting through illusion and denial and laying open the truth to our unwilling eyes. She has no tolerance for self-deceit or clinging to outmoded beliefs, as Grace Barker writes about in "The Seven Gates," a vivid portrayal of Ereshkigal as the Goddess of Dealing with Your Shit.

In "She Comes to Me Masked," Clare Vaughn describes her as having "a surgeon's compassion and precision, cutting away that which must be removed, shedding blood of necessity and not flinching from her difficult, painful task. She has the compassion of the knife, her edge honed to cut cleanly when she strikes. Hers is the bitter healing, not the sweet."

In the tarot, the Queen of Swords is identified with the widow, the divorcee, and the spinster: women embittered by experience and grief. Ereshkigal has become associated with the negative stereotypes of such women: the bitch, the harridan, the harpy – but for those who are willing to listen with compassion and courage, she illustrates the power and dignity of truth-telling rather than pleasing.

Ordeal Mistress

Combining the roles of Mistress of the Descent and Merciful Blade, Ereshkigal as Ordeal Mistress is the patron of those who offer themselves up to extreme physical rituals in order to achieve healing, transformation, transcendence, and ecstasy, and those who preside over such rituals. Here she is most obviously a Bitch Goddess, using steel and rope, the whip, hooks, knives, and fire as sacred tools. She is a sadist who takes pleasure in inflicting pain on willing subjects, a priestess who makes a sacrament of the worshipper.

The Invitation

You now stand at the brink of the underworld, on the shadowed path that few walk willingly. Those who have contributed to this book have walked this road and returned again, bearing the blessings of the Queen.

I invite you to dare the path as well.

Ereshkigal awaits you. . . .

For me personally, the Dungeon has always represented the Underworld, actually and metaphorically. Some interpret it in the 'evil' or negative sense; thus energetically I cannot be in the midst of those kinds of scenes. It is a matter of intention. Partly why I enact these scenarios is about both the pain and pleasure which conventional society hides and denies, and 'cutting through': getting down to our true erotic, physical, emotional, spiritual, naked Selves, both our Dark sides and our Light sides . . . and the magical ability to transmute pain to pleasure, or release shame. That is what this whole ritual was about: purging, releasing and letting go of religious indoctrination, control, and sexual shaming; then embracing sexual and spiritual empowerment and freedom.

I met her in the mid 1990's. She was emerging from six years of celibacy within her Church and coming out again as a Lesbian. More than a decade beforehand she had gone back into the closet, and she had been completely celibate during the last six years after she converted to Mormonism. I don't usually date those just coming out as Lesbian, only those who are rock solid in their Dyke identity. So I interrogated her about her decision to reemerge after many years of denial. She stated she was VERY CLEAR

she was Lesbian and wanted to FULLY EXPRESS HER LESBIANISM, and wanted NOTHING to do with her religion any longer.

She had grown very disillusioned with the religion, especially once she realized how patriarchal it was. When she took her one year Mission she realized it was one big salesmanship game to recruit souls and money for an already rich Church. She found there is no room for overt homosexuality within the Mormon Church, as its support of California's Proposition 8 (outlawing same sex marriage) has made quite clear.

She wrote the Church and asked them to take her "off the rolls," which meant voluntary excommunication. She wanted to plan some kind of ritual to celebrate her excommunication and her freedom from that Church. I began to study their theology, doctrine and even rudimentary magic. The more I read, the more experiences she shared with me about their rites, the more heavy handed and absolutely patriarchal the system seemed to be, snuffing out any creativity or power of women especially.

I picked up a slim book on the Inanna myth and read it. I also reread Lesbian author Judy Grahn's work *Queen of Swords*, which is a Lesbian reenactment of the Inanna myth. In Grahn's version, Helen, presented as a modern housewife, slums one day and enters a Lesbian bar and meets "the Butch of the Realm," Ereshkigal. Helen endures the same events that Inanna does, but with a modern day Butch/Femme twist to it. Since my partner and I were in a Butch/Femme relationship, this worked out for us. I really could relate to being the "Butch of the Realm," hanging up Helen/Inanna on her peg and putting her through three days of trials before she could emerge. . . much like the Dark of the Moon.

The energy of my Top space, especially in connection with ritual, is somewhat akin to the severity of the Crone/Dark Goddess. There is a simplicity in my dress, all in black and black leather generally, representing knowledge, as in the Black Belt I possess, and the Zen-like simplicity and 'cutting through' nature of the martial artist. I use Sado-masochism/Sex Magic as a technique to shed layers of being cloaked from one's naked Self, to cut through, both physically as in rending garments, and metaphorically. I FEEL Her severity – the TaskMaster, the Zen Master, the Master Instructor, the plain spoken, direct gazed, non-codependent, non-people-pleasing Dark Goddess/Crone – She is part of me as I Top. It may not always be Ereshkigal; it could be Hecate, Medusa, or the severe part of Artemis as well. In the ritual to come, I as Ereshkigal would lead my partner through a Rite of Passage to let go of the shame and all else that oppressive religion had burdened her with. Through physical, emotional, and psychic means she could release that burden as she was stripped and passed through the Gates to meet Erishkegal.

My partner finally received her notice that she had been dropped from the rolls. We burned the notice ritually. We prepare for several months through study and ritual to re-create the Inanna/Ereshkigal rite at a local women's play party near the Spring Equinox, which I felt was the most appropriate holiday. Spring Equinox is a very powerful holiday energetically for me, since it is easiest then to shed the Darkness of Winter and emerge into Spring, as Persephone does to then be joined with her Mother Demeter, the myth I usually reenact on this holiday. This would be a different focus, a different myth, though similar in certain ways. In this case, my partner was emerging from the dark winter of six

years under intense patriarchal religious authority where she sacrificed her Sexual being, and she would be coming into Spring, reclaiming that part of herself, and Ereshkigal would be her guide to shed that control over her, through the passage into Spring.

I wanted my partner, who was new to Goddess worship, to understand the awesome act we would be undertaking, to read the myth of Inanna and Ereshkigal herself, to be fully ready, and to know that this was REAL. I wanted her to be very clear that once we did this ritual any vestiges of Mormonism would indeed be swept away.

The night finally came. I wore my usual black leather and black garments. I had my knife at my side. My partner dressed in her white Mormon Temple garments: a white dress with many layers beneath it. The outfit included a green apron, representing the fig leaf that Eve wore, the last layer, but she would not put that on until we were ready to begin the Rite itself.

We had not told anyone at the play party what we were going to do; it was a secret between us, and as we interacted with the other women, nobody suspected a thing.

Finally, it was time. She put on the green apron. I hung her upon the St. Andrew's Cross, then began to strip her, cutting off part of the garments to reveal her back. I began to flog her slowly, then built up the intensity. This was a Rite of Passage; as each garment was stripped off her, she passed through another Gate, shedding that which she no longer needed, until finally taking her over the threshold through the pain and intensity of the flogging, the naked rawness, to meet the Goddess Ereshkigal, Goddess of the Underworld. Using my knife I slowly stripped off the rest of her garments till she lay naked upon the cross. The last item to go was the green apron, the fig leaf, and along with it, her innocence.

It came to me during the Rite that the role Mormons and other Christians would see me as would be the Christian Devil....that part scared me. But as I've been into Goddess Worship for many years, I REFUSED to take that role, and their judgments, on ... I could feel those judgments as a very real force. Instead, I affirmed strongly the matriarchal role and Power of the Goddess I was embodying ... the Dark Goddess Ereshkigal. I would much rather be judged by Her, a female entity, who I personally believe because she is Female, ultimately has compassion underneath all Her sternness, not the destructive and deliberately cruel patriarchal other. Realizing this in these moments that the Goddess has compassion, especially towards other women, I held and nurtured my partner after working her over. This flash of insight came to me in those sacred moments and I truly realized that what we had done was immensely powerful.

Now she was rid of the physical vestiges of Mormonism through the rending of her sacred Mormon garments, and hopefully she was freed of the psychological and spiritual controls as well. Little did we know just how well this ritual worked.

What the months and years of our relationship later revealed was that she did not replace the Void left in her life where her Mormon spirituality had been. We had a women's circle that met every other month at our house, and she could create beautiful altars and art reflecting female and Goddess images, but it seemed she could not take

the Goddess on...or allow anything else inside her. At first I thought these were my biases, that she wasn't moving along the Path quickly enough, or that it was her stubborn personality, but there were others in our Goddess circle who saw the same things. All the forms were there, but not the substance. She had experienced a real break with ANY connection to a Higher Power ... and does to this day.

This is my one regret. Ereshkigal really DID help her let go of Mormonism, but there was a Void that was left in that space, a Void she never replaced with Goddess or with another benevolent Higher Power or system, even though she participated in all our rituals. Instead there was a glass wall and an attitude of "nobody is going to tell me what to do or how to believe". Our relationship ended in 2001 with an ugly breakup.

A mutual Pagan friend told me recently that my former partner has gone towards atheism, which saddens me. The ritual indeed worked, but neither of us knew the full outcome. There was a part of me that felt guilty and filled with regret ... and yet we both had agreed and consented and did all the work to prepare together.

Perhaps Ereshkigal's gift to me was the ability to take on the role of Funerary Priestess several years later when those close to me passed, and also the ability to continue to communicate with them on the Other Side through my dreams.

I still have great respect for Ereshkigal and Inanna, but if you work with Them be prepared for the outcome. It may not be what you expect. It is a Myth that is true in its essence that taps into very powerful and REAL forces.

Be mindful that this may take many forms, and can manifest in astral aide, internal dialogue, or an actual individual who will come temporarily into our lives and shake our world or manifest into this role then leave, not always in the easiest way. For strongest calling force, consider doing this in a dark mirror, in a mirror in a darkened room, or under the auspices of the new moon.

Even now, three years later, I vividly remember what it was like to be sacrificed: naked, blindfolded, chained by my neck and wrists to the sacrificial rock and abandoned for the gods to do with as they pleased. My heart still beat, my lungs continued to draw breath, but for all intents and purposes I was no longer a part of mortal human life. Eventually my body would give out, succumb to dehydration or exposure or even the cruelly merciful touch of a divine hand, but that would be a formality. My existence as a living woman was over.

This was not the experience I had sought or expected when my lover¹ and I planned the ritual of binding and sacrifice. Although we had always used the term “sacrifice” in our

discussions, what we had in mind was more a temporary consecration of me as his priestess-agent, one who would offer up prayers on his behalf, represent him before the gods and perhaps serve as their oracle to him, and then be returned to my normal life. And yet, despite the explicitness of that intention, our actions and invocations had turned me into something else entirely.

At the time of the ritual I had been on the path of the underworld priestess for perhaps four months. The death of my lover had devastated me, but it had also been the gateway to a powerful initiation. A relatively new friend had reached out to me in her own role as an underworld priestess and offered her service and support in my grief. The more I learned about her path, the more I began to feel as if I had finally found my own calling. Not only did the symbols and ways of working resonate with me at a deep level, it held out a possibility that nothing else did: that of continuing to have a relationship with the man I loved.

The ritual we designed together was, at the most fundamental level, one of binding. It was a way of practicing the magical skills I was learning, practicing working with him in his spirit form, and a way to spend focused, dedicated time with him. The stated goal of me acting as a priestess on his behalf was less important to us than the steps leading up to what we continued to call the sacrifice.

Those preliminary steps of binding, marking, and offering up were extremely powerful, extremely intimate, and the details are not something it would be appropriate to share in this context. Suffice to say that by the time I was naked, on my knees, blindfolded, and chained by neck and outstretched wrists to the headboard of my bed, I no longer felt like my own person. I had voluntarily surrendered all that I was to my partner, who had in turn fully rendered me up to the gods.

There is a dual consciousness that takes over in such situations. My rational mind was fully aware that I was alone, on my bed, restrained by bindings that I had placed on myself and could easily undo. My magical awareness was of something entirely different. I was not in my bedroom. I was half-hanging from a large rock that stood out beyond human habitation. I could not get up and leave at any time. I had been given up to the gods, and there was nothing I or any other mortal could do about it.

My mouth was dry. In my pre-ritual fantasies, this had been the point where I started to pray -- first for my lover, and then as the spirit moved me. In my fantasy I was eloquent, filled with the power of prophecy. Now that I was actually stretched out in my bonds, words failed me. I whispered a prayer for my beloved, and then tried to pray for peace. But my words, though sincere, fell like pebbles onto dry earth. I finally realized that prayer was not to be part of my purpose -- and I certainly was not going to play the romantic, powerful role of bound oracle.

I was simply a sacrifice: a naked woman, sundered from all her former connections, bound to a rock and waiting to die.

Not what you expected, eh? came a crackling, edged, amused voice -- and I knew Hecate was with me.

No, I confessed silently. *It's not.*

Can't be a death priestess if you haven't died, she told me briskly. *Of course, you've already died, many times -- but you don't remember.*

This is what being a priestess is, she told me: *a sacrifice to the gods, dead to all but the will of the gods. "Hierodule" you've called yourself, "sacred slave" -- this is the truth of it:*

naked, with a chain around your neck, the gods' slave. You do their work, not your own. You don't worry about what anyone else thinks or wants. You mind your masters.

Yes, I thought.

Hollow bone, she reminded me – invoking a concept from my shamanic training: being the hollow bone of the flute through which the wind/will/music of the gods pass.

Grail Chalice, empty, a conduit. . . No place for all that other stuff to get in the way, muck up the Waters.

You just hang here a while. There's no place for you to go.

I had the sense that this would be longer than I wanted, but not nearly long enough to rate as a true ordeal. We were not set up for that. But this was a descent – not what I had planned, but voluntary. The voluntary descent was something I hadn't done in a very long time, was something that needed to happen as part of my underworld training. I needed to remember that as a mortal I am already dead – but that the gods have brought me back again and again to serve their purposes.

I was to feel myself dead, know myself dead, find that place of after-death where all the memories and identity and connections are gone, and hang there for a while.

I won't pretend that I fully achieved that place of non-being, but I brushed up against it, passed into and out of it, more than a few times. Time stretched out. I did my best to keep my consciousness focused on the inner world, to forget the objective truth of my safe and comfortable bedroom and the realization that my bent and bound legs were becoming numb. I was dead.

Eventually Hecate drew me back from the abyss and took me down a long, dark, bare path into the underworld. Fully committed to the process, I was allowed to release my wrists and unwrap the end of the chain from the head of the bed – but only if I collapsed and lay as one dead on the bed/altar. I obeyed, and felt my right leg start to tingle as circulation was restored. Hecate mocked my bound-shut legs. My sex magic, life-magic, could not function in my dead body.

We reached the bottom of the path, passed through a large, featureless gate, and I was tossed -- bound and on my belly – into the dirt at the foot of Ereshkigal's throne.

How to describe that moment of looking up and first beholding Her?

I have been blessed with a mystical aptitude that has allowed me to enjoy deep communion with the divine in various manifestations. In virtually every encounter, I have experienced the gods as warm, supportive, welcoming. Ereshkigal was none of those things. She loomed above me on Her throne, huge and beautiful and terrible and stern. She was dressed in elegant robes of midnight blue and deepest black. Her hair was black and Her skin was starkly white. There was no welcome in Her gaze, no warmth in Her expression. I felt like a dead mouse dropped by a cat: something to be coldly amused by and then kicked into a trash bin. I was ashamed of my smallness, of my naked helplessness. Then She smiled down on me, and I became truly frightened. Her smile had a knife's edge and no reassurance at all.

She reached down and pulled me up by the chain necklace-collar, so my face was directly in front of Hers, her fingers curled around the chain. "You wanted more depth in your spiritual practice," She said, smiling her terrifying smile. "This is where you go deep."

Most of what She said after that was and remains private. The most important thing was that She was aware of my desire to be an underworld priestess, and She was willing to

take me as Her own so I could learn from Her. The price was my death, and lying naked and prostrate in the dirt while she conducted business. I was to be dead and accept it, understand it. The world was lost to me. (And in quiet counterpoint to her cruel voice I heard whispered reminders of all that was dear to me, all that I should cherish and embrace when I was returned to life – although so deep was my sense of being at Ereshkigal's mercy I wasn't entirely convinced She would ever fully let me leave her throne room again, never truly embrace life as a living being again.)

She affirmed my sense that I was to become a teacher. I was to teach the truth as I understood it, and not to worry about what other people thought, since I would be teaching for the sake of the gods. The chain around my neck was no longer an accessory for my lover and me to enjoy in our play, it was Her mark on me, Her reminder to me of my status as Hers, and I was to wear it when I taught as a priestess. *Your cunt belongs to LM, she acknowledged, but your ass is mine. You're my bitch. You wear my collar.*

Dead, naked, bound at the foot of her throne, hearing Her offer me what I've wanted, but in terrible form, all I could do was agree.

And you'll wear this chain for the rest of the day, to remind you. Wrap it twice around your throat, and feel my presence.

Yes, I said. *I will.*

Satisfied, She told me I was free to go for now, and left the throne room.

I continued to lay helpless on the floor, aware that I did not have the power to rise from where I was and that my lover was barred from entering the underworld to come after me.

Then Dionysus was at my side, offering me wine to start reviving me. Persephone was there a few moments later, beautiful and serene, offering me a pomegranate. *You can eat it, she assured me. You already have the power to go in and out of the underworld.* Their sustenance brought life back into my body.

At some point during this transition, I heard Ereshkigal's voice and saw something like a smile – an expression with which I would become very familiar in the months ahead. *You have to be a bitch first, before you can become a Bitch Goddess.* It was a reassuring promise of blessings and growth to come. She seemed amused, a bit pleased. Almost not scary.

When I was alive enough to re-enter this world, my lover was at my side. Working as quickly as possible without being chaotic, I removed bindings. I tried to undo the chain to re-wrap it according to Ereshkigal's demand, but couldn't work the toggle clasp. Finally I gave up. I left the blindfold on, since I wasn't yet ready to be confronted with the living/waking/material world.

I am going to fuck you back to life, LM told me with his fierce-tender tone. I was very cold, so I cuddled down under my blankets. He began to touch me, giving me his fire. I warmed up quickly, and my desire for him also came back from the dead. We came together as husband and wife – loving partners, no ritual left but the chain collar around my neck to remind us both that I was fresh from the underworld and still bound to its mistress.

* * * * *

In the three years since that day, I have come to know Ereshkigal well. The chain collar has been replaced by a beaded necklace which I made on the day of my initiation as a priestess. I no longer kneel in the dirt, but stand before Her as her cherished servant. I still see Her knife-edged smile, but I have also known her tenderness. As I finish my work on this devotional, I am looking forward to a new ritual with Her, one of rededication that will reflect my growth as a priestess in Her service and the changes in my life that have come with the healing of my grief. I remain rooted in the underworld, but as a living being it is important that I balance those energies with those of the upper world.

I was afraid at first of moving away from Her, but She has let me go with grace. Our bond is still there, but I spend less time in Her presence.

“You have to release even Me,” She told me quietly. “I am your patron, and I will still be with you, but you must continue to move forward.”

The ways of the underworld are perfect. I do question them sometimes, but I never doubt the love and faithfulness of my Queen.

1: The lover I refer to throughout this piece is LM, whose death triggered my underworld initiation. His participation in this ritual was entirely in spirit. Trying to fully describe the experience of working with a disincarnate partner would draw the focus from my encounter with Ereshkigal, so I have glossed over those details

Samhain, 2004. A coven-sister created a Sabbat ritual focusing on the Descent of Inanna. The rites included poetic “sermonettes” by Inanna, Dumuzi and Ereshkigal. Our lead priest and priestess were to officiate, calling in Inanna and Dumuzi, and I was asked to evoke Ereshkigal.

I had lots of experience working with Inanna. During the early 90s I was inspired by the Qadesha work of Tara Webster, and spent years engaged in a monthly and seasonal practice of devotion, chanting, and libation to her and Ishtar. This was synchronous with many of my magickal colleagues who began playing in Inanna’s current around the same time. However, the connection for me eventually faded once I had integrated what she wanted me to learn. I continue to be intrigued with the mythology, and have created and attended several rituals based on the myth of the Seven Gates. It’s a powerful and resonant story. But when I was asked to evoke Ereshkigal, I realized that I had never really acquainted myself with her. The speed with which I got to know her shook me.

Within hours of receiving the first draft of the ritual, Ereshkigal was Present. Her energy was palpable, and distinctly foreign to me. I’m no stranger to chthonian Goddesses, but Ereshkigal was unlike anything I had ever encountered. The feelings and images were immediate, but words to name them came slowly, and with effort. The first word was “depth”. Caverns and caves and rock strata descending ever further into the alien world beneath our reality. Spans of time so vast my mind could not conceive of them. Through it all I felt she was holding back, knowing I couldn’t take the full weight of what she was. She kept saying, *I am not the river, I lay down the bones of the river’s bed*. My dreams became very vivid but I remembered nothing the next morning. And I had a mad craving for potatoes, lentils, and beans: hearty Earthy fare.

My coven mates and I emailed revisions and changes back and forth; we would not have time to meet until ritual night itself. The ritual became more elaborate, more formal. There were to be spoken word pieces by the three deities, then a walking meditation through seven “gates” where we had to give up a token of what we’d leave behind on the descent. Each of the four ritualists – three deities and one psychopomp – were working on our parts at home, informed by the collective working but individually following the current where it took us. Ereshkigal wanted altar space. She chose bones, wood and shells for her space. I felt moved to fill an antique silver bowl with dirt from my yard. She wanted soil and dirt, with chunks of coral below the topsoil. On this I laid out my seven tokens to charge up prior to the ritual.

The night of the ritual, just as I was driving into the driveway, my Priestess called. She was sick, too sick to come, and would I mind presiding over the ritual? I was happy to do it, and did the honors perfectly, except for one thing: I was supposed to call in Inanna at the beginning of the ritual. Although I cleansed, cast circle and called the quarters just as we had scripted, when it came time for me to call in Inanna, it slipped my mind completely. I called in Ereshkigal instead. The ritual went on fine – no one noticing the change except for my coven-sister who wrote the ritual. At dinner afterward she whispered “You called the wrong Goddess, silly!” But I hadn’t. After the work I’d been doing for the past many weeks, Ereshkigal was my only thought, and to have called in another Goddess, even her own sister, would have felt wrong, would have been wrong. After Samhain, Ereshkigal faded away. She had nothing more to say, and once I dismantled her shrine and returned the rocks and coral to the garden, she was gone. I have not heard from her since then, but now, when I drop my energy into the Earth to

ground, I feel like I go deeper, into places I could never reach before. In times of stress and worry, my core is strong and unshaken. I surprise myself at times with how much stronger I am since Ereshkigal's brief visit. I feel this is her gift, and I honor it.

Naked and Bowed Low

Ereshkigal. Queen of the Great Beneath. Goddess of Boundaries. Her hair is a darkness that hasn't seen light in longer than we mortals could comprehend. Her skin is alabaster stalagmite that spears air holding the metallic taste of ore and the tickle of damp moss. Her eyes gleam like a pool of water that glows from within, an echo of a sun-kissed day miles out of reach. This is the goddess I see when I speak to her: stillness and shadow that is always there, ever-watching, ever-lasting.

I do not work with the goddess often, or at all, if truth be told. My Master is of a different pantheon entirely, although they both share the bailiwick of Death in different manifestations. As such, there is a certain acceptance, a knowledge that, should I need help, I will not immediately be turned away. The goddess will at least listen to my words. Whether she helps ... well, that is a different matter entirely.

One day I did end up needing her help. I had set the circle, but the work had drawn the attention of ones who were not welcome. I drew the power of the Grey Lands between life and death about the circle as a deterrent, but the darkness was not afraid. I drew the fire of life, hid it in that deep shadow, and that seemed to confuse them for a while, but eventually the darkness I defended from did manage to pass.

If death could not turn away the darkness, and life did not deter it, what did I have left? I didn't know, but then I remembered the goddess of boundaries, the Queen, and I reached for her. I asked for her help to hold the line. In the broad light of day, I saw the entrance to her kingdom: a small arch into a stone mountain that led to a winding path. From experience, having walked that path, I knew it spiraled and turned deep into the earth and ended in a cavern so grand that it seemed to have no ends or limits. I knew the gates that stood between the shadowy palace in that awesome space. But standing just out of the touch of daylight, far above at the entrance of this path, was the goddess, Ereshkigal. I had asked for help, and she had honored my plea.

I told her of the obstacles I had placed, and I asked her to help me hold the boundaries, to stop the darkness from passing through. She smiled at me, her beautiful mouth turning in a grim amusement sharp as a dagger's edge. "You don't need me to hold the line," she said. "Forbid them entry and it shall be so."

I was sure I had not heard correctly. Who was I to stand before the darkness and refuse them passage? I hadn't the power to do that.

I didn't understand how I could hold against the darkness without her help, but I did as she had told me, and was surprised when the line held and my grim determination kept the darkness at bay. I won't say it was easy, but it wasn't the effort I had thought it would be.

Hers is the sharp cleanliness of carbolic acid and poke root, remedies which burn as they cure. Hers is the harshness of a desert hermitage, the austerity of locusts and wild honey and no water left for tears. Hers is the alchemical fire which transmutes suffering into gold, whence falls away the ashes of all that she would have you shed. The healing she gives is the healing of loss and release.

As I edit this for final draft form, she stands behind me. She knows what I have written, and the mask she wears today – a curved heraldic shield – shows a fierce smile. I have the sense that she is pleased with my words. I offer them to her, for it is on her behalf that I have written them.

So do it. Imagine a master who would give you these orders. Ask your real Master to give them. Ask your spirit lover. Just don’t ask me. I’m not your diet coach,” She said, almost primly. The Fifth Gate

I made my way down the tunnel, leaving my guardian behind me at the entrance. The first stretch of the tunnel was empty and the gatekeepers silently opened the doors as I descended. How can I fix a problem like this?

I suppose there is a possibility of a companion/familiar, but I perform no magic, so maybe just a pet. Then again, a familiar could help me use magic to help the world and my community, to share loving and healthful energy with them all, but this is beside the point. A pet is not something I can afford right now, and I’ll be moving in with my sister soon anyways, so what is the problem? Why is this being pointed out to me?

Is there a further need to spend time with my guides and guardians? Sure, that can be done, but it doesn’t take away the desire for physical, real contact. What exactly is expected of me?

The Sixth Gate

Erishkegal: Lady of Shadows

I worked with Erishkegal for quite some time as a matron deity. Despite her reputation as a scary, horrible goddess, I didn't find her to be that way at all; in fact, most women are drawn to her at some point in life, although they usually don't realize it. Elizabeth Barrette gives her the titles of She Who Complains and Goddess of Thankless Tasks.¹ I feel these are both very apt. As She Who Complains, Erishkegal is the voice inside of us that says, "Are you going to TAKE that? You don't have to! You need to stand up and say you've had enough!" And when we finally do say "ENOUGH!" it is Erishkegal's voice we use to make our complaints effective. She is also the matron deity of those who do all the yucky and/or boring but necessary tasks that constantly require someone's attention. Think of cleaning a greasy, dirty oven, doing seemingly endless laundry and grocery shopping, changing diapers, washing dishes, cleaning the toilet and the cat's litter box. How often are you thanked or appreciated for doing these tasks? How often do you feel that what you do is overlooked? Do you see Erishkegal in your life?

I learned that I could go to her altar and meditate on accepting the tasks I had to do even though I didn't want to. Erishkegal dealt with many unpleasant things, such as the death of her husband and the insults to her sovereignty, so she understands. I found that by putting representations of those tasks on her altar, I could scream, yell and complain about them, then accept them and let go of the anger. I also learned that I can take my grievances to her, lay them at her feet, and practice how to tell people that I wasn't going to put up with that any more.

To honor Erishkegal is to honor the difficult things in life that we cannot avoid, but that will make us stronger if we face them. Miriam Harline says in her essay on crone goddesses, "Despair, depression and death can be honored as a gift, and not just in a superficial chirpy way that assumes they can thus be placated and avoided... It's also true that only once we truly honor Erishkegal can we, like Inanna, get off the hook and return to the upper world."² While I'm not sure I can ever consider despair or depression

as gifts, I can appreciate that they are valid feelings we all have, and that going through them makes me more appreciative of the good things in my life and helps me to be more understanding when others go through them.

How can we honor this goddess? Easy. We can say “thank you” to people who do the nasty, dirty jobs that need doing in order for us to function in a clean environment. (I ran through the mud in our community garden one year to thank the driver of the sewage truck for keeping our portable toilets so clean, and to wish him a Merry Christmas. He was VERY surprised and pleased!) We can honor her by honoring ourselves and learning to say “no” when people ask us to do more than we can reasonably take on. We can sign petitions, write letters and publicly protest spending money on unnecessary wars and new weapons, and recommend instead that it be put into finding cures for AIDS, cancer and other major diseases. (If we try to lighten Erishkegal’s load of death, she will help us lighten our own loads.) And we can weep with and comfort those who mourn, sharing their sorrow because we are all in this world together. As John Donne said, “No man is an island, entire of itself... Every man’s death diminishes me, because I am involved in mankind...” While we will probably never be able to eliminate the need for Erishkegal’s presence in the world, we can bring her out of the House of Dust and give her the acknowledgment and respect she deserves.

Ereshkigal's Visit

Ereshkigal and Inanna came to me in the summer of 2004, when I started my book tour.¹ They started teaching me many lessons about balance, about the dance of light and dark, and about appreciating the resistance in the path as much as the blessings. These lessons began to lead to many understandings of how struggle brings growth, and how we learn from suffering. I gained many blessings during that time, and as my ministry grew I said many times that if I ever had an opportunity to do a series of rituals where I could be able to put enough effort into it, I would do a really elaborate "Descent of Inanna". It was not too many years later that the opportunity presented itself, when my coven was booked to do four rituals in a row during the month of October.

I asked a spirit sister of mine, Inara de Luna, who I knew was learning similar lessons, to share this experience with me. She agreed and we began to write the ritual. We decided that we would switch roles halfway through the series. I would do the first two as Ereshkigal, as I was comfortable with her energy and had been through a dark time myself. Then I would do Inanna for the last two. We started at a Pagan Pride day, introducing ourselves to the community, sharing our individual perspectives as Goddesses of the myth, and preparing people for the elaborate rituals that many of them would be participating in as the Fall gathering season developed.

Pagan Pride day went well, and I was excited about the upcoming events. Ereshkigal's lessons brought enlightenment to my soul. I understood how she felt, both in being the sufferer of lessons and as the teacher who brought lessons to others and had to suffer with them. Having recently experienced a period of burnout, I felt her indifference as well as her determination. Within Ereshkigal, I found an appreciation for the darkness I did not know before.

As the time of the next ritual, the full descent, drew near, I could feel the power building. People began putting together the various gates around the land. Our vision started coming into view, and we were all very excited. Inara and I work well together; we are very much a balance of opposites. We mirror so much of each other, it's easy to envision her as my Sister of Heaven and Earth.

As I prepared myself with Ereshkigal's face, I could feel Her coming to me. I put out all my makeup and let her choose how she wanted to look. I found myself putting white and black on my face in some very extreme, and intense, but darkly beautiful angles and shadows. As I became her, I felt frustrated, isolated, alone, misunderstood. I noticed my attendant wasn't attending me. I drove to the drum circle alone, with everyone else in a rush to get ritual ready. There were many details, many gates. I did not care. I was centered within myself, focused on my own needs. I prepared the music. It was about the depravity of mankind, to a very funky beat. I hoped it would be a nice irony of entertainment within the dreadful message of drug abuse, suicide, and several other horrible paths that lead to Ereshkigal. I was cold.

My throne room was the drum circle. It was October, and the temperature had dropped fast. There was a fire in front of me, but it was too far away to warm me. There were torches lighting the circumference of my area and torches that lit either side of my throne, yet the darkness was tangible. For the others, the journey started at the top of the hill, a couple of hundred yards away at the main ritual circle. Rather than finding the usual circle of friends waiting for them, each person who entered the circle found a gateway to the underworld and began their descent through the gates to the lower circle, where I waited.

"I HAD an attendant!" I thought, exasperated that I was left to care for all my own details, all made up dripping with clothing, and jewelry. I could hardly find my hands, much less use them. I noticed he was busy seeing to Inanna. This did not please me. I felt a stab of jealousy, which I felt was inappropriate and pushed away. I climbed up into my throne without assistance, hoping the seat would make me happier.

I waited. . . I was waiting, FOREVER! *Is there a problem?* I wondered, frustrated at having to sit in the cold. I sat sullen by a fire that did not warm me, with no one around to ask, in what felt like blackness. I waited, alone, my anger growing. Finally they came. They were cold, and confused. They were expecting something. They looked at me, in my ill temper, as I waited. They sat down, tentatively, they waited with me. Still more came.

How am I going to do a ritual like this? I wondered, agitated and frustrated. *I'm so pissed. WHAT is taking so long! Who is not considering how long these people are waiting? *I* am waiting?!?* I was practically screaming in my head.

We waited in the dark and the cold together, in silence. The music amused me at times. I wondered what they were thinking as they stared at me. The temperature had dropped below freezing. *Why do we always think it's a good idea to invoke the Underworld?* I thought to myself, *It never ceases to drop below freezing just as soon as you do that.* The complaining in my head became almost more than I could take, and I was about to call my attendant to me and ask W.T.F.?!?

And then She came. . . Inanna. She would demand and dare to yell at Me? She had been stripped of all her queenly finery and stood in front of me cold and naked. Frustrated and confused herself, her long blond hair her only protection, She demanded to learn the mysteries of death. I thought to myself, "She does not know the consequences of what she asks." So cold, I felt My hand close around My sword. I stood and screamed. It was the loudest scream I had ever heard. It came from deep within Me. It came with pain, and suffering, anger and confusion. It was a scream of torment and outrage. I watched Inanna fall dead in front of Me, and saw them drag Her body away. But I was not concerned with Her.

My attention instead turned to those who would call themselves children of the dark, the hidden children of the Goddess, those who would walk in My realm. They come to Me seeking safety and refuge from the pains of life. They do NOT find it. Like Inanna, they come to my realm dressed in fancy clothing, dripping with crystals and magical tools, a drum and cape in tow, hoping to learn the mysteries of magic. Yet I clearly warn them . . . My priestesses clearly warn them . . . These are the mysteries of Death and Initiation. Death . . . Do you really wish to know?

Dragging my sword in the sand behind me, tired and frustrated, I cried out to them. I wanted them to understand that they receive what they ask for. Change and Death are one in the same. I heard Her speak through me. She said . . .

The ways of the Underworld are NOT your ways. The ways of the Underworld are MY ways. They are perfect and are not to be questioned . . . Yet question them you do.

I take the time to mold you, and define you, to guide you, and teach you. My face is who you see when there is nothing left. When there is change, transformation, deep knowing and understanding, you will find Me. When you are alone, I am there with you. You may dance in the sun of Inanna all you like, revel in Her pleasures. But if you seek to know Me, look within the suffering of your soul. You agree to suffer to learn, and yet you wish to suffer not. You run away from that which scares you, and rail against the pain of the path. Yet when the path blooms beneath your feet, you do not grow stronger. It is only when I am pushing against you that your muscles are strengthened. Yet you rage against me when I take the time to do it.

If your path be laden with roses, and you struggle not, then know truly: you are not accomplishing much. Know that when your heart is rending, when your brain is reeling, when your world is spinning, that you will learn how to balance this, and for it you will be better. Know that the challenges you find are those that I place upon your path, and be grateful for my ministering. Know that I prepare you for greater challenges to come.

Anyone can rest on laurels and laugh the day away. It takes an ambitious soul to desire to know the mysteries of my realm. Know that your desire for this knowledge, set your feet upon this path before you were born. This contract you made with me prior to this incarnation. Call me by what name you will. I am the Dark Goddess, the Mother of Witches; She who teaches the powers of change. I allow you access or not. I give you guidance or My many attendants send you back to the surface, unaware that you never made it to My chamber door.

I have laid your path out before you in the stars, that you may achieve your goals, and walk it you will. Yet you will not walk it alone. I am with you with every step you take. You and I have work to do together, you belong to Me, and I to you: you who would work magic and know the ways of the Underworld. Know then, that your ways were left behind when you stepped into the darkness. The ways of the Underworld are MY ways, you will get what you need, in perfect time as the path unfolds.

My ways are perfect. Rage not against your lessons. Know that you are only stepping up to greater challenges as your abilities grow, and be thankful for the opportunity. Death is the doorway that leads to rebirth. I am the Goddess of Life and Death. Death and Life. You cannot be delivered without first letting go.

Let go with grace.

Inanna was then revived and returned to Her kingdom, renewed and better for her visit. The participants came and spoke to Ereshkigal and Inanna in their shrines. Ereshkigal helped many see how their struggles had made them who they are today, and helped them transform their pain into understanding.

I left ritual feeling great. My students took down the ritual areas and grounded. I felt very clear and focused as I made my way back to the campsite, undressed, and got things ready for bed. It was cold, so I stoked a fire in the center of my hand sewn, 18ft tipi, my second home. Our native tent heated up nicely and I readied the beds for my three children to come in later and snuggle in for the evening. My lover, Dusty, asked me if I wanted a drink; I refused. I was drinking water, and planned to be very responsible with my energy for the evening.

I did not remove Her face. I did not take the skulls from my hair. I did not formally devoke. I felt good, and didn't want to. I refused food and headed back down to the gathering to spend time with my loved ones in the after ritual glow.

As I walked through the Great Hall, hugging my friends and loved ones, I checked on my kids and then walked out the back of the Hall to where the ritual staff was gathering. Suddenly Daniel, my summoner, grabbed me and shook me, screaming in my face, "Bella, THE TIPI IS ON FIRE!" Stunned, I looked up the hill and indeed saw a screaming skirted Goddess roaring into the air. I shook my head, and thought *This can't be happening, delete, rewind, this isn't real*. I took off at a run back up the hill.

My heart was pounding; I could not move fast enough. I thanked Goddess my children were still safely in the Great Hall behind me, as I watched the men moving vehicles away to safety. I saw Dusty moving my car. There was nothing else on fire. No other tents were harmed. But the canvas of the tipi went very quickly, then the frame and all within. Everything I had for the gathering was ruined: years of clothes, ritual gear, blankets, beds, everything. I stood there, in Ereshkigal's face, as the words that she spoke to others that evening echoed in my ears.

The community came to put out the fire and offer emergency supplies for the evening. They hugged me and told me, "It's what you said, Bella. It's exactly what you said."

"I know!" I cried in return. And I did know. No one was hurt. Most of my belongings had been left at home because I was in a hurry to leave and so did not bring several boxes. I had complained all weekend about the absence of my skirts and various supplies, not realizing that it was all part of the design. I did not lose anything I wasn't meant to lose.

The next day we went through the rubble. We found a whole package of incense that did not burn. We found melted and wet messes of plastic and metals that were useless. We found some tarot cards that did not burn, only three, with interesting messages upon each.

"Master your thoughts"

"If you determine your course with force or speed, you miss the way of the law"

"Even in the empty forest, he finds joy because he wants nothing"

Then we found something that was not a part of my tent, something that I did not bring with me, nor would be likely to have around. I'm not much of a card-giving person. If you get a gift from me, rarely will a card be attached. I don't buy them, and I rarely keep them if they are given to me. So there is no way I would have a random, unsigned card laying around my home, much less my campsite. Yet a greeting card is what we found. The margin was burned, but the outside read "Our Friendship is Special to Me." Inside it said, "There are friends I can laugh with, or share happy times with, enjoying whatever we do. There are friends I can even share secrets or dreams with, but no friend is closer

than you!" The card was unsigned, but the burned out space of the margin looked like the outline of Ereshkigal's throne.

I cried, I accepted the loss, and I let it go. People asked me if I was going to rebuild. I want another tipi, but no. I filed an insurance claim on the loss and ended up better off than when I started. I cannot say I have never railed against the path since then, but I can say that every time a challenge presents itself, I smile and ask "Mom" what the heck I'm supposed to be learning from this one. And I never feel like I'm doing it alone now.

Inara and I did the other two rituals. I invoked Inanna the next time, and Inara was Ereshkigal. She received her lessons and we decided to end the rituals in the roles we both found most comfortable: me as the dark Goddess, she as the light. Yet neither of those rituals touched me like the evening the Goddess visited me at my tipi, and left a calling card with her signature on it.

Inara de Luna

So, I had this great idea: I wanted to enact the Descent of Inanna. I'd been studying this Sumerian Goddess as part of my sacred sexuality studies and had become incredibly intrigued by her journey to the Underworld. In a serendipitous conversation with my good friend and fellow priestess, Bella, we discovered that we both had a desire to create this ritual for a large group. We decided to devote the whole month of October 2007, to this project. We had four events, one every weekend that month, to take four different groups through the descent. We decided further that it would be great if we switched off the two main parts: she would invoke Ereshkigal for the first two, while I invoked Inanna; then we would switch places for the last two events. This way, we thought, we would both get to experience both sides of this working.

I loved being Inanna — the bright Goddess of Heaven and Earth, the embodiment of beauty, grace, power, and sexual independence. She inhabited me as if she belonged, and I thoroughly enjoyed every moment. However, I didn't learn as much from her as I did from her Dark Sister.

The first time we did this ritual was during our local Pagan Pride day, where Bella and I circled one another, invoked as Ereshkigal and Inanna, respectively, and we described who and what we were.

Ereshkigal: *I am Ereshkigal, the Dark Mother, Queen of the Dead. I am the Queen of all Witches. You come to me to learn the mysteries of intuition, magic, and sorcery. You come to me when the moon is full, and ask of me to deliver my deepest secrets, and I give them to you. All acts of pain and suffering are my tests.*

Inanna: *I am Inanna, the Bright Mother, Queen of Heaven and Earth. Mine is the ecstasy of the spirit and mine also is joy on earth. My law is love unto all beings. You come to me in worship, and dance in my honor. You revel in my blessings. All acts of love and pleasure are my rituals.*

We were mostly talking to the crowd, I carrying a beautiful staff crowned with white and silver, while she carried a large, intimidating sword. Our lines gradually moved into veiled insults of one another.

Inanna: *I am the beauty of the green earth, and the desire in the heart of man. I come to you in the face of your loved ones, your mother's soft touch, your father's gentle security, your best friend's support, and your lover's caress. I have created all this beauty for you to enjoy. I ensure that you never have lack, that you are always comforted, and safe. From me, all things proceed.*

Ereshkigal: *And unto me, ALL THINGS MUST RETURN. I ensure that you DO lack, and that you are sometimes uncomfortable. Without these struggles, you would be a spoiled and soft people, easily misled, easily lied to, easily conquered. Is this what you want? Do you want to be coddled and safe? Provided for? Like puppies? I come to you in the face of your loved ones, and your enemies. You will see my dark and terrible face reflected back by those who challenge you, who oppose you, who cause you to rethink, overcome, and prevail. You dishonor me when you hate and rage against the mysteries only I can bring. You dishonor the path when you hate and rage against your brothers and sisters.*

Finally Bella/Ereshkigal rushed at me with her sword aimed at my head. I raised my staff and blocked her blow and we locked eyes. This intense moment was a challenge: the Dark Sister daring Her light half to brave Her dark realm and experience what it really meant to learn the dark mysteries.

The following weekend, we were at a full weekend festival out in the wilds of west Georgia. We each dressed in our ritual outfits, applied our make-up and did our hair and then we split up: she was off to the drum circle, which was to serve as her Underworld domain, to await the souls who chose to make the journey. Meanwhile, I wandered the entire festival grounds, proclaiming to all my intentions to confront my Sister in her realm:

I go to the Underworld, the realm of my sister, Queen Ereshkigal. I go to learn from her the mysteries of the Underworld, so that I may find a way to bring relief to my people. I have attired myself with all the symbols of my station and authority, as befits a Queen, for I am Inanna, Goddess of Heaven and Earth! If you choose to accompany me down the dark path to the Underworld, please equip yourself with all that you are, that you may be prepared for this journey.

Finally, we arrived at the top of the hill that represented the first of seven gates to be passed through on the way to Ereshkigal's realm. At each gate was stationed a guardian who challenged every one of us, and as the last to pass through each gate, I,

as Inanna, was required to remove some piece of jewelry or part of my garment before passage was granted. I eventually arrived at the final gate, whereupon I was required to remove my final garment; I entered the Underworld completely naked. Holding my head high, trying to maintain my queenly dignity even while nude and stripped of all my articles of power, I stalked toward Ereshkigal where she sat arrogantly upon her throne. Immediately, I started making demands, very aware of the responsibility my people had placed on me to alleviate the hardships they endured in their lives.

She looked me dead in the eye, stood slowly and imperiously, and uttered a deathly scream. I was struck down, the power of her voice robbing me of life. I crumpled to the ground before her throne and was dragged off to the side by her minions while she addressed the crowd of souls that had dared the same journey.

Eventually, I was revived by the water and bread of life brought by Enki's little genderless beings, whereupon I stood to face my sister and apologized for my own arrogance and lack of understanding. We embraced, and then stood upon our own shrines to minister individually to the people who had attended the ritual. Many hugs and tears and expressions of gratitude were exchanged. Finally, we closed the ritual, but we were so giddy that the ritual had been so successful, and so eager to get to the party planned for afterward, that we neglected to formally devote.

About half an hour into the party, we heard yells coming from the area of the festival grounds where Bella was camped. "Bella's tipi is on fire!" And sure enough, when we looked up the hill, a huge blaze was roaring! Everyone went running: some up to the tipi itself, some to the kitchen with buckets, bowls, trash cans, and anything else we could think of in which to carry water. We were desperate to get the fire out before it could spread to the trees or any other tents. An amazingly hot fire, it quickly destroyed the entire tipi and most of its contents, mostly personal items belonging to Bella and her family. Thank the Goddess, no one was seriously hurt. Her children had not been in or near the tipi when it caught, and the only injury I heard of was a volunteer that got hit in the head by one of the tipi poles when it fell.

When the fire was finally out and the excitement had died down, I crumpled into a heap. Watching Bella's tipi burn down after she wore Ereshkigal's face and knowing that I would then be playing that role the very next weekend terrified me. Not only was I personally afraid of losing something as a direct result of invoking Her energy, I was also confronted with a dramatic example of the power and responsibility we have as magical people. Part of me wanted to run away, to forget that magic even existed, to stop "playing the game." But, as She conveyed, there is no turning back. You can't unlearn what you've learned, not and live authentically.

It became apparent to me that this whole experience was giving me the opportunity to dive even more deeply into magical understanding of myself and the world; to communicate more often and more succinctly with the Gods; to honor the responsibility I have been given.

So, after much intense soul searching during the following week, I went ahead and bravely invoked Ereshkigal myself. I remember as I began to dress, do my hair, and especially as I started to apply my make-up, that with each action I was invoking Her more and more. This particular deific energy was unlike anything I'd ever felt before. It was heavy and dark, and full of anger, sadness, and other "negative" emotions. I found that my easy smile was nowhere to be found. My partner asked me if I was okay, and I

assured him that nothing was wrong personally, but that the Goddess was already riding me hard.

We were finally ready to begin, and so I made my way to the drum circle/throne room and climbed atop my throne. I watched as the little people hesitantly stepped into my realm; I nodded regally at those brave enough to acknowledge me. I was still and quiet, awaiting my sister, knowing I would soon kill her, and feeling a strange sort of triumphant sadness in the knowledge. Finally, she arrived, and flounced before me in all her splendid nude beauty. I was suddenly enraged by her, by all of what she represented, by the neglect I had suffered from both the other gods and by the humans in her realm. I couldn't even hear what she was saying; I just stood up, opened my mouth and screamed. Even now, remembering back on this moment, the hair stands up on my arms and a chill runs down the back of my neck.

She crumpled at my feet and I waved at my minions to move her worthless corpse from my sight. I stood and climbed down from my throne, clutching my blade, and I surveyed the cowering humans before me. They had been shivering and complaining of the cold and I was incensed. How dare they come down to my realm, of their own free will, and complain about something so insignificant as the cold? I then asked them to remember some of my harsher lessons and explained that if their lives were always soft and safe and comfortable, they would never grow. As harsh as my lessons may be, they come from my desire to make a person strong and beautiful, like a sword, which must be thrust into the fire and pounded repeatedly before it emerges as a useful tool of beauty.

I mourned the lack of appreciation or acknowledgment I generally receive for my efforts. I lamented the pain I endure. I cried out against my loneliness. I gradually realized that these two strange little beings were empathizing with me. Finally, someone was hearing and validating me! And they had compassion for me! I cried out in relief and offered them anything in my power to give, to thank them for that tiny, but hugely significant gift. All they wanted was Inanna's corpse, which I had no use for, so they revived her. Once reanimated, she came and stood before me, and expressed her sorrow for not understanding and her gratitude for my lessons. I finally felt heard and seen by my sister of the Light, and felt hope that her followers would better appreciate my role in their lives. We embraced, then parted to receive the humans who remained and would soon be returning to their world. Many tears and laughter and hugs were shared. This time, after the people had dispersed, a priest approached us individually and formally and thoroughly thanked and devoked the Goddess' presences from us, and we each made an offering to the fire. Fortunately, we had learned our lesson and nothing needed to be sacrificed this time.

The following weekend, the fourth and final in our series, Bella and I reverted back to our original roles: I would wear Inanna's face again, while Bella was ridden by Ereshkigal. We both decided that we were far more comfortable in these roles, and that we had learned the lessons we needed from the opposite. Our last re-enactment of this ritual theater went off splendidly, and nothing burned down that time, either. Our divine commitment was complete.

* * * * *

Invoking Ereshkigal was a difficult thing for me. Inanna is a far more natural fit, and so learning to become Ereshkigal was quite a stretch. But it taught me a lot. Not only do I more deeply understand Her lessons associated with loss and hardship and that it all happens for a reason, namely to make us stronger, but now I also understand how Her role as the Goddess of Thankless Tasks translates to my role as a priestess, teacher and leader in the community. Sometimes I will have to convey a hard truth to someone who may not want to hear it. Sometimes I may have to tell someone “No.” I may not always be liked and appreciated, and that has to be okay.

Ereshkigal helped me to more deeply understand the importance of death in the cycle. And not just physical death, but symbolic death. We must die in order to be reborn, both within this life and in the greater cycle. With each personal transformation, a part of us dies and must be let go, in order to complete the transformation.

Finally, I was also needing balance. I seek the Light, the Love, the Joy, the Compassion . . . and sometimes I neglect the darker, shadowy aspects of myself and of life in general. Wearing Ereshkigal’s face was a heavy burden and it was not fun. I felt deeper anger, sorrow and frustration than I normally do. Her rage filled me up and She required me to be direct and confrontational — an interpersonal style that I am neither accustomed to nor comfortable with. When I/Ereshkigal asked Bella/Inanna if she was willing to embrace her Shadow/Sister, I was really asking that question of myself. And I can now say, after completing this series of rituals, that I am, and that I am prepared to accept responsibility for my dark half, in a way that I couldn’t even comprehend before.

Queen Ereshkigal, I offer this to you as a sign of my understanding and acceptance. Please accept this offering in the spirit in which it is given. Thank you for the opportunity to learn your lessons and to convey them to the community. Thank you for all that I have endured to reach this place, which enabled me to carry this off. I honor you.

These words were spoken by the priestesses channeling the Goddess Ereshkigal during the Descent of Inanna re-enactment in October 2007. Bella and Inara took turns throughout the month playing the characters of the two goddesses, and these words were divinely inspired.

I am Ereshkigal, the Dark Mother, Goddess of the Dead. I am the Queen of all Witches. I am not often given voice. But now that you have called to me, I have much to say. You come to me to learn the mysteries of intuition, magic, and sorcery. You seek to know the great mysteries hidden in the stars, you ask me to teach you the secrets of my realm. You come to me when the moon is full, and ask of me to deliver my deepest secrets, and I give them to you. But then you run from me in fear and spit your anger back at me. You do not want to pay my price. Even now with all that you have learned, and all that you have gained, you long for what you have given up. All acts of pain and suffering are my tests.

How do you trust that which scares you?

Mine is the Cauldron of Cerridwen, which is the Holy Grail of Immortality. You beg for my help. But then you cry and wail against me, for taking away what no longer serves you. You shrink from the challenges I bring before you. But once you step upon my spiraling path, there is no turning back. You cannot undo the vows you make to me; you cannot unlearn my mysteries. And yes... they do hurt. They leave marks upon your soul. Every single one of you has experienced loss and hardship and you have learned from that experience. But you don't often give thanks for that experience. You don't trust me. You don't believe that I love you. And so the lesson goes unheeded. You fear me, as you should. But you also forget me, you intentionally close your ears to me, and you don't thank me. When you do this, you don't incorporate my lessons and so I have to hit you again and again and again, harder each time.

Tell me, what gifts of pain and suffering have I given you? What hurts do you harbor in your heart?

I am not nice, but I am not here to punish you. I am harsh, but I am not vindictive. You start as shapeless, formless, useless blobs, and that's how you would stay if it weren't for me. I thrust you into the fire and pound you over and over, until you have become strong and beautiful. Like my sword.

I challenge you to succeed. Through my mysteries you will not be vulnerable and naive, easily defeated, easily controlled. Is this not love?

Yes, I will burn your shit down! If that is what you need. Remember, my ways are perfect, but they are not your ways. Everything you experience happens for a reason, but you may not immediately be able to see or understand that reason. And that's why you need to trust me. Even when you're scared shitless.

My lessons are not easy, or fun, or pleasurable – but they help you to appreciate all the wonderful things in your life. And they bring you together in ways that comfort and pleasure cannot.

I ensure that you do lack, and that you are sometimes uncomfortable. Can you face your fears and walk the path with honor and respect for those who teach you lessons, both good and horrible? I come to you in the face of your loved ones and your enemies. You will see my dark and terrible face reflected back by those who challenge you, who oppose you, who cause you to rethink, overcome, and prevail.

Yet my wisdom lies deep within you. It comes from within, and so you think it's you. You think you taught yourself this all on your own. You are an arrogant one! You do not appreciate the gifts I give you. My temples are barren and in need of repair. I receive no offerings for ministering to you. My priests and priestesses are scorned, for the lessons they have taught brought you pain and suffering. You do not honor me. You are not grateful for my gifts.

So many paths entwine as one. So much work that must be done. You cannot see the cloth as it weaves. You cannot see when the thread is complete. You do not know all the others you affect. You do not consider the lives you may wreck.

Are your goals and desires, and hopes and good deeds, still important to you in the face of others' needs?

How often do you call on the gods? How often do you ask for their assistance? How often do you express thanks to the gods and serve them or their people? Remember, you must sometimes give before you can get. The gods need thanks and appreciation, to be honored and served. Don't forget to acknowledge the gifts they've already given you. We are all born with gifts and it closes us off to further blessings when we take these gifts for granted or don't utilize them. Sometimes, sacrifice is required. Sometimes, surrender. You must be prepared to give up all that you have, all that you are, in order to transform into all that you might become. You must be prepared to submit and surrender to the will of the gods, even when it hurts, if you truly wish to embrace all the gifts they have for you.

If you feel drawn toward Ereshkigal and want to make contact with her, your best resource is your own intuition and inner wisdom. Sit quietly, clear your mind, place yourself under the protection of the highest form of deity you know (or that of the guardians with whom you usually work) and then address yourself to her. Tell her that you would like to meet with her and ask her to grace you with her presence. You may not feel like you get a response. You may have images or words come up which let you know what she would like you to do in order to prepare for such a meeting. You might be surprised by the vivid immediacy of her response. It will all depend on your individual situation, talents, and needs.

If you do not receive a response, or if you want to set up more formal, focused conditions before attempting to communicate with her, the following elements can help create an appropriate ritual atmosphere:

A black candle

Myrrh

A sharp knife, or other object that feels symbolically appropriate to you

A black or red altar cloth

You may also wish to make an offering of fresh bread and something good to drink, or something of natural beauty. In my experience, Ereshkigal likes white roses.

Waiting until after dark on a night of the new moon can also be helpful.

Set up your altar, light the candle and incense, set some form of protection¹, and then clear your mind. Close your eyes or use the knife (or other symbol) as a focus for meditation. You can also chant, drum, or use other techniques to help shift your consciousness, if you prefer.

Ask Ereshkigal to make herself known to you, and then listen closely for the response. It may be dramatic, but it also may come in a “still, small voice,” images, or feelings. If nothing seems to come to you, try using automatic or off-hand writing to allow the goddess to speak through your own shadow-self.

Ereshkigal may make herself present, or you may receive a vision of a downward path or the entrance to a cave and an invitation to descend. Understand that an invitation to descend will not necessarily involve an ordeal, but you may be asked to give one or more items to gatekeepers. You are always free to turn back at any time.

If you do get a response, please exercise basic spiritual common sense and test anything you receive before acting on it. Ereshkigal herself will never seek to demean or injure you, nor will she ever ask you to harm another. She will not ask you for your blood. There are spirits who will take advantage of an inexperienced person by pretending to be a deity in order to advance their own agendas, especially a deity who, like Ereshkigal, has been called on for dark purposes in the past. Placing yourself under protection before you begin a ritual will usually be enough to prevent such an incident, but it's always wise to exercise caution. No authentic deity will ever be insulted if you ask for time to think about something they have told you, or if you tell them you need to take time for discernment.

At the end of your encounter, thank the goddess for her presence and blessings and then transition slowly out of meditative space. Eat and drink something to help ground yourself.

1: This can be as simple as saying a prayer asking the protection of a deity, angel, or guardian spirit. You can also visualize yourself in a circle or sphere of light that nothing can pass if it has ill intent or is contrary to your greatest good.
