## *Brief History of Masonic Marker*

Since 1935 the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters in North Carolina has annually made a pilgrimage to the Great Smoky Mountains National Park and held in connection therewith a Special Summer Assembly and Outing as follows:

September 2, 1935, M. I. K. W. Parham, Grand Master  
 July 20, 1936, M. I. T. Troy Wyche, Grand Master  
 July 5, 6, 7, 1937, M. I. Michel Saliba, Grand Master  
 July 11, 12, 13, 1938, M. I. H. Grady Gibson, Grand Master

Through the efforts of M. I. T. Troy Wyche, who has acted as General Chairman each year, the Assemblies have now reached the point where they might be more fittingly termed Interstate Outings of York Rite Masons, as the number of Grand Jurisdictions to be represented have steadily increased each year, attracting visiting Masons from all points of the United States.

One of the features of the 1937 Assembly was the burial of a Memorial Chest at the Black Camp Gap Entrance to the Great Smoky Mountains National Park containing mementoes of the time contributed by thirty Grand Councils of the United States and Canada. This Memorial Deposit is to be opened in the year 1972, the 150th Anniversary of the convention which met to form the Grand Council of North Carolina.

In giving thought to a proper Marker for designating the spot of the Memorial Deposit, M. I. T. Troy Wyche visioned the opportunity to make of it not merely a piling up of stones, but an assembling of stones from the shrines of many lands into a monument that might truly symbolize the universality of Freemasonry, and thereby founded the movement to build this Marker. Through his untiring energy and zeal the Marker has been made with stones sent in by Freemasons from the shrines of their homes, from every state in the Union, the Americas, Europe, Africa, Asia, Australia, and the Isles of the Seas. It is a fitting symbol of the Freemason's belief in the Brotherhood of Man and in the Fatherhood of God.

STONES IN "SQUARE & COMPASS" PANEL MAIN TIER—BACK

- 232 Stone from the lot in Asheville, N. C., upon which the home of R. E. W. F. Randolph 33, stood and where he lived for many years prior to his death. This stone contributed to the memory of Ill. Bro. Randolph, Past Grand Commander and for a number of years Secretary of the Scottish Rite Bodies at Asheville by Ill. Thomas J. Harkins 33, S. G. I. G. for N. C.
- 233 Stone from the farm upon which Ill. Thomas J. Harkins 33, S. G. I. G., was born, in Buncombe County, N. C.
- 234 Stone from the yard of the Asheville home at the time of his death of R. E. A. H. Cobb 33, Past Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of N. C., contributed to his memory by Ill. Thomas J. Harkins 33, S. G. I. G. for N. C.
- 235 Stone from the lot which was the home of Ill. Clyde E. Cotton 33, K. T., beloved Worker in both the Scottish and York Rite Bodies of Asheville, N. C. Contributed to his memory by Ill. Thomas J. Harkins 33, S. G. I. G. for N. C.
- 16 Two specimens of native shell stone of Texas, struck from an ashlar placed in the Memorial Building being erected on the San Jacinto battle ground near Houston, Texas. The Memorial Building from when these stones came are of special interest to Masons in that particularly all the major characters who took part in the Battle of San Jacinto, which was the 11th decisive battle of the world, were members of the Masonic Fraternity. From Bro. Houston Wade, Life Member of Holland Lodge No. 1 of Houston, Texas, writer of Texas Masonic History.
- 28 Rock from around the grounds of Cooch's Bridge, Delaware, the historic spot where the American flag was first unfurled over a field of battle. From Comp. Richard C. McMullen, Governor of Delaware.
- 176 Rough ashlar from the quarry of the beautiful Ogleboe Park which is owned by the city of Wheeling West Virginia. From M. E. Fred C. Steinbicker, Grand High Priest of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of West Virginia.
- 95 Flint stone from the grounds of the Masonic Orphanage at Oxford, N. C., presented by the children of the Orphanage to the memory of the late beloved M. W. Leon Cash, P. G. M. of the Grand Lodge of N. C., whose greatest delight was visiting the children at Oxford.
- 82 Small piece of silver granite from a quarry about sixteen miles from Spokane, Washington. From M. I. Edward Eisle, Grand Master of the Grand Council R. & S. M. of the State of Washington.
- 143 Stone picked up during the year by the donor in the heart of Huasteca Canyon near Monterrey, Mexico. M. P. Bert S. Lee, Springfield, Mo., Past General Grand Master of the General Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of U. S. A.
- 86 Stone left over from building the donor's home in Milwaukee. Quarried in the Lannon Quarry near Milwaukee. M. I. Charles E. Inbusch, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, General Grand Marshal of the General Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the U. S. A.
- 84 Stone from the cave at Big Falls now within the city limits of Akron, Ohio. In the year 1759 a twelve-year-old girl named Mary Campbell was kidnapped by Delaware Indians from her home in what is now Western Pennsylvania and carried to this cave where she was held captive for five years and then in 1764 was returned to her home in Pennsylvania. She, without doubt, being the first white child that set foot on the territory of the Western Reserve. From M. I. Earl V. Carter, Akron, Ohio, Grand Master 1936-37, Grand Council of R. & S. M. of Ohio.
- 115 Stone from the edge of the abandoned quarry on the outskirts of Raleigh, N. C., where the stone was quarried from which the State Capitol Building of N. C. was built. R. W. Charles P. Eldridge, Junior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of N. C.

- 222 Small dark stone from Pittsfield, Maine. From M. E. Frank W. Fuller, Grand High Priest of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Maine.
- 230 Stone picked up at Old Fort Erie, Canada, this ancient fort being now restored. M. E. John Sterling, Buffalo, New York, Past Grand Superintendent for Lanarkshire, Scotland, Supreme Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Scotland.
- 154 Boulder from the grounds of the Masonic Home at Zenith, Wash. From M. I. Walter F. Meier, Seattle, Washington; General Grand Conductor of the Council of the General Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the U. S. A. and P. G. M. of the Grand Lodge of Washington.
- 110 White quartz from the shores of Masonic Island, Lake Metigoshe, N. Dak., owned by the Grand Masonic Bodies of that state. M. P. Walter L. Stockwell, Past General Grand Master of the General Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the U. S. and Grand Secretary-Recorder of the Grand Bodies of North Dakota.
- 67 Stone from the most Eastern point of land in the United States. This stone came from a part of the ledge on which is located a small wooden building in which the first regular communication of a Masonic Lodge was held in Eastport, Maine. The Lodge, Eastern Lodge No. 7, was one of the earliest established in Maine and when instituted was under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts. Chartered June 8, 1801, and instituted August 8, 1801. From M. W. Henry R. Gillis, Grand Master of Masons of Maine.
- 55 Polished cube of Tennessee pink marble quarried and finished at Knoxville where the Grand Lodge of Tenn. was organized in 1823 under a charter from the Grand Lodge of N. C. From M. W. Charles H. McKinney, Knoxville, Tenn., Grand Master of Masons of Tennessee.
- 62 Three slabs of St. Cloud granite (a) Minnesota Pink, (b) North Star Red, (c) Pioneer gray. From R. E. Charles N. Orr, St. Paul, Minn., Grand Generalissimo of the Grand Encampment of K. T. of the U. S. A.
- 197 Granite from the foundation of the Masonic Temple at Copenhagen, Denmark. R. W. Alex Troedson, Grand Secretary of the National Grand Lodge of Denmark.
- 145 Stone from the foundation of the Iowa Masonic Library at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, the foundation of which was laid in 1883 and the building dedicated in 1884. From M. W. Charles Clyde Hunt, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Iowa.
- 58 Two small slabs of St. Cloud granite of Minn. From M. I. Edward J. Newman, Wayzata, Minn., P. G. M. of Grand Council R. & S. M. of Minn.
- 129 Specimen of Oregon Ribbon Agate in "Thunder Egg" formation. From Ill. Louis Gaylord Clarke 33, S. K. I. G. for Oregon, Supreme Council of Scottish Rite.
- 72 Petrified wood from Arizona Petrified Forest. From M. I. Shelton G. Dowell, Douglas, Arizona, Grand Master of Grand Council R. & S. M., Arizona.
- 231 Stone from the lot upon which the Masonic Temple in Asheville, N. C., stands. From Scottish Rite Bodies of Asheville.

STONES IN THE LOWER THREE FOOT SECTION OF SOUTH EAST CORNER—MAIN TIER

- 262 Stone from one of the buildings inside Fort Augusta at Sunbury, Pennsylvania, built in 1756, which had it not been maintained, the Colonies in the trying days of the Revolution would have lost its most important bulwark. From M. P. S. Carbon Wolfe, Williamsport, Pa., Past Grand Master and present Grand Recorder, Grand Council, R. & S. M. of Pennsylvania.
- 297 Slate extracted from a hundred and fifty foot depth during road construction on Lachmect Motoaka, West Virginia, by Comp. E. C. Green, member of the Waynesville, N. C., Masonic Bodies.

- 260 Two original bricks from the brick pillars of the Masonic Building at Halifax, N. C., oldest building in the world used exclusively for Masonic purposes. From V. I. A. M. Atkinson, Enfield, North Carolina, Past Prov. Grand Master, Eastern Province, Grand Council, R. & S. M. in North Carolina.
- 100 Rock taken from the wall surrounding Poplar Tent Presbyterian Church Yard, Cabarrus County, N. C., which was established in 1762, the first pastor being Rev. Hezekiah Balch who was one of the signers of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence, May 20, 1775, from M. I. Henry Grady Gibson, Grand Master, 1938-39, of Grand Council, R. & S. M., North Carolina.
- 101 Rock from wall same as No. 100 from M. E. Luther Thompson Hartsell, Grand High Priest of N. C., 1936-1937, and Present Grand Standard Bearer of the Grand Commandery of N. C., Knights Templar.
- 275 Stone picked up at Sira Island, extinct volcano near Aden, Arabia, where, according to Major H. Wilburforce Bell in his "Romances of Aden," the Queen of Sheba conferred with Solomon. This stone was placed in the personal care of Captain Owen Morris of the British S. S. Steamship "City of Salisbury" to be delivered to the steamship's agents in New York. The steamship on entering the harbor at Boston, Mass., in a fog was thrown upon an uncharted rock which ripped the vessel open and caused it to wreck. Captain Morris, who is a member of Modoc Lodge No. 1509 of Wales, advised that the package containing this stone was the first one to go over the rail to be saved. Brother Morris called the British Consulate who in turn called the Grand Lodge of Mass., who sent Brother Philip C. McMurdle, their Service Director, for an interview with Brother Morris. Brother McMurdie accepted the responsibility of delivering the package to Waynesville, which contained the stone. From Ill. S. P. Patel, T. I. M., 1937-38, Felix Council R. & S. M. No. 90 in Aden-Felix, Arabia.
- 174 Large specimen of native New York State Garnet in its rough and natural state from the Garnet Mines of Gore Mountain which are the largest in New York state. From M. E. Seth T. Cole, Grand High Priest of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of New York, Albany, New York.
- 247 Stone from the foundation of an old Indian Mission in the famous Qu'Appelle Valley in Saskatchewan, Cana. Qu'Appelle is an Indian name meaning "Who calls." The name was derived from the legend wherein an Indian maiden lay dying. Her brave was paddling his canoe down the Qu'Appelle River before death overtook her. In her weakened condition she called aloud his name and he, not recognizing her voice called "Qu'Appelle?"—"Who calls?" From M. I. Joseph Ross Yorke of Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada, Grand Master of Supreme Grand Council of Western Canada 1937-38; P. G. M. of Masons of the Grand Lodge of Saskatchewan, First Principal R. A. M., Past Grand First Principal, Grand Royal Arch Chapter.
- 272 Cube of brownstone saved from a house located on the site where the State Library of Connecticut now stands. This brownstone was cut originally from the famous quarries at Portland, Conn., from Ill. Wilbur L. Cross, Governor of Conn.
- 273 Native stone from the summit of Mount Junaluska, site of the old Eagles Nest Hotel, altitude 5050 feet, overlooking Waynesville, N. C. From Waynesville Lodge 259 A. F. & A. M. to the memory of W. Jeff Nelson, Assistant Grand Lecturer whose last Masonic duty was coaching Waynesville Lodge a few days before his death in 1937. The stone was selected from the summit of a mountain peak that Brother Nelson loved.
- 61 Native stone found near Grafton, West Virginia. From R. E. William A. Beavers, Grafton, W. Va., Grand Commander Knights Templar, West Virginia.
- 263 Specimen of gold quartz taken from the Sunset Mine, Amador County, California. From Ill. Frank F. Merriam, Governor of California.
- 264 Quartz crystal from Huosteca Canyon near Monterrey, N. V., Mexico. From W. V. H. Peerman, K. T., Santa Katrina, N. L., Mexico, Past Master of Monterrey Lodge, F. & A. M.
- 97 Native fossil stone from the Southern-most point of the U. S. A., Key West, Florida. From W. F. O. Weech, District Deputy Grand Master and Secretary of Dade Lodge No. 14, Key West, Florida.
- 229 Stone from Pecos, Texas, from M. I. W. A. Hendricks, Grand Master of the Grand Council R. & S. M. of Texas.
- 246 Stone from Branch County, Mich., which came from the Lake Superior District by action of the glaciers eons ago. From M. E. Charles A. Conover, General Grand Secretary of the General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the U. S. A., and Grand Recorder of the Grand Council R. & S. M. of Michigan.
- 60 Stone from the Dallas, Texas, Scottish Rite Temple which was dedicated in 1913, from Ill. James C. James 33, Secretary of the Dallas Scottish Rite Bodies.
- 265 A piece of Texas limestone taken from the monument at the San Jacinto battle ground which monument commemorates the battle where Texas won their independence from Mexico. From Bro. John Martin of Houston, Texas.

#### STONES IN THE FRONT OF MAIN TIER

- 394 A forty-five inch equilateral triangle of the famous Mt. Airy, N. C., granite inscribed: "THE VISIBLE STONES OF THIS MARKER WERE SENT FROM HISTORIC OR INTERESTING PLACES BY FREEMASONS OF THE AMERICAS, EUROPE, ASIA, AFRICA, AUSTRALIA AND THE ISLES OF THE SEAS. TO UNIVERSAL BENEVOLENCE." Contributed by Companions J. D. Sargent and C. Binder of Mt. Airy, N. C., and Granite Lodge No. 322, A. F. & A. M. of Mt. Airy, N. C.
- 393 The sixty stones appearing in the block above the triangle to the right of the letter "G" are geological specimens obtained from various parts of New South Wales, Australia, and were sent by Zetland Council No. 45 of Sydney, New South Wales, being one stone from each member of the Council. Zetland Council is under the jurisdiction of the Grand Council, R. & S. M. of England and Wales. Comp. A. J. Kaglund, Recorder, Croydon, New South Wales.
- 376 (Near the left of the Apex of triangle.) A stone or crystal obtained 300 feet under the surface in the famous Bella Mar Caves at Mantanzas, Cuba, which caves are full of stalagmites and stalactites. From Comp. Halsey B. Levitt 32, K. C. C. H., Asheville. Companion Levitt was at one time a member of Island Lodge No. 6, of Havana, Cuba.

- 79 Tile taken from the hall of the House of Representatives in the State Capitol, at Columbia, South Carolina. From Bro. Olin D. Johnston, Governor of South Carolina.
- 106 A slab of white polished Italian marble from the material used in the building of the Masonic Temple at Baltimore, Maryland. M. I. Charles H. Welden, P. G. M. and Present Grand Recorder of the Grand Council R. & S. M. of Maryland.
- 107 Slab of gray polished Tennessee marble from the material used in building the Masonic Temple of Baltimore, Maryland. Ill. C. Ellwood Smyrk, Baltimore, Past Master of Concordia Council and Grand Lecturer of the Grand Council R. & S. M. of Maryland.
- 133 Slab of polished red Finish granite. W. Waino Sola, Helsinki, Suomi (Finland), Past Master of Sanct Jonannes Lodge No. 4 and Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of N. C. near the Grand Lodge of Finland.
- 134 Slab of red Finish granite in natural state. Donor same as No. 133.



- 184 Slab of polished Oregon jade from Jade Mine, Durkee, Oregon. M.'W.'. Carl G. Patterson, Baker, Oregon, Grand Master of Masons of Oregon.
- 267 Two stones quarried in Amanacaes, a few miles from Lima, the capital city of Peru, South America (La Ciudad de los Reyes), the city of the Kings. E.'. F. Larkey 32, Past Master; P. P. Z.; P. W. C. N.; P. T. I. Mas.; Scribe E. of Peace Universal Royal Arch Chapter No. 192, Callao, Peru, South America.
- 285 A two-inch by three-inch slab of polished black stone from Norway. Contributed by Bros.'. Sigurd Ronne, Engineer, and Sverre Mohn, Merchant, of Oslo, Norway.
- 343 Stone extracted from an Egyptian Pyramid. National Lodge A. F. & A. M. of Egypt. R.'.W.'. Abdel Mequid Younis, Grand Secretary, Cairo.
- 344 Stone from King Solomon's Quarries at Jerusalem and of the same kind of stone employed for the construction of King Solomon's Temple. Donor same as No. 343.
- 323 A polished green stone, a stone that is peculiarly characteristic of New Zealand. A stone well known throughout the world as that from which the Maoris of New Zealand fashioned their weapons and ornaments. M.'.E.'. A. Digby Smith, D. S. O., Grand Superintendent for New Zealand, Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Scotland, Dunedin, New Zealand.

- 15 A cross-section of Breccia Rock consisting mostly of Jasper formation picked up in the West Gallatin River bed in the Gallatin National Forest between Bozeman, Mont., and the entrance to Yellow Stone National Park, a short distance from the famous Lewis and Clark Trail of 1804-1806. M.'.I.'. Channell A. MacKenzie, Bozeman, Mont., Grand Master of the Grand Council of Montana, R. & S. M.
- 63 Fluospar from the mines in Hardin County, Illinois. from Ill.'. Henry Horner 33, Governor of Illinois.
- 73 Selenite gypsum from the State of Sonora, Mexico. From Propatria Lodge of F. & A. M. at Agua Prieta, Sonora, Mexico.
- 125 Fluospar from the Hillside Fluo Spar mines, Rosiclare, Ill., from M.'.W.'. Everett L. Lawrence, Quincy, Illinois, Grand Master of Masons of Illinois.
- 130 Polished piece of Oregon Ribbon Agate in "Thunder Egg" formation from Warm Springs Indian Reservation in Oregon. From the Portland, Oregon, Scottish Rite Bodies.
- 147 Stone of water onyx inscribed: "MONTANA." taken from a mountain in Madison County, Montana. near the old Salt Lake Road. The stone was taken about 25 miles from Virginia City, the cradle of Masonry in Montana and head quarters of the Vigilantes in 1863-64, from Ill.'. Llewellyn L. Callaway 33, S. G. I. G. of Montana, Scottish Rite and Ill.'. John Kain, T. I. M. of Helena, Council No. 1, R. & S. M. of Montana.
- 158 Copper ore from Kennecott Copper Mines in Alaska from W.'. A. McN. Field 32, K. C. C. H., Past Master and Secretary Mt. McKinley Lodge No. 183 F. & A. M., Cordova, Alaska.
- 214 Hot Springs Crystal. It is from rocks of this nature that the famous Hot Springs Diamonds are cut. From R.'.W.'. S. Albert Kemp, Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Arkansas. Little Rock, Ark.
- 157 A crystal from Mt. Roraima 8600 feet high, the highest mountain in British Guiana and the point at which the frontiers of Brazil, Venezuela and British Guiana meet. From E.'. Charles Holman Barker Williams 32, K. T., Past Z. of St. Andrews Royal Arch Chapter No. 140, Georgetown, British Guiana, South America.
- 210 Purple fluospar from a mine located at Eureka, Utah, from M.'.W.'. James W. Collins 33, Deputy of the Supreme Council of the Scottish Rite for Utah and P. G. M. of Masons of Utah.

- 152 Robin-egg blue boulder from the Columbia River basin near the city limits of Spokane, Washington. From Scottish Rite Bodies of Spokane, Washington.
- 14 Small rough ashlar taken from the quarry at the mouth of the Stikine River near Wrangell, Alaska, in its crude and natural shape containing two deep red garnets just as they are mined. From R.'.W.'. Charles P. Kirtland of Wrangell, Alaska, Senior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge F. & A. M. of Washington.

- 76 Stone from Beaver Dam, a marble quarry located near the Maryland Masonic Home "Bonnie Blink," near Cockeysville, Md. R.'.E.'. Edwin S. White, Baltimore, Grand Commander of Knights Templar of Maryland.

- 357 A stone from the monument built a number of years ago at the intersection of the states of New Mexico, Utah, Colorado, and Arizona, the only spot in the United States where four states corner. Comp.'. W. T. Shelton, Waynesville, N. C.
- 354 A stone from historic ruins in England, brought back several years ago. Contributed by Mrs. John N. Shoolbred in memory of her father, Comp.'. Charles P. Tonecray, who was for forty-three years a member of Dasheil Lodge No. 238, Elizabethton, Tennessee.
- 353 Stone from one of the beaches at Providence, R. I. From Comp.'. Berton E. Kile, K. T., Providence, Rhode Island.
- 326 Stone from the extinct volcano region in the Western part of Idaho about fifty miles Northeast of Payett. From R.'.I.'. Charles Hartung, Payette, Idaho, Grand Captain of the Guard of the Grand Council R. & S. M. of Idaho.

- 317 Stone from New Salem State Park which is located on the site of the town of New Salem, Illinois, where Abraham Lincoln resided for approximately six years before moving to Springfield. The stone was obtained by R.'.E.'. Edward E. Core, Springfield, Illinois, Grand Secretary, and contributed by M.'.E.'. Gustav H. Muller, Grand High Priest of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Illinois.
- 320 Stone from the grounds surrounding his Hyde Park, New York, residence, contributed by Ill.'. Bro.'. Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the U. S.

- 334 A piece of Rushmore granite from the site of the famous Memorial in the Black Hills of South Dakota, now being carved by Gutzon Borglum. M.'I.'. Harry B. Reynolds, Terraville, S. Dak., Grand Master of Grand Council, R. & S. M. of South Dakota.
- 347 Stone from the banks of a creek on the grounds of the Indiana Masonic Home where the donor is employed. R.'I.'. D. Samuel Cade, Franklin, Indiana, Grand Conductor of the Council, Grand Council R. & S. M., Indiana.
- 322 A stone from the famous Great Ravine on the battlefield of Saratoga, which battle was one of the most important and decisive of the Revolutionary War. M.'I.'. Charles B. Weller, Mount Vernon, N. Y., Grand Master of the Grand Council, R. & S. M. of New York.
- 340 A stone from the Salt Cairn made and used by the Lewis and Clarke Expedition of 1805 to boil ocean water down to obtain salt for the party. This salt cairn is located near the ocean front at Seaside, Oregon. From R.'E.'. D. R. Cheney, Portland, Oregon, Grand Secretary of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Oregon.
- 358 A quartz crystal of a purple or lavender hue found in the mountains west of North Carolina and placed in the marker from their relics at the request of the small daughters of the donor. M.'I.'. T. Troy Wyche, P. G. M. of Grand Council, R. & S. M. and General Chairman of the Summer Assembly program.

#### STONES IN THE BACK OR WEST BASE

- 53 Stone from the DeWint House at Tappan, New York, built in 1700 by Daniel De Clark. This house was occupied as headquarters by General George Washington during the bitter winter of 1780. It was in this house that the court martial was ordered for Major Andre, the British spy through whose arrest the treason of Benedict Arnold was discovered. Washington signed his death warrant in this house and Major Andre was executed within sight of the windows of Washington's room. This house is now owned as a shrine by the Grand Lodge of New York. - 212 A piece of stone from the old Copper Mine at Newgate Prison in Connecticut. The prison was used by the British for prisoners in the War of Revolution. From M.'P.'. Thomas W. Morgan 33, Hartford, Connecticut, Past Grand Master of the Grand Council, R. & S. M. of Connecticut, and Past Grand Commander, K. T.
- 213 A smooth ashlar of limestone from the Silverdale Quarries of Kansas. From M.'E.'. William F. Shea 33, Arkansas City, Kansas, Grand High Priest of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Kansas and Deputy Commander of the Grand Commandery K. T.
- 228 Granite inscribed: "Corinthian Lodge No. 42, A. F. & A. M., Kokomo, Colorado, Highest Lodge in U. S.—Elevation 10,618 feet." Contributed by Corinthian Lodge 42, Kokomo, Colorado, W.'. Benjamin F. Rich, Master. Inscription was done by W.'. O. C. Watson, of Denver.
- 303 Block of polish Mount Airy Granite inscribed: "N. C. Bodies A. & A. S. R., July 11, 1938." Contributed for the Scottish Rite Bodies of N. C.
- 313 Ashlar from the Blue Stone Quarries east of the city of Cleveland, Ohio. Contributed by Forest City Council No. 111, R. & S. M., Cleveland, Ohio.
- 336 A twenty-three pound stone taken directly from under the Masonic Hall, 6th Avenue and 23rd Street, New York City, where contractors are blasting and removing rock formations for the new 6th Avenue Line of the Municipal Subway under construction. From Columbian Council No. 1, R. & S. M. of New York. Ill.'. William R. Prosser, Master, M.'I.'. Martin Q. Good, Recorder.

- 316 A stone from a bare island in Lake Winnepesaukee, New Hampshire, which is the third largest inland lake in the United States, altitude 5,000 feet, there being 274 islands in the lake. From R.'E.'. Oscar J. George, Grand Commander of Knights Templar of New Hampshire.
- 364 A 170 pound stone from the exterior defenses of Castillo De La Feurza, first of the fortresses constructed in Cuba by Don Hernando De Soto. Contributed by the Supremo Consejo Del Grado 33, Para La Republica de Cuba. Ill.'. Enrique Llanos Ordenez 33, Sovereign Grand Commander. Ill.'. Luis Grinda 33 was commissioned by the Supremo Council to attend to the details of sending the stone, accompanying which was a certificate of authenticity rendered by the Sovereign Grand Commander, excerpts from the history of the stone, and a copy of the minutes of the Board of Councilmen of the City of Havana, authorizing the building of the fortress in 1538.

- 366 A block of Bird's Eye Kentucky marble from Fayette County, Ky. Contributed to the memory of M.'E.'. George Allison Holland, who was General Grand King of the General Grand Royal Arch Chapter of the United States, and Grand Secretary-Recorder of the Grand York Rite Bodies of Kentucky, by the Masonic Bodies of Lexington, Ky.; Lexington Lodge No. 1, F. & A. M.; Lexington Chapter No. 1, R. A. M.; Washington Council No. 1, R. & S. M.; Webb Commandery No. 1, K. T.; Devotion Lodge No. 160, F. & A. M.; and Oleeka Temple, A. A. O. N. M. S.
- 369 A stone from the foundation of the building at Highlands, N. C., occupied by Blue Ridge Lodge No. 435, A. F. & A. M., this lodge building having the highest elevation of any east of the Mississippi River. Contributed by the Blue Ridge Lodge.
- 371 Marble from the First Baptist Church of Waynesville, N. C., removed during recent addition. Contributed by Mrs. John A. Smith, to the memory of her husband who was an active member of Waynesville Lodge No. 259, A. F. & A. M.
- 299 A stone inscribed: "Grand Lodge of Ohio, F. & A. M." Gutzon Borglum, the famous sculptor is carving and erecting a memorial at Marietta, Ohio, commemorating the start westward of civilization. The stone is from this memorial. From M.'W.'. Louis B. Blakemore, Cincinnati, Ohio, Grand Master of Masons of Ohio.
- 276 Stone from the foundation of the home owned and occupied by Ex-President Warren G. Harding at Marion, Ohio. - 25 Stone from the Capitol Building at Nashville, Tennessee. From Bro.'. Gordon Browning 32, Governor of Tennessee.
- 138 Stone picked up from the well from which President Andrew Jackson drank near the spot where his law offices was located in Rowan County, N. C., contributed by the York Rite Bodies of Salisbury, N. C.
- 135 Blue slate rock from Union County, N. C. From R.'.I.'. Julius S. Stearns, Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Council R. & S. M., N. C.
- 37 Stone from the historic Capitol Building of Maryland at Annapolis. The Annapolis Convention of 1786, forerunner of the Convention that framed the American Constitution met in the old Senate Chamber. Three years earlier, in this same room, Washington resigned his commission as Commander-in-Chief of the Continental Armies. Here the Treaty of Peace with Great Britain was ratified in 1784. From Comp.'. Harry W. Nice, Governor of Maryland.
- 51 Thirteen-pound piece of granite used in highway construction in Coosa County, Alabama. From M.'.W.'. Samuel B. Adams, Mobile, Ala., Grand Master of Masons, Alabama.
- 253 A stone from the top of Mount Greylock, the highest point of land in the state of Mass. M.'.I.'. William S. Hamilton, Williamston, Mass., Grand Master of Grand Council R. & S. M. of Massachusetts.
- 59 Piece of glacier stone which underlies a section of the Southwest portion of Rochester, N. Y. This stone averages from five to eight feet under surface of land and in many instances homes built upon it find it absolutely flat surface for their cellar bottoms. M.'.I.'. Raymond E. Westberry 33, Rochester, New York, P. G. M. of Grand Council R. & S. M. of N. Y.
- 242 Stone from a ford of Cattaloochee Creek, Haywood County, N. C., at the spot where the father of the donor became engaged to the girl he married. Contributed by W.'. Robert Hoyle Gibson, Master 1938 of Waynesville Lodge No. 259, to the memory of his father, Rev. Thomas Franklin Gibson of the M. E. Church, South, who was a Master Mason for many years.
- 8 A stone from the site of the Drake Oil Well near Titusville, Pennsylvania, the first oil well drilled in the history of the petroleum industry in 1859. At that date stone was used to arch up around the steam boiler and the stone contributed is one from the arch. M.'.P.'. J. - 251 Stone from the Guilford Battlefield near Greensboro, N. C., where was fought during the Revolutionary War the battle of Guilford Court House. Donor same as 250.
- 252 Stone from "The Battle of Alamance Field," a few miles South of Burlington, N. C. This was one of the first battles fought in the Revolutionary War. Donor same as 250.
- 217 Stone picked up at the remnants of the old town of Kaskaskia at the junction of the Mississippi and Kaskaskia Rivers a few miles north of Chester, Illinois. On July 4, 1778, George Rogers Clark, with a company of two hundred Virginia Militia, captured it for the U. S. by night attack, thus enabling us to claim and obtain possession of the Northwest Territory by the Peace Treaty of 1783. From R.'.E.'. Cedric Cook Howland, Peoria, Illinois, Grand Commander of K. - 18 Stone from that used in the Scottish Rite Temple at Louisville, Ky. From Ill.'. Isaac T. Woodsen 33, Grand Master of the Grand Consistory of Kentucky, A. A. S. R.
- 117 Stone from a Travastun Quarry near Sarasota, Florida. From M.'.I.'. F. William Schultz, Grand Master 1937-38 of the Grand Council R. & S. M. of Florida.
- 241 Stone from Sira Island near Aden, Arabia, where, according to Major H. Wilburforce Bell, the Queen of Sheba and King Solomon met. M.'.E.'. Cecil Arthur Bush, First Principal 1938-39, Felix Chapter No. 90, R. A. M., Aden, Arabia.
- 292 Part of stone window sill of Denbigh Castle in Northern Wales, built in 1284, which castle is in an excellent state of preservation and visited by all who go into that locality. Contributed by Royal Denbigh Lodge No. 1143, through the courtesy of W.'. E. G. Jones, Past Master and P. G. B. and present Treasurer, "Werna," Vale St., North Wales.

William, Ontario, on the north shore of Lake Superior. From R.'.I.'. Ed J. Marshall, Sarnia, Ontario, Grand Recorder of the Supreme Grand Council of the Western Jurisdiction of Canada, R. & S. M.
- 91 A fossil mullosk dug out of the rocks of Malta. From Ill.'. W. A. Griffiths, Past Master of Caledonian Council No. 325, Villa Blye, Canal Paula, Malta.
- 92 A pebble washed down from the Alps of Switzerland, contributed in the name of the Grand Lodge of Alpina by W.'. Dr. Hans Kriesi of Frauenfeld, Switzerland, Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina near the Grand Lodge of Alpina, who writes, "In



- Switzerland, Freemasonry has just gone through a tremendous struggle. Asked for by our Swiss Nazi, plebiscite was taken on Freemasonry, but, fortunately the Nazi proposal was turned down by a substantial majority."
- 50 Small stone picked up on the hill near Lebanon, Kentucky, made famous particularly by the operations of Gen. John H. Morgan during the hectic days of the War Between the States. M.'E.'. J. T. T. Hourigan, Lebanon, Kentucky, Grand High Priest of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Kentucky.
- 116 A stone from Mount Helen, Washington, in King Edward VII Land, Antarctica, which stone was brought back from Little America at the South Pole by Mr. Thomas Poulter who was a member of the Admiral Byrd Expedition. Contributed by Comp.'. J. V. Gray, K. T., Mount Pleasant, Iowa, Secretary of Mount Pleasant Lodge No. 8, A. F. & A. M.
- 187 Small stone from Ronas Voe, Lerwick, Shetland. R.'E.'. Sheriff R. J. Wollis, West Hall, Lerwick, Shetland, First Grand Standard Bearer and Past Z. of Naval and Military Chapter No. 40, Edinburgh, Scotland.
- 39 A small stone from the grounds on which is occupied the building of Fort Kent Lodge No. 209 F. & A. M. in Fort Kent, Maine, which is the most northerly Lodge in the Continental United States. From Bro.'. John R. Sedley, Secretary of Fort Kent Lodge.
- 127 A piece of turquoise in the rough taken from an old mine in New Mexico and received by the donor from an Indian friend. Ill.'. Harry G. Shelton, Albuquerque, N. Mexico, Special Deputy of R. & S. M. under the General Grand Council for New Mexico and Recorder of Hiram Council No. 1, R. & S. M.
- 183 Three "Petrified Roses," a mineral barite of peculiar shape often resembling the rose, found only in the state of Oklahoma, so far as is known. These "Roses" were obtained from the red beds (Permian) series six miles East of Norman, Okla. From Bro.'. E. W. Marland, Governor of Oklahoma.
- 85 Quartz rock picked up on the farm known as "Scottstown," which was owned and occupied by Patrick Henry at the time he made his famous speech "Give Me Liberty or Give Me Death," on which farm the old house is still standing in Hanover County, Virginia. - 120 Two stones. One a piece of limestone and the other a flint stone from Mrs. Charles H. Warne, Tipton, Indiana, contributed to the memory of her late husband M.'I.'. Charles H. Warne, P. G. - 295 Idaho granite from Middle Fork of the Clearwater River taken from the trail over which Captain Meriweather Lewis and Captain William Clark traveled from Missouri to the Pacific Coast over the Lolo Pass from Montana to Idaho in 1805. From M.'E.'. Edward D. Sanman, Grand High Priest 1935-36 of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Idaho, Lewiston, Idaho.
- 293 Rock from the grounds of the Masonic Home of Mississippi near Meridian. This rock is

probably a petrified root. Ill.'. Luther A. Smith 33, S. G. I. G. for Mississippi, Supreme Council A. A. S. R. of the Southern Jurisdiction of the U. S. A.

- 169 Ervine Creek limestone, Weeping Water, Nebraska, widely used in the navigation development on the Missouri River. From Bro.'. Roy L. Cochran, Governor of Nebraska.
- 182 Stone from the grounds of Jubilee College, founded in 1835 near Peoria, Illinois, Bishop Philander Chase, first Bishop of Ill. of the Protestant Episcopal Church. From M.'.I.'. Charles W. Keys, Peoria, Illinois, Grand Master 1931 and Present Grand Recorder of the Grand Council R. & S. M. of Illinois.
- 118 Rock from the river bed of Miami River in Ohio. Contributed by Reese Council No. 9 Royal and Select Masters, Dayton, Ohio.
- 227 Brownstone from the top of Pikes Peak, inscribed: "Summit of Pikes Peak." Contributed by Zabud Council No. 8, R. & S. M., Colorado Springs, Colorado. The stone was secured by Ill.'. Orrie W. Stewart, who operates Summit House on Pikes Peak and engraved by W.'. Orion C. Watson, President Watson Memorial Company, Denver.
- 48 Stone from the ledge on which is located the Portland Headlight, one of the early light houses on the Atlantic coast about three miles from Portland, Maine, which was ordered lighted one hundred forty-eight years ago by President George Washington and has functioned ever since. From Ill.'. Frank C. Allen 33, Portland, Maine, Deputy for Maine of the Supreme Council Scottish Rite, Northern Masonic Jurisdiction, U. S. A.
- 5 An original brick taken from the main building of the Masonic Medical College of Missouri erected at Lexington, Mo., in 1847. From R.'.W.'. Henry C. Chiles, Lexington, Mo., Deputy Grand Master of Grand Lodge of Missouri.
- 6 A piece of alabaster which originally came from Italy and was part of one of the reflectors in the transepts in the Temple Room of the House of the Temple of the Supreme Council A. A. S. R. at 1733 16th Street, N. W., Washington, D. C., subsequently becoming broken. From Ill.'. Comp.'. John H. Cowles 33, Sovereign Grand Commander of the Supreme Council A. A. S. R., Southern Jurisdiction of the U. S. A.
- 47 Bermuda hard limestone quarried at the Government Quarries in Bermuda by prisoners. The Atlantic Phoenix Lodge No. 224, Hamilton, Bermuda, Bro.'. H. C. Morgan, Secretary.
- 259 Stone from near the grave at Halifax, N. C., of R.'.W.'. Joseph Montfort, who was commissioned as Provincial Grand Master of and for America under date of January 4, A.D., 1771, A. L., 5771. From M.'.W.'. Watson N. Sherrrod, Grand Master of Masons of N. C. 1937-38 and Grand High Priest 1934-35, R. A. M.
- 255 Stone from the bank of Kankakee River about forty miles South of Chicago in Illinois near the town of Momence. The stone is roughly marked "H. Ill." From M.'.E.'. Harry W. Harvey, Chicago, General Grand Custodian of Work of the General Grand Royal Arch Chapter of the U. S. A.
- 201 Cross-section of a column of basalt which forms in pentagonal cross-section in columns

twelve yards high and more and abounds in the northeastern part of Bohemia, the section between the famous Spas of Kalsbad and Tepliz. From Grand Lodge Lessing Zu Den Drei Ringen. The stone was accompanied by an excellent address of brotherly feeling from M.'.W.'. Ernst Klatcher, Grand Secretary, Prague, Czechoslovakia.

- 20 Quartz stone from Austin Homestead, Tarboro, N. C. From R.'.E.'. Joseph Leishman Peacock, Tarboro, N. C., Grand Commander of K. T. North Carolina, 1934-35, Grand Chaplain of the Grand Council of R. & S. M. in North Carolina.
- 119 Stone from the river bed of Miami River of Dayton, Ohio. Comp.'. Albert M. Sullivan, K. T., Recorder of Reese Council No. 9, R. & S. M., Dayton, Ohio.
- 261 Rough ashlar from the summit of Mount Mitchell in Eastern N. C., highest mountain peak east of the Rockies. From M.'.E.'. John R. McCracken, Waynesville, Grand High Priest 1931-32 of Grand Royal Arch Chapter of North Carolina.

#### STONES IN THE SMALL LOWER LEFT PANEL—MAIN TIER BACK

- 383 Two stones which are "gizzard" stones from the Uintah Basin area of Utah. Many thousands of years ago there roamed across this region animals to the dinosaur group. These animals were some herbivorous, some cannibalistic, and probably omnivorous. They had to digest their food, and like birds of today, possessed gizzards. Contributed by Bro.'. Gerald Torne of Progress Lodge No. 22, F. & A. M. and W.'. E. G. Titus, Salt Lake City, Assistant Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge, F. & A. M. of Utah.
- 391 A stone from the old Fort Marion at St. Augustine, Fla., erected in 1672 by the Spanish as a protection to the city. This is the oldest fort on the shores of the United States and was declared a National Monument by presidential proclamation on October 15, 1924. From M.'.I.'. John B. Phelps, P. G. M. of the Grand Council of Florida and Past Grand Commander, K. T.
- 382 A piece of flagstone from the Masonic Temple in Hillsboro, N. C., the corner stone of which was laid November 22, 1823. The General Assembly of North Carolina in 1821 authorized a Masonic lottery to be conducted by Eagle Lodge No. 71 for the purpose of financing the building as a Masonic Temple. The lottery was conducted and the Temple was completed in 1825 at a cost of \$3,000. The Temple still stands, and is in the form of a perfect cube, being forty feet long, forty feet wide, and forty feet high. From M.'.I.'. J. W. Parham, Raleigh, Grand Master, 1935-1936 of the Grand Council, R. & S. M. of N. C.
- 392 A stone picked up by the donor during a cruise on May 24, 1930, on the shores of Lake Valencia near the town of Maracay, Republic of Venezuela, South America. M.'.W.'. Alexander B. Andrews, P. G. M. of Grand Lodge of N. C., Past Grand High Priest, 1907-1908, R. A. M., Past Commander, K. T., 1906-1907, Past Master, R. & S. M., 1902-1906.
- 385 A cube (nearly two inches) of polished onyx from the surroundings of Ankara, Turkey, inscribed: "Supreme Council 33, Turkey, Istanbul, 7-3-1938." From the Supreme Council 33, Scottish Rite of Turkey. Ill.'. Muhiip Nihot, Istanbul, Turkey, Grand Secretary General.
- 384 A stone used as a paper-weight for more than fifty years by the late Ill.'. Jean Marie Raymond 33, Sovereign Grand Commander of the Supreme Council 33, Scottish Rite of France. The stone was contributed by his son, Ill.'. Rene Raymond 33, the present Sovereign Grand Commander, Paris, France.
- 389 A piece of Quebec limestone taken from the American Presbyterian Church now demolished which stood for years in Montreal, Quebec. The corner stone box was recently discovered, containing many interesting periodicals of the year 1865 and other historical data of the 1860's. From Ill.'. O. E. Stanton 33, Montreal, Quebec, active member of the Supreme Council, A. A. S. R. of Canada.
- 399 (Note: This stone is not indicated on chart but is placed to the right of No. 389.) A "wood stone" of which there are many lying all around the Magwe District of Burma. Contributed by Yenangyaung Lodge No. 4374 E. C., Yenangyaung, Upper Burma.

The following stones are not on the chart, but are placed in the lower section of this panel.

- 400 Dark gray stone from the Atlantic sea coast at North Rye, New Hampshire. From the Grand Council, R. & S. M. of New Hampshire, M. I. William T. Putnam, Grand Master and Ill. J. Melvin Dresser, Grand Recorder.
- 401 Utah granite from the quarries in Little Cottonwood Canyon, twenty miles southeast of Salt Lake City, the granite of which the famous Mormon Temple in Salt Lake City and the State Capitol Building are constructed. From M. I. J. Warren Belless, P. G. H. P. and P. G. M. of the Grand Council of Utah, and M. E. J. M. Dunlap, P. G. H. P., Grand Secretary of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Utah.
- 402 White stone from the Atlantic sea coast at North Rye, New Hampshire, contributed by Grand Lodge, F. & A. M. of New Hampshire, R. W. J. Melvin Dresser, Grand Secretary.
- 403 Limestone from the campus of Emory and Henry College, Emory, Virginia. From M. W. J. N. Hillman, Emory, Grand Master of Masons of Virginia.
- 406 Rock from Edenton Harbor, being one of the stones which were used as a ballast back in Colonial days when Edenton was a large shipping center. From Unimity Lodge No. 7, A. F. & A. M. at Edenton, N. C., the Lodge was chartered by Provincial Grand Master Montford and was one of the Lodges forming the Grand Lodge of North Carolina in December, 1787.

- 26 A part of "The Rocks" on which the Swedes landed in 1638 on the Christina River at Wilmington, Delaware. A monument was dedicated at this spot recently. From M. E. Frank Law Harrar, Grand High Priest of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Delaware.
- 71 A stone picked up from the capitol grounds at Montgomery, Alabama, and is part of the old capitol building taken out in 1933-34 when the building was being renovated. From Bro. Bibb Graves 32, K. C. C. H., Governor of Alabama.
- 126 A stone which was part of the foundation of the oldest house in Salem, N. C. From R. E. Fredc. F. Bahnson, Grand Commander, 1929-1930, of the Grand Commandery, K. T. of N. C.
- 219 A stone from the hill-sides of Wales, where it is reported Boadicea, Queen of the ancient Inceni, a tribe of Britons about A.D. 60, was defeated by the invading Romans; she committing suicide, was burned near the site from whence came the stone. From Ill. William Henry Pincombe, Shirwell, Prestatyn, North Wales, Past Grand Conductor of Council of the Grand Council of England and Wales.
- 299 Large piece of rose quartz from the Black Hills of South Dakota, one of the few spots where rose quartz is found in this country. From R. I. Robert S. Hart, Grand Master of the Grand Council, R. & S. M. of South Dakota, and Past Grand High Priest, R. A. M. Companion Hart delivered the quartz in person at Waynesville, N. C.
- 300 A cube of marble removed from the First Baptist Church of Waynesville, N. C., at time of recent additions. Contributed by Mrs. L. E. Green to the memory of her husband, M. I. Lawrence E. Green, Grand Master, 1929-30, of the Grand Council, R. & S. M. of N. C.

- 173 Stone from a block which was used in the structure of Washington Cathedral of Washington, D. C., from Ill. James E. Freeman 33, Bishop of Washington.

- 96 Cube of Stanstead Granite from M. W. J. D. McFadyen, P. G. M. of Stanstead, Quebec, Grand Representative of N. C. near Grand Lodge of Quebec.

- 122 White marble inscribed "Gd. Comdy. Kansas" from R. E. Dwight M. Numbers, Grand Commander K. T., Kansas.
- 102 Rough Ashlar, a deposit of the Glacial Period in Ohio from the Miami Valley. R. I. Horace L. Stephens, Grand Principal Conductor of the Work of the Grand Council of Ohio. Dayton.
- 239 Rough Ashlar of semi-metamorphosed marble taken from a quarry located on a dome in central part of Louisiana. Ill. R. W. Leche, Governor of Louisiana.
- 75 Cube, 4"x4"x10", product of a quarry at Queenston, Ontario, near Niagara Falls. From Ill. W. H. Davis 33, Secretary General Supreme Council, A. A. S. R. of Canada.
- 121 Polished stone of a peculiar deposit recently discovered on the scenic drive of Kansas, inscribed "Kansas," from M. I. Roy H. Clossen, P. G. M. and M. I. Neil M. McLeod, Grand Master of Grand Council of Kansas.
- 243 Olivene specimen from the Balsam Mountains of Western N. C., Ill. O. T. Alexander, Past Master of Doric Council No. 20 of Waynesville, N. C.; P. M.; P. H. P.; P. C.
- 137 Five-pound stone rock picked up on the battlefield at Blue Lick's Springs in Robertson County, Kentucky. This battle was fought on August 19, 1782, between Indians commanded by British officers and Kentucky pioneers. M. I. C. E. Peterson, P. G. M. of Grand Council of Ky.; Deputy Grand High Priest; Grand Warder of Grand Commandery, Maysville, Ky.
- 192 Boulder from the bed of the stream at Minnehaha Falls in Minneapolis, Minn., made immortal by Longfellow in his poems. M. W. A. F. Pray 33, P. G. M. of Masons in Minn., and S. G. I. G. for Minnesota, Scottish Rite.
- 221 Iowa limestone rock quarried near Anamora, Iowa, inscribed "R. A. M. Iowa E. E. D." M. E. Earl E. Dusenberry of Des Moines, Iowa, General Grand Master of the First Veil of the General Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons of U. S. A.
- 168 Stone from the coping on top of the Ritual Building of the Masonic Temple of Detroit, Mich., contributed by Masonic Temple Association of Detroit, Ill. W. Barclay Deyo 33, President.
- 240 Stone from the grounds of the Masonic and Eastern Star Home at Greensboro, N. C., contributed by the Guests of the Home to the memory of M. I. Henry C. Butler, Grand Master of the Grand Council of N. C., 1913-14.
- 3 Chip from the High Point Memorial erected on the highest point in New Jersey in High Point State Park, Sussex County, New Jersey, altitude 1,877 feet; height of Monument, 220 feet; corner stone laid June 8, 1929. Ill. Stanley L. Horka, D. D. G. M. and T. I. M. of Blanchard Council, No. 14, R. & S. M., Passaic, New Jersey.
- 139 White stone from the Masonic Temple at Virginia City, Mont., where the first meeting of Royal and Select Masters was held in that State, from M. W. Edwin Grafton, Grand Master of Masons of Montana. Billings, Mont.
- 205 Block of Winnsboro (S. C.) granite inscribed: "Grand Commandery K.T. of S. C. 1938," from Grand Commandery of S. C., R. E. Marion A. Park, Grand Commander and R. E. O. Frank Hart, Grand Recorder.
- 238 Stone from McCamie Cabin in Union County, N. C., where ex-President Andrew Jackson was born. From M. E. J. Roy Shute, II, Grand High Priest, 1938-39; Grand Master of Grand Council of N. C., 1934-35.
- 40 Gray stone from the house in which Andrew Johnson, the 17th president, was born in 1808, Raleigh, N. C., from W. D. Terry, Grand Tiler of Grand Lodge of N. C.
- 208 This stone is red sandstone from the Huyton Quarries near Liverpool and is the stone



being used to build the Cathedral. This actual piece was cut in the Masons Yard adjoining the Cathedral and it has been roughly tooled by several of the Master Masons working on the building. From R.'I.'. Charles G. S. Gordon, Past Grand Standard Bearer, Grand Council of England and Wales. Recorder Royal Solomon, No. 24, Treasurer Royal Hiram, No. 35, Liverpool, England.

- 350 A forty-pound block of Westerly granite of Rhode Island inscribed in triangular position: "Rhode Island 1938." From M.'I.'. Walter I. Cook. Providence, Grand Master of the Grand Council, R. & S. M. of Rhode Island.
- 359 North Carolina granite inscribed: "Ionic Council No. 9, Asheville, N. C." Contributed by Ionic Council No. 9, R. & S. M.
- 370 A block of soapstone taken from the head of Buck Creek in Macon County, N. C. From Comp.'. Wilton H. Cobb, K. T., Highlands, N. C., being a member of Blue Ridge Lodge No. 435, Highlands, N. C., the lodge with the highest elevation east of the Mississippi River, and a member of the York Rite Bodies of Waynesville, N. C.

#### STONES IN UPPER SECTION OF NORTHWEST CORNER—MAIN TIER

- 27 A stone from the farm of the Hoppe homestead, Gladbrook, Iowa, the home of seven brothers who are Master Masons. From W.'. Alvin H. Hoppe, Past Master and District Lecturer and his six brothers, Adolf F.; William C.; Henry M.; Edward K.; K. A.; and Harold R. All were raised in Olivet Lodge No. 436 at Gladbrook, Iowa. When the last brother (Harold R.) was raised, the other six brothers filled the principal stations. Henry M. and Edward K. are also Past Masters.
- 123 A peculiar stone picked up near the foot of Taum Sauk Mountain, Iron County, Missouri, the state's highest peak. From R.'.E.'. James A. Kinder, Cape Girardeau, Missouri, Grand Commander, K. T. of Missouri and Past Grand High Priest.
- 170 Two pieces of lava rock from Clarke's Quarry, Hulamanu, Oahu, T. H. From Ill.'. James S. McCandless 33, Honolulu, Hawaii, Deputy for Hawaii, of the Supreme Council, A. A. S. R. for the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States.
- 308 A stone from the old state capitol building at Frankfort, Kentucky. Contributed by Companion Albert B. Chandler, Governor of Kentucky.
- 310 A piece of Quincy granite from the city of Quincy, Mass. This stone is significant because of the fact that the first railroad in the United States was developed to quarry Quincy granite. Quincy is also the birthplace and burial place of two presidents, John Adams and John Quincy Adams. From W.'. Phillip C. McMurdie, Boston, who is Director of the Service Department of the Grand Lodge of Mass.
- 325 A stone which is probably from a volcanic eruption of millions of years ago from the famous Snake River Canyon near the Sho-Shone Falls of Idaho, one of the scenic wonders of the west. From R.'.I.'. Robert A. Parrott, Grand Conductor of Council of the Grand Council, R. & S. M. of Idaho.
- 355 An Arkansas crystal picked up near the famous Hot Springs of that state by Comp.'. Albert Abel, Waynesville, N. C., member of Doric Council No. 20, Waynesville, N. C.
- 365 Basalt with markings of limestone in the seams selected from near the banks of the beautiful Rogue River near Medford, Oregon. From M.'.I.'. D. Bruce Stuart, Grand Master, 1937-38, and M.'.I.'. Ralph E. Sweeney, Grand Master, 1938-39, of the Grand Council, R. & S. M. of Oregon.
- 367 An original brick from the chimney of a house built in 1735 on Masonboro Sound near Wilmington, N. C. Masonboro Sound is supposed to have gotten its name from the congregation of Masons. From the construction of the building, the upper floor has evidently

been used as a Masonic Lodge and there is a probability that this building was the first Masonic building in North Carolina. From M.'.I.'. John S. McEachern, D. D. G. M., Wilmington, Grand Master, 1933-1934, Grand Council, R. & S. M.; Grand High Priest, 1926-1927, R. A. M.

- 380 A stone from the enclosure of the Plymouth Rock where the Pilgrims landed in 1620. The stone was obtained by digging down the side of the famous rock. From R.'.E.'. Adelbert E. Place, Providence, R. I., Grand Commander of Knights Templar for Massachusetts and Rhode Island.

- 89 Grinding stone used by Mandan Indians about three hundred to four hundred years ago to grind their maize; dug out of the ruins of the Mandan Indian village on the banks of the Missouri River. R.'.E.'. Louis F. Smith, Mandan, N. D., Grand Commander of Knights Templar of North Dakota.
- 151 A piece of Basalt from the Columbia River basin of Washington. Ill.'. William S. McCrea 33, S. G. I. G. for the State of Washington, Supreme Council A. A. S. R. for the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States.
- 305 Ore from the Boylston Gold Mine property in Henderson County of N. C. R.'.E.'. Howard G. Etheridge, Asheville, Grand Commander of Knight Templar, 1937-38, and Grand Master, 1926-27 of the Grand Council, R. & S. M. of N. C.
- 309 Small piece of granite from the Sugar Loaf Mountain, Co. Wicklow, Ireland. W.'. Philip Crossle, Librarian, and R.'.W.'. Henry C. Shellard, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge, A. F. & A. M. of Ireland.
- 324 Flint from near the banks of the Ocmulgee River which was once the camping grounds of the early Indians in Georgia, now a National Park known as "Ocmulgee Indian Mounds," Ill.'. W. J. Penn, Jr., Macon, Ga., Grand Secretary-Recorder of the Grand York Rite Bodies of Georgia.
- 332 Two stones from the summit of Mt. Mitchell in Western North Carolina, the highest mountain peak east of the Rockies. From Ill.'. W. H. Woodbury 33, Past High Priest of Asheville Chapter No. 25, R. A. M.
- 356 Coral taken from the plates of the ocean-going tank vessel "F. D. ASCHE," which was stranded on the reefs of the Bahama Islands in a West Indian hurricane, October 27, 1921, then owned by the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey. The impact caused a number of tons of this coral to become imbedded in the plates of the vessel, which was subsequently removed when the vessel was sent to Newport News, Virginia, for repairs. From Bro.'. W. T. Huff, Waynesville, member of Waynesville Lodge No. 259.
- 361 Rock from the farm of Eastern Carolina Training School For Boys at Rocky Mount, N. C., a state training school for boys established by State Legislature enactment in 1923. Contributed by Cryptic Council No. 26, R. & S. M. of Rocky Mount, the youngest Council in North Carolina.
- 368 A piece of bluff granite or Norite from the southern-most portion of New Zealand and the British Empire. M.'.E.'. Herbert Greenwood, Dunedin, New Zealand, Hon. 2nd Grand Sojourner, Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland and Dist. Grand Scribe of New Zealand.
- 378 A stone from the ruins of the tower of the Cathedral of Old Panama City, which city was plundered in 1671 by Henry Morgan, the pirate and the Spaniard inhabitants set fire to it before retiring. M.'.W.'. Guillermo Andreve 33, P. G. M., Grand Lodge of Panama and Sovereign Grand Commander, Supreme Council A. A. S. R. of Panama.
- 377 A stone from Meigs Corner, established by R. J. Meigs in 1802 on what is now Mt. Collins in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, altitude 6,274 feet, about 4½ miles west of

Newfound Gap, which at that time marked the boundary between the Cherokee Indians and the United States and was thereby the western boundary of the United States. The following is copied from Meigs's notebook: "Erected by the order of Thomas Jefferson the Supreme Executive of the U. States. The man who in Eloquent Stile & firmly collected attitude, in the Face of the Universe announced the Independence of the United States of America. The undulations of his Voice made Tyrants tremble; and revived the Hopes of oppressed Humanity in distant Regions. August 17th, 1802. Erected post of Spruce Pine 15 inches in diameter, 6 feet high . . . erected a mound of stones around this post of about two tons of stone with difficulty we collected having no tools for digging." This is one of the stones from the mound, and is contributed by M. I. T. Troy Dyche, Grand Master 1936-1937 of Grand Council, R. & S. M. of N. C., Grand Master of Second Veil of Grand Royal Arch Chapter, and Founder of the movement to build The Marker.

- 379 A piece of Carrara (Italy) marble which was salvaged from the famous Canova Statue of Washington when the State House of North Carolina was burned in 1831. This famous statue, done by Antonio Canova in 1821 and placed in the State House by North Carolina was considered one of the art treasures of the nation, but its existence was brief, for the statue was destroyed on June 21, 1831, when the State House was burned. Contributed by Illustrious Brother Clyde R. Hoey, Governor of North Carolina.
