COUNSELING SERVICE

The Philosophical Research Society and its School recognize philosophical, religious, and psychological counseling as an integral part of an idealistic educational program. Through counseling, the individual is helped to sustain his integration under the stress of modern living, avert many critical situations, correct unfortunate tendencies, and come to a better and richer understanding of the laws operating beneath the surface of man's mental and emotional conduct patterns.

TO MEET A REAL NEED

Because of the unique place our Society occupies in the sphere of learning, many of our students and friends have appealed to us for psychological direction, guidance, analysis, and therapy. Due to lack of adequate facilities, it has not been possible to serve effectively the ever increasing number of those who desire counseling.

The Society has therefore decided to establish a Counseling Center and placed it under the direction of Mr. Henry L. Drake, who is trained in both psychology and philosophy. His approach to counseling and analysis will be in conformity with the basic philosophical, religious, and psychological convictions of the Society.

As our Society is a non-profit educational corporation, this Counseling Service can be offered at a substantially lower fee than would be possible in private practice. Those interested in such services for them-
