**A SYNOPSIS OF
EMERGENCY MEDICAL TREATMENT**

[REDACTED] was with the President when he was shot, followed him to the hospital, and was with him throughout his emergency treatment and surgery. Dr. Joseph Giordano took charge of the President's emergency treatment and performed part of his surgery. Dr. Benjamin Aaron removed the bullet from the President's chest.

Dr. Arthur I. Kobrine supervised Mr. James Brady's emergency treatment and operated on him to remove bullet fragments from his skull.

Dr. Neofytos Tsangaris supervised Special Agent Timothy McCarthy's emergency treatment and performed surgery to remove a bullet from his abdomen.

[REDACTED], conducted the preliminary examination of Officer Thomas Delahanty. Dr. Michael W. Dennis supervised his treatment and performed surgery on him to remove a bullet from near his spine.

SA [REDACTED] United States Secret Service, gathered up the President's clothes from the floor of the emergency treatment room as the President was being treated, and gave them to [REDACTED] SA, USSS, who gave them to [REDACTED] SA, USSS, who gave them to SA [REDACTED] FBI, who delivered them to the FBI Laboratory.

[REDACTED] and [REDACTED], MPD, recovered various pieces of clothing and personal effects of all four victims and gave them to SA's [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] FBI, who delivered them to the FBI Laboratory.

SA [REDACTED] FBI, took three bags of sealed evidence from the emergency room at George Washington Hospital to the FBI Laboratory.

[redacted] was with the President at the Washington Hilton Hotel on the afternoon of March 30, 1981. The President was giving a speech, and [redacted] was with him as is the standard practice whenever the President leaves the White House. [redacted] stated that after everything was over, the President and his party exited the Hilton through the same side entrance that they entered through. As they exited, [redacted] was about fifteen to twenty feet behind the President. There were about five to seven people between [redacted] and the President. [redacted] stated that he, [redacted] was walking by himself as they exited, and further, that he noted nothing suspicious as he exited.

[redacted] advised that as they exited, he went directly towards the [redacted] in the motorcade, where he normally rides. That car was parked in the street, while the President's limousine was parked in a small circular driveway by the exit. When [redacted] was still on the sidewalk, about seven to ten feet from his car, he heard gunshots to his left. [redacted] turned and observed three people on the ground. He noted that the President had been wearing a blue pin stripe suit, and did not see anyone wearing a blue pin stripe suit among those on the ground. [redacted] did see a heavyset person with a grey suit lying face down on the ground, probably James Brady.

[redacted] next noticed a Secret Service Agent looking across the street with his revolver drawn pointing in the air. [redacted] did not see the President, but did see the Presidential limousine pull away. He hollered for his car, [redacted] and jumped in it. [redacted] stated he did not have any idea of where the shots came from, and did not see

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any struggle going on.

██████████ was in the right rear of the ██████████ with a female Secret Service Agent next to him and the usual Secret Service Agent was driving. As they drove, the female agent climbed over into the right front seat. The motorcade proceeded at a high rate of speed South on Connecticut Avenue. The radio announced that ██████████ (the president) is okay" and "we're going direct to the White House" several times, and ██████████ saw the President sitting up in the right rear seat of the limousine in front of them. As they reached the area of Farragut Square, the radio from the Presidential limousine announced that "we're going to George Washington (hospital)", and they turned in that direction.

The Presidential limousine and follow up car pulled up to the Emergency Room entrance loop and the President walked towards the entrance with ██████████ close behind. The President then slumped, someone yelled, "pick him up" and the President was carried into the Emergency Room, placed on a cart and taken to the Treatment Room on the extreme left. Seven or eight medical persons attended to the President, and ██████████ watched from the foot of the cart.

██████████ said that at first no one realized the President had been shot. The President looked at ██████████ several times, but did not say anything. The President was stripped naked and a wound was noted on the left side of his chest. The wound was in the lateral aspect of the chest about five inches below the arm pit, and was about three quarters of an inch in length. There was not much bleeding, and no apparent exit wound.

██████████ stayed with the President throughout his treatment except one time that he stepped out to speak to Mrs. Reagan briefly. He estimated that the President was in the Emergency room about forty minutes when he was moved to the Operating Room. ██████████ went to the Operating Room and observed the operation. He observed ██████████ make a one and a half inch incision into the President's abdomen to look for any damage. None was found, and that incision was closed.

██████████ then operated on the President's chest. ██████████ heard ██████████ say he had found the bullet in the chest, and saw him give it to a Secret Service Agent. The round was placed in a round cardboard container and marked with the time

██████████ said he had no contact with the Secret Service Agent or Metropolitan Police Department Officer who were shot. He did see James Brady in the Emergency and Operating rooms occasionally and saw ██████████ operating on him.

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[redacted] advised that while assisting President Reagan into the Hospital emergency room, the President collapsed and he then carried the President to a bed. At that point, the President's clothes were ripped off by Hospital staff and thrown on the floor. [redacted] primary duty was the welfare of President Reagan; however, when time permitted, he gathered some of the clothes lying on the floor and gave them to Special Agent [redacted] of the Secret Service. [redacted] advised he has no knowledge of what happened to the ripped parts of the President's shirt, or his cuff links.

[redacted] Metropolitan Police Department was also present during the interview.

On March 30, 1981, he was assigned to the 4 P.M. to 12 midnight shift. At approximately 2:25 P.M. while enroute to work at the White House, accompanied by Special Agents [redacted] and [redacted] also of the Presidential Protection Division, he heard over the Secret Service Radio that shots had been fired and the President was enroute to George Washington Hospital. He immediately proceeded to George Washington Hospital with the aid of red light and siren. [redacted] arrived at George Washington Hospital approximately one minute after the Presidential Motorcade. He and the other occupants of his vehicle then rushed into the emergency room area to establish security. During this time Special Agent [redacted] Secret Service, handed [redacted] a bundle of clothes. The bundle was comprised of a dark blue pinstripe cloth material and felt as if it had shoes wrapped inside. Upon handing [redacted] the bundle [redacted] said something like, "these are the President's clothes, hold onto them for safekeeping."

[redacted] was taking the clothes outside to be placed in the President's limousine when he saw Special Agent, [redacted] Presidential Protection Division, Secret Service. He handed the clothes to [redacted] and said, "These are the President's clothes, put them in the car for safekeeping." [redacted] then returned inside and did not see the clothes again.

On March 30, 1981, Special Agent (SA) [redacted] Presidential Protective Division, United States Secret Service, Washington Field Office (WFO), telephone number [redacted] Washington, D.C. (WDC), advised the under-noted agent at the George Washington University Hospital, WDC, that she was in possession and custody of several articles of clothing belonging to President Ronald Reagan. SA [redacted] stated that these articles were presently secured in the back seat of the Presidential limousine, numbered [redacted]. Shortly thereafter, the undernoted agent accompanied SA [redacted] to the Presidential limousine numbered [redacted]. At this time the doors to the back seat of the limousine were unlocked and SA [redacted] and SA [redacted] entered the vehicle. SA [redacted] identified the articles of clothing within as those belonging to the President. (b)(7)(c):(F) (b)(2)

SA [redacted] further advised that this clothing was given to her by SA [redacted], Presidential Protective Division, United States Secret Service, WFO, WDC. SA [redacted] noted that these articles of clothing initially had been placed in two other Presidential vehicles which now had departed the hospital prior to their placement in the Presidential limousine numbered [redacted]. SA [redacted] with the assistance of SA [redacted] placed each article of clothing in a clear plastic bag and immediately sealed the same. SA [redacted] itemized each article of clothing on a clean sheet of white paper which also contained the signature, date, and an acknowledgment by SA [redacted] of receipt of all articles itemized. At this time SA [redacted] took physical control and possession of the clothing which were now individually sealed in clear plastic bags. Soon thereafter SA [redacted] accompanied by SA [redacted] Presidential Protective Division, United States Secret Service, WFO, WDC, delivered the articles of clothing to the FBI Laboratory, FBI Headquarters, WDC. Upon arrival at the hospital, interviewing agents were introduced to [redacted] and [redacted] the Mobile Crime Lab, Metropolitan Police Department (MPD), WDC, who had set up a center for the collection, inventory and preservation of evidence.

[redacted] and [redacted] accompanied by the interviewing agents, delivered these bags to the custody of Special Agent [redacted], Laboratory Division, Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), at approximately 6:45 p.m.

Also delivered to the FBI lab was one bag of clothing and effects of MPD officer, Thomas Delahanty, which [redacted] advised he had recovered from the Washington Hospital Center, WDC, earlier in the day.

[redacted] advised that after the President was transferred from the emergency room to the operating room, he found a cuff link in the area where President Reagan was attended to. The cuff link, according to [redacted], was gold with some type of buffalo or similar picture on it. [redacted] advised he then gave this item to a police officer or someone who resembled a police officer, dressed in a blue uniform.

[redacted] advised that he has no other knowledge regarding the cuff link, or any knowledge concerning the President's shirt.

On March 31, 1981, Special Agent [redacted] of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), re-introduced himself to [redacted] (Personal Assistant to) President Ronald Reagan. [redacted] advised [redacted] that he would like to take custody of the President's pocket knife and wrist watch, which were in the possession of [redacted].

At this point, [redacted] objected to turning over the pocket knife and wrist watch since they were the personal property of the President. [redacted] explained the FBI's interest regarding this matter. [redacted] of the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD) and [redacted] who were also present, concurred with [redacted] D.C.

[redacted] then handed [redacted] one silver pocket knife with the inscription Ronald Reagan - 1976. [redacted] advised that a [redacted] found the pocket knife on the floor of the emergency room and gave it to [redacted] in the early morning of March 31, 1981.

[redacted] then requested [redacted] to release the President's wrist watch and again [redacted] was hesitant. [redacted] advised it was in another room of the hospital where he spent the night.

[redacted] returned later and gave [redacted] the gold-tone wrist watch. [redacted] advised that either a nurse or a doctor gave the wrist watch to him either the late evening of March 30, 1981, or early morning of March 31, 1981.

The pocket knife and wrist watch were then submitted to the FBI Laboratory by [redacted].

On March 30, 1981, at approximately 7:00 P.M., Special Agent [redacted] Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), surveyed the Emergency Room of George Washington University Hospital where President Reagan, Presidential Press Secretary Brady, and United States Secret Service Special Agent McCarthy were previously treated. This survey was made in an attempt to ascertain the shirt of President Reagan and any other articles which may be of evidentiary value to the FBI. 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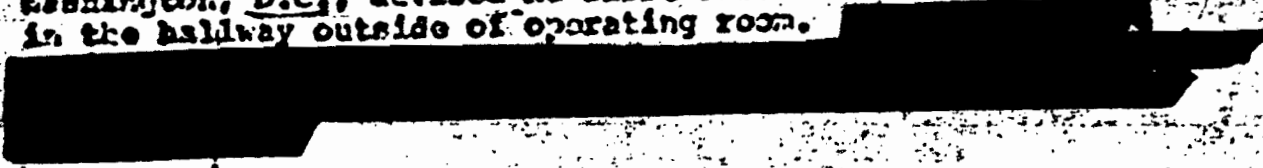

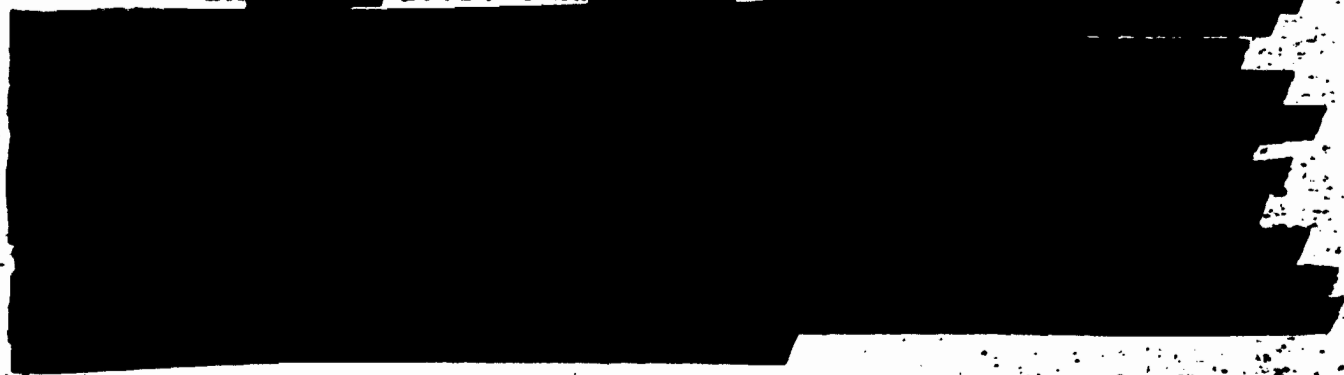

On April 6, 1981, Special Agent (SA) [redacted] of the Washington Field Office (WFO) of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) had telephonic conversation with Assistant United States Attorney (AUSA) William Block, United States District Court. At this time SA [redacted] who is the Legal Adviser for the WFO, informed AUSA Block that when Room 312 of the Park Central Hotel, 705 18th Street, N. W., Washington, D. C., was searched two items of possible evidentiary value were seized, but were inadvertently omitted from the inventory. The items consisted of one issue of the Washington Post and one issue of the Washington Star, both dated March 30, 1981.

SA [redacted] advised AUSA Block that when Room 312 was entered SAs of the WFO found sections A, B, C, D and the "Washington Business Section" of the Post lying in a pile on the floor near the far wall. Sections B, C, and D of the Star were also in this pile. Section A of the Star was on the bed, and opened to page A-4. This page contained "The President's Schedule" section which listed President Reagan's upcoming address to the AFL-CIO at the Washington Hilton Hotel.

SA [redacted] advised AUSA Block that he obtained the following chronology of events from SA [redacted], WFO, FBI, team leader for the search of Room 312; SA [redacted], WFO, FBI, the SA who prepared the inventory list; SA [redacted], Latent Fingerprint Section, Laboratory Division, FBIHQ, who was in charge of processing the room for latent evidence:

Room 312 was entered at 9:53 p.m., March 30, 1981, by SAs [redacted], and [redacted], and [redacted] observed the newspapers; SAs [redacted] and [redacted] photographed them as they were originally found. At approximately 10:15 p.m., SA [redacted] entered Room 312 with a team of latent fingerprint technicians. Upon entering Room 312, SA [redacted] team began processing the furniture, doors, and other fixed items for latent fingerprints. Upon arrival it was noted that representatives of the United States Secret Service, the Washington, D. C. Metropolitan Police Department, and the FBI Technical Section were also present.

After the arrival of the search warrant for the hotel room, the apartment was entered by FBI and U. S. Secret Service representatives, and it was determined that no explosive devices were secreted in the hotel room. Immediately thereafter SAs [redacted] and [redacted] photographed the hotel room in the exact fashion it was left by the subject. Photographs were taken of the overall scene from numerous angles, and closer view photographs were made of a Washington Star newspaper which was open on one of the two beds in the room. Closer view photographs were also made of the name tags on the two pieces of luggage in the room. No items in the room were disturbed during this photography.

The Technical Section of the FBI then dusted the room for any latent fingerprints which might have been present. Following this procedure the entire contents of the room were inventoried by the search team. As this was done SAs [redacted] and [redacted] photographed any evidence which was deemed to have immediate lead potential.

The search and photographing of Room 312, Park Central Hotel continued until approximately 4:45 a.m., March 31, 1981, at which time the room was sealed by the Metropolitan Police Department.



**TECHNICAL ANALYSIS
(FIREARMS IDENTIFICATION EXAMINATIONS)**

The following laboratory results appear in the combine laboratory report bearing laboratory numbers 10330048, 10330049, 10330050, 10330051, 10330052, 10330053, 10330054, 10330055, 10330056, 10331012, 10331055, 10331092, 10331114, 10401026, 10401028, 10402003, 10403041, and 10413016.

The six cartridge cases removed from the .22 Long Rifle Caliber RG Industries Revolver, Model RG14, Serial Number L731332, were identified as having been fired from that weapon.

The bullet removed from President Ronald Reagan, the bullet from Timothy McCarthy, and the bullet removed from Officer Delahanty, were all identified as having been fired from the above described revolver, bearing Serial Number L731332.

Bullet fragments and metal fragments recovered from James Brady, are too mutilated to determine caliber, manufacture, and general rifling characteristics or from which weapon the fragments might have been fired from.

The bullet fragments which were found in James Brady, fragments from the right rear window of the Presidential Limousine, and fragments from the window of the Universal Building, although not identifiable, were consistent with a devastator type round.

It was determined that the .32 caliber S&W cartridge case recovered at the Washington Hilton, was not fired from the weapon, a .32 Long Caliber S&W Revolver, Serial Number 4014, recovered from [REDACTED]

(GUNPOWDER AND PRIMER RESIDUE EXAMINATION)

The clothing from all four victims at the Washington Hilton, were examined microscopically and processed chemically for the presence of gunpowder residue but none were found. The absence of such residue precludes the possibility of any muzzle-to-garment distance determinations.

Hinckley's clothing was also examined for gunpowder residue, but none were found.

Swabs from hands of Hinckley were analyzed by neutron activation analysis. No significant amounts of antimony and barium were detected.

The absence of gunshot residue particles and significant amounts of antimony and barium does not preclude the possibility that a person could have discharged a firearm.

(PAINT AND TRAJECTORY EXAMINATIONS)

It was concluded by trajectory tests and microscopic, microchemical and instrumental analysis, that the bullet which struck and was removed from President Reagan, first deflected off of the right rear quarter panel of the Presidential Limousine. The bullet was found to exhibit paint layers and composition which were identical to that of the Presidential Limousine.

(AMMUNITION COMPONENT EXAMINATIONS)

A small metal cylinder was removed from the bullet removed from President Ronald Reagan, Timothy McCarthy, and Officer Delahanty. These three cylinders have characteristics similar to metal cylinders loaded into .22 caliber exploding bullets sold under the trade name "Devastator." The small metal cylinders in the bullets contained approximately 28 milligrams of lead azide. The lead azide is a primary explosive, used in detonators and primers in the commercial explosives industry.

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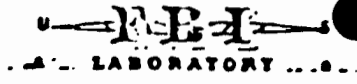

FIREARMS IDENTIFICATION EXAMINATIONS

The Q1 through Q6 cartridge cases were identified as having been fired in the K1 revolver.

The Q7, Q21 and Q138 bullets were identified as having been fired from the K1 revolver.

Specimen Q11 is a .22 caliber copper-plated lead bullet fragment which is too mutilated to determine its manufacturer or the general rifling characteristics of the weapon from which it was fired. Further, specimen Q11 bears no microscopic marks of value for identification purposes.

Specimens Q12 and Q14 are metal fragments which have no remaining bullet characteristics and bear no microscopic marks of value for identification purposes.

Specimen Q13 is a copper-plated lead bullet fragment which is too mutilated to determine its caliber, manufacturer or the general rifling characteristics of the weapon from which it was fired. This fragment bears no microscopic marks of value.

The fragments contained in specimens Q29 through Q35 were examined and two copper-plated lead bullet fragments were noted. These bullet fragments are too mutilated to accurately determine their caliber(s), manufacturer(s) or the rifling characteristics of the weapon(s) which fired them. Further, these two bullet fragments bear no microscopic marks of value for identification purposes.

Specimens Q76 and Q77 are .22 Long Rifle caliber cartridges of Remington-Peters manufacture. Specimens Q78 through Q112 are .22 Long Rifle caliber cartridges of Winchester-Western manufacture. The bullet portions of these cartridges differ in physical characteristics from the bullets and bullet fragments recovered from the victims and from the scene of the shootings. No microscopic marks of value for comparison purposes were found in any of the Q76 through Q112 cartridges.

Specimen Q113 is a .32 S&W caliber cartridge case of Remington-Peters manufacture. Based on microscopic comparisons, it was determined that the Q113 cartridge case was not fired in the K12 revolver.

Specimens Q126 through Q128 are .22 Short caliber cartridges of Remington-Peters manufacture. The bullet portions of these cartridges differ in physical characteristics from the bullets and bullet fragments recovered from the victims and from the scene of the shootings. No microscopic marks of value for identification purposes were found in the Q126 through Q128 cartridges.

GUNPOWDER AND PRIMER RESIDUE EXAMINATIONS

The Q8 through Q10, Q15 through Q20 and Q22 through Q28 garments were examined microscopically and processed chemically for the presence of gunpowder residues, but none were found. The absence of such residues precludes the possibility of making any muzzle-to-garment distance determinations.

The Q38, Q43 and Q44 garments from HINCKLEY were examined microscopically and processed chemically for the presence of gunpowder residues, but none were found.

The Q118 suit coat was examined microscopically and processed chemically for the presence of gunpowder residues, but none were found. Adhesive dabbings taken from the right and left sleeves of the Q118 suit coat were examined by instrumental means for particles of gunshot residue. No particles of gunshot residue were detected on these dabbings. It is pointed out that minute lead particles were detected on these dabbings. In the experience of the FBI Laboratory, such lead particles are not unique to gunshot residue and, therefore, cannot be identified as such.

Adhesive dabs taken from the cuff area of the right and left sleeves of the Q38 jacket were examined by scanning electron microscopy and x-ray analysis for particles of gunshot residue. No gunshot residue particles were detected on these dabs.

Specimens Q39 and Q40 were analyzed by neutron activation analysis for the elements antimony and barium which are components of most primer mixtures and can be deposited on the back of the thumb, forefinger and connecting web area of the hand when a firearm is discharged. No significant amounts of antimony and barium were detected on specimens Q39 and Q40 from the back of the right and left hand of HINCKLEY.

Specimens Q41 and Q42 from the palms of HINCKLEY were likewise analyzed for antimony and barium. No significant amounts of antimony and barium were detected on specimens Q41 and Q42.

The absence of gunshot residue particles and significant amounts of antimony and barium does not preclude the possibility that a person could have discharged a firearm. If gunshot residues were deposited, such residues could have been removed by wiping, washing or other activity prior to the time the garment was sampled or the hands were swabbed.

An analysis of residue from the primer area of the Q1 through Q6 cartridge cases revealed barium but no antimony. This is consistent with primer mixtures used in .22 caliber cartridges produced by Cascade Cartridge Incorporated.

PAINT AND TRAJECTORY EXAMINATIONS

Specimen K6 was found to exhibit the following paint finish in the areas adjacent to the damaged portion:

1. Glossy black, nitrocellulose modified acrylic lacquer

2. Thin dark gray nitrocellulose modified primer/surfacer
3. Thick medium to light gray lacquer primer
4. Thin red-brown nitrocellulose modified primer
5. Thick medium to light gray lacquer primer
6. Light (pale) green primer-type paint
7. Thick, coarse-textured, light pink body filler material
8. Metal substrate

A microscopic examination of the Q7 bullet revealed the presence of minute, crushed black paint deposits in several areas on the flattened side which exhibits no rifling characteristics. Some of these black paint deposits are crushed and intermixed with gray primer-like paints.

Microscopic, microchemical and instrumental comparison examinations disclosed that the black paint deposits on the Q7 bullet are like the black top layer as described in K6 above with respect to color, type and composition. Additionally, the crushed gray deposits on Q7 were found to be like a combination of layers two (2) and three (3) as set forth in the K6 layer structure with respect to types and composition.

Based on these paint comparisons, it is concluded that the Q7 bullet either struck the painted surface represented by K6 or another painted surface that bears the exact same paints. This latter possibility is considered to be remote.

Trajectory tests conducted, using the Presidential limousine and the K1 revolver, confirmed that the bullet which struck President Reagan first deflected off of the right rear quarter panel of the Presidential limousine.

AMMUNITION COMPONENT EXAMINATIONS

A small metal cylinder was removed from each of the Q7, Q21 and Q138 bullets. These three cylinders have remaining observable characteristics similar to the metal cylinders loaded into .22 caliber exploding bullets sold under the trade name "Devastator."

An instrumental examination of the powder taken from the metal cylinders found in specimens Q7, Q21 and Q138 determined it to be lead azide, a primary explosive, used in detonators and primers in the commercial explosives industry. The small metal cylinders contained approximately 28 milligrams of lead azide and were sealed at one end with a blue nitrocellulose-based lacquer.

Lead carbonate hydroxide and elemental lead, two known byproducts from the detonation of lead azide, were found around the crater in specimen Q117. It therefore was determined that the crater in specimen Q117 was caused by the impact of a lead azide-containing bullet.

No residues were found on the Q14 fragment of aluminum from BRADY that could be attributed to explosives or their byproducts. Further, no byproducts which could be attributed to explosives were found on the Q11 through Q13 fragments from BRADY.

Foreign material removed from the Q36 swab and Q37 swab taken from the window of the Universal Building North was identified as minute particles of lead. Due to the limitation of material available, it was not possible to further characterize these particles or to detect other significant components which might identify the source of the foreign material.

The Q7, Q21 and Q138 bullets are the same in all observable physical characteristics as those sold commercially in "Devastator" cartridges. These three bullets, as well as the Q1 through Q6 cartridge cases, could have originated from the ALSO SUBMITTED ammunition box (Laboratory Number 10331055 S QY RP).

The lead component of the Q7, Q21 and Q138 bullets; the Q11, Q12 and Q13 lead fragments; the Q29, Q30, Q31 and Q33 lead fragments and lead fragments from specimens Q34, Q35 and Q115 were analyzed for their elemental composition using neutron activation analysis.

The lead component of the Q7 and Q138 bullets and the Q33 lead fragment match in elemental composition.

The Q11, Q12 and Q13 lead fragments match in elemental composition. It is consistent that these lead fragments originated from a single bullet.

The Q29, Q30 and Q31 lead fragments and the lead fragments from specimens Q34 and Q35 match in elemental composition. It is consistent that these lead fragments originated from a single bullet.

The lead represented by the Q29, Q30 and Q31 fragments and the fragments from Q34 and Q35 and the lead represented by the Q11, Q12 and Q13 fragments match in elemental composition. They are generally similar in elemental composition to the lead component of the Q21 bullet.

The lead fragments from specimen Q115 match in elemental composition. It is consistent that these lead fragments originated from a single bullet.

The four compositions of lead represented in the above specimens are consistent with lead compositions found in a single box of commercially available cartridges.

No lead consistent with bullet lead was found in specimen Q114.

The human blood identified on the Q8 jacket was grouped as [REDACTED] human blood was identified on the Q9 trousers. The other blood grouping tests conducted on the Q8 jacket were inconclusive. The bloodstains on the Q9 trousers were too limited in quantity for further examination.

Grouping tests conducted on the human blood identified on the Q38 jacket and the Q44 shirt were inconclusive. No blood was found on the Q43 trousers or on the boots and socks from HINCKLEY.

Group [REDACTED] human blood was identified on the Q116 swabs. The other grouping tests conducted were inconclusive.

The Q74 blood sample from HINCKLEY was grouped as [REDACTED] [REDACTED] The other tests conducted were inconclusive.

HAIR AND FIBER EXAMINATIONS

Blue woolen fibers were found in specimens K4 and K5. These fibers have been mounted on glass microscope slides for possible future comparison.

No hairs were found in specimens K4 and K5, and therefore, no comparisons were made with the specimens K2 and K3 hair samples of HINCKLEY.

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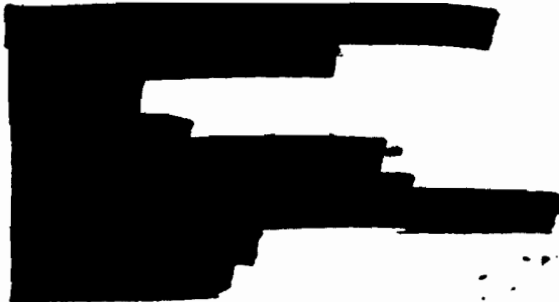

A Synopsis of the
Arrest and Interview of Subject

On March 30, 1981, John Warnock Hinckley, Jr. (b)(7)(c) was located at the Homicide Branch of the Metropolitan Police Department, Washington, D.C., and advised by Special Agents [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] that he was under arrest by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) for the attempted assassination of President Ronald Reagan in violation of Title 18, Section 1751(a) United States Code.

Hinckley was transported by Bureau Agents to FBI Washington Field Office (WFO):

Upon arrival Hinckley was immediately advised of his rights as set forth in FD-395, "Interrogation, Advice of Rights". Hinckley executed a Waiver.

Hinckley was interviewed and refused to make any statements concerning the assassination attempt of President Ronald Reagan.

Hinckley provided descriptive background information as well as travel itinerary surrounding his arrival in Washington, D.C., on March 29, 1981.

Hinckley was photographed, fingerprinted and received medical treatment.

On March 31, 1981, Hinckley was turned over to the U.S. Marshal Service, U.S. Marine Corps Base Correctional Facility, Quantico, Virginia, where he was incarcerated.

On March 31, 1981, Hinckley provided Handwriting exemplars to FBI Agents.

JOHN WARNOCK HINCKLEY was located in the Homicide Section of the Metropolitan Police Department, WDC, and was advised that he was being placed under arrest by the Federal Bureau of Investigation for violation of Title 18, USC, Section 1751. This violation was explained to HINCKLEY to be an attempt to kill the President of the United States.

HINCKLEY was thereafter transported to the Washington Field Office of the FBI where he was interviewed, fingerprinted and photographed.

Following appropriate processing of HINCKLEY at the Washington Field Office, HINCKLEY conferred with Attorneys ED WILHITE and STUART FISK JOHNSON.

HINCKLEY was placed in a U.S. Secret Service vehicle and transported to the U.S. District Court House, WDC, where he was afforded his initial appearance before U.S. Magistrate ARTHUR L. BURNETT.

HINCKLEY was thereafter transported to the Marine Base Stockade, Quantico, Va., where he was lodged.

At the time of the interview, John W. Hinckley was being housed at the United States Marine Corps Base Correctional Facility, Quantico, Virginia.

Hinckley then furnished twenty-seven pages of handwriting samples to Special Agents [redacted] and [redacted], Federal Bureau of Investigation, Washington, D.C.

The obtaining of the handwriting samples was terminated at 7:10 p.m. on March 30, 1981, with numerous rest periods and a twenty minute supper period.

During the course of obtaining the handwriting samples, Hinckley was only instructed to write certain numbers, letters, dates, times, words, and phrases which were similar to those written on items seized in the authorized search of his room, #312, Park Central Hotel, 705 18th Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. [redacted]
