RANCE, England, Italy and stricken Belgium stake their existence on America's food resources—on her Wheat, above all. Coarse grains to mix in their war bread—corn, outs, rice, and other cereals—they need also. These we are sending—millions of bushels—and can continue to send from our surplus. Of wheat alone there is no surplus—we can send Wheat only as we save it. We must send it. Providing food to maintain the Allies is a national obligation that everyone of us is pledged to redeem. Thus Far We Have Not Saved Enough

Why Loyal Americans are keeping the Pledge to eat less Wheat and Meat

HE United States Food Administration by your efforts alone is able to send our soldiers and sailors and the people whose fate is linked with ours the food to sustain them through defense to victory. Every man, woman and child, by eating plenty, but wisely, without waste, can help to create a supply of wheat, beef, pork, fats and sugar to serve the common cause.

What the food situation is

WAR has brought Europe to the verge of famine. War demands, absorbing all surplus of wheat, meat, sugar and fats, reach into every American home. America must provide in increasing amounts—and only America can provide—these vital foods which, packed in the smallest space, are all that can go in the limited shipping available. Before the New Year began we had sent to Europe for our normal surplus. Now we must create fresh supplies by patriotic savings. Our Government will hold here enough for our needs; every pound above that will be sent where war demands are most pressing. We cannot spare more; we dare not send less.

Why we must help

WHY WE MUST EAT LESS WHEAT

Bread comes first. Bread means wheat. The people of the Allies, eating war bread darker and heavier than any we are asked to adopt, must have enough to make the raised loaf. They are eating corn and barley and rye; that they may have Bread we must send them 75,000,000 bushels of wheat.

To create that supply, we must cut down our own use of wheat by one-third. To sustain them against famine, to protect the armies from disaster, loyal Americans are eating Victory Bread.

WHY WE MUST EAT LESS MEAT

Beef and pork keep the armies and workers in fighting trim. All Europe has eaten into its herds of meat animals down to the danger point. All we save will go to strengthen our fighting arms across the Atlantic.

We have been eating twice what we needed. We can create a supply without harm to ourselves by drawing on other food resources. So doing, loyal America gives power to our armies and our associates to gain the victory.

WHY WE MUST EAT LESS FATS

Animal fats mean pork and dairy products. The nation that is without enough of these is destroyed. While Europe has been slaughtering its swine and its dairy cattle down to the danger point, we have been eating and wasting more than twice as much fats as we need. We have increased our exports tenfold and more; but we must increase our shipments still further.

We can safely eat and use in cooking more vegetable oils, giving the children plenty of butter and milk, and thus save what is necessary to send over-seas.

WHY WE MUST EAT LESS SUGAR

Sugar is a food that releases energy in the quickest way. France, Italy and Belgiuin, which formerly produced their own sugar have been able to produce but little during the war. England is now cut off from Germany, Austria, and far-off Java, from which she got most of her supply. The whole demand of the Allies now falls on Cuba and us, and we rely upon Cuba for part of our own needs. To meet the situation we must cut down our lavish consumption, and share with the Allies.

How you can help

EAT LESS WHEAT BREAD

Have at least TWO WHEATLESS days (Monday and Wednesday) each week and ONE WHEATLESS MEAL each day. By wheatless we mean without wheat products. Use corn, oats, barley, or Victory Bread (made of mixed cereals) as wheat saving breads.

Order bread from your baker at least 24 hours in advance so that he will not bake too much. Cut the loaf of bread on the table. Use all stale bread for toast or cooking. Eat less cake and pastry

cooking. Eat less cake and pastry.

EAT LESS MEAT

It is imperative in order that we may send over-seas the wheat necessary to maintain the Allies this year to eat fish and other sea food, poultry and rabbits, instead of beef, mutton and pork. Fish, chicken, etc., can not be shipped in compact form like meat, and are more perishable.

Have at least ONE MEATLESS DAY (Tuesday) and TWO PORKLESS DAYS (Tuesday and Saturday) each week and ONE MEATLESS MEAL each day. By meatless we mean without any beef, pork or sheep products. For other meals use mutton and lamb in preference to beef or pork. Use all left-over meat cold or in made dishes, Use more soups. Use beans; they have nearly the same food value as meat.

EAT LESS FATS

Use butter on the table only; give children all they need. Use no butter in cooking except left-overs that would otherwise go to waste. Cook with cottonseed or corn oil or other vegetable oils instead. Save lard.

Try to use up all left-over fats in cooking. Waste no soap; it is made from fat.

As a nation we use and waste two and one-half times as much fat as we need.

EAT LESS SUGAR

Cut down on sweet drinks and candy containing sugar. Use honey, maple syrup, corn syrup, or molasses on the breakfast table instead of sugar.

Serve cake without frosting or icing. Eat plenty of fruit. We will endeavor to see that the country is provided with a supply of household sugar on the basis of three pounds of sugar for each person per month. Do not consume more. The English allow themselves but 2 lbs. a month; the French and Italians only 1 lb.

It is the firm policy of the U.S. Government to retain in this country by means of its control of exports, a sufficient supply of every essential kind of food for its people. And it has no intention of taking the preserved fruits and vegetables, of the homegrown food supplies of private citizens, either now or at any future time. Any other statement is enemy propaganda to frighten you into withholding your support from the cause of freedom. Only there must be no unnecessary buying and holding of food supplies—in a word, no hourding. The hoarder is an enemy at home.







The Honor Flag of the Third Liberty Loan is awarded by the United States Treasury Department to every town in the country which sells its quota of Liberty Bonds in the present campaign. Every town which wins the right to fly this Flag will have its name inscribed on the State Honor Roll under a State Honor Flag to be unfurled at the State capital. The results in each state will be indicated on a national Honor Flag which will be raised in the Treasury Department in Washington and remain there permanently.

When you buy a Third Liberty Loan Bond you will receive a window emblem bearing your name and a reproduction of the Honor Flag. Paste the emblem in a window of your home or place of business.

What are Bonds of the Third Liberty Loan?

They are an investment in the United States of America. They are a direct promise to pay back with interest the money that you invest. This promise of the United States is the safest investment on earth.

The difference between \$100 tucked away in your home and \$100 invested in Third Liberty Loan Bonds is that if you keep the \$100 in cash, at the end of the year \$100 is all you have, but if you buy a \$100 Bond of the Third Liberty Loan, at the end of the year you have the \$100 Bond and the interest.






Persuaded that the time has come when a frank renunciation of war as an instrument of national policy should be made · · · Convinced that all changes in their relations with one another should be sought only by pacific means · · · Hopeful that, encouraged by their example, all the other nations of the world will join in this humane endeavor · · · Have decided to conclude a Treaty · · ·

Article 1

The High Contracting Parties solemnly declare in the names of their respective peoples that they condemn recourse to war for the solution of international controversies, and renounce it as an instrument of national policy in their relations with one another.

Article 2

The High Contracting Parties agree that the settlement or solution of all disputes or conflicts of whatever nature or of whatever origin they may be, which may arise among them, shall never be sought except by pacific means.

la 1927 the 11 provinces recuived "pravincial autonomy," that is control of the provincial governments by popularly elected Indian ministrius. The Provincial Governments in India have roughly the same scope of the State Governments in the U.S. A. British India has gradually maved from outscratic government inherited from the Hilade Klags and Muslim Emperors to constitutional Government. British has effected table full post-war dominion status, with the right to secode from the British Commonwealth of Marlions if the Indian people so desire.

In 1941 India's population was 389,000,000. Most Indians are poor and tive to med-welled villages, wearing catton garanests and eating a vegeturion diet of rice, wheat and vegetables, India's cities one assumptibles and out unlike those of the United States or Europe. New Dolla is the ampties.

The 255 million Hindus and 92 million Muslims comprise the balk of India's population. Indian Christians total about 7 millions, Sikhs, 6 millions, Hindu society is divided into four main castes and unerrous sub-castes. 8 American Rights and 8 American Duties

I AM AN AMERICAN. Brave men and women have fought and died to win American rights for me. But these rights truly belong to me only if I earn them. To possess them myself, I must make sure that others have them, too. This is my duty, which I am proud to perform.

Because I have the right to... Express my opinion orally or in writing in criticism or in praise of public officers and on public issues; to listen and to read, to assemble peaceably with others, and to discuss openly such questions as are worthy of serious attention.

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Because I have the right to...Voie for whom I choose in the election of those who will hold office in our representative form of government.

Because I have the right to ... Worship according to the dictates of my own conscience.

Because I have the right to ... Petition my government for redress from wrongs, to state a grievance, or ask relief from oppression.

Because I have the right to... Own property which cannot be taken from me except by due process of law, to hold my home inviolate from unlawful search and myself from illegal seizure, and to establish my own integrity.

Because I have the right to... Be tried by a jury of my fellow citizens if 1 am legally charged with a crime; to be assured that 1 cannot be punished more than once for the same offense; to refuse to testify against myself; to be free under bond except for a capital offense.

Because I have the right to... Follow without interference the lawful occupations of peacetime, to own and bear arms legally, to serve in military organizations voluntarily.

Because I have the right to... Exercise my rights as a citizen under the Constitution of the United States and the laws of the state and of the community in which I live; to engage in whatever occupation I may lawfully follow; to be free to travel, to educate myself, and to strive for my own occupational competence and happiness.

It is my duty to ... Study problems and social issues carefully, and to listen and read with discrimination before expressing an opinion; to tolerate the views of others as being as worthy of consideration as my own; to make my criticism; constructive; to withhold judgment until the evidence is reviewed; and to refrain from loose talking which may injure another or jeopardize my countrymen.

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It is my duty to... Use my right to vote as intelligently as possible, and to respect and support public officers in the honest performance of their duty.

It is my duty to... Accord this same privilege to others and to respect the sacredness of religious faith.

It is my duty to... Ask no more for myself than 1 would give to all others with similar problems, and to remember that personal interest must be subordinate to the public good.


It is my duty to ... Respect the property and personal rights of others; to refrain from trespass; and to avoid slander, knowing that a person's good name is his legal right.

It is my duty to... Remember at all times that a person accused is deemed to be innocent until proved guilty; to abstain from passing my own judgment until the court has made its decision; and to assist the courts by serving as a witness or as a juryman when called upon to do so.

It is my duty to... Serve my country well at all times, to cherish and protect it from its enemies within or without, and serve under arms when called in an emergency, sacrificing my life and property if need be that this nation might live.

It is my duty to ... Preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States, to obey its laws, to make myself personally competent, to conduct myself at all times as an honorable citizen of a great nation under whose flag mankind has reached its highest state of freedom.

This is the fivedom. men value most of all; for this they have borne countless persecutions and fought more bravely than for food or gold. Three men coming out of their chapel-what is the finest thing about them, next to their undiscourageable life? It is that they do not demand that others should worship as they do, or even that others should worship at ail. In that waving valley are some who have not come to this service. It is not held against them; mutely these worshipers understand that faith takes many forms, and that men more with diverse words the hope that in their hearts is one.

It is autorishing and impiring that after all the bloodshed of history this land should house in fellowship a houseed religious and a hundred doubts. This is with as an already ancient heytage; and because we know such freedom of worship from our hirth, we took it for granted and expected it of all ancience mean. I full yestarday the whole civilized world seemed accurin that Sharty.

But now middenly, through none paramoine mania of racial superiority, or some obscurs and/ms of publical strategy, personalize is removed, and men are commanded to reader auto-Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and unto-Caesar the things that are God's. The Japanese,

who cace made all things beautiful, begin to exclude from their reals; every faith but the childish belief in the divinity of their emperor. The Italians, who twice littered their paninsula with genius, are compelled to oppress a handful of heated men. The French, once honored in every hard for diviliation and courtery, hand over decolate refugers to the coldest murderers that history has ever known. The Germans, who once made the world their debtors in science. scholamble, philosophy and masic, are prodded into one of the bitterest persecutions in all the accords of neverory by mon who same to delight in human misery, who openly piedge themselves to destroy Christianity, who seem resolved to leave their people no religion but war, and no God but the state.

It is incredible that such reactionary madness can express the mind and heart of an adult mation. A mon's dealings with les God should be a mered thing, inviolable by any potentate. No ruler has yet existed who was wise enough to instruct a mint; seed a good men who is not great is a hundred times more precious than a great men who is not good. Therefore, when we denounce the issorianment of the heroic Nismöller, the silencing of the brave Faulhaber, we are defending the fivedom of the German propie as well as of the busines spirit everywhere. When we yield our some to war, it is in the trust that their sacrifice will bring to us und our allies no inch of alies still, no setfalt mopopoly of the world's resources or trade, but only the privilege of winning for all propins the most prorious gifts in the orbit of life-freedom of body and soul, of movement and enterprise, of thought and atterance, of faith and worship, of hope and charity, of a humane fellowship with all noon.

Hour sons and brothers accomplish this, if by their toll and suffering they can carry to all mankind the boss and stimulus of an ordered liberty, it will be an achievement healds which all the triumphs of Alexander, Caesar and Napoleon will be a little thing. To that purpose they are offering their youth and their blood. To that purpose and to them we others, regretting that we cannot stand builds these, dedicate the remaining of ters lives.

And earth and heaven and the towers of time, both near and far,


Were shaken with the shouts of terror calling,
