

Focus

The rule when adding a prefix is: just add it! Don't change or miss out any letters.

Example: un + sure = unsure

Sometimes, adding a prefix creates a double letter.

Example: dis + satisfy = dissatisfy

Bringing together the last letter of the prefix with the first letter of the word causes the double **s**. Don't be tempted to leave out an **s**.
