THE POLITICAL ECONOMY OF NORTH-SOUTH RELATIONS

Spring 2006 Professor Thomas Callaghy

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Course Perspective

We live in fascinating times. The last decade has brought amazing and important changes in the evolution of the world political economy. Globalization has accelerated and is being hotly debated. Some want to try to stop, divert or modify it. Others want to see it accelerated and have a particular tone and shape. Non-governmental organizations (NGOs) have become a force to be reckoned with on many of these issues. Thousands of demonstrators have filled the streets of Seattle, Washington, Prague, Johannesburg, and other cities around the world challenging some aspect of current global economic governance, while world financial officials discussed the state of the world behind police lines. Some change has emerged such as the recent debt relief deal for poor countries. Major protests took place against the World Trade Organization (WTO) in Cancún, Mexico in September 2003, and then again last month in Hong Kong where it became very clear that the Doha Round of global trade talks is stalled.

This has also been a sobering period for many. Markets have not always worked the way people expected. Some states have made considerable developmental progress while for others marginalization is accelerating. In many places, neither did markets bloom nor democracy flower, while they did in other, sometimes unexpected, places. The Asia crisis of the late 1990s took everybody by surprise, no matter what they claim now. The crisis of legitimacy now facing corporate America has surprised many. From the crash in Argentina in late December 2001 to the U.S., financial globalization has revealed weak banking, judicial, and financial sectors in many countries -- things that underpin markets that were either assumed to exist or believed would emerge quickly and in a relatively uniform way.

One of the most striking things about this period is that key beliefs, strategies, and institutions are being challenged. We have seen mainstream Western economists vigorously attack accepted development doctrine and the way key institutions of global economic governance function. Joseph Stiglitz, Nobel Prize winner and World Bank chief economist, savages the IMF, praises China, condemns the handling of Russia, and was forced to resign his position. Columbia's Jeffrey Sachs and other senior economists have done much the same. Harvard's Ken Rogoff went to be the chief economist at the IMF, defending it vigorously, only to depart and become very critical of it. A Congressional commission slammed the way the IMF and World Bank operate and recommended substantial change. NGOs demand major changes in the operation of the

IMF, the World Bank, and the World Trade Organization. Last year brought a major push to deal with Africa's enormous problems. In addition, mainstream views about international relations are also being challenged on a variety of fronts.

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We will explore the relationships between states, international organizations, markets, NGOs, and ideas, as well as new ways in which the international system functions and how it may evolve. In the process, we will examine various approaches to understanding these issues. In addition, we will take note of the fact that geo-strategic issues are once again of particular importance to the functioning of the international political economy.

This course thus concerns the political economy of "North-South" relations – basically the relations between the industrial democracies of the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) and what many are now calling the "Global South" – all of the "developing" and "transition" countries of the world. The course will follow a multi-track approach in which we will look at a set of issues in tandem each week in order to emphasize the fact that they are all interrelated. After looking at the current conjunction, inequality, and globalization, we will examine the following set of topics: contending perspectives on international political economy, the New International Economic Order (NIEO), international financial institutions [particularly the IMF, World Bank, and WTO], debt, structural adjustment, trade, development strategy, the Asia crisis, and the increasingly important role played by NGOs, and the social movements they create, in international economic governance. The global economy is an exciting place, full of interesting people and forms of politics; it is anything but boring or dry, despite the tone of much of the literature. To emphasize this, we will follow four "sagas" throughout the course: [1] the journey of Joe Stiglitz from academia, to the US Treasury, then World Bank, and back to academia where he was free to express his views on globalization and global governance; [2] the journey, achievements, and problems of James Wolfensohn, the president of the World Bank 1995-2005; [3] all the behind-thescenes drama, horror, and complexity of the Asia crisis, that erupted with devastating force in July 1997, and what it tells us about global economic governance, as seen through the eyes of a senior international journalist; and [4] the dramatic crash in Argentina in 2001 a seen by the same journalist.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Heavy weight will be given to class discussion of the readings and the submission of at least seven two-page assessments not summaries of the weekly readings. They must be typed and turned in at the beginning of class. More than seven assessments may be turned in, and the best seven will be used for grading purposes. Students will also be responsible for leading off the discussion of individual readings during class. Class discussion and the assessment papers will account for 50% of the course grade.
- 2. There will be a take-home final examination of about 25 pages. It will require synthesis and analytic assessment of all of the course material. The exam will be distributed on the April 18, the last day of class, and will be due no later than May 5, the

last day of the examination period. It will constitute 50% of the course grade.

3. One of the best ways to keep track of North-South relations is to follow the postings of the Stop-IMF email list; you will be asked to subscribe and may do so by going to the following URL: http://lists.essential.org/mailman/listinfo/stop-imf. We will follow other relevant current events as well, both from the Internet and other media. A list of relevant web sites is provided at the end of the syllabus, and we undoubtedly will discover more as the course progresses.
