### PREFACE.

The historical geography of the United States and of the previous Colonies has been much neglected; it is therefore difficult to collect material upon which to base historical maps; or to check the results by the published work of other students. This brief series is offered as an attempt to make maps from the records,—from the texts of grants, charters, and governors' instructions, and from statutes, British, colonial, state, and national. The purpose has been to draw no boundary line for which documentary authority does not exist. The author hopes that in his use of records, and in the inferences which he has been compelled to employ where material is wanting, he has fallen into no unpardonable errors.


The territorial development of the United States, and the status of territorial slavery, are questions on which no two investigators will precisely agree; the principle adopted has been to make the maps conform to the official treaties and to the laws of the United States, as understood at the time when they were negotiated or enacted.



### LONGMANS' SCHOOL GEOGRAPHY.

In Longmans' School Geography an attempt is made at a new departure in the teaching of Geography by providing a text-book which is founded on the results and Methods following from the great advance which has taken place in Geographical Science and Teaching on the Continent, and especially in Germany. The aim of the author has been to exclude from the books almost all details which pupils cannot be expected to keep permanently in mind, but to take care that what the book does contain should consist of what is most effective as discipline, and of most importance to know. In the American edition prepared by Mr. Leete, the portions on America in general, North America and the United States have been newly written. The other parts have been changed but little, though alterations and adaptations have been made wherever they seemed called for by the fact that American instead of English or Australian pupils were to be the readers,

Like the larger book, this text-book is divided into paragraphs for the sake of making frequent cross references. The references are made by printing the number of the paragraph referred to in thick type, in parenthesis, thus (245.)
