DRINKING

Drinking is a key part of the Shànghǎi experience, with more and more locals flocking to bars and pubs to keep the foreigners company. Expats tend to go out more than their contemporaries at home and as their numbers increase, so do the number of bars. But Shànghǎi's bar scene is a fickle animal, with places going in and out of fashion quicker than you can down a drink. In this parallel universe, places shift location or open and close before anyone even knew they were there, as streets are demolished and backers run out of money and/or interest.

Nor is Shànghǎi a cheap place to drink. With so many bars trying to outdo each other with ever-more extravagant locations and fancy designs, there are few places where you can settle in for a night of cheap boozing. But lots of bars run happy hours (generally from 5pm to 8pm) or weekly specials, such as ladies nights, and if you look hard you can find somewhere that won't break the bank. Mostly though, a bottle of local beer will cost in the region of Y30 to Y40, while cocktails and mixed drinks start at Y50.

Those who prefer a nice cup of green tea to the hard stuff will be disappointed at the dwindling number of teahouses. In contrast, there are increasingly more contemporary cafés appearing on Shànghǎi's streets, as well as western staples like Starbucks, so caffeine addicts will find plenty of places for their daily fix.

Most bars get going in the late afternoon, although many open earlier, and they call time around 2am. On weekends, some stay open later. Opening hours are listed in the following reviews. For the latest hotspots, check expat mags like That's Shanghai or www.smartshanghai.com.

mier drinking spots that jump at the weekends. These are places to get dressed up for and the drinks don't come cheap. But a trip to at least one of these bars is obligatory, if only for the stunning night time view of the Huangpu River and the glittering lights of Pǔdōng. Remember though, the lights are switched off at 11pm unless it's a national holiday.

Hip, but slightly tiresome, Bar Rouge attracts Americans, Eurotrash and cashed-up locals. The swish, red-curtained booths are reserved for big spenders, and ordinary mortals can sometimes struggle to get served on busy nights. But the terrace does offer fantastic views, and big-name European DJ's are frequently flown in to provide the soundtrack. If one of them is on the decks, expect to pay Y300 to get in. Otherwise, it's Y100 on Fridays and Saturdays.

ALCOHOLIC DRINKS

The most famous domestic brand of beer is Qingdao (青岛; Tsingtao), a beer that has been brewed up in the Shāndōng port since 1903. The cheapest local brand is Reeb (Lìbō).

Foreign beers have flooded the Shànghǎi market, with Budweiser (百威; Bǎiwēi) leading the way. The German beer Becks (贝克; Bèikè) has a brewery in China, and the Japanese beers Suntory and Kirin and Denmark's Carlsberg all have breweries in Shànghǎi. Foreign bars have a selection of Bitburger, Guinness, Kilkenny, Coopers, Tetleys and Steinlager – mostly on tap.

The dinnertime poison of choice for many Shanghainese is $b\dot{a}iji\dot{u} - a$ shockingly potent, colourless fuel with an aroma hovering between nail-polish remover and turpentine. More pleasant is Shàoxing rice wine, which tastes vaguely like sherry. It's traditionally served warm.

It also hosts monthly jazz and classical concerts (p174) and Sunday afternoon readings (Y50).

It's a nice place to kickback and relax after a busy day of seeing the sights.

DRINKING OLD TOWN

WHERE SHÀNGHĂI'S DIFFERENT TRIBES DRINK

Shànghǎi's foreign residents have always been notoriously thirsty. Even in the 1920s there were drinking dens to satisfy all tastes, whether you were a taipan, remittance man, sad-eyed Russian exile or a sailor on shore leave. Nothing's changed since then, except there are now so many places to choose from that it can be hard to find the bar that'll best suit your tastes.

For those in search of beautiful people sipping elegant cocktails in designer-chic surroundings, the big three Bund bars, **Bar Rouge** (p182), **Glamour Bar** (p183) and **New Heights** (p183), are beloved by both tourists, who can goggle at the spectacular night-time vista below them, and the banker/lawyer/Eurotrash expat crowd. The atmosphere is not quite as rarefied as the prices might suggest, but these are still perfect places for posing.

Less precious are the bars housed in colonial-era villas in the French Concession. Cotton's (opposite), Face (opposite) and Sasha's (p186) are all delightful in the summer, when their gardens come into their own, and attract a varied crowd of younger expats and locals.

Sports fans and older expats are drawn like moths to the big screen TVs and pints on tap at the British Bulldog (opposite), Big Bamboo (p188), Blarney Stone (below) and O'Malley's (p186), while Shànghāi's slackers and students head for Logo (opposite), Pirates (p186) and Time Passage (p186), which are too far off the beaten track to attract the dressed-up crowd. The gay and lesbian scene remains limited, but Eddy's Bar (opposite) is still going strong, while Arch (p187), Bar Rouge (p182) and YY's (p187) are all gay-friendly.

More raucous are the bars that line Tongren Rd. Places like Judy's Too Tongren (p188) are a good place to observe the cross-cultural communication between western gents and the local ladies, or to dance and drink the night away.

Finally, if you want to go where the real Shanghainese drink, then the bars in the French Concession that line Hengshan Rd south of the South Wulumuqi Rd intersection offer a quick introduction to the differences between east and west. It's dice and drinking games galore here, but Westerners are not always welcomed with open arms. Try Mural (opposite) for a genial introduction to the scene.

Home to the biggest concentration of bars, cafés and teahouses in the whole of Shànghǎi, the French Concession offers drinkers a choice between elegant bars housed in colonial-era villas, the foreign pubs around the north end of Hengshan Rd, the more dubious delights of the Julu Rd strip, as well as a brand new crop of places springing up in the far west section of the Concession.

The drinks and bar snacks, pizzas, burgers, salads and sandwiches are reasonably priced and the crowd is a good mix of locals and expats. You'll have to get here early on weekends to grab a table outside, or book ahead.

The Bund looks small from this high up, and at night the lights of East Nanjing Rd curve away into the distance towards Renmin Park. The cocktails are decent, and there's a nonsmoking section. After 8pm there's a Y120 minimum (plus 15% service charge), which is sometimes compensated for by the appearance of fortune tellers and magicians.

A wide range of teas are available, including *lǜchá* (绿茶; green tea), *mòlìhuā* (茉莉花; jasmine), *júhuā chá* (菊 花茶; chrysanthemum), *lóngjĩng* (龙井; longjing), *wūlóng* (乌龙; colong) and *hóng chá* (红茶; black tea). Some backstreet Chinese restaurants still serve complimentary tea with meals. Bottled ice teas (Y5) are available everywhere, and are generally very thirst-quenching (go for either Kirin, Suntory or Tongyi). Look out for sweet bubble tea (*zhēnzhū nǎichá*). Sold all over town, it comes either hot or cold in a sealed plastic cup, into which you poke a thick straw.

Shànghải has been swamped with cafés, but coffee is still not that cheap. A decent cup is easily Y25 to Y30. But City Diner (p163) offers free refills.

There's a wide range of teas available and they serve alcohol too. Look for the statue of Charlie Chaplin out front.

HONGOIAO AIRPORT AREA

With so many expats resident in the Honggiao Airport Area and Gubei, the area now has its own bar/restaurant strip, the Hongmei Rd Entertainment Street, for those who don't want to make the trek to the French Concession or Bund. There's an outlet of the Blue Frog (Map p123; 5422 5119; No 30 Lane 3338, Hongmei Rd Entertainment Street) bar here, as well as various other places that are OK for a local drink.
