ENTERTAINMENT

Perhaps in no other city does so much human energy go into the search for amusement as among the foreign population of Shànghǎi.

A night on the town in Shànghǎi leaves many visitors wondering if they really are in China. Certainly, the crowds that pack the growing number of nightclubs are reminiscent of the West and the prices aren't much different either. Nevertheless, it would be an exaggeration to suggest that Shànghǎi can compare to London or New York when it comes to nightlife. Although increasing numbers of locals are joining in the fun, it is foreigners who drive the city's club scene and until that changes it'll remain somewhat limited.

Shànghǎi maintains a spirited rivalry with Běijīng for the title of China's cultural capital. Běijīng is still a better place to catch classical music, but plenty of international opera and ballet troupes visit Shànghǎi. Many fly in for the **China International Festival of Arts** (www .artsbird.com in November; p18). It's held in conjunction with the Shanghai Art Fair, which is Asia's biggest art event. Also worth checking is the Shanghai Biennale (p18), which takes place every September at the Shanghai Art Museum (p70) and presents a mixed bag of local and international artists.

The city can also boast the biggest and best film festival (p18) in China, in June, when a motley crew of Asian and Hollywood stars arrive to promote their movies. Some Broadway musicals make it to town too. When the ABBA show *Mamma Mia!* ran at the Shanghai Grand Theatre (p175) in 2006 it drew huge, enthusiastic crowds. There's a small but thriving jazz scene, and Shànghǎi is also the first stop on the mainland for high-profile pop and rock acts. Christina Aguilera and the Rolling Stones are among the more recent visitors.

Petrolheads from all over the world jet in for the Formula I Grand Prix (p18). Shànghǎi is now also an established stop on the golf and tennis pro tours. For details of the many parties and events that take place, check the local listings mags like *That's Shanghai* and www.smart shanghai.com.

NIGHTLIFE & THE ARTS ACROBATICS

The Shànghǎi troupes are among the best in the world and a night watching them spinning plates on poles and contorting themselves into unfeasible anatomical positions never fails to entertain.

SHANGHAI CENTRE THEATRE

The Shanghai Acrobatics Troupe (Shànghǎi Zájì Tuán) has popular performances here most nights at 7.30pm. It's a short but fun show and is high on the to-do list of most first-time visitors. Buy tickets a couple of days in advance from the ticket office on the right-hand side at the entrance to the Shanghai Centre.

Out on the far northern outskirts of town is this impressive complex. The shows combine awesome acrobatics with newfangled multimedia elements. Shows start at 7.30pm. Tickets are available at the door, but booking ahead is advised.

CHINESE OPERA

The shrill falsetto, crashing cymbals, expressive masks and painted faces of Běijīng opera are what most people have in mind when they think of Chinese opera, though the art form actually has a number of different styles. A local predecessor to Běijīng opera is the melodic $K\bar{u}nj\dot{u}$ or $K\bar{u}nq\dot{u}$ (Kun opera, from nearby Kūnshān), one of the oldest existing forms of Chinese opera, and best known for its adaptation of the 16th-century erotic-love ghost story *The Peony Pavilion*. One of the only Kun opera troupes in the country is based in Shànghǎi.

The main problem with going to see a traditional opera in Shànghǎi is that there's no English surtitles. But the plotlines are relatively simple, which makes following the action not impossible. Before snatching up tickets for *A Dream of Red Mansions* at the Shanghai Grand Theatre, try the Běijing opera highlights show in Yifu Theatre (below) first.

One block east of Renmin Square, this is the main opera theatre in town and recognisable by the huge opera mask above the entrance. The theatre presents a popular programme of Beijing, Kun and Yue (Shaoxing) opera. A Beijing opera highlights show is performed several times a week at 1.30pm and 7.15pm; pick up a brochure at the ticket office or check the website for exact dates. A shop in the lobby sells Peking Opera CDs.

CINEMAS

Běijīng allows in about 30 foreign (read Hollywood) movies per year, after they pass the censors' scissors of course. See the boxed text, p172, for a list of cinemas showing undubbed foreign films.

Over 150 films are screened at the annual Shanghai International Film Festival (www siff.com in June; p18), though Cannes doesn't need to worry about the competition quite yet. For a better selection of arthouse cinema, sign up with Maria's Choice (mariaschoice -subscribe@topica.com), a private film club that arranges screenings of independent Chinese films with English subtitles at Kodak Cinema World (boxed text, p172). The Shanghai Science & Technology Museum (p94) has an **IMAX theatre** (Jùmù Yĩngyuàn; tickets Y40).

CLUBBING

Shànghǎi's clubs are mostly big, glossy places devoted to playing mainstream house, techno and hip-hop. An number of big-name DJs are flying in these days, which has helped boost interest among the locals. But for more interesting and alternative electronic sounds you'll do better to visit bars like Pirates (p186) and Bar Rouge (p182), which have DJ sets at the weekends. Check local listing mags and www.smart shangai.com for up-to-date information.

From Sunday to Tuesday it functions as a normal bar from 5pm until late.

It's a stylish, intimate place that attracts both Western and local hipsters. On Thursdays there's a popular salsa night, while Friday is R&B. The rest of the time it's house. There's a cool feel, but you need to get here early on weekends. It's closed on Sunday.

GAY & LESBIAN SHÀNGHĂI

Shànghǎi is well ahead of the rest of the country in terms of general acceptance of gays and lesbians, though essentially that just means that gay bars and clubs are tolerated. Most locals choose to stay in the closet – many are married – and this isn't the place for public displays of affection. But there are tentative signs that attitudes to homosexuality in China are changing, at least in the big cities. There's more discussion of gay issues in the media, partly prompted by rising rates of HIV, and Shànghǎi is now home to the mainland's first gay and lesbian support line.

For visitors, Eddy's Bar (p185) and Pink Home (above) are the best introduction to gay Shànghǎi. There are a growing number of nightspots out there, but addresses change rapidly, and for now, many places prefer to stay underground. The Utopia website (www.utopia-asia.com/chinshan.htm) has up-to-date listings and a forum.

With a decent sound system and reasonably priced drinks, it pumps out hi-energy house for a friendly crowd intent on having fun. Next door is Hotel 101 (p198), China's first and only gay hotel.

KARAOKE

Karaoke is by far China's favourite leisure activity; there are karaoke places, ranging from the seedy to upmarket, all over town.

MUSIC Rock & Pop

Shànghǎi has a lamentable live music scene. Although there are a number of local bands out there, playing everything from Britpop to metal and punk, they struggle to find suitable venues to play or audiences prepared to listen. Few get as far as landing a recording contract. Consequently, most bars feature nothing more exciting than a Filipino cover band.

There are regular gigs at the Shanghai Grand Stage (inside Shanghai Stadium) and at

Hongkou Stadium, but these are mostly sappy Cantonese crooners or the latest identikit Taiwanese act. Once in a while the odd Western singer and band, either mainstream like Norah Jones or superannuated like Eric Clapton and the Rolling Stones, passes through. But ticket prices for these gigs are high. Check www .shangaiist.com for news of when and where local bands are playing.

Jazz & Blues

Shànghǎi has a long tradition of jazz, going back to the 1920s when Russian and Filipino bands jammed together in the French Concession. The International Jazz Festival is a relatively recent event and generally takes place for a week in April. Some of the high-end hotels also have tame jazz bands.

Wynton Marsalis once stepped in to jam, forever sealing the Cotton Club's reputation as the best livemusic haunt in town. The crowd here is younger than in the more portly hotel jazz scene and the drinks are reasonably priced. The music gets going at 9pm.

Jazz concerts generally fall on a weekend night, and classical music on a Sunday afternoon. Times and dates vary though, so check the website beforehand for specifics.

Sunday night is a free-for-all jam. Upstairs offers Western and Chinese food.

The Shanghai Grand Theatre (right) and Shanghai Centre Theatre (p170) are the premier venues for local and international opera, ballet and drama productions. Several smaller theatres stage interesting performances, normally in Chinese only but sometimes with English subtitles.

There are gyms galore in Shànghải, and if team sports are your thing there's no shortage of expat clubs, ranging from softball to football (soccer), basketball and even fencing. Another chain, with facilities including exercise studios, a large range of fitness equipment, a sauna and solarium. It offers classes and personal training, massage and aromatherapy. Non-members can pay Y200 a day. Otherwise, membership (three months minimum) is Y2100.

KERRY GYM Map pp98–9

Facilities here include an indoor swimming pool, outdoor tennis courts and aerobics and taichi classes. A month-long membership is Y2500, or it's Y12,000 for a year.

MEGAFIT Map pp80-1

This gym opposite Shanghai Central Plaza is the cheapest place for visitors, with a day rate of Y100 and Y500 for one month. A year-long membership is a very reasonable Y2950. Top-end equipment in the gym, and lots of group classes including taichi, yoga and Pilates.

MARTIAL ARTS

Early morning taichi (*tàijí quán*; 太极拳) on the Bund is one of the classic images of Shànghǎi. If you're interested in learning either taichi or one of the harder martial arts ($w \dot{u} sh \dot{u}$; 武术) styles, there are a number of schools around town offering a range of classes for everyone from kids to adults. There are also aikido, karate and tae kwon do groups.

Serious students of the more esoteric Chinese martial arts will have to network to find a genuine teacher who will accept a foreigner as their student. You can also try showing up on early mornings in the local park and following alongside a group of practitioners (ask first), though it helps if you can speak some Chinese.

LONGWU INTERNATIONAL KUNG FU CENTRE Map pp80-1 龙武功夫馆 Lóngwǔ Göngfū Guǎn ② 5465 0042; 215 South Shanxi Rd, French Concession; 法租界陕西南路215号; ^① 7am-9pm; ⑨ South Shanxi Rd

Coaches from Shànghăi's martial arts teams give classes in Chinese, Japanese and Korean martial arts. The largest centre in the city, it also offers children's classes on weekend mornings and lessons in English. Prices are Y100 per class or Y1500 for three months. Kids classes are Y900 for 30 sessions.

WUSHU CENTRE Map pp98–9

武术中心 Wǔshù Zhōngxīn ② 6258 0973; No 2, Lane 591, West Nanjing Rd, Renmin Square; 人民广场南京西路591弄2号; ② West Nanjing Rd Down an alley off West Nanjing Rd, the affable but serious guys at this centre teach karate and aikido, in both Chinese and English. Costs run from Y450 for three months to Y1200 for a year.

WUYI CHINESE KUNGFU CENTRE Map pp80–1

English-language taichi classes on Thursday and Sunday and *wǔshù* classes on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday for adults and kids. It's Y600 per month.

MASSAGE & SPAS

Chinese massage, known as tuiná (推拿; literally push-grab), is an integral part of traditional Chinese medicine (TCM), and is primarily concerned with your body's qi (energy) and the meridians, or energy channels, through which it flows. A good masseuse or acupuncturist will look for qiblockages and keep your body in balance by working with a combination of specific pressure points, which are located along the body's meridians.

Even if you're the type who raises an eyebrow and a bout of scepticism at the mere mention of the word qi, look at the quantitative side of it. You might be stressed from work, or worn out after a day of pounding the pavement or a night of drinking way too much. Massages do wonders for relaxing both your body and mind, and in Shànghǎi they come at a fraction of the price you'd probably be paying at home. For more details, see the boxed text, p178.

MOTOR RACING

The regular Chinese roads can sometimes resemble racetracks, but the real thing is now available too.

FORMULA 1 GRAND PRIX off Map pp58–9

Every October, the Formula 1 circus comes to this impressive, state-of-the-art circuit,

which is 40 minutes northwest of the city centre. It's one of the most glamorous events on the Shànghǎi calendar, and tickets, costing from Y380 to Y3980, get snapped up very quickly. Book ahead through the website, or visit a friendly ticket tout.

OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES

There are a surprising number of adventure sports on offer in and around the city. Cycling through rush-hour traffic is the easiest and cheapest way to get a few thrills, but there are other options too, including rock climbing and sailing, that may not be so lifethreatening.

Cycling

Shànghǎi's mad traffic can make cycling the city's most stressful, if not potentially lethal, activity. However, the French Concession offers some charming areas for biking, and the ambitious can make longer excursions out of the city to places like Shěshān and even Sūzhõu.

Golf

Golf in China is the preserve of businesspeople, the nouveau riche and expats. It's one of the city's most expensive pastimes. In fact, you can pick up a basic set of clubs at one of the many golf shops around town for about the same price as a day's green fees. The clubs listed below are also open to nonmembers.

BECAUSE YOU DESERVE IT!

Neighbourhood Massage Parlours

Neighbourhood massage parlours (recognisable by the pair of feet pasted on the door and reclining armchairs inside) offer a herbal medicine soak for your feet, an hour-long foot massage and a chance to catch up on all the local gossip. And all this from around Y50 an hour. Two things to remember: Chinese massage is relaxing, but not necessarily gentle, and if the masseuse is only wearing a negligee, it's not going to be a foot massage. Alternatively, your masseuse might be wearing dark glasses— in China, it's traditionally a job for the blind.

Lulu Massage (鄧潞盲人按摩中心; Lùlù Mángrén Ànmó Zhōngxīn; Map pp80–1; 窗 6473 2634; 597 Central Fuxing Rd, French Concession; 法租界复兴中路 597号; 🕑 noon-2am; 🕲 South Shanxi Rd) This is a typical blind massage parlour, offering 45-minute full-body massages for Y40, one-hour full-body massages for Y60, and one-hour foot massages for Y42. Regulars can purchase discount cards.

Shanghai Qigong Institute (上海气功研究所; Shànghǎi Qigōng Yánjiūsuǒ; Map pp80–1; 窗 5306 4832; 218 Nanchang Rd, French Concession; 法租界南昌路218号; 🏵 8am-4.30pm; ⑨ South Shanxi Rd) Part of Shànghǎi's Traditional Chinese Medicine school, the Qigong Institute offers qi gong treatments and massage (Y250), as well as acupuncture sessions (Y150). If you have a specific problem, this is a good place to seek treatment. No English is spoken.

Deluxe Massage Centres

To achieve a greater sense of inner peace, book a session at one of the more deluxe massage centres. Most follow a similar formula of serene, candlelit private rooms, and you get your own set of PJs.

Dragonfly (悠庭保健会所; Yōutíng Bǎojiàn Huìsuǒ; Map pp80–1; 窗 5405 0008; 20 Donghu Rd, French Concession; 法租界东湖路20号; ऒ 10am-2am; ⑨ South Shanxi Rd) Offering hour-long Chinese body massage (Y135), Japanese-style shiatsu (Y135) and aroma oil massage (Y225) in soothing surroundings. There's also a two-hour hangover relief treatment (Y270) to help with detoxification. There are other branches at 206 Xinle Rd (Map pp80–1) and 84 Nanchang Rd (Map pp80–1) and elsewhere around town.

Green Massage (青专业按摩; Qing Zhuānyè Ànmó; Map p74; 窗 5386 0222; 58 Taicang Rd; 太仓路58号;
② 10.30am-2.30am; ⑨ South Huangpi Rd) Forty-five minute *tuīná* and shiatsu massages (Y98), Chinese cupping (Y10) and a skin revitalisation treatment (Y10).

Luxury Spas

For those who love to pamper themselves, you can't skip the luxury spas. From seaweed body masks to a G5 massage designed to break down fatty deposits, the following offer the most privileged treatments in town.

Banyan Tree (悦榕庄; Yuèróng Zhuāng; Map p62; 窗 6335 1888; 3rd fl, Westin Shanghai, 88 Central Henan Rd, The Bund; 外滩河南中路88号威斯汀酒店3楼; № 10am-midnight; ⑧ East Nanjing Rd) A range of two- to three-hour Thai and Balinese massage sessions from Y1000. Staff recommend an apple or black-sesame body scrub, followed by a melon and aloe facial scrub, topped with a honey cucumber mask. An hour-long massage is Y780, plus 5% service charge.

Evian Spa (依云水疗中心; Yīyún Shuǐliáo Zhōngxīn; Map p62; 窗 6321 6622; 2nd fl, Three on the Bund, 3 East Zhongshan No 1 Rd, The Bund; 外滩中山东1路3号2楼; 🏵 10am-10pm; 🕲 East Nanjing Rd) Japanese serenity, French luxury and beautifying facials, manicures and aromatherapy massages, from Y480.

Big hitters staying in the Grand Hyatt can simply go to Lujiazui Golf Club (陆家嘴高尔夫 俱乐部; Lùjiāzuǐ Gāo'ērfū Jùlèbù; Map p90; 窗 6887 1700; 501 Yincheng Rd, Pŭdöng; 银城路501号; ⑨ Lujiazui), an enclosed driving range next door.

Hiking

Shànghải is as flat and concrete as they come, but there are a number of decent hiking spots within a few hours' drive if you know where to look – and if you have transportation. The easiest way to get out of town is to sign up for one of the weekend trips organised by outdoor stores like Yě Huǒ Hùwài Yòngpǐn Diàn (p141).

Rock Climbing

Mountains are in short supply in Shànghǎi, but the odd climbing wall around town will satiate rockheads.

Running

Eccentric expat organisation Hash House Harriers ('drinkers with a running problem') originated in Malaysia. The Shànghǎi chapter organises runs most Sunday afternoons, at 3pm in the winter and 4pm in the summer, followed by a meal and plenty of beer. Check the website www.shanghaihhh.com for details.

Water Sports

For a city by the sea, there's surprisingly little water-borne sports activity in Shànghǎi. What there is mostly takes place inland on Dianshan Lake.

SHANGHAI BOAT AND YACHT CLUB www.shanghaibyc.org

SBYC organises outings at the Shanghai Water Sports Centre on Dianshan Lake, about 50 minutes' drive from Shànghǎi. Members currently meet at 10am on Sunday at Oscar's Pub, across the road from the Cotton Club in the French Concession; nonmembers are welcome to tag along for a sail.

SHANLONG DRAGONBOAT TEAM dragonboatsh@yahoo.com

For something more physical, try competitive dragon-boat racing held at Dianshan Lake. The Shanlong Dragonboat team meets Sunday mornings in Gùbèi.

RUGBY

Local heroes, the Shanghai Hairy Crabs, take on expat rivals such as the Beijing Devils. Practice is held every Saturday afternoon at the Shanghai Football Club ground opposite Carrefour in Pǔdōng's Jīnqiáo district. Check www.shanghaifootballclub.com for contact details.

SNOOKER

Snooker tournaments get big TV audiences in China and there are a number of places around town to practise your pots.

JIN DU BILLIARDS CLUB Map pp80-1 锦都桌球俱乐部 Jǐn Dū Zhuō Qiú Jùlèbù 窗 6473 5846; 3rd fl, 277 Wuxing Rd; 五星路 277号3楼; ⁽²⁾ 24hr; ⁽²⁾ Hengshan Rd Walk up the stairs past the poster of Stephen Hendry in his permed pomp and grab a game against the lads dreaming of becoming the next Ding Junhui, the young Chinese snooker player many believe will be world champion one day. This place never closes and the tables, from Y14 to Y35, are in good condition. They serve beer (Y12) too.

SPECTATOR SPORTS

Shanghai Stadium (上海体育场; Shànghǎi Tiyù hǎng; Map p126) seats 80,000 spectators for major sports events and occasional soft-rock concerts.

Shanghai Shenhua is the city's top football team and local matches are played in Hongkou Stadium (虹口足球场; Hóngkóu Zúqiúchǎng; Map p104) in north Shànghǎi. The local basketball team is the Shanghai Sharks, who haven't been the same since Yao Ming departed for the Houston Rockets and NBA in 2002. They play at Luwan Stadium (卢湾体育场; Lúwān Tiyùchǎng; Map pp80-1; 窗 6467 5358; 128 Zhaojiabang Rd; 肇嘉浜路128号).

Other big draws include the annual Shanghai Open tennis tournament, and the Volvo China Open golf tournament in April.

SQUASH

The squash (壁球; *bì qiú*) courts at Hotel Equatorial (国际贵都大酒店; Map pp80-1; 窗 6248 1688; www.equatorial.com/sha; 65 West Yan'an Rd, French Concession; 法租界延安西路65号; ⑨ Jing'an Temple) can **ENTERTAINMENT SPORTS & ACTIVITIES**

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be rented for Y120 per hour, plus the Y15 per person entrance fee as well as Y30 for a racquet. For a cheaper hit, there are also courts at Hongkou Stadium (Mapp104), on the 5th floor opposite the main entrance. Charges are Y35 per hour, plus Y10 for a racquet and Y3 for balls.

SWIMMING

All top-end hotels have pools; however, if swimming is your thing and you're coming in winter, make sure your hotel has an indoor pool.

This outdoor pool is particularly popular with expats – possibly more for pool-side lounging (got to work on that tan) than actual swimming. It's Y60 for adults and Y30 for kids.

Head over to Půdong to check out this great circular pool, enclosed in a glass dome with views of the Bund. Entry is Y80, Y40 for kids under 1.2m.

Shanghai Stadium

Public swimming pools in China wouldn't be your first choice to do laps, although they are considerably cheaper than hotel pools. A shop next door sells swimming gear. Tickets are Y25 before 5.30pm, Y30 after. Kids under 1.2m get in for half price. It's just near Shanghai Stadium.

TENNIS

There are several places to play tennis (网球; wàng qiú). Reserve courts in advance, especially at the weekend.

These hard courts are fairly central, in the French Concession off Huashan Rd, next to Time Passage (p186). It's Y60 per hour during day, Y70 in the evening. There's also a small shop selling tennis equipment.

Weekdays cost Y40 per hour for daytime play and Y80 for the evening (Y60/100 on weekends), with Y30 racquet hire. Courts are a bit cheaper between 6am and 8am. Reception is in the north side of the tennis stadium.

YOGA

Popular with both well-heeled locals and expats, voga classes aren't cheap in Shànghǎi but there are plenty of options to choose from.

Shànghǎi's poshest and most popular yoga centre offers a full range of classes in Ashtanga yoga for both men and women, along with hot (Bikram) yoga, which takes place in a heated room to aid stretching and toning. Classes run daily from 10am to 8.45pm. Individual classes start at Y200, 50 cost Y5600 or a year's membership is Y9600.

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
