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SLEEPING

When it comes to accommodation in Singapore, there's good news and bad news. First, the good: despite the fact that you may run into one fully-booked hotel after another during major events, there have never been more hotels in Singapore than there are now. Now the bad: though not exactly across the board, prices have gone up in the last couple of years. Many former budget hotels have crept into the midrange category – sometimes, but not always, accompanied by corresponding improvements. Prices for many midrange and top-end hotels have also gone up, though not in all cases. (Indeed, there are some fine bargains to be found around town, especially through the internet.) While some new budget hotels have opened up (particularly those offering 'transit', or hourly rates), others have been driven out of business by rising property values.

Thanks to the peerless public transport system, it doesn't really matter where you stay in central Singapore. Everywhere is less than half an hour from everywhere else. If you're looking for atmosphere and character, we recommend Chinatown or Little India, both of which harbour most of the budget accommodation and boutique hotels in shophouse conversions. If you don't mind being a bit further out, there is a cluster of new hostels in the Joo Chiat area.

Orchard Rd and its environs are crammed with identikit upmarket hotels (with a few distinctive exceptions), as is the area around Marina Bay, where you'll find the Esplanade complex and Suntec City mall. There are also good options dotted close by the redeveloped quays of the Singapore River.

If you want to experience the grittier side of Singapore outside your hotel room, then Geylang is worth considering; we've found two hotels in that area that are high in cultural interest and low in sleaze. If you want the sea and a beach close at hand, Sentosa's the go, but avoid weekends, when rates and occupancy are higher.

LONGER-TERM RENTALS

For medium- to long-term stays, Singapore has a number of serviced apartments. It is also possible to rent rooms in private flats (check the classified pages of the *Straits Times* for listings). Rents are high, regardless of how near or far from the city centre you are. Note that the prices quoted include all taxes.

Probably the best place to start looking for long-term rental in Singapore is Singapore Expats (www.singaporeexpats.com), which has detailed information on the different districts, outlines the whole rental procedure and carries an apartment search engine. The Singapore section of www.craigslist.org is also a good place to look for long-term stays.

ACTUAL PRICES MAY VARY

In Singapore's midrange and top-end hotels, room rates are about supply and demand, fluctuating daily.

Travellers planning a trip to Singapore need to keep this in mind, especially if youy're planning to come here during a major event. Be aware that reservation desk staff in top hotels usually add a casual (and often barely audible) 'plus plus plus' after the rate they quote you. Ignore this at your peril. The three plusses are service charge, government tax and GST, which together amounts to a breezy 16% on top of your bill.

To further complicate matters, Singapore's high-end hotels offer a stunning array of pricing packages, from rooms for a few hundred a night to Bill Gates–class suites costing thousands (with many incremental, ever-fluctuating price levels in between).

All prices quoted in our listings are from the day of our visit; your own price may vary. Don't thank us: that's the invisible hand of capitalism at work.

BOOKING ON THE FLY

If you arrive in Singapore without a hotel booking, don't despair. The efficient Singapore Hotel Association (www .stayinsingapore.com.sg) has four desks at Changi airport, with two at Terminal 1 (\bigotimes east wing 10am-11.30pm, west wing 24hr) and two at Terminal 2 (\bigotimes north wing 7am-11pm, south wing 24hr).

There are dozens of hotels on its lists, ranging from \$37 a night right up to Raffles Hotel at over \$650. There's no charge for the service, and promotional or discounted rates, when available, are passed on to you. You can also book the hotels over the internet on the association's website.

If you've made it as far as Orchard Rd and still don't have a hotel room (and don't fancy sleeping in the park), Singapore Visitors Centre @ Orchard (To 6738 3729; svorchard2003@yahoo.com; cnr Cairnhill & Orchard Rds; 9 9 9 m-6 pm) works with local area hotels and can help visitors get bargain rates.

to-ceiling windows offering spectacular views. The rooftop pool is an especially nice touch, as are the guided floor-lights in the lobby, presumably to guide your footsteps when you come home drunk.

RESERVATIONS

'Build it and they will come', or so goes the Kevin Costner quote in *Field of Dreams*. In Singapore, the 'it' is lots of hotels, and the 'they', well, that's you. The more hotels that go up, the more travellers (and less hotel rooms) there seem to be. Though most travellers won't have too much of a problem finding a place to stay, Singapore is definitely not the place to just rock up without reservations if you can help it – especially if you arrive during holidays (like Chinese New Year) or during major sporting events.

So book ahead and online when possible, if not for peace of mind then for the often available (and sometimes substantial) internet discounts. Hotel websites and discount websites like www.asiabesthotels.com, www .hotels.online.com.sg, or www.agoda.com are all good resources.

COLONIAL DISTRICT & THE QUAYS

This sprawling nerve centre of tourist activity contains the widest variety of accommodations, from the cheapest of the cheap no-frills hostels to the priciest luxury hotels. Though precise definition of where this area begins and ends is a bit difficult to pin down, for the purposes of our listings we're including anything close to the Clarke Quay, Dhoby Ghaut, City Hall or Bugis MRT stations, which includes the vast nexus of hotels on and around Bencoolen St.

Hotels that double as tourist attractions are sometimes a let-down. This one isn't. With its wooden floors, high ceilings, unshakeable colonial decor and even its famous Sikh doorman, it stands alongside the Peninsula

Hong Kong and the Oriental Bangkok as one of Asia's truly special hotels. Whether you're coming to stay or simply to soak up some air-conditioned elegance, be advised: dress code is in effect, and Raffles' turbaned doorman will not allow those in sleeveless shirts, sandals, or grubby backpacker attire to enter.

The Fullerton has the distinction of being both one of Singapore's most magnificent pieces of colonial architecture and the only hotel we've ever heard of that's also a restored post office. The heritage principles involved in the restoration mean some of the Armani-beige rooms overlook the inner atrium. Spend a bit extra to gain access to the hotel's private Straits Club and upgrade to river- or marina-view rooms, all of which are stunning. Though easily as elegant as the famed Raffles, the Fullerton is a bit less restrictive when it comes to welcoming casually dressed tourists.

RITZ-CARLTON

A must for romantic occasions.

SWISSÔTEL, THE STAMFORD

Prices include breakfast, and if you get a room on the 57th floor executive club, breakfast (or any meal) will come with endless high-grade coffee, compliments of your room's personal Lavazza espresso machine.

Less expensive rooms are also lovely, though decorated more along standard five-star lines. Facilities include a fitness centre, a pleasant rooftop pool and several good restaurants.

The subdued minimalist lobby is so hip it hurts, and room decorations are sexy without being lewd. Broadband and wireless are free, as is the indoor recreation area. The one drawback to this otherwise excellent hotel is that the construction being carried out next door might not be done until sometime in 2009.

The hotel is still clean and well run, with rooms equipped with TVs, fridges and phones. It's within reasonable walking distance of Orchard Rd, the Colonial District and Bugis. Breakfast is included.

Undoubtedly the hippest hotel in Singapore, the newly opened New Maiestic Hotel is destined to become an icon of cool.

HISTORIC HOTELS

It's not just Raffles that has an illustrious past (see p56). Goodwood Park Hotel (p169), dating from 1900 and designed to resemble a Rhine castle, served as the base for the Teutonia Club, a social club for Singapore's German community, until 1914 when it was seized by the government as part of 'enemy property'. In 1918 the building was auctioned off and renamed Club Goodwood Hall, before it morphed again into the Goodwood Park Hotel in 1929, fast becoming one of the finest hotels in Asia.

During WWII it accommodated the Japanese high command, some of whom returned here at the war's end to be tried for war crimes in a tent erected in the hotel grounds. By 1947 the hotel was back in business with a \$2.5-million renovation program bringing it back to its former glory by the early 1960s. Further improvements in the 1970s have left the hotel as it is today.

The Fullerton Hotel (p162) occupies the magnificent colonnaded Fullerton Building, named after Robert Fullerton, the first Governor of the Straits Settlements. When it opened in 1928, it was the largest building in Singapore and cost over \$4 million. The General Post Office, which occupied the three floors of the building, was said to have the longest counter (100m) in the world at the time. Above the GPO was the exclusive Singapore Club, in which Governor Sir Shenton Thomas and General Percival discussed surrendering Singapore to the Japanese.

In 1958 a revolving lighthouse beacon was added to the roof, its beams could be seen up to 29km away. By 1996 the GPO had moved out and the entire building underwent a multimillion-dollar renovation and reopened in 2001 to general acclaim, receiving the prestigious Urban Redevelopment Authority Architectural Award the same year.

Located in the guieter eastern end of Joo Chiat, Rucksack has two eight-bed dorms, segregated by sex whenever possible. It's above Genesis Bistro Bar.
