Entertainment ■

Seoulites of all ages love going out and socialising, whether it's with classmates, work colleagues, friends or dates, so entertainment areas are humming every night of the week until late. On Friday and Saturday the revels continue all night. The usual thing is to choose a neighbourhood, eat and drink, then go to a live music show or sing in a *noraebang* (karaoke room), then drink some more, and finally hit a dance club until the subway system starts up again at 5.30am. Student haunts like Hongik, Sinchon and Daehangno are swarming with bars, live music venues, *noraebang*, DVD *bang* (a room where you can watch DVDs) and dance clubs. The expat Itaewon area has a party atmosphere on Friday and Saturday nights.

THEATRE, DANCE & CASINOS

Plenty of theatres present traditional music, dance and drama, while modern local musicals like *Nanta, Tokebi Storm* and *Taekwon* can be enjoyed by foreigners since there are few or no words. Western-style opera, ballet, modern dance and musicals are regularly staged. The Kim Yun-gyu dance company melds traditional and modern styles.

Daehangno (Map p208) is home to a lively drama scene with 60 small theatres. Ticket prices are a reasonable W11,000 to W25,000, but everything is in Korean. The discount theatre ticket booth (Map p208; № 1pm-7.30pm Tue-Sun), behind the open-air stage in Marronnier Park, sells W12,000 theatre tickets for W7000, but you need ID and you may have to queue.

Top local bands and famous groups from Western countries often perform at Jamsil Sports Complex (Map pp214–15). Ticket prices generally range from W40,000 to W70,000.

This well-regarded and well-established theatre is centrally located and puts on 1½-hour performances of traditional music, singing and dancing. The shows are targeted at foreign visitors and English subtitles appear on a screen. After the show you can take photographs of the performers in their traditional clothing. The ticket office opens at 7pm. Tickets cost W30,000 to W40,000 with discounts for students.

DONGSOONG ARTS CENTRE Map p208

HAKCHON GREEN THEATRE Map p208 763 8233; www.hakchon.co.kr; tickets adult/ student W28,000/22,000; subway Line 4 to Hyehwa, Exit 2

The smash-hit rock musical *Line 1* takes a satirical look at Seoul – the 'Ladies of Gangnam' song and dance is a memorable highlight. The nearly three-hour show has English subtitles on a screen on Wednesday, Friday and Sunday.

KAYAGUM THEATRE Map pp198-9

These entertaining and lavish 1½-hour shows include traditional Korean music and dance followed by a glitzy Western/Asian cabaret revue. The hotel theatre is over 1km from the subway, so take the hotel shuttle bus or a taxi.

KOREA HOUSE Map pp206-7

☎ 2266 9101; www.koreahouse.or.kr; tickets W29,000; subway Line 3 or 4 to Chungmuro, Exit 3 This intimate 150-seat theatre stages onehour performances after their fine dinners (p92). Put on by a large troupe of top musicians and dancers, the shows have some commentary in English on a screen. Show items include elegant court dances, pansori (Korean opera), a crowd-pleasing fan dance, a spiritual shamanist dance, and female drummers standing up and acrobatically banging on three drums each. The finale is samullori (traditional farmers' dance), with swirling dancers trying to outdo each other as they dance to fast and furious percussion rhythms.

MARRONNIER PARK Map p208

Subway Line 4 to Hyehwa, Exit 2

This free performance area in Daehangno usually has something happening on warm weekend afternoons. Student artists draw portraits in one corner while high-school rock bands crank it up on the glass-roofed outdoor stage, and a *samullori* troupe bang their drums and gongs while dancing around under the chestnut trees. 'Mr Guitar', a musician and comedian, regularly performs in front of a large and appreciative audience.

MUNYE THEATRE Map p208

Subway Line 4 to Hyehwa, Exit 2

This large red-brick theatre in Daehangno puts on a varied dance-oriented programme of events and shows as well as hosting the annual Modern Dance Festival (p102). Posters around Daehangno advertise what's on.

Dance to irresistible Latin rhythms at Bahia (p111) or Macondo (p111) in Hongik.

NANTA THEATRE Map pp202-3

Set in a kitchen, this long-running, highenergy show mixes varied ingredients – magic, circus tricks, drumming with kitchen utensils, comedy, dance, martial arts and audience participation – to produce a clever and enjoyable musical pantomime.

NATIONAL CENTRE FOR KOREAN TRADITIONAL PERFORMING ARTS

Map pp198-9

Next door to the Seoul Arts Centre, the Yeakdang theatre (580 3300; tickets W8000 and W10,000) puts on a programme by top performers every Saturday from March to December at 5pm. The 1½-hour show is a bargain and usually contains eight items including court dances, folk songs, *pansori* and drumming. A three-day festival is held at the end of October.

Between early May and early December, at the smaller Umyeondang theatre, younger performers put on a similar show every Thursday (same ticket prices). Other traditional performances are held here too. Take the shuttle bus (W500) from the subway exit or walk (15 minutes).

NATIONAL THEATRE Map pp206-7

On Namsan, this complex is home to the national drama, national changgeuk (Korean opera), national orchestra and national dance companies. Venues include the main hall and outdoor stages where free concerts and movies are held in summer. It's a 15-minute walk from the subway exit or take the yellow bus No 2 (W500, every 10 minutes) from the bus stop just behind Exit 6.

This theatre specialises in musicals that can be enjoyable even if you can't understand Korean (or take a Korean-speaking friend along with you). Some shows are adaptations of Western musicals, while others are home-grown.

SEJONG CENTRE FOR THE

PERFORMING ARTS Map pp202-3

Centrally located, this newly renovated centre is a leading arts complex that puts on major drama, music and art shows, including an annual three-day international drum festival in early October. It has a grand hall, small theatre and three art galleries.

SEOUL ARTS CENTRE Map pp198-9

This sprawling arts complex has a circular opera house, with a roof shaped like a Korean nobleman's hat, which also houses the 700seat Towol Theatre and the smaller Jayu Theatre. The national ballet and opera companies are based here. Music House consists of a large concert hall and a smaller recital hall and is home to the national choir, the Korea and Seoul symphony orchestras and the Seoul performing arts company.

The arts centre is 600m from the subway exit - walk straight on from the subway exit and turn left at the end of the bus terminal, or take the frequent shuttle bus (W500).

SEOUL NORIMADANG Map pp214-15

 □ 410 3168; admission free; shows 3pm & 4pm Sat & Sun Apr-Oct; subway Line 2 or 8 to Jamsil, Exit 3 This covered outdoor arena with seats hosts entertaining traditional music and dance performances that are enjoyed by the mainly elderly local audience who may get up and start dancing. If you are in Lotte

World walk through Baby World and go up the stairs for a short cut to the lakeside venue.

SHERATON GRANDE WALKERHILL CASINO Map pp198-9

☎ 456 2121; **№** 24hr; subway Line 5 to Gwangnaru, Exit 2

This casino offers the usual ways of losing money - one-armed bandits, roulette, poker, blackjack, baccarat, big wheel and tai-sa. Snacks are free, and free drinks can be ordered at the gaming tables. Minimum bets are W2500 or W5000. There is no dress code and Korean nationals are not allowed inside.

A second casino is opening in May 2006 at the Millennium Hilton Hotel. Called Seven Luck, it will be open 24 hours.

FESTIVALS

Seoul hosts a festival almost every week (p8). A wellestablished, two-week international Modern Dance Festival (www.modafe.org) is held every spring. It's based at Munye Theatre in Daehangno (Map p208). The two-week Seoul Fringe Festival takes over the student area in Hongik in late August with art, dance, drama and street performances. The National Theatre (Map pp206-7) hosts a 10-day Traditional Dance Festival in late August, while the three-week Seoul International Dance Festival (www.sidance.org) in October is held mainly at the Seoul Arts Centre.

TOKEBI STORM THEATRE Map pp202-3

☎ 739 8288; tickets W20,000-80,000; **№** shows 8pm Tue-Sat, 3pm & 6pm Sun; subway Line 1 or 2 to City Hall, Exit 2

Tokebi Storm is an energetic and fun drumming show with a goblin theme (every culture seems to have its goblins), which is all-action and mime with no dialogue, so will appeal to a global audience.

CINEMAS

Luxurious new multiplex cinemas with large screens and the latest sound equipment are opening all round Seoul. Films are usually shown from 11am to 11pm. English-language films are shown in cinemas with their original soundtrack and Korean subtitles. Unfortunately Korean-language movies shown in cinemas don't have English subtitles, but you can see them in a DVD bang (see p103) with English subtitles. Cinema and DVD bang tickets usually cost W7000.

CINE CUBE Map pp202-3

subway Line 5 to Gwanghwamun, Exit 6

This well-respected art cinema near Deoksugung screens international festival films, which are usually shown in their original language with Korean subtitles. Interest in world cinema is growing, especially amongst young Seoulites.

COEX MALL MEGABOX Map pp214-15

6002 1200; tickets W7000; № 9am-midnight A mega popular 17-screen multiplex cinema with over 4000 seats that screens some films at midnight, when most other

cinemas have closed for the night. Queues can build up at busy times.

Terminal, Fxit 5

The archives screens classic Korean films with English subtitles. The seasonal programmes provide a rare opportunity to see films that are not normally shown.

MMC CHEONGDAEMUN MULTIPLEX

DVD BANG

A DVD bang is the best place to see Korean movies, as they can be shown with English subtitles. See p23 for reviews of some excellent Korean films. DVD bang are all similar: you watch the film sitting on a comfortable sofa in your own private room. The usual cost is around W7000 per person (the same as a cinema ticket) but can be cheaper in student areas. They're popular with dating couples and most are open all night.

Watch DVDs on a big screen, sitting on a sofa in your own little room up on the 4th floor. There is no need to book, just turn up.

NORAEBANG

Seoul has thousands of *noraebang*, where friends and work colleagues sing along to well-known songs, including ones in English. Every Seoulite seems to sing well, and many can sing in English better than they speak it. Most noraebang open from 2pm to 2am and prices start at around W15,000 an hour, although luxury ones cost more. No alcohol is served, but a few have hostesses to help patrons have a good time by holding their hand and singing a duet with them, and applauding enthusiastically after each song. The best way for a foreign businessman to impress his Korean hosts is to belt out a heartfelt version of Frank Sinatra's 'My Way'.

Seoul has an unbelievable number of bars so competition is strong. Most of Seoul's expat and gay bars and clubs can be found in Itaewon, which caters to the US troops stationed nearby (although they'll be moving to bases further south by 2008). Most bars have English-speaking staff, and only get busy around 10pm or later, even on Friday and Saturday. It's the only area where you see lots of foreigners and it has a different atmosphere from the rest of Seoul.

Itaewon's hostess bars are concentrated on the hill (known as Hooker Hill), across the main road from the Hamilton Hotel. Step inside one and a drink for yourself may cost only W5000, but a drink for one of the scantily clad girls plastered in make-up could set you back W20,000 or more. These bars have signs outside that read 'Sweetheart Club – Drink Food Woman', 'Woman & Cocktails' or the slightly more subtle 'For Gentlemen'.

GWANGHWAMUN

BUCK MULLIGAN'S Map pp202-3

Guinness is W8000 and live pop and rock music can be enjoyed at 7.30pm and 9pm in this Irish-themed bar with a pool table.

TIME OUT SPORTS BAR Map pp202-3

A monster collection of signed sporting memorabilia adorns the walls of this sports bar with screens and differing zones to relax in. Beers start at a reasonable W2500, and the fusion-style food includes steaks. An organic salad buffet is available at lunch time.

Mixing together an English pub atmosphere (darts, pool and a trivia quiz every Thursday night) with top-notch Europeanstyle pub grub and seven draught beers is a formula that makes this an expat magnet.

ALWAYS HOMME Map p209

Beer is W4000 and cocktails are W5000 at this homely gay bar with a touch or two of style. The music is not so loud that you can't talk and the staff are friendly.

BAR BLISS Map p209

English-speaking, motorbike-riding gay gypsy Ted Park welcomes everyone to his smart wine bar. The armchairs, the music, the good house wine and the cheese and crackers are all so tempting you may never want to leave this bar that's hidden behind Reggae Pub.

GECKO'S TERRACE Map p209

This comfortable and popular 2nd floor bar and restaurant has a global menu, lunch specials, six draught beers and lots of bottled ones plus the obligatory-in-ltaewon darts and pool. It can get like a rugby scrum at peak times.

NASHVILLE SPORTS BAR Map p209

A scruffy Itaewon institution with a juke-box, pool, darts and a view. Beer costs W2500 and cocktails W5000. In summer the rooftop garden bar opens except when it's raining. In the basement is an Americanstyle diner and above the sports bar is Club Caliente (p110).

Reggae rhythms on the sound system are the main attraction at this Jamaican outpost, but there is the usual pool and darts. Jah beef *jjigae* (stew) is W8000, Jamaican chicken barbecue is W10,000, a beer is W2500 and a mug of Jamaican punch or *soju* (local vodka) is W6000.

Dip your feet in the pool, sunbathe on a sunlounger, sit in a garden swing seat or relax in a hammock outside or on a bed inside this bar, which is full of relaxing ideas and has an all-white upstairs floor. Drinks start at W5000.

Up on the 2nd floor, the bar has wood cabin décor, bar food and, best of all, a 500ml beer costs only W1900. No need to say any more.

Probably the most amazing bar interior in Seoul, it has overhead waterways, and a sinuous white creeper design that creates individual cubicles for patrons. Imagine a Star Wars bar designed by an Inuit. It feels strange even when you're sober.

Sinchon, Exit 2

A classy black-and-chrome interior sets the tone for the generally cool jazz in this 2nd floor bar, where beers are W5000. It's perfect for a guiet chat with a date rather than somewhere for a raucous night out.

WOODSTOCK Map p210

Sinchon, Exit 2

Years of scribbles have built up on the walls, tables and chairs in this bar where the big attraction is the loud rock music selected from their huge collection. Beer is W2000 a glass or W10,000 a pitcher.

GANGNAM

This large 'Irish' pub has indoor and outdoor seating, five draught beers including Guinness, and bottled Newcastle Brown (W12,000).

Popular in summer, this outdoor bar near Apquieong has a retractable roof. Beer and soju is W4000 but the food, such as chicken gizzards or feet, grilled eel, stews and fish, is relatively expensive.

PLATINUM MICROBREWERY Map p211

Feeling in a party mood? Ten metres from the subway exit is this smart good-deal restaurant that offers the chance to eat and drink too much at the same time. The buffet has 17 items such as salads, sushi, shellfish, bulgogi (barbecued beef slices and lettuce wrap), spaghetti, soup and fruit. The on-site brewery produces six beers including a brown ale and a stout. The décor is modern with black furniture and fairy lights.

ROCK'N'ROLL BAR Map p211

8pm-5am; subway Line 3 to Apqujeong, Exit 6 A small museum of personal mementoes adds atmosphere to this three-storey logcabin bar in Apquieong where the cocktails (W9000) are a better deal than the beers (W8000).

Teashops cluster mainly in Insadong, but a few are scattered elsewhere. Many owners put a lot of effort into creating a special atmosphere for their customers with traditional décor and music. The medicinal hot and cold teas are made from roots, leaves, herbs or fruit. A cup of tea costs around W6000 (as much as a cheap meal), but it's a quality product and often served with a rice-cake snack.

This is not a traditional Korean teashop, but instead offers the chance to sip teas from around the world in the pleasant covered courtyard of a modern hanok (traditional Korean one-storey wooden house with a tiled roof), with tea sets on display.

DALSAENEUN DALMAN SAENGGAK HANDA Map p205

Moon Bird Thinks Only of the Moon; 2 723 1504; Insadong 4-gil; teas W6000; Y 11am-11pm; subway Line 3 to Anguk, Exit 6

This special, poetically named teashop is packed with plants and rustic artefacts, and bird song, soothing music and trickling water add to the atmosphere. Huddle in a cubicle and savour one of the many teas, which include *aamnipcha* (persimmon-leaf tea). Saenggangcha (ginger tea) is peppery but sweet.

JEONTONG DAWON Map p205

₹ 7306305; off Seokjeongol-qil; teas W6000; 8.30am-9.20pm; subway Line 3 to Anguk, Exit 6 Sit outside under the shady fruit trees in the very pleasant courtyard hideaway or inside a 19th-century hanok decorated with scribbles on the walls. Small art exhibition spaces surround the courtvard. In summer sip delicious omiiacha hwaechae fruit punch (omija are tiny dried berries said to contain five flavours). The *nokcha* (green tea) is unusual, as it's served with milk.

Green-tea ice cream is recommended as are the homemade green-tea chocolates (W1000) but the green-tea latte tastes like hot milk.

Classy live jazz venues can be found in every entertainment district, and luxury hotels often have a live band in the bar. Itaewon has a live music scene, some of it provided by expat bands. But Hongik is the place for live indie music played in tiny underground venues by student bands with names like No Brain, Lazy Bone and Vaseline, But so far only Crying Nut has made it to stadium status. Concerts usually run from 7pm to 10.30pm. Admission varies from nothing to W10,000, which may include a drink.

The new Sound Day (www.soundday .co.kr) is held on the second Friday of the month from 8pm to 5am. W15,000 gains entry to around 10 live music venues in Hongik and includes a free drink.

Entry costs from W5000 to W10,000 and includes a free drink, but a few clubs charge more on Friday and Saturday nights. The famous Hongik Club Day (www.clubcul ture.or.kr) is held every last Friday of the month from 9pm to 5am. Pay just W15,000 for a free drink and entry to a dozen clubs, which all feature a bunch of DJs. Take some ID. Clubs that currently participate include Joker Red, Sk@, Saab, MI and M2. A map comes with the Club Day ticket. Clubbers are fickle so venues can blow hot and cold, but the Latin American dance clubs always retain their fan base.

ACTIVITIES WATCHING SPORT

Baseball

South Korea has had a professional league (www.koreabaseball.or.kr) since 1982, and teams are sponsored by local jaebeol (huge family-run corporate conglomerates). The season runs from April to October. The Doosan Bears and the LG Twins play their home matches at Jamsil Baseball Stadium (Map pp214-15).

Basketball

Seoul has two teams, Samsung Thunders and SK Knights, in the 10-team Korean basketball league (www.kbl.or). Matches are played from late October to March at Jamsil

Gymnasium (Map pp214–15). See the website for the schedule of weekday evening matches and weekend afternoon matches. Two foreign players (usually Americans) are allowed in each team.

Horse Racing

SEOUL RACECOURSE Map pp198-9 races 11.30am-5pm Sat & Sun Sep-Jun, 1-9pm Sat & Sun Jul & Aug; subway Line 4 to Seoul Racecourse, Exit 2

Every weekend thousands head south to the horse racing. The spectators used to be mainly men, but racing authorities have had some success at promoting racing as a family or couple activity. Huge screens on the track show the odds, and close-ups of the horses. Short 1km to 2km races take place every half-hour with evening racing in July and August. Foreigners can make use of a smart and comfortable suite – just walk left into the new Lucky Ville grandstand, take the elevator to the 4th floor and walk to section S. English-speaking staff are on hand, but betting is easy enough. Despite the big crowds (legal gambling opportunities are still restricted in Seoul) everything is well-organised. The only problem is picking the winners.

The Equine Museum (509 1283; admission free; 9am-6pm) houses some modern displays of historical items relating to horses and some are, quite surprisingly, beautiful.

Meals are limited to budget fast-food outlets, and the track is closed on four weekends of the year - New Year, Chuseok and the last weekend in December and July.

Soccer

Soccer was given a huge boost by the heroic efforts of the talented and spirited South Korean team, which reached the semifinals of the 2002 FIFA World Cup, cohosted by South Korea and Japan. But since then results have been disappointing and two coaches have been sacked. The home soccer league has 13 teams and matches are played from April to October at World Cup Stadium (Map pp198-9).

Ssireum

Ssireum is Korean-style wrestling, which is more similar to Mongolian wrestling than Japanese sumo. Tournament winners are given the title of *jangsa* (the strongest man in the world), and they used to be given a live bull as a prize.

A four-day ssireum competition (admission free) is held here around the Lunar New Year.

Taekwondo

Expect to see graceful movements, acrobatic high kicking that defies gravity and spectacular pineboard breaking. Saturday and Wednesday mornings are when demonstration teams practice, except during university holidays. The museum (admission free; (2) 9am-5pm Mon-Fri) has photos, cups, medals and uniforms relating to the sport.

OUTDOOR & INDOOR ACTIVITIES

Adventure Sports

White-water rafting tours are run by USO (p46). Contact the Adventure Club (www.ad venturekorea.com) for information on caving, rock climbing, white-water rafting and other outdoor activities.

Baseball

You can whack some baseballs from a pitching machine at Baseball Hitting Practice (Map p205; Insadong-gil; 10 balls W500; 9am-midnight) in Insadong and Baseball Hitting Practice (Map p211; W500; 9am-6pm) near Gangnam station.

Golf

Private golf courses are usually for members only, but there are plenty of driving ranges in top-end hotels and elsewhere. A typical one is Hyosung Golf (Map p211; 543 3046; Dosandaero; 1hr W15,000; 5am-10pm; subway Line 3 to Apgujeong, Exit 2).

Ice-Skating

Lotte World ice-skating rink (p59) is open all year. In winter the swimming pools along the Han River freeze over and become skating rinks.

There's a skating rink (adult W1000, free skates) at the City Hall Plaza (Map pp202-3). The Sheraton Grande Walkerhill (Map pp198-9) and the Grand Hyatt (Map p209) also have ice-skating rinks in winter (entry and skates W30,000), but are only reachable by taxi. Ttukseom Seoul Forest and World Cup Park both have a sledding slope (1hr W500; 10am-4pm).

Pool & Four Ball

Seoul is full of pool halls - look for the cuesand-coloured-balls signs. The halls usually have both pool tables (pool is called 'pocketball') and tables for four ball. The cost is usually W6000 per hour.

Four ball is played in Belgium and the Netherlands but is most popular in South Korea. There are no pockets and players must hit cannons. Two red balls and two white ones are used. The players (any number) hit the white balls in turn.

Players try to reach a score of zero. It's a handicap system, so beginners start with a score of three points. When you improve you start with five points, then eight, then 10 and so on. When your score reaches zero, to finish you must do a more difficult shot - hit the side-cushion three times while hitting both red balls without hitting the other white ball. A player scores minus one if they're successful and their white ball hits both the red balls without touching the other white ball, and can take another turn. It sounds easy but isn't. Players score nothing for hitting just one red, and plus one for hitting the other white ball or missing everything.

Skiina

The cold winters and mountainous terrain make Korea an ideal country for winter sports. Prices are reasonable and ski resorts offer a range of accommodation from youth hostels and basic minbak (private homes with rooms for rent) to condominiums and luxury hotels. The ski season runs from December to February. Ski clothes and equipment and English-speaking instructors can be hired. The dozen or so ski resorts have offices in Seoul and run all-inclusive oneday package tours from W75,000. USO (p46) organises weekend ski trips.

Five ski resorts are shown on the Seoul Vicinity Map (p146), but they can be very crowded, so you may want to go further a field to Korea's best ski resort at Yongpyong (www.yongpyong.co.kr) in Gangwon-do.

RIVERSIDE CYCLING TRIPS

Cycle paths, sports fields and flower gardens line both banks of the Han River and bicycles can be rented in parks along the river. The cycle paths are shared with pedestrians and flocks of flying rollerbladers. Both cycle rides start from Yeouido Park. Take subway Line 5 to Yeouinaru station and leave by Exit 2. Walk to one of the two bike hire huts (Map p210; bicycles/tandems per hour W2000/5000; 9am-7pm). ID is required and padlocks and bicycle helmets are not supplied.

Yeouido to the World Cup Stadium

This route is 7km return and takes 90 minutes, but lasts longer if you explore the stadium and surrounding parks.

From Yeouido cycle west past the green-domed National Assembly (p57) and after about 1km you reach Yanghwa gardens. Five minutes beyond is Yanghwa bridge, which you can use to cross the river. Walk up the steps of the bridge pushing your bike up the little bike path on the right of the steps. Stop to have a look round Seonyudo, an island in the middle of the river, which is being transformed from a water treatment plant into an eco park.

Wheel your bicycle down the narrow path on the right of the steps on the other side of the bridge, and then turn right along the cycleway on the northern side of the river. After 10 minutes, turn right at the orange Seongsan bridge, ride over a small bridge and then turn right, following the green signs. After another 10 minutes you should arrive in the large Pyeonghwa (Peace) Park, south of the impressive **World Cup Stadium** (p64) and its shopping malls and cinemas.

For a 6km (30-minute) detour, cycle around what is now an attractive green hill but used to be a mountain of garbage. Cross the major road to Nanjicheon Park (Map pp198-9; 😭 6am-7pm) and keep going. Then return to Yeouido retracing the same route.

Yeouido to Olympic Park

This is a long trip, 38km return, and takes four hours cycling, but virtually all of it is on a cycleway and there are

Along the way are flower gardens, sports fields and lots of bridges. Herons, geese and other birds live near the river. At Banpo and Jamsil, windsurfers (W10,000), water-skis (W15,000) and jet-skis (W100,000) can be rented by the hour in July and August.

Near the 18km distance marker, turn right, ride under a couple of bridges and follow the left side of the usually dry riverbed. At the road, turn left, cross over the minor road, and then cross the major road using the pedestrian crossing. Then turn right, go over the bridge, and Olympic Park (p59) is on your left. It takes at least an hour to tour round Seoul's best park with its museums, stadiums and outdoor sculptures.

Swimming

Outdoor swimming pools only open in July and August. Six swimming pools with the same opening hours and prices can be found along the Han River including the Yeouido Hangang swimming pool (Map p210; 785 1093; adult/teenager/child W4000/3000/2000; 9am-7pm) and Ttukseom swimming pool (Map pp214-15).

The Hamilton Hotel (p137) has a popular pool on its roof-top, which is also open to non-guests. The outdoor pools at the Sheraton Grande Walkerhill Hotel (Map pp198-9; ☎ 453 0121; adult/child incl buffet lunch W55,000/35,000; № 10am-6pm; subway Line 5 to Gwangnaru, Exit 2) are the best but the hotel is 2km from the subway and lunch is compulsory.

Lotte World (p59) and most top-end hotels have indoor pools. Carribean Bay (p155) is Seoul's best water park. See p151 for Seoul's nearest island beach.

Taekwondo

This traditional Korean martial art developed out of taekyon, which can be traced back to ancient tomb murals in the Goryeo dynasty. Taekwondo is now an Olympic sport and is increasingly popular with martial arts fans all over the world. All Korean army personnel receive taekwondo training and five million people worldwide have reached certificate standard. See opposite for Kukkiwon, the HQ of taekwondo.

A 1½-hour introductory programme at the War Memorial & Museum gymnasium costs W35,000 and usually starts at 10am. The best thing about the programme is that you have the opportunity to break a 2cm-thick wooden board. Longer courses are also possible. Contact Hoki first before turning up at the gymnasium.

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Tenpin Bowling

Tenpin bowling is available all over the city at around W3000 a game plus W1000 shoe hire. Seoulites take the sport seriously.

HEALTH & FITNESS

Bathhouses & Saunas

Don't leave Seoul without experiencing an *oncheon* (public bath) and a sauna where you can simmer or steam yourself like a *mandu* (dumpling). Spartan saunas cost only W5000, but *jjimjilbang* (upmarket saunas with Internet cafés, and luxury décor and facilities), cost from W7000 to W14,000. Most are open 24 hours, and some offer unusual green-tea baths or mugwort herbal saunas.

Undress in the locker room and then take a shower, as you must clean yourself thoroughly before getting into the public bath. Soap and shampoo are supplied, as well as toothpaste and toothbrushes, and the ladies section usually has hairdryers, foot massagers, lotions and perfumes. You can often have your hair cut as well as your shoes shined.

The water temperature in the big communal baths varies from hot to extremely hot, but there may also be a cold bath (including a 'waterfall' shower). Relaxing and turning pink in a hot bath is good therapy, especially on a cold winter's day. The heat soaks into weary bodies, soothing tired muscles and minds.

Saunas vary but all are as hot as a pizza oven, and to suffer more you can be pummelled by a masseur. Afterwards take a nap lying on a wooden floor with a block of wood for a pillow. You can even spend the night in the dormitory, sleeping on a *yo* (a padded quilt that serves as a futon or mattress on the floor).

DONGBANG SAUNA Map p213

This clean and spacious sauna in Hongik offers separate sections for men and women. Facilities include an exercise centre, two sleeping rooms (one with bunks), a TV room, a green-tea pool, clay and crystal saunas and massages.

ITAEWONLAND SAUNA Map p209

This new luxurious *jjimjilbang*, spread over five floors, is the best in Itaewon. With separate sections for men and women, every customer is loaned a towel and T-shirt. A long list of pools, spa baths and massages is available including a green-tea beauty treatment.

SEOUL MUD Map p209

Foot massages, mugwort steam treatment, special soft mud packs and a ginseng bath cost from W20,000 to W82,000. It's a cheap price to pay for beauty if it works.
