# **Travel Facts**



### **GETTING THERE**

Australia is well serviced with international flights. Brisbane and Cairns are the international ports with regular domestic services to all the GBR points. The state of Queensland has many coastal centres with regular commuter air services that serve as jumping-off points to the GBR and Coral Sea. Australia's major domestic airlines will book and supply services to all ports (including services run by subsidiary airlines).

Lady Elliot, Brampton, Hamilton, Dunk, Lizard and Hicks Islands all have their own airstrips, as do many of the Torres Strait Islands. There are feeder airports at Bundaberg, Gladstone, Mackay, Proserpine, Townsville, Cairns and Thursday (Horn) Island. Iron Range has an airstrip, which is often used as a change-over point for Far Northern GBR expedition trips through Portland Roads, serviced from either Cairns or Thursday Island.

### Cairns - The GBR's Gateway City

With a population of more than 100,000, Cairns is now firmly established as one of Australia's top travel destinations and is the main jumping-off port to GBR and Coral Sea destinations.

Cairns was once a laid-back country town, but today is a modern, vivacious city that lives and breathes tourism. Cairns Airport is one of the busiest in Australia and the flow of international arrivals continues to swell.

Many divers start or finish their GBR trip in Cairns and, although the city itself only has a small built beach, dozens of operators run daily and hourly trips to nearby beaches and offshore islands and reefs. Cairns is also the centre for a host of other activities including whitewater rafting, para-sailing, rainforest excursions, horse-riding, hiking, mountain biking, canoeing and, for the real adrenaline junkies, there's always bungee jumping or sky diving.



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### **GETTING AROUND**

In most major centres there are regular bus services (check with the local tourist or information centre for fares and schedules) and taxis are everywhere, but can get expensive if you have a lot of running around to do before your dive trip. Renting a car is a good option if you have a group of people, enjoy driving long distances and have the time. Plan carefully as the distances between cities are deceptively long. Rental cars are available at every centre and airport, while some long-stay visitors even buy a car for the duration of their visit.

Coaches (most with movies), operate regularly between all centres and are the backpacker's choice of transport. The coaches are met by backpacker representatives at most towns. You can take a train from Brisbane to Cairns – an inexpensive and a great way to see the countryside if you have the time. Cruises between Townsville and Cairns, or Cairns and Cooktown are a great travel option, although diving is often

a lower priority to cruising, snorkeling and island visits.

Many dive operators offer a pickup service from local accommodations. Helicopters, floatplanes and amphibians can also take you directly to islands, boats or reef pontoons. Most are on a charter basis but some have regular services. A great site, listing current opportunities and services, is www.queenslandholidays.com.au.



### **ENTRY**

To visit Australia you need a current passport valid for three months after your departure. For visa requirements, visit www.immi.gov.au or check with your local Australian consulate.

### **DIVING LAWS**

International standards apply. To dive in Queensland you need to show your dive certification card and log book. Operators will often want to chat about what diving you have done. You will often be asked to sign a waiver form to protect the operator.

If you wish to undertake a resort or introductory dive you are required to complete a medical questionnaire – ideally you should have a proper medical by a diving doctor as there are particular aspects to diving physiology that diving doctors are trained in.

#### MONEY

Australia uses Australian dollars and cents only. Generally all other currencies are only acceptable at banks. Traveller's cheques can be used but usually at a poorer rate at retail outlets. The use of credit cards is easy and widespread and there are many -hole in the wall' ATMs and Eftpos outlets, which will work with most overseas accounts. All dive services and accommodations accept credit cards.

### TIME

Australian Eastern Standard Time (GBR) is 10 hours ahead of GMT except on Heron Island Resort, which is 11 hours ahead. Queensland does not observe daylight saving time seen in other Australian states. When it's noon on the GBR, it's 11am in Tokyo, 2am in London and 6pm the day before in San Francisco. World times are listed under 'International Codes' in the local telephone directories.

### **ELECTRICITY**

Three-pin flat-point plugs are standard in Australia. All electricity is on a 240V, 50Hz cycle, available at all resorts and on overnight vessels. As most are on a generator system, fluctuations are common so be careful with sensitive gear. Check ahead if you require 110V as it is rarely available. If you need multiple outlets, bring along a multi-plug 'power board,' converter plugs and a transformer. Most duty free, hardware and luggage stores have converter plugs. Under no circumstances should you plug a non-240V unit into any Australian outlet.

### **WEIGHTS & MEASURES**

Australia follows the metric system, although many people still understand imperial systems. In this book, both

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imperial and metric measurements are given, except for specific references to depth, which are given in metres. Be careful to plan and undertake your dives in whatever system your gauges use. Divemasters are almost always capable of handling both measurements, but it's good to know what you're using before you head out. Refer to the conversion chart at the back of this book.

### WHAT TO BRING

Bring prescription medicines. It's also wise to carry copies of the prescriptions in case you need more, or to subdue an over-enthusiastic customs person. Carry them with you and even carry another set in your luggage in case of loss. Some drugs sold overseas are not available in Australia or are known under different names, so it's important to know what the drug is. Also bring prescription lenses, and their prescriptions and any other hard-to-get items. Other personal items are readily available in major centres along the coast.

It can get cold and windy at sea and on the islands, so a good waterproof windbreaker or spray jacket is useful. A woolen sweater or fleece is advisable during winter in the south. A hat, sunglasses, sunscreen, long-sleeved shirt or rashie for sunburn protection is also important – there are reasons for the famous Aussie hats! Bug repellent is useful on the coast and some islands.

### DIVE-RELATED EQUIPMENT

For long periods of diving, you'll find a light wetsuit (3mm) is suitable throughout the north. In the south, in winter to early summer, you'll want a 5mm full wetsuit, hood and boots. A lycra skin is ideal for snorkeling and sun protection. Most operators rent out equipment at prices similar to most international destinations. Wetsuits are usually in good order. With competition and the high standards required by Queensland law, most operators now carry only well-serviced gear and offer computers in the rental package. As each operator is

different, check beforehand (in writing if possible), to ensure you are getting the gear or air mixes you want.

The basic principles of safe diving are enshrined in law. Queensland law says that each diver must dive with a buddy, wear a BC with a whistle, have an alternate air source, gauges, a protection suit, weights with a quick release catch



and a dive computer. Divers should also use the DCIEM (Defence & Civil Institute of Environmental Medicine) tables and follow the instructions of the Divemaster. Be patient with dive staff, as the precautions are for your safety and protection.

Repairs are readily available at coastal centres but generally not on boats or at resorts. Most locations sell all dive equipment, books and videos. Purchasing spare parts here can be risky, as most retail centres cater to a limited range of brands. Batteries are available almost everywhere.

### **BUSINESS HOURS**

Almost everything is open from 9am to 5pm Monday to Friday, except for banks, which are open to 4pm, and 5pm only on Fridays. Most shops open 9am to noon on Saturdays, with major shopping centres open all day Saturday and some on Sunday. For specialty items, it's best to shop before the weekend, when many specialty shops are closed.

### **ACCOMMODATION**

Stay in a deluxe all-inclusive resort or pitch your tent on a remote reef island - accommodations on the GBR run the full gamut. Four to five star accommodations are available in Port Douglas. Cairns, Townsville and on Heron, Hayman, Dunk, Bedarra and Lizard islands. There are also four-star hotels in Mission Beach, Airlie Beach, Mackay, Yeppoon, Rockhampton, Gladstone and Bundaberg. Motels, hotels, caravan parks, camping areas and backpackers (privately run budget hostels) are available at all centres and many places in between. Most dive operators will be happy to suggest affiliated accommodations or suggest a hotel that has the best deal for your requirements. Keep in mind that June and July are peak tourism months, with school holidays falling at this time, and prices can vary depending on when you go.

Many of the islands are national parks and with a permit from the Environment Protection Agency you can camp at minimal cost. Some islands – such as Great Keppel, Magnetic, Hook and Fitzroy islands – have hostels or other forms of budget accommodations. For details and permits, visit www.epa.qld. gov.au/parks\_and\_forests. Many operators can organise accommodation for divers as part of a package.

### **DINING & FOOD**

Port Douglas has the reputation for the best dining available on the GBR coast, but there's still a good range of restaurants around Cairns, Townsville and the Whitsundays. Popular seafood dishes include barramundi (found in rivers and estuaries in northern Australia), coral trout, tuna, sweetlip, bream and mangrove jack. Fresh prawns, Moreton Bay bugs, painted crayfish and mud-crab are also popular. Excellent Australian wines are available, as are local beers like VB

and XXXX (four-ex, because it is said they couldn't spell beer!) – a favourite after a hot day on the reef. For dessert try the pavlova – an 'Australian' dessert made of meringue, whipped cream and fruit – it was invented in New Zealand, they say!

### **THINGS TO BUY**

Australia is a signatory to the CITES (Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species) Convention so it is illegal to trade in turtle shell, dugong, many shells, coral, black coral and the like. Treat your time on the reef as a national park experience and limit yourself to souvenirs such as T-shirts, videos, books, your own photos and your dive log. Items made from marine organisms (jewellery, shell etc) that are for sale in shops were probably obtained legally. It's likely that these items were collected in a non-sustainable fashion and to the detriment of their environment - your future dive sites. Sunscreens, clothes, confectionery, film, books, batteries and the like are available at most resort boutiques and on many boats.
