DRINKING & NIGHTLIFE

In a city where alcohol was once the main currency (see p23), it's little wonder that drinking is a big part of the social fabric – whether it's knocking back some tinnies on the beach or meeting mates at the pub.

These days Sydney offers plenty of choice in drinking establishments, from the flashy to the trashy. If the mood to tie one on hits, you should find no difficulty finding a place that suits. Sydneysiders are generally gregarious and welcoming of visitors, and the easiest place to meet them is at the pub.

Many areas have kept their historic corner pubs – an appealing facet of British life that the colonists were loathe to leave behind. Given the Australian weather the addition of beer gardens was an obvious improvement on the formula. Over the last few years those pubs lacking them have scrambled to graft on rooftop terraces to cater to smokers; smoking is now banned from all substantially enclosed licensed premises. It's a cruel irony that the most pleasant open-air areas are now often the stinkiest.

While it might not seem the case, NSW licensing laws are quite restrictive. Setting up a new venue requires buying an existing premises or paying through the nose to transfer a license. The result is that the licenses tend to go to where the money is – huge booze barns with racks of poker machines. Unlike Melbourne, small wine bars and cocktail bars are uncommon – unless attached to a kitchen or part of a larger complex.

Poker machines ('pokies' in the local lingo) are the scourge of Sydney's bars – changing many a lovely local into a circus of flashing lights, beeps, whistles and hypnotised gamblers. It's a brave licensee who forgoes this cash cow in favour of a more pleasant drinking environment (in NSW they suck up more than \$4 billion annually), but bigger complexes have the luxury of hiding them in a separate annexe.

LIVE MUSIC & DJS

From the 1950s jazz music made inroads into Sydney venues, and in the 1970s and '80s Aussie pub rock became a force to be reckoned with – spawning the likes of INXS, Midnight Oil, Men At Work and Cold Chisel. Although Sydney fell into a house-induced trance in the '90s, live music has started to make a comeback. You can catch a band any night of the week in dozens of inner-city pubs and clubs. Pick up the free street mags (*Drum Media, Revolver*) and check Friday's Metro section of the *Sydney Morning Herald* for what's on.

Sydney's obsession with dance music was born out of the gay scene's legendary bacchanalias – Mardi Gras, Sleaze Ball and numerous other megaparties (see p182). The crossover into mainstream youth culture in the 1990s coincided with the worldwide explosion of dance music and a flood of ecstasy tablets. Now it's so ubiquitous that it is unusual to step into any venue without a four-to-thefloor doof-doof soundtrack.

Apart from some truly world-class nightclubs, plenty of upmarket bars have DJs and dance floors. Sydney's not quite like New York or London where you can party large any night of the week, but if your booty needs shaking there are plenty of options from Wednesday through Sunday. Look for flyers, a free copy of *3D World* magazine, or call into Central Station (p127) for information and tickets for coming events.

Sydney's nightlife has had a druggy reputation for years, but that didn't prepare it for the horrible toll that an influx of crystalmethamphetamine has had on the scene (aka crystal meth, ice, P, Tina); the inane grins of e-heads have all too often given way to the psychotic grimaces of crystal addicts. Without wanting to sound like a nana, this incredibly addictive and destructive substance is best avoided.

OTHER ENTERTAINMENT

Poker competitions are the current hip addition to many pubs' midweek entertainment line-up. Other old favourites include trivia and karaoke, and you'll occasionally find comedy or poetry nights as well. Life drawing is a current fad; although we suspect the venues that offer it just like to have naked people hanging around. Most places have Sky TV for screening sports.

WHEN TO GO

Pubs generally open midmorning (later on weekends) until around midnight. In livelier areas they'll crack on until the wee small hours, and some stay open continuously. Places get busier as you head towards the weekend. The post-beach Sunday sundowner is extremely popular, and Sunday nights attract plenty of hospitality workers and hairdressers.

Clubs don't normally open their doors until 10pm, but don't expect them to get pumping until after midnight. Most close around 5am.

WHAT TO WEAR

Yes, Sydney can be flashy, but it's also very casual. Men will nearly always get away with tidy jeans, T-shirts and trainers. Thongs (flipflops, jandals), singlets (vests) and shorts are usually fine in pubs in the daytime, but can be more problematic at night. At ritzier bars and clubs it's safest to dress up. If you're a guy, getting your its out on the dance floor is de rigueur if any two of the following three is true: a) it's a gay bar; b) it's incredibly hot; and c) you're incredibly hot.

Women can generally wear whatever the hell they like, and many take this as an excuse to wear as little as possible. Dress up for cocktail bars and nightclubs. Some gay bars have a no-open-toed-shoes policy, ostensibly for safety (avoiding broken glass) but generally aimed at keeping straight women out.

WHAT TO DRINK

Beer is the staple; Tooheys New, Victoria Bitter and Carlton Cold are the most popular on tap. Order by the schooner (425ml), middy (285ml), or, if you're sharing, a jug. The cheapest places to drink are the Returned Services League (RSL) clubs. In a touristfriendly irony, locals are prevented from entering unless they're members, but visitors who live more than 5km away are welcome. You'll need to bring proof.

Australian wine is very good and most house wine available at pubs is quite drinkable. Many places now offer extensive wine lists. Cocktails (often with an Asian or Latin twist) are all the rage in the more upmarket venues, usually costing upwards of \$15.

THE ROCKS & CIRCULAR QUAY

The Rocks has had a boozed-up reputation since convict times, and several of its pubs date to that era. On George St you'll discover a tiny pub every few doors, many with live musicians performing throughout the week. While The Rocks is quite tourist-orientated, it's still an interesting stretch to explore. Cross Sydney Cove for a completely different experience; East Circular Quay is lined with modern bars serving pricey drinks to view-hungry tourists at tables spilling out onto the promenade.

BLU HORIZON BAR Map p54

Perched on the top of the Shangri La hotel tower, it's worth heading up here for one over-priced drink and a walk on the glitzy side of Sydney life.

Upstairs is icy Minus 5 (p59) and swanky cocktail lounge Bubbles.

Some are worth seeking out for their views, boutique beverages, sumptuous décor or historical interest. Most are what Sydney wags might call 'drycleaners' – good places to pick up suits. Many of them close on Sunday when the suits are shed in favour of Speedos and cocktails in the inner suburbs.
