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GAY & LESBIAN LONDON

London is, let's face it, pretty damn gay. The city of Oscar Wilde, Quentin Crisp and Elton John does not disappoint today, being a queer world capital on par with New York and San Francisco, with vast gay and lesbian communities that fan out throughout the city. There's also a superb film festival, one of the world's largest annual gay pride events, a simmering activist movement and more bars and clubs than most entire countries can claim.

Things have improved immeasurably in the past decade for gay and lesbian rights and recognition thanks almost entirely to the Labour government. Protection from discrimination is now enshrined in law, and civil partnerships now allow gay couples the same rights as straight couples, even with respect to adoption. That's not to say homophobia doesn't exist – outside the bubble of Soho, abuse on the street at public displays of affection is still shockingly common and sadly it's always best to assess the area you're in before walking hand in hand down the street.

The long-established gay village of Soho, once so central to any gay experience of London, has somewhat lost its pre-eminence in a city where redevelopment and high rentals have pushed people out to cheaper neighbourhoods. Soho retains the largest number of gay bars and pubs, and walk down Old Compton St at any time and you'll notice omnipresent gay and lesbian life, but many of the city's better clubs and venues are to be found elsewhere. The alternative two focuses of the city's gay life are in Vauxhall, south of the river, and Shoreditch, north of the City. Vauxhall, once a bleak concrete jungle, is now home to London's muscle boys, who party from Thursday to Tuesday without break. Fashionable Shoreditch is home to London's more alternative gay scene, often very well mixed in with local straight people; here you'll find arty parties, great shopping and the hipper clubs, where the muscle boys fear to tread.

The lesbian scene in London is far less visible than the flamboyant gay one, and lesbian bars are surprisingly few and far between. The most famous of these by far, the Candy Bar, is the place to head for a first-time visitor, although certain areas of the capital are well known to have large, thriving lesbian communities and are worth a visit in their own right – particularly Stoke Newington and Hackney in northeast London. DRINKING & NIGHTLIFE

The queer drinking scene in London is wonderfully varied: whether you fancy a quiet pint in a traditional boozer that just happens to be gay or want a place to wet your whistle before going out dancing, you'll be spoiled for choice. Following are our favourite bars although there are plenty more; check the gay press for comprehensive listings.

London has some of the most exciting and varied gay clubbing in the world, but it's a moveable feast, as the clubbing scene is about club nights rather than venues. Whether it's drug-addled muscle boys, fetish clubs or skinny punk-rock guys and girls you're after,

BEST GAY CLUB NIGHTS

Monday

 Popcorn (Heaven, p335) Still a great and cheap night out, Popcorn is an 'Ibiza-style club night' with a great selection of music on offer in several different rooms and refreshingly priced drinks offers.

Tuesday

 Salon (Shadow Lounge, p334) This former lap-dancing club in the heart of Soho now hosts this favourite evening for the capital's fashionistas presided over by the fantastic Minty and Talulah.

Wednesday

 Nag Nag Nag (Ghetto, p335) Still the favoured haunt of the alternative cognoscenti in Soho, Nag's disco, nuwave, synth-core and dirty electro beats make for one of the best midweek parties in town. See www.nagnagnag .info for more.

Thursday

 Rude Boyz (Fire, p336) London's notorious gay chav club attracts a young, badly behaved crowd who seem to spend most of the evening in the 'cruise cave' when they're not competing in amateur stripping contests on stage. Great fun.

Friday

- A:M (Fire, p336) One of the fiercest and most popular gay nights in Vauxhall, A:M packs in a beautiful crowd of serious clubbers for an incredible 12-hour stretch. The music features some of the best techno and electro DJs on the London scene.
- Popstarz (Scala, p302) This grand dame of gay indie has been revitalised in the past few years and often features
 excellent live bookings. It's popular with a studenty, friendly, mixed crowd. There are four rooms of great music
 from indie to the 'rubbish room'. See www.popstarz.org for more info.
- Trailertrash (Map p150; www.clubtrailertrash.com; On the Rocks, 25 Kingsland Rd, Shoreditch E2; So 10.30pmlate) Dirty electro disco brought to you by the Trailertrash crew served up every Friday in Shoreditch's sweatiest venue, but it's well worth braving the heat and grime with music this good and a crowd this friendly.

Saturday

- Duckie (Vauxhall Tavern, p336) Get here by 10.30pm to avoid a massive queue because Duckie, hosted by the marvellous Amy Lamé, is the perfect antidote to pretension on the gay scene. Great indie tunes and some of the most unusual cabaret in London await you here.
- Foreign (Bar Music Hall, p299) The Bar Music Hall is the place to be in Shoreditch, and this hyperfashionable gay night is most popular of all, hosted by Jodie Harsh and Scottee. This is the place to meet the glamorous Hoxton crowd on their own territory lots of fun. Oh, and it's free...
- G-A-Y (Astoria, p307) Love it or hate it, G-A-Y is a centre of gravity for the gay scene and seemingly where half of Soho is headed on a Saturday night when it's one of the world's largest gay clubs, attracting megastar PAs from the likes of Kylie. Bring your tight T-shirt. See www.g-a-y.co.uk for more information.
- Rebel Rebel (www.clubrebelrebel.co.uk) Held in various venues, this indie monthly (first Saturday of each month) is one to make a beeline for. Clubbers of all stripes come together for a fantastic night of indie rock, punk and pop. As well as the monthly parties, it holds specials now and again that have taken in some great venues.
- XXL (Map p126; www.xxl-london.com; 51/53 Southwark St, London Bridge SE1; 10pm-6am Sat) The world's biggest club for bears (hairy, stocky gay men) and their admirers is a real event. A very friendly crowd is spread out over a wonderfully quirky space, with two dance floors and a 'recreational maze'.

Sunday

 DTPM (Fabric, p300) The name apparently stands for Drugs Taken Per Minute, and that has some resonance when you see the glam crowd that rolls up here – none of them appear to have slept since Thursday. However, the atmosphere is incredible, with superb music in a superb venue. look no further – London has it all. The few exclusively gay clubs are listed here, while most big nights are held in straight clubs that put on a gay night or two each week. The gay press and the Gay & Lesbian section in weekly listings magazine *Time Out* are the best places to check for up-to-date club listings as things change weekly.

THE WEST END

Tucked away down a side street is this fun gay bar, full of a diverse range of people enjoying a pint or two and some evening cruising. There are frequent club nights in the downstairs area, including the very popular gay comedy night Comedy Camp every Tuesday (see opposite).

This is the hottest lesbian bar in town, a great, friendly place, with a long bar on the ground floor and a miniclub in the basement where DJs play most nights. Look out for karaoke every Tuesday, which is a blast. Men are admitted as guests to women (one man allowed per woman).

EDGE Map p68

Overlooking Soho Sq in all its four-storey glory, the Edge is London's largest gay bar and heaves from the early evening until the early hours with preclubbing revellers fuelling up for the night ahead. There's a heavy straight presence though, as it's so close to Oxford St, but it's still a fun place to start the evening.

Definitely one of Soho's hippest gay bars, and thankfully one of the few fashionable queer drinking establishments that hasn't initiated a dubious door policy or membership scheme to ensure that only the rich and beautiful arrive. A fun and up-for-it crowd assemble in the early evening, drink beer under S&M Barbie and Ken, and chill out to live DJs all evening.

Its location doesn't hurt either, where Chinatown, Soho and Covent Garden meet, and there's always something going on, from karaoke to cabaret.

The door policy is a little erratic: at quiet times you're usually fine although there's generally a £5 to £10 entry charge; other times you'll need to be with a member or a Soho 'face' to make it past the gorillas on the door.

This cool two-floor space from the people who revolutionised London's gay scene with indie club Popstarz in the 1990s has great staff and an alternative yet unpretentious feel. The lines outside can be big at the weekends, so get here early – as with most cool places in London, demand way outstrips supply. There's a small dance floor downstairs with a more relaxed lounge upstairs.

This old Soho favourite attracts a great cross section of the great and the good. It's a pretty attitude-free place, perfect for preclub drinks or just an evening out. There are DJs upstairs most nights in the cool loft area as well as the eponymous courtyard downstairs.

There's also Thursday's indie-music Mis-shapes and Saturday's trashy Wig Out.

Determinedly run-down and cheesy, the Joiners is Hoxton's only totally gay pubclub (perhaps reflecting the degree to which such distinctions are blurred around E2). It's a crowded, funky old boozer where hip gay boys hang out at the bar, dance and watch people play pool all night.

Simon Happily is the creator and host of popular gay comedy night Comedy Camp (www.comedycamp.co.uk), the 'straight friendly' Tuesday-evening show held downstairs at Barcode in Soho (see p304 and opposite).

Where did the idea for a gay comedy night come from? Before I set Comedy Camp up I'd been shocked at how many comedians still made homophobic jokes or remarks and consequently how few lesbians and gay men tended to be in the audience. So I set up Comedy Camp as a safe environment for people to watch comedy, knowing they wouldn't have to listen to homophobic jokes. It doesn't only feature gay acts – that would get boring, not to mention repetitive – but those comedians who work well with a majority lesbian and gay crowd.

So it's been a success? Within a few months we had queues stretching round the block and major comedians, including some household names, asking to perform here. I never expected Comedy Camp to get so big, let alone be so critically acclaimed by the comedy critics in the mainstream press.

So anyone can go? Comedy Camp was always designed to be a 'straight-friendly' lesbian, gay and bisexual environment. A straight comedy-club promoter told me l should call it 'gay-friendly' – I said 'no, it's "straight-friendly" and so the tag was born. It may be semantics, but it neatly sums up what the club is about. Everyone's welcome at Comedy Camp, regardless of sexuality, so long as they know and respect what they're coming to and recognise it's primarily 'our' safe space.

Best and worst of gay London? The best thing is definitely the variety due to London's large lesbian and gay population so there are lots of different places to go for different things. The worst is the large number of nightclubs that all seem to play the same heavy clubby dance music. I know they're very popular, but aren't my thing! I'm also not a fan of some of the snobbier, overpriced, more attitude-filled venues – there are plenty that are down-to-earth and better value so I'm more likely to head there.

Did London improve for gay people under Blair? Yes, London – like the UK – became much more tolerant under Tony Blair, not just in terms of equality legislation, but also there's been a clear social change – arguably his greatest legacy. Having said that, there are sadly still bigots and thugs in the capital. Personally, I like to keep my element of risk small, so while public displays of affection are unlikely to cause problems in Soho, I wouldn't risk it in some parts of the city late at night!

What would be your first act as Mayor of London? Ban cars for all but the disabled, put segregated cycling lanes on every road and bring back more trams rather than those hideous lane-hogging bendy-buses!

Here there's a friendly, laid-back, local crowd who come for a quiet drink during the week and some madcap cabaret and dancing at weekends.

Rough around the edges to say the least, the Vauxhall Tayern is the perfect antidote to the gleaming new wave of gay venues now crowding Vauxhall's gay village. Friday's Le Phreeque and Saturday's Duckie, a wonderful indie performance night hosted by Amy Lamé, are rightly considered to be two of the best club nights in London.

FURTHER RESOURCES

London has a lively free gay press documenting the ever-changing scene. You can pick up these free publications at any gay venue and it's always a good idea to do so as the listings are the most up-to-date and wideranging available. Many different magazines come and go each year, but the mainstays are the tabloids Boyz (www.boyz.co.uk) and OX (http://qxmagazine.com), and the more serious and newsy Pink Paper (www.pink paper.com). They all include weekly listings for clubs, bars and other events, and often contain flyers that grant discounted entry to various venues. Magazines on sale at most London newsagents include Gay Times (www .gay times.co.uk), Diva (www.divamag.co.uk), Attitude (www.attitude.co.uk) and AXM (www .axm-mag.com), although some less enlightened proprietors still place them on the top shelf next to the pornography.
