SLEEPING

Accommodation in London is among the most expensive on earth, and you can expect to spend a very large portion of your travel budget on it. At the same time, despite the increase in hotel rooms in recent years, demand still outstrips supply in this, the capital of Europe, so it's essential that you book at least part of your accommodation before arriving, especially during holiday periods and in summer.

Another problem here can be quality – even in the midrange. A large part of readers' letters sent to Lonely Planet about London and the *London* guide concern accommodation, many of them complaining about the quality and cleanliness of hostels, guesthouses and some hotels, 'fauna' in the rooms and the rudeness of staff. Hopefully the descriptions in this chapter will help you make your choice.

Of course it's not all bad news. A miniboom in hotel building continues apace, with thousands of new rooms expected before the Summer Olympics open here in 2012. A slew of upmarket boutique hotels have brought a real sense of style to the city's digs, and scores of midrange hotels and B&Bs are following suit. At the other end of the spectrum, some places have begun to fill a gap in the market by providing boringly functional but affordable rooms. A very exciting trend recently has been the convergence of these two extremes in a new crop of 'budget boutique' hotels, providing a bit of chic at reasonable prices.

ACCOMMODATION STYLES

London has a superb range of deluxe hotels (from £350 per double) and you'll be spoiled for choice with old classics that combine the best in traditional atmosphere and modern comforts. There's also good choice in the topend category (anything from £180 to £350), which offers superior comforts without the prestige. Also in this bracket you'll find many of the boutique and style hotels that have sprung up in recent years. Below £180 there's a bit of a slide in quality and choice. Although there's an increasing number of terrific places to rest your head without haemorrhaging your budget, it's still not enough. And if you were expecting to spend less than £100 a night on a double room during the week, your lodgings probably won't provide the most cherished memories of your trip. (On the other hand, you will find some good weekend deals for that price.) In London, cheap means less than £80 per en suite double. After B&Bs,

the cheapest forms of accommodation are hostels, both the official Youth Hostel Asssociation (YHA) ones, of which there are six in London, and the (usually) hipper, more party-orientated independent ones.

Hotel rooms in the UK are subject to a 17.5% 'value added tax' or VAT. Many hotels quote rates inclusive of VAT, while others do not so it always pays to ask if you are uncertain. Remember, though, that many hotels – especially deluxe ones – regularly offer promotional deals on the internet that are much lower than their published rates. Unless otherwise indicated, accommodation prices quoted in this book include breakfast.

The accommodation options in this guide are listed by area and then by price, from most to least expensive. See the boxed text, left, for more information on accommodation prices. The choice is enormous, but the lower end is consistently oversubscribed, so if your budget is limited it's a good idea to book well ahead. LONGER-TERM RENTALS Apartments & Serviced Apartments

If you are visiting London for a few weeks or several months, staying in a short-term or serviced apartment is the best way to get a sense of living in the city. Many agencies in *Loot* (p396) or other small ads have pretty insalubrious properties; ask to see rooms first. Some better agencies and their daily rates are listed here.

Rooms & Flats

Most newcomers to the city still find leasing expensive (note that almost all rented accommodation in London is furnished). At the very bottom end, bedsits (£300 to £600 per month) are single furnished rooms, usually with a shared bathroom and kitchen, and they are always pretty grim. A step up is a self-contained studio (from £600), which normally has a separate bathroom and kitchen. You'll rarely get a two-bedroom flat for less than £1000. Shared accommodation offers the best value, at £300 and upwards for a room in a flat or a house with several bedrooms. Most landlords demand a security deposit (normally one month's rent) plus a month's rent in advance. lonelyplanet.com

The London tourist organisation Visit London (%0870 156 6366; www.visitlondon.com) offers a free booking service with a wide range of accommodation options and always has special deals. There's also the British Hotel Reservation Centre (%7340 1616; www.bhconline.com), which has kiosks at Gatwick Airport, Heathrow Airport and Paddington, Waterloo and Victoria stations. There's also a kiosk on the mezzanine level of the Britain Visitor Centre (p400). Another excellent source for hotel bookings and discounts is LondonTown (%7437 4370; www.londontown.com).

AIRPORT HOTELS

London's airports have plenty of hotels to cater for passengers with early morning flights. If you're one of these, the best thing to do is to go to the relevant airport website (see p381) and click on 'Airport Information' where you'll find a link to hotels at or near the airport and the best rates currently available. Otherwise, these easy options are worth considering:

Hilton Gatwick (%01293-518080; www.hilton.co.uk/gatwick; South Terminal, London Gatwick Airport; r from £159) Conveniently connected to the airport building via a short walkway, this hotel is notable for its very large rooms and triple glazing.

Radisson SAS Stansted (%01279-661012; www.stansted.radissonsas.com; Waltham Close, London Stansted Airport; r from £149) A two- to three-minute walk from the main terminal building, this hotel has 500 rooms in three 'styles': Urban (mostly red), Ocean (mostly blue) and Chili (mostly yellow). We don't know, either.

Park Inn Heathrow (%8759 6611; www.rezidorparkinn.com; Bath Rd, Heathrow; s/d from £127/145) With 880 rooms, the largest of the Heathrow hotels and one of the closest to the airport, this is much more luxurious than you'd expect for the money, but is sometimes overrun with guests. Take H2 Hoppa Bus (£4 per person).

WHERE TO STAY

Where you choose to stay in London will have an effect on the kind of time you have here and the image of London you'll take home, so geography should be as important a consideration as comfort, style and expense. Base yourself in the West End and you'll soon get into the throbbing rhythm of London at play. If your idea of the British capital is one of stately Georgian houses, Regency crescents and private parks in the centre of leafy squares, book a place in Chelsea or Mayfair. Hoxton, Clerkenwell and Shoreditch are where it's at right now, and there are a few good places to stay here at London's cutting edge. Culture vultures and/or those with literary aspirations should look to Kensington, Bloomsbury or even Fitzrovia. Want workaday London, with barrow boys shouting out their wares in Cockney accents alongside ethnic Pakistanis selling prayer rugs? Choose somewhere out in the East End. If you want to feel how most Londoners live, you might hang out in Camden or Stoke Newington. If you don't care how Londoners live, you might pause with the travelling circus in Earl's Court or Shepherd's Bush.

THE WEST END

You're really at the hub of London life in the West End, where you won't have to worry about running for the last tube home. The city's major theatres, as well some of its best dining and drinking, is right on your doorstep, as are many major attractions. Of course such a privilege doesn't come cheaply. Moderately priced hotels in the centre are as scarce as hen's teeth. Having said that Bloomsbury is a haven of B&Bs and guesthouses, and tucked away in leafy Cartwright Gardens, north of Russell Sq and within easy walking distance of the West End, you'll find some of central London's best-value small hotels. At the other end of the accommodation spectrum Mayfair can boast hotels so grand that many of them are tourist attractions in their own right.

Bedrooms boast a wealth of seductive details, including mahogany four-poster beds, Victorian claw-foot tubs, sumptuous fabrics and genuine antiques. It's a listed building so there is no lift.

PICCADILLY BACKPACKERS Map p68

The most central of London's six YHA hostels is basic, clean, loud and not particularly all that welcoming. Most of the 76 beds are in twin rooms though there are dormitories with three and four beds. There is a large kitchen but no meals are served apart from a packed breakfast.

Its 204 rooms have floorto-ceiling windows with sweeping West End views, the public rooms are bustling meeting points, and everything (and everyone) is beautiful. The overwhelmingly yellow reception area plays havoc with some complexions.

It's the progeny of Tim and Kit Kemp and it shows – from the hand-painted Gournay wallpaper to the 18m pool with funky drawing room.

Built on the site of the old Savoy Palace in 1889, the Savoy has welcomed the high, the mighty and the not-untalented, including a certain Monsieur Monet who immortalised the views from the 'river rooms' on canvas. Fun fact: the Savoy's forecourt is the only street in the British Isles where motorists must drive on the right.

Along with 214 rooms, which have dorm rooms of between four and 14 beds, there are pool tables, safe-deposit boxes and a large eating area, but no kitchen.

FITZROVIA

With the West End perpetually overrun by crowds, the City is refreshingly quiet at weekends, yet offers easy access to such attractions as the Tower of London and the restaurants and bars of Shoreditch and Hoxton.

CHAINS WITHOUT FRILLS

London counts several discount hotel chains that offer clean and modern – if not especially full of character – accommodation for reasonable rates.

EasyHotel (www.easyhotel.com) uses the same pricing model as its sister easyJet airline to get bods on beds. It's a functional hotel that offers the best deals to early birds, with rates from £35 to £60 per room. Each of the garishly orange plastic-moulded rooms contains a bed next to a sink and a shower and toilet unit. There are no phones in the rooms, TV is an optional extra (as is cleaning and fresh linen at £10 a pop) and some rooms have no windows. There are several branches in London, including easyHotel Earl's Court (Map p177; 14 Lexham Gardens SW5; Cloucester Rd) and easyHotel Victoria (Map pp138–9; 36-40 Belgrave Rd SW1; Victoria).

Express by Holiday Inn (%0800 434 040; www.hiexpress.co.uk) is the most upmarket of the chains listed here, and is most notable for its clever locations. Of the 18 or so properties in greater London, for example, is the so-called London City branch (Map p150; %7300 4300; 275 Old St EC1; t Old St) in the heart of the Shoreditch nightlife area and the Southwark branch (Map p126; %7401 2525; 103-109 Southwark St SE1; t Southwark or London Bridge) just behind the Tate Modern. Rates vary wildly but start at about £115 for a double during the week and sink to as low as £70 at the weekend.

Premier Travel Inn (%0870 242 8000; www.premiertravelinn.com) is London's original cheap chain, herding them in and out of mostly converted older buildings at 18 properties. Hotels are fairly bare-bones beds are soft, the second bed is a pull-out sofa and there are more rules here than in a Victorian grammar school, but at from £94 a night per room on weekdays (£82 at weekends), few guests complain. The original property is in County Hall (Map p126; %0870 238 3300; Belvedere Rd SE1; t Waterloo) near the London Eye but it doesn't have river views. The Euston branch (Map p168; %0870 238 3301; 1 Duke's Rd WC1; t Euston or King's Cross) is handy to the train stations but is on a very busy street.

Travelodge (≫0870 085 0950; www.travelodge.co.uk) charges roughly the same price as Premier Travel Inn. Here you get a nicer room, but few public facilities; there's usually no lounge, the reception areas are small and service can be rather brusque. Of the 16 properties in greater London, central ones include the Travelodge Liverpool Street (Map p110; ≫0870 191 1689; 1 Harrow PI E1; Aldgate), which is just west of Petticoat Lane, and the Travel Lodge Covent Garden (Map pp72–3; %0870 191 1745; 10 Drury Lane WC2; Holborn or Covent Garden).
