# DRINKING

It may be the biggest city in an officially Muslim country, but İstanbul's population likes nothing more than a drink or two. If the raki-soaked atmosphere in the city's meyhanes isn't a clear enough indicator, a foray into Beyoğlu's thriving bar scene will confirm this fact. If you're in the mood for a drink, we suggest you go out on the town on a Thursday, Friday or Saturday night. Alternatively, you could check out the alcohol-free, atmosphere-rich cay bahçesis (tea gardens) or kahvehanes (coffee houses) dotted around Sultanahmet and over the Galata Bridge in Tophane. These are great places to relax and sample a Turkish institution, the nargileh (water pipe), and a cup of Türk kahvesi (Turkish coffee) or cay (tea).

# SULTANAHMET Sadly, there are few pleasant bars in Sultan-

ahmet. The joints along Akbıyık Caddesi are great for backpackers and unthinkable for evervone else. Don't despair, though. Why not substitute tobacco or caffeine for alcohol and visit one of the many atmospheric *cay bahcesis* dotted around the neighbourhood?

We agonised about whether to include this rooftop bar-restaurant in the book or not. Its amazing views are certainly worthy of comment, but like everyone in Sultanahmet, we're deeply disturbed as to how the place managed to get a permit to build so high, dominate the skyline (not felicitously) and obscure the views of so many other businesses. On top of this, the waiters here can be spectacularly disinterested in serving guests who only want a drink - the money (and tips) are clearly in the substandard fish dishes the place serves and not in the pricey drinks. Hmm.

Generations of backpackers have joined locals in claiming one of its cushioned benches under coloured lights and enjoying a tea and nargileh. There's sporadic live Turkish music in the evening and a dervish performance at 8pm and 10pm.

# **DERVIŞ AİLE ÇAY BAHÇESİ** Map p50

The Dervis' paved courtyard, which is superbly located directly opposite the Blue Mosque, beckons patrons with its comfortable cane chairs and shady trees. Efficient service, reasonable prices and peerless people-watching opportunities make it a great place for a leisurely tea, nargileh and game of backgammon.

# NARGILEHS: NAUGHTY BUT NICE

When ordering a nargileh, you'll need to specify what type of tobacco you would like. Most people opt for elma (when the tobacco has been soaked in apple juice, giving it a sweet flavour and scent), but it's possible to order it unadulterated (tömbeki). The water pipe will be brought to your table, hot coals will be placed in it to get it started and you will be given a disposable plastic mouthpiece to slip over the pipe's stem. Just draw back and you're off. Bliss!

The drinks are expensive - a fresh juice or a beer will cost YTL9, for instance – but as the old adage says, quality doesn't come cheaply.

If the boza is too confrontational for you, the bar also serves *şıra*, a fermented grape juice.

These days they have to fight for space with tourists, who love the quirky 'flying dervish' murals, the old photographs on the walls, and the cheap tea and coffee.

# **GALATA & TOPHANE**

There aren't too many bars and cafés around this area, but you'll find a raft of incredibly popular nargileh cafés in the park behind the Tophane tram stop (Map p103). There's nothing gained by us singling out one of these joints at the expense of the others – they're all redolent with the smell of apple tobacco and packed with trendy teetotallers.

Whether you want to drink a few quiet ales in a cosy pub, down a martini or two in a sophisticated bar or party the night away in its pumping next-door neighbour, the streets and lanes off İstiklal Caddesi will have the drinking spot for you. This is where the city's barflies and party set hang out (when they're not down on the shores of the Bosphorus) and it's great fun.

Coffee culture is also something that is embraced on this side of the Galata Bridge. In fact, we will go so far as to say that Beyoğlu has gone batty over its beans, and really needs to calm down. At the time of research there were seven multinational coffee-chain franchises on İstiklal Caddesi. In our view, that's caffeine addiction that's got truly out of hand ...

You can while away the night in glamorous nightclubs on the Bosphorus – where you'll spend your entire holiday budget in one night if you're not careful – or you can drink rakı while listening to live fasıl music at one of the city's many cheap and rowdy meyhanes. With an almost religious devotion to all forms of music and a great love of dance, it's rare to have a week go by when there's not a special event, festival or performance scheduled (see also p16) in İstanbul. In short, the only thing you can't do in this town is be bored.

# **Tickets & Reservations**

If you can't make it to the box office, or if there isn't one for the venue, try **Biletix** ( **a** 216-4541555, 216-556 9800; www.biletix.com). It's a major ticket seller for all kinds of events from festivals and big-name concerts to football matches. Biletix outlets are found in many spots throughout the city, but the most convenient for travellers is probably the one at the **Istanbul Kitapçsı** ( **a** 212-2929518; Istikla (addesi 79-81, Beyoğlu). Alternatively, you can buy tickets by credit card on Biletix's website and collect them from the venue before the concert.

Who cares if İstanbul's in Europe or Asia? All we know is that it's developing a great club and live-music scene. The horrible 1980s covers and saccharine Turkish pop that used to be inflicted on club-goers are increasingly being replaced by Middle Eastern fusion beats, techno and jazz-influenced tracks. If you're like us, you'll rarely see the daylight during your stay.

When Istanbullus go out clubbing they dress to kill. If you don't do the same, you'll be unlikely to get past the door bitches (usually buffed young hunks) at the mega-venues on the Bosphorus. Fortunately, you'll have no trouble in venues in other parts of town as these cater to the transient crowd and couldn't give a toss what labels you're wearing.

As is the case with bars and restaurants, most of the clubbing action is in Beyoğlu or along the Bosphorus. The only thing to do at night in Sultanahmet is leave. Clubs are busiest on Friday and Saturday nights, and the action doesn't really kick off until 1am. Many of the clubs close down from June or July – when the party crowd moves down to Turkey's southern coasts – until the end of September. Those clubbers who stay in town tend to flock to the open-air waterfront spots such as Sortie and Reina.

# LIVE JAZZ

İstanbul has seen an increase in the number of dedicated jazz venues in recent years, all of which have very different styles. These include the smoky atmosphere and unpretentious décor of Nardis, the opulent trappings of Q Jazz by Les Ottomans and dinner sessions at the Istanbul Jazz Center. During the popular International Istanbul Jazz Festival (p17) and Akbank Jazz Festival (p17), other live-music sites host events.

Its line-up of performers is exceptionally good; some come from the winners' ranks of its yearly amateur contest and others are visiting international artists. Different daily performers make every visit fresh and serendipitous – book ahead.

# LIVE TURKISH MUSIC

Turks are proud of their traditional music (see p33) and, whether young or old, will usually be familiar enough with the most popular folk and fasil numbers to sing along in bars or meyhanes. One of the most entertaining experiences you can possibly have while visiting İstanbul is to have dinner at a fasıl venue where the guests take turns in serenading the restaurant with their favourite songs. Several restaurants in the Balık Pazarı (p110) and on Nevizade Sokak (p167) are among a number of places in Beyoğlu that now offer this type of sing-and-dance-along entertainment with their reasonably priced menus. Others have a set meal deal with either limited or unlimited booze. Make sure to tip when the musicians come to your table, nothing extravagant but substantial enough to be appreciated (YTL5 to YTL 10 per person is about right). When booking at a meyhane (it's not necessary to book at bars), try to opt for a Friday or Saturday night - on other nights restaurant management might tell musicians not to come in if numbers are low.

Come prepared to sing along.

# **GAY & LESBIAN İSTANBUL**

All gay and lesbian listings in this book (clubs, hamams and bars) were written by René Ames, an İstanbul resident and freelance writer for *Time Out İstanbul*. René also updated the sections on clubbing, live jazz and live Turkish Music.

Having previously lived in New York, Switzerland, London and Spain, René is well qualified to assess how the gay and lesbian scene stacks up against its equivalents in the world's other big cities. He describes it as being just as lively and energy-sapping, but adds that the current impetus towards Europe makes it even more dynamic. 'People have that feeling of liberation, knowing that the European Union is hovering and showing interest in Turkey's human rights situation. It's like being in the cusp of a major historical turnover; very similar to the La Movida moment before Spain joined the rest of Europe, a truly exhilarating time when you can feel and live the possibilities.'

Asked about how the scene differs to those of its European sister cities he says, 'There are more tranny bars here than in New York or London or any other European capital. Leather and fetish clubs are the only ones absent in this mosaic, except when held as party themes. And we don't have dark rooms and naughty nooks like in some Western gay venues, meaning that most action needs to be done in private. The only public sex available is in a seedy cinema on İstiklal Caddesi showing heterosexual erotic films, or via furtive flings in dark alleys.'

The furtiveness may be due in part to the ambiguous legal status of homosexuality here; René points out that while Turkey has no laws against homosexuality, it has none in favour of it, either. 'In other words, it's neither legal nor illegal and that's where the problem is, because gays can be prosecuted or just plain harassed by the authorities under other legal statutes. Most telling is the fact that there are no antidiscriminatory laws covering sexual identity in this country; this is what the EU wants changed.' René is yet to witness police action leading to a closure of a gay venue, but he has been present when police visit and check everyone's *kimlik* (identity cards). He also notes that the hamam scene is changing: 'Police have been pretty vigilant against lewdness in hamams, too, so much so that bathhouse habitués say that the traditional homoerotic undercurrents in these bathhouses have changed considerably'.

Unfortunately, there are few organisations fighting for gay rights in Turkey. René describes the best known of these, Lambda Istanbul (www.lambdaistanbul.org in Turkish), as 'a far cry from their counterparts elsewhere', and comments that when he recently visited to try and gauge its political stance on the present situation in Turkey regarding the ascent of AKP, the implications of a Gül presidency and the impact of an impending socio-cultural overhaul after the last elections, the organisation's spokespeople had no comments to make: 'Either they were timid and not prone to open their mouths or they haven't done their homework... When I was in their office they were decorating and they seemed more interested in that task than to put their agenda out through a sympathetic member of the media.'

Asked to nominate an İstanbul gay icon, René is emphatic: 'That would have to be Ahmet Kural, one of my *Time Out* interviewees, who is credited with establishing the first gay bar in İstanbul. His bar (1001 Gece in Taksim) is still popular, though it now predominantly caters for chicks-with-dicks chasers.'

# **NIGHTLIFE RIP-OFFS**

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Foreigners, especially single foreign males, are targets for a classic İstanbul rip-off that works like this. You're a single male out for a stroll in the afternoon or evening. A well-spoken, well-dressed Turk strikes up a conversation and says he knows a 'good place where we can have a drink and chat' or a 'great nightspot' etc. You enter, sit down and immediately several women move to your table and order drinks. When the drinks come, you're asked to pay – anywhere from YTL200 to however much money you have with you. It's a mugging and if you don't pay up, they take you into the back office and take it from you.

A variation is a single foreign male having a drink and a meal at the Çiçek Pasajı. Several Turkish friends strike up a conversation, then suggest you all take a taxi to another place. In the taxi, they forcibly relieve you of your wallet.

How do you avoid such rip-offs? As many Turks are generous, hospitable, curious and gregarious, it's difficult to know whether an invitation is genuine (as it most often is) or the prelude to a mugging. Tread carefully if there's any reason for suspicion. As for nightclub recommendations, take them from a trusted source, such as your hotel clerk.
