# SHOPPING

Eager to change your look to blend in with the casual-but-sophisticated Spanish crowd? Tired of bull postcards and tacky flamenco posters? Convinced that your discerning friends back home have taste that extends beyond a polka-dot flamenco dress? In Madrid you'll find it all, as well as English-language bookshops, stores selling Spanish food delicacies and cutting-edge homewares. This is a fantastic city in which to shop and madrileños are some of the finest exponents of the art.

The key to shopping Madrid style is knowing where to look. Salamanca is the home of upmarket fashions, with chic boutiques lining up to showcase the best that Spanish and international designers have to offer. Some of it spills over into Chueca, but Malasaña is Salamanca's true alter ego, home to fashion that's as funky as it is offbeat and ideal for that studied underground look that will fit right in with Madrid's hedonistic after-dark crowd. Central Madrid – whether it's Sol, Huertas or La Latina – offers plenty of individual surprises, although there's little uniformity in what you'll find. That sense is multiplied a hundred-fold in El Rastro market, where madrileños converge in epic numbers on Sunday to pick through the junk in search of treasure.

## LOS AUSTRIAS, SOL & CENTRO

The maze of streets around the Plaza Mayor and extending up towards Gran Vía have something for everyone. These are fine streets in which to window-shop unless you're after something specific.

## **SALES & OPENING HOURS**

The peak shopping season is during *las rebajas*, the annual winter and summer sales, when prices are slashed on just about everything. The winter sales begin around 7 January, just after Three Kings' Day, and last well into February. Summer sales begin in early July and last into August.

The shopping day starts at about 10am and is often broken up by a long lunch from 2pm to 5pm, except in larger stores. Shops reopen after lunch and stay busy until 8pm or even later. Shops selling music and books, as well as some convenience stores, are the only outlets allowed to open every Sunday, although all shops may (and most usually do) open on the first Sunday of every month and throughout December. There are plans to allow more shops to open on Sunday.

## **TAXES & REFUNDS**

Value-added tax (VAT) is known as impuesto sobre el valor añadido (IVA; EE-ba). On accommodation and restaurant prices, IVA is 7% and is usually - but not always - included in guoted prices. On retail goods IVA is 16%.

Visitors are entitled to a refund of the 16% IVA on purchases costing more than €90.16, from any shop, if the goods are taken out of the European Union (EU) within three months. Ask the shop for a cashback refund form showing the price and IVA paid for each item, and identifying the vendor and purchaser; then present the form at the customs booth for IVA refunds when you depart from Spain (or elsewhere from the EU). At this point, you'll need your passport and a boarding card that shows you're leaving the EU. The officer will stamp the invoice and you hand it in at a bank at the departure point for the reimbursement. There are refund offices in terminals T1, T2 and T4 at Barajas airport as you're departing from Madrid.

Always wanted to be a torero but didn't have a thing to wear? This is where Spain's toreros come to have their traje de luces (suit of lights, the traditional glittering bullfighting suit) made in all its intricate excess. A custom-made suit starts at €2500, a muleta (cape) goes for €155, while the sexy pink tights are a steal at €50.

## LA LATINA & LAVAPIÉS

La Latina is very much an after-dark or weekend barrio. That said, this is one of the most popular barrios for a hip, well-to-do urban crowd and the small boutiques dotted around the narrow streets reflect this clientele, especially when it comes to designer jewellery. But it's also the barrio that throngs with Sunday bargain hunters drawn here by El Rastro and you'll also come across curio shops so specialised that you wonder how they ever keep going. Down into Lavapiés, the barrio's large immigrant population has fostered a fascinating mix of ethnic shops (Asian food markets, Muslim halal butchers and stores selling gifts imported from China).

## **EL RASTRO & THE FLEA MARKETS OF MADRID**

Flea markets, fresh markets, crafts markets...bargain hunters will have a field day in Madrid. The city's biggest and best-known market is **El Rastro**, by some accounts the largest flea market in Europe and a thriving mass of vendors, buyers, pickpockets and the generally curious. This classic flea market, open on Sunday morning only, has been an open-air market for half a millennium.

The madness begins at the Plaza de Cascorro, near La Latina metro stop, and worms its way downhill along the Calle de la Ribera de Curtidores and the streets off it. The shopping starts at about 8am and lasts until 2pm or 3pm, but for many madrileños the best of El Rastro comes after the stalls have shut and everyone crowds into the nearby bars of La Latina for an *aperitivo* (appetizer) of vermouth and tapas.

Apart from El Rastro, other curious local markets include the following:

You could easily spend an entire morning inching your way down the Calle de la Ribera de Curtidores and through the maze of streets that hosts El Rastro flea market every Sunday morning. Cheap clothes, luggage, old flamenco records, even older photos of Madrid, faux designer purses, grungy T-shirts, household goods and electronics are the main fare, but for every 10 pieces of junk, there's a real gem (a lost masterpiece, an Underwood typewriter) waiting to be found. Antiques are also a major drawcard for traders and treasure hunters alike.

A word of warning: pickpockets love El Rastro as much as everyone else, so keep a tight hold on your belongings and don't keep valuables in easy-to-reach pockets.

## **HUERTAS & ATOCHA**

Although you'll stumble across some quirky little boutiques tucked away in the lanes of the Barrio de las Letras, you wouldn't come to Huertas just for the shopping. Most of the shops of interest are in the streets close to the Plaza de la Puerta del Sol.

You don't see them much these days, but the exquisite fringed and embroidered *mantones* and *mantoncillos* (traditional Spanish shawls worn by women on grand occasions) and delicate *mantillas* (Spanish veils) are stunning and uniquely Spanish gifts. Inside this dark shop, dating back to 1880, the sales clerks still wait behind a long counter to attend to you; the service hasn't changed in years and that's no bad thing. Our only complaint? Kitsch tourist souvenirs (T-shirts and the like) have made an appearance here.

You just don't find wine stores like this any more – family run, friendly, with knowledgeable staff, and still decorated in the original 1913 style with wooden shelves and even a ceiling fresco. There are fine wines in abundance (mostly Spanish, and a few foreign bottles) with some 500 labels on show or tucked away out the back.

You can even develop your photos here. And no, there's not a *lomo* (of the cured Spanish meat variety) in sight.

The Paseo del Prado is more about grand art galleries and afternoon promenades, but there is one Madrid shopping tradition that you really must seek out.

Undernation would look right at home in Malasaña with hard-core clothing and accessories with black and underground slogans the recurring themes. But, perhaps in a nod to its Chueca locale, Undernation stocks brands like Franklin & Marshall and the shop has none of the grungy atmosphere that usually accompanies the look.
