## **ON THE STREET**

## From Catholic kitsch to rings made from computer keys, Neapolitan shopping is funky and offbeat.

Forget multinational malls and homogenised high Streets. In Naples, retail therapy is as idiosyncratic as the city itself. Chain stores do exist but they play second fiddle to specialised shops owned by enterprising locals: from vintage delis crammed with local produce to artists' lounge rooms stocked with unorthodox sculpture.

Neapolitans are seasoned shoppers, and Saturday morning is their favourite time to shop. Even busier than Saturday mornings (but worth the bumps and bruises) are the sales, which take place from January to mid-March and from early July to early September. Stock is reduced at these times by up to 75% and smaller shops generally offer the best buys to shoppers.

Different neighbourhoods offer very different shopping experiences. For the hot and the haute, head to Chiaia where Via Calabritto, Via dei Mille and Via G Filangieri read like a *Vogue* directory. This is the place for Armani, Zegna and legendary local tailors like Finamore and Borrelli (see p143). Chiaia is also great for sleek homewares and cuttingedge jewellery. Just off Piazza dei Martiri, Via Domenico Morelli is the place for antiques, while Via Chiaia heaves with midprice fashion chains.

At its eastern end Via Chiaia spills onto Via Toledo, the city's buzzing high street. A prime spot to people-watch, this is where you'll find everything from upmarket department stores to chintzy *bomboniere* (christening mementos) shops.

Catch the funicular to Vomero for preppy purchases, or better still go east for trad, kooky and kitsch in the gritty centro storico (historic centre). Here, specialty streets include Via

Port'Alba for secondhand bookshops, Via San Sebastiano for musical instruments and Via San Gregorio Armeno for beautifully crafted *presepi* (nativity scenes).

South of the centro storico you'll find frenetic Corso Umberto I, where cashedup teens come for cool, cheap threads and funky trainers. Further south around Piazzetta Orefici (Goldsmiths' Sq), the Borgo degli Orefici (Goldsmiths' Quarter) is the city's traditional home of bling.

But for the ultimate Neapolitan shopping fix, hit the legendary markets. Home to one of the world's biggest counterfeit scenes, Naples will provide you with anything from bootleg CDs and kinky knickers to convincing Gucci fakes – all at dirt-cheap prices. Don't forget to haggle, and watch your wallet – pickpockets love to shop here too.

Shops are usually open from 9.30am to 1.30pm and 4.30pm to 8pm (in winter) or 4pm to 8.30pm (in summer) Monday to Saturday, closing on Monday mornings in winter and Saturday afternoons in summer. Small boutiques or speciality shops might not open until 10am, and afternoon hours might be shorter. Department stores and larger chains are open from 9.30am to 8.30pm. Many shops throughout the city are closed in August. Where opening hours are listed in the reviews below, it indicates that they vary from standard opening times.

A value-added tax of 20%, known as Imposta de Valore Aggiunto (IVA), is slapped onto just about everything. If you are a non-EU resident and spend more than  $\in$ 180 in a single shop at once, you can claim a refund when you leave the country. See p251 for more information. Postpurchase, make sure you're given a receipt. By law, the *guardia de finanza* (finance police) can make a spot check outside the shop, and if you don't have a receipt you may be fined.

## CENTRO STORICO & MERCATO BERISIO MAP PP280-1 BOOKS

## THE BEST OF NEAPOLITAN KITSCH

Flashing halos, Godfather bling, action-packed *pastori* (nativity-scene figurines) – Naples is a kitsch-lover's paradise. For a taste of old-school trash and tack, hit the following garish gems:

ARTISAN CRAFT

Arte in Movimento (Map pp280–1; 🙆 081 420 10 94; Via San Biagio dei Librai 33; M Dante) Head here for motorised *pastori* and hand-painted Neapolitan clichés. Best of the bunch is a bending *pizzaiolo* (pizza maker) complete with fiery oven.

La Galleria delle Bomboniere (Map pp280–1; 🖾 081 551 80 95; Via Enrico Pessina 76; M Dante) Southern Italian chintz at its overstated best – think Communion-themed photo frames, mock-baroque jewellery boxes, glass pumpkin carriages and chirpy ceramic squirrels.

Napolimania (Map pp280–1; 🖾 081 41 41 20; Via Toledo 312; 💭 CS to Via Toledo) Tacky and proud of it, this offbeat shrine to local pop culture is the place for plastic Totò statues, Neapolitan 'survival kits' and cheeky jocks with bawdy local slang.

Via Francesco Caracciolo (Map pp284–5; 💭 C25 to Riviera di Chiaia) The stalls along the sea on Via Caracciolo are the place for over-the-top seashell souvenirs and bright plastic Madonnas.

Via Mezzocannone (Map pp280–1; 🖨 E1 to Via Mezzocannone) Another great street for Catholic kitsch, here you'll find anything from the Virgin Mary with a blinking crown to a glow-in-the-dark Jesus.

## **MARKET TIME**

Naples' legendary markets are loud, intoxicating and just a little bit edgy, so hang on to your wallet. Beware the digital/video camera scam – the result, in short, is that you buy an empty box. If you *are* tempted, then insist that you buy the particular camera being demonstrated, rather than the prepackaged one. Most designer goods are fakes (but perfect copies) and vendors are open to haggling, except where specified below. The following markets are the cream of the crop:

**Bancarelle a San Pasquale** (Map pp284–5; Via San Pasquale, Via Imbriani & Via Carducci; 论 8am-2pm Mon-Wed, Fri & Sat, closed Aug; 🖨 C25 to Riviera di Chiaia) Hit the stalls on Via Imbriani for hip threads, sarongs and avantgarde jewellery. The section between Via Carducci and Via San Pasquale is great for fish, spices, fruit and vegetables. Not a place for haggling.

Fiera Antiquaria Napoletana (Map pp284–5; Villa Comunale;  $\mathfrak{S}$  8am-2pm last Sun of month, closed Aug;  $\square$  C25 to Riviera di Chiaia) Set on the waterfront, this is a cool, laid-back spot for vintage silverware, jewellery, furniture, paintings, prints and wonderful, overpriced junk.

La Duchessa (Map pp280–1; Via S G Calasanzio & surrounding streets; S am-2pm Mon-Sat, closed Aug; R R2 to Piazza Garibaldi) Packed, gritty and obscenely cheap, this multiethnic hot spot heaves with counterfeit booty, from bootlegged blockbusters and porn to fake D&G belts and Prada bags. Stock up on African knick-knacks, soccer tops and cheap knickers.

La Pignasecca (Map pp280–1; Via Pignasecca & surrounding streets; 论 8am-1pm; M Montesanto) Naples' oldest and (arguably) best market is *the* place for food. You'll find everything from fresh mozzarella and crunchy Casareccio bread to meat, fish and artichokes. It's also good for discounted perfume and linen, kitchenware, Neapolitan hip-hop CDs and cheap (fake) designer bags and threads.

Mercatino di Antignano (Map p283; Piazza degli Artisti; 论 8am-1pm Mon-Sat, closed Aug; M Medaglie D'Oro) Up high in Vomero, this place is popular for bags, jewellery, linen, kitchenware, shoes, new and end-of-season clothing. And a hysterical stall owner who throws underwear in the air while screaming out *Un euro!* Un euro! (One euro! One euro!)

Mercatino di Posillipo (Map p287; Parco Virgiliano; 论 8am-2pm Thu, closed Aug; 🗐 140 to Viale Virgilio) Not the cheapest market, but the best for quality goods. Top buys include genuine designer labels (although the D&G and Louis Vuitton bags are fakes), women's swimwear, underwear and linen. It's only the African vendors at the bottom of the hill who don't mind a haggle.

Mercato dei Fiori (Map pp280–1; Castel Nuovo; 论 dawn-noon; 🖨 R2 to Piazza del Municipio) Got a date? Then pick up a fresh bunch of roses at the city's flower market.

Mercato di Poggioreale (Map pp278–9; Via Nuova Poggioreale;  $\bigotimes$  8am-1pm Fri-Mon, closed Aug;  $\widehat{M}$  Gianturco) Set in the city's old slaughterhouse there are 40 shoe stalls alone that sell hot designer overstock and no-frills everyday brands. Equally fab are the cheap casual wear, suits, colourful rolls of fabrics and kitchenware.

Porta Nolana (Map pp280–1; Via Nolana; 🖄 8am-6pm; 📾 R2 to Piazza Garibaldi) A heady, sprawling wonderland of bellowing fishmongers, industrious Chinese traders and contraband cigarette stalls. Grab a grilled cob of corn and hit the trestled streets for fresh fish and fruit, cheap watches, nifty gadgets and compilation CDs from the '80s.

# top five SHOPPING STRIPS

## Via Toledo (Map pp280–1)

Head to the pedestrianised southern end, with its slick boutiques, *sfogliatella* (cinnamon-infused ricotta in a puff-pastry shell) stalls, street artists and dressed-to-impress strollers.

### Via dei Tribunali (Map pp280–1) It's just a few hundred metres but the stretch between Piazza San Gaetano and Via Atri is an electric combo of old-school delis, grocery shops, much-loved restaurants and a nativity-scene tailor.

### Via Chiaia (Map pp278–9)

This savvy strip tempts with cute boutiques, sharp designer outfits, sassy shoes, fancy accessories and sleek, gleaming homewares.

Via San Gregorio Armeno (Map pp280–1) Vintage artisan studios and shops burst with the best and the kitschiest of Neapolitan *presepe* (nativity scene) figurines (see p140).

Via Calabritto (Map pp284–5) Rodeo Drive, Napoli-style. Polish that gold Amex and hit the cobbled pavement for A-list fashion from Armani to Zegna. Window-shopping doesn't get any better than this.

products, a fashionable florist, a sassy bar/ restaurant and a fabulous day spa complete with glam *hammam* (communal bathhouse). Shop for silk slippers, sip a Campari, then get horizontal for a spot of shiatsu.

Neapolitan style queens head here for exquisitely cut jackets, skirts and trousers, and fabulous leather handbags. Think *Vogue*meets-*Harpers Bazaar*, with labels including Etro, Blumarine, Malo and Cucinelli. Prices start at around €250 for separates.

## EDDY MONETTI MEN'S STORE MAP PP284-5 BOUTIOUE

The menswear branch of Eddy Monetti is an elegant den of Burberry blazers, Ralph Lauren shirts and irresistible cashmere sweaters. The vibe here is monied and the service suitably snooty.

There's nothing restrained about the ultracool menswear collection here: paint-splashed denim, hot-pink shirts, striped pastel knitwear and sexy pinstriped suits. Match it all up with hip footwear from Pantofola d'Oro, Carshoe and Abercrombie & Fitch.

### INTERFOOD MAP PP284-5

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WINE

This little *enoteca* (wine bar) in Santa Lucia stocks mainly Campanian vino, a rising star on the Italian wine scene. Among the better producers, look for Cantina del Taburno or Ocone or D'Ambra for reds, and Falanghina or Coda de Volpe for whites. Good deals include three bottles of reasonable wine for €15 or less.

## LIVIO DE SIMONE MAP PP284-5 BOUTIQUE Construction of the second second

The late Livio de Simone dressed the likes of Audrey Hepburn and Jacqui O. Today his wife and daughter keep the vision alive with bold hand-printed *robe chemisiers* (shirt dresses) and matching purses, bags, and shoes – think Capri with a Japanese twist. A second shop at Vico Satriano 3A stocks vintage Livio de Simone pieces for serious (and seriously moneyed) fashionistas.

## SARTORIAL NAPLES

Milan may be the hyped-up face of Italian style, but Naples is its heart and soul. The city's bespoke tailors are legendary, and once drew the likes of early 20th-century Italian king Emmanuel III to their needles and threads. In fact, Naples' ateliers are regarded as clubs or meeting places for debonair Neapolitan gentlemen, who talk fashion, style and cut. Today, Mariano Rubinacci suits, Borrelli and Finamore shirts

and Marinella ties are male fashionista must-haves from Tokyo to Turin. The key to this success is traditional, handmade production, superlative fabrics and minute attention to detail and

form. Suitwise, the look is more bratpack than powerbroker – think slim-fit flexible cut, natural and unengineered shoulders (great for gesticulating), high-set arm holes and the signature *barchetta* (little boat) breast pocket. The style itself evolved from the Savile Row suits popular in the 1920s. Local tailors began loosening the rigid Anglo cut, ditching the shoulder pads and reducing canvas and padding for a look more suitable for languid Neapolitan lounging.

A classic Neapolitan shirt will often feature fine Italian, Swiss or Irish cottons, hand-stitched collar, yolk and sleeve, hand-sewn button holes and gathered pleating at the shoulder.

While most of the boutiques offer *prêt-à-porter* threads and accessories (including ready-made suits), creating a shirt or suit from scratch will usually involve a couple of fittings and anything from three to eight weeks. Finished items can be shipped to you overseas.

Credit card at the ready, now that you're clued up hit these local legends for a Neapolitan revamp:

Mariano Rubinacci (Map pp284–5; 🗟 081 41 57 93; www.marianorubinacci.it; Via Filangieri 26) Beautiful, lightweight and precisely fitting suits from the granddaddy of Neapolitan tailoring. Former clients include Neapolitan film director Vittorio de Sica and playwright Eduardo de Filippo.

**Cesare Attolini** (Map pp284–5; 🖻 081 42 68 26; www.cesareattolini.it; Vico Vetriera 12) Cesare Attolini and his two stylish sons offer three lines of got-to-have suits: Cesare Attolini for fully handmade bespoke tailoring, Sartoria Attolini for fully handmade ready-to-wear suits and Sartoria for hand-finished suits for younger style-gurus.

Borrelli (Map pp284–5; 🗟 081 423 82 73; www.luigiborrelli.com; Via Filangieri 68; 🖨 C25 to Piazza dei Martiri) The look is classic preppy with a funked-up twist – think pastel blazers, chequered suits and striped blood-orange cashmere sweaters. Debonair, but always respectable.

**Finamore** (Map pp284–5;  $\Box$  081 246 18 27; www.finamore.it in Italian; Via Calabritto 16) Ready-to-wear (€160 to €250) and bespoke (€90 upwards) shirts in delectable shades such as royal blue, pastel pink and citrus green. Shirts are entirely hand sewn and there are ties and scarves to match.

**Marinella** (Map pp284–5; 🕲 081 245 11 82; Piazza Vittoria 287) One-time favourite of Luchino Visconti, Aristotle Onassis and Gianni Agnelli, this is *the* place for *prêt-à-porter* and made-to-measure ties. Match them with an irresistible selection of luxury accessories, including shoes, shirts, sweaters and vintage colognes.

Anna Matuozzo (Map pp284–5; 🗟 081 66 38 74; www.annamatuozzo.it; Viale Antonio Gramsci 26) The softly spoken Signora Matuozzo was once the apprentice of Mariano Rubinacci. Now the signora and her daughters are famed for their bespoke shirts, which feature mother-of-pearl buttons and vintage hand stitching. Silk ties in colour combinations such as fuchsia and baby blue complete the elegant look. Call in advance to make an appointment for a fitting.



## **NAPLES BEST BUYS**
