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# SHOPPING

In the last decade or so Prague's shopping scene has changed beyond recognition. A massive influx of global brand names and a wave of glitzy new malls crammed with designer outlets, smart cafés and big Western brand names has left the city's main shopping streets looking very much like those of any other European capital.

Imported goods often carry Western European prices, but Czech products remain affordable for Czechs and cheap for Westerners. While tourist gift shops outside Prague – see Karlštejn (p230) or Mělník (p233) – have smaller selections, prices are significantly lower. If you're hunting for bargains, the word 'sleva' means 'discount'.

## SHOPPING AREAS

The city centre's single biggest – and most exhausting – retail zone is around Wenceslas Square (Václavské náměstí), its pavements jammed with browsing visitors and locals making beelines for their favourite stores. You can find pretty much everything here, from high fashion and music megastores to run-of-the-mill department stores and gigantic book emporia. Many of the more interesting shops are hidden away in arcades and passages, such as the Lucerna Palace (Map pp108–9).

The other main shopping drag intersects with the lower end of Wenceslas Square, comprising Na Příkopě, 28.října and Národní třída (Mappp88–9 and (Mappp108–9). Most of the big stores and malls are concentrated on Na Příkopě, with the biggest of them all – the Palladium Praha Shopping Centre (Mapp106) – at its northeast end, opposite the Municipal House.

În Staré Město, the elegant avenue of Pařížská (Map pp88–9) is lined with international designer houses including Dior, Boss, Armani and Louis Vuitton, while the back streets to its east are home to boutiques operated by Czech fashion designers. In contrast, the winding lanes between the Old Town Square and Charles Bridge are thronged with tacky souvenir shops flaunting puppets, Russian dolls and 'Czech This Out' T-shirts.

In recent years many new shops have opened up outside the centre, notably in Vinohrady (Map p121), which is good for antiques and designer furniture; Smíchov (Map p138), dominated by the huge Nový Smíchov mall; and the suburb of Zlíčin on the far western edge of the city, which has a vast shopping centre ranged around Tesco and IKEA.

## **OPENING HOURS**

Prague shops usually open anywhere between 8am and 10am, and close between 5pm and 7pm on Monday to Friday; major shops, departments stores and tourist businesses also open on weekends, but more local shops may be closed on Saturday afternoon and Sunday.

## **CONSUMER TAXES**

Value-added tax (VAT, or DPH in Czech) is applied at 5% on food, hotel rooms and restaurant meals, but 22% on luxury items (including alcohol). This tax is included in the marked price and not added at the cash register.

It is possible to claim VAT refunds of up to 14% of the purchase price for purchases totalling more than 2000Kč that are made in shops displaying the 'Tax Free Shopping' sticker. They will give you a Tax Free Shopping voucher, which you then need to present to customs for validation when you leave the country (which must be within three months of the date of purchase). You can then claim your refund either at a duty-free shop in the airport (after passing through passport control) or from a cash-refund office back home (within six weeks of the purchase date). # **HRADČANY**

ANTIQUE MUSIC INSTRUMENTS

It may not get the prize for most inventive shop name, but this place is a real treasure-trove of vintage stringed instruments. You'll find an interesting stock of antique violins, violas and cellos dating from the 18th century to the mid-20th century, as well as bows, cases and other musical accessories.

In the same premises you'll find the Icon Gallery, a luminous collection of Russian and Eastern European religious icons, as well as lots of other decorative objets d'art, watches, porcelain and Art Nouveau glassware.

## HOUPACÍ KŮŇ Map pp70–1

Toys

The 'Rocking Horse' toy shop houses a collection of carved wooden folk dolls, old 1950s wind-up tractors, toy cars and – surprise – even a couple of rocking horses. There are quality toys and art supplies you won't find anywhere else in Prague, but for a typically Czech souvenir look out for the famous and ubiquitous Little Mole character, available here in several guises.
