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# Introduction

Few things in the universe are constant over thousands or millions of years, not the orbit of the Earth around the sun, the height of eroding mountains, the distribution of boreal forests, or the abundance of a particular species. As we shift our attention from the stellar and global to the regional and local, then the more likely it is that we will encounter things that change over even short spans of time.

Dictionaries contribute to communication by providing definitions which deliver consistency of meaning. But consistency is not the same as constancy. With the passage of time, new dictionaries, or new editions of old ones, are necessary, because new subject areas develop, new terms are introduced or the meanings of words change. Examples of all of these developments are to be found in the following pages, as is to be expected in such dynamic fields of study as environment and ecology. In documenting change, dictionaries not only record developments in language and human endeavour, but also reflect the reality of the natural world.

As this dictionary goes to press it is perhaps global climatic change and the high rate of extinction of species which are the best exemplars of this. Change can be a challenge to those with an interest in ecology or the environment, as that interest rightly engenders a commitment to seek to conserve what we know and value. It can also create tensions between competing interests within the same field, as conflict between the protection of bird life and the perceived need for offshore wind farms has illustrated But the entities we are aware of are more than features in their own right, they are also the products of fundamental processes which seem remarkably constant over time. These processes, such as glaciation, erosion, mutation, evolution, competition and decay have created the landscapes, communities, plants and animals we observe and study. As ecologists and environmentalists it is primarily these processes which we study, and it is perhaps these which we should value and conserve as much as their temporary products. This shift in emphasis may be one of the future developments in thinking in ecology and environment and a change to be recorded in later editions of this dictionary.

# Preface

This dictionary provides the user with a wide range of vocabulary from across the fields of environment and ecology, and also includes general terms frequently used in scientific documents and reports, as well as some more informal terms seen in the media. Words and phrases cover many aspects from contaminated land and landfill sites to climate change and biofuels.

The dictionary is designed for anyone who needs to check the meaning of an environmental or ecological term, but especially for those for whom English is an additional language. Each entry is explained in clear straightforward English and examples are given to show how the words are used in normal contexts. Quotations from reports and publications give recent uses of some words. In some cases, additonal information about a word is added in a Note, or a wider context is offered in a Comment. Irregular plurals and verb forms, and other helpful usage points are included.

**abate** verb to become less strong or intense  $\bigcirc$  The wind has abated.

**abatement** *noun* a reduction in strength or intensity  $\bigcirc$  *water pollution abatement* 

abiotic adjective not relating to a living organism

**abiotic factor** *noun* something which influences the environment but which is not produced by living organisms, e.g. wind, temperature or rainfall. Compare **biotic factor** 

**abiotic stress** *noun* stress caused by the physical and chemical aspects of an organism's environment

**abiotic stress resistance** *noun* resistance in organisms to stress arising from non-biological causes such as drought or salinity

**ablation** *noun* **1**. the removal of the top layer of something **2**. the removal of snow or ice from the surface of a glacier by melting or by the action of the wind

**abort** verb 1. to stop a process or the development of something before it is finished, or to stop developing  $\bigcirc$  *The flowers abort and drop off in hot, dry conditions, with no fruit developing.* 2. to give birth before the usual end of a pregnancy (technical) Also called **miscarry** 

**abrasion** *noun* the wearing away by friction of a material, especially the erosion of rock by the action of particles suspended in water, ice or wind

**abscission** *noun* the shedding of a leaf or fruit due to the formation of a layer of cells between the leaf or fruit and the rest of the plant (NOTE: It occurs naturally in autumn, e.g. leaf fall, or at any time of the year in response to stress.)

**absolute** *adjective* **1.** very great  $\bigcirc$  *absolute confidence in the results* **2.** complete or total  $\bigcirc$  *No absolute correlation with climate change has yet been established.* **3.** measured relative to a standard  $\blacksquare$  *noun* an unchanging principle

**absorb** verb to take something in  $\bigcirc$  Warm air absorbs moisture more easily than cold air.  $\bigcirc$  Salt absorbs moisture from the air.

absorbent adjective able to absorb

**absorption** *noun* the process of taking in water, dissolved minerals and other nutrients across cell membranes

**absorptive capacity** noun the ability of a substance or part of an organism to take up something such as moisture or nutrients **abstract** noun a short summary of a document  $\bigcirc$  It's quicker to search through the abstracts than the full text.  $\blacksquare$  verb **1**. to remove water from a river or other source for industrial, horticultural or agricultural use **2**. to take something such as gas, oil, mineral resources or gravel from the ground

**abstraction** *noun* **1**. the removal of water from a river or other source for industrial, horticultural or agricultural use **2**. the removal of something such as gas, oil, mineral resources or gravel from the ground

**abstraction licence** *noun* a licence issued by a regulatory body to allow abstraction, e.g. of water from a river, lake or aquifer for domestic or commercial use such as irrigation

**abundance** noun **1.** a large amount or number of something  $\bigcirc$  *The area supports an abundance of wildlife.* **2.** a measure of quantity applied to plants or animals, often based on density or frequency

**abundant** adjective occurring or available in large quantities  $\bigcirc$  a region of abundant rainfall  $\bigcirc$  The ocean has an abundant supply of krill.

**abyss** noun a very deep part of the sea **abyssal** adjective referring to the deepest part of the sea

**abyssobenthic** *adjective* referring to an organism living on the floor of the deepest part of a sea or lake

**abyssopelagic** *adjective* referring to an organism living in the deepest part of a sea or lake, at depths greater than 3000m

acaricide *noun* a substance used to kill mites and ticks. Also called acaridicide

**acarid** *noun* a small animal which feeds on plants or other animals by piercing the outer skin and sucking juices, e.g. a mite or tick

Acarida noun the order of animals including mites and ticks. Also called Acarina acaridicide noun same as acaricide Acarina noun same as Acarida

# acceptable daily intake

**acceptable daily intake** *noun* the quantity of a substance such as a nutrient, vitamin, additive or pollutant which a person or animal can safely consume daily over their lifetime. Abbr **ADI** 

**acceptable limits** *plural noun* the upper and lower limits within which something is generally regarded as suitable by a large number of people or by legislation  $\bigcirc$  *The noise from the road falls within acceptable limits.*  $\bigcirc$  *The acceptable limits for such chemicals in food and animal feed are strictly regulated.* 

access noun 1. a place of entry, or the right of entry, to somewhere 2. the right of the public to go onto uncultivated private land for recreation.  $\Diamond$  Countryside and Rights of Way Act

**access order** *noun* a court order which gives the public the right to go on private land

**access road** *noun* a road that allows only the properties on it to be reached and is not for general traffic

acclimatisation, acclimatization, acclimation noun the process of adapting to a different environment (NOTE: This process is known as acclimatisation if the changes occur naturally and acclimation if they are produced in laboratory conditions.)

**acclimatise**, **acclimatize** *verb* **1**. to make an organism become used to a different environment, usually a change in climate **2**. to become used to a different sort of environment

**accretion** *noun* **1**. the growth of inorganic objects by the attachment of material to their surface **2**. the growth of a substance around an object  $\bigcirc$  *an accretion of calcium round the joint* **3**. an accumulation of sediments

**accumulate** verb 1. to collect and increase  $\bigcirc$  Cold air flows downwards and accumulates over low ground.  $\bigcirc$  Sediment and debris accumulate at the bottom of a lake. 2. to gather several things together over a period of time  $\bigcirc$  We have gradually accumulated a large collection of plant specimens.

**accumulation** noun **1**. the process of becoming greater in size or quantity over a period of time  $\bigcirc$  the risk of accumulation of toxins in the food chain **2**. something that has accumulated

**acer** *noun* a maple or sycamore tree. Genus: *Acer*.

achene noun a dry single-seeded fruit that does not split open (NOTE: Achenes are

produced by plants such as dandelions and sunflowers.)

**acid** *noun* a chemical compound containing hydrogen which dissolves in water and forms hydrogen ions, or reacts with an alkali to form a salt and water, and turns litmus paper red

**acid aerosol** *noun* an acidic liquid or solid particles that are small enough to be propelled through the air

acid deposition noun acid rain

acid fallout *noun* an acid which forms in the atmosphere and falls as particles, without any water

acid grassland noun a type of vegetation that is typical especially on soils that drain freely and are low in mineral nutrients, and may also occur on post-industrial sites. The range of plant species found is small.  $\diamond$  calcareous grassland

**acidic** *adjective* referring to acids  $\bigcirc$  *has acidic properties* 

**acidic rock** *noun* a rock which contains a high percentage of silica

**acidification** noun the process of becoming acid or of making a substance more acid  $\bigcirc$  Acidification of the soil leads to the destruction of some living organisms.

**acidify** verb to make a substance more acid, or to become more acid  $\bigcirc$  Acid rain acidifies the soils and waters where it falls.  $\bigcirc$  The sulfur released from wetlands as sulfate causes lakes to acidify.

**acidifying compound** *noun* a compound that contributes to acidification, e.g. sulfur oxides, sulfates, nitrogen oxides, nitrates and ammonium compounds

**acidity** noun the proportion of acid in a substance  $\bigcirc$  The alkaline solution may help to reduce acidity.

acid mine drainage *noun* water containing acids, which drains from mine workings or from heaps of mine refuse and enters water courses

acid mine water noun water in mine workings which contains acid from rocks

acid-neutralising capacity noun the ability of water to neutralise acids, measured by the amount of bicarbonate it contains. Abbr ANC

acid precipitation noun same as acid rain

**acid-proof** *adjective* able to resist the harmful effects of an acid

acid pulse noun a sudden increase in acidity in rainwater or river water

acid rain noun precipitation such as rain or snow which contains a higher level of acid than normal. Also called acid deposition, acid precipitation

COMMENT: Acid rain is mainly caused by sulfur dioxide, nitrogen oxide and other pollutants being released into the atmosphere when fossil fuels such as oil or coal containing sulfur are burnt. Carbon combines with sulfur trioxide from sulfur-rich fuel to form particles of an acid substance. The effects of acid rain are primarily felt by wildlife. The water in lakes becomes very clear as fish and microscopic animal life are killed. It is believed that it is acid rain that kills trees, especially conifers, making them gradually lose their leaves and die. Acid rain can damage surfaces such as stone buildings when it falls on them.

**acid soot** *noun* acid carbon particles which fall from smoke from chimneys

acorn noun the fruit of an oak tree

acoustician noun a person who specialises in the study of sound

acoustics noun the study of sound, especially noise levels in buildings

**ACP** *abbr* Advisory Committee on Pesticides

acquired character noun a characteristic that develops in response to the environment

**acquis** noun in the European Union, a set of laws that potential member states have to adopt  $\bigcirc$  an environmental acquis

**acre** noun a unit of measurement of land area, equal to 4840 square yards or 0.4047 hectares

**ACRE** *abbr* Advisory Committee on Releases to the Environment

**acreage** *noun* the area of a piece of land measured in acres

**acrid** *adjective* having a strong bitter smell or taste  $\bigcirc$  *acrid fumes* 

**actinide** *noun* one of the radioactive elements which are in the same category as uranium in the periodic table and have atomic numbers from 89 to 104

actinium noun a natural radioactive element, produced by the decay of uranium-235 (NOTE: The chemical symbol is Ac; the atomic number is 89 and the atomic weight is 226.)

actinomycete noun a bacterium shaped like a rod or filament. Order: Actinomycetales. (NOTE: Some actinomycetes cause diseases while others are sources of antibiotics.)

**action** noun **1.** something done or to be done  $\bigcirc$  Appropriate action should be taken to avoid contamination. **2.** the effect that something has  $\bigcirc$  worn away by the action of rain  $\bigcirc$  the action of the drug on the nervous system  $\Box$  to take action against something or to stop something to work to prevent something happening  $\bigcirc$  The government is taking action to stop the spread of pollution.

**action plan** noun a detailed statement of how something that needs to be done will be carried out  $\bigcirc$  an action plan for conserving species

activate verb to start a process or to make something start working

activated sludge noun solid sewage containing active microorganisms and air, mixed with untreated sewage to speed up the purification process

activation noun the act of making something start to work

**activator** *noun* a substance which activates a process  $\bigcirc$  *a compost activator* 

**active** *adjective* **1**. doing something, usually energetically, or being alert  $\bigcirc$  *Kiwis are only active after dark.* **2**. in action or in use **3**. (of a volcano) likely to erupt from time to time

active ingredient *noun* the main effective ingredient of something such as an agrochemical, as opposed to the base substance. Abbr AI

active organic matter *noun* organic matter in the process of being broken down by bacteria. Abbr **AOM** 

**active packaging** *noun* food packaging that interacts chemically or biologically with its contents so that shelf-life is longer or the product is modified during storage

**activity** noun **1**. the actions that humans and other living things undertake  $\bigcirc$  research activities  $\bigcirc$  The hillside showed signs of human activity.  $\bigcirc$  We saw no activity around the nest in several hours. **2**. the effect that something has  $\bigcirc$  Biopesticides are being evaluated for their biological activity in a range of environments. **3**. an action or movement  $\bigcirc$  volcanic activity

act on, act upon verb (of force) to produce an effect on something

**acute exposure** *noun* exposure to a pollutant or radioactive substance for a short period

**acute health effect** *noun* a health problem which lasts a short time, following exposure to a pollutant or radioactive substance

**acute toxicity** *noun* the concentration of a toxic substance which is high enough to make people seriously ill or can cause death adapt

**adapt** verb 1. to change to suit new conditions  $\bigcirc$  People adapt to the reduced amounts of oxygen available at high altitudes. 2. to change or modify something for special use  $\bigcirc$  The engine has been adapted to use the new fuel. 3. to experience a heritable change in structure or function that makes an organism better able to survive and reproduce, as part of the process of evolution

**adaptation, adaption** *noun* **1.** the act of changing, or of modifying something for special use **2.** a heritable change in an organism so that it is better able to survive and reproduce in an environment, as part of the process of evolution

**adaptive radiation** *noun* the development of different species from a single ancestor in such a way that the different forms have adapted to suit different environmental conditions

ADAS *noun* a commercial research-based organisation that offers technical advice on agricultural, food and environmental matters to rural industries. Former name Agricultural Development and Advisory Service

**additive** noun **1**. a chemical which is added to food to improve its appearance or to keep it fresh  $\bigcirc$  *The tin of beans contains a number of additives.*  $\bigcirc$  *These animal food-stuffs are free from all additives.* **2**. a chemical which is added to something to improve it  $\bigcirc$  *A new fuel additive made from plants could help reduce energy costs.* 

COMMENT: Colour additives are added to food to improve its appearance. Some are natural organic substances like saffron, carrot juice or caramel, but others are synthetic. Other substances added to food to prevent decay or to keep the food in the right form are emulsifiers, which bind different foods together as mixtures, and stabilisers, which can keep a sauce semi-liquid and prevent it from separating into solids and liquids. The European Union allows some additives to be added to food and these are given E numbers.

ADI abbr acceptable daily intake

adiabatic adjective referring to a change in temperature in a mass of air as a result of compression or expansion caused by an increase or decrease in atmospheric pressure without loss or gain of heat to or from its surroundings

**adjust** verb to change something to be more suitable or so that it works better  $\bigcirc$ We will have to adjust the next trial to take account of recent results. **adjustment** *noun* **1**. a change to improve the setting or position of something  $\bigcirc$  *The brightness needs adjustment.* **2**. a process of physical change in response to external environmental changes

**adjuvant** *noun* something added to improve the effectiveness of something else, e.g. a substance added to a pesticide to make it stick to waxy leaves

**adsorb** verb (of a solid) to bond with a gas or vapour which touches its surface

adsorbent adjective capable of adsorption

**adsorber** *noun* a device which removes volatile organic compounds from gas by adsorbing them to a carbon filter

**adsorption** *noun* the bonding of a solid with a gas or vapour which touches its surface

**adult** *adjective* having reached maturity ○ *takes two years to reach the adult stage* ■ *noun* an organism that has reached maturity **advanced gas-cooled reactor** *noun* a type of nuclear reactor, in which carbon dioxide is used as the coolant and is passed into water tanks to create the steam which will drive the turbines. Abbr **AGR** 

advection *noun* a movement of air in a horizontal direction □ advection fog fog which forms when warmer moist air moves over a colder surface (land or sea) ► compare convection

**adventitious** *adjective* **1**. on the outside or in an unusual place **2**. referring to a root which develops from a node on a plant stem and not from another root

**adverse** *adjective* **1.** bad or poor  $\bigcirc$  *Adverse weather conditions delayed planting.* **2.** harmful or unfavourable  $\bigcirc$  *adverse effects* **3.** moving in the opposite direction  $\bigcirc$  *adverse winds* 

**adverse health effect** *noun* a harmful effect on a person's health as a result of coming into contact with pollutants or allergens

**advisory** *adjective* giving advice and information

advisory board, advisory committee noun a group of specialists who can give advice

Advisory Committee on Pesticides noun a statutory body set up under the UK Food and Environment Protection Act 1985 to advise on all matters relating to the control of pesticides. Abbr ACP

Advisory Committee on Releases to the Environment *noun* an independent advisory committee giving statutory advice to UK Government Ministers on the risks to human health and the environment from the release and marketing of genetically modified organisms (GMOs). It also advises on the release of some non-GM species of plants and animals that are not native to Great Britain. Abbr **ACRE** 

**AE** *abbr* assimilation efficiency

**AEPS** *abbr* Arctic Environmental Protection Strategy

**aerate** verb to allow air to enter a substance, especially soil or water  $\bigcirc$  Worms play a useful role in aerating the soil.

**aeration** *noun* the process of putting air into a substance  $\bigcirc$  *aeration of the soil* 

COMMENT: The process of aeration of soil is mainly brought about by the movement of water into and out of the soil. Rainwater drives out the air and then, as the water drains away or is used by plants, fresh air is drawn into the soil to fill the spaces. The aeration process is also assisted by changes in temperature, good drainage, cultivation and open soil structure. Sandy soils are usually well aerated; clay soils are poorly aerated.

**aerator** *noun* a device to put a gas, especially carbon dioxide or air, into a liquid.  $\phi$  **de-aerator** 

**aerial** *adjective* referring to the air  $\bigcirc$  *Some orchids have aerial roots.* 

**aerobe** *noun* a living thing, particularly a microorganism, that needs oxygen for metabolism. Compare **anaerobe** 

**aerobic** *adjective* needing oxygen for its existence or for a biochemical reaction to occur. Compare **anaerobic** 

**aerobic digester** *noun* a digester which operates in the presence of oxygen

**aerobic digestion** *noun* the processing of waste, especially organic waste such as manure, in the presence of oxygen

**aerobiosis** *noun* a biological activity which occurs in the presence of oxygen

**aerogenerator** *noun* a windmill with fast-moving sails used to generate mechanical power or electricity

**aerolisation**, **aerolization** *noun* the transmission of a substance in the form of a vapour or fine particles in the air

**aerosol** noun **1**. a quantity of tiny particles of liquid suspended in a gas under pressure, sprayed from a container **2**. a can of liquid with a propellant gas under pres-

sure, which is used to spray the liquid in the form of tiny drops **3.** a quantity of tiny particles of liquid or powder which stay suspended in the atmosphere

**aesthetic argument** *noun* reasoning for conservation based on the view that the beauty of scenery or nature should be preserved

**aesthetic injury level** *noun* the level at which the amenity benefits of pest control become acceptable. Abbr **AIL** 

**aestivation** *noun* **1.** dormancy in some animals such as lungfish during the summer or periods of drought. Compare **hibernation 2.** the arrangement of sepals and petals in a flower bud

**aetiological agent** *noun* an agent which causes a disease

**aetiology** *noun* the causes of a disease, or the study of those causes

**affect** *verb* to have an influence on or to change something. Compare **effect** 

**affluent** *adjective* referring to water which is flowing freely **■** *noun* a stream which flows into a river

afforest verb to plant an area with trees

**afforestation** noun **1.** the growing of trees as a crop  $\bigcirc$  *There is likely to be an increase in afforestation of upland areas if the scheme is introduced.* **2.** the planting of trees on land previously used for other purposes

**aflatoxin** *noun* a toxin produced by species of the fungus *Aspergillus*, especially *Aspergillus flavus*, which grows on seeds and nuts and affects stored grain

**afrormosia** *noun* a hardwood tree from West Africa, now becoming scarce. Latin name: *Pericopisis elata*.

**afterburner** *noun* a device which reduces pollution by burning out organic gases

**aftercare** noun **1.** arrangements for preventing future pollution from an environmentally sensitive activity that has ceased **2.** the continuing management of the soil or vegetation of an area that has been restored or replanted  $\bigcirc$  vegetation management practices during aftercare  $\bigcirc$  an aftercare agreement to restore a disturbed site

**aftershock** *noun* a weaker shock which follows the main shock of an earthquake. Compare **foreshock** 

**agency** noun **1**. an organisation or company that acts as a representative for a person or business **2**. a government organisation with a specific role **3**. the act of causing something to happen  $\bigcirc$  *The disease devel*-

**Agenda 21** *noun* a global environmental programme and statement of principles concerning sustainable development for the 21st century, agreed in 1992 at the Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil

**agglomerate** *noun* a rock made up of fragments of lava fused together by heat

**agribusiness** *noun* a large-scale farming business run along the lines of a conventional company, often involving the processing, packaging and sale of farm products

agricultural adjective referring to farming

**agricultural burning** *noun* the burning of agricultural waste as part of farming practice, e.g. stubble burning

**agriculturalist** *noun* a person trained in applying the principles of science to farming

**agricultural waste** *noun* waste matter produced on a farm, e.g. plastic containers for pesticides

Agricultural Waste Stakeholders' Forum noun a group that includes representatives of government, farming organisations, waste companies and farm suppliers with the aim of identifying and dealing with issues of waste management in agriculture **agriculture** *noun* the cultivation of land, including horticulture, fruit growing, crop and seed growing, dairy farming and livestock breeding

Agriculture, Environment and Biotechnology Commission *noun* the UK Government advisory body on biotechnology issues affecting agriculture and the environment

**agri-environmental indicator** *noun* an indicator designed to provide information on the complex interactions between agriculture and environment

**agri-environment scheme** *noun* a financial incentive given to farmers to adopt environmentally beneficial land management practices, e.g. the Countryside Stewardship Scheme

**agrobiodiversity** *noun* the aspects of biodiversity that affect agriculture and food production, including within-species, species and ecosystem diversity

**agrochemical industry** *noun* the branch of industry which produces pesticides and fertilisers used on farms

**agrochemicals** *plural noun* pesticides and fertilisers developed for agricultural use

**agroclimatology** *noun* the study of climate and its effect on agriculture

**agroecology** *noun* the ecology of a cropproducing area

**agroecosystem** *noun* a community of organisms in a crop-producing area

**agroforestry** *noun* the growing of farm crops and trees together as a farming unit

**agroindustry** *noun* an industry dealing with the supply, processing and distribution of farm products

**Al** *abbr* **1**. active ingredient **2**. artificial insemination

**air bladder** *noun* an air-filled sac that helps the fronds of a seaweed to float in the water

**airborne** *adjective* carried in the air  $\bigcirc$  *airborne particles*  $\bigcirc$  *airborne spores* 

**airborne lead** *noun* particles of lead carried in the air, causing pollution

**air gas** *noun* a mixture of carbon monoxide and nitrogen made by passing air over hot coke and used as a fuel. Also called **producer gas** 

**air monitoring** *noun* the taking of regular samples of air to check pollution levels

**air pollutant** *noun* a substance such as gas or smoke that contaminates the air in a specific place or the Earth's atmosphere. Also called **atmospheric pollutant** 

**air pollution** *noun* the contamination of the air by substances such as gas or smoke. Also called **atmospheric pollution** 

**air quality** *noun* the state of the air in a specific place in terms of the degree of pollution measured

Air Quality Framework Directive noun a European Commission directive that provides a framework for setting limits for a range of pollutants, for assessing their concentrations and for managing air quality so that it remains within the set limits

**air quality index** *noun* a numerical scale that indicates how polluted the air is in a specific place

**air quality monitoring station** *noun* a facility that measures the concentration of pollutants in the air of a specific place

**air quality standards** *plural noun* legal limits on specific pollutants in the air

**air stripping** *noun* a technique for removing pollutants from water in which water is split into minute particles

Al symbol aluminium

**albedo** *noun* a measurement of the ability of a surface to reflect light, shown as the proportion of solar energy which strikes the Earth and is reflected back by a particular surface

**alder** *noun* a hardwood tree in the birch family. Genus: *Alnus*. (NOTE: The wood is resistant to decay in wet conditions.)

**aldrin** *noun* an organochlorine insecticide that is banned in the European Union

**alga** *noun* a tiny single-celled or multicellular organism living in water or in moist conditions, which contains chlorophyll but has no stems, roots or leaves (NOTE: The plural is **algae**.)

COMMENT: Algae were formerly regarded as plants because they contain chlorophyll, but are now classified separately. Seaweeds are forms of algae. Algae grow rapidly in water which is rich in phosphates and/or nitrates. When these levels increases, for example when fertiliser runoff enters the water, the algae multiply to form huge floating mats called blooms, blocking out the light and inhibiting the growth of other organisms. When the algae die, they combine with all the oxygen in the water so that other organisms suffocate.

**algal bloom** *noun* a mass of algae which develops rapidly in a lake as a result of eutrophication

**alkali** *noun* a substance which reacts with an acid to form a salt and water. It may be either a soluble base or a solution of a base that has a pH value of more than 7. (NOTE: The plural is **alkalis**; an alternative US plural is **alkalies**.)

**alkaline** *adjective* containing more alkali than acid and having a pH value of more than 7

**alkalinity** noun the amount of alkali in something such as soil, water or a body  $\bigcirc$ *The alkalinity of the soil makes it unsuitable for growing rhododendrons* 

**alkaloid** *adjective* similar to an alkali ■ *noun* one of many poisonous substances found in plants which use them as a defence against herbivores (NOTE: Many alkaloids such as atropine, morphine or quinine are also useful as medicines.)

alkyl benzenesulfonate, alkyl benzenesulphonate noun a surface-acting agent

# Allee effect

used in detergents, which is not biodegradable and creates large amounts of foam in sewers and rivers

Allee effect noun an effect of population density on population growth, by which there is a fall in reproductive rate at very low population densities and a positive relationship between population density and the reproduction and survival of individuals

**allele** *noun* one of two or more alternative forms of a gene, situated in the same area (**locus**) on paired chromosomes and controlling the inheritance of the same characteristic

**allelopathy** *noun* the release by one plant of a chemical substance that restricts the germination or growth of another plant

Allen's rule *noun* a rule that shows that warm-blooded animals from cold regions have smaller ears and legs than animals from warmer regions, reducing the ratio of body volume to body surface

**allergen** *noun* a substance which produces a hypersensitive reaction in someone. Allergens are usually proteins, and include foods, the hair of animals and pollen from flowers, as well as dust.

allergenic adjective producing an allergy • the allergenic properties of fungal spores

**allergic** *adjective* affected by an allergy  $\bigcirc$  *allergic to penicillin* 

**allergy** noun a sensitivity to substances such as pollen or dust, which cause a physical reaction  $\bigcirc$  She has an allergy to household dust.  $\bigcirc$  He has a penicillin allergy.

**alleviate** verb to reduce or lessen the harmful effect of something

**alleviation** *noun* a reduction or lessening of the harmful effect of something

**alley cropping** *noun* the planting of crops such as maize or sorghum between trees (NOTE: The trees help to prevent soil erosion, especially on slopes, and may benefit soil fertility if the leaves are used as mulch or they are legumes.)

Alliance of Small Island States noun a group of states made up of islands or low-lying areas in the Pacific, Caribbean and Indian Oceans that negotiate within the United Nations to show how vulnerable they are to climate change. Abbr AOSIS

allo- prefix different

**allochthonous** *adjective* relating to flora, fauna, material or inhabitants that have moved from elsewhere to the region in which they are found. Compare **autochthonous**  **allogenic succession** *noun* the establishment of different communities in a particular area as a result of external environmental factors such as climatic change

**allopatric** *adjective* referring to plants of the same species which grow in different parts of the world and so do not cross-breed

**allopatric speciation** *noun* the development of new species which are geographically isolated from each other

alluvial adjective referring to alluvium

**alluvial deposit** *noun* a deposit of silt formed on the bed of a river or lake and carried and laid down elsewhere, often on flood plains. Also called **alluvial soil** 

**alluvial fan** *noun* a fan-shaped deposit of sediment built up by a river where the slope of the bed becomes less steep

**alluvial flat** *noun* a flat area along a river where silt is deposited when the river floods. Also called **alluvial plain** 

**alluvial mining** *noun* the extraction of minerals from alluvial deposits, e.g. panning for gold

alluvial plain noun same as alluvial flat alluvial soil noun same as alluvial deposit

**alluvial terrace** *noun* a flat plain left when a river cuts deeply into the bottom of a valley. Also called **river terrace** 

**alluvium** *noun* the silt deposited by a river or a lake

**alpha diversity** *noun* the number of species occurring in a small area

**alpine** *adjective* referring to the European mountains known as the Alps, or to other high mountains  $\blacksquare$  *noun* a plant that grows on mountains between the tree line and the snow line

**alternate** *adjective* referring to flowers, buds, or leaves that are arranged singly at different heights on either side of a stem, rather than being in pairs or groups

**altruism** *noun* the behaviour of an animal that reduces its chances of survival or of producing offspring, but increases those chances for another closely related individual of the same species

**aluminium** *noun* a metallic element extracted from the ore bauxite (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **AI**; the atomic number is **13** and the atomic weight is **26.98**.)

**Am** *symbol* americium

**AMAP** *abbr* Arctic Monitoring and Assessment Programme

**amber** noun a yellow translucent substance that is the fossilised resin of conifers. It sometimes contains fossilised insects.

**ambient** *adjective* referring to background conditions

**ambient air** *noun* the air around a building or other point

**ambient climate** *noun* the atmospheric conditions surrounding a specific geographical point

**ambient conditions** *plural noun* the atmospheric conditions such as humidity, temperature or air pressure in which something exists  $\bigcirc$  *The ambient conditions are ideal for the development of fungi.* 

ambient environment *noun* the environment which surrounds an ecosystem

**ambient quality standards** *plural noun* the levels of acceptable clean air which a regulatory body tries to enforce

**ambient temperature** *noun* the temperature of the air surrounding something **amelioration** *noun* an improvement or the process of improving something  $\bigcirc$

**americium** *noun* an artificial radioactive element (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Am**; the atomic number is **95** and the atomic weight is **243**.)

**amino acid** *noun* a chemical compound which is a component of proteins

**ammonia** noun a gas with an unpleasant smell that is easily soluble in water. Formula:  $NH_3$ .

**ammonification** *noun* the treatment or soaking of something with ammonia

**ammonium** *noun* an ion formed from ammonia

amorphous adjective with no regular shape

**amount** noun a quantity of something  $\bigcirc$  Global warming and climate change caused by increasing amounts of greenhouse gases will have wide-ranging consequences.

**Amphibia** plural noun a class of egg-laying animals which live partly in water and partly on land and whose larvae live in water (NOTE: Amphibia include frogs, toads and newts.)

**amphibian** *noun* **1**. an animal which lives both in water and on land, e.g. a frog, toad or newt **2**. a vehicle which can travel both on water and on land  $\blacksquare$  *adjective* referring to an organism which lives both in water and on land

**anemometer** *noun* an instrument, usually attached to a building, which provides wind-speed information

aneroid barometer noun a device that shows the changes in atmospheric pressure angiosperm noun a plant in which the sex organs are carried within flowers and seeds are enclosed in a fruit. Compare gwmnosperm

**anthracite** *noun* a type of shiny hard black coal which burns well and does not produce much smoke

**anthropogenic** *adjective* caused by or resulting from human activities

anti- prefix against or opposing

antibacterial adjective preventing or reducing the growth of bacteria

**anticline** *noun* (*in rock formations*) a fold where the newest layers of rock are on the surface. Compare **syncline** 

anticondensation paint noun a paint which prevents the formation of condensation

anticyclone noun an area of high atmospheric pressure, usually associated with fine dry weather in summer and fog in winter (NOTE: Winds circulate round an anticyclone clockwise in the northern hemisphere and anticlockwise in the southern hemisphere.)

**apparatus** noun equipment used in a laboratory or elsewhere for experiments or scientific study  $\bigcirc$  a self-contained apparatus which provides a efficient and convenient method for conducting safety tests (NOTE: no plural: a piece of apparatus; some new apparatus)

**aridity** *noun* the state of being extremely dry

**arithmetic mean** *noun* a number calculated by adding together several figures and dividing by the number of figures added. Also called **average** 

aromatic adjective having a pleasant smell

aromatic compound, aromatic hydrocarbon noun a compound such as benzene, with a ring of carbon atoms held by single and double bonds

arrest noun a sudden stoppage

**arrester** *noun* a device or substance which prevents or stops something from happening

**arroyo** noun a gully with a stream at the bottom, found in desert regions of the US. Compare **wadi** 

**arsenic** noun a grey semimetallic chemical element that forms poisonous compounds such as arsenic trioxide, which was formerly used in some medicines (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **As**; the atomic number is **33** and the atomic weight is **74.92**.)

**arsenide** *noun* a compound of arsenic and a metallic element

artefact, artifact noun a human-made object

**artesian well** *noun* a well which has been bored into a confined aquifer, the hydrostatic pressure usually being strong enough to force the water to the surface

**artifact** *noun* another spelling of **artefact artificial** *adjective* made by humans and not existing naturally

**artificial community** *noun* a plant community kept by people, as in a garden

**artificial fertiliser** *noun* a fertiliser manufactured from chemicals. Also called **chemical fertiliser** 

**artificial insemination** *noun* a method of breeding livestock by injecting sperm from specially selected males into a female. Abbr **Al** 

**artificial recharge** *noun* the introduction of surface water into an underground aquifer through a recharge well

As symbol arsenic

**asbestos** *noun* a fibrous mineral substance that causes lung disease if inhaled. It was formerly used as a shield against fire and as an insulating material in many industrial and construction processes.

**asbestosis** *noun* a disease of the lungs caused by inhaling asbestos dust

**ASCOBANS** *noun* an agreement made between European countries in 1991. Full form Agreement on the conservation of small cetaceans of the Baltic and North Seas

**asexual** *adjective* not involving sexual reproduction

**ash** *noun* **1**. a hardwood tree. Genus: *Fraxinus*. **2**. a grey or black powder formed of minerals left after an organic substance has been burnt

**aspect** noun a direction in which something faces  $\bigcirc$  *a site with a northern aspect* **aspen** noun a hardwood tree with leaves that tremble in the wind. Genus: *Populus*.

**asphalt** noun a black substance formed from bitumen

**assessment** *noun* **1.** careful consideration of something to make a judgment about it **2.** a judgment based on evidence

ASSI abbr Area of Special Scientific Interest

**assimilate** *verb* to take into the body's tissues substances which have been absorbed into the blood from digested food

**assimilation** *noun* the action of assimilating food substances

**assimilation efficiency** *noun* the percentage of food energy which is taken into the gut of a consumer and assimilated through the wall of the gut. Abbr **AE** 

**associate** verb to be linked to or accompanied by something  $\bigcirc$  *Turbulence is often* associated with strong winds.

**association** noun **1**. a group of people with similar interests **2**. a link between two things  $\bigcirc$  They were looking for an association between specific chemicals and the disease. **3**. same as **biological association astatine** noun a natural radioactive ele-

atomic power station *noun* a power station in which nuclear reactions are used to provide energy to run turbines that generate electricity

**atomic waste** *noun* radioactive waste from a nuclear reactor, including spent fuel rods and coolant

atomise, atomize verb to reduce liquids to a fine spray

atrazine noun a herbicide used especially on maize crops that kills germinating seedlings. It is a contaminant of ground water and is banned in the European Union, but still allowed for essential use in the UK.

**atropine** *noun* a poisonous plant compound (**alkaloid**), found in *Atropa belladonna*, that affects heart rate and is used medically to relax muscles

**attend** verb to exist or happen in connection with something else (formal)  $\bigcirc$  Serious consequences may attend this decision.

**beetle** *noun* an insect with hard covers on its wings. Order: Coleoptera.

**Bhopal** *noun* a town in India that was the scene of an accident in 1984, when methyl isocyanate gas escaped from a chemical plant and caused many deaths

BHT abbr butylated hydroxytoluene

bicarbonate noun same as hydrogen carbonate

**biennial** adjective happening every two years ■ noun a plant that completes its life cycle over a period of two years. \$ **annual**, **perennial** 

bight noun a wide curve in a shoreline

**bilharzia** noun **1**. a flatworm which enters the bloodstream from infected water and causes schistosomiasis. Genus: Schistosoma, **2**, same as **schistosomiasis** 

bilharziasis noun same as schistosomiasis

**billion** *noun* a number equal to one thousand million (NOTE: In the US it has always meant one thousand million, but in the UK it formerly meant one million million, and it is still sometimes used with this meaning. With figures it is usually written **bn**: 5bn.)

**bind** *verb* to form a chemical bond

**binding agent** *noun* a substance that causes two or more other substances to stick together or combine

**binding target** *noun* an environmental standard that must be met in the future

**binomial classification** *noun* the scientific system of naming organisms devised by the Swedish scientist Carolus Linnaeus (1707–78)

COMMENT: The Linnaean system of binomial classification gives each organism a name made up of two Latin words. The first is a generic name referring to the genus to which the organism belongs, and the second is a specific name referring to the particular species. Organisms are usually identified by using both their generic and specific names, e.g. Homo sapiens (human), Felis catus (domestic cat) and Sequoia sempervirens (redwood). A third name can be added to give a subspecies. The generic name is written or printed with a capital letter and the specific name with a lowercase letter. Both names are usually given in italics or are underlined if written or typed.

**biodegradable** adjective easily decomposed by organisms such as bacteria or by natural processes such as the effect of sunlight or the sea  $\bigcirc$  biodegradable household waste such as potato peelings  $\bigcirc$  Biodegradable cartons can be made from potato starch.  $\bigcirc$  Organochlorines are not biodegradable and enter the food chain easily.

**biodegradable packaging** *noun* material such as boxes, cartons or bottles that can be decomposed by organisms such as bacteria or by natural processes such as the effect of sunlight or the sea

**biodegradation** *noun* the breaking down of a substance by natural processes, e.g. the breakdown of activated sludge by bacteria

**biodegrade** *verb* to decay as the result of natural processes

**biodiesel** *noun* a substitute for diesel fuel made wholly or partly from organic products, especially oils extracted from plants such as oilseed rape

**biodigestion** *noun* the use of microorganisms to break down food and organic waste

**biodiverse** *adjective* containing a large number of species  $\bigcirc$  *a biodiverse area of rainforest* 

**biodiversity** *noun* the range of species, subspecies or communities in a specific habitat such as a rainforest or a meadow. Also called **biological diversity** 

<sup>4</sup>Modern intensive farming is probably the main cause of declining biodiversity in the countryside. (Delivering the evidence. Defra's Science and Innovation Strategy 2003–06)<sup>5</sup>

**Biodiversity Action Plan** *noun* a detailed scheme to maintain the biological diversity of a specific area. Abbr **BAP** 

**biodiversity hotspot** noun a threatened region with a large range of endemic plant species (at least 1500) but where more than 70% of the original habitat has been lost because of human activities. Typically, the diversity of endemic vertebrates is also high.

**biodiversity indicator** *noun* a factor that allows change in the environment over time to be assessed. Also called **bioindicator** 

**biodiversity prospecting** *noun* the process of searching among wild organisms for new species or genetic characteristics that may have potential commercial value

**biodome** *noun* a very large greenhouse or similar structure with a controlled internal environment in which plants and animals from much warmer or colder regions are kept in conditions similar to nature

**biodynamic agriculture** *noun* a view of agriculture based on a holistic and spiritual understanding of nature and humans' role in it, which considers a farm as a selfcontained evolving organism, relying on home-produced feeds and manures with external inputs kept to a minimum

**biodynamics** *noun* the study of living organisms and the production of energy

**bioecology** *noun* the study of the relationships among organisms and between them and their physical environment, with particular emphasis on the effect of humans on the environment

bioenergetics noun same as biodynamics **bioenergy** *noun* energy produced from biomass

**bioengineering** *noun* the use of biochemical processes on an industrial scale to produce drugs and foodstuffs or to recycle waste

**bioerosion** *noun* erosion or decay due to the action of living organisms

**bioethanol** *noun* a fuel for internal-combustion engines that is made by fermenting biological material to produce alcohol (NOTE: Typically 5–10% bioethanol is added to petrol.)

**biofilter** *noun* a filter system that uses microorganisms to convert the organic compounds of a pollutant to carbon dioxide, water and salts

**biofuel** *noun* a fuel produced from organic domestic waste or other sources such as plants (NOTE: Coppiced willow is sometimes grown for biofuel.)

**biogas** noun a mixture of methane and carbon dioxide produced from fermenting waste such as animal dung  $\bigcirc$  Farm biogas systems may be uneconomic unless there is a constant demand for heat.  $\bigcirc$  The use of biogas systems in rural areas of developing countries is increasing.

**biogenic** *adjective* relating to plants and animals

**biogenic source** *noun* a plant or animal which emits air pollutants

**biogeochemical** *adjective* relating to biogeochemistry

**biogeochemical cycle** *noun* a process in which nutrients from living organisms are transferred into the physical environment and back to the organisms (NOTE: This process is essential for organic life to continue.)

**biogeochemistry** *noun* the study of living organisms and their relationship to the chemical components of the Earth such as its soil, rocks and minerals

**biogeographer** *noun* a scientist who studies regions that have their own fauna and flora

**biogeographical region**, **biogeographical zone** *noun* a region of the Earth that has its own special fauna and flora, separated from other regions by a natural barrier or change in environmental conditions

**biogeography** *noun* the study of the relationship between organisms and the geography of the region where they occur, including how they originally came to that region **biogeosphere** *noun* the top layer of the Earth's crust, which contains living organisms

**biohazard** *noun* a risk to human beings or their environment presented by something that is toxic or infectious

**biohydrology** *noun* the study of the interactions between the water cycle and plants and animals

bioindicator noun same as biodiversity indicator

**bioinformatics** *noun* the use of computers to extract and analyse biological data

**bioinsecticide** *noun* an insecticide developed from natural plant toxins, e.g. pyrethrum.  $\Diamond$  **microbial insecticide** 

**biological** *adjective* referring to biology

**biological association** *noun* a group of organisms living together in a large area, forming a stable community

biological control *noun* the control of pests by using predators and natural processes to remove them. Also called **biocon**trol

**biological desert** *noun* an area where there is no life (NOTE: Heavy pollution can turn the bottom of a lake into a biological desert.)

biological diversity noun same as biodiversity

**Biological Diversity Convention** *noun* one of two binding treaties agreed at the Earth Summit, in Rio de Janeiro in June 1992, requiring states to take steps to preserve ecologically valuable areas and species

**biological efficiency** *noun* the ratio of the productivity of an organism or community of organisms to that of its supply of energy

**biological half-life** *noun* the time taken for half of an amount of radioactive material to be eliminated naturally from a living organism

**biological indicator** *noun* an organism that is known to respond to specific changes in the environment

biologically decomposable adjective same as biodegradable

biological magnification noun same as bioaccumulation

biological mass noun same as biomass

**biological monitoring** *noun* the process of checking the changes that take place in a habitat over time 22

**biological oxygen demand** *noun* the amount of pollution in water, shown as the amount of oxygen needed to oxidise the polluting substances. Abbr **BOD** 

COMMENT: Diluted sewage passed into rivers contains dissolved oxygen, which is utilised by bacteria as they oxidise the pollutants in the sewage. The oxygen is replaced by oxygen from the air. Diluted sewage should not absorb more than 20 ppm of dissolved oxygen.

biological pesticide noun same as biopesticide

**biological pump** *noun* the process by which carbon sinks from the surface to the depths of the oceans, so reducing the levels of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere

**biological wastewater treatment** *noun* the use of aerobic or anaerobic microorganisms to produce effluents and separated sludge containing microbial mass together with pollutants, often as well as using mechanical processes

**biologist** *noun* a scientist who specialises in biology

**biology** *noun* the study of living organisms

**bioluminescence** *noun* the production of light by organisms such as fireflies or sea animals, as a result of an enzymic reaction (NOTE: Bioluminescence is found in many deep-sea animals, fireflies and some bacteria and fungi.)

biomagnification noun same as bioaccumulation

**biomanipulation** *noun* the action or process of changing the environment to improve the survival of wildlife

**biomarker** *noun* a distinctive indicator of a biological or biochemical process, e.g. a chemical whose occurrence shows the presence of a disease

**biomass** *noun* **1**. the sum of all living organisms in a given area or at a given trophic level, usually expressed in terms of living or dry mass **2**. organic matter used to produce energy (NOTE: Willow and miscanthus are grown as biomass for fuel.)

**biomass boiler** *noun* a device that burns biomass as a fuel to heat water

**biomass energy** *noun* the energy produced by burning renewable materials such as wood or waste

**biomaterial** *noun* a biodegradable material of plant origin

**biome** noun a large ecological region characterised by its vegetation and climate and the organisms adapted to live in it COMMENT: The ten principal biomes are: mountains, polar regions, tropical rainforest, grasslands, deserts, temperate forests, monsoon forests, deciduous forests, coniferous forests and evergreen shrub forests.

**biometeorology** *noun* the scientific study of the weather and its effect on organisms

**biomethanation** *noun* a system of producing biogas for use as fuel

'Biomethanation is attractive for use in rural areas for several reasons: it is an anaerobic digestion process, which is the simplest, safest way that has been found for treating human excreta and animal manure.' [Appropriate Technology]

biometrical adjective referring to biometrics

**biometrics** *noun* the use of statistical techniques on biological data (NOTE: takes a singular verb)

**biomonitoring** *noun* the measurement and tracking of a chemical substance in an organism or in biological material such as blood or urine, in order to monitor exposure to pollution, chemicals or other hazards

**bion** *noun* a single living organism in an ecosystem

**biopesticide** *noun* a pesticide produced from biological sources such as plant toxins that occur naturally.  $\Diamond$  **microbial insecticide** 

**biophyte** noun a plant that obtains nutrients from the decomposing bodies of insects which it traps and kills, e.g. a sundew **biopiracy** noun the commercial development of genetic resources such as plants with medicinal properties or genes for resistance to disease without allowing the people or government of the area where they were originally discovered to share in financial benefits

**bioprospecting** *noun* the process of looking for plants that contain potentially useful pharmaceutical compounds

**bioregion** *noun* an area defined in environmental terms rather than by geopolitics

**bioremediation** *noun* the use of organisms such as bacteria to remove environmental pollutants from soil, water or gases (NOTE: Bioremediation is used to clean up contaminated land and oil spills.)

**biosecurity** *noun* the management of the risks to animal, plant and human health posed by pests and diseases

**bioseparation** *noun* the use of biological agents such as plants, enzymes, or biological membranes in separating the different components of something, e.g. in the purification of proteins or water, or in making food and pharmaceutical products

**biosolids** *plural noun* a nutrient-rich organic material, solid or semi-solid before processing, that is derived from sewage as a product of wastewater treatment and used as a fertilizer

biosphere noun same as ecosphere

**biosphere reserve** *noun* an environmentally sensitive area with protected status managed primarily to preserve natural ecological conditions (NOTE: Biosphere reserves may be open to tourists.)

**biospheric cycle** *noun* a natural cyclical process that supports life on Earth, e.g. the oxygen cycle, carbon cycle, nitrogen cycle or water cycle

**biostimulation** *noun* the addition of nutrients to polluted waste or ground in order to enhance the remedial activity of microorganisms

**biosynthesis** *noun* the production of chemical compounds by a living organism **biota** *noun* the flora and fauna of a region

**biotechnology** noun the use of biological processes in industrial production, e.g. the use of yeasts in making beer, bread or yoghurt. b **genetic modification** 

**biotic** *adjective* referring to the living constituents of an environment. Compare **abi**otic

**biotic barrier** *noun* a set of conditions which prevent members of a species moving to other regions

**biotic carrier potential** *noun* an assessment of the maximum increase in the number of individuals in a species, not considering the effects of competition and natural selection

**biotic climax** *noun* a plant community produced by a permanent influence or combination of influences of organisms, including people, e.g. woodland

**biotic community** *noun* a community of organisms in a specific area

**biotic factor** *noun* an organism that has an effect on a specific environment. Compare **abiotic factor** 

**biotic index** *noun* a scale for showing the quality of an environment by indicating the types of organisms present in it

biotic potential noun same as biotic carrier potential

**biotic pyramid** *noun* a graphical representation of the structure of an ecosystem in terms of which organism eats which. Also called **ecological pyramid** (NOTE: The base is composed of producer organisms, usually plants, then herbivores, then carnivores. It may be measured in terms of number, biomass or energy.)

**biotic succession** *noun* the sequence of changes that takes place in the composition of a group of organisms under the influence of their changing environment

**biotope** *noun* a small area with uniform biological conditions such as climate, soil or altitude

**biotroph** *noun* a parasite which only feeds on living organisms. Compare **necro-troph** 

**biotype** *noun* a group of similar individuals within a species

**biphenyl** *noun* a white or colourless crystalline substance, used as a fungicide, in the production of dyes and as a preservative applied to the skins of citrus fruit. Formula:  $C_6H_5C_6H[[SUB]]5$ . (NOTE: The preservative has E number E230.)

**birch** *noun* a common hardwood tree found in northern temperate zones. Genus: *Betula*.

**bird** *noun* a warm-blooded animal that has wings, feathers and a beak and lays eggs

"Birds are sensitive to even small climate changes. For instance the North Atlantic Oscillation – the Atlantic's version of El Niño – has subtle effects on weather. These go unnoticed by most humans, but research shows that as the oscillation waxes and wanes, populations of larks and sandpipers rise and fall. (Climate Change, UK farmland birds and the global greenhouse. RSPB 2001)"

birder noun same as birdwatcher

**bird haven** noun same as **bird sanctuary bird of prey** noun a bird that kills and eats other birds or small animals

bird reserve noun same as bird sanctuary

**bird sanctuary** *noun* a place where birds can breed and live in a protected environment

**Birds directive** *noun* a European Union directive relating to the conservation of all species of naturally occurring wild birds

**birdsong** *noun* singing calls made by birds to communicate with each other

**birdwatcher** *noun* a person who observes and studies birds as a leisure activity. Also called **birder** 

**birdwatching** *noun* observing and studying birds as a leisure activity

**birth** *noun* the event of being born

**birthrate** noun the number of births per year, shown per thousand of the population  $\bigcirc$  a birthrate of 15 per thousand  $\bigcirc$  There has been a severe decline in the birthrate. **bison** *noun US* a type of large cattle found in North America, now largely restricted to protected areas because of hunting. Also called **buffalo** 

bitumen noun a solid hydrocarbon contained in coal. Also called tar

**bituminous coal** *noun* coal containing a high percentage of tar

bituminous sand, bituminous shale noun same as oil sand

**bivalve** *noun* an invertebrate animal with a shell composed of two halves joined at one place. Bivalves such as oysters or mussels may live in fresh or salt water.

**black carbon** *noun* carbon in the form of fine particles which rise in the smoke produced by the burning of fossil fuels such as coal, wood or oil

black earth noun same as chernozem

**bladder** *noun* **1**. an inflated modified leaf of a plant that traps insects, e.g. bladderwort, or an inflated fruit, e.g. senna pod **2**. same as **air bladder** 

**blade** *noun* **1**. a flattened part of a propeller, rotor or wind turbine **2**. a thin flat leaf, e.g. a leaf of a grass, iris or daffodil

**blanket bog** *noun* a wide area of marshy ground that may occur in lowland or upland areas (NOTE: In the UK, they occur mainly at high altitude in the north and west.)

**blast** *noun* the impact from an explosion  $\bigcirc$  *Thousands of people would be killed by the blast.* 

**blast effect** *noun* a result of the impact from an explosion, e.g. damage caused

**blaze** noun a mark put on a tree to show that it needs to be felled or to indicate a path through a forest

**bleaching** *noun* **1**. the removal of colour by the action of a chemical or sunlight **2**. a process in which coral loses its colour or loses its symbiotic algae  $\bigcirc$  *There have been several incidents of coral bleaching on reefs around Easter Island and northeastern Australia.* 

**bleed** verb **1**. to exude blood or sap from a wound **2**. to remove liquid or gas from a system

**blight** noun 1. a disease caused by different fungi, that rapidly destroys a plant or plant part 2.  $\Box$  (urban) blight excessive building development, or the occurrence of dilapidated and unattractive areas in a city or town  $\blacksquare$  verb to ruin or spoil the environment  $\bigcirc$  The landscape was blighted by open-cast mining.

**blizzard** noun a heavy snowstorm with wind, or lying snow which is blown by

strong wind  $\bigcirc$  There were blizzards in the highlands during the weekend.

**bloom** noun a flower  $\bigcirc$  The blooms on the orchids have been ruined by frost.  $\blacksquare$  verb to flower  $\bigcirc$  The plant blooms at night.  $\bigcirc$  Some cacti only bloom once every seven years.

**blow** verb (of air or wind) to move  $\bigcirc$  The sea breeze may blow almost parallel to the coast.

**blow-by** *noun* unburnt fuel mixed with air and other gases that escapes past the piston rings in an internal combustion engine

**blowhole** *noun* **1**. a hole in the roof of a cave by the sea, leading to the surface of the cliff above, through which air and water are sent out by the pressure of the waves breaking beneath **2**. the nostril of a cetacean such as a whale, situated towards the back of the skull, through which the whale releases air and water

**blowout** *noun* a sudden rush of oil or gas from an oil well

**blubber** noun fat lying in a thick layer under the skin of marine animals such as whales

**blue flag beach** *noun* a beach with sea water that meets the cleanliness requirements of the European Commission and has been awarded the symbol of a blue flag **blue-green alga** *noun* **)** cyanobacterium

**blue whale** *noun* a large whale with no teeth, which feeds by straining large amounts of water through its baleen and so retaining plankton and other food

**board of inquiry** *noun* a group of people who carry out a formal investigation when there has been an accident, or something has gone wrong

**BOAT** abbr byway open to all traffic

**BOD** *abbr* **1**. biochemical oxygen demand **2**. biological oxygen demand  $\bigcirc$  *The main aim of sewage treatment is to reduce the BOD of the liquid.* 

**body burden** *noun* the amount of a chemical contained in a human or animal body

**bog** *noun* soft wet land, usually with moss growing on it, which does not decompose, but forms a thick layer of acid peat (NOTE: The mosses that grow on bogs live on the nutrients that fall in rain.)

**boggy** *adjective* soft and wet like a bog **bogland** *noun* an area of bog

**boil** verb to heat a liquid until it reaches a temperature at which it changes into gas **bole** noun the wide base of a tree trunk

**bond** noun same as **chemical bond** ■ verb 1. (of two substances) to link together ○ Adsorption is the bonding of a gas to a solid surface. 2. (of atoms) to form a chemical bond

**bone** *noun* **1**. one of the calcified pieces of connective tissue which make up the skeleton, e.g. a leg bone **2**. a hard substance of which the parts of the skeleton are formed

**bonemeal** *noun* a fertiliser made of ground bones or horns, reduced to a fine powder

**boom** *noun* a sudden loud noise, especially one caused by an aircraft travelling at speeds greater than the speed of sound

**boom town** noun a town where the population and number of buildings is increasing very quickly, or a town where business is thriving  $\bigcirc$  *The oil industry has turned this once sleepy port into a boom town.* 

**booster** *noun* a device which increases the force or amount of something

**Bordeaux mixture** *noun* a mixture of copper sulfate, lime and water, used to spray on plants to prevent infection by fungi

• They have bored six test holes to try to find water.

**boreal** *adjective* referring to the climate in the northern hemisphere between 60° and 40° N with short hot summers and longer cold winters

**boreal forest** *noun* a forest in the tundra areas around the North Pole, consisting primarily of black spruce and white spruce trees with balsam fir, birch and aspen

**boreal region** *noun* one of the biogeographical regions of Europe, in the north east between the Arctic and the continental region

**borehole** noun **1**. a hole bored deep into the ground to survey for the presence of oil, gas or water, or to establish the nature of ground structure  $\bigcirc$  The borehole is intended to test the geology of the site to see what sort of foundation the building will need. **2**. a hole bored into the water table for the extraction of water  $\bigcirc$  Boreholes supply water of excellent quality.

**-borne** *suffix* carried by  $\bigcirc$  *wind-borne pollen of grasses* 

**boron** *noun* a chemical element. It is essential as a trace element for healthy plant growth. (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **B**; the atomic number is **5** and the atomic weight is **10.81**.)

**botanic**, **botanical** *adjective* referring to botany

**botanical garden**, **botanic garden** *noun* a place where plants are grown for showing to the public and for scientific study

**botanical horticulture** *noun* the activity of growing different species of plants to study and maintain them

**botanical insecticide** *noun* an insecticide made from a substance extracted from plants, e.g. pyrethrum, derived from chrysanthemums, or nicotine, derived from tobacco plants

**botanical specimen** *noun* a plant collected for study

**botanist** *noun* someone who studies plants as a scientific or leisure activity

**botany** *noun* the study of plants as a scientific or leisure activity

**bottle bank** *noun* a large container into which people put empty glass bottles and jars which can then be recycled into new glass

**bottled gas** *noun* a gas produced from refining crude oil and sold in pressurised metal containers for use in domestic cooking or heating, or as vehicle fuel

**bottom** *noun* **1**. the floor of a sea, lake or river **2**. a flat area along a river where silt is deposited when the river floods

**bottom feeder** *noun* an organism such as a fish which collects food on the bottom or in the deepest water of the sea, a lake or river

**bottom-up control** *noun* the system of regulation of trophic levels by which the abundance of individuals in the higher trophic levels is determined by factors in the lower levels. Compare **top-down control** 

**boulder** noun a large rounded piece of rock

**Bovidae** *plural noun* the largest class of even-toed ungulates, including cattle, ante-lopes, gazelles, sheep and goats

**bovine** *adjective* referring to cattle

bovine spongiform encephalopathy noun full form of BSE

- **Bq** symbol becquerel
- Br symbol bromine

**bracken** *noun* a tall fern with large triangular fronds that grows on hillsides and in woodland. Latin name: *Pteridium aquilinum*. (NOTE: no plural)

**brackish** *adjective* referring to water which contains some salt, though less than seawater, and is not good to drink

**bract** *noun* a small green leaf at the base of a flower or flowering stem

**braided river** *noun* a river that is divided into a pattern of many channels with small areas of dry land between them

**braiding** *noun* the process of a river becoming divided into many channels with small areas of dry land between them

**bran** noun the outside covering of a cereal grain (NOTE: It is removed from wheat in making white flour, but is an important source of roughage in the human diet and is used in muesli and other breakfast cereals.)

**branch** *noun* **1.** a woody stem growing out from the main trunk of a tree **2.** a subdivision of something larger **3.** a smaller stream separating from but still forming part of a river

brass noun an alloy of copper and zinc

**Brassicaceae** *noun* a family of common plants, including cabbage, whose flowers have four petals. Former name **Cruciferae** 

**breakdown** *noun* **1**. a failure of a system or organisation **2**. the separation of a substance into its component parts

**breakthrough** *noun* a situation occurring when sewage or other pollutants get into the main domestic water supply

**breakwater** *noun* a stone or wooden structure that is built out from the shore into the sea in order to block the force of waves and so prevent erosion

**breccia** noun a type of rough rock made of sharp fragments of other rocks fused together

**breed** noun a group of organisms of a specific species which have been developed by people over a period of time for desirable characteristics  $\bigcirc$  a hardy breed of sheep  $\bigcirc$ Two new breeds of rice have been developed.  $\blacksquare$  verb 1. (of organisms) to produce young  $\bigcirc$  Rabbits breed very rapidly. 2. to encourage something to develop  $\bigcirc$  Insanitary conditions help to breed disease. 3. to produce an improved animal or plant by crossing two parent animals or plants showing the desired characteristics  $\bigcirc$ Farmers have bred new hardy forms of sheep.  $\square$  to breed true to reproduce all the characteristics of the type in the next generation  $\bigcirc F_1$  hybrids do not breed true.

**breeder** noun a person who breeds new forms of animals or plants  $\bigcirc a$  cat breeder  $\bigcirc a$  cattle breeder  $\bigcirc a$  rose breeder  $\bigcirc a$ plant breeder

**breeding** *noun* the crossing of different plants or animals to produce offspring with desirable characteristics

**breeding bird** *noun* a bird that is actively reproducing in a specific place at a specific time

**Breeding Bird Survey** *noun* an ongoing assessment of breeding birds conducted by the British Trust for Ornithology, JNCC and RSPB

breeding ground noun an area where birds or animals come each year to breed

**breeding pair** *noun* two animals, especially birds, that have established a mating relationship with each other

**breeding season** *noun* the time of year when organisms produce offspring

**breeze** *noun* **1**. a light wind **2**. the solid waste of burnt coal or other material produced by a furnace

**bridle path**, **bridle way** *noun* a track along which a horse can be ridden

British thermal unit noun the amount of heat needed to raise the temperature of one pound of water by one degree Fahrenheit (NOTE: Its approximate SI equivalent is 1055 joules.)

British Trust for Ornithology noun an independent scientific research trust that investigates the populations, movements and ecology of wild birds in the British Isles. Abbr **BTO** 

**broad** *noun* a river that has spreads to cover low-lying land

**broadacre agriculture** *noun* the largescale cultivation of field crops

**broadleaf**, **broadleaf** tree *noun* a deciduous tree that has wide leaves, e.g. beech or oak. Compare **conifer** 

**broadleaved** *adjective* (*of a tree*) having wide leaves rather than needles. Compare **coniferous** 

**broadleaved evergreen** *noun* an evergreen tree or shrub with wide leaves, e.g. rhododendron or laurel

**broadleaved forest, broadleaved woodland** *noun* an area of wooded land consisting of more than 75% of broadleaved trees

**broad-spectrum** *adjective* referring to an antibiotic or pesticide which kills or controls many types of organism 'Broad-spectrum pesticides often control both pest and natural enemies removing the benefits of biological control. Often, pesticides are applied just after damage or infestations are identified. Such treatments will prevent beneficial pests from multiplying to populations that will significantly reduce pest numbers. (Pest Management in cereals and oilseed rape – a guide. HGCA 2003)'

**bromine** noun a chemical element. It is used in various industrial processes and in antiknock additives for petrol. (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **B**r; the atomic number is **35** and the atomic weight is **79.90**.)

**brood** noun a group of offspring produced at the same time, especially a group of young birds  $\bigcirc$  The territory provides enough food for two adults and a brood of six or eight young.

**brooding time** *noun* the length of time a bird sits on its eggs to hatch them out

brook noun a little stream

**brown** *adjective* **1**. of a colour like the colour of earth or wood **2**. not produced from renewable sources

**brown earth** *noun* good fertile soil, slightly acid and containing humus

**brownfields** *plural noun* vacant industrial land that was formerly developed

**brownfield site** *noun* a development site that is in a town and formerly had buildings on it, preferred for building development to open fields. Compare **greenfield site** 

**brown fumes** *plural noun* fumes from tarry substances produced by coal burning at low temperatures. Also called **brown smoke** 

**brownlands** *plural noun* areas of land for development that have been previously developed but are currently unused

brown smoke noun 
brown fumes

**browse** verb to feed on plant material, especially the leaves of woody plants, which is not growing close to the ground. Compare **graze** 

**brucellosis** noun a disease which can be caught from cattle or goats or from drinking infected milk, spread by a species of the bacterium *Brucella* 

**brushwood** *noun* undergrowth with twigs and small branches

**bryophyte** *noun* a non-flowering plant, frequently growing in damp places, with separate gamete- and spore-bearing forms, e.g. moss. Division: *Bryophyta*.

**BSE** noun a fatal brain disease of cattle. Also called **mad cow disease**. Full form **bovine spongiform encephalopathy** 

**BTO** *abbr* British Trust for Ornithology

**bud** *noun* a young shoot on a plant, which may later become a leaf or flower

**budding** *noun* a way of propagating plants in which a bud from one plant is grafted onto another plant

**buffalo** *noun* **1**. a common domestic animal in tropical countries, used for milk and also as a draught animal **2**. *US* same as **bison** 

**buffer** noun a solution in which the pH is not changed by adding acid or alkali  $\blacksquare$  verb to prevent a solution from becoming acid or alkaline  $\bigcirc$  If a lake is well buffered, it will not have a low pH factor, even if acid rain falls into it.  $\bigcirc$  Bicarbonate is the main buffering factor in fresh water.

**buffer land**, **buffer zone** *noun* land between a protected area such as a nature reserve and the surrounding countryside or town

**bug** *noun* **1.** an insect (*informal*) **2.** a winged insect belonging to the class Hemiptera

**build** verb to make a construction  $\bigcirc$  The developer is planning to build 2500 new houses on the greenfield site.  $\bigcirc$  The female birds build nests of straw in holes in trees.

**building** noun **1**. a construction such as a house, shop or office  $\bigcirc$  modern buildings with good insulation **2**. the process of constructing something  $\bigcirc$  permission for building on the site

**building area** *noun* an area of land on which building may take place or is taking place. Also called **building zone** 

**building certificate** *noun* an official document allowing a person or company to build a property. Also called **building permit** 

**building control** *noun* a system for regulating the design of buildings, especially for the safety and health of the occupants

**building density** *noun* a number of buildings allowed on a specific area of land, e.g. fifteen houses to the acre

**building development** noun an area of land on which building is taking or has taken place  $\bigcirc$  *The company is planning a new building development of 1500 homes.* 

**building ground**, **building land** *noun* an area of land suitable for or with permission for building on

**building legislation** *noun* the set of laws controlling all aspects of putting up new buildings or altering existing buildings **building permit** *noun* same as **building** certificate

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**building-related illness** *noun* an illness that can be traced to a specific pollutant or source within a building (NOTE: Legionnaires' disease is a building-related illness.)

**building site** *noun* an area of land on which building is taking place

building zone noun same as building area

**build up** verb **1**. to form by accumulation  $\bigcirc$  *The pesticide gradually built up in the food chain.* **2**. to develop gradually  $\bigcirc$  *Traffic has built up over the last five years.* 

**build-up** noun a gradual accumulation  $\bigcirc$  *a build-up of DDT in the food chain*  $\bigcirc$  *a build-up of static electricity* 

**built environment** *noun* the buildings, roads and other structures made by people and in which they live, work or travel. Compare **natural environment** 

**built heritage** *noun* the part of a country's historic resources that consists of buildings and structures, as opposed to natural assets

**built-up area** *noun* an area which has many houses, shops, offices and other buildings, with very little open space

**bulb** *noun* an underground plant organ of fleshy scale leaves and buds. It can be planted and will produce flowers and seed.

**bulk** noun a large quantity of something **in bulk** in large quantities

**bulking agent** *noun* an additive which causes a substance to stick together as a mass

**bulk plant** *noun* a factory which produces something in large quantities

**bund** *noun* a soil wall built across a slope to retain water or to hold waste in a sloping landfill site

**bunding** *noun* the formation of bunds 'Farmers have traditionally relied on a system of bunding to grow sorghum in the area's semi-arid soil.' [*New Scientist*]

**burial site** *noun* **1**. a place where nuclear waste is buried **2**. a place where animals that have died from an infectious disease such as foot and mouth disease are buried

**burn** noun 1. an injury to skin and tissue caused by light, heat, radiation, electricity or a chemical 2. in Scotland, a small stream  $\blacksquare$  verb 1. to destroy or damage something by fire  $\bigcirc$  Several hundred hectares of forest were burnt in the fire.  $\diamondsuit$  slash and burn agriculture 2. to use fuel or food to produce energy  $\bigcirc$  Swimming will help you burn calories.

**burner** *noun* a device for burning something such as fuel or waste

**burner reactor** *noun* a type of nuclear reactor in which fuel such as uranium-239 is used to generate heat by fission

**burning** *noun* **1**. the act or process of destroying or damaging something by fire **2**. the process of burning something such as fuel or waste

**burn-up** *noun* the amount of fuel burnt in a nuclear reactor, shown as a proportion of the fuel originally used

**bush** noun **1**. a plant with many woody stems  $\bigcirc a$  coffee bush  $\bigcirc a$  rose bush **2**. in semiarid regions, natural land covered with bushes and small trees

**bush-fallow** *noun* a form of subsistence agriculture in which land is cultivated for a few years until its natural fertility is exhausted, then allowed to rest for a long period during which the natural vegetation regrows, after which the land is cleared and cultivated again

**business park** *noun* an area of land with buildings specially designed and constructed for business premises, light industries or science

**butane** *noun* a gas produced during petroleum distillation, used domestically for heating and sold in special containers as bottled gas. Formula:  $C_4H_{10}$ .

**butterfly** *noun* a flying insect with large, often colourful wings

**butterwort** *noun* an insectivorous plant that grows in bogs. Genus: *Pinguicula*.

**butylated hydroxytoluene** noun a common antioxidant additive (E321) used in processed foods containing fat. It may be carcinogenic. Abbr **BHT** 

**by-catch** noun fish or sea mammals caught during fishing but not required and thrown back dead into the sea  $\bigcirc$  *By-catch is a major environmental problem as it involves the uncontrolled destruction of populations.* 

**by-pass** noun a road built around a town, to relieve traffic congestion  $\bigcirc$  Since the by-pass was built, traffic in the town has been reduced by half.

**by-product** *noun* something additional produced during a process

**byway** *noun* a small country road or track **byway open to all traffic** *noun* a road mainly used by the public as a footpath or bridleway on which vehicles are allowed. Abbr **BOAT**

**C3 plant** *noun* a plant found in temperate regions in which photosynthesis levels off at high light intensities

**C4 plant** *noun* a plant, usually found in hot dry regions, which is efficient at photosynthesis at high light intensities

**CA** *abbr* Countryside Agency

**cactus** *noun* a succulent plant with a fleshy stem often protected by spines, found in the deserts of North and Central America (NOTE: The plural is **cacti** or **cactuses**.)

**cadmium** noun a metallic element naturally present in soil and rock in association with zinc (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Cd**; the atomic number is **48** and the atomic weight is **112.40**.)

**caducous** *adjective* referring to a part of a plant or animal which becomes detached during the organism's life

**caesium** noun a metallic alkali element which is one of the main radioactive pollutants taken up by fish (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Cs**; the atomic number is **55** and the atomic weight is **132.91**.)

### cal symbol calorie

**calcareous** *adjective* referring to a chalky soil that contains calcium or to a rock such as chalk or limestone that contains calcium

**calcareous grassland** *noun* the type of vegetation such as grasses that is typical on chalk soil.  $\Diamond$  **acid grassland** 

**calcicole**, **calcicolous plant** *noun* a plant which grows well on chalky or alkaline soils. Also called **calciphile** 

**calcification** noun the process of hardening by forming deposits of calcium salts **calcified** adjective made hard  $\bigcirc$  Bone is calcified connective tissue.

**calcifuge** *noun* a plant which prefers acid soils and does not grow on chalky or alkaline soils. Also called **calciphobe** 

**calcimorphic soil** *noun* soil which is rich in lime

**calcination** *noun* the heating of something such as a gas at high temperature in the production of metal oxides

### calciphile noun same as calcicole calciphobe noun same as calcifuge

**calcium** noun a metallic chemical element naturally present in limestone and chalk. It is essential for biological processes. (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Ca**; the atomic number is **20** and atomic weight is **40.08**.)

**calcium carbonate** *noun* a white insoluble solid formed from animal organisms that is naturally abundant and is found in chalk, limestone and marble. It is used in the production of cement, paint and toothpaste. Formula: CaCO<sub>3</sub>.

**calcium phosphate** noun the main constituent of bones and bone ash fertiliser. Formula:  $(Ca_3(Po_4)_2)$ .

**calibrate** *verb* to make a scale on a measuring instrument

**calm** *noun* a period when there is no wind at all

caloric adjective referring to calories

**calorie** *noun* a unit of measurement of heat or energy. Symbol **cal** (NOTE: The **joule**, an SI measure, is now more usual: 1 calorie = 4.186 joules.)

calorific value noun same as energy value

**calyx** *noun* the part of a flower made up of green sepals which cover the flower when it is in bud (NOTE: The plural is **calyces**.)

**camouflage** noun the natural concealment of an animal's shape by colours or patterns  $\bigcirc$  The stripes on the zebra are a form of camouflage which makes the animal difficult to see in long grass.  $\blacksquare$  verb to hide the shape of an animal or object by using colours or patterns on the skin or exterior

**canal** *noun* **1**. a waterway made by people for boats to travel along **2**. a waterway made by people to take water to irrigate land

**can bank** *noun* a large container in a public place into which people can put their empty metal food containers for collection and recycling

**candela** *noun* an SI unit measuring the brightness of a light. Symbol **cd** 

**canker** noun **1**. a disease causing lesions on a plant or on the skin of an animal  $\bigcirc a$ 

bacterial canker of fruit trees **2**. an area of damage caused by canker  $\bigcirc$  cankers on the stem

**cankered** adjective (of skin or plant tissue) having areas of damage caused by canker

**canopy** *noun* a layer of branches and leaves of trees which shade the ground underneath

'Trees that grow to form the tallest part of the canopy suffer more damage than the slower growing trees forming the understorey.' [Guardian]

**canopy cover** *noun* the percentage of the surface of the ground which is shaded by the leaves and branches of trees

canyon noun a deep valley with steep sides

**cap** *noun* a part of the dome-shaped structure of some fungi which bears spores on its lower surface

**CAP** *abbr* Common Agricultural Policy

**capacity** noun **1**. the ability to do something easily  $\bigcirc$  the capacity to conserve the woodland **2**. the amount of something which a container can hold  $\bigcirc$  Each cylinder has a capacity of 0.5 litres.

capillarity noun same as capillary action

**capillary** *noun* a narrow tube carrying a liquid

**capillary action**, **capillary flow** *noun* the movement of a liquid upwards inside a narrow tube or upwards through the soil

**capillary pore** *noun* a space in the soil through which water flows towards a root

**capsid bug** *noun* a tiny insect that sucks the sap of plants

**capsular** *adjective* referring to a capsule **capsule** *noun* **1**. a dry structure which bursts open with force releasing the seeds of flowering plants or spores of mosses **2**. a membrane round an organ

**captive breeding** *noun* the breeding of threatened species in zoos, usually with the intention of later releasing them into the wild

**carbamate** *noun* a pesticide belonging to a large group used as insecticides, herbicides and fungicides

**carbohydrate** *noun* an organic compound composed of carbon, hydrogen and oxygen, e.g. sugars, cellulose and starch

**carbon** *noun* a common non-metallic element that is an essential component of living matter and organic chemical compounds (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **C**; the atomic number is **6** and the atomic weight is **12.01**.)

carbon-14 dating noun same as carbon dating

**carbonaceous** *adjective* referring to rock which is rich in hydrocarbons, e.g. coal

**carbonate** *noun* a compound formed from a base and carbonic acid  $\blacksquare$  *verb* to add carbon dioxide to a drink to make it fizzy

**carbonation** *noun* the addition of carbon dioxide to a drink to make it fizzy

**carbon cycle** *noun* the circulation of carbon, by which carbon atoms from carbon dioxide are incorporated into organic compounds in plants during photosynthesis. They are then oxidised into carbon dioxide during respiration by plants or herbivores which eat them and by carnivores which eat the herbivores, thus releasing carbon to go round the cycle again.

**carbon dating** *noun* the process of finding out how old something is by analysing the amount of carbon, especially the radioactive isotope carbon-14, in it that has decayed. Also called **carbon-14 dating** 

**carbon dioxide** noun a colourless odourless non-flammable atmospheric gas. It is used in photosynthesis and given off in aerobic respiration. Formula:  $CO_2$ .

COMMENT: Carbon dioxide exists naturally in air and is produced by burning or by decaying organic matter. In animals, the body's metabolism utilises carbon, which is then breathed out by the lungs as waste carbon dioxide. Carbon dioxide is removed from the atmosphere by plants when it is split by chlorophyll in photosynthesis to form carbon and oxygen. It is also dissolved from the atmosphere in water. The increasing release of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere, especially from burning fossil fuels, contributes to the greenhouse effect.

**carbon dioxide equivalent** *noun* a metric measure used in comparing emissions from different greenhouse gases to assess their global warming potential. Also called **CO<sub>2</sub> equivalent** 

carbon dioxide tax noun same as carbon tax

**carbon emissions** *plural noun* the carbon dioxide and carbon monoxide produced by motor vehicles and industrial processes and regarded as atmospheric pollutants

**carboniferous** *adjective* containing coal or carbon  $\bigcirc$  *carboniferous limestone* 

**Carboniferous period** *noun* the period of geological time when reptiles first ap-

peared and much of the Earth's surface was covered by forests

**carbonisation** *noun* the process by which fossil plants have become carbon

**carbon monoxide** *noun* a colourless, odourless and poisonous gas found in fumes from car engines, burning gas and cigarette smoke. Formula: CO.

**carbon neutral** *adjective* referring to the balance between producing and using carbon (NOTE: Renewable plant fuels are carbon neutral – if the same numbers of plants are replanted as are harvested the CO<sub>2</sub> levels in the air will remain about the same.)

**carbon sequestration** *noun* the uptake and storage of carbon by trees and other plants absorbing carbon dioxide and releasing oxygen

**carbon sink** *noun* a part of the ecosphere such as a tropical forest which absorbs carbon

**carbon source** *noun* a part of the ecosphere such as animals or an industrial or domestic process that releases carbon into the atmosphere in the form of carbon dioxide

**carbon tax** *noun* an amount of money added by a government to the price of fuel according to its carbon content, to encourage the use of fuels that contain less carbon and so reduce emissions of carbon dioxide.

### Also called carbon dioxide tax

**carbon tetrachloride** noun a dense non-flammable toxic liquid that is colourless with a sweetish smell, used as a solvent, refrigerant and dry-cleaning agent and in fire extinguishers. Formula:  $CCI_4$ .

**carbon trading** *noun* the system of one country using some of another country's permitted carbon dioxide output as well as its own.  $\phi$  **emissions trading** 

**Carbon Trust** *noun* a UK organisation supported by government grants that encourages and promotes the development of low-carbon technologies, both energy-efficient technologies and low-carbon energy supplies

**carboxyhaemoglobin** *noun* a compound of carbon monoxide and the blood pigment haemoglobin formed when a person breathes in carbon monoxide from car fumes or from ordinary cigarette smoke

### carcin- prefix cancer

carcinogen *noun* a substance which causes cancer

carcinogenesis *noun* the formation of cancerous cells in tissue

carcinogenic adjective causing cancer

**car lobby** *noun* a group of people who try to persuade politicians that cars should be encouraged and not restricted

**carnivore** *noun* an animal that eats meat. () detritivore, frugivore, herbivore, omnivore

**carnivorous** adjective **1**. referring to animals that eat meat  $\bigcirc$  a carnivorous animal **2**. referring to plants which trap and digest insects  $\bigcirc$  Sundews are carnivorous plants.

**carotene** *noun* an orange or red plant pigment (NOTE: Some carotenes are converted to vitamin A by animals.)

**carpel** *noun* a female part of a flower, formed of an ovary, style and stigma

**carr** noun an area of wetland which supports some trees  $\bigcirc$  fen carr  $\bigcirc$  willow carr

**carrageen** *noun* a purplish-brown seaweed that contains a mucilage. Genera: *Chondrus* or *Gigartina*. Also called **Irish** moss

**carrageenan** *noun* an extract of seaweed, used as an emulsifier. It may be carcinogenic.

**carrier** noun **1**. an organism that carries disease and infects other organisms, e.g. an insect that transmits the parasite causing malaria **2**. someone who has an infectious disease without showing symptoms, who may then infect other people **3**. a neutral substance to which an active ingredient is added

**carrier bag** *noun* a paper or plastic bag used for carrying goods bought in shops (NOTE: Plastic bags present a considerable problem in terms of waste disposal.)

**carrier gas, carrier solvent** *noun* a gas used in an aerosol can to make the spray come out

**carrying capacity** *noun* the maximum number of individuals of a species that can be supported in a given area

**cascade** noun **1**. a small waterfall **2**. a system for purifying substances, in which the substance passes through a series of identical processes, each stage increasing the purity  $\blacksquare$  verb (of liquid) to fall down like a waterfall

**Case** noun **1**. an outer covering  $\bigcirc A$  butterfly pupa is protected in a hard case or chrysalis. **2**. same as **seedcase 3**. a single occurrence of a disease  $\bigcirc$  There were two hundred cases of cholera in the recent outbreak.

**cash crop** *noun* a crop grown to be sold rather than eaten by the person who grows it, e.g. oil palm

### cashew-nut shell liquor

**cashew-nut shell liquor** *noun* a highly corrosive substance produced from the shells of cashew nuts, used in paints for ships, heatproof materials and in ecocomposites to replace fossil oil. Abbr **CNSL** 

**caste** *noun* a group with a particular function in a hierarchical society of social insects such as termites

CAT abbr control action threshold

catabolic adjective referring to catabolism

**catabolism** *noun* the breaking down of complex chemicals into simple chemicals

catadromous, katadromous adjective referring to fish that live in fresh water and go to the sea to spawn. Compare anadromous

**catadromy, katadromy** *noun* the migration of fish such as eels from fresh water to the sea for spawning. Compare **anadromy catalyse** *verb* to act as a catalyst in helping to make a chemical process take place (NOTE: The US spelling is **catalyze**.)

**catalysis** *noun* a process in which a chemical reaction is helped by a substance, the catalyst, which does not change during the process

**catalyst** *noun* a substance which produces or helps a chemical reaction without itself changing  $\bigcirc$  *an enzyme which acts as a catalyst in the digestive process.* 

catalytic adjective referring to catalysis

**catalytic converter, catalytic muffler** *noun* a box filled with a catalyst such as platinum attached to the exhaust pipe of a motor vehicle burning unleaded petrol in order to reduce the emission of carbon monoxide

**catch** *noun* the amount of fish caught  $\bigcirc$  *regulations to limit the herring catch* 

**catchment, catchment area** noun **1.** an area of land, sometimes extremely large, that collects and drains the rainwater that falls on it, e.g. the area round a lake or the basin of a river. Also called **drainage area**, **drainage basin 2.** an area around a school, hospital, shopping centre, or other service from which its pupils, patients or customers come

catchment basin noun same as catchment 1

**catchwater drain** *noun* a type of drain designed to take rainwater from sloping ground

**catena** *noun* a diagram showing the differences in soil caused by drainage

**cation** *noun* an ion with a positive electric charge

**catkin** *noun* a long hanging structure consisting of many single-sex flowers on a thin stem, found on temperate trees such as hazel, birch and oak. They are pollinated by the wind.

**cattle** *plural noun* domestic farm animals raised for their milk, meat and hide. Class: Bovidae.  $\bigcirc$  *herds of cattle*  $\bigcirc$  *dairy cattle* 

cattle identification document noun a document which identifies an animal and shows its movements from owner to owner. Abbr CID

caustic adjective acid

caustic soda noun same as sodium hydroxide

**cave** *noun* a large hole under the ground, usually in rock

**Cavern** noun a very large cave, formed by water which has dissolved limestone or other calcareous rock

**cavity** *noun* a hole inside a solid substance **CB** *abbr* cumulonimbus

**CBD** abbr Convention on Biological Diversity

**CCW** *abbr* Countryside Council for Wales **Cd** *symbol* cadmium

**CDM** abbr Clean Development Mechanism

CE abbr consumption efficiency

**cedar** *noun* a large coniferous tree belonging to several genera, including *Thuya* and *Cedrus* 

**ceiling** *noun* an upper limit or point that cannot be passed  $\bigcirc$  *a ceiling on imports* 

-cele, -coele suffix referring to a hollow

**cell** noun **1**. the basic independently functioning unit of all plant and animal tissue **2**. a separate unit or section of something larger **3**. a system of positive and negative plates for storage of electricity that form a battery **4**. the central part of a thunder cloud  $\circ$  The life cycle of the thunderstorm cell ends when the downdraughts have spread throughout the cloud.

**cellular** *adjective* **1**. referring to the cells of organisms **2**. made of many similar parts connected together

**cellulose** *noun* **1**. a carbohydrate which makes up a large percentage of plant matter, especially cell walls **2**. a chemical substance processed from wood, used for making paper, film and artificial fibres

**Celsius** noun a scale of temperature where the freezing and boiling points of water are, respectively,  $0^{\circ}$  and  $100^{\circ}$ . Symbol **C**. Former name **centigrade** (NOTE: It is used in many countries, except in the USA, where the Fahrenheit system is still commonly used.)

**cement** *noun* **1.** material which binds things together, such as that which binds minerals together to form sedimentary rocks **2.** a powder which, if mixed with water and then dried, sets hard like stone

**census** *noun* a survey of a specific population to assess numbers and other features

### centigrade noun Celsius

**centimetre** *noun* a unit of measurement of length, equivalent to one hundredth of a metre. Symbol **cm** 

**centre** noun **1.** a point in the middle of something  $\bigcirc$  a park in the centre of the town  $\bigcirc$  The centre of the hurricane passed over the city. **2.** a large building  $\bigcirc$  a conference centre **3.** a focus for activity or attention, or where activities are coordinated  $\bigcirc$ a resource centre (NOTE: The US spelling is center.)

**Centre for Ecology and Hydrology** *noun* a UK organisation that does research on and monitors terrestrial and freshwater environments

**centre of gravity** *noun* the point through which the resultant force of gravity acts

**centre of origin, centre of origin and diversity** *noun* a region where a species is thought to have originated and spread from **centrifugal** *adjective* going away from the centre

**centrifugation** *noun* the separation of the components of a liquid in a centrifuge. Also called **centrifuging** 

**centrifuge** *noun* a device which uses centrifugal force to separate or remove liquids

centrifuging noun same as centrifugation

centripetal adjective going towards the centre

**cephal-** *prefix* referring to the head **cephalic** *adjective* referring to the head **cephalopod** *noun* a marine invertebrate animal with a well-developed head and tentacles, e.g. an octopus, squid or cuttlefish. Class: Cephalopoda.

**CERCLA** *abbr* Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act

**cereal** *noun* a type of grass which is cultivated for its grains. Cereals are used especially to make flour for breadmaking, for animal feed or for producing alcohol. (NOTE: The main cereals are wheat, rice, barley, maize and oats.)

**certification** *noun* the process of obtaining or giving approval for something such as carrying out specific tests, or confirmation for something such as the source from which something was obtained

**certify** *verb* to authorise or permit the use of something

**cesspool, cesspit** *noun* a tank for household sewage, constructed in the ground near a house which is not connected to the main drainage system, and in which the waste is stored before being pumped out for disposal somewhere else

**chemical** noun a substance formed of chemical elements or produced by a chemical process  $\bigcirc$  the widespread use of chemicals in agriculture  $\bigcirc$  The machine analyses the chemicals found in the collected samples.  $\blacksquare$  adjective 1. referring to chemistry or chemicals 2. not found in nature (informal)  $\bigcirc$  an unpleasant chemical taste

**chemical bond** *noun* the force which links atoms to form molecules. Also called **bond** 

chemical closet noun same as chemical toilet

**chemical control** *noun* the control of pests using chemicals

**chemical element** *noun* a substance which exists independently and cannot be broken down into simpler substances

chemical fertiliser noun same as artificial fertiliser

chemical oxygen demand noun the amount of oxygen taken up by organic matter in water used as a measurement of the amount of organic matter in sewage. Abbr **COD** 

**chemical toilet** *noun* a toilet containing chemicals to neutralise the body's waste products. Also called **chemical closet** 

**chemical toxicity** *noun* the poisonous nature of chemicals used in pest control

**chemist** *noun* a scientist who specialises in the study of chemistry

**chemistry** *noun* **1**. the study of substances, elements and compounds and their reactions with each other **2**. chemical substances existing together  $\bigcirc$  *Human action has radically altered the chemistry of the atmosphere.* 

chemo- prefix chemistry

**chemoautotrophic** *adjective* referring to the oxidation of nitrogen or other chemical elements to create a source of food. Compare **photoautotrophic** 

**chemolithotrophic** *adjective* referring to organisms such as bacteria which obtain energy from inorganic substances

**chemo-organotrophic** *adjective* referring to an organism such as an animal which obtains its energy from organic sources

**chemoreceptor** *noun* a cell which responds to the presence of a chemical compound by activating a sensory nerve.  $\Diamond$  **receptor** 

**chemosphere** *noun* the zone in the Earth's atmosphere, above the upper part of the troposphere and within the stratosphere, where chemical changes take place under the influence of the Sun's radiation

**chemosterilant** *noun* a chemical substance which sterilises by microorganisms

**chemosynthesis** *noun* the production by bacteria of organic material using chemical reactions

**chemotaxis** *noun* a movement of a cell which is attracted to or repelled by a chemical substance

**chemotroph** *noun* an organism which converts the energy found in organic chemical compounds into more complex energy, without using sunlight. Compare **phototroph** 

**chemotrophic** *adjective* obtaining energy from sources such as organic matter. Compare **phototrophic** (NOTE: Most animals are chemotrophic.)

**chemotropism** *noun* the movement or growth of an organism in response to a chemical stimulus **Chernobyl** *noun* a town in the Ukraine where a large nuclear power station had a disastrous fire in 1986

**chernozem** *noun* a dark fertile soil, rich in organic matter, found in the temperate grass-covered plains of Russia and North and South America. Also called **black earth** 

**chickpea** *noun* a legume crop, grown for its large round pale-yellow seeds. It is important in India and Pakistan as a source of protein. Genus: *Cicer arietinum*. Also called **gram** 

### chill noun coldness

**chimney** noun a tall tube, either inside a building or separate from it, which takes smoke and fumes away from a fire  $\bigcirc$  Smoke poured out of the factory chimneys.  $\bigcirc$  Chimneys were built very tall, so that the polluting smoke would be carried a long way away by the wind.

**chimney stack** *noun* a tall chimney, especially on an industrial building

china clay noun same as kaolin

**China syndrome** *noun* a potential disaster occurring when the core of a nuclear reactor overheats

**chinook** *noun* a warm wind that blows from the Rocky mountains down onto the Canadian plains in winter. Compare **föhn** 

**chitin** *noun* a tough waterproof substance that forms part of the outer skeleton of insects and the cell walls of fungi

chlor- prefix same as chloro-

**chlorella** *noun* a very small green freshwater alga, occurring naturally or grown commercially for use in human food

**chloride** *noun* a salt of hydrochloric acid **chlorinate** *verb* to treat something with chlorine, especially to sterilise drinking water or water in a swimming pool by adding chlorine

chlorinated adjective treated with chlorine

**chlorinated hydrocarbon** *noun* a compound containing chlorine, carbon and hydrogen that remains in the environment after use and may accumulate in the food chain, e.g. an organochlorine pesticide such as lindane or DDT, an industrial chemical such as a polychlorinated biphenyl (PCB), or a chlorine waste product such as a dioxin or furan

chlorination *noun* sterilisation by adding chlorine

chlorinator noun an apparatus for adding chlorine to water

**chlorine** noun a greenish chemical element. It is used to sterilise water and for bleaching. (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **CI**; the atomic number is **17** and the atomic weight is **35.45**.)

**chlorofluorocarbon** *noun* a compound of fluorine and chlorine. It is used as a propellant in aerosol cans, in the manufacture of plastic foam boxes, as a refrigerant in refrigerators and air conditioners and as a cleaner of circuit boards for computers. Abbr CFC

COMMENT: Chlorofluorocarbons are classified by numbers: CFC-10 is used in aerosols; CFC-11 is used to make plastic foam: CFC-12 is a coolant for refrigerators; and CFC-13 is a cleaning substance used in the electronics industry. When CFCs are released into the atmosphere, they rise slowly, taking about seven years to reach the stratosphere. But once they are there, under the influence of the Sun's ultraviolet light they break down into chlorine atoms which destroy the ozone layer. This allows harmful solar UV radiation to pass through to the Earth's surface. Because it takes so long for the CFCs to reach the stratosphere, any reduction in their use on Earth does not have an immediate effect on the concentrations in the stratosphere. Replacements for CFCs are being developed.

**chlorofluoromethane** *noun* a gas that is a volatile organic compound, generated from landfill sites, petrol engine exhausts and other industrial processes. In the chemical industry, it is often manufactured from carbon tetrachloride. Formula: CH<sub>2</sub>CHO. Abbr **CFM** 

**chloromethane** *noun* a gas which is a compound of carbon and chlorine, formed by fungi as they rot wood (NOTE: It acts in a similar way to CFCs in depleting the ozone layer.)

**chlorophyll** *noun* a green pigment in plants and some algae

**Chlorophyta** *noun* a large group of algae that possess chlorophyll

chloroplast noun a tiny sac within the cells of plants and some algae which contains chlorophyll and other pigments and is the place where photosynthesis occurs (NOTE: The number of chloroplasts in a cell varies, but each consists of interconnected stacks of disc-shaped membranes in fluid, surrounded by a double membrane.)

**chlorosis** *noun* a reduction of chlorophyll in plants, making the leaves turn yellow

### chlorpyrifos

**chlorpyrifos** *noun* an organophosphate insecticide used on a wide range of crops **chlortoluron** *noun* a herbicide applied as a spray, especially on cereals (NOTE: It is under review for withdrawal from use in the European Union.)

**cholera** noun a serious bacterial disease spread through food or water which has been infected by *Vibrio cholerae*  $\bigcirc$  A cholera epidemic broke out after the flood.

**cholesterol** *noun* a fatty substance found in fats and oils. It is produced by the liver and forms an essential part of cells.

CHP plant abbr combined heat and power plant

chrom- prefix same as chromo-

**chromatography** *noun* a scientific method for separating and analysing chemicals through a porous medium

**chromatophore** *noun* a plant or animal cell which contains pigment, e.g. a cell in the eyes, hair and skin, or a similar cell in an alga (NOTE: Chromatophores enable chameleons to change colour.)

**chromium** *noun* a metallic trace element. It is used to make alloys. (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Cr**; the atomic number is **24** and the atomic weight is **52.00**.)

**chromo-** *prefix* **1.** colour **2.** chromium **chromosomal** *adjective* referring to chromosomes

**chromosome** *noun* a thin structure in the nucleus of a cell, formed of DNA which carries the genes (NOTE: Different types of organism have different numbers of chromosomes.)

**chromosome number** *noun* the number of chromosomes present in each cell nucleus of a specific animal or plant (NOTE: Each species has its own characteristic chromosome number, e.g. humans have 46 chromosomes, receiving 23 from each parent.)

**chronic exposure** *noun* exposure to a pollutant or radioactive substance for a long period, even for a whole lifetime

**chronobiology** *noun* the study of recurring cycles of events in the natural world

**chrysalis** *noun* **1**. a stage in the development of a butterfly or moth when the pupa is protected in a hard case **2**. the hard case in which a pupa is protected

**Chrysophyta** *noun* a group of goldenbrown algae, which store oil in their cell walls

**chute** *noun* **1.** a sloping channel along which something such as water or rubbish may pass **2.** a waterfall

**CID** *abbr* cattle identification document **-cide** *suffix* killing

cilia plural of cilium

ciliary adjective referring to cilia

ciliate, ciliated adjective having cilia

**cilium** *noun* one of many tiny projections resembling hairs which move backwards and forwards and drive particles or fluid along (NOTE: The plural is **cilia**.)

**cinders** *plural noun* **1.** hard pieces of material left when the flames from a burning substance have gone out **2.** the small pieces of lava and rock thrown up in a volcanic eruption

**circadian rhythm** *noun* a rhythm of daily activities in plants and animals, repeating every twenty-four hours

**circuit breaker** *noun* an electrical device used to interrupt an electrical supply when there is too much current flow

**circulate** *verb* to move round in such a way as to arrive at the point of departure  $\bigcirc$  *Water circulates via the radiator and pump through to the engine block itself.*

**cirrocumulus** *noun* a form of high cloud, occurring above 5000 m, like altocumulus with little clouds

cirrostratus noun a high thin layer of cloud

**cirrus** *noun* a high cloud, occurring above 5000m, forming a mass of separate clouds which look as if they are made of fibres, but which are formed of ice crystals

**classification** noun a system by which objects or organisms are put into order so as to be able to refer to them again and identify them  $\bigcirc$  the classification of plants and animals

**classify** verb 1. to allocate something to a category  $\bigcirc$  *The area has been classified as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.*  $\bigcirc$  *The pollution records are classified under the name of the site which has been polluted.* 2. to restrict the publication of  $\bigcirc$  *The reports on the accident are classified and may not be consulted by the public.*

**clean air** *noun* air which does not contain impurities

**Clean Development Mechanism** *noun* a scheme by which an industrialised country can receive credit for emission reductions in a developing country which result from projects financed by the industrialised country. Abbr **CDM** 

**cleaner** *noun* a fish or insect which cleans other animals by removing dirt or parasites

cleanse verb to make clean

**cleanser** *noun* a powder or liquid used for cleaning

**clean up** verb to remove refuse, waste substances or pollutants from a place  $\bigcirc$ *They are working to clean up the beaches after the oil spill.*

climate change noun a long-term alteration in global weather patterns, occurring naturally, as in a glacial or post-glacial period, or as a likely result of atmospheric pollution (NOTE: Sometimes climate change is used interchangeably with 'global warming', but scientists tend to use the term in the wider sense to include natural changes in the climate.)

climatic adjective referring to climate

**climatic zone** *noun* one of the eight areas of the Earth which have different climates

COMMENT: The climatic zones are: the two polar regions (the Arctic and Antarctic); the boreal in the northern hemisphere, south of the Arctic; two temperate zones, one in the northern hemisphere and one in the southern hemisphere; two subtropical zones, including the deserts; and the equatorial zone which has a damp tropical climate.

**climatological** adjective referring to climatology  $\bigcirc$  Scientists have gathered climatological statistics from weather stations all round the world.

climatologist noun a scientist who specialises in the study of the climate

climatology noun the scientific study of climate

**climax** *noun* the final stage in the development of plant colonisation of a specific site,

### climax community

when changes occur within a mature and relatively stable community

climax community noun a plant community which has been stable for many years and which changes only as the environment or climate changes or there is human interference

cline noun the set of gradual changes which take place in a species according to geographical and climatic differences across the environment in which it lives. ecocline, geocline

**clinker** noun the lumps of ash and hard residue from furnaces, used to make road surfaces or breeze blocks

clisere noun the succession of communities influenced by the climate of an area

**cloning** *noun* the reproduction of an individual organism by asexual means

**Clostridium** noun a type of bacterium (NOTE: Species of Clostridium cause botulism, tetanus and gas gangrene, but also increase the nitrogen content of soil.)

cloud noun 1. a mass of water vapour or ice particles in the sky which can produce rain or snow 2. a mass of particles suspended in the air  $\bigcirc$  Clouds of smoke poured out of the factory chimney. O Dust clouds swept across the plains. (NOTE: As a plural, clouds means several separate clouds; otherwise the singular cloud can be used to refer to a large continuous mass: There is a mass of cloud over the southern part of the country.)

COMMENT: Clouds are formed as humid air rises and then cools, causing the water in it to condense. They are classified by meteorologists into ten categories: cirrus, cirrocumulus and cirrostratus (high-level clouds); altocumulus and altostratus (middle-level clouds); and stratocumulus, nimbostratus, cumulus, cumulonimbus and stratus (low-level clouds).

cloudbank noun a mass of low clouds

cloudbase noun the bottom part of a layer of cloud

cloudburst noun a sudden rainstorm

cloud chamber noun a piece of laboratory equipment in which clouds can be formed for the study of ionisation

**cloud cover** noun the amount of sky which is covered by clouds. \$ okta

cloud forest noun a tropical forest growing at high altitude that is usually covered by cloud and where epiphytes such as orchids, mosses and ferns grow easily on the trees because of the constant moisture in the air

cloud formation noun a pattern of clouds in the sky

cloudlayer noun a mass of clouds at a specific height above the land

cloudless adjective without clouds

cloudy adjective 1. covered with clouds O a cloudy sky **2.** not clear or transparent  $\bigcirc a$ cloudy liquid

**coastal defence strategy** *noun* an official plan for the protection of the coast

**coastal erosion** *noun* the loss of land from a coast as a result of the force of waves and currents

**coastal fog** *noun* a type of advection fog which forms along the coast

**coastal habitat management plan** *noun* an overview of the loss and gain of coastal habitats over 30–100 years and options for preventing, restoring or compensating for lost habitats. Abbr **CHaMP** 

**coastal lagoon** *noun* a body of seawater near the coast, separated from the sea by a small strip of land and with only a small opening to the sea **coastal pelagic fish** *noun* a fish which lives in the upper layer of the sea, close to land

**coastal protection, coast protection work** *noun* action to protect the coast from being eroded by the action of the sea such as building sea walls and projecting structures to break the force of the waves

**coastal realignment** *noun* the gradual change in a coastline, as land disappears into or is deposited from the sea, often as part of a policy to provide more effective sea defences or restore wetlands

coastal retreat noun serious erosion of a coastline

**coastal squeeze** *noun* the reduction of the area of land near a coast or the loss of its former use because of its position between rising sea levels and fixed sea defences or high ground

**cohort study** *noun* an investigation in which a group of people without a disease are classified according to their exposure to a risk and are studied over a period of time to see if they develop the disease, in order to study links between risk and disease

**coir** *noun* a rough fibre from the outer husk of coconuts

**coke** *noun* a fuel manufactured by heating coal to high temperatures without the presence of air

**coke burner** *noun* a device in which coal is heated to produce coke

**col** noun **1.** a high pass between two mountains **2.** a low pressure area between two anticyclones

**cold-blooded** *adjective* referring to an animal such as a reptile or fish whose body temperature is dependent on the temperature of its surroundings. Also called **ecto-therm, poikilotherm** 

**coleopteran** *noun* an insect such as a beetle with modified tough forewings that act as covers for the membranous hindwings. Order: Coleoptera.

**coliform** *adjective* referring to bacteria which are similar in shape to *Escherichia coli* 

**collection** *noun* **1**. the process of gathering something together  $\bigcirc$  *the regular collection of samples for analysis* **2**. a group of objects or organisms brought together  $\bigcirc a$ 

labelled collection of insects  $\bigcirc$  a living collection of plants

collector panel noun same as solar panel

**colloid** *noun* a substance with very small particles that do not settle but remain in suspension in a liquid

**colloidal** *adjective* referring to a colloid **colonial** *adjective* referring to a colony

**colonial animal** *noun* an animal which usually lives in colonies, e.g. an ant

**colonisation** noun the act of colonising a place  $\bigcirc$  Islands are particularly subject to colonisation by species of plants or animals introduced by people.

**colonise** verb (of plants and animals) to become established in a new ecosystem  $\bigcirc$  Derelict city sites rapidly become colonised by plants.  $\bigcirc$  Rats have colonised the sewers.

**coloniser, colonist** *noun* an organism that moves into and establishes itself in a new ecosystem, e.g. a plant such as a weed **colony** *noun* a group of animals, plants or microorganisms living together in a place  $\bigcirc$  *a colony of ants* 

**coloration** *noun* the colours or patterns of an animal  $\bigcirc$  *protective coloration* 

**colour** noun the set of differing wavelengths of light that are reflected from objects and sensed by the eyes  $\bigcirc$  Flower colour attracts insects.  $\blacksquare$  verb to give colour to something  $\bigcirc$  The chemical coloured the water blue. (NOTE: [all senses] The US spelling is color.)

**colouring** *noun* **1.** the appearance of something in terms of its colour **2.** same as **food colouring** 

**colourless** adjective with no colour  $\bigcirc$  Water is a colourless liquid.

**column** noun 1. a solid with a tall narrow shape  $\bigcirc$  Basalt rocks form columns in some parts of the world. 2. a body of fluid with a tall, narrow shape  $\bigcirc$  Torricelli first demonstrated that the atmosphere has weight by showing that it can support a column of liquid. 3. a vertical section of a table in a document  $\bigcirc$  Column four of the table shows the totals of the other three.

**columnar** adjective in the form of a column  $\cap$  Igneous rocks may have a columnar structure.

**combe**, **coombe** *noun* a small valley with steep sides and usually no water flowing through it

**combination** noun **1**. two or more things together  $\bigcirc$  Lichens are a combination of a fungus and an alga. **2**. the act of bringing

two or more things together  $\bigcirc$  *the success-ful combination of our ideas with their resources* 

**combine** *verb* to bring two or more things together to make one, or to come together to make one

combined heat and power plant noun a power station that produces both electricity and hot water. Abbr CHP plant (NOTE: Such a plant may operate on almost any fuel, including refuse.)

**combust** verb to burn, or to burn something  $\bigcirc$  The region combusts 75% of its refuse for heat reclamation.

**combustion** *noun* the burning of a substance with oxygen

**command-and-control regulations** *plural noun* rules that require polluters to meet specific emission-reduction targets, often using specific types of equipment

**commensal** *noun* an organism which lives on another plant or animal but does not harm it or influence it in any way. ◊ **parasite, symbiont** ■ *adjective* referring to a commensal

**commensalism** *noun* the state of organisms existing together as commensals

**comminution** *noun* the crushing or grinding of rock, ore or sewage into small particles

**comminutor** *noun* a crushing machine that makes particles smaller

**committee** *noun* a group of people dealing with a particular subject or problem

**common** *adjective* **1**. occurring frequently  $\bigcirc$  *a common spelling error* **2**. used or done by several people  $\bigcirc$  *a common ethical stance* **3**. ordinary  $\bigcirc$  *common household chemicals* **4**. belonging to several different people or to everyone  $\bigcirc$  *common land*  $\blacksquare$ *noun* an area of land to which the public has access for walking

COMMENT: About 80% of common land is privately owned and, subject to the interests of any commoners, owners enjoy essentially the same rights as the owners of other land. Commonrs have different types of 'rights of common', e.g. to graze animals, or to extract sand, gravel or peat.

**Common Agricultural Policy** *noun* a set of regulations and mechanisms agreed between members of the European Union to control the supply, marketing and pricing of farm produce. Abbr **CAP** 

**Common Birds Census** *noun* an ongoing survey of commonly occurring birds, run by the British Trust for Ornithology **commoner** *noun* someone with a right to use a common in a particular way, e.g. to graze animals on it

**Common Fisheries Policy** *noun* the legal framework which covers all fishing in the European Union. It aims to conserve fish stocks by regulating fish catches. Abbr **CFP** 

**common land** *noun* same as **common common nuisance** *noun* a criminal act which causes harm or danger to members of the public in general or to their rights

**community** noun **1**. a group of people who live and work in a district  $\bigcirc$  *The health services serve the local community*. **2**. a group of different organisms which live together in an area  $\bigcirc$  *the plant community on the sand dunes* 

**community architecture** *noun* a way of designing new housing projects or adapting old buildings, in which the people living in the area as well as specialists are involved in the planning

**community ecology** *noun* the study of the processes that determine the composition and structure of the mixture of species found in a particular area

**community forest** *noun* a wooded landscape near an urban area, sometimes created on formerly derelict land, maintained for work, wildlife, recreation and education

**community transport** *noun* a bus or rail service which is available to the community

**commute** verb to travel regularly to and from home and a place of work  $\bigcirc$  Thousands of people commute long distances daily.

**commuter** *noun* a person who travels regularly to and from his or her place of work, especially in a city

**commuter belt** *noun* an area around a big city, where commuters live

**commuting** *noun* the activity of travelling regularly to and from home and a place of work  $\bigcirc$  *a huge increase in commuting from cheaper housing areas into the cities* 

**compact** *verb* to compress the ground and make it hard, e.g. by driving over it with heavy machinery or as the result of a lot of people walking on it

**compaction, compacting** *noun* the compression of ground and making it hard, e.g. by driving over it with heavy machinery or as the result of a lot of people walking on it

**compactor** *noun* **1.** a machine which compresses the ground and makes it hard **2.** a machine that crushes refuse

**companion animal** *noun* an animal that is kept for company and enjoyable interaction, rather than for work or food

**companion plant** *noun* a plant which improves the growth of nearby plants (NOTE: Companion plants are often used by horticulturists and gardeners because they encourage growth or reduce pest infestation in an adjacent plant.)

**companion planting** *noun* the use of plants that encourage the growth of others nearby

**comparative risk analysis** *noun* the comparison of two types of risk

**compartment** *noun* a section of a managed plantation of trees

**compensation depth** *noun* the point in a lake or sea at which the rate of formation of organic matter by photosynthesis is the same as the rate of loss of matter by respiration

**compensation point** *noun* the point at which the rate of photosynthesis is the same as the rate of respiration (NOTE: It can be measured as the point at which the amount of carbon dioxide used by plants equals the amount of oxygen they release.) **compensatory habitat** *noun* a habitat created because an existing protected natu-

ral area has been damaged or lost

**compensatory measure** noun a course of action that is taken to improve a situation when environmental damage cannot be directly restored

**compete** *verb* to try to obtain the same limited resources such as food, light or a mate as other organisms of the same or different species

**competition** *noun* the struggle for limited resources such as food, light or a mate, occurring between organisms of the same or different species

**competitive exclusion principle** *noun* the concept that two or more species with identical requirements will not be able to live on the same limited resources because one species will compete more successfully than the other (NOTE: The loser has to adapt its feeding habits or behaviour or migrate to another area, otherwise it will experience a decrease in population or even become extinct.)

**competitive release** *noun* the process by which a species may expand its niche if it has no competitors

**complementarity** *noun* nature conservation based on a balance between wild and domesticated species in an area

**compliance** *noun* the act of obeying a regulation or conforming to a set of standards

**comply with** verb to obey a regulation  $\bigcirc$ People importing plants have to comply with CITES regulations.

**compose** verb to be made from a number of parts  $\bigcirc$  A carpel is composed of an ovary, a stigma and a style.

**Compositae** *plural noun* former name for **Asteraceae** 

**composition** *noun* the make-up or structure of something  $\bigcirc$  *the composition of the atmosphere* 

**compost** *noun* **1.** rotted vegetation, used as fertiliser or mulch **2.** a prepared soil or peat mixture in which plants are grown in horticulture ■ *verb* to form material resembling humus by the decomposition of organic waste, as in a compost heap

**compost heap** *noun* a pile of organic, especially plant, waste, usually kept in a container and left to decay gradually, being turned over occasionally. It is used as a fertiliser and soil improver.

**composting** *noun* the controlled decomposition of organic waste, especially used for the disposal for plant waste in gardens or domestic green waste such as vegetable peelings

**compound** *noun* a substance made up of two or more components

**compound fertiliser** *noun* a fertiliser that supplies two or more nutrients. Also called **mixed fertiliser**. Compare **straight fertiliser** 

**compulsory** *adjective* forced or ordered by an authority  $\bigcirc$  *the compulsory slaughter of infected animals* 

**concentrate** noun **1**. the strength of a solution, or the quantity of a substance in a specific volume **2**. a strong solution which is to be diluted  $\bigcirc$  orange juice made from concentrate  $\blacksquare$  verb to reduce the volume of a solution and increase its strength by evaporation. Opposite **dilute** 

**concentration** noun **1**. a collection in a particular place rather than spread around  $\bigcirc$  *The maximum concentration of ozone is between 20 and 25km above the Earth's surface.* **2**. the amount of a substance in a given volume or mass of a solution

**concentration peak** *noun* the largest amount of a substance in a solution or in a given volume **concrete** *noun* a hard stone-like substance made by mixing cement, sand, aggregate and water and letting it dry

**concretion** *noun* the formation of a solid mass of rock from pieces of stones and other sedimentary materials

**concretionary** *adjective* referring to stone which is formed by concretion

**condensate** *noun* **1.** a substance formed by condensation, e.g. a liquid formed from a vapour **2.** a substance that is a gas when occurring naturally underground but becomes liquid when brought to the surface

**condensation** *noun* **1**. the action of making vapour into liquid **2**. the water that forms when warm damp air meets a cold surface such as a wall or window

**condense** *verb* **1.** to make something compact or more dense **2.** to make a vapour become liquid

**condensed** *adjective* made compact or more dense

**condenser** *noun* a device that cools steam or other vapour and turns it back into liquid

**condition** noun **1.** the present state of something **2.** the physical state of a site of special scientific interest, according to whether or not conservation objectives are being achieved  $\bigcirc$  favourable condition  $\bigcirc$  unfavourable condition  $\blacksquare$  plural noun **conditions** variable environmental factors such as temperature, salinity and acidity to which organisms respond  $\bigcirc$  in wet or dry conditions

**conditioned reflex** *noun* **1**. an automatic reaction by an animal to a stimulus, learned from past experience **2**. a reaction to a stimulus learned from past experience

**conditioner** noun a substance that is used to make an improvement in something else  $\bigcirc$  mushroom compost used as a soil conditioner

**conditioning** *noun* the act of improving the quality of something

**conduct** *verb* to carry out something such as an experiment, survey or review

**conduction** noun the process by which heat or electricity passes through a substance  $\bigcirc$  Heat is transferred to the layer of air next to the Earth's surface by conduction.

**conductive** *adjective* having the ability to allow heat or electricity to pass through  $\odot$  *Steel is a conductive material.*  $\bigcirc$  *Land masses are less conductive than water.* 

**conductivity** *noun* the ability of a material to conduct heat or electricity  $\bigcirc$  *Because* 

of the poor conductivity of air, heat is transferred from the Earth's surface upwards by convection.

**conduit** *noun* **1**. a channel along which a fluid flows **2**. a pipe or elongated box used to protect electrical cables

**cone** noun **1**. a solid body with a base in the shape of a circle, and with sides that narrow to a point **2**. a hard scaly structure containing seeds on such plants as conifers **Conference of the Parties** noun the group of nations which have ratified the Framework Convention on Climate Change. Abbr **COP** 

**confluence** *noun* a place where two rivers or streams of air join

**congener** noun **1**. a species which belongs to the same genus as another **2**. a chemical element which belongs to the same group as another

**congenital** *adjective* existing at or before birth

congested adjective blocked

**congestion** *noun* **1**. the blocking of a tube or a passage **2**. the situation that occurs when there is too much traffic to be able to flow freely in the streets of a town or city

**congestion charge** *noun* a sum of money paid by motorists to be allowed to drive a vehicle into a town or city centre

**congestion charging** *noun* a method of reducing congestion in a city by charging motorists a fee to drive within a certain area **conglomerate** *noun* a sedimentary layer formed of small round stones

**conifer** *noun* a tree with long thin needleshaped leaves and bearing seed in scaly cones. Most are evergreen.

coniferous adjective referring to conifers

**coniferous forest, coniferous woodland** *noun* an area of wooded land consisting of more than 75% conifers

**coning** *noun* the widening out of a column of smoke as it leaves a chimney

**conjugation** *noun* **1**. a simple form of reproduction in single-celled organisms in which they join together, exchange genetic information and then separate **2**. in algae and fungi, the fusion of male and female nuclei **3**. the alternation in a molecule of two or more double or triple bonds with single bonds

**connect** verb to join or associate two or more objects, processes or ideas together  $\bigcirc$ *Bones are connected to form a skeleton.* 

**connection** *noun* a point at which things are joined or associated  $\bigcirc$  *the connection* 

between living things and their environment

**conservancy** *noun* an official body which protects a part of the environment

**conservation** *noun* **1.** the process of protecting something from undesirable change **2.** the maintenance of environmental quality and resources by the use of ecological knowledge and principles

**conservation area** *noun* an area of special environmental or historical importance that is protected by law from changes that have not received official permission

**conservation biology** *noun* the study of how species and ecosystems can be maintained

**conservation body** *noun* a group of people or an organisation that promotes the conservation of species, habitats or an area of countryside and the careful management of natural resources

**conservation headland** *noun* an area between the edge of a crop and the first tractor tramline that is treated less intensively with pesticides so that a range of broadleaved weeds and beneficial insects survive, used as a method of encouraging biodiversity

**conservationist** *noun* a person who promotes, carries out or works for conservation

**conservation measure** *noun* a way in which environmental quality can be maintained

**conservation of energy** *noun* the process of making consumption of energy more efficient, preventing loss or waste of energy, e.g. by the loss of heat from buildings

**conservation of resources** *noun* the process of managing resources such as fossil fuels and other natural materials so as not to waste them, damage them or use them too quickly

**conservation status** *noun* the condition of a site of special scientific interest, according to whether or not conservation objectives are being achieved

**conservation tillage** *noun* a farming method which aims to plough the soil as little as possible, to prevent erosion, save energy and improve biodiversity. Also called **minimum tillage** 

**conserve** verb **1**. to keep and not waste something  $\Box$  **to conserve energy** to use only as much electricity or other fuel as is really needed, e.g. by keeping central heating a little lower than before **2**. to look after and keep something in the same state  $\bigcirc$  to conserve tigers' habitat

**consociation**, **consocies** *noun* an ecological community that has one main species, e.g. a wood consisting mostly of beech trees

**conspecific** *adjective* referring to an organism belonging to the same species as another organism  $\blacksquare$  *noun* an organism belonging to the same species as another organism

**constant** *noun* an item of data whose value does not change. Opposite **variable**  $\blacksquare$  *adjective* **1**. not changing  $\Box$  **to remain constant** to stay the same  $\bigcirc$  *The temperature of the gas remains constant.* **2**. continuous, not stopping  $\bigcirc$  *The wardens complained about the constant stream of visitors to the reservation.* 

**constituent** *noun* a substance or component which forms part of a whole  $\blacksquare$  *adjective* forming part of a whole  $\bigcirc$  *the constituent elements of air* 

**construction** *noun* **1.** the building of something **2.** something built  $\bigcirc$  *an elegant construction of steel* 

**construction industry** *noun* the business or trade of constructing buildings

**consultative body** *noun* a group of people who can give their advice and opinion on a subject but who do not have the power to make laws

consumable adjective able to be consumed

**consumable goods, consumables** *plural noun* products that are used quickly and have to be bought often, e.g. food or stationery

**consume** verb **1**. to use up or burn fuel  $\bigcirc$ The new pump consumes only half the fuel which the other pump would use. **2**. to eat foodstuffs  $\bigcirc$  The population consumes ten tonnes of foodstuffs per week.

**consumer** noun **1**. a person or company which buys and uses goods and services  $\bigcirc$ *Gas consumers are protesting at the increase in prices.*  $\bigcirc$  *The factory is a heavy consumer of water.* **2**. an organism that eats other organisms. Compare **producer** 

**consumerism** *noun* a movement for the protection of the rights of consumers

**consumer panel** *noun* a group of consumers who report on products they have used so that the manufacturers can improve them or use what the panel says about them in advertising

**consumer protection** *noun* protecting consumers against unfair or illegal traders

**consumer research** *noun* research into why consumers buy goods and what goods they really want to buy

**consumption** noun **1**. the fact or process of using something  $\bigcirc$  a car with low petrol consumption  $\bigcirc$  The country's consumption of wood has fallen by a quarter. **2**. the taking of food or liquid into the body  $\bigcirc$  Nearly 3% of all food samples were found to be unfit for human consumption through contamination by lead.

**consumption efficiency** *noun* the percentage of the total available matter at one trophic level which is consumed by animals at the next trophic level, e.g. the percentage of plants eaten by herbivores. Abbr **CE** 

**contact** *noun* a physical connection between two or more things

**contact herbicide**, **contact weedkiller** *noun* a substance which kills a plant whose leaves it touches, e.g. paraquat

**contagion** *noun* the spreading of a disease by touching an infected person, or objects which an infected person has touched. Compare **infection** 

**contagious** *adjective* referring to a disease which can be transmitted by touching an infected person, or objects which an infected person has touched. Compare **infec**tious

**container** *noun* **1**. a box, case or bottle that holds something else **2**. a large case, with internationally agreed measurements, that can be transported by truck and then easily loaded on a ship

**containment** *noun* the actions taken to stop the spread of something such as disease or contamination

**contaminant** *noun* a substance which causes contamination

**contaminate** *verb* to make something impure by touching it or by adding something, especially something harmful, to it  $\bigcirc$  *Supplies of drinking water were contaminated by uncontrolled discharges from the factory.* 

**contaminated land, contaminated site** *noun* an area which has been polluted as a result of human activities such as industrial processes, presenting a hazard to human health, and which needs cleaning before it can be used for other purposes

COMMENT: Contaminated land is a feature of most industrialised countries. Careless past management of waste, lack of pollution controls and many leaks and spills have left a legacy of land contaminated by a wide variety of substances. In some cases this presents unacceptable risks to human beings, ecosystems, water resources or property and has to be dealt with by formal remedial measures.

**continental climate** *noun* a type of climate found in the centre of a large continent away from the sea, with long dry summers, very cold winters and not much rainfall

**continental crust** *noun* the part of the Earth's crust under the continents and continental shelves, lying above the oceanic crust

**continental drift** *noun* a geological theory that the present continents were once part of a single landmass and have gradually drifted away from each other over a period of millions of years

**continental shelf** *noun* the sloping land surface of the seabed from the shore out to sea for an average distance of 70 km

**contingent valuation method** *noun* a survey-based economic method which is used to determine the monetary value of the benefits or costs of an environmental policy or feature

continuous adjective going on without stopping

**contour** *noun* **1**. the shape of something **2**. same as **contour line** 

**contour line** *noun* a line drawn on a map to show ground of the same height above sea level

**contour ploughing** *noun* the practice of ploughing across the side of a hill so as to create ridges along the contours of the land which will hold water and prevent erosion

contract noun an agreement

**control** *noun* **1**. the action of directing or working in a specific way **2**. the process of restraining something or keeping something under control to make sure that something is well regulated ○ *The authorities brought the epidemic under control*. □ **out of control** unregulated ○ *The epidemic appears to be out of control*. **3**. (*in experiments*) a sample used as a comparison with the one being tested ■ *verb* to direct or manage something

**control action threshold** *noun* the point at which the amount of pest infestation makes it necessary to start pest control. Abbr **CAT** 

**controlled atmosphere** *noun* the conditions in which oxygen and carbon dioxide concentrations are regulated and monitored, e.g. to improve the storage of fruit and vegetables

controlled dumping noun the disposal of waste on special sites

**controlled environment** *noun* an environment in which conditions such as temperature, atmosphere and relative humidity are regulated and monitored

**controlled experiment** *noun* an experiment designed to test the effects of independent variables on a dependent variable by changing one independent variable at a time

**controlled landfill** *noun* the disposal of waste in a landfill carried out under a permit system according to the specific laws in force

**controlled tipping** *noun* the disposal of waste in special landfill sites. ◊ **fly-tipping conurbation** *noun* a large area covered with buildings such as houses, factories or offices

**convection** noun the process by which hot air rises and cool air descends  $\bigcirc$  Heat is transferred from the Earth's surface upwards largely by convection.

**convention** noun **1**. a meeting of large numbers of people  $\bigcirc$  a convention of environmentalists **2**. a formal agreement  $\bigcirc$ *Convention on Biological Diversity*  $\square$  **by convention** by general agreement or custom

**conventional** *adjective* usual, accepted and familiar to most people  $\bigcirc$  *the conventional symbols used on weather charts* 

**conventional fuel** *noun* a traditional means of providing energy, e.g. coal, wood or gas, as opposed to alternative energy

sources such as solar power, tidal power or wind power

Convention on Biological Diversity noun an international agreement made at the Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro in 1992 to conserve biological diversity, encourage sustainable use of natural resources and ensure that benefits from the use of genetic resources are shared in a fair way. Abbr CBD Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora noun an international agreement between 123 countries to reduce or prevent the trade in endangered species

of wild animals and plants. Abbr CITES Convention on the Conservation of European Wildlife and Natural Habitats noun an agreement made in 1979 between 45 European and African states to conserve wild flora and fauna, especially endangered and vulnerable species, including migratory species, and their natural habitats. Also called **Bern Conven**tion

**convergence** noun 1. the movement towards or the act of coming together or meeting at a point  $\bigcirc$  *There is convergence* of meridians of longitude at the North and South Poles. 2. a phenomenon that occurs whenever there is a net inflow of air into a region of the atmosphere, resulting in the accumulation of air and an increase in density. Compare **divergence 3.** the process that occurs in an ocean when warm surface water meets cold polar surface water and starts to cool and sink

**convergence zone** *noun* the area of an ocean in which convergence occurs

**conversion** *noun* a change from one system or set of beliefs to another

**convert** verb to change something to a different system, set of rules or state  $\bigcirc$  *Photochemical reactions convert oxygen to ozone.*  $\bigcirc$  *She has converted her car to take LPG.* 

**converter** noun a device which alters the form of something  $\bigcirc$  A backup converter converts the alternating current power into direct current.

cool adjective rather cold

**coolant** *noun* a substance used to cool something such as an engine

**coombe** *noun* another spelling of **combe cooperation** *noun* the act of working together in harmony to achieve a common goal

**COP** *abbr* Conference of the Parties

**copper** noun a metallic trace element. It is essential to biological life and used in making alloys and in electric wiring. (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Cu**; the atomic number is **29** and the atomic weight is **63.55**.)

**coppice** noun an area of trees which have been cut down to near the ground to allow shoots to grow which are then harvested. **coppice forest, coppice wood** *noun* woodland that has regrown from shoots formed on the stumps or roots of previously cut trees, usually cut again after a few years to provide small branches for uses such as fuel

COMMENT: The best trees for coppicing are those which naturally send up several tall straight stems from a bole, such as willow, alder or poplar. In coppice management, the normal cycle is about five to ten years of growth, after which the stems are cut back.

ing many years to regrow once stripped (NOTE: It is used, among other things, for bottle corks, fishing net floats and flooring, but cork oaks are now attracting conservation interest.)

**cork oak**, cork tree *noun* an evergreen tree from which cork is harvested. Latin name: *Quercus suber*.

**corm** *noun* a swollen underground plant stem with a terminal bud, e.g. a crocus corm

**corn** *noun* **1**. wheat or barley (*informal*) **2**. *US* maize

Other cosmic rays appear to come from deep space, especially from supernovae, which accounts for the appearance of heavier nuclei.

**cost-benefit analysis** *noun* an economic examination of the advantages and disadvantages of a specific course of action

**cost of living** *noun* the level of prices of the basic necessities of life such as food, clothing, shelter and fuel  $\bigcirc$  *The cost of living has risen by 2% over the last year.* 

**cotton grass** *noun* a plant with white fluffy flower heads that grows in boggy ground. Latin name: *Eriophorum angustifolium*.

**Countryside and Rights of Way Act** *noun* legislation passed by the UK government in 2000 that gave the public greater freedom of access to privately owned areas of uncultivated land and strengthened legislation protecting wildlife. Abbr **CROW Act** 

**Countryside Commission** noun a former organisation in the UK, which supervised countryside planning and recreation. It was particularly concerned with National Parks and Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

**Countryside Commission for Scotland** *noun* an organisation in Scotland concerned with the protection of the countryside and with setting up country parks for public recreation. It is part of Scottish National Heritage.

**Countryside Council for Wales** *noun* a statutory advisory body of the UK government responsible for sustaining natural beauty, wildlife and outdoor leisure opportunities in Wales and its coastal areas. Abbr **CCW** 

**countryside management** *noun* the study and practice of environmental conservation in association with rural enterprise, countryside access and recreational activities

**Countryside Management Scheme** *noun* in Northern Ireland, a system of payments designed to encourage landowners and farmers to adopt, or to continue with, environmentally sensitive farming practices

**countryside recreation** *noun* leisure activities that take place in the countryside. Also called **rural recreation** 

**countryside recreation site** *noun* a location visited or used by tourists in the countryside, e.g. a national park, heritage coast, cycle path or watersports facility

**countryside stewardship** *noun* the practice of altering farming practices to benefit wildlife and retain natural diversity. Abbr **CSS** 

### **Countryside Stewardship Scheme**

Dams can have serious environmental effects: the large lake behind the dam may alter the whole climate of a region; the large heavy mass of water in the lake may trigger earth movements if the rock beneath is unstable: in tropical areas, dams encourage the spread of bacteria, insects and parasites, leading to an increase in diseases; dams may increase salinity in watercourses and retain silt which otherwise would be carried down the river and be deposited as fertile soil in the plain below: dams may also deprive downstream communities or countries of water, leading to regional tensions.

It is also possible to chart past changes in climate in the same way, as rings vary in thickness according to climatic conditions, allowing scientists to compare the climatic changes in various parts of the world over a very long period of time.

COMMENT: A desert will be formed in areas where rainfall is less than 25 cm per annum whether the region is hot or cold. About 30% of all the land surface of the Earth is desert or in the process of becoming desert. The spread of desert conditions in arid and semi-arid regions is caused not only by climatic conditions, but also by human pressures. So overgrazing of pasture and the clearing of forest for fuel and for cultivation both lead to the loss of organic material, a reduction in rainfall by evaporation and soil erosion.

dicotyledenous *adjective* referring to dicotyledons

**differential** *adjective* referring to things which react differently when measured against a norm or standard

**differential reproduction** *noun* the ability to produce more offspring with the same adaptations as the parents, allowing the species to survive under changed environmental conditions

**diffuse** *adjective* **1**. spread out in every direction **2**. widespread in effect and without a single identifiable source  $\bigcirc$  *diffuse pollution*  $\Diamond$  **non-point source** 

**diffusion** noun **1**. the process of spreading out  $\bigcirc$  Gas from the turbine enters the exhaust system at high velocities but, because of high friction losses, the speed of flow is decreased by diffusion. **2**. the mixing of a liquid with another liquid, or of a gas with another gas **3**. the passing of a liquid or gas through a membrane

**digest** verb 1. to break down food and convert it into elements which can be absorbed by the body 2. to use bacteria to process waste, especially organic waste such as manure, in order to produce biogas 0.55% of UK sewage sludge is digested. 0.55% of UK sewage sludge is digested. 0.55% of UK sewage sludge is digested.

**digester** *noun* a device that produces gas such as methane from refuse

**digestible organic matter** *noun* an organic substance which can be processed to produce biogas, e.g. manure. Abbr **DOM** 

**digestion** *noun* **1**. the process by which food is broken down and converted into elements which can be absorbed by the body **2**. the conversion of organic matter into simpler chemical compounds, as in the production of biogas from manure

**digit** *noun* a finger or toe, or a similar body part

**digitate** *adjective* **1.** having fingers or toes, or body parts like fingers or toes **2.** same as **palmate** 

dilation noun an increase in volume

**diluent** *noun* a substance which is used to dilute a liquid

**dilute** verb to add water or solvent to a liquid to make it weaker. Opposite **concentrate** ■ adjective with water or solvent added **dilute and disperse** *noun* a method of using landfill sites in which the waste is allowed to leak gradually into the surrounding soil

**dilution** *noun* **1**. the action of diluting a liquid **2**. a liquid which has been diluted

**dilution effect** *noun* a strategy adopted by prey to reduce the effect of predators, by which the prey congregates in large numbers so that a predator can only remove a small proportion of the total

**dimethyl sulfide**, **dimethyl sulphide** *noun* a gas given off by water which is rich in sewage pollution

**diminished** *adjective* reduced  $\bigcirc$  *At higher altitudes, ground objects are less easily seen because of diminished size.* 

**diode** *noun* an electronic component that allows an electrical current to pass in one direction and not the other

**dioecious** *adjective* referring to a plant species in which male and female flowers occur on different individuals.  $\Diamond$  **monoe**cious

**dioxin** *noun* an extremely poisonous gas. It is formed as a product of waste incineration and some other combustion processes and is also a by-product of the manufacture of the herbicide 2,4,5-T. (NOTE: It is the gas that escaped in the disaster at Seveso in 1976.)

**diploid** *adjective* referring to an organism that has two matched sets of chromosomes in a cell nucleus, one set from each parent (NOTE: Each species has a characteristic diploid number of chromosomes.)

**direct current** *noun* an electric current of constant value that flows in one direction. Abbr **DC** 

**disaster** *noun* a serious event causing deaths and/or great damage to the environment. Disasters are often classified as either natural, e.g. earthquakes, or manmade, e.g. oil spills.

**disaster management** *noun* the policies developed and the actions undertaken to deal with a disaster

**disc floret** *noun* a small tubular part among those on the central rounded part of the flower head of a plant belonging to the Compositae, such as a daisy or sunflower. Compare **ray floret** 

**discharge** noun **1**. the action of releasing waste material into the environment **2**. waste material, such as that from an industrial process or in the form of sewage, that is passed into the environment **3**. the rate of flow of a liquid in a channel  $\blacksquare$  verb **1**. (of a

*river*) to flow into a lake or the sea  $\bigcirc$  *The river Rhine discharges into the North Sea.* **2.** to pass waste material into the environment  $\bigcirc$  *The factory discharges ten tonnes of toxic effluent per day into the river.* 

**disclimax** *noun* a stable ecological state which has been caused by human intervention, e.g. a desert caused by deforestation

**disclimax community** *noun* a stable plant community which is caused by human action, e.g. felling a rainforest for timber. Compare **climax** 

**discoloration**, **discolouration** *noun* a change of colour, especially one caused by deterioration

**discolour** *verb* to change the colour of something, especially through deterioration, usually making it paler (NOTE: The US spelling is **discolor**.)

**discoloured** *adjective* with a changed colour, especially through deterioration

**discontinuity** *noun* **1**. a break in a layer of rock, caused by a fault or erosion **2**. a band in the interior of the Earth which separates two layers and through which seismic shocks do not pass

**discounting** *noun* a method used by economists to calculate the cost in current value of a project's future costs and benefits

**disease** noun an illness of people, animals or plants  $\bigcirc$  *He caught a disease in the tropics.*  $\bigcirc$  *He is a specialist in occupational diseases.* 

**diseased** adjective affected by a disease and so not functioning as usual or not whole  $\bigcirc$  To treat dieback, diseased branches should be cut back to healthy wood.

**disinfect** verb to make something or somewhere free from microorganisms such as bacteria  $\bigcirc$  All utensils must be thoroughly disinfected. (NOTE: Disinfect, disinfection and disinfectant are used for substances which destroy germs on instruments, objects or the skin.)

**disinfectant** *noun* a substance used to kill microorganisms such as bacteria

**disinfection** *noun* the process of making something or somewhere free from microorganisms such as bacteria

**disinfest** *verb* to remove insect or animal pests from a place

**disintegrate** *verb* to break into pieces  $\bigcirc$  *In holocrine glands the cells disintegrate as they secrete.* 

**disintegration** noun the process of breaking into pieces  $\bigcirc$  *Electromagnetic radiations resulting from the disintegration of*

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radioactive materials are known as gamma rays.

**disjunct** *noun* a distribution area for an animal or plant which is split into geographically different regions

**disorder** *noun* a disruption of a system or balanced state

**dispersal** noun the moving of individual plants or animals into or from an area  $\bigcirc$ seed dispersal by wind  $\bigcirc$  Aphids breed in large numbers and spread by dispersal in wind currents.

**disperse** verb 1. (of organisms) to separate and move away over a wide area 2. to send something out over a wide area  $\bigcirc$  Some seeds are dispersed by birds.  $\bigcirc$  Power stations have tall chimneys to disperse the emissions of pollutants.

**dispersing agent** *noun* a chemical substance sprayed onto an oil slick to break up the oil into smaller particles

**dispersion** *noun* the pattern in which animals or plants are found over a wide area

**dispersion model** *noun* a mathematical prediction of how pollutants from a source will be distributed in the surrounding area under specific conditions of wind, temperature, humidity and other environmental factors

**disposable** adjective thrown away after use  $\bigcirc$  disposable syringes

**disposal** noun the process of getting rid of something  $\bigcirc$  The disposal of raw sewage into the sea contaminates shellfish.  $\diamondsuit$  final disposal

**disposal site** noun same as **landfill site dispose of** verb to get rid of something  $\bigcirc$ *The problem with nuclear reactors is how to dispose of the radioactive waste.* 

**disrupt** verb to upset a system or balanced state  $\bigcirc$  *The storm disrupted the electricity supply.* 

**disruption** *noun* the process of upsetting a system or balanced state

**disseminate** verb to make information or knowledge available  $\bigcirc$  The information was disseminated widely throughout the organisation.

**dissemination** *noun* the process of making information about something available  $\bigcirc$  *the dissemination of new technology* **dissolvable**, **dissoluable** *adjective* able to be dissolved

**dissolve** verb to become part of a liquid and form a solution  $\bigcirc$  Sugar dissolves in water.  $\bigcirc$  There is a possibility that gas may be dissolved into the fluid and thus introduced into the system. **dissolved oxygen** *noun* the amount of gaseous oxygen present in water, expressed as either its presence in a volume of water (in milligrams per litre) or its percentage in saturated water. Abbr **DO** 

**distal** *adjective* away from the centre or point of attachment. Compare **proximal** 

**distil** *verb* **1**. to produce a pure liquid by heating a liquid and condensing the vapour, as in the production of alcohol or essential oils **2**. to produce by-products from coal

**distillate** *noun* a substance produced by distillation

**distillation** *noun* the process of producing a pure liquid by heating a liquid and condensing the vapour, as in the production of alcohol or essential oils

**distributary** *noun* a stream or river flowing out from a larger river, as in a delta

**distribute** verb to give something or send something out  $\bigcirc$  distribute electrical power

**distribution** noun **1**. the process of giving or sending something out  $\bigcirc$  power distribution systems **2**. the pattern in which something is found in various areas, depending on factors such as climate or altitude  $\bigcirc$  The distribution of crops in various regions of the world is a result of thousands of years of breeding and testing.

**distributional effects** *plural noun* the net costs and benefits of a policy across the population and economy

**distribution area** *noun* a number of places in which a species is found

**district** *noun* a part of an area, especially for administrative purposes

**disturb** verb to alter the usual condition of something  $\bigcirc$  Small hills can disturb the flow of air.  $\bigcirc$  The building of the road has disturbed the balance of the ecosystem.

**disturbance** noun **1**. an alteration in the usual condition of something  $\bigcirc$  *In general, the higher the mountain and the faster the air flow the greater is the resulting disturbance.* **2**. a change in an ecosystem caused by an alteration of the environmental conditions, by a process such as drought, pollution or felling of woodland

**disturbance threshold** *noun* the point at which an alteration of the environmental conditions causes change in an ecosystem

**ditch** noun a channel to take away rainwater

**dithiocarbamates** *plural noun* fungicides widely used on fruit, vegetables and arable crops

**diurnal** adjective 1. referring to the 24hour cycle of day and night  $\bigcirc$  Diurnal changes in surface temperature over the sea are small. 2. happening every day 3. happening in the daytime

**diurnal jet** *noun* a current of water in the ocean created by the heat of the sun during the daytime

**diuron** noun a herbicide used as a ground spray around trees and bushes (NOTE: It is under review for withdrawal from use in the European Union.)

**divergence** noun a difference  $\bigcirc$  a divergence of opinion on the cloning issue  $\bigcirc$  a divergence between the preliminary report and the final results

divergent adjective different

diversification noun changing to a different way of working

**diversify** verb **1.** to develop in different ways **2.** to start doing several different things  $\bigcirc$  Farmers are encouraged to diversify land use by using it for woodlands or for recreational facilities.

**diversity** *noun* the richness of the number of species

**divide** verb to separate something into parts, or become separated into parts  $\bigcirc$  Air masses are divided into two types according to source region and these are known as polar and tropical air masses.

division noun 1. a separation into parts 2. a traditional category in the scientific classification of plants, now replaced by **phylum** 

**DM** *abbr* dry matter

**DNA** noun a nucleic acid chain carrying genetic information that is a major constituent of chromosomes. Full form **deoxyribonucleic acid**.  $\Diamond$  **RNA** 

DO abbr dissolved oxygen

**Dobson unit** *noun* a unit used in measuring the total amount of ozone present in a vertical column of air above the surface of the Earth (NOTE: In a layer of ozone at atmospheric pressure of 1013 hPa and temperature of 298 K which measures 1 mm in thickness, the ozone present is equivalent to 100 Dobson units.)

**doline**, **dolina** *noun* a round or oval depression in the ground, found in limestone regions

**dolomite** *noun* an alkaline carbonate of magnesium or calcium rock

**dolphin** *noun* a marine mammal belonging to the family which also includes killer whales and pilot whales. Family: Delphinidae. **DOM** *abbr* **1**. digestible organic matter **2**. dry organic matter

**domain** noun a particular area of activity O The subject is controversial outside the scientific domain.

**domestic** adjective **1**. referring to the home  $\bigcirc$  domestic waste **2**. not foreign  $\bigcirc$  domestic politics **3**. kept as a farm animal or pet

**domestic animal** *noun* **1**. an animal such as a dog or cat which lives with human beings as a pet **2**. an animal such as a pig or goat which is kept by human beings for food or other uses

**domesticated** *adjective* **1**. referring to a wild animal which has been trained to live near a house and not be frightened of human beings **2**. referring to a species which was formerly wild but has been selectively bred to fill human needs

**domestication** *noun* the action of domesticating wild animals or plants

domestic consumption *noun* same as home consumption

**domestic green waste** *noun* the waste produced by a household that is from plants or other materials that can be composted

**domestic hot water** *noun* hot water used for washing in a house. Abbr **DHW** 

domestic refuse noun waste material from houses. Also called domestic waste, household refuse

**domestic sewage** *noun* the sewage from houses

domestic waste noun same as domestic refuse

**dominance** *noun* **1.** a state where one species in a community is more abundant than others **2.** the priority for food and reproductive mates that one animal has over another in a group **3.** the characteristic of a gene form (**allele**) that leads to the trait which it controls being shown in any individual carrying it. Compare **recessiveness** 

**dominance hierarchy** *noun* the system of priority given to specific individuals in terms of access to food and reproductive mates  $\bigcirc$  *In many species a male is at the top of the dominance hierarchy.* 

**dominant** *adjective* **1**. important or powerful **2**. (*of an allele*) having the characteristic that leads to the trait which it controls being shown in any individual carrying it. Compare **recessive 3**. (*of a species*) being more abundant than others in a community **=** *noun* a plant or species which has most influence on the composition and distribution of other species.  $\boldsymbol{\Diamond}$  codominant, subdominant

**dominant species** *noun* species which has most influence on the composition and distribution of other species

**dormancy** noun an inactive period  $\bigcirc$  seed dormancy

**dormant** *adjective* **1**. not active or developing  $\bigcirc$  *Some seeds lie dormant in the soil for many years.* **2**. referring to a volcano which is not erupting but is still able to erupt. Compare **extinct** 

**dormitory suburb**, **dormitory town** *noun* a suburb or town from which the residents travel to work somewhere else

**dorsal** *adjective* referring to the back of a structure such as the body of a leaf. Opposite **ventral** 

**dose** noun the amount of a drug or of ionising radiation received by an organism  $\bigcirc$ *The patients received more than the permitted dose of radiation.* 

**dosimeter**, **dosemeter** *noun* an instrument for measuring the amount of radiation **double hulled tanker** *noun* an oil tanker made with two hulls, one inside the other, so as to prevent oil from spilling out if there is an accident

**doubling time** *noun* the time a population takes to double in numbers

**Douglas fir** *noun* a North American softwood tree widely planted throughout the world, and producing strong timber. Latin name: *Pseudotsuga menziesii*.

**down** noun **1**. the small soft feathers of a young bird, or soft feathers below the outer feathers in some adult birds **2**. a grass-covered chalky hill with low bushes and few trees  $\blacksquare$  plural noun **downs** an area of grass-covered chalky hills with low bushes and few trees

**down draught** *noun* **1.** the cool air which flows downwards as a rainstorm approaches **2.** the air which flows rapidly down the lee side of a building or mountain **3.** the air which blows down a chimnev

**downland** *noun* an area of grassy treeless hills

**downpipe** *noun* a pipe carrying rainwater from a roof into a drain or soakaway

**downstream** adverb, adjective towards the mouth of a river  $\bigcirc$  The silt is carried downstream and deposited in the delta.  $\bigcirc$ Pollution is spreading downstream from the factory.  $\bigcirc$  Downstream communities have not yet been affected. Compare upstream

down-the-drain chemical noun a household chemical such as a product used

for cleaning that is disposed of through the public drains

**downwash** *noun* the action which brings smoke from a chimney down to the ground as it is caught in a downward moving current of air

**drain** noun 1. an underground pipe which takes waste water from buildings or from farmland 2. an open channel for taking away waste water  $\blacksquare$  verb 1. to remove liquid from somewhere 2. (of liquid) to flow into something  $\bigcirc$  The stream drains into the main river.

**drainage** *noun* **1**. the removal of liquid from somewhere **2**. the removal of liquid waste and sewage from a building

drainage area, drainage basin noun same as catchment 1

**drainpipe** *noun* a pipe carrying rainwater, sewage or other liquid into a drain or soakaway

**draught animal** *noun* an animal used to pull vehicles or carry heavy loads

**dredge** *verb* to remove silt and alluvial deposits from a river bed or other water course or channel

drift noun a slow movement or change

**drift mine** *noun* a mine used when the material to be extracted is visible on the side of a hill or mountain and can be dug into directly

**driftnet** *noun* a very wide long net for catching fish that a fishing boat allows to drift in the sea

**drill** verb to bore a hole or an oil well  $\bigcirc$ They are hoping to start drilling for oil by the end of the year.

**drilling** *noun* the process of boring a hole or an oil well

**drilling rig**, **drilling platform** *noun* a large metal construction containing the drilling and pumping equipment for extracting oil or gas

**drinkable** *adjective* referring to water or another liquid that is safe to drink

**drinking water** *noun* water for drinking, especially water that is safe to drink

**drizzle** *noun* a light persistent rain with drops of less than 0.5 mm in diameter

**drizzly** *adjective* referring to weather with a lot of drizzle

**drop** noun **1**. a small amount of liquid that falls  $\bigcirc a \, drop \, of \, water \bigcirc a \, few \, drops \, of \, rain$ **2**. a lowering or reduction  $\bigcirc$  The passage of a cold front is usually followed by a drop in temperature.  $\bigcirc$  A sudden drop in oil pressure is usually an indication of serious en*gine trouble.* **3.** a fall of immature fruit ■ *verb* to fall or let something fall

**droplet** noun a small drop of liquid  $\bigcirc$  *Experiments show that smaller droplets of rain can remain supercooled to much lower temperatures than large droplets.* 

**droppings** plural noun excreta from animals  $\bigcirc$  The grass was covered with rabbit and sheep droppings.

**drought** *noun* a long period without rain at a time when rain usually falls

**drought stress** *noun* a lack of growth caused by drought

**drowned valley** *noun* a valley which has been submerged by the advance of the sea or a lake

**drumlin** *noun* a small oval hill formed by the movement of a glacier, with one end steep and the other sloping

**drupe** *noun* a fruit with a single seed and a fleshy body (NOTE: Stone fruits such as cherries or plums are drupes.)

**dry** *adjective* with very little moisture **u** *verb* to remove moisture from something

**dry deposition** *noun* the fall of dry particles from polluted air forming a harmful deposit on surfaces such as buildings or the leaves of trees

**dryfall** *noun* the fall of polluting substances as particulates. Compare **wetfall** 

drying noun removing moisture from something

**drying out** *noun* a process whereby water is drained away from wetlands

**dry land** *noun* **1.** land contrasted with the sea or other body of water **2. dryland** an area that often has no rain for long periods (*often plural*) **a** *djective* referring to areas where there is little rain

**dry matter** *noun* the matter remaining in a biological sample or in animal feed after the water content has been removed. Abbr **DM** 

**dryness** noun a state of not being wet  $\bigcirc$  the dryness of the atmosphere on very high mountains

**dry organic matter** *noun* organic matter such as sewage sludge or manure which has been dried out and may be used as a fertiliser. Abbr **DOM** 

**dry season** *noun* the time of year in some countries when very little rain falls

**dry-stone wall** *noun* a wall made of stones carefully placed one on top of the other without using any mortar

**dry up** verb (of a river or lake) to become  $dry \circ The river dries up completely in summer.$ 

**duct** *noun* a channel or tube through which things such as fluids or cables can pass  $\bigcirc$  *Air-conditioning ducts need regular cleaning.* 

**dump** noun a place where waste, especially solid waste, is thrown away  $\bigcirc$  The mine is surrounded with dumps of excavated waste.  $\blacksquare$  verb to throw away waste, especially without being subject to environmental controls

**dumping** noun **1.** the disposal of waste  $\bigcirc$  the dumping of nuclear waste into the sea  $\bigcirc$  illegal dumping **2.** the sale of agricultural products at a price below the true cost, to get rid of excess produce cheaply, usually in an overseas market

**dumping ground** *noun* a place where waste is thrown away, especially casually

**dumpsite** noun a place on land or at sea where waste is dumped  $\bigcirc$  Sludge bacteria can survive in seawater for long periods and are widely dispersed from dumpsites.

**dunes** plural noun an area of sand blown by the wind into small hills and ridges which may have plants growing on them  $\bigcirc$ The village was threatened by encroaching dunes.  $\bigcirc$  The dunes were colonised by marram grass.

**dung** *noun* solid waste excreta from animals, especially cattle, often used as fertiliser

**duplication** *noun* a situation where two or more things have the same purpose

duramen noun same as heartwood

**durum** noun a type of wheat grown in southern Europe and the USA and used in making semolina for processing into pasta. Latin name: *Triticum durum*.

**dust** *noun* a fine powder made of particles, e.g. dry dirt or sand

**dustbin** *noun* a container into which household rubbish is placed to be collected by municipal refuse collectors

**dustcart** *noun* a large vehicle that is used for collecting household waste

**dust devil** *noun* a rapidly turning column of air which picks up sand over a desert or beach, and things such as dust, leaves and litter elsewhere

**dust discharge** *noun* a release of dust into the atmosphere, especially from an industrial process

**dust storm** *noun* a storm of wind which blows dust and sand with it, common in North Africa

**dust veil** noun a mass of dust in the atmosphere created by volcanic eruptions, storms and burning fossil fuels, which cuts

**Dutch elm disease** *noun* a fungal disease that kills elm trees, caused by *Ceratocystis ulmi* and spread by a bark beetle

**duty of care** *noun* a duty which every citizen and organisation has not to act negligently, especially the system for the safe handling of waste, introduced by the UK Environmental Protection Act 1990

**dwelling** *noun* a place where a person lives, e.g. a house, apartment or flat

**dye** noun a substance used to change the colour of something  $\bigcirc$  Minute surface cracks which are difficult to detect by visual means may be highlighted by using penetrant dyes.

**dyke** *noun* **1**. a long wall of earth built to keep water out **2**. a ditch for drainage ■ *verb* to build walls of earth to help prevent water from flooding land

**dynamic coastline** *noun* a coastline that is changing naturally through wind and

wave action and may be increasing or eroding, either rapidly over a longer period

**dynamic equilibrium** *noun* a situation which is fluctuating around an apparent average state, where that average state is also changing through time

**dynamometer** *noun* a machine that measures the output of an engine

**dysphotic** *adjective* referring to the area of water in a lake or the sea between the aphotic zone at the bottom of the water and the euphotic zone which sunlight can reach

**dystrophic** *adjective* referring to a pond or lake that contains very acidic brown water, lacks oxygen, and is unable to support much plant or animal life because of excessive humus content.  $\diamond$  **eutrophic, mesotrophic, oligotrophic** 

**dystrophy** *noun* a condition in which pond or lake water is unable to support much plant or animal life because of excessive humus content. The dead vegetation does not decompose but settles at the bottom forming a peat bog.

**ear** noun **1**. an organ which is used for hearing **2**. the flower head of a cereal plant such as wheat or maize where the grains develop

**early successional plant** *noun* a plant which grows rapidly and produces many seeds, often not tolerating shade. Such plants are the first to colonise new areas.

**earth** noun **1.** soil **2.** the ground or land surface ■ verb to connect an electrical device to the ground  $\bigcirc All$  appliances must be earthed. (NOTE: The US term is ground.)

**Earth** *noun* the planet on which human beings developed and live

COMMENT: Earth is the third planet of the solar system and the only one known to support life. Earth is also remarkable for its seas of liquid water, for its oxygen-containing atmosphere and for being geologically very active. Earth rotates on its axis in a day, orbits the Sun in a year and has a satellite, the Moon, which orbits it once per lunar month. Earth can be divided into various zones: the lithosphere (solid rock and molten interior), the hydrosphere (the water covering the surface), the atmosphere (the gaseous zone rising above Earth's surface) and the biosphere (those parts of the other zones in which living organisms exist).

**earth closet** *noun* a toilet in which the excreta are covered with earth instead of being flushed away with water or treated with chemicals

earth dam noun a dam made of piled earth

**earth flow** *noun* the sliding of wet earth and rocks down the side of a slope or mountain, often after heavy rainfall or sometimes caused by excavation

**earthquake** noun a phenomenon in which the Earth's crust or the mantle beneath it shakes and the surface of the ground moves because of movement inside the crust along fault lines, often causing damage to buildings.  $\phi$  **epicentre, Modified Mercalli scale, Richter scale, seismic** 

**earth science** *noun* any science concerned with the physical aspects of the planet Earth, e.g. geochemistry, geodesy, geography, geology, geomorphology, geophysics or meteorology,

**Earth Summit** *noun* the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development held in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in June 1992

**earthworks** *plural noun* constructions such as walls or banks made from soil

**earthworm** *noun* an invertebrate animal with a long thin body divided into many segments, living in large numbers in the soil

COMMENT: Earthworms aerate the soil as they tunnel. They also eat organic matter and help increase the soil's fertility. They help stabilise the soil structure by compressing material and mixing it with organic matter and calcium. It is believed that they also secrete a hormone which encourages rooting by plants.

**ebb** verb (of the sea or water affected by tides) to move away from a shore, as the tide falls  $\blacksquare$  noun the movement of the sea or water affected by tides away from a shore as the tide falls. Compare flow

**ebb tide** noun a tide which is going down or which is at its lowest  $\bigcirc$  The plan is to build a barrage to generate electricity on the ebb tide. Compare **flood tide** 

**ebony** *noun* a black tropical hardwood tree, now becoming scarce. Genus: *Diospyros*.

**ecdysis** *noun* the regular shedding of the hard outer layer (**cuticle**) of arthropods or the skin of reptiles

**ecesis** *noun* the successful establishment of a plant or animal species in a new environment

echinoderm noun a marine invertebrate animal with a radially symmetrical body, tube feet, and an internal skeleton of calcareous plates, e.g. a starfish, sea urchin, sea lily or sea cucumber. Phylum: Echinodermata.

**echo** *noun* the repetition of a sound by reflection of sound waves from a surface

echolocation *noun* the technique of finding the location of something by sending out a sound signal and listening to the reflection of the sound (NOTE: Bats and whales navigate and find their food by using echolocation.)

#### echosounder

**echosounder** *noun* a device used to find the depth of water by sending a sound signal down to the bottom and calculating the distance from the time taken for the reflected sound to reach the surface again

**echosounding** *noun* the process of finding the depth of water using an echosounder

eclipse noun a situation when the Moon passes between the Sun and the Earth or when the Earth passes between the Sun and the Moon, in both cases cutting off the light visible from Earth.  $\Diamond$  solar eclipse, lunar eclipse

eco- prefix ecology, ecological

**ecoagriculture** *noun* the practice of productive agriculture using methods designed to maintain natural resources, biodiversity and the landscape

eco-audit noun same as environmental audit

**ecocatastrophe** *noun* an event that results in very severe damage to the environment, especially one caused by human action

ecoclimate noun the climate of a specific habitat, regarded as an ecological factor

**ecocline** *noun* the changes which take place in a species as individuals live in different habitats

**ecocomposite** *noun* a material made from a plant fibre such as hemp fixed in a resin based on a plant extract such as cashew-nut shell liquor

**eco-efficiency** *noun* the efficient manufacture of goods at competitive prices without harm to the environment

**eco-engineering** *noun* the use of trees and traditional materials to protect areas of land likely to suffer erosion or landslips, keeping hard construction to a minimum

ecol. abbr 1. ecological 2. ecology

**ecolabelling** *noun* the identification and labelling of products and services that are considered less harmful to the environment than other similar products or services

E. coli abbr Escherichia coli

ecological adjective referring to ecology ecological balance noun the theoretical concept of stability occurring when relative numbers of different organisms living in the same ecosystem remain more or less constant, although in practice there is always fluctuation

**ecological corridor** *noun* a strip of vegetation allowing the movement of wild-life or other organisms between two areas

ecological damage *noun* the harm done to an ecosystem

**ecological disaster** *noun* an event which seriously disturbs the balance of the environment

**ecological diversity** *noun* a variety of biological communities that interact with one another and with their physical and chemical environments

**ecological efficiency** *noun* a measurement of how much energy is used at different stages in the food chain or at different trophic levels

ecological engineering noun a design process that aims to integrate human activities with the natural environment for the benefit of both, taking ecological impact into account in the construction of roads or harbours, the introduction of new plants or animals, or other actions

**ecological factor** *noun* a factor which influences the growth and distribution of a plant species in a habitat

ecological fitness noun the number of offspring that survive to maturity and themselves reproduce

**ecological footprint** *noun* an area of the Earth that supplies the ecosystem resources for an organism to exist  $\bigcirc$  *Ecological footprints enable people to visualise the impact of their consumption patterns and activities on ecosystems.*  $\bigcirc$  *You can alter the size of your ecological footprint by modifying your actions.* 

**ecological indicator** *noun* a species that has particular nutritional or climatic requirements and whose presence in an area indicates that those requirements are satisfied

**ecological justification** *noun* the reasoning for nature conservation based on the idea that the environment provides specific functions necessary for human life

ecologically adverb in an ecological way

ecologically sustainable development noun development which limits the size of the human population and the use of resources, so as to protect the existing natural resources for future generations

ecological niche noun the chemical, physical or biological characters that determine the position of an organism or species in an ecosystem (NOTE: This is also referred to as the 'role' or 'profession' of an organism, which may be described in terms of its environment and type, e.g. as an aquatic predator or a terrestrial herbivore.)

#### ecological pyramid noun same as biotic pyramid

**ecological recovery** *noun* the return of an ecosystem to its former favourable condition

ecological restoration *noun* the process of renewing and maintaining the health of an ecosystem

ecological structure noun the spatial and other arrangements of species in an ecosystem

ecological succession noun the series of stages by which a group of organisms living in a community reaches its final stable state or climax

**ecologist** *noun* **1.** a scientist who studies ecology **2.** a person who is in favour of maintaining a balance between living things and the environment in which they live in order to improve the life of all organisms

**ecology** *noun* the study of the relationships among organisms as well as the relationships between them and their physical environment

Eco-Management and Audit Scheme *noun* full form of EMAS

**ecomovement** *noun* a grouping of people and organisations dedicated to the protection of the environment

economic conservation *noun* the management of the natural environment to maintain a regular yield of natural resources

economic development noun the process of change from an economy based on agriculture to one based on industry

economic injury level *noun* the level of an activity such as pest control at which it is not longer profitable to continue. Abbr EIL

ecoparasite noun a parasite which is adapted to a specific host. Compare ectoparasite, endoparasite

ecophysiology noun the study of organisms and their functions and how they exist in their environment

**ecosphere** *noun* the part of the Earth and its atmosphere where living organisms exist, including parts of the lithosphere, the hydrosphere and the atmosphere. Also called **biosphere** 

**ecosystem** noun a complex of plant, animal and microorganism communities and their interactions with the environment in which they live  $\bigcirc$  European wetlands are classic examples of ecosystems that have been shaped by humans.

**ecosystem approach** *noun* a set of internationally agreed principles guiding the way in which the natural environment and wildlife should be managed

ecosystem diversity noun the variety of habitats that exist in the biosphere

ecosystem services plural noun services provided naturally by the ecosystem, which help humans to exist, e.g. reduction in atmospheric carbon dioxide levels, stabilising the climate and maintenance of the ozone layer

**ecotax** *noun* a tax that is used to encourage people to change from an activity that damages the environment or to encourage activities with beneficial environmental effects. Also called **environmental tax** 

**ecotone** *noun* an area between two different types of vegetation which may share the characteristics of both, e.g. the border between forest and moorland

**ecotourism** *noun* a form of tourism that increases people's understanding of natural areas, without adversely affecting the environment, and gives local people financial benefits from conserving natural resources

ecotoxic adjective likely to cause severe damage to organisms and their environment

**ecotoxicity** *noun* the degree to which a chemical released into an environment by human activities affects the organisms that live or grow there

**ecotoxicology** *noun* the study of how chemicals associated with human activities affect organisms and their environment

**ecotype** *noun* a form within a species that has special characteristics which allow it to live in a specific habitat

**ecowarrior** *noun* an activist who is prepared to take direct, sometimes illegal, action on environmental issues rather than just campaign

ecto- prefix outside. Compare endo-

ectoparasite noun a parasite which lives on the skin or outer surface of its host but feeds by piercing the skin. Compare endoparasite

**ectotherm** noun an organism which is largely reliant on external sources of heat to raise its body temperature  $\bigcirc$  *Plants and reptiles are ectotherms.* Compare **endotherm.** Also called **poikilotherm** 

edaphic adjective referring to soil edaphic climax noun a climax community caused by the type of soil in an area

#### edaphic factors

**edaphic factors** *plural noun* the soil conditions that affect the organisms living in a specific area

edaphon noun an organism living in soil eddy noun a whirlpool of air or of water in a current

**Eden Project** *noun* a development by a conservation charity in a large disused clay pit in Cornwall that explores human dependence on plants in a global context, illustrating economic, social and environmental impacts. Plants from tropical and other climates are housed in extremely large, domed glasshouses.

**edgeland** *noun* land at the edge of a field or wood, or on the edge of an urban area (often plural) ○ The edgelands around big cities often have blossoming wildlife.

edible adjective referring to something that can be eaten

**effect** *noun* something which happens as the result of an action  $\bigcirc$  *Pressure patterns have an effect on weather.* Compare **affect**

**effective height** *noun* the height above the ground when a column of smoke from a factory chimney becomes horizontal

**effectiveness** noun an assessment of how effective an action is  $\bigcirc$  *Ice covering reduces the effectiveness of an aerial.* 

**efficiency** *noun* the ability to act or produce something with a minimum of waste, expense or unnecessary effort

**efficient** *adjective* referring to the ability to act or produce something with a minimum of waste, expense or unnecessary effort  $\bigcirc$  *Composting is an efficient method of recycling organic matter.* 

effluent noun liquid, semisolid or gas waste from industrial processes or material such as slurry or silage effluent from a farm effluent standard noun the amount of

sewage allowed to be discharged into a river or the sea

**egg** noun **1**. a reproductive cell produced in a female mammal by the ovary which, if fertilised by male sperm, becomes an embryo **2**. a fertilised ovum of an animal such as a bird, fish, reptile, amphibian or insect, protected by a membrane layer in which the embryo continues developing outside the mother's body until it hatches **EHO** *abbr* Environmental Health Officer **EIA** *abbr* environmental impact assessment

**EIL** *abbr* economic injury level

**EINECS** *abbr* European Inventory of Existing Commercial Chemical Substances

**EIS** *abbr* environmental impact statement

ejecta *plural noun* the ash and lava thrown up by an erupting volcano

**electric** *adjective* worked by, charged with or producing electricity

**electrical** *adjective* referring to electricity  $\bigcirc$  *an electrical fault* 

electrical conductivity noun a measurement of salt concentration in soils

**electric car** *noun* a car that is propelled by an electric battery so that it produces no harmful emissions

electric generator noun a device which produces electricity

**electricity** *noun* an electric current used to provide light, heat or power

electricity grid noun a system for carrying electricity round a country, using power lines from power stations. Also called **na**tional grid (NOTE: The electricity is at a high voltage, which is reduced by transformers to low voltage by the time the electricity is brought into use.)

**electric meter**, **electricity meter** *noun* a device which records how much electricity has been used

electric storm *noun* a storm with thunder and lightning

**electrodialysis** *noun* the process by which ions dissolved in sea water are removed, making the water fit to drink

**electrolysis** *noun* a chemical reaction caused by the passage of electricity from one electrode to another

**electrolyte** *noun* a chemical solution of a substance which can conduct electricity

**electromagnet** *noun* a magnet made from a coil of wire through which an electric current is passed

**electromagnetic** *adjective* **1.** having magnetic properties caused by a flow of electricity **2.** containing or worked by an electromagnet

electromotive force *noun* a source of electrical energy, from the movement of electrons, required to produce an electric current, produced by devices such as batteries or generators and measured in volts. Abbr emf

**electron** *noun* a negatively charged subatomic particle within an atom

**electronegative** *adjective* (*of atoms*) having negative electric charge and therefore tending to move towards a positive electric pole

**electronic** *adjective* referring to, based on, operated by or involving the controlled conduction of electrons, especially in a vacuum, gas or semi-conducting material

**electron microscope** *noun* a microscope that uses a beam of electrons instead of light. Abbr **EM** 

**electrostatic** *adjective* referring to devices using the properties of static electrical charge

**electrostatic precipitator** *noun* a device for collecting minute particles of dust suspended in gas by charging the particles as they pass through an electrostatic field

**element** *noun* a chemical substance that cannot be broken down to a simpler substance (NOTE: There are 110 named elements.)

elemental *adjective* in the form of a pure element

elementary particle *noun* a particle that is smaller than an atom or forms part of an atom, e.g. an electron. Also called fundamental particle, subatomic particle

**elements** *plural noun* the weather  $\bigcirc$  *protected from the elements* 

elephant grass noun same as miscanthus

**elevated** *adjective* **1.** raised to a higher place or position **2.** increased  $\bigcirc$  *elevated concentrations of particles in the air* 

**eliminate** verb 1. to get rid of or remove something that is not wanted  $\bigcirc$  Mosquitoes were eliminated by spraying breeding grounds with oil. 2. to rule out a possibility  $\bigcirc$  Bacteria were eliminated as a possible cause of the illness.

**elimination** noun **1.** the removal of a problem **2.** the removal of waste matter from the body **3.** the process of ruling out a possibility  $\bigcirc$  the elimination of possible sources of contamination  $\square$  by a process of elimination by removing possibilities one by one until only the most likely cause or answer is left

**El Niño** *noun* a phenomenon occurring every few years in the Pacific Ocean, where a mass of warm water moves from west to east, rising as it moves, giving very high tides along the Pacific coast of South America and affecting the climate

**eluviation** *noun* the action of particles and chemicals leaching from the topsoil down into the subsoil

**eluvium** *noun* gravel formed as rocks are broken down into fragments where they are lying. Compare **alluvium** 

**ELV** *abbr* end-of-life vehicle

EM abbr electron microscope

**EMAS** noun a voluntary scheme of the European Union in which commercial and other organisations are encouraged to assess their approach to environmental matters against a given set of criteria. Full form **Eco-Management and Audit Scheme** 

**embankment** *noun* a wall made along a river bank to prevent a river from overflowing

**embryo** *noun* an organism that develops from a fertilised egg or seed, e.g. an animal in the first weeks of gestation or a seedling plant with cotyledons and a root (NOTE: After eight weeks an unborn baby is called a **fetus**.)

**embryonic** *adjective* **1**. referring to an embryo **2**. in the first stages of development **emergence** *noun* **1**. a gradual upward movement of a land mass **2**. the germination of a seed

**emergency** noun a dangerous situation in which immediate action needs to be taken  $\bigcirc$  You should know the safety procedures to be taken in case of emergency.  $\bigcirc$ After the earthquake, an emergency was declared.

emission rate *noun* the amount of pollutant produced over a specific period

**emission standard** *noun* the amount of an effluent or pollutant that can legally be released into the environment, e.g. the amount of sewage which can be discharged into a river or the sea, or the amount of carbon monoxide that can legally be released into the atmosphere by petrol and diesel engines

**emissions trading** *noun* the system of one country using some of another country's permitted emission amount as well as its own, as a result of the rule that any new source of pollution must be offset by the reduction of pollution from existing sources

emission tax noun a tax levied on air or water emissions

**emit** verb to send out matter, energy or a signal  $\bigcirc$  radiation emitted by the sun  $\bigcirc$  An X-ray tube emits radiation. (NOTE: emitting – emitted)

**emulsifier** noun a substance added to mixtures of food such as water and oil to hold them together.  $\Diamond$  **stabiliser**. Also called **emulsifying agent** (NOTE: Emulsifiers are used in sauces and added to meat to increase the water content so that the meat is heavier. In the European Union, emulsifiers and stabilisers have E numbers E322 to E495.)

**encapsulation** *noun* the enclosure of something inside something else, especially for protection

**enclosure** *noun* an area surrounded by a fence, often to contain animals. Compare **exclosure** 

**encroach on** verb to come close to and gradually cover something  $\bigcirc$  The town is spreading beyond the by-pass, encroaching on farming land.  $\bigcirc$  Trees are spreading

down the mountain and encroaching on the lower more fertile land in the valleys.

**endanger** verb to put something in danger  $\bigcirc$  Pollution from the factory is endangering the aquatic life in the lakes.

endangered species *noun* a species that is facing a risk of extinction in the wild, usually taken to be when fewer than 250 mature individuals exist. Abbr EN (NOTE: The plural is endangered species.)

**endemic** *adjective* **1.** referring to an organism that exists or originated from a specific area  $\bigcirc$  *The isolation of the islands has led to the evolution of endemic forms.*  $\bigcirc$  *The northern part of the island is inhabited by many endemic mammals and birds.* **2.** referring to a disease that occurs within a specific area  $\bigcirc$  *This disease is endemic to Mediterranean countries.*  $\diamondsuit$  **epidemic, pandemic** 

**endemic population** *noun* a group of organisms existing in a specific geographic area

**endemic species** *noun* a species that is native to a specific geographic area

endo- prefix inside or within. Compare ecto-

**endocarp** *noun* the innermost of the layers of the wall (**pericarp**) of a fruit (NOTE: Sometimes it is toughened or hardened, as in a cherry stone or peach stone.)

endocrine disrupter, endocrine inhibitor noun a substance that damages the activity of the endocrine system, sometimes causing reproductive or developmental problems, sometimes because it has a similar action to a natural hormone

**end-of-life directive** *noun* a set of regulations about the disposal of something such as a vehicle or appliance at the end of its useful service

**end-of-life vehicle** *noun* a vehicle that has reached the end of its useful service and is subject to regulations for its disposal in order to avoid pollution

**endoparasite** *noun* a parasite that lives inside its host. Compare **ectoparasite** 

**endosperm** *noun* a storage tissue in plant seeds that provides nourishment for the developing embryo

**endotherm** *noun* an organism that is able to generate heat internally in order to raise its body temperature  $\bigcirc$  *Birds and mammals are endotherms.* Compare **ectotherm**. Also called **homoiotherm** 

endothermic reaction *noun* a chemical reaction in which heat is removed from the surroundings. Compare exothermic reaction

**endotoxin** *noun* a poison from bacteria which passes into the body when contaminated food is eaten

**enemy-free space** *noun* an area into which a prey can escape from a predator, especially where two species of prey live in the same environment

**energise** *verb* to supply energy such as electricity to a machine or system to make it work

energostasis noun energy balance

**energy** noun **1**. the force or strength to carry out activities  $\bigcirc$  You need to eat carbohydrates to give you energy. **2**. electricity or other fuel  $\bigcirc$  We have to review our energy requirements regularly.

**energy balance** *noun* a series of measurements showing the movement of energy between organisms and their environment

**energy budget** *noun* the level of energy at different points in an ecosystem or an industrial process

energy conservation noun the avoidance of wasting energy

COMMENT: Energy conservation is widely practised to reduce excessive and costly consumption of energy. Reduction of heating levels in houses and offices, insulating buildings against loss of heat, using solar power instead of fossil fuels and increasing the efficiency of car engines are all examples of energy conservation.

energy conservation law noun a law which makes it illegal to waste energy

energy content noun the amount of energy available in a specific amount of fuel

**energy crop** *noun* a crop which is grown to be used to provide energy, e.g. a fastgrowing tree

energy efficiency ratio noun a measure of the efficiency of a heating or cooling system such as a heat pump or an air-conditioning system, shown as the ratio of the output in Btu per hour to the input in watts. Abbr **EER** 

**energy-efficient** *adjective* referring to the careful use of energy with minimum waste  $\bigcirc$  *energy-efficient manufacturing processes* 

**energy flow** *noun* the flow of energy from one trophic level to another in a food chain

**energy gain** *noun* an increase in the amount of energy or heat. Also called **heat** gain

energy recovery noun the production of energy from synthetic materials, e.g. us-

ing the heat from incineration of solid waste to generate electricity

**energy tax** *noun* a tax on an energy source intended to discourage the use of environmentally damaging sources and encourage energy conservation or use of alternative sources

**energy value** *noun* the heat value of a substance measured in joules. Also called **calorific value** 

engineer noun a person who works in engineering ■ verb to design and make something

**engineering** *noun* the application of the principles of science to the design, construction and use of machines or buildings

**English Nature** *noun* the UK government agency that is responsible for nature conservation in England. Abbr **EN** (NOTE: It was formerly part of the Nature Conservancy Council and is about to undergo another reorganisation.)

enhanced greenhouse effect noun the warming influence on the climate produced as human emissions of greenhouse gases increase the natural greenhouse effect

enhancer noun an artificial substance that increases the flavour of food or of artificial flavouring that has been added to food (NOTE: In the European Union, flavour enhancers added to food have the E numbers E620 to E637.)

enquire, inquire verb to ask questions about something

**enquiry, inquiry** *noun* **1.** a question, or the process of asking a question.  $\phi$  **public enquiry** (NOTE: The plural is **enquiries.**) **2.** a request for data or information from a device or database

**enrich** verb **1.** to make something richer or stronger, e.g. adding humus to enrich the soil **2.** to improve the nutritional quality of food  $\bigcirc$  enrich with vitamins **3.** to increase the amount of uranium-235 in the fuel of a nuclear reactor  $\bigcirc$  Fuel is enriched to 15% with fissile material.

**enrichment** *noun* the increase in nitrogen, phosphorous and carbon compounds or other nutrients in water, especially as a result of a sewage flow or agricultural runoff, which encourages the growth of algae and other water plants

**ensilage**, **ensiling** *noun* the process of making silage for cattle by cutting grass and other green plants and storing it in silos **enteric** *adjective* referring to the intestine **entero-** *prefix* referring to the intestine

Enterobacteria plural noun a family of bacteria, including Salmonella and Escherichia

entire adjective referring to leaves that are not divided into parts

entity noun something which is distinct and separate from something else O The institutes are closely connected but are separate legal entities.

entomological adjective referring to insects

entomologist noun a scientist who specialises in the study of insects

entomology *noun* the study of insects

entrap verb 1. to catch an animal by means of a trap 2. to catch and retain something  $\bigcirc$  *Moisture is entrapped in the layers.*  $\bigcirc$  Up to 90% of sulfur emissions can be entrapped.

entropy noun a measure of the degree of disorder in a closed system

entry point noun a place where people can enter or by which something can be accessed

environment *noun* the surroundings of any organism, including the physical world and other organisms. built environment, natural environment

COMMENT: The environment is anything outside an organism in which the organism lives. It can be a geographical region, a climatic condition, a pollutant or the noises which surround an organism. The human environment includes the country or region or town or house or room in which a person lives. A parasite's environment includes the body of the host. A plant's environment includes the type of soil at a specific altitude.

Environment Act noun a piece of UK legislation passed in 1995 that created the Environment Agency and set out measures for dealing with contaminated land

Environment Agency noun in England and Wales, the government agency responsible for protection of the environment, including flood and sea defences. Abbr EA

environmental adjective referring to the environment

environmental accounting noun same as full-cost accounting

environmental assessment noun the identification of the expected environmental effects of a proposed action

environmental audit noun an assessment made by a company or organisation of the financial benefits and disadvantages of adopting an environmentally sound policy. Also called eco-audit

'Environmental audits can alert an organisation to areas in which it does not meet current or proposed legislative requirements. Such audits can also encourage more efficient techniques and waste reduction measures.' [Environmental Conservation]

environmental biology *noun* the study of living organisms in relationship to their environment

environmental conditionality noun same as cross-compliance

environmental control noun the means of maintaining an environment

environmental damage noun harm done to the environment, e.g. pollution of rivers

environmental degradation noun a reduction in the quality of the environment environmental directive noun an EU policy statement on the appropriate ways of dealing with a specific environmental issue environmental disorder noun a disruption of the usual condition of an environment

environmental equity noun the principle that no section of the population receives a greater effect of environmental pollution or disruption than any other. Also called environmental justice

environmental ethics noun the examination and discussion of people's obligations towards the environment

environmental fluctuation noun a long- or short-term change in the environment, which may have a large effect on the populations living there

environmental forecasting noun the prediction of the effects on the surrounding environment of new construction programmes

environmental health noun the local government functions concerned with minimising risks to public health and the local environment, including water and air quality, hygiene in restaurants and shops, and pest control

Environmental Health Officer noun an official of a local authority who examines the environment and tests for hazards such as bad sanitation or noise pollution. Abbr EHO

hygiene noun the environmental measures undertaken to keep the human environment safe and healthy to live in, including waste disposal, clean water supplies, food safety controls and good housing

environmental impact noun the effect upon the environment of actions or events

such as large construction programmes or the draining of marshes

**environmental impact assessment** *noun* an evaluation of the effect upon the environment of an action such as a large construction programme. Abbr **EIA** 

**environmental impact statement** *noun* a statement required under US law for any major federal project, evaluating the effect of the project on the environment. Abbr **EIS** 

environmental indicator noun an organism that increases or decreases in specific environmental conditions and whose presence indicates the state of an environment or a change in an environment, e.g. a lichen sensitive to industrial pollution becoming rare in a polluted area, or a species of fish returning to a formerly polluted river environmentalism noun concern for

the protection of the environment

**environmentalist** *noun* a person who is concerned with protecting the environment **environmentalist** group *noun* an association or society concerned with the protection of the environment and increasing awareness of environmental issues

**environmentalist lobby** *noun* a group of people who try to persuade politicians that the environment must be protected and that pollution must be controlled

environmental justice noun same as environmental equity

environmental labelling noun same as ecolabelling

**environmentally** *adverb* with regard to the natural world and its vulnerability to damage

**environmentally friendly** *adjective* intended to minimise harm to the environment, e.g. by using biodegradable ingredients. Also called **environment-friendly** 

**Environmentally Sensitive Area** *noun* in the UK, a rural area designated by Defra as needing special protection from modern farming practices. Abbr **ESA** 

'The Defra-funded Countryside Stewardship and Environmentally Sensitive Areas schemes help to maintain and enhance the biodiversity and landscape value of farmed land, protect historic features and promote public access. (Delivering the evidence. Defra's Science and Innovation Strategy, 2003–06)'

**environmental policy** *noun* a plan for dealing with all matters affecting the environment on a national or local scale

**environmental pollution** *noun* the pollution of the environment by human activities

**environmental protection** *noun* the activity of protecting the environment by regulating the discharge of waste, the emission of pollutants and other human activities. Also called **environment protection** 

Environmental Protection Act 1990 noun a UK regulation to allow the introduction of integrated pollution control, regulations for the disposal of waste and other provisions. Abbr EPA

Environmental Protection Agency noun US an administrative body in the USA which deals with pollution. Abbr EPA environmental protection association noun an organisation concerned with protecting the environment from damage and pollution

**environmental quality standard** *noun* a limit for the concentration of an effluent or pollutant which is accepted in a specific environment, e.g. the concentration of trace elements in drinking water or of additives in food

**environmental radioactivity** *noun* the energy in the form of radiation that is emitted into the environment by radioactive substances

**environmental resistance** noun the ability to withstand pressures such as competition, weather conditions or food availability, which restrict the potential growth of a population

**environmental science** *noun* the study of the relationship between humans and the environment, the problems caused by pollution or loss of habitats, and proposed solutions

**environmental set-aside** *noun* a scheme of suspending cultivation of food crops for a period with clearly defined environmental aims and designed appropriately for local conditions

**environmental studies** *noun* a course of study that includes a range of disciplines focusing on the natural environment

environmental tax noun same as ecotax

**environmental variation** *noun* the continual changes in the environment over a period

**Environment Council** *noun* the forum of environment ministers of member countries of the European Union that agrees legislation on environmental matters

environment-friendly *adjective* same as environmentally friendly

environment protection *noun* same as environmental protection

**Envirowise** *noun* a government programme providing advice to businesses in industry and commerce on improving efficiency in the use of resources and reducing waste

enzymatic adjective referring to enzymes

**enzyme** *noun* a protein substance produced by living cells which promotes a biochemical reaction in living organisms (NOTE: The names of enzymes mostly end with the suffix **-ase**.)

**eolian** *adjective* caused by wind  $\bigcirc$  *eolian deposits* 

**EPA** *abbr* **1**. Environmental Protection Act 1990 **2**. Environmental Protection Agency

**ephemeral** *noun* a plant or insect that has a short life cycle and may complete several life cycles within a year  $\bigcirc$  *Many weeds are ephemerals.* 

**epibiont** *noun* an organism that lives on the surface of another without being a parasite

**epibiosis** *noun* a state where an organism lives on the surface of another, but is not a parasite

**epicentre** *noun* a point on the surface of the Earth above the focus of an earthquake or in the centre of a nuclear explosion. Also called **focus** 

epidemic *noun* a rapidly spreading infection or disease.  $\phi$  endemic, pandemic

epidemiological adjective referring to epidemiology

**epidemiologist** *noun* a person who studies the factors involved in the incidence, distribution and control of disease in a population

**epidemiology** *noun* the study of diseases in a population, how they spread and how they can be controlled

epidermis *noun* an outer layer of cells of a plant or animal

**epigeal** *adjective* occurring or developing above ground  $\bigcirc$  *epigeal germination* Compare **hypogeal** 

epigenous adjective developing or growing on a surface

**epilimnion** *noun* the top layer of water in a lake, which contains more oxygen and is warmer than the water below.  $\Diamond$  **hypolimnion, metalimnion** 

epilithic adjective growing on or attached to the surface of rocks or stones

**epiphyte** *noun* a plant that lives on another plant for physical support, but is not a parasite of it (NOTE: Many orchids are epiphytes.)

epiphytic adjective attached to another plant for support, but not parasitic

episode noun an event, or a group of related events

**episodic** *adjective* happening sometimes but not regularly

epithelial adjective referring to the epithelium

epixylous adjective growing on wood

**epizoite** *noun* an animal that lives on the surface of another, without being a parasite

epoch noun 

geological epoch

**equator** noun an imaginary circle around the Earth's surface, equidistant from the poles and perpendicular to the axis of rotation, which divides the Earth into the northern and southern hemispheres  $\bigcirc$  Every point on the equator is equidistant from the poles.

equatorial adjective referring to the equator

equilibrium *noun* a state of balance equine *adjective* relating to horses

**equinox** noun either of the two occasions in the year, spring and autumn, when the sun crosses the celestial equator and night and day are each 12 hours long

**equip** verb to provide a person, organisation or place with machinery or equipment  $\bigcirc$  The laboratory has been recently equipped with new microscopes.

**equipment** noun the devices, systems or machines that are needed for a particular purpose  $\bigcirc$  drilling equipment (NOTE: no plural: for one item say a **piece of equipment**.)

**equivalent** *adjective* being the same, or effectively the same  $\bigcirc A$  metal part could be as much as 25 times heavier than an equivalent plastic part.  $\bigcirc$  The electricity it uses is equivalent to the amount needed to power a small radio.

**eradicate** *verb* to remove something completely  $\bigcirc$  *action to eradicate an infestation of woodworm* 

**eradication** *noun* **1**. the complete removal of something **2**. the total extinction of a species

**ergot** *noun* a fungus that grows on cereals, especially rye, producing a mycotoxin which causes hallucinations and sometimes death if eaten. Genus: *Claviceps*.

ergotamine noun the toxin that causes ergotism

ergotism noun poisoning by eating cereals or bread contaminated by ergot **ericaceous** *adjective* belonging to the group of plants such as heather and azalea that grow on acid soils

**erode** verb to wear away gradually, or to wear something away  $\bigcirc$  The hills have been eroded by wind and rain.

**erosion** noun the wearing away of soil or rock by rain, wind, sea or rivers or by the action of toxic substances  $\bigcirc$  Grass cover provides some protection against soil erosion.

COMMENT: Accelerated erosion is caused by human activity in addition to the natural rate of erosion. Cleared land in droughtstricken areas can produce dry soil which may blow away. Felling trees removes the roots which bind the soil particles together and so exposes the soil to erosion by rainwater. Ploughing up and down slopes as opposed to contour ploughing, can lead to the formation of rills and serious soil erosion.

erupt verb (of a volcano) to become active and produce lava, smoke and hot ash

**eruption** noun a sudden violent ejection of lava, smoke and ash by a volcano  $\bigcirc$  Several villages were destroyed in the recent volcanic eruption.

**essence** *noun* a concentrated oil extracted from a plant, used in food, cosmetics, analgesics and antiseptics  $\bigcirc$  *vanilla essence* 

essential adjective extremely important or necessary

essential fatty acid *noun* an unsaturated fatty acid essential for growth but which cannot be synthesised by the body and has to be obtained from the food supply. Abbr EFA (NOTE: The two essential fatty acids are linoleic acid and linolenic acid.)

**essential oil** *noun* an oil from a plant, used in cosmetics, analgesics or antiseptics, e.g. peppermint oil. Also called **volatile oil establish** *verb* **1**. to work out or calculate something  $\Box$  **to establish a position** to find out where something is **2**. to start or set up something  $\bigcirc$  *We established routine procedures very quickly*.  $\Box$  **to establish communication** to make contact  $\Box$  **to establish control** to get control **3**. to settle or grow permanently  $\bigcirc$  *The starling has become established in all parts of the USA*.  $\bigcirc$  *Even established trees have been attacked by the disease*.

**estate** noun **1**. a rural property consisting of a large area of land and a big house **2**. same as **plantation**  $\bigcirc$  *a tea estate* **3**. an area specially designed and constructed for residential or industrial use  $\bigcirc$  *a housing estate* 

**estimate** *noun* an approximate calculation of size, weight or extent  $\blacksquare$  *verb* to make an approximate calculation of size, weight or extent

estivation noun US spelling of aestivation

estrogen noun US spelling of oestrogen estuarine adjective referring to estuaries estuarine plant noun a plant which lives in an estuary, where the water is alternately fresh and salty as the tide comes in and goes out

**estuary** *noun* a part of a river where it meets the sea and is partly composed of salt water

**ethanol** noun a colourless inflammable liquid, produced by the fermentation of sugars. It is used as an ingredient of organic chemicals, intoxicating drinks and medicines. Formula:  $C_2H_5OH$ . Also called **ethyl alcohol** 

ethene noun same as ethylene

**ethical** *adjective* concerning accepted standards of behaviour and practice

**ethics** *noun* **1**. a set of moral standards by which people behave **2**. a code of practice which shows how a group of professionals should interact with each other

**Ethiopian Region** *noun* a biogeographical region, part of Arctogea, comprising Africa south of the Sahara

ethno- prefix human

#### ethnobotany

ethnobotany noun the study of the way plants are used by humans

**ethnopharmacology** *noun* the study of the medicines used by people in traditional communities

ethology noun the study of the behaviour of living organisms

ethyl alcohol noun same as ethanol

**ethylene** *noun* a hydrocarbon occurring in natural gas and ripening fruits. It is used in the production of polythene and as an anaesthetic. Also called **ethene** 

etiolation noun the process by which a green plant grown in insufficient light becomes yellow and grows long shoots

etiology noun another spelling of aetiology

-etum suffix area containing a particular type of plant  $\bigcirc$  arboretum  $\bigcirc$  pinetum

EU abbr European Union

**eucalypt**, **eucalyptus** *noun* a quickgrowing Australian hardwood tree with strong-smelling resin. Genus: *Eucalyptus*.

**Euglenophyta** *noun* a division of unicellular algae

**eukaryote**, **eucaryote** *noun* an organism that has a cell or cells with nuclei and organelles. Compare **prokaryote** 

eukaryotic, eucaryotic adjective referring to eukaryotes. Compare prokaryotic

**EUNIS** *noun* a database of publicly available data on species, habitat types and designated sites in Europe, maintained by the European Union Nature Information System

**euphotic** *adjective* relating to the upper layer of a body of water that allows the penetration of enough light to support plants which photosynthesise

**euphotic zone** *noun* the top layer of water in the sea or a lake, which sunlight can penetrate and in which photosynthesis takes place. Also called **photic zone**. Compare **aphotic zone** 

**Eurobeach** *noun* a beach in any of the countries of the European Union that meets the EU regulations on the content of bacteria in the water, making it safe for swimming

**Europarc** *noun* a group of government and non-government organisations concerned with the management of protected areas

**European Environment Agency** *noun* an EU organisation with responsibility for environmental matters. Abbr **EEA**  **European Union** noun an alliance of 25 European countries, originally established with six members in 1957 by the Treaty of Rome. Among its powers are those for environmental and agricultural policy in its member states. Abbr **EU** (NOTE: formerly called the **European Community** or **European Economic Community**)

NOTE: formerly called the European Commission or European Economic Community or common market; in 2004 there will be ? States in the EU...???

**European Union Nature Information Service** *noun* a source of information on environmentally important matters in Europe, which also aims to encourage the use of terms referring to the environment in a standard way

**Eurosite** *noun* a group of European government and non-government organisations concerned with the management of wildlife sites, currently with 75 members in 17 countries

**euryhaline** *adjective* referring to an organism which can survive a wide range of salt concentrations in its environment. Compare **stenohaline** 

**euryphagous** *adjective* referring to organisms that consume a variety of different foods

**eurythermous** *adjective* referring to an organism which can survive a wide range of temperatures in its environment. Compare **stenothermous** 

**eurytopic** *adjective* referring to organisms that tolerate a wide range of environmental conditions

**eusociality** *noun* a situation in which a eusocial society exists

**eusocial society** *noun* a group of animals such as ants, bees and wasps in which some individuals are workers and do not reproduce, while others are fertile

**eustatic change** *noun* a change resulting from worldwide variations in sea level, as distinct from regional change caused by ground movements in a particular area

**eutectic point** *noun* the temperature at which a eutectic mixture freezes, which is the lowest freezing point of any constituent of the mixture

eutherian noun a mammal whose young develop within the womb attached to maternal tissues by a placenta. Subclass: Eutheria. Also called placental mammal

**eutrophic** *adjective* referring to water which is high in dissolved mineral nutrients.  $\Diamond$  **dystrophic, mesotrophic, oligotrophic**  eutrophication, eutrophy noun the process by which water becomes full of phosphates and other mineral nutrients which encourage the growth of algae and kill other organisms

**evaporate** verb to change from being a liquid to being a vapour, or to change a liquid into a vapour  $\bigcirc$  In the heat of the day, water evaporates from the surface of the earth.  $\bigcirc$  The sun evaporated all the water in the puddle. Opposite **condense** 

evaporation *noun* the process of changing from a liquid into a vapour

evaporative adjective able to evaporate

**evaporative emission** *noun* a pollutant emitted through the evaporation of a substance, e.g. from petrol when filling a tank

**evapotranspiration** *noun* the movement of water from soil through a plant until it is released into the atmosphere from leaf surfaces

**evapotranspire** *verb* to lose water into the atmosphere by evaporation and transpiration

**event** *noun* **1**. an action or activity **2**. a catastrophic event such as an earthquake or eruption

**evolution** *noun* heritable changes in organisms which take place over a period of time involving several generations (NOTE: Significant evolutionary changes can occur in a species in relatively few generations.)

**evolutionary** *adjective* referring to evolution  $\bigcirc$  *Evolutionary changes have taken place over millions of years.* 

**evolutionary ecology** *noun* the study of the impact of evolution on current ecological patterns

**evolve** verb 1. to develop gradually  $\bigcirc$  The strategy is still evolving. 2. to change and develop gradually over millions of years from primitive forms into the range of plant and animal species known on Earth

**examination** *noun* the activity of looking at someone or something carefully  $\bigcirc$ *They carried out an examination of the problem.* 

**exceed** verb to be more than expected, needed or allowed  $\bigcirc$  *The concentration of radioactive material in the waste exceeded the government limits.* 

**exceedance** noun the degree to which the concentration of a pollutant is more than a standard or permissible limit  $\bigcirc$  exposure of the population to exceedances of air quality standards

excess *noun* an amount or quantity greater than what is expected, needed or allowed ■ *adjective* more than is expected, needed or allowed

**excessive** *adjective* more than expected, needed or allowed  $\bigcirc$  *Excessive ultraviolet radiation can cause skin cancer.* 

**exchange** noun the act of taking one thing and putting another in its place  $\bigcirc$  gas exchange

**exclosure** *noun* an area fenced to prevent animals from entering. Compare **enclosure** 

**exclusion zone** *noun* an area that people may not enter because a hazardous substance has been released

excrement noun faeces

**excreta** *plural noun* the waste material excreted from the body of an animal, e.g. faeces, urine, droppings or sweat

**excrete** verb to pass waste matter out of the body  $\bigcirc$  The urinary system separates waste liquids from the blood and excretes them as urine. Compare **secrete** 

**excretion** *noun* the passing of the waste products of metabolism such as faeces, urine, sweat or carbon dioxide out of the body. Compare **secretion** 

**exhaust** verb to use something up completely  $\bigcirc$  The supplies are exhausted. **noun 1.** waste gases from an engine **2.** the part of an engine through which waste gases pass  $\bigcirc$  Fumes from vehicle exhausts contribute a large percentage of air pollution in towns.

**exhaustion** noun the complete using up of something  $\bigcirc$  the exhaustion of the area's natural resources

**exhaustive** *adjective* complete and thorough  $\bigcirc$  *an exhaustive reply to the safety concerns*  $\bigcirc$  *an exhaustive search for the information* 

existing chemicals *plural noun* the chemicals listed in the European Inventory of Existing Commercial Chemical Substances between January 1971 and September 1981, a total of over 100,000. Compare **new chemicals** 

**exosphere** *noun* the highest layers of Earth's atmosphere, more than 650km above the surface and composed almost entirely of hydrogen

**exothermic reaction** *noun* a chemical reaction in which heat is given out to the surroundings. Compare **endothermic reaction** 

**exotic** *adjective* referring to an organism or species that is not native and has been introduced from another place or region  $\blacksquare$  *noun* an organism or species that is not native to its current environment  $\blacktriangleright$  also called (all senses) **alien** 

**exotoxin** *noun* a poison produced by bacteria which affects parts of the body away from the place of infection

**expanded** *adjective* referring to plastic or polystyrene made into a hard lightweight foam by blowing air or gas into it

**expenditure** noun **1.** the spending of money  $\bigcirc$  agreed the expenditure of public funds for this project **2.** the amount of money spent

**experiment** noun a scientific test under controlled conditions that is made to demonstrate or discover something  $\bigcirc$  *Experiments have shown that time to flowering is affected by daylength.*  $\blacksquare$  *verb* to carry out a scientific test under controlled conditions in order to demonstrate or discover something  $\square$  to experiment with something to try something to see how it performs or affects you  $\bigcirc$  *experimenting with planting density*  $\square$  to experiment on someone or something to use someone or something in an experiment  $\bigcirc$  *experimented on laboratory mice* 

**experimental** adjective referring to something still at an early stage of development  $\bigcirc$  the experimental and testing stages of a new technique

experimentally adverb by carrying out experiments

**explode** verb **1.** to burst, or to make something burst, violently **2.** to increase rapidly  $\bigcirc$  *Population numbers have exploded.* 

**exploit** verb 1. to take advantage of something  $\bigcirc$  Ladybirds have exploited the sudden increase in the numbers of insects. 2. to use a natural resource  $\bigcirc$  exploiting the natural wealth of the forest 3. to treat something or someone unfairly for personal benefit

**exponentially** *adverb* more and more rapidly  $\bigcirc$  *We can expect this population to increase exponentially over the next few years.*

extinction noun the process of a species dying out

**extinction rate** *noun* the rate at which species become extinct

**extinction vortex** *noun* a situation where genetic traits and environmental conditions combine to make a species gradually become extinct

**extinguishing agent** *noun* **1**. a chemical substance which makes another substance react **2**. a substance or organism which causes a disease or condition

**extract** noun a preparation made by removing water or alcohol from a substance, leaving only the essence  $\blacksquare$  verb 1. to take something out of somewhere  $\bigcirc$  Vanilla essence is extracted from an orchid. 2. to obtain something such as information or data from a source 3. to take something such as a mineral out of the ground

facies noun the characteristic appearance of something such as an animal or plant

**facilitation** *noun* a situation in which a developing community changes an environment allowing other species to invade

**facility** noun a building or site with a particular function  $\bigcirc a$  processing facility  $\bigcirc a$ recycling facility  $\blacksquare$  plural noun facilities the building, equipment or resources which can be used to do something  $\bigcirc$  laboratory facilities  $\bigcirc$  leisure facilities

**factor** noun **1.** something that has an influence on something else  $\bigcirc$  Annual rainfall is an important factor in affecting plant growth. **2.** the amount by which something is multiplied  $\square$  by a factor of indicating a quantity by which a stated quantity is multiplied or divided, so as to indicate an increase or decrease in a measurement  $\bigcirc$  The number of plants in the quadrat had increased by a factor of 10.

**factory** *noun* a building where products are manufactured  $\bigcirc$  *a chemical factory* 

factory farm *noun* a farm that uses intensive methods of rearing animals

factory farming *noun* a highly intensive method of rearing animals characterised by keeping large numbers of animals indoors in confined spaces and feeding them processed foods, with the use of drugs to control diseases

**facultative** *adjective* describing an organism that usually exists in a particular set of circumstances but is also able to do so in different circumstances  $\bigcirc a$  facultative anaerobe  $\bigcirc A$  facultative parasite can also live as a saprophyte. Compare obligate

**faecal** *adjective* referring to faeces (NOTE: The US spelling is **fecal**.)

faeces *plural noun* solid waste matter passed from the bowels of a human or other

animal after food has been eaten and digested (NOTE: The US spelling is **feces**.)

**Fahrenheit** *noun* a scale of temperatures on which the freezing and boiling points of water are 32° and 212°, respectively. Compare **Celsius**. Symbol **F** (NOTE: The Fahrenheit scale is still commonly used in the USA.)

fail verb to be unsuccessful  $\bigcirc$  Attempts to reach agreement on the environmental agenda failed.

fall noun 1. a reduction  $\bigcirc a$  fall in pressure 2. the amount of rain or snow which comes down at any one time  $\bigcirc an$  overnight fall of snow 3. US autumn  $\blacksquare$  verb 1. to become less in amount  $\bigcirc atmospheric$  pressure is falling 2. to be included within the range of something  $\bigcirc$  Design methods fall into four groups. 3. to come down freely because of gravity  $\bigcirc$  Light rain may fall occasionally. 4. to occur at a particular time  $\bigcirc$  The vernal equinox falls in March. (NOTE: falling - fell - fallen)

**fallout** *noun* the radioactive matter which falls from the atmosphere as particles, either in rain or as dust

**fallout shelter** *noun* a building where people are protected from radioactive material which falls from the atmosphere after a nuclear explosion

**fallow** noun a period when land is not being used for growing crops for a period so that nutrients can build up again in the soil or to control weeds ⊂ *Shifting cultivation is characterised by short cropping periods and long fallows.* ■ *adjective* referring to land that is not being used for growing crops for a period □ to let land lie fallow to allow land to remain without being cultivated for a period

**falls** *plural noun* a large waterfall (NOTE: often used in names: *Niagara Falls, Victoria Falls*)

fallspeed noun the speed at which raindrops or dry particles fall through the air

**fallstreak** *noun* a column of ice particles which are falling through a cloud

**family** *noun* **1.** a group of people, or of some other animals, composed of parents and offspring **2.** a group of genera which have some characteristics in common  $\bigcirc$  *the* 

plant family Orchidaceae  $\bigcirc$  Tigers and leopards are members of the cat family. (NOTE: Scientific names of families of animals end in -idae and those of families of plants end in -ae.)

**famine** noun a period of severe shortage of food  $\bigcirc$  When the monsoon failed for the second year, the threat of famine became more likely.

famine food *noun* a plant that is regarded as suitable for eating only when other food is scarce

famine relief *noun* the supplies of basic food sent to help people who are starving

**fanning** *noun* the spreading out of a horizontal layer of smoke and other pollutants from a chimney

fan out verb to spread out from a central point

**FAO** *abbr* Food and Agriculture Organization

**farm** *noun* an area of land used for growing crops and keeping animals to provide food and the buildings associated with it ■ *verb* to run a farm

**Farm Assured** *noun* a UK government scheme to inform the public that farm produce is of good quality according to a set of standards. It is symbolised by a little red tractor on the packaging.

**farmed** *adjective* grown or produced commercially and not in the wild  $\bigcirc$  *farmed salmon* 

farmer noun someone who runs or owns a farm

**farming** *noun* running a farm, including activities such as keeping animals for sale or for their products and growing crops

**farming community** *noun* a group of families living near to each other and having farming as their main source of income

**farmland** *noun* land on a farm which is used for growing crops or rearing animals for food

**farmland bird** *noun* a bird that nests in an agricultural environment. Many are declining in numbers because of changes in agricultural practices.

farmland bird indicator noun a standard way of measuring the frequency of birds found in agricultural areas

'The farmland bird indicator is calculated on the breeding populations of 20 species (including skylark, grey partridge and goldfinch), which have collectively declined by 40% since the mid-1970s. (Delivering the evidence. Defra's Science and Innovation Strategy 2003–06)'

**farmstead** *noun* a farmhouse and the farm buildings around it

farmworker noun a person who works on a farm

farmyard noun the area around farm buildings

farmyard manure *noun* manure formed of cattle excreta mixed with straw, used as a fertiliser. Abbr FYM

fast breeder reactor, fast breeder noun a nuclear reactor which produces more fissile material than it consumes, using fast-moving neutrons and making plutonium-239 from uranium-238, thereby increasing the reactor's efficiency. Abbr FBR fat noun 1. a compound of fatty acids and glycerol. () lipid 2. a white oily substance in the body of mammals, which stores energy and protects the body against cold (NOTE: Fat has no plural when it means the substance in the body of mammals; the plural fats is used to mean different types of fat.) ■ adjective 1. describing the body of a large person or animal (NOTE: fat - fatter fattest) 2. referring to an animal which has been reared for meat production and which has reached the correct standard for sale in a market

**fatal** adjective causing death  $\bigcirc$  a fatal accident  $\bigcirc$  a fatal dose

**fat-soluble** adjective referring to a substance that can be dissolved in fat  $\bigcirc$  Vitamin D is fat-soluble.  $\bigcirc$  Polychlorinated biphenyls are fat-soluble and collect in the blubber of seals.

fatstock noun livestock which has been fattened for meat production

**fatten** *verb* to give animals food so as to prepare them for slaughter

**fatty** adjective containing a lot of fat  $\bigcirc$ Fatty foods contribute to the risk of obesity. **fault** noun **1**. a feature that spoils the overall quality of something  $\bigcirc a$  design fault **2**. an error, especially in a calculation **3**. a change in the position of the rock layers of the Earth's crust in response to stress, leading to earthquakes

**fault line** *noun* a line of cracks in the Earth's crust occurring where changes in the position of rock layers have taken place and along which earthquakes are likely to occur

**fault plane** *noun* the face of the rock at a fault where one mass of rock has slipped against another

fauna noun the wild animals and birds which live naturally in a specific area. Compare flora

**favourable condition** *noun* a category indicating a good state of conservation of an area of the environment

FBC abbr fluidised-bed combustion

FBR abbr fast breeder reactor

**FDA** *abbr* Food and Drug Administration **Fe** *symbol* iron

**feasibility** *noun* the practical likelihood of being able to do something  $\bigcirc$  *a report on the feasibility of introducing restricted car access* 

fecal adjective US spelling of faecal feces plural noun US spelling of faeces fecundity noun the fertility of a plant or animal

**fecundity schedule** *noun* a chart showing the number of eggs or offspring produced by a group during a specific period, indicating whether the population of the group has increased or decreased

**feed** verb **1**. to take food  $\bigcirc$  The herd feeds here at dusk. **2**. to give food to a person or an animal **3**. to provide fertiliser for plants or soil **4**. to supply or add to something **5**. to lead into and so make larger  $\bigcirc$  Several small streams feed into the river.  $\blacksquare$  noun **1**. food given to animals and birds  $\bigcirc$  Traces of pesticide were found in the cattle feed. **2**. fertiliser for plants or soil  $\bigcirc$  Tomato plants need liquid feed twice a week at this time of year.

**feed additive** *noun* a supplement added to the feed of farm livestock, particularly pigs and poultry, to promote growth, e.g. an antibiotic or hormone

**feed concentrate** *noun* an animal feed which has a high food value relative to volume

**feeder** noun **1**. an animal that eats particular food or eats in a particular way  $\bigcirc a$  night feeder **2**. a device which supplies something  $\bigcirc a$  bird feeder **3**. something which supplies or adds to something else of the same type

**feed grain** *noun* a cereal which is fed to animals and birds, e.g. wheat or maize

**feeding ground** noun an area where animals come to feed  $\bigcirc$  *Estuaries are the winter feeding grounds for thousands of migratory birds.* 

feeding strategy *noun* the tactics used by an animal to obtain food

feedingstuff noun same as feedstuff

**feedlot** *noun* a field with small pens in which cattle are fattened

**feedstuff** *noun* food for farm animals. Also called **feedingstuff** 

feldspar, feldspath noun a common type of crystal rock formed of silicates

**fell** noun a high area of open moorland in the north of England  $\blacksquare$  verb to cut down a tree.  $\Diamond$  clearfell

**female** *adjective* **1**. referring to an animal that produces ova and bears young **2**. referring to a flower which has carpels but not stamens, or a plant that produces such flowers

**fen** *noun* an area of flat marshy land, with plants such as reeds and mosses growing in alkaline water

**fence** noun a barrier put round a field, either to mark the boundary or to prevent animals entering or leaving  $\blacksquare$  verb to put a fence round an area of land

**fenland** *noun* a large area of flat marshy land with alkaline water

**feral** adjective referring to an animal which was formerly domesticated and has since reverted to living wild  $\bigcirc$  *The native population of rabbits was exterminated by feral cats.* 

fermentation *noun* the process by which organic compounds such as carbohydrates are broken down by enzymes from microorganisms such as yeasts to produce energy fern *noun* a type of green flowerless plant with large leaves (fronds) that propagates by spores.  $\Diamond$  pteridophyte (NOTE: Ferns grow in damp rocky places and woodlands.)

**ferric oxide** *noun* a red insoluble oxide of iron. Formula:  $Fe_2O_3$ .

ferro- prefix referring to or containing iron ferrous adjective referring to or containing iron

ferruginous *adjective* referring to rock or water which contains iron

**fertile** *adjective* **1**. referring to an animal or plant that is able to produce offspring by sexual reproduction. Opposite **sterile 2**. referring to soil with a high concentration of nutrients that is able to produce good crops

**fertilisation** *noun* the joining of an ovum and a sperm to form a zygote and so start the development of an embryo

fertilise verb 1. (of a sperm) to join with an ovum 2. (of a male) to make a female pregnant 3. to put fertiliser on crops or soil fertiliser noun a chemical or natural substance spread and mixed with soil to stimulate plant growth

COMMENT: Organic materials used as fertilisers include manure, slurry, rotted vegetable waste, bonemeal, fishmeal and seaweed. Inorganic fertilisers such as powdered lime or sulfur are also used. In commercial agriculture, artificially prepared fertilisers (manufactured compounds containing nitrogen, potassium and other chemicals) are most often used, but if excessive use of them is made, all the chemicals are not taken up by plants and the excess is leached out of the soil into ground water or rivers where it may cause algal bloom.

**fertility** *noun***1**. the state of being fertile **2**. the proportion of eggs which develop into young

**fertility rate** *noun* the number of births per year, shown, in humans, per thousand females aged between 15 and 44

fetus, foetus noun an unborn animal in the womb at the stage when all the structural features are visible, i.e. after eight weeks in humans (NOTE: The usual scientific spelling is 'fetus', although 'foetus' is common in non-technical British English usage.)

**fibre** noun **1**. a natural filament such as cotton or a synthetic filament such as nylon **2**. a long narrow plant cell with thickened walls that forms part of a plant's supporting tissue, especially in the outer region of a stem (NOTE: [all senses] The US spelling is **fiber**.)

**fibrous** *adjective* made of a mass of fibres **field** *noun* **1**. an area of land, usually surrounded by a fence or hedge, used for growing crops or for pasture **2**. an area over which something such as snow, ice or lava is found **3**. an area of natural resources, e.g. an oilfield or coalfield **4**. an area of interest or activity  $\bigcirc$  *He specialises in the field of environmental health.* 

field margin noun the edge of a field

**field observation** *noun* an examination made in the open air, looking at organisms in their natural habitat, as opposed to in a laboratory

**field research** *noun* a programme of scientific studies carried out at a geographical location as opposed to in a laboratory

field station *noun* a scientific research centre located in the area being researched

**field study** *noun* an investigation carried out at a geographical location as opposed to in a laboratory

**field trial** *noun* a trial that tests the ability of a crop variety to perform under normal cultivation conditions

fieldwork noun scientific studies carried out somewhere other than in a laboratory

filament noun the stalk of a stamen, carrying an anther

**film** noun a thin layer, covering or coating  $\circ$  a thin film of oil on the surface of the lake  $\circ$  An electrical element made of gold film is sandwiched between the layers of glass.

**filter** noun a material or device through which a liquid or a gas is passed in order to separate the fluid from solid matter or to remove unwanted substances  $\bigcirc$  a fuel filter  $\bigcirc$ an oil filter

**filter basin** *noun* a large tank through which drinking water is passed to be filtered

**filter bed** *noun* a layer of charcoal, gravel or similar material through which liquid sewage is passed to clean it

**filter cake** *noun* a deposit of semisolids or solids that separates out between layers of filtering material

**filter feeder** *noun* an animal that lives in water and feeds on small particles that it filters out of the water it takes in, e.g. a clam, sponge, or baleen whale

**filtrate** *noun* a liquid which has passed through a filter

**filtration** *noun* the process of passing a liquid through a filter to remove solid substances

**fin** *noun* a thin flat projection on the body of a fish

**final disposal** *noun* the last stage in getting rid of waste, e.g. incineration or placing in a landfill

**fine** *adjective* **1.** describing something that is very small in size, thickness or weight **2.** referring to weather that is warm and sunny, with few clouds and no rain or fog

**finite** adjective referring to something that has an end  $\bigcirc$  *Coal supplies are finite and are forecast to run out in 2020.* 

**finite resource** *plural noun* a natural resource that is does not renew itself and which will potentially be completely used up, e.g. coal or oil. Opposite **renewable resource** 

fiord noun another spelling of fjord

fir noun a common evergreen coniferous tree. Genus: Abies.

**fir cone** *noun* a hard oval or round structure on a fir tree containing the seeds (NOTE: The term is sometimes applied to the cones of other trees such as pines.)

fire noun the process, or an area, of burning

**firebreak** *noun* an area kept free of vegetation, so that a fire cannot pass across and spread to other parts of the forest or heath

fire climax *noun* the condition by which an ecosystem is maintained by fire -fired suffix burning as a fuel  $\bigcirc$  coal-fired power station  $\bigcirc$  gas-fired central heating fired camp noun some as methane

firedamp noun same as methane

**fire hazard** *noun* something that increases the risk of fire  $\bigcirc$  *These piles of paper are a fire hazard*.

**fire management** *noun* the practice of burning in a controlled and selective way grasses, brush, undergrowth and trees in an area, to maintain an ecological balance of species and prevent uncontrolled fires

fire-prone adjective liable to catch fire

**fire-prone ecosystem** *noun* an ecosystem such as fynbos or a eucalypt forest that is likely to be frequently affected by fires

**fireproof** *adjective* referring to a material or structure designed to resist the effect of fire  $\bigcirc A$  fireproof fence surrounds the forest.

**fire-retardant** *adjective* referring to a substance which slows down the rate at which a material burns

**firewood** *noun* wood which is burnt to provide heat

**firn** *noun* the spring snow on high mountains which becomes harder during the summer

**fish** noun a cold-blooded vertebrate that lives in water (NOTE: Some species are eaten for food. Fish are high in protein, phosphorus, iodine and vitamins A and D. White fish have very little oil.) ■ *verb* to try to catch fish

**fisherman** *noun* a man who catches fish as an occupation or as a leisure activity

**fishery** noun **1**. the commercial activity of catching fish **2**. an area of sea where fish are caught  $\bigcirc$  The boats go each year to the rich fisheries off the north coast.

**fish farm** *noun* a place where edible fish are bred or reared in special pools for sale as food

**fish farming** *noun* the commercial activity of keeping fish in ponds or fenced areas of the sea for sale as food. Also called **aquaculture**, **aquafarming**, **aquiculture** 

**fishing** noun the activity of catching fish as an occupation or a leisure activity  $\bigcirc$  He enjoys fishing in trout streams.

**fishing quota** *noun* the amount of a species of fish that it is permitted to catch within a period of time

**fish kill** noun an instance of a lot of fish being killed  $\bigcirc$  Aluminium is a critical factor in fish kills.

fish ladder noun a series of pools at different levels, specially built to allow fish such as salmon to swim up or down a river on migration

fishless lake noun a lake containing no fish

**fishmeal** *noun* a powder of dried fish, used as an animal feed or as a fertiliser

**fish pass** noun a channel near a dam, built to allow migrating fish to swim past the dam. Also called **fishway**. ◊ **fish ladder fish stock** noun the fish population from which catches are taken, usually within a specific fishery

fishway noun same as fish pass

**fissile** *adjective* **1**. referring to rock which can split or be split **2**. referring to an isotope which can split on impact with a neutron

**fission** noun **1. atomic fission 2.** the process of splitting **3.** a process of reproduction, in which an organism splits in two and two complete new organisms grow, as in corals **a** verb (in nuclear fission) to split an atomic nucleus  $\bigcirc$  When the plutonium is fissioned, fast neutrons are produced.

fissure noun a crack or groove

fit adjective 1. referring to something that is suitable for its purpose  $\bigcirc$  This food is fit to eat.  $\square$  fit-for-purpose a standard for assessing the suitability of something for a particular use 2. referring to an organism that is well adapted or evolutionarily successful  $\bigcirc$  survival of the fittest  $\bigcirc$  Only the fit individuals will survive. (NOTE: fitter-fittest)

**fitness** *noun* a measure of the evolutionary success of genes, traits, organisms or populations

**fixation** *noun* the act of fixing something.  $\phi$  **nitrogen fixation** 

**fjord**, **fiord** *noun* a long inlet of the sea among mountains in temperate or arctic regions

**flagellum** noun a long thin tapering outgrowth of some cells that waves or rotates to propel the cell (NOTE: Flagella are found in some bacteria and protozoa, and in sperm cells.)

**flake** noun **1**. a small piece of a solid  $\bigcirc$  *a flake of rock* **2**. a small piece of snow which falls from the sky. Also called **snowflake** 

**flammability** *noun* the ability of a material to catch fire

**flammable** *adjective* easily set on fire and capable of burning fiercely and rapidly  $\bigcirc$ *Aviation gasoline is a flammable liquid.* (NOTE: **Flammable** and **inflammable** mean the same thing. To avoid confusion, it is recommended to use **flammable**.) **flare** *noun* a device that burns surplus gases to prevent them from being released into the environment, usually found on top of tall chimneys

**flash** noun a sudden or periodic burst of light  $\bigcirc$  Lightning is accompanied by a brilliant flash.  $\blacksquare$  verb to switch a light on and off  $\bigcirc$  He flashed his torch as a signal.

**flash flood** *noun* a sudden rush of water in a stream or narrow river, often causing damage

**flashy** *adjective* referring to a river whose water level is rising rapidly after it has rained a lot

**flatfish** noun a type of fish with a flattened back that lives on the bed of the sea or of a lake and has both eyes on the top of its body, e.g. plaice (NOTE: The body of a flatfish is flattened in such a way that the fish is lying on its side. As the young fish grows, the eye underneath moves round its head to join the one on top.)

flatworm noun a worm with a flat body, a single gut opening, and no circulatory system. Phylum: Platyhelminthes. (NOTE: Flatworms include both free-living species and parasites such as flukes and tapeworms.)

flaw noun a fault or error

**flea** noun a small jumping insect which lives as a parasite on animals, sucking their blood and possibly spreading disease. Order: Siphonaptera. (NOTE: Historically, bubonic plague was spread by fleas.)

**flexible** adjective **1**. not rigid or stiff **2**. capable of responding to a variety of conditions or situations  $\bigcirc AC$  electrical energy is more flexible and more efficient than DC.

**flightless bird** *noun* a bird which has small wings and cannot fly, e.g. an ostrich or a penguin

**flocculant** noun a substance added to water as it is treated to encourage impurities to settle

**flocculation** noun the gathering together of particles into lumps  $\bigcirc$  flocculation of yeast in brewing  $\bigcirc$  The flocculation of particles is very important in making clay soils easy to work.

**flock** noun a large group of birds or some farm animals such as sheep and goats  $\bigcirc a$  flock of geese  $\bigcirc a$  flock of sheep (NOTE: The word used for a group of cattle, deer or pigs is herd.)

**flood** noun a large amount of water covering land that is usually dry, caused by phenomena such as melting snow, heavy rain, high tides or storms  $\blacksquare$  verb to cover dry land with a large amount of water  $\bigcirc$  The river bursts its banks and floods the whole valley twice a year in the rainy season.

flood alleviation, flood control *noun* the avoidance of the possibility of flooding by controlling the flow of water in rivers with structures such as dams and embankments

**flood control measures** *noun* ways of managing water flow to reduce the possibility of flooding by rivers or the sea

flood damage noun the damage caused by floodwater

**flood defence** *noun* the measures taken to protect low-lying areas from flooding by rivers or the sea

**flood forecasting** *noun* the process of establishing when an area is at risk of being flooded, taking into account local features, climate change, the likelihood of extreme weather, and socio-economic factors

**floodgate** *noun* a gate in a weir or dyke, designed to control water flow

**flooding** noun the uncontrolled spread of a large amount of water onto land that is usually dry  $\bigcirc$  Severe flooding has been reported after the heavy rain overnight. (NOTE: About 10% of the land area of England is at risk of flooding.)

**flood plain** *noun* a wide flat part of the bottom of a valley which is usually covered with water when the river floods

**flood storage** *noun* the measures taken to control and retain the large amount of water produced in a flood until it can disperse naturally

flood tide noun a tide that is rising. Compare ebb tide

**flood warning** *noun* an alert that there is likely to be a flood

**floodwater** noun water that spreads uncontrolled onto land that is usually dry  $\bigcirc$  After the floodwater receded the centre of the town was left buried in mud.

**floor** noun the ground beneath something  $\bigcirc$  fish that live on the floor of the ocean  $\bigcirc$  The forest floor is covered with decaying vegetation.

flora noun the wild plants that grow naturally in a specific area. Compare fauna

**Flora, flora** *noun* a book or list describing the plants of a specific area  $\bigcirc$  *a Flora of the British Isles* 

floral adjective referring to plants or flowers

**floret** *noun* a little flower that forms part of a larger flower head

#### flourish

**flourish** verb to live or grow well and increase in numbers  $\bigcirc$  *The colony of rabbits flourished in the absence of any predators.* 

**flow** verb to move or run smoothly with continuity  $\bigcirc$  Water flows down the outer surface, cooling the interior.  $\blacksquare$  noun 1. continuous movement of a fluid in a particular direction  $\bigcirc$  the flow of water downstream 2. the rate at which a substance is moving  $\bigcirc$  The meter measures the flow of water through the pipe. 3. the movement of the sea or water affected by tides towards a shore as the tide rises. Compare ebb 4. an area of peat bog, especially in Scotland  $\bigcirc$  the flow country

flower noun the reproductive part of a seed-bearing plant (NOTE: Some flowers are brightly coloured to attract pollinating insects and birds and usually consist of protective sepals and bright petals surrounding the stamens and stigma. Many are cultivated for their colour and perfume.)

flowerless adjective without flowers

**flowmeter** noun a meter attached to a pipe to measure the speed at which a liquid or gas moves through the pipe

**fluctuate** verb to vary or change irregularly  $\bigcirc$  The magnetic field will fluctuate at the supply frequency.

**fluctuation** noun an irregular variation or change  $\bigcirc$  Fluctuations in the water table affect the growth of plants.

**flue** noun a chimney or other structure through which gas or smoke is released from a furnace or stove  $\bigcirc$  Gases are passed directly from the flue into the atmosphere.

**flue gas** noun a gas produced by a burning substance that is released into the atmosphere from a chimney

**fluid** *noun* a substance whose molecules move freely past one another and that takes the shape of its container (NOTE: Both liquids and gases are fluids.)

**fluidise** verb to make a solid move in the manner of a fluid (NOTE: One way to do this is by pulverising it into a fine powder and passing a gas through to induce flow.)

**fluidised-bed combustion** *noun* a method of burning fluidised low-grade fuel while keeping the emission of pollutant gases to a minimum. Abbr **FBC** 

**fluke** *noun* a parasitic flatworm (NOTE: Flukes may settle inside the liver, bloodstream or in other parts of the body.)

**fluoridate** *verb* to add sodium fluoride to drinking water to help prevent tooth decay

**fluoridation** *noun* the addition of sodium fluoride to drinking water to help prevent tooth decay

**fluoride** *noun* a chemical compound of fluorine, usually with sodium, potassium or tin

fluorine noun a yellowish gas (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **F**; the atomic number is **9** and the atomic weight is **19.00**.)

**fluorocarbon** *noun* an inert compound of fluorine and carbon, with high temperature stability.  $\Diamond$  **chlorofluorocarbon** 

**fluorosis** *noun* a condition caused by excessive fluoride in drinking water or food (NOTE: It causes discoloration of teeth and affects the milk yields of cattle.)

**flush** *verb* **1**. to clear a tube such as a sewer by sending water through it **2**. to pass water through a tube or system in order to remove something and clean it

flush toilet *noun* a toilet in which the excreta are washed into the sewage system by a flow of water. Compare **chemical toilet**, earth closet

fluvial, fluviatile *adjective* referring to rivers

**flux** *noun* the rate at which heat, energy or radiation flows

fly noun a small insect with two wings. Order: Diptera. ■ verb to move through the air (NOTE: fly – flew – flown)

**fly ash** noun solid particles in the air that have come from burning coal or another solid fuel  $\bigcirc$  *The cloud contained particles of fly ash*. (NOTE: Fly ash can be collected and used to make bricks.)

**fly-tipper** *noun* a person who dumps rubbish somewhere other than at an official rubbish dump

**fly-tipping** *noun* the dumping of rubbish somewhere other than at an official site

'A quarter of all farms in England and Wales have experienced fly-tipping on their land in recent years. The total quantity of waste tipped in 2001 was estimated at 600000 tons. (Agricultural Waste: Opportunities for Change. Information from the Agricultural Waste Stakeholders' Forum)'

**foam** noun a mass of bubbles of air or gas in a liquid film  $\bigcirc$  detergent foam on the river  $\bigcirc$  foam fire extinguishers

**foam plastic** *noun* plastic with bubbles blown into it to make a light material used for packing. Also called **plastic foam** 

**fodder**, **fodder** crop *noun* plant material or a crop which is grown to give to animals as food, e.g. grass or clover  $\bigcirc$  *winter fodder* **FoE** *abbr* Friends of the Earth

foehn noun another spelling of föhn

**foetus** *noun* another spelling of **fetus** (NOTE: The usual scientific spelling is 'fetus', although 'foetus' is common in non-technical British English usage.)

**fog** *noun* a thick mist made up of tiny drops of water

**foggy** *adjective* referring to weather conditions when there is fog

**föhn, foehn** *noun* a warm dry wind which blows down the side of a mountain away from the prevailing wind. It occurs when moist air rises up the mountain on the windward side, loses its moisture as rain or snow and then flows down the other side as a dry wind. Compare **chinook** 

**foliage** noun the leaves on plants  $\bigcirc$  In a forest, animals are hard to see through the thick foliage on the trees.

foliar adjective referring to leaves

foliar spray noun 1. a method of applying pesticides or liquid nutrients as droplets to plant leaves  $\bigcirc$  needs weekly foliar sprays 2. a pesticide or liquid nutrient applied to plant leaves as droplets

**folic acid** *noun* a vitamin in the vitamin B complex found in milk, liver, yeast and green plants such as spinach

**follicle** *noun* **1**. a fruit in the form of a dry case that splits along one side to release the seeds **2**. the small structure in the skin from which each hair develops **3**. one of many small structures in the ovaries where egg cells develop

**food** *noun* **1**. the nutrient material eaten by animals for energy and growth **2**. the nutrient material applied to plants as fertiliser

**Food and Agriculture Organization** *noun* an international organisation that is an agency of the United Nations established with the purpose of improving standards of nutrition and eradicating malnutrition and hunger. Abbr **FAO** 

**Food and Drug Administration** *noun* a US government department that protects the public against unsafe foods, drugs and cosmetics. Abbr **FDA** 

**food balance** *noun* the balance between food supply and the demand for food from a population

**food chain** *noun* a series of organisms that pass energy and minerals from one to another as each provides food for the next (NOTE: The first organism in the food chain is the producer and the rest are consumers.)

COMMENT: Two basic types of food chain exist: the grazing food chain and the detrital food chain, based on plant-eaters and detritus-eaters respectively. In practice, food chains are interconnected, making up food webs.

**food colouring** *noun* a substance used to colour food

**food grain** *noun* a cereal crop used as food for humans, e.g. wheat, barley or rye

**food mile** *noun* a measure of the distance that food is transported from its place of origin to the consumer

**food pyramid** *noun* a chart of a food chain showing the number of organisms at each level

**food safety** *noun* the issues surrounding the production, handling, storage and cooking of food that determine whether or not it is safe to eat

**food scare** *noun* a situation when food is believed to be unsafe or contaminated, often leading to many people refusing to buy it

**food security** *noun* the situation that exists when people have both physical access to, and the economic means to buy, sufficient food of a quality that meets their nutritional needs and food preferences

Food Standards Agency noun a British government agency set up in 2000 to offer advice on food safety and quality. Abbr FSA

**foodstuff** noun something that can be used as food  $\bigcirc$  cereals, vegetables and other foodstuffs

**food supply** noun **1**. the production of food and the way in which it gets to the consumer **2**. a stock of food  $\bigcirc$  The ants will vigorously defend their food supply.

**food web** *noun* a series of food chains that are linked together in an ecosystem

**footpath** noun a route along which people walk on foot but along which vehicles are not permitted  $\bigcirc$  Long-distance footpaths have been created through the mountain regions.

**footprint** *noun* the resources that an individual or organisation consumes  $\bigcirc$  *the ecological footprint of the building* 

**forage** noun a crop planted for animals to eat in the field  $\blacksquare$  verb to look for food  $\bigcirc$ The woodpecker forages in the forest canopy for insects.

force of gravity noun same as gravity forecast noun a description of what it is thought will happen in the future on the basis of current knowledge  $\bigcirc$  the weather forecast  $\bigcirc$  population forecasts  $\bigcirc$  a forecast of the requirements for new homes forecasting

**forecasting** *noun* the activity of using current knowledge to describe what might happen in the future

**foreign** *adjective* belonging to or coming from another country

**foreshock** *noun* a small shock that comes before a main earthquake.  $\Diamond$  **aftershock** 

**foreshore** *noun* an area of sand or pebbles which is only covered by the sea when there are very high tides

**forest** *noun* **1**. an area of land (more than 0.5 ha), 10% of which is occupied by trees **2**. same as **plantation**  $\blacksquare$  *verb* to manage a forest, by cutting wood as necessary, and planting new trees

**forest conservation** *noun* the active maintenance of forests by controlled felling and planting

**forest degradation** *noun* the loss of the natural resources in areas covered by forests, whether permanent or reversible

forest dieback noun a disease affecting pine trees in which the pine needles turn yellow. Also called **Waldsterben** 

**forester** *noun* a person who manages woodland and plantations of trees

forest fire noun a sudden intense fire that spreads rapidly and often destroys a very large wooded area (NOTE: Some trees such as eucalyptus grow again from their blackened stumps and some seeds only germinate after experiencing the intense heat of such a fire.)

**forest floor** *noun* the ground at the base of the trees in a forest

forest management *noun* the conservation and regeneration of the ecological resources of a forest while maintaining its productivity

**forest regeneration** *noun* the process of new trees growing again on land that was formerly wooded, whether naturally or as a result of planting schemes

**forestry** *noun* the management of forests, woodlands and plantations of trees

Forest Stewardship Certification noun a mark of recognition by the Forest Stewardship Council, based in the USA, that a forest is being managed in an environmentally responsible, socially beneficial and economically viable way. Abbr FSC

**forest tree** *noun* a large tree of the type that grows in a forest

**formation** noun **1**. the way in which something is formed, shaped or arranged  $\bigcirc$ *a formation of flower buds* **2**. the shape or structure that something has  $\bigcirc$  *The geese*  flew in a V formation. **3.** a structure formed of layers of rock  $\bigcirc$  an unusual rock formation

forward verb to improve or send on something

**fossil** *noun* the remains of an ancient animal or plant found preserved in rock

**fossil fuel** *noun* a substance containing carbon formed from the decomposed remains of prehistoric plants, e.g. oil, natural gas or peat

**fossilised** *adjective* referring to an animal or plant that has become a fossil

**fossil record** *noun* the information about ancient climate and species preserved in fossils

**fossil water** *noun* water that has accumulated in underground strata over millions of years and is therefore not a renewable resource

foul water noun water containing waste or sewage

**founder crop** *noun* a crop that was one of the earliest to be used and developed by humans, e.g. wheat, barley, lentils and chickpeas

**founder effect** *noun* the existence of low levels of genetic variation due to a new population being established by only a few original individuals.  $\Diamond$  **genetic bottleneck** 

**fowl** *noun* a bird, especially a hen, raised on a farm for food.  $\Diamond$  **waterfowl** 

Fr symbol francium

**fraction** noun a part of a whole unit, expressed as one figure above another, e.g.  $\frac{1}{4}$  or  $\frac{1}{2}$ 

**fractional distillation** *noun* a distillation process in which different fractions of a mixture of liquids are collected at different points during the process

fractional process noun a process that separates out the components of a mixture

**fragile** adjective referring to something that is easily broken or damaged  $\bigcirc$  a fragile glass tube  $\bigcirc$  The desert is a fragile environment.

**fragment** noun **1**. a small piece of something  $\bigcirc$  a fragment of rock **2**. a piece of DNA, especially one cut by an enzyme  $\bigcirc$  a restriction fragment  $\blacksquare$  verb to break into pieces

**framework** noun **1**. the supporting structure round which something is made or built  $\bigcirc$  *This house has a timber framework.* **2**. a set of ideas or principles that form the basis of something that will be developed more at a later stage  $\bigcirc$  *The draft report will provide a framework for our discussions.* 

#### Framework Convention on Climate

**Change** *noun* a treaty agreed at the Earth Summit requiring states to take steps to limit the emission of greenhouse gases, especially carbon dioxide, believed to be responsible for global warming

**francium** *noun* a naturally radioactive element (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Fr**; the atomic number is **87** and the atomic weight is **223**.)

**free** *adjective* **1**. not attached, confined or controlled **2**. chemically uncombined ■ *verb* to release something or someone from constraint

freedom to roam phrase 
Countryside and Rights of Way Act

**free-living animal** *noun* an animal that exists in its environment without being a parasite on another

**free radical** *noun* an atom or group of atoms that is highly reactive due to the presence of an unpaired electron

free-range eggs noun eggs from hens that are allowed to run about in the open and eat more natural food

free-swimming adjective same as pelagic

**free temperature rise** *noun* the difference between the temperature outside a building and the free heat inside it (NOTE: If a building is well insulated, the difference can be as much as 10K.)

freeze verb 1. (of liquid) to become solid as a result of a drop in temperature 2. to preserve something such as food by keeping it at a very low temperature it 3. (of weather) to be so cold that water turns to ice  $\bigcirc$  It will freeze tomorrow. Opposite melt 4. to become or remain motionless to avoid the attention of predators  $\bigcirc$  These small birds freeze if a hawk passes overhead. (NOTE: freeze – froze – frozen)

**freeze drying** *noun* a method of preserving food or tissue specimens by freezing rapidly and drying in a vacuum

**freezer** *noun* an appliance for preserving perishable items by keeping them at a very low temperature

**frequency** *noun* **1**. the number of times something happens in a given period of time **2**. the probability of a item occurring in a sample **3**. the percentage occurrence of a single species in a set of samples

**fresh** *adjective* **1**. not used, not dirty **2**. not tinned or frozen  $\bigcirc$  *Fresh fish is less fatty than tinned fish*.  $\bigcirc$  *Fresh vegetables are expensive in winter*.

**fresh air** noun the air outside buildings or other structures  $\bigcirc$  They came out of the office into the fresh air.

**fresh water** *noun* water in rivers and lakes which contains almost no salt. Compare **salt water** 

**freshwater** *adjective* **1**. containing fresh water  $\bigcirc$  *freshwater lakes* **2**. living in fresh water  $\bigcirc$  *freshwater fish such as pike* 

**friable** *adjective* referring to soil which is light and crumbles easily into fragments

**fridge mountain** noun the unexpected result of an EU decision that required CFCs to be recovered from fridges that were being thrown away, because there was not enough special equipment to do the job and the fridges had to be stored

**Friends of the Earth** *noun* a pressure group formed to influence local and central governments on environmental matters. Abbr **FoE** 

**frond** *noun* a large compound leaf, divided into many sections, such as that found on ferns and palm trees

**front** noun **1**. the forward part or surface  $\bigcirc$  *The entrance is at the front.* **2**. same as weather front

**frontal** *adjective* referring to the forward part or surface area of something  $\bigcirc$  *the frontal area* 

**frost** *noun* the deposit of ice that forms on surfaces when the temperature is below the freezing point of water  $\bigcirc$  *frost on the windowpanes* 

**frosty** *adjective* referring to an air temperature below  $0^{\circ}C \odot a$  frosty night

**fructose** noun a sugar with six carbon atoms, which together with glucose forms sucrose. Also called **fruit sugar** 

**frugivore** noun an animal that mainly eats fruit (NOTE: Many bats and birds are frugivores.)

**fruit** noun the structure of a plant formed after flowering and usually containing seeds. Many fruits are eaten as food.  $\bigcirc a$  diet of fresh fruit and vegetables  $\bigcirc A$  peach is a fleshy fruit.  $\blacksquare$  verb (of a plant) to produce fruit  $\bigcirc$  Some varieties of apple fruit very early.

fruit farming noun the activity of growing fruit for sale

fruit sugar noun same as fructose

**fruitwood** *noun* the wood from a fruit tree such as apple or cherry, which may be used to make furniture

**fruticose** *adjective* (*of some lichens*) with upright branches, like a small shrubby plant

**FSA** *abbr* Food Standards Agency

**FSC** *abbr* Forest Stewardship Certificate **fuel** *noun* a substance that can be burnt to provide heat or power, e.g. wood, gas or oil **fuel efficiency** *noun* the percentage of the heat from burning a fuel that is converted into energy

fuel-efficient *adjective* referring to an engine or process that uses fuel efficiently

fuel-saving adjective using less fuel than others of the same type

**fuel switching** *noun* the act of changing from a fuel with a high sulfur content to one such as natural gas that contains a relatively low amount of sulfur

**fuelwood** *noun* wood that is grown to be used as fuel

**fugitive dust** *noun* dust caused by an activity that makes it blow in the air, as occurs when tractors are ploughing dry fields

**fugitive emissions** *plural noun* polluting substances released into the atmosphere as a result of leaks, evaporation or wind effects

full-cost accounting *noun* the practice of including the less obvious costs of a product or activity, such as its effects on the environment or health, together with its direct costs when making decisions. Also called green accounting, environmental accounting

**fumarole** *noun* a small hole in the Earth's crust near a volcano from which gases, smoke or steam are released

**fumes** *plural noun* **1**. gas or vapour **2**. the solid particles produced by a chemical reaction which pass into the air as smoke

**fumigant** *noun* a chemical compound that becomes a gas or smoke when heated and is used to kill insects

fumigate verb to kill microorganisms or insects by using a fumigant

**fumigation** *noun* **1**. the use of a fumigant to kill microorganisms or insects **2**. a high amount of air pollution near the ground, caused when the morning sun heats the air and forces polluted air down from higher levels

**function** noun the use or purpose of something or how it works  $\bigcirc$  The function of a wing is to provide lift.

**functional food** *noun* a food designed to be medically beneficial, helping to protect against serious conditions such as diabetes, cancer or heart disease

**functionality** *noun* the purpose that something is designed to fulfil, or the range of functions that something has functional response noun the response of a predator to an increase in population of its prey. Either the predator increases its consumption as the population of the prey increases, or it reduces its consumption because it has enough to eat.

**fundamental** *adjective* referring to or forming the foundation or base  $\bigcirc$  *the fundamental characteristics of cells* 

fundamental niche noun the full range of physical, chemical and biological factors each species could use if there were no competition from other species.  $\diamond$  interspecific competition

fundamental particle noun same as elementary particle

**fungal** *adjective* referring to fungi  $\bigcirc$  *Powdery mildew is a fungal disease.* 

fungi plural of fungus

**fungicidal** *adjective* referring to a substance which kills fungi  $\bigcirc$  *fungicidal properties* 

fungicide noun a substance used to kill fungi

**fungoid** *adjective* referring to something shaped like a fungus  $\bigcirc$  *a fungoid growth on the skin* 

fungus *noun* an organism that has threadlike cells with walls made of chitin and no green chlorophyll (NOTE: The plural is **fun**gi. For other terms referring to fungi, see words beginning with **myc-**.)

COMMENT: Fungi grow in almost every environment and are vital in nutrient cycling as they can digest the cellulose in dead plants. Mushrooms are the spore-producing structures of a large group of otherwise threadlike fungi; many are edible although some are deadly poisonous. Fungi are used in brewing, cheese-making and the production of antibiotics such as penicillin. Some fungi can cause diseases of animals and plants.

**funnel cloud** noun a rotating, visible extension of a cloud, with the top attached to the cloud but without the bottom tip touching the ground  $\bigcirc$  When a funnel cloud touches the ground it becomes a tornado.

fur noun 1. a coat of hair covering an animal  $\bigcirc$  The rabbit has a thick coat of winter fur. 2. skin and hair removed from an animal, used to make clothes

**furling** *noun* a way of preventing damage to horizontal-axis wind turbines by automatically turning them out of the wind

**furrow** *noun* a long trench cut in the soil by a plough

FYM abbr farmyard manure

**fynbos** *noun* the scrubland typical of the Western Cape area of South America, consisting of low bushes with hard leaves

**g** symbol gram **Ga** symbol gallium

Gaia hypothesis, Gaia theory noun a theory that the biosphere is like a single organism where the living fauna and flora of Earth, its climate and geology, all function together and are interrelated, influencing the development of the whole environment

**gain** noun an increase  $\bigcirc$  a gain in altitude  $\bigcirc$  There is a gain of heat by the Earth due to solar radiation.

**gale** noun a very strong wind usually blowing from a single direction (NOTE: A gale is force 8 on the Beaufort scale.)

**galena** *noun* a shiny blue-grey mineral consisting of lead sulfide. Symbol **PbS** (NOTE: It is a source of lead and silver.)

**gall** *noun* a hard growth on a plant caused by a parasitic insect

**gallium** noun a rare blue-grey metal element used in semiconductors, high-temperature thermometers and alloys (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Ga**; the atomic number is **31** and the atomic weight is **69.72**.)

**gallon** *noun* a unit of liquid volume in the Imperial System, approximately equal to 4.5 litres

**galvanised iron** *noun* iron that has been coated with zinc to prevent it from rusting (NOTE: Sheets of galvanised iron are widely used for roofs.)

**game** *noun* animals that are hunted and killed for sport or food or both

**game reserve** *noun* an area of land where wild animals are kept to be hunted and killed for sport

gamete noun a sex cell (NOTE: In animals the male and female gametes are a spermatozoon and an ovum respectively, in plants they are a pollen grain and an ovule.) gametocide noun a drug that kills gametocytes

**gametocyte** *noun* a cell that develops into a gamete

**gametophyte** *noun* the part of a plant's life cycle when sex organs and sex cells (gametes) are produced

**garden** *noun* an area of land cultivated as a hobby or for pleasure, rather than to produce an income.  $\Diamond$  **market garden** 

**garden city** *noun* a large town planned in the early 20th century on farmland near a large town, with both public parks and a private garden for each house. The aim was to mix the urban and rural environments. ¢ **garden suburb** 

gardener noun a person who looks after a garden

**gardening** *noun* the activity of looking after a garden

**garden suburb** *noun* an area of a city planned in the early 20th century to include large open public spaces and many private gardens.  $\Diamond$  **garden city** 

**garrigue**, garigue *noun* in the Mediterranean area, low-growing vegetation of drought-resistant prickly shrubs and herbs

**gas** noun **1**. a substance that is not a liquid or a solid, which will completely fill the container it occupies, and which becomes liquid when it is cooled  $\bigcirc$  *Heating turned the liquid into a gas.* **2**. a substance found underground, or produced from coal, and used to cook or heat  $\bigcirc$  *gas central heating*  $\bigcirc$  *We heat our house by gas.* **3**. *US* same as **gasoline** (NOTE: The UK term is **petrol**.)

**gas cleaning** *noun* the removal of pollutants from gas, especially from emissions from factories and power stations

**gaseous** *adjective* referring to a substance formed or in the form of gas  $\square$  water in the gaseous state steam

**gaseous pollutant** *noun* a pollutant in the form of a gas

gas exchange *noun* the transfer of gases between an organism and its environment

**gasoline** noun US a liquid made from petroleum, used as a fuel in internal combustion engines (NOTE: The UK term is **petrol**.)

**gastropod** noun a molluse that has a head with eyes, tongue and tentacles, a large flattened muscular foot and often a single shell. Class: Gastropoda. (NOTE: Limpets, snails and slugs are gastropods.)

**gather** verb to collect things together  $\bigcirc$ The children gathered sea shells on the beach.  $\bigcirc$  We gathered information from several reports and reviews.

**gatherers** *plural noun* people who collect their food and materials, rather than growing them

#### Gause's principle

**Gause's principle** *noun* a theory that suggests that two similar and competitive species cannot occupy the same ecological niche at the same time

**GCV** abbr gross calorific value

**GE** *abbr* genetic engineering

**Geiger counter**, **Geiger-Muller detector tor** *noun* an instrument for the detection and measurement of radiation

**gene** *noun* a unit of DNA on a chromosome which governs the synthesis of one protein and may combine with other genes to determine a particular characteristic

**gene bank** *noun* a collection of seeds from potentially useful wild plants, which may be used in the future for breeding new varieties

**gene flow** *noun* a movement of genes among populations through interbreeding, dispersal and migration

**gene frequency** *noun* the ratio of a specific variant form (**allele**) of a gene to the total number of alleles in a specific population

**gene mutation** *noun* a change in a single base or base pair in the DNA sequence of a gene

**gene pool** *noun* the total of all the genes carried by the individual organisms in a population

genera plural of genus

**general circulation model** noun a complex computer simulation of climate and its various components  $\bigcirc$  *General circulation models are used by researchers and policy analysts to predict climate change.* 

**generalist** *noun* **1**. a species which can live in many different environments **2**. a person who studies many different subjects, rather than specialising in one

**generate** verb to make something exist  $\bigcirc$ Carbon monoxide is generated by car engines.  $\bigcirc$  The nuclear reaction generates a huge amount of heat.

**generation** noun **1**. the act or process of making or creating something  $\bigcirc$  the generation of electricity  $\bigcirc$  the generation of ideas **2**. a group of individual organisms derived from the same parents

**generator** noun a device that generates electricity  $\bigcirc$  The centre has its own independent generator, in case of mains power failure.

**generic** *adjective* **1**. relating to or suitable for a broad range of things or situations **2**. referring to a genus

**generic name** noun the scientific name of a genus. Compare **specific name** (NOTE: It is the first name in the binomial classification system, the second being the name which identifies the species. It is written with a capital letter.)

**genet** *noun* **1.** an individual organism which is genetically different from others **2.** a clone from a genetically distinct organism

genetic, genetical adjective referring to genes or genetics

**genetically modified** *adjective* referring to an organism that has received genetic material from another in a laboratory procedure, leading to a permanent change in one or more of its characteristics. Abbr **GM** 

genetically modified organism noun a plant or animal produced by the technique of genetic modification. Abbr GMO

**genetic bottleneck** *noun* a change in gene frequencies and decline in total genetic variation where there is a sharp decrease in population numbers

genetic code *noun* the information carried by an organism's DNA which determines the synthesis of proteins by cells and which is passed on when the cell divides. Also called genetic information

**genetic damage** *noun* damage to an organism's genes by external agents such as radiation or chemicals

genetic diversity *noun* the richness of the variety and range of genes

genetic drift *noun* a random change in gene frequency

genetic engineering noun same as genetic modification. Abbr GE

genetic information noun same as genetic code

genetic manipulation noun same as genetic modification

**genetic marker** *noun* a known, usually dominant, gene that is used in the identification of genes, chromosomes and characteristics already known to be associated with that gene

**genetic material** *noun* the parts of a cell that carry information that can be inherited, e.g. DNA, genes or chromosomes

genetic materials plural noun same as germplasm

**genetic modification** *noun* the alteration and recombination of genetic material under laboratory conditions, resulting in transgenic organisms. Abbr **GM**. Also

#### called genetic manipulation, genetic engineering

**genetics** *noun* the study of the way in which the characteristics of an organism are inherited

**genetic variation** *noun* the inherited differences between the members of a species

**genome** noun **1**. the set of all the genes in an individual **2**. all the genes in a species **genomic** adjective relating to a genome

**genotype** noun **1**. the genetic constitution of an organism.  $\Diamond$  **phenotype 2**. an individual organism

genotypic adjective relating to a genotype

**genus** *noun* a group of closely related species (NOTE: The plural is **genera**.)

geo- prefix Earth

geochemical adjective relating to geochemistry

**geochemist** *noun* a scientist who specialises in the study of geochemistry

**geochemistry** *noun* the scientific study of the chemical composition of the Earth

**geocline** *noun* the set of changes that take place in a species across different geographical environments

**geodesy** *noun* the science of the measurement of the Earth or of very large sections of it to determine the exact location of points on the Earth's surface through precise observation of distances and angles

geodetic, geodesic adjective referring to geodesy

**geographer** *noun* a person who specialises in the study of geography

**geographic, geographical** adjective referring to geography  $\bigcirc$  a specific geographical area  $\bigcirc$  the north geographic pole **geographical barrier** noun a natural feature such as a mountain range or a wide river that prevents easy movement from one area to another and separates different habitats

geographic information system noun a computer system for capturing, manipulating, analysing and displaying all forms of geographic information. Abbr GIS geographic isolation noun the state of being separated from other members of the same species by the sea or a range of mountains

**geography** *noun* the scientific study of the Earth's surface, climate and physical features

**geological** *adjective* referring to geology **geological** *aeon noun* a unit of geological time, lasting millions of years and containing several eras, during which Earth's surface and its underlying strata underwent particular changes

**geological epoch** *noun* a unit of geological time, a subdivision of a geological period

**geological era** *noun* a unit of geological time containing several geological periods

**geological period** *noun* a unit of geological time, shorter than an era and longer than an epoch

**geological timescale** *noun* the time during which the Earth has existed, i.e. many millions of years

**geologist** *noun* a scientist who specialises in the study of geology

**geology** *noun* the scientific study of the composition of the Earth's surface and its underlying strata

**geomagnetic** *adjective* referring to the Earth's magnetic field

geomagnetic pole noun same as magnetic pole

**geophone** *noun* a sensitive device which records sounds of seismic movements below the Earth's surface

**geophyte** *noun* a perennial herbaceous plant that lives through the winter as an underground structure such as a bulb or corm **geopolitics** *noun* the influence of geographical factors on the politics of a country

**geoscience** *noun* a science concerned with the physical aspects of the Earth, e.g. geochemistry, geodesy, geography, geology, geomorphology, geophysics or meteorology

**geoscientist** *noun* a person who specialises in one or several of the geosciences **geosphere** *noun* the central part of the Earth, which contains no living organisms **geostrophic wind** *noun* a wind which blows horizontally along the isobars, across the surface of the Earth

**geosyncline** *noun* a long fold in the Earth's crust, forming a basin filled with a sediment of volcanic rocks

**geothermal** *adjective* referring to heat from the interior of the Earth

COMMENT: Apart from channelling water from hot springs, geothermal energy can also be created by pumping cold water into deep holes in the ground at points where hot rocks lie close to the surface. The water is heated and becomes steam which returns to the surface and is used for domestic heating.

geothermal power noun same as geothermal energy

**geotropism** noun the growth or movement of a plant in response to gravity (NOTE: Stems and other parts that grow upwards against gravity show negative geotropism. The downwards growth of roots is positive geotropism.)

**gillnet** *noun* a type of net which is attached to the seabed, in which fish are caught by their gills

**gills** *plural noun* **1**. the breathing apparatus of fish and other animals living in water, consisting of a series of layers of tissue which extract oxygen from water as it passes over them **2**. a series of thin structures on the underside of the cap of a fungus, carrying the spores

**GIS** *abbr* geographic information system

glabrous adjective smooth and without hairs

**glacial** *adjective* referring to a glacier  $\bigcirc$  *The rocks are marked by glacial action.* 

**glacial drift** *noun* the material left behind by a glacier, e.g. sand, soil or gravel

**glaciation** *noun* **1**. the formation of glaciers **2**. the formation of ice crystals at the top of a rain cloud

**glacier** *noun* **1.** a mass of ice moving slowly across land, like a frozen river **2.** a large amount of stationary ice covering land in the Arctic regions

COMMENT: During the Ice Ages, glaciers covered large parts of the northern hemisphere, depositing sand in the form of glacial moraines and boulder clay. Glaciers are still found in the highest mountain areas and in the Arctic and Antarctic regions.

**glaciologist** *noun* a scientist who specialises in the study of glaciers

glaciology noun the study of glaciers

**gland** noun (in animals and plants) a cell or group of cells that secrete a specific substance

**glandular** *adjective* referring to glands **glass** *noun* a substance made from sand and soda or lime, usually transparent and used for making windows, bottles and other objects

**glasshouse** *noun* a large structure made of glass inside which plants are grown, especially commercially or for scientific purposes

**global positioning system** *noun* an extremely accurate method of locating a position using satellite signals. Abbr **GPS** 

**global solar radiation** *noun* the rays emitted by the Sun which fall on the Earth. Abbr **GSR** 

**global stability** *noun* the ability of an ecological or taxonomic unit to be unaffected by large disturbances

**global temperature** *noun* the temperature over the Earth as a whole

**global warming** *noun* a gradual rise in temperature over the whole of the Earth's surface, caused by the greenhouse effect

global warming potential noun a concept that takes into account the differing times that gases remain in the atmosphere, in order to find out the potential climate effects of equal emissions of each of the greenhouse gases. Abbr GWP

**globe** *noun* **1.** a spherical object **2.** the Earth

globule noun a round drop of liquid

**gloom** *noun* **1.** low light intensity **2.** dark and miserable weather

**glowworm** *noun* a beetle of which the females and larvae produce a greenish light

**glucose** *noun* a simple sugar found in some fruit

**goat** *noun* a small animal with horns, kept for its milk and meat

**graben** *noun* a type of rift valley, formed where land between fault lines has sunk

**grass** *noun* a monocotyledonous plant in the Poaceae family. There are many genera. (NOTE: Grasses include cereals and are important as food for herbivores and humans.)

areas of land covered mainly by grasses, e.g. the prairies of North America and the pampas of South America

**gravel** noun sand and small pebbles occurring as deposits (NOTE: On the Wentworth-Udden scale, gravel has a diameter of 2-4 millimetres.)

**graveyard** noun a place where nuclear waste is buried, or where unwanted machines or vehicles are left (*informal*)

gravitational adjective referring to gravity

**gray** *noun* an SI unit of measurement of absorbed radiation equal to 100 rads. Symbol **Gy** 

graze verb (of animals) to feed on lowgrowing plants

grazer noun a grazing animal

**grazer system** *noun* the section of a community where animals feed on plants

grazier noun a farmer who looks after grazing animals

**grazing** noun **1.** the action of animals feeding on growing grass, legumes or other plants  $\bigcirc$  Spine on plants may be a protection against grazing. **2.** the action of animals eating plankton or other very small animals **3.** an area of land covered with low-growing plants suitable for animals to feed on  $\bigcirc$  There is good grazing on the mountain pastures.

**grazing food chain** *noun* a cycle in which vegetation is eaten by animals, digested, then passed into the soil as dung and so taken up again by plants which are eaten by animals

**Green Belt** *noun* an area of agricultural land, woodland or parkland which surrounds an urban area

**green burial** *noun* an act of burial designed to have low environmental impact, typically placing a corpse that has not been embalmed in a biodegradable coffin or bag and burying it in a grave marked with a sapling. b woodland burial

**green certificate** *noun* a official record confirming that a specific percentage of electricity has been produced from renewable energy sources

**green chemistry** *noun* the development of chemical products that do not cause pollution or environmental and human health risks

**green consumerism** *noun* a movement to encourage people to buy food and other products such as organic foods or lead-free petrol which are regarded as environmentally good

green electricity noun same as green tariff electricity

**greenfield site** noun a place in the countryside, not previously built on, that is chosen as the site for a new housing development or factory  $\bigcirc$  Urban fringe sites are less attractive to developers than greenfield sites. Compare brownfield site

greenhouse effect noun the effect produced by the accumulation of carbon dioxide crystals and water vapour in the upper atmosphere, which insulates the Earth and raises the atmospheric temperature by preventing heat loss

COMMENT: Carbon dioxide particles allow solar radiation to pass through and reach the Earth, but prevent heat from radiating back into the atmosphere. This results in a rise in the Earth's atmospheric temperature, as if the atmosphere were a greenhouse protecting the Earth. Even a small rise of less than 1°C in the atmospheric temperature could have serious effects on the climate of the Earth as a whole. The polar ice caps would melt, causing sea levels to rise everywhere with consequent flooding. Temperate areas in Asia and America would experience hotter and drier conditions, causing crop failures. Carbon dioxide is largely formed from burning fossil fuels. Other gases contribute to the greenhouse effect, for instance methane is increasingly produced by rotting vegetation in swamps, from paddy fields, from termites' excreta and even from the stomachs of cows. Chlorofluorocarbons also help create the greenhouse effect.

**greenhouse gas** noun a gas that occurs naturally in the atmosphere or is produced by burning fossil fuels and rises into the atmosphere, forming a barrier which prevents heat loss  $\bigcirc$  planning to introduce a tax to inhibit greenhouse gas emissions. Abbr **GHG** 

COMMENT: The six greenhouse gases with a direct effect are carbon dioxide, methane, nitrous oxide (all of which occur naturally), hydrofluorocarbons and perfluorocarbons, and sulfur hexafluoride. Indirect greenhouses gases are nitrogen oxides, which produce ozone during their breakdown in the atmosphere, carbon monoxide and non-methane volatile compounds.

**greening** *noun* **1.** the process of planting trees and other vegetation in an area **2.** the process of becoming more aware, or increasing others' awareness, of the environment and environmental issues

green manure noun fast-growing green vegetation such as mustard or rape which is grown and ploughed into the soil to rot and act as manure

**Green Revolution** noun the development in the 1960s of new forms of widely grown cereal plants such as wheat and rice, which gave high yields and increased food production especially in tropical countries

**green space** *noun* an area of land which has not been built on, containing grass, plants and trees

**greenstrip** *noun* a firebreak on open grassland, planted with vegetation that does not burn easily

green tariff electricity noun electricity produced from renewable resources such as wind. Also called green electricity

greenwash noun a public relations initiative such as advertising or public consultation, that is designed to show the concern of a business or organisation for the environmental impact of its activities but which is often regarded as propaganda

green waste noun leaves, grass cuttings and other plant material that is to be disposed of

**greenway** noun **1**. a grass track **2**. a system of linked open spaces such as parks and privately owned natural areas, often in an urban area

green wood *noun* new shoots on a tree, which have not ripened fully

**grey water**, **greywater** *noun* the relatively clean waste water from sinks, baths, and kitchen appliances

grid noun a pattern of equally spaced vertical and horizontal lines

**grid reference** *noun* a set of numbers which refer to a point on a map, used for accurate location of a place

grind verb to reduce a substance to fine particles by crushing

**grinder** *noun* a device or machine which reduces a substance to fine particles by crushing

grinding noun the process of reducing of a substance to fine particles by crushing

**grit** *noun* **1.** sharp-grained sand **2.** a tiny solid particle in the air, larger than dust

**groove** noun a long shallow depression in a surface

**gross calorific value** *noun* the total number of calories which a specific amount of a substance contains. Abbr **GCV** 

gross primary production noun the rate at which a biomass assimilates organic matter

**gross primary productivity** *noun* the rate at which producers in an ecosystem capture and store chemical energy as biomass.  $\Diamond$  **net primary productivity** 

**ground** noun **1**. the solid surface of the Earth **2**. a surface layer of soil or earth  $\bigcirc$  stony ground **3**. an area of land  $\bigcirc$  a stretch of open ground before you reach the trees

ground clearance *noun* the removal of trees and undergrowth in preparation for an activity such as ploughing or building

**ground cover** *noun* plants that grow densely close to the ground, either in natural conditions or planted to prevent soil erosion or the spread of weeds

**ground-level concentration** *noun* the amount of a pollutant measured at the height of the ground, just above it or just below it

ground-nesting adjective (of birds) building nests on the ground

**ground pollution** *noun* the presence of unusually high concentrations of harmful substances in the soil

**ground source heat pump** *noun* a heat pump used to extract heat from the ground at several metres deep and transfer it to a building where heat is required

ground water noun water that stays in the top layers of soil or in porous rocks and can collect pollution. Compare surface water

**groundwater recharge** *noun* the process by which water from above the surface is added to the saturated zone of an aquifer, either directly or indirectly

**group** *noun* a number of individual items or people brought together ■ *verb* to bring several things together

grove noun a small group of trees

**grow** verb 1. (of plants) to exist and develop well  $\bigcirc$  Bananas grow only in warm humid conditions. 2. **Gulf Stream** noun a current of warm water in the Atlantic Ocean, which flows north along the east coast of the USA, then crosses the Atlantic to northern Europe, passing close to the west coast of Scotland and giving the British Isles and European coast a mild winter climate compared with countries at the same latitude such as eastern Canada

**gulfweed** *noun* floating seaweed that grows in the Sargasso Sea

**gull** *noun* a seabird, with a large body, usually white or grey feathers, a hooked beak and webbed feet. There are several different species.

**gully** *noun* **1**. a deep channel formed by soil erosion and unable to be filled in by cultivation **2**. a small channel for water, e.g. an artificial channel dug at the edge of a field or a natural channel in rock

**gully cleaning** *noun* the clearance of rubbish from drainage gullies at the edge of roads

**habitat restoration** *noun* activity carried out to return an area to a former more favourable condition for wildlife

**haematite** noun iron oxide, the most common form of iron ore. Formula: Fe<sub>2</sub>O<sub>3</sub>. **hail** noun water falling from clouds in the form of small round pieces of ice  $\blacksquare$  verb to fall as small pieces of ice

**hailstone** *noun* a piece of ice which falls from clouds like rain

**hailstorm** *noun* a storm in which the precipitation is hail and not rain **hair** noun **1**. a slender outgrowth on the surface of a plant or animal **2**. a mass of outgrowths on an animal's skin or a person's head or body

**half-hardy** *adjective* referring to a plant that is able to tolerate cold weather down to about  $5C. \ b$  hardy

half-life, half-life period noun 1. the time taken for half the atoms in a radioactive isotope to decay. Also called half-value period 2. the time required for an organism to eliminate naturally half the amount of a substance that has entered its body

halo- prefix salt

halobiotic *adjective* referring to organisms which live in salt water

**halocarbon** *noun* a chemical consisting of carbon, sometimes hydrogen, and a halogen such as chlorine, fluorine, bromine or iodine. Also called **halogenated carbon** 

**halocline** *noun* a salinity gradient where two masses of water such as fresh water and the sea meet

halogen noun a non-metallic element belonging to a series of chemically related non-metallic elements that includes fluorine, chlorine, iodine, bromine and astatine halogenated adjective referring to a chemical compound that contains one of the halogens

halogenated carbon noun same as halocarbon

**halogen lamp** *noun* a light bulb containing a halogen that runs at a much higher temperature than a conventional incandescent lamp

halogenous *adjective* referring to or containing a halogen

halomorphic soil noun soil that contains large amounts of salt

**halon** *noun* a chemical compound that contains bromine and resembles a chlorofluorocarbon

**halophile** *noun* a species that can live in salty conditions

**halophyte** *noun* a plant that is able to grow in salty soil, as in estuaries

**hands-on** *adjective* referring to being actively involved in something  $\bigcirc$  *hands-on experience* 

**hanging valley** *noun* a valley high above the side of another valley, formed when the main valley was cut deeper by a larger glacier, leaving the smaller valley to join it at a cliff (NOTE: This is one of the ways in which waterfalls are formed.)

HAP abbr Habitat Action Plan

**hard** *adjective* (*of water*) containing calcium and magnesium in solution

**harden** verb to make something hard, or become hard  $\Box$  **to harden off** to make plants become gradually more used to cold  $\bigcirc$  After seedlings have been grown in the greenhouse, they need to be hardened off before planting outside in the open ground.

**hardness** *noun* **1**. an indication of the percentage of calcium in water **2**. a measurement of how hard a mineral is

hardpan noun a hard soil surface, usually formed of dried clay

**hardwood** *noun* **1.** a slow-growing broad-leaved tree, e.g. oak, teak or mahogany **2.** the fine-grained, dense wood produced by a tree such as oak, teak or mahogany. Compare **softwood** 

**hardy** *adjective* referring to a plant able to tolerate cold weather, especially below 5  $^{\circ}$ C.  $\Diamond$  **half-hardy** 

**harmattan** *noun* a hot dry winter wind that blows from the northeast and causes dust storms in the Sahara

**harness** verb to control a natural phenomenon and make it produce energy  $\bigcirc A$  *tidal power station harnesses the power of the tides.* 

**harvest** noun **1**. the time when a crop is gathered **2**. a crop that is gathered **\blacksquare** verb **1**. to gather a crop that is ripe  $\bigcirc$  They are harvesting the rice crop. **2**. to gather a natural resource

hatch verb (of an animal) to break out of an egg

**hatchery** *noun* a place where eggs are kept warm artificially until the animal inside becomes mature enough to break out

**hay** *noun* grass mowed and dried before it has flowered, used for feeding animals

hay fever noun same as pollinosis

haymaking noun the cutting of grass in fields to make hay

**hazard** noun something with the potential to cause injury, damage or loss  $\bigcirc$  a fire hazard  $\bigcirc$  a health hazard  $\bigcirc$  Thunderclouds may pose hazards to aircraft. Compare **risk** 

**hazard assessment** *noun* a formal assessment of the potential of something to harm humans or the environment

**hazardous** *adjective* referring to the danger that something might present  $\bigcirc$  *hazardous chemicals*  $\bigcirc$  *Climbing mountains can be hazardous.* 

**hazardous substance** *noun* a substance that is toxic, persistent and likely to accumulate in organisms

**hazardous waste** *noun* a by-product of manufacturing processes or nuclear processing that is toxic and can damage people's health or the environment if not treated correctly

**hazard profile** *noun* data on the physical and chemical characteristics, toxicity, bioaccumulation, persistence and mobility in environmental media and other properties of a chemical, used together with information on exposure to assess risk

**haze** noun dust or smoke in the atmosphere  $\bigcirc$  Haze can seriously reduce air-toground visibility.

HD polythene noun same as high-density polythene

**head** noun **1**. a point where a river starts to flow **2**. pressure shown as the vertical distance that water falls from the inlet of the collection pipe to the water turbine in a hydroelectric power system **3**. pressure shown as the vertical distance of a water tank above the taps in a house  $\blacksquare$  verb **1**. to be in charge of an organisation or group of people **2**. to move or move something in a particular direction

**headwaters** *plural noun* the area in which tributary streams feed into a river near the river's source

**Health and Safety at Work Act** *noun* an Act of Parliament which indicates how the health of workers should be protected by the companies they work for

**Health and Safety Executive** *noun* a UK government organisation responsible for checking people's working environment. Abbr **HSE**

**health assessment** *noun* an assessment of the dangers to the health of the population involved in a contaminated area

**health food** *noun* a food that is regarded as contributing to good health, especially one with no artificial additives (NOTE: Health foods include natural cereals, dried fruit and nuts.)

**health hazard** *noun* something that is likely to harm someone's health

**health risk assessment** *noun* a prediction of the potential health effects of being exposed to hazardous substances

**healthy** *adjective* **1**. not ill, or not showing signs of diseases or disorders **2**. likely to keep or make you well  $\bigcirc$  *a healthy diet* 

**heart** *noun* the compact central part of a vegetable such as lettuce, cabbage or celery, where new leaves or stalks form

**heartwood** *noun* the hard dead wood in the centre of a tree trunk which helps support the tree. Compare **sapwood**. Also called **duramen** 

**heat** noun **1**. energy that is moving from a source to another point  $\bigcirc$  *The heat of the* Sun made the surface of the road melt. **2**. the period when a female animal will allow mating  $\square$  **an animal on heat** a female animal in the period when she will accept a mate  $\blacksquare$  verb to make something hot  $\bigcirc$  *The* solution should be heated to 25 °C.

**heat accumulator** *noun* a vessel for storing hot liquid, allowing even heat distribution or distribution over a period of time. Also called **thermal accumulator**

**hedgelaying** *noun* a traditional method of cultivating hedges, where tall saplings are cut through halfway and then bent over so that they lie horizontally and make a thick barrier

**hedgerow** *noun* a line of bushes forming a hedge

hedging noun the skill of cultivating hedges

**heliophyte** *noun* a plant that is adapted to grow in strong light

**heliotropic** *adjective* referring to a plant that grows or turns towards a light source

**helium** noun a light inert gas, used in balloons and as a coolant in some types of nuclear reactor (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **He**; the atomic number is **2** and the atomic weight is **4.00**.)

**helophyte** noun a plant that typically grows in marshy or lake-edge environments

**hemisphere** noun **1**. one half of a sphere **2**. one half of the Earth north or south of the equator  $\bigcirc$  *the northern hemisphere* 

**hemlock** *noun* **1**. a North American softwood tree. Genus: *Tsuga*. **2**. a poisonous plant. Latin name: *Conium maculatum*.

**herdsman** *noun* someone who looks after a herd of animals

**hereditary** *adjective* referring to a genetically controlled characteristic that is passed from parent to offspring

**hereditary factor** *noun* a genetically controlled characteristic that is passed from parent to offspring

**heredity** *noun* the transfer of genetically controlled characteristics from parent to offspring

heritable adjective able to be passed from parent to offspring

**heritage** *noun* the environment, including the countryside, biodiversity of species, and historic buildings and sites, seen as something to be passed on in good condition to future generations **heritage coast** *noun* an area of coastline that is protected because of its special scenic or environmental value

**hermaphrodite** *noun* an animal, plant or flower that has both male and female sexual organs

**hertz** *noun* the SI unit of frequency. Symbol **Hz** (NOTE: One hertz is equal to one cycle per second.)

hetero- prefix different. Compare homo-

**heterogeneous** *adjective* having different characteristics or qualities (NOTE: Do not confuse with **heterogenous**.)

**heterogenous** *adjective* coming from a different source (NOTE: Do not confuse with **heterogeneous**.)

**heterologous** *adjective* differing in structural features or origin

**heterophyte** *noun* **1**. a plant that grows in a wide range of habitats **2**. a plant that lacks chlorophyll and is parasitic

heterosis noun an increase in size or rate of growth, fertility or resistance to disease found in offspring of a cross between organisms with different genotypes. Also called hybrid vigour. Compare inbreeding depression

heterotroph noun an organism that requires carbon in organic form and cannot manufacture it (NOTE: Animals, fungi and some algae and bacteria are heterotrophs.) heterotrophic adjective referring to a

heterotroph  $\bigcirc$  a heterotrophic organism

**heterozygosity** *noun* the state of being heterozygous

heterozygous adjective relating to a cell or organism that has two or more variant forms (alleles) of at least one of its genes (NOTE: The offspring of such an organism may differ with regard to the characteristics determined by the gene or genes involved, depending on which version of the gene they inherit.)

hexachlorocyclohexane noun same as lindane

**hill** *noun* an area of ground higher than the surrounding areas but not as high as a mountain

**hinterland** *noun* an area of land lying behind the shore of the sea or of a river

**histochemistry** *noun* the study of the chemical constituents of cells and tissues and their function and distribution

**histology** *noun* the study of the anatomy of tissue cells and minute cellular structures, using a microscope after the cells have been stained

**hominid** *noun* any member of the family of humans, especially humans early in their history

**homologous** *adjective* having the same structural features

**homologous pair** *noun* a pair of chromosomes in a diploid organism that are structurally similar and have the same arrangement of genes, although they may carry different alleles (NOTE: One member of each pair is inherited from each parent.)

**homosphere** *noun* the zone of the Earth's atmosphere, including the troposphere, the stratosphere and the mesosphere, where the composition of the atmosphere remains relatively constant

homozygosity noun the state of being homozygous

**homozygous** *adjective* relating to a cell or organism that has two identical forms (alleles) of a gene **honeypot site** *noun* a place that attracts large numbers of visitors because of its reputation or position

**hookworm** *noun* a parasitic worm in the intestine which holds onto the wall of the intestine with its teeth and lives on the blood and protein of the carrier

**horizon** *noun* **1**. the line where the sky and the ground appear to join **2**. a layer of soil which is of a different colour or texture from the rest

**horizontal-axis wind turbine** *noun* a wind turbine with two or three blades attached to a central hub that drives a generator and where the main shaft is parallel with the surface of the ground  $\bigcirc$  *Horizontal-axis wind turbines are the most common form of wind turbine.*

**human geography** *noun* the study of the distribution of human populations with reference to their geographical environment

humankind noun all human beings considered as a whole

human race noun same as humankind

human settlement noun a place such as a village or city where humans live

**human timescale** *noun* the time during which humans have existed on earth, i.e. several thousand years

**humate** *noun* a salt that is derived from humus

**humid** adjective relating to air that contains moisture vapour  $\bigcirc$  Decomposition of organic matter is rapid in hot and humid conditions. **humidifier** *noun* a device for making dry air moist, especially in air conditioning or heating systems

**humidify** *noun* to make something moist **humidity** *noun* a measurement of how much water vapour is contained in the air

humification noun the breakdown of rotting organic waste to form humus

**humify** *verb* to break down rotting organic waste to form humus

COMMENT: Hydrocarbons are found in fossil fuels such as coal, oil, petroleum and natural gas. They form a large part of exhaust fumes from cars and contribute to the formation of smog. When released into the air from burning coal or oil they react in the sunlight with nitrogen dioxide to form ozone. Hydrocarbons are divided into aliphatic hydrocarbons (paraffins, acetylenes and olefins) and aromatic hydrocarbons (benzenes).

The chemical symbol is **H**; the atomic number is **1** and the atomic weight is **1.01**.)

**hydrogen carbonate** *noun* a salt of carbonic acid in which one hydrogen atom has been replaced, usually by a metal. Also called **bicarbonate** 

**hydrogen cyanide** *noun* a poisonous liquid or gas with a smell of almonds, which is found naturally in some plants such as cassava or almond nuts. Formula: HCN.

**hydrograph** *noun* a graph showing the level or flow of water in a river or lake

**hydrography** *noun* the science of measuring and charting rivers, lakes and seas

hydrological adjective referring to hydrology

**hydrology** *noun* the study of water, its composition and properties and in particular the place of water in the environment

**hydrometer** *noun* an instrument that measures the density of a liquid

**hydromorphic soil** *noun* waterlogged soil found in bogs and marshes

**hydrophyte** *noun* a plant that lives in water or in marshy conditions

**hydroponics** *noun* the practice of growing plants in a nutrient liquid with or without sand, vermiculite or other granular material

hydropower noun same as hydroelectric power

**hydrosere** *noun* a series of plant communities growing in water or in wet conditions.  $\Diamond$  **clisere, lithosere, xerosere** 

**hydrosphere** *noun* all the water on the Earth, in the atmosphere, the sea and on land

**hydrostatic** *adjective* referring to water that is not moving

**hydrothermal** *adjective* referring to water and heat under the Earth's crust

**hydroxide** *noun* a metallic compound containing inorganic OH- groups giving it basic properties

**hygiene** *noun* **1**. the state or practice of being clean and keeping healthy conditions **2**. the science of health

**hygienic** adjective referring to the state or practice of being clean  $\bigcirc$  hygienic conditions  $\bigcirc$  Don't touch the food with dirty hands – it isn't hygienic.

hygro- prefix wet

**hyperparasite** *noun* a parasite which is a parasite on other parasites

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**hypersensitive** *adjective* reacting more strongly than usual to a factor such as stress, an antigen, an event or a disease agent

**hypersensitivity** *noun* a condition in which an organism reacts unusually strongly to a factor such as stress, an antigen, an event or a disease agent

**hypothesis** *noun* a suggestion that something may account for observed facts, though without proof, used as a basis for reasoning (NOTE: The plural is **hypotheses**.)

**hypotonic** *adjective* referring to a solution with lower osmotic pressure than that of another solution to which it is compared **hypoxia** *noun* the depletion of oxygen in water caused by too great a supply of nutrients stimulating the growth of algae which use large amounts of oxygen as they decompose

ice noun frozen water

COMMENT: Ice is formed when water freezes at 0°C. Ice is less dense than water and so floats. Because the ice in the polar ice caps is very thick and has been formed over many thousands of years, scientists are able to discover information about the climate over a very long period of time by examining core samples obtained by drilling into the ice.

International Commission on Radiological Protection *noun* a group of scientists who try to decide on worldwide safety standards for the nuclear industry by fixing a maximum allowable dose of radiation. Abbr ICRP

International Council of Chemical Associations noun a group of trade associations representing chemical manufacturers worldwide

**International Whaling Commission** *noun* an international body set up under an agreement signed in 1946 to control the commercial killing of whales

**internode** *noun* the part of a plant stem between two adjacent nodes

**interpretation** *noun* an explanation of the meaning or importance of something

**intersexual selection** *noun* the selection of a mate where an individual looks for special traits in the opposite sex

interspecific adjective involving two or more species

interspecific competition noun the competition between species for one or more of the same limited resources of food, sunlight, water, soil, nutrients or space. fundamental niche

**intertidal** adjective relating to land that is covered by the sea at high tide and exposed at low tide  $\bigcirc$  *intertidal communities* Also called **littoral**

COMMENT: The uppermost layer of Earth's atmosphere is where most of the atoms are ionised. Some 350 km above sea level, the ionosphere has high temperatures because high-energy solar photons are captured there, including those in X-ray wavelengths. This prevents radiation which would otherwise be fatal to human

and other life from reaching sea level, so that without the ionosphere any life on Earth would have evolved very differently. The ionosphere is also useful for communications and radar, since it is possible to bounce radio signals off it for transmission beyond the visible horizon.

At the surface, the irrigated water rapidly evaporates, leaving the salts behind as a saline crust. Irrigation can also increase the spread of disease. Water insects are easily spread through irrigation canals and reservoirs.

**land use** noun the way in which land is used for different purposes such as farming or recreation  $\bigcirc a$  survey of current land use **lapse** noun a short period of time which separates two events

**lapse rate** *noun* the rate at which temperature changes according to altitude

**larch** noun a deciduous European softwood tree that has cones. It is fast-growing and used as a timber crop. Genus: *Larix*.

large-scale adjective big in size or extensive in scope. Compare small-scale **larva** *noun* the form of an insect or other animal in the stage of development after the egg has hatched but before the animal becomes adult (NOTE: The plural is **larvae**.)

**larval** adjective referring to larvae  $\bigcirc$  the larval stage

latent adjective present but not yet developed

**lateral** adjective referring to the side  $\bigcirc$  lateral buds  $\bigcirc$  Drift is lateral movement caused by wind.

**laterisation**, **laterization** *noun* the process of weathering tropical soil into hard laterite

**laterise**, **laterize** *verb* to weather tropical soil into hard laterite

**laterite** *noun* a hard rock-like clay found in the tropics, formed when latosol dries out (NOTE: When tropical rainforests are cleared, the soil beneath rapidly turns to laterite as nutrients are leached out by rain and the land cannot be cultivated.)

**lateritic** *adjective* referring to soil that contains laterite

**late successional plant** *noun* a plant that grows slowly to a large size, tolerates shade and is competitive towards other plants, e.g. a hardwood tree (NOTE: Such trees form a **climax community**.)

**latex** *noun* a white fluid from a plant such as poppy, dandelion or rubber tree

**latitude** noun an angular distance north or south of the Earth's equator, measured in degrees, minutes and seconds, along a meridian  $\bigcirc$  Parallels of latitude are imaginary circles on the surface of the Earth, their planes being parallel to the plane of the equator.  $\square$  at a latitude of 46°N at a position on the Earth's surface which is 46 degrees north of the equator

**latosol** noun a type of reddish soft soil found in tropical areas that is characterised by deep weathering and hydrous oxide material

**launch** noun the start of a planned activity  $\bigcirc$  the launch of their public awareness campaign  $\blacksquare$  verb to begin a planned activity, especially by announcing it publicly  $\bigcirc$ to launch a new research initiative

**lava** *noun* molten rock and minerals which flow from an erupting volcano and solidify into various types of igneous rock

**law** noun **1**. a rule or set of rules by which a country is governed □ **under British**, **French**, etc., **law** according to British, French, etc., law **2**. a basic principle of science or mathematics **lawrencium** noun a chemical element (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Lr**; the atomic number is **103** and the atomic weight is **256**.)

**layer** noun **1**. a flat area of a substance under or over another area (NOTE: In geological formations, layers of rock are called **strata**; layers of soil are called **horizons**.) **2**. a stem of a plant which has made roots where it touches the soil  $\blacksquare$  *verb* to propagate a plant by bending a stem down until it touches the soil and letting it form roots there

LD<sub>50</sub> abbr lethal dose 50%

**leach** verb to be washed out of the soil by water  $\bigcirc$  Excess chemical fertilisers on the surface of the soil leach into rivers and cause pollution.  $\bigcirc$  Nitrates have leached into ground water and contaminated the water supply.

**leachate** *noun* **1.** a substance which is washed out of the soil **2.** a liquid which forms at the bottom of a landfill site

**leaching** *noun* the process by which a substance is washed out of the soil by water passing through it

**lead**<sup>1</sup> *noun* a very heavy soft metallic element (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Pb**; the atomic number is **82** and the atomic weight is **207.20**.)

**lead**<sup>2</sup> noun an electrical wire or narrow cable  $\bigcirc$  A lead connects the monitor to the computer.

**lead-acid battery**, **lead-acid accumulator** *noun* a type of battery consisting of lead and lead-oxide plates, surrounded by a sulfuric acid electrolyte

**leaded petrol** *noun* petrol to which a fuel additive such as tetraethyl lead has been added to prevent knocking

**lead-free** *adjective* referring to something such as paint or fuel which has no lead in it  $\bigcirc$  *lead-free petrol*  $\bigcirc$  *Lead-free fuel is used in most modern piston engines.* 

**lead poisoning** *noun* poisoning caused by taking in lead salts

**lead replacement petrol** *noun* a leadfree petrol for compulsory use in vehicles that were designed to be used with leaded petrol, introduced as a way of improving air quality and protecting the environment

**leaf** *noun* a structure growing from a plant stem, with a stalk and a flat blade. It is usually green and carries out photosynthesis. (NOTE: A leaf stalk is called a **petiole**, and a leaf blade is called a **lamina**.) **LEAF** *noun* an independent organisation that promotes better understanding of farming by the public and helps farmers improve the environment by combining the best traditional farming methods with modern technology. Full form **Linking Environment and Farming** 

**leaf cutting** *noun* a piece of a leaf, root or stem cut from a living plant and put in soil where it will sprout

**leaf litter** *noun* dead leaves lying on the floor of a forest. Also called **litter** 

**leaf mould** *noun* a soft fibrous material formed of decomposed leaves

**leak** noun an escape of liquid or gas from a sealed container  $\bigcirc a$  gas leak  $\blacksquare$  verb (of liquid or gas) to escape from a sealed container  $\bigcirc$  Fuel may leak from a fuel tank if the drain plug is not seated correctly.

**leakage** noun the process of a gas or liquid leaking out of a container  $\bigcirc$  Any internal or external leakage of fuel will cause a reduction in the operating period.

**leak rate** *noun* the speed at which a liquid or gas escapes from a sealed container

**lean-burn engine** *noun* a type of internal combustion engine adapted to use less fuel than other engines, and so release less carbon monoxide and nitrogen oxide into the atmosphere

**LED** *abbr* light-emitting diode

**lee** noun the side of something which is protected from the wind  $\bigcirc$  *The trees in the lee of the hill grow better than those on the windward side.*  $\square$  **on the lee side** on the side away from the wind

**leeward** *adjective* protected from the wind

**leg** *noun* a part of the body with which a person or animal walks and stands

**legionnaires' disease** *noun* a bacterial disease similar to pneumonia (NOTE: The bacteria develop in warm, moist areas such as air-conditioning systems and are transmitted through droplets of moisture in the air, often affecting many people at once.)

**legislation** *noun* the laws by which a country is governed

**legislative body** *noun* a group of people who make laws for a country

**legume** *noun* a member of the plant family that produces seeds in pods, e.g. peas and beans. Family: Leguminosae.

COMMENT: There are many species of legume, including trees, and some are particularly valuable because they have root nodules that contain nitrogen-fixing bacteria. Such legumes have special value in maintaining soil fertility and are used in crop rotation. Peas, beans, clover and vetch are all legumes.

**Leguminosae** *noun* a family of plants including peas and beans, that produce seeds in pods

leguminous adjective referring to a legume

leguminous plant noun a plant that is a legume

**leisure** *noun* free time that can be used for relaxation, entertainment or sport

**leisure centre** *noun* a place that provides equipment and resources for activities such as swimming or sport

**leisure facilities** *plural noun* equipment and resources such as sports centres, swimming pools, parks or cinemas which can be used during free time

**leisure visitor** noun someone who visits a place for pleasure  $\bigcirc$  The number of leisure visitors to the area has increased.

**lek** *noun* a small territory established by a male for breeding purposes

**lentic** *adjective* referring to stagnant water **Lepidoptera** *noun* an order of insects that includes butterflies and moths

**lessen** verb to make something less or to become less  $\bigcirc$  *Clean filters lessen the possibility of blockage.* 

**lethal** *adjective* causing death  $\bigcirc$  *These fumes are lethal if inhaled.* 

**lethal concentration 50** *noun* the concentration of a pollutant or effluent at which 50% of the test organisms die. Abbr LC<sub>50</sub>

**lethal dose 50%** *noun* the dose of a substance which will kill half the organisms which absorb it. Abbr LD<sub>50</sub>

LEV abbr low-emission vehicle

**levee** noun (in the USA) an embankment built up along the bank of a river to prevent flooding

**level** adjective having a flat, smooth surface  $\blacksquare$  noun a relative amount, intensity or concentration  $\bigcirc$  an unsafe level of contamination  $\bigcirc$  reduced noise levels  $\blacksquare$  verb 1. to make something become flat  $\bigcirc$  levelling the ground 2. to knock down and destroy something  $\bigcirc$  The developers levelled the derelict buildings.

**ley** *noun* a field in which crops are grown in rotation with periods when the field is sown with grass for pasture (NOTE: Leys are an essential part of organic farming.)

LH2 abbr liquid hydrogen

Li symbol lithium

**liana** *noun* a climbing plant found in tropical rainforests **lias** *noun* a type of rock formation consisting of shale and limestone

#### lice plural of louse

**lichen** *noun* a complex of two organisms growing in symbiosis, a fungus providing the outer shell and an alga or a cyanobacterium giving the organism its colour. Lichens are often found on the surface of stones or trunks of trees. (NOTE: As they are able to survive in cold or exposed conditions, they provide food for many arctic animals. Many lichens are very sensitive to pollution, especially sulfur dioxide, and act as indicators for atmospheric pollution.)

**lidar** noun a device that uses pulses of laser light to measure the distance between an aircraft and the ground, used to produce many reference points over an area of land and allow the mapping of large areas such as marshes and river networks to which access might be difficult. Full form **Light Detection and Panence**

**life form** *noun* a living thing, e.g. a plant, animal or microorganism

**life span** noun the length of time that an organism lives or a product is useful  $\bigcirc$  Some insects have a life span of only one day.

**lifestyle** *noun* the way in which a person or group of people live their daily lives, including habits, behaviour and activities

**lifestyle farmland buyer** *noun* a purchaser of farmland for leisure or investment purposes rather than as a working farmer

**life system** *noun* a part of an ecosystem which is formed of a living organism and the parts of the environment which support it

**lifetime** noun **1**. the time during which an organism is alive  $\bigcirc$  Humans consume tons of sugar in a lifetime. **2**. the approximate

time it would take for the part of an atmospheric pollutant concentration created by humans to return to its natural level assuming emissions cease  $\bigcirc$  Average lifetimes range from about a week for products such as sulfate aerosols to more than a century for CFCs and carbon dioxide. Also called **atmospheric lifetime 3.** a period of time during which a device is useful or not outdated  $\bigcirc$  This new computer has a four-year lifetime.

**life zone** *noun* a place or area in which the type and number of organisms differ slightly from neighbouring areas because of variations in environmental conditions

**light** noun 1. brightness produced by the Sun, the Moon or a lamp 2. electromagnetic radiation which can be sensed by the eyes  $\blacksquare$  adjective 1. bright because the sun is shining  $\bigcirc a$  light room  $\bigcirc At$  six o'clock in the morning it was just getting light. 2. without much weight  $\bigcirc Aluminium$  is a light metal.

**light-emitting diode** *noun* a semiconductor diode that emits light when a current is applied, used in clock and calculator displays and as an indicator. Abbr **LED** 

**lightning** *noun* a discharge of electricity between clouds and the Earth, seen as a bright flash and accompanied by the sound of thunder which is heard after a short delay

**light pollution** *noun* the effect of street or other artificial lighting which makes the sky red or orange at night, and so reduces the visibility of stars

**light water reactor** *noun* a nuclear reactor which uses ordinary water as a coolant. Abbr **LWR** 

**light wave** *noun* **1**. a visible wave of electromagnetic radiation that travels from a source of light and is capable of stimulating the retina **2**. any wave of electromagnetic radiation, including ultraviolet and infrared

**lignin** *noun* the material in plant cell walls that makes plants woody and gives them rigidity and strength

**lignite** *noun* a type of soft coal with a low carbon content

**limb** noun **1**. a leg or arm  $\Box$  **lower limbs** legs  $\Box$  **upper limbs** arms **2**. a main branch of a tree

**lime** noun **1.** calcium oxide made from burnt limestone, used to spread on soil to reduce acidity and add calcium **2.** a hardwood tree. Genus: *Tilia.* **3.** a citrus fruit tree, with green fruit similar to, but smaller than, lemons. Latin name: *Citrus aurantifo*- *lia.*  $\blacksquare$  *verb* to treat acid soil by spreading lime on it

**limestone** noun a common sedimentary rock, formed of calcium minerals and often containing fossilised shells of sea animals. It is porous in its natural state and may form large caves by being weathered by water. It is used in agriculture and building.  $\bigcirc$  carboniferous limestone

**limestone pavement** *noun* an area of outcrops of rock where the surface has been dissolved by water over millions of years into blocks, giving it the appearance of a street pavement. Some rare plants live on limestone pavements.

lime treatment noun same as liming

**limewater** *noun* a solution of calcium hydroxide in water

**liming** *noun* the spreading of lime on soil to reduce acidity and add calcium. Also called **lime treatment** 

**limit** noun a furthest point or place beyond which you cannot go  $\bigcirc$  They have set a strict limit on the amount of fish which foreign fishing boats are allowed to catch.  $\blacksquare$ verb to set a limit on something  $\bigcirc$  The government has limited the number of barrels of oil to be extracted each day.

**limiting factor** noun something that is essential for a chemical reaction to take place and which prevents the reaction or limits its rate of occurrence if it is not present  $\bigcirc$  Oxygen is a limiting factor for combustion.

**limiting factor principle** *noun* a general rule that too much or too little of any abiotic factor can limit or prevent the growth of a population

**limiting similarity** *noun* the extent of niche differentiation required for species to coexist

limn- prefix fresh water

limnetic adjective referring to deep fresh water

**limnic** *adjective* referring to deposits in fresh water

**limnology** *noun* the study of river systems and their ecology

**lindane** noun an organochlorine pesticide. It is a persistent organic pollutant and has been banned for all agricultural uses in the European Union. Formula:  $C_6H_6Cl_6$ .

**line** verb to cover the inside of a container to prevent the contents escaping  $\bigcirc$  Landfill sites may be lined with nylon to prevent leaks of dangerous liquids.

**lined landfill** *noun* a hole in the ground covered on the inside with nylon sheets to

prevent leaks of dangerous liquids from waste deposited there

**line of latitude** *noun* an imaginary line running round the Earth, linking points at an equal distance from the equator

**liner** noun material used to line something, e.g. a sheet or bag of nylon or plastic **line squall** noun a series of thunderstorms advancing in a line

**link** noun a connection between two things  $\bigcirc$  proved a link between smoking and lung cancer  $\blacksquare$  verb to be related to or associated with something  $\bigcirc$  Health is linked to diet or Health and diet are linked.

**linkage** *noun* the process of two or more genes situated close together on a chromosome being inherited together

Linnaean system noun the scientific system of naming organisms devised by the Swedish scientist Carolus Linnaeus (1707– 78). See Comment at binomial classification (NOTE: Carl von Linné is another form of his name.)

**linoleic acid** *noun* one of the two essential fatty acids which cannot be produced in the body by humans and has to be taken in from food such as vegetable oil. Formula:  $C_{18}H_{32}O_2$ .

**linolenic acid** *noun* one of the two essential fatty acids which cannot be produced in the body by humans and has to be taken in from food such as vegetable oil. Formula:  $C_{25}H_{30}O_2$ . (NOTE: Linolenic acid is also used in paints and in synthetic resin manufacture.)

**lipid** *noun* an organic compound belonging to a group of compounds that are not water-soluble and include animal fat, plant oils and waxes

**liposoluble** *adjective* referring to a substance that can be dissolved in fat

**liquefaction** *noun* the process of making a solid or gas into liquid

**liquefied natural gas** *noun* a natural gas, extracted from under ground, that is cooled and transported in containers. Abbr **LNG** 

**liquefied petroleum gas** *noun* propane or butane or a combination of both produced by refining crude petroleum oil. Abbr **LPG** (NOTE: Liquefied petroleum gas is used for domestic heating and cooking and for powering vehicles.)

**liquefy** verb to make a gas into liquid or to become liquid

**liquid** noun a substance with a consistency like water  $\bigcirc$  Water is a liquid, ice is a solid.

**liquid fertiliser** *noun* a solution of a solid fertiliser

**liquid hydrogen** *noun* an alternative fuel proposed for use in cars and aircraft. Abbr LH2

**list** *noun* a set of short pieces of information, each one given on a separate line  $\bigcirc a$ *list of endangered species* 

**listeria** *noun* a bacterium found in human and animal faeces, one species of which can cause meningitis if ingested in contaminated food. Genus: *Listeria*.

List of Chemicals of Concern noun a list of chemicals believed to be produced or used in the UK in substantial amounts which meet specific criteria for concern relating to risks to the environment and human health on the basis of information currently available. The list is drawn up by the UK Chemicals Stakeholder Forum and is intended for discussion and input.

liter noun US spelling of litre

lith- prefix stone

**lithium** noun a soft silvery metallic element, the lightest known metal, used in batteries (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Li**; the atomic number is **3** and the atomic weight is **6.94**.)

**lithosere** *noun* a succession of communities growing on rock

**lithosol** *noun* soil which forms on the surface of rock, with no clearly different layers **lithosphere** *noun* **1**. the Earth's solid surface, together with the molten interior above the core **2**. the solid surface of the Earth which lies above the asthenosphere

**lithospheric** *adjective* referring to the lithosphere

**litmus** *noun* a dye obtained from lichens which is used to make litmus paper

**litmus paper** *noun* paper treated with litmus, used in tests for acidity (NOTE: The paper becomes red when the pH falls below 7, indicating acid, and becomes blue when the pH is above 7, indicating alkaline.)

**litre** noun a measure of capacity equal to 1000 cc or 1.76 pints. Symbol I, L (NOTE: It is the volume of one kilogram of water at  $4^{\circ}$ C.)

**logger** *noun* a person whose job is to cut down trees

**logging** *noun* the commercial activity of cutting down trees

**long-day plant** *noun* a plant that flowers as the days get longer in the spring. Compare **short-day plant** 

**long-grass prairie** *noun* an area in the east of the North American prairies where mainly varieties of tall grasses grow. Also called **tall-grass prairie** 

**longitude** *noun* an angular distance on the Earth's surface, measured east or west from the prime meridian to the meridian passing through a position, expressed in degrees, minutes and seconds

COMMENT: Longitude is measured from Greenwich, just east of London, and, together with latitude, is used to indicate an exact position on the Earth's surface. Longitude is measured in degrees, minutes and seconds. The centre of London is latitude 51°30'N, longitude 0°5'W

**longline** noun a very long fishing line, which stretches for miles and is baited with many hooks (NOTE: Longlines are a problem in that they catch all types of fish, some of which are not of commercial interest, and even dolphins)

**long-lived** *adjective* referring to an animal or plant that lives for a long time **long-range** *adjective* referring to a weather forecast that covers a period more than five days ahead

**longshore** *adjective* referring to a current which flows along the length of a shore

**long-term** adjective lasting for a long time  $\bigcirc$  the long-term effects of grazing

#### long ton noun same as ton 1

**looping** *noun* a situation in which a column of smoke from a tall chimney is brought down to ground level by air currents and then rises again

**loss** noun the state of not having something any more, or of having less of something  $\bigcirc$  loss of control  $\bigcirc$  the loss of natural habitats  $\bigcirc$  loss of amenity value  $\bigcirc$  hearing loss from noisy working conditions

**lotic** *adjective* referring to ecological communities that live in water that flows quickly

**Lotka-Volterra predator-prey model** *noun* a simple mathematical model representing the interaction between predators and their prey

lough noun (in Ireland) a lake

**louse** *noun* a small wingless insect that sucks blood and lives on the skin as a parasite on animals and humans. There are several types, the commonest being body louse, crab louse and head louse. Some diseases can be transmitted by lice. Genus: *Pediculus*. (NOTE: The plural is **lice**.)

**low** *adjective* near the bottom or towards the bottom  $\blacksquare$  *noun* same as **depression 1**  $\bigcirc$  *A series of lows are crossing the North Atlantic towards Ireland.*

**lowland** noun an area of low-lying land as opposed to hills and mountains or high-lands

**low-level radioactive waste, lowlevel waste** *noun* waste which is only slightly radioactive and does not cause problems for disposal

**low production volume chemical** *noun* a chemical of which 10–1000 tonnes is sold per year per manufacturer or importer

**lucerne** noun a perennial, drought-resistant, leguminous plant that is rich in protein. It is mainly used either for green feed for animals or for hay or silage. Latin name: *Medicago sativa*. (NOTE: The US name is alfalfa.)

**lumber** noun (in the USA and Canada) trees which have been cut down

**lumberjack** noun (in the USA and Canada) a person whose job is to cut down trees

lunar adjective referring to the moon

**lunar eclipse** *noun* a situation when the Earth passes between the Sun and the Moon causing the shadow of the Earth to fall across the Moon, so cutting off its light. Compare **solar eclipse** 

**lunar phase** *noun* a change in the appearance of the Moon as it moves from new to full and back again every 29 days (NOTE: The phases are: new moon, first quarter, full moon and last quarter.)

**lung** *noun* the organ of respiration of vertebrates that breathe air

**lush** *adjective* referring to vegetation which is thick and green  $\bigcirc$  *Lush tropical vegetation rapidly covered the clearing.* 

**lux** *noun* an SI unit of brightness of light shining on a surface. Symbol **lx** 

LWR abbr light water reactor

**lyophilise** *verb* to preserve food by freezing it rapidly and drying in a vacuum

**lysimeter** *noun* a device used for measuring the rate of drainage of water through soil and the soluble particles removed in the process

**lysis** *noun* the destruction of a cell by disrupting its outer membrane, allowing the cell contents to escape

**mackerel sky** *noun* a pattern of wavy cirrocumulus or altocumulus cloud with holes which looks like the body markings of mackerel fish

**macrobenthos** *noun* plants or animals living at the bottom of a lake or the sea whose shortest dimension is equal to or more than 0.5 mm

**macrobiotic** *adjective* referring to a vegetarian diet without artificial additives or preservatives  $\bigcirc$  *a macrobiotic diet* 

**macrobiotics** *noun* a dietary system based on vegetarian foods without artificial additives or preservatives, especially organically grown whole grains, fruit and vegetables

macroclimate *noun* the climate over a large area such as a region or country. ¢ mesoclimate, microclimate

**macronutrient** *noun* a nutrient that an organism uses in very large quantities, e.g. oxygen, carbon, hydrogen, nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, calcium, magnesium and iron

**macroparasite** *noun* a parasite which lives on or inside the body of the host but does not multiply, e.g. a worm or insect larva

**macrophyte** *noun* a plant that is large enough to be studied without the aid of a microscope

**macroplankton** *plural noun* plankton of about 1 mm in length

**macroscopic** *adjective* referring to an object or organism that can be seen without the aid of a microscope

mad cow disease same as BSE (informal)

**magma** *noun* a molten substance in the Earth's mantle, which escapes as lava during volcanic eruptions and solidifies to form igneous rocks

magmatic adjective referring to magma

**magnesium** noun a light, silvery-white metallic element that burns with a brilliant white flame (NOTE: It is also found in green vegetables and is essential especially for the correct functioning of human muscles. The chemical symbol is **Mg**; the atomic number is **12** and the atomic weight is **24.31**.)

**magnet** *noun* an object that produces a magnetic field and attracts iron and steel

**magnetic** *adjective* referring to a magnet or a magnetic field

**magnetic field** noun an area round an object that is under the influence of its magnetic effect  $\bigcirc$  The Earth's magnetic field is concentrated round the two magnetic poles. **magnetic pole** noun one of the two poles of the Earth, near to but not identical with the geographical poles, which are the centres of the Earth's magnetic field and to which a compass points. Also called **geomagnetic pole** 

**magnetosphere** noun a region surrounding the Earth, extending from about 500 to several thousand kilometres above the surface, in which charged particles are controlled by the Earth's magnetic field

**magnification** noun a measure of increase in size, especially in the apparent size of an image seen through a microscope **magnox power station** noun a nuclear power station with a magnox reactor

COMMENT: The first magnox power station was built in the UK in 1956. The safety record has been very good, but magnox power stations are at the end of their commercial life and decommissioning began in 1990.

**mahogany** *noun* a tropical hardwood tree producing a dark timber, now becoming rare. Genus: especially: *Swietenia*.

**mains** noun a system of pipes or cables which bring gas, water or electricity to a house  $\bigcirc$  mains gas  $\bigcirc$  mains electricity

**maintain** verb to keep something at the same level or standard

**maintenance** *noun* the action of keeping something at the same level or standard

**maize** *noun* a tall cereal crop grown in warm climates, that carries its grains on a

*mays.* (NOTE: The US term is **corn**.) **make up water** *noun* the water introduced into an irrigation or sewage system to replace water lost by leaking or evaporation

**malaria** *noun* a tropical disease caused by the parasite *Plasmodium* which enters the body after a bite from a mosquito

malarial adjective referring to malaria

malarious *adjective* referring to a region where malaria occurs frequently

**malathion** *noun* an organophosphorus insecticide used to kill aphids, mainly on flowers grown in glasshouses

**male** *adjective* **1**. referring to an animal that produces sperm **2**. referring to a flower that produces pollen, or a plant that produces such flowers  $\blacksquare$  *noun* a male animal or plant

**malignant melanoma** noun a dark cancerous tumour that develops on the skin from a mole, caused by exposure to strong sunlight  $\bigcirc$  *Cases of malignant melanoma could rise by between 5 and 7 per cent for each percentage decrease in ozone in the atmosphere.* 

**malnutrition** *noun* **1**. the effect of an inadequate or unhealthy diet **2**. the state of not having enough to eat

**mammal** *noun* an animal that gives birth to live young, secretes milk to feed them, keeps a constant body temperature and is covered with hair. Class: Mammalia.

**man** noun **1**. an adult male human being **2**. all human beings considered in contrast to other animals ○ Man is the only species to have made a global impact on the environment. ◊ humankind (NOTE: This use of 'man' is now regarded as inappropriate in many non-technical contexts.)

**manage** verb 1. to organise something or control the way in which something happens  $\bigcirc$  The department is in charge of managing land resources. 2. to succeed in doing something  $\bigcirc$  We managed to prevent further damage occurring.

**managed forest, managed woodland** *noun* a wood or a forest producing commercial timber that is controlled by cutting down, coppicing or planting trees

**management** *noun* **1**. the organised use of resources or materials **2**. the people who control an organisation or business

**manager** *noun* a person who is in charge of an organisation or part of one

Man and the Biosphere Programme noun a programme of research and training organised by UNESCO to encourage the sensible use and conservation of the biosphere's resources and to improve relationships between people and their environment. Abbr MAB

**mandible** *noun* a biting mouthpart in insects and other invertebrates

manganese noun a metallic trace element. It is essential for biological life and is also used in making steel. (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Mn**; the atomic number is **25** and the atomic weight is **54.94**.)

**mangrove** *noun* a salt-tolerant tropical shrub or tree that grows in areas such as river estuaries or tidal marshes that are covered by the sea at high tide

**mangrove forest** *noun* a group of salttolerant tropical trees and shrubs growing in an area that is covered by the sea at high tide

**mangrove swamp** *noun* an area that is covered by the sea at high tide where mangroves grow

**manhole** noun a hole in a roadway or pavement leading to a shaft down which an inspector can go to look at the sewers

**man-made** adjective referring to an object made or an event caused by human beings

**mantle** *noun* a layer of the interior of the Earth, between the solid crust and the core, formed of magma

**manual** *noun* a document or book containing instructions for doing something, especially carrying out a procedure or operating a machine **adjective** carried out by someone without the help of a machine

**manufacture** verb 1. to make a product using machines 2. to produce a chemical naturally  $\bigcirc$  *Ozone is constantly being manufactured and destroyed by natural processes in the atmosphere.* 

**manufacturer** *noun* a person or company that produces machine-made products  $\bigcirc$  *The company is a large manufacturer of farm machinery.* 

manufacturing *noun* the production of machine-made products for sale

manure noun animal dung used as fertiliser (NOTE: In liquid form it is called 'slurry'.) ■ verb to spread animal dung on land as fertiliser

**map** *noun* **1**. a drawing that shows the location of geographical and urban features **2**. a diagram showing the position of something such as stars in the sky or genes on

chromosomes ■ *verb* to make a map of a place or area

MAP abbr Mediterranean Action Plan

**maple** *noun* a hardwood tree of northern temperate regions, some varieties of which produce sweet sap which is used for making sugar and syrup. Genus: *Acer*.

**MAPPS model** *noun* a global biological and geographical model that simulates the potential natural vegetation that will grow at any site in the world. Full form **mapped atmosphere–plant–soil model** 

**maquis** *noun* in the Mediterranean area, shrubby vegetation, taller than garrigue, of evergreen shrubs and small trees with thick or spiny leaves

**marble** *noun* a form of limestone that has been metamorphosed, used especially in building and sculpture as it can be polished to give a flat shiny surface

**margin** noun **1**. the edge of a place or thing  $\bigcirc$  the eastern margin of the continent  $\bigcirc$  unploughed strips at the margins of the fields  $\bigcirc$  a leaf margin **2**. an amount by which an amount or estimate may be different from the one expected without it causing a problem. Also called **margin of error 3**. a blank space around a section of printed text

**marine biocoenosis** *noun* a varied community of organisms living in the sea

marine biology noun the scientific study of sea life

marine disposal noun the depositing of waste at sea

**marine ecology** *noun* the study of the relationship between organisms that live in the sea and their environment

**marine environment** *noun* the areas of the world usually covered by or containing sea water, including seas and oceans, river estuaries, and coasts and beaches

**marine fauna** *noun* the animals that live in the sea

marine flora noun the plants that live in the sea

marine habitat noun an area of sea coast, including features such as beaches, cliffs, salt marshes, dunes or mangrove swamps

**marine park** *noun* a natural park created on the bottom of the sea where visitors can go into observation chambers to look at the fish and plant life. Compare **oceanarium** 

**marine pollution** *noun* the harmful effects of human activities such as disposal of waste into the sea on marine organisms and their environment, with resulting hazards to human food and health

**maritime climate** *noun* a climate that is modified by the influence of the sea, giving mild winters and warm summers, but with high rainfall

**marked** *adjective* clear and definite  $\bigcirc$  *marked* changes in climatic conditions

marker noun same as genetic marker

**market garden** *noun* a place for the commercial cultivation of plants, usually vegetables, soft fruit, salad crops and flowers, found near a large urban centre which provides a steady outlet for the sale of its produce

**marl** *noun* a fine soil formed of a mixture of clay and lime, used for making bricks

**MARPOL Convention** *noun* the main international agreement for the prevention of pollution of the sea by ships, either accidentally or deliberately. Full form **Conven**tion for the Prevention of Pollution from Ships

**marram grass** *noun* a type of grass planted on sand dunes to prevent them being spread by the wind. Latin name: *Ammophila arenaria*.

**MARS** *noun* a computer network used by member countries of the EU and OECD for reporting and exchanging information on serious industrial accidents in a standard format. Full form **Major Accident Reporting System** 

**marsh** noun an area of permanently wet land and the plants that grow on it (NOTE: Marshes may be fresh water or salt water and tidal or non-tidal. A marsh usually has a soil base, as opposed to a bog or fen, which is composed of peat.)

#### marsh gas noun same as methane

marshland noun land that is covered with marsh

marshy adjective referring to land that is permanently wet

marsupial noun a mammal with a pouch in which its young are carried, e.g. Australian kangaroos and wallabies or South American opossums (NOTE: Marsupials give birth to young at a much earlier stage of development than other mammals so that the young need to be protected in the mother's pouch for some months until they become able to look after themselves.)

**mass** *noun* **1**. a body of matter **2**. a large quantity or large number

**mass extinction** noun the disappearance of numerous species in a short period by a force of nature such as climate change or a volcanic eruption  $\bigcirc$  It has been suggested that the mass extinction of the dinosaurs 65 million years ago may have been caused by the impact of a comet or meteorite.

**mast** noun **1**. a vertical pole for a flag or antenna  $\bigcirc$  *Ice accretes on the leading edge of the detector mast.* **2**. the small hard fruits that have fallen from a beech tree

mate noun an animal that reproduces sexually with another ■ verb to reproduce sexually with another of same species

**matter** noun a physical substance  $\bigcirc$  organic matter

maturation *noun* the process of becoming mature or fully developed

maturation lagoon, maturation pond noun a pond used in the final stages of sewage treatment

**maturing** *adjective* referring to something that is in the process of becoming mature

maturity noun the state of being fully developed

**Mauna Loa** *noun* a volcano on the island of Hawaii where scientists have maintained the longest continuous collection of reliable daily atmospheric records

**maximise, maximize** *verb* to make something as large as possible. Opposite **minimise** 

**maximum** adjective referring to the greatest possible  $\bigcirc$  maximum effect  $\bigcirc$  The maximum capacity of the vehicle is 12. Opposite minimum

maximum allowable concentration noun the largest amount of a pollutant with which workers are allowed to be in contact in their work environment. Abbr MAC

**maximum–minimum thermometer** *noun* a thermometer that shows the highest and lowest temperatures reached since it was last checked, as well as the current temperature

**maximum permissible dose** noun the highest amount of radiation to which a person may safely be exposed

**maximum permissible level** noun the highest amount of radiation that is allowed to be present in an environment

**maximum residue level** *noun* the maximum amount of a pesticide that can remain in crops or foodstuffs under European Union regulations. Abbr **MRL** 

**MCPA** *noun* a herbicide that kills the most persistent broad-leaved weeds: nettle, buttercups, charlock, dock seedlings, plantains and thistles. Full form **2-methyl-4chlorophenoxy-acetic acid** 

MCPP abbr mecoprop

**meadow** noun a field of grass and wild plants, sometimes grown for fodder.  $\Diamond$  water meadow

mean adjective referring to an arithmetic mean ○ mean daytime temperatures ■ noun same as arithmetic mean

**meander** noun a large bend in the course of a river as it nears the sea **verb** (of a river) to follow a winding course

**mean lethal dose** *noun* the dose of a substance that will kill half the organisms which absorb it

**means** noun a way of doing something that brings a result  $\bigcirc$  Turning down the central heating temperature by one or two degrees is a means of saving energy.

**mean sea level** noun the level of the sea, measured relative to points on land, with wave movements and tide changes averaged out over a period of time  $\bigcirc$  Altitude is the vertical distance between a specific point and mean sea level. Abbr **MSL** 

**mean temperature** noun an average temperature  $\bigcirc$  The mean temperature for July in this area is 25 °C.

**meat** noun animal flesh that is eaten as food

**mechanical treatment** *noun* the processing of sewage by mechanical means such as agitating or stirring

**mechanism** noun **1**. a machine or part of a machine **2**. a method of achieving something  $\bigcirc$  a mechanism for receiving feedback from consumers

**mecoprop** noun a commonly used herbicide, mostly used to control weeds in cereal and grass crops, that is found as a contaminant of water. Abbr **MCPP**

**medicinal** *adjective* referring to a substance or plant that has healing properties

**medicinally** adverb in the treatment of disease  $\bigcirc$  *The herb can be used medicinally.* 

**medicine** *noun* **1**. a drug or preparation taken to treat a disease or condition **2**. the study of diseases and how to cure or prevent them

**Mediterranean Action Plan** *noun* an agreement to protect the environment and encourage sustainable development in the Mediterranean area established by the European Union and the countries bordering the Mediterranean Sea. Abbr **MAP** 

medium adjective middle or average ■ noun 1. a substance through which something else is transmitted or carried ○ Tubes convey the cooling medium. (NOTE: The plural is mediums or media.) 2. a substance in which an organism lives or is grown

**medulla** *noun* **1**. the soft inner part of an organ surrounded by the cortex **2**. same as **pith** 

**medullary ray** *noun* a band or sheet of connective tissue between the pith and the bark in the stems of some woody plants

mega- prefix large. Opposite micro-

**megadose** noun a large dose  $\bigcirc$  received a megadose of radiation

megalo- prefix unusually large. Opposite micro-

**megalopolis** *noun* a group of several small towns that grow to become one huge urban area

**meridian** *noun* an imaginary circle on the Earth's surface passing through the north and south geographic poles

meridional adjective referring to a meridian

**meridionality** *noun* a phenomenon of air blowing from north to south or from south to north

**meristem** *noun* a plant tissue at the tips of stems and roots in which cells are actively dividing

**mes-** *prefix* same as **meso-** (NOTE: used before vowels)

**mesa** *noun* a high plateau in the southwest of the USA, with steep sides and a flat top

**mesarch** *adjective* relating to the sequence of plant or animal communities (**sere**) that originates in a moist habitat

**mesh size** *noun* the diameter of the holes in a net (NOTE: The mesh size of fishing nets is used as a means of limiting catches.)

**mesic** *adjective* referring to an organism growing in or an environment characterised by moderate moisture

meso- prefix middle

**mesobenthos** *noun* the animals or plants living on the seabed, 250–1000m below the surface

**mesoclimate** *noun* the climate over a specific locality such as a hillside or valley, extending no more than a few kilometres in radius.  $\Diamond$  **macroclimate, microclimate** 

**mesohaline** *adjective* referring to water that contains a limited amount of salt

**mesopause** *noun* a thin cold layer of the Earth's atmosphere between the meso-sphere and the thermosphere

**mesophyll** *noun* the tissue inside a leaf where photosynthesis takes place

**mesophyte** *noun* a plant that needs a standard amount of water to survive

**mesoplankton** *plural noun* organisms that take the form of plankton for part of their life cycle

**mesosaprobic** *adjective* referring to an organism that can survive in moderately polluted water

**mesosphere** noun the zone of the Earth's atmosphere between the stratosphere and the thermosphere (NOTE: It lies 50–80km above the surface, with the stratopause at the bottom and the mesopause at the top. The air temperature falls steadily with increasing ascent through the mesosphere.)

**mesotherm** *noun* a plant that grows in warm conditions

**mesotrophic** *adjective* referring to water that contains a moderate amount of nutrients. Compare **eutrophic**, **oligotrophic**

metabolic adjective referring to metabolism

**metabolise** *verb* to break down or build up organic compounds by metabolism  $\bigcirc$ *The liver metabolises proteins and carbohydrates.* 

**metabolism** *noun* the chemical processes of breaking down or building up organic compounds in organisms

**metabolite** *noun* a chemical produced as a result of metabolism

**metal** *noun* an element or a compound that can conduct heat and electricity

**metaldehyde** *noun* a substance used in the form of pellets to kill slugs and snails

**metalimnion** *noun* the middle layer of water in a lake. Also called **thermocline**. Compare **epilimnion**, **hypolimnion** 

**metallic** adjective 1. referring to metal ○ metallic materials 2. referring to something that is like metal, especially in appearance **metamorphic** adjective referring to rock that has changed because of external influences such as pressure from other rocks or temperature changes. ◊ **igneous, sedimentary** 

**metamorphism** *noun* the process of forming metamorphic rock

**metamorphose** verb **1**. (of an animal) to change into another form **2**. (of rock) to undergo metamorphism

**metamorphosis** *noun* a process of change into a different form, especially the change of a larva into an adult insect

**metapopulation** *noun* a population belonging to a group of populations of the same species that exchange individuals through migration and recolonise sites in which other metapopulations have become extinct

**meteor** noun a solid body that enters the Earth's atmosphere from outer space, usually burning up as it does so

**meteoric** *adjective* referring to meteors **meteorite** *noun* a solid body that falls from outer space onto the Earth's surface

meteorological *adjective* referring to meteorology or to climate

**meteorologist** *noun* a person who studies, reports and forecasts the weather

**meteorology** *noun* the scientific study of weather and weather conditions  $\bigcirc$  *Terrestrial radiation plays an important part in meteorology*.

meter noun 1. a device to measure a physical property such as current, rate of flow or air speed 2. US spelling of metre ■ verb to count or measure with a meter

**methanation** *noun* the process of converting a mixture into methane. Also called **methanisation** 

**methane** noun a colourless flammable gas produced naturally from rotting organic waste, as in landfill sites or animal excreta. Formula:  $CH_4$ . (NOTE: It is also found in marshes (**marsh gas**) and coal mines (**firedamp**).)

**methane converter** *noun* a process that turns into a usable form the gas produced by rotting waste in a landfill site

**methanol** *noun* an alcohol manufactured from coal, natural gas or waste wood, which is used as a fuel or solvent. Formula: CH<sub>3</sub>OH. Also called **methyl alcohol**, wood alcohol

**methylated spirits** *noun* almost pure alcohol, with wood alcohol and colouring added

**methyl isothiocyanate** *noun* a chemical compound used in the production of soil sterilants. Abbr **MIC** 

**metre** noun an SI unit of length  $\bigcirc$  The area is four metres by three. Symbol **m** (NOTE: The US spelling is **meter**.)

**metres per second** noun a system of measuring speed  $\bigcirc$  *One metre per second is equal to 2.2 miles per hour.* Abbr **m/s** (NOTE: It is often used to measure wind speed.)

**metric system** *noun* a decimal measuring system, calculated in units of ten, e.g. the SI system

metric ton noun same as tonne

metropolis noun a very large town, usually the capital of a country

**metropolitan** adjective referring to a large town  $\bigcirc$  *Smog covered the whole metropolitan area.* 

mg abbr milligram

**mica** *noun* a silicate mineral that splits into thin transparent flakes. It is used as an insulator in electrical appliances.

micro- prefix very small. Opposite macro-, mega-, megalo-

**microbe** *noun* a microorganism (NOTE: Viruses, bacteria, protozoa and microscopic fungi are informally referred to as microbes.)

**microbenthos** *noun* plants or animals living at the bottom of a lake or the sea whose shortest dimension is equal to or more than 0.1 mm

microbial adjective referring to microbes microbial insecticide noun an insecticide based on fungal, bacterial or other microorganisms that are pathogens of insects, or their toxins, as a form of biological control, e.g. the fungus Verticillium lecanii controlling whitefly in glasshouses

microbiological adjective referring to microbiology

microbiologist noun a scientist who specialises in the study of microorganisms microbiology noun the scientific study of microorganisms

microclimate noun the climate over a very small area such as a pond, tree, field,

or even a leaf.  $\Diamond$  macroclimate, mesoclimate

microenvironment noun same as microhabitat

**microfauna** *noun* **1**. very small animals which can only be seen with a microscope **2**. the animals living in a microhabitat

**microgram** *noun* a unit of measurement of weight, equal to one millionth of a gram. Symbol µg

microhabitat *noun* a single small area such as the bark of a tree, where fauna and/or flora live. Also called **microenvi**ronment

**micro-hydro system** *noun* a small system that uses water to produce electricity

**micrometer** *noun* an instrument for taking very small measurements such as of the width or thickness of very thin pieces of tissue

**micrometre** *noun* one thousandth of a millimetre. Symbol µm

**micronutrient** *noun* a nutrient which an organism uses in very small quantities, e.g. iron, zinc or copper

**microorganism** *noun* an organism that can only be seen with a microscope. Compare **microbe** (NOTE: Viruses, bacteria, protozoa and fungi are all forms of microorganism.)

**microparasite** *noun* a parasite which multiplies inside the body of its host, e.g. a virus

**microplankton** *plural noun* plankton in the size range 20–200 µm

**micropollutant** *noun* a pollutant which occurs in very small quantities

**microscope** noun a scientific instrument which makes very small objects appear larger  $\bigcirc$  The tissue was examined under the microscope.  $\bigcirc$  Under the microscope it was possible to see the chloroplasts.

COMMENT: In a light microscope the image is magnified by lenses. In an electron microscope the lenses are electromagnets and a beam of electrons is used instead of light, thereby achieving much greater magnifications.

**microscopic** *adjective* referring to something so small that it can only be seen through a microscope

**microscopy** *noun* the science of the use of microscopes

**microtherm** *noun* a plant which grows in cool regions

mid- prefix middle

mid-latitude desert noun a desert situated between the tropics, e.g. the Gobi Desert or the Turkestan Desert. Also called warm desert

**midrib** *noun* the thick structure that runs along the middle of a leaf, providing for support and the movement of dissolved substances

**migrant** *noun* an animal or bird that moves from one place to another according to the season. Compare **nomad** 

**migrate** verb **1.** (of a bird or other animal) to move from one place to another according to the season  $\bigcirc$  As winter approaches, the herds of deer migrate south. **2.** to move to another place  $\bigcirc$  Waste materials may be allowed to migrate from landfill sites into the surrounding soil.

migration noun 1. the process of a bird or other animal moving from one place to another according to the season ○ *The islands lie along one of the main migration routes from Siberia to Australia.* (NOTE: Birds such as swallows breed in Northern Europe but fly south for the winter; fish such as salmon and eels spawn in one place, often a river, and then migrate to the sea.) 2. the process of moving from one place to another

**migratory** *adjective* moving from one place to another according to the season  $\bigcirc$  *Estuaries are important feeding grounds for migratory birds, and are also important for the passage of migratory fish such as salmon.* 

**mildew** *noun* a disease caused by a fungus which produces a fine powdery film on the surface of an organism

**mile** *noun* an imperial measurement of distance, equal to 1.609 km. Also called **statute mile** (technical)

**mileage** noun a distance measured in miles

mill noun a factory where a substance is crushed to make a powder, especially one for making flour from the dried grains of cereals ■ verb to crush a substance to make a powder

**millet** *noun* a cereal crop grown in many of the hot, dry regions of Africa and Asia, where it is a staple food. Genera: especially: *Panicum* or *Eleusine*.

**milli-** *prefix* one thousandth or  $10^{-3}$ . Symbol **m** 

millibar noun a unit of pressure equal to one thousandth of a bar or 100 Pa. Symbol mbar (NOTE: This unit is often used in meteorology to express atmospheric pressure, standard atmospheric pressure at sea level being 1013.25 millibars.) **milligauss** noun a unit of magnetic flux density  $\bigcirc$  A person living under a low-voltage power line is exposed to 20 milligauss of radiation.

**milligram** *noun* a unit of measurement of weight, equal to one thousandth of a gram. Abbr **mg** 

**millilitre** *noun* a unit of measurement of liquid equal to one thousandth of a litre. Abbr **ml** (NOTE: The US spelling is **milliliter**.)

**millimetre** *noun* a unit of measurement of length, equal to one thousandth of a metre. Abbr **mm** (NOTE: The US spelling is **millimeter**.)

**milling** *noun* **1.** the process of crushing and grinding mineral ores to separate out the useful materials **2.** the process of grinding cereal grains into flour

million tonnes of coal equivalent noun a measure of energy from a source that is not coal. Abbr MTCE

millisievert noun a unit of measurement of radiation. Abbr **mSv** 

millisievert/year noun a number of millisieverts per year

**millwheel** noun a large wheel with wooden bars that is turned by the force of water

**mimic** noun an animal which imitates another  $\bigcirc$  Starlings are excellent mimics. verb to imitate another animal  $\bigcirc$  The starling mimicked the call of the thrush.

**mimicry** *noun* a situation where one animal imitates another, often to prevent itself from being attacked

**Minamata disease** *noun* a form of mercury poisoning from eating polluted fish, first identified in Japan

mine noun a hole dug in the ground to extract a mineral ■ verb to dig into the ground to extract a mineral

**mineral** *noun* an inorganic solid substance with a characteristic chemical composition that occurs naturally (NOTE: The names of many minerals end with the suffix -ite.)

mineral deposit *noun* a deposit of rocks containing useful minerals

mineralisation noun the breaking down of organic waste into its inorganic chemical components

mineral nutrient noun an inorganic element other than carbon, hydrogen and oxygen that is absorbed by plants from the soil mineral oil noun US oil which derives from petroleum and is made up of hydrocarbons (NOTE: The UK term is liquid paraffin.)

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**minimal** adjective small in amount or importance  $\bigcirc$  the minimal area for sampling in which specimens of all species can be found

**minimisation** *noun* the measures or techniques that reduce something such as the amount of waste generated during industrial production processes

**minimise**, minimize verb to make something as small as possible  $\bigcirc$  We minimised costs by cutting down the number of components. Opposite maximise

**minimum** *adjective* referring to the smallest possible  $\bigcirc$  *the minimum amount required*  $\bigcirc$  *minimum requirements* 

**minimum lethal dose** *noun* the smallest amount of a substance needed to kill an organism

**minimum tillage** *noun* a method of ploughing in which disturbance of the soil does not affect the deeper layers. The benefits are conservation of organic matter, leading to a better soil structure and less soil erosion, better soil biodiversity, and the use of less energy; disadvantages include the easier germination of grass seeds. Also called **min-till**.  $\phi$  **no-till agriculture** 

**minimum viable population** *noun* the smallest population which will allow a species to continue to exist and to avoid inbreeding, usually taken to be about 300 individuals. Abbr **MVP** 

mining subsidence area noun a region in which the ground has subsided because of mines being dug

**minute** *adjective* extremely small  $\bigcirc$  *minute hairs on leaves*  $\bigcirc$  *minute traces* 

mire noun an area of land saturated with water

miscanthus *noun* a plant related to sugar cane that is grown as an ornamental plant or for use as a fuel. Also called **elephant** grass

miscarry verb same as abort 2 (technical)

mist noun 1. the visible water vapour, in the form of very fine droplets, in the atmosphere ○ an early morning mist on the fields ○ Mist is thinner than fog. 2. water vapour that has condensed on a cool surface 3. liquid in the form of a spray ○ an air/oil mist ■ verb 1. also mist up to form a mist on a cool surface ○ The windows had misted up. 2. to spray plants with small drops of water to keep them wet

**mister** *noun* a device for spraying plants with small drops of water to keep them wet

**mistral** *noun* a strong, cold wind from the north which blows down the Rhone valley into the Mediterranean

**misty** *adjective* referring to mist  $\bigcirc$  *a misty autumn morning*  $\bigcirc$  *a misty window* 

**misuse** *verb* to use something wrongly or inappropriately

**mite** *noun* a tiny animal of the spider family which may be free-living in the soil or on stored products, or parasitic on animals or plants

**miticide** *noun* a substance that kills mites **mixed** *adjective* referring to something made up of different parts or categories

**mixed cropping** *noun* the practice of growing more than one type of plant on the same piece of land at the same time. Opposite **monocropping** 

**mixed farming** *noun* the practice of combining arable and dairy farming

mixed fertiliser noun same as compound fertiliser

**mixed woodland** *noun* a wooded area where neither conifers nor broadleaved trees account for more than 75% of the total **mixture** *noun* something which is the result of mixing a number of things together **ml** *abp* millilitre

mm abbr millimetre

**MMHD** *abbr* Mountain, Moor, Heath, Down

Mn symbol manganese

Mo symbol molybdenum

**moder** *noun* humus which is partly acid mor and partly neutral mull

**Modified Mercalli scale** *noun* a scale rising from 1 to 12 used for measuring the damage caused by an earthquake

**module** *noun* a part that together with other parts makes up another structure or system

**Mohorovicic discontinuity, Moho** *noun* a boundary layer in the interior of the Earth between the crust and the mantle, below which seismic shocks move more rapidly

moist adjective damp or humid

**moist tropical forest** *noun* a tropical forest which receives less rain than other types of tropical forest such as cloud forest **moisture** neuron under or other liquid

moisture noun water or other liquid

**molar** *adjective* referring to a solution containing one mole of solute per litre  $\blacksquare$  *noun* a large back tooth

**mold** *noun, verb* US spelling of **mould mole** *noun* **1**. a small dark-grey mammal which makes tunnels under the ground and eats worms and insects **2**. a dark raised spot on the skin  $\bigcirc$  *She has a large mole on her chin.* **3**. an SI unit of measurement of the amount of a substance. Symbol **mol** 

molecular adjective referring to molecules

**molecular ecology** *noun* the study of ecological problems using the techniques of molecular biology

**molecule** *noun* the smallest particle into which a substance can be divided without changing its chemical and physical properties  $\bigcirc$  *The molecules of a gas move more quickly than the molecules of a liquid.* 

**mole drain** *noun* an underground drain formed under the surface of the soil by a special plough (**mole plough**) as it is pulled across a field (NOTE: Mole drains are usually made 3 to 4 metres apart, and are used in fields with a clay subsoil.)

**molehill** *noun* a small heap of earth pushed up to the surface by a mole as it makes its tunnel

**mollusc** *noun* an invertebrate animal with a soft body, a muscular foot on the underside used for movement and, in many species, a protective shell (NOTE: Molluscs are found on land as well as in fresh and salt water; slugs, snails and shellfish are molluscs. The US spelling is **mollusk**.)

**molluscicide** *noun* a substance used to kill molluscs such as snails

**molten** *adjective* having become liquid when heated. ◊ **melt** 

**molybdenum** *noun* a metallic trace element. It is essential to biological life and is also used in electric wiring. (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Mo**; the atomic number is **42** and the atomic weight is **95.94**.)

**monitor** noun **1**. a screen for a computer display **2**. a piece of equipment for showing information or recording a process  $\blacksquare$  verb to check or examine how something is working

**monitoring** noun a process of regular checking on the progress of something  $\bigcirc$  health monitoring  $\bigcirc$  Scientists have set up a monitoring programme to record the changes in the Sun's radiation.

**monitoring well** *noun* a well used to take water quality samples or to measure ground water levels

mono- prefix single or one. Opposite multi-

**monoclimax** *noun* a situation where one single community exists in a geographical region

**monocline** *noun* a rock formation where sedimentary rock slopes sharply on one side of a fold

**monocot** noun same as **monocotyledon** (informal)

monocotyledenous adjective referring to monocotyledons

**monocotyledon** *noun* a plant with seeds that have a single cotyledon, e.g. a grass or lily. Compare **dicotyledon**.  $\Diamond$  **cotyledon** 

monocropping, monocrop system, monoculture *noun* a system of cultivation in which a single crop plant such as wheat is grown over a large area of land often for several years. Opposite **mixed cropping** 

**monoecious** *adjective* with male and female flowers on separate plants. Compare **dioecious** 

**monogamy** *noun* a breeding arrangement where a male and female mate for life. Compare **polygamy** 

**monophagous** *adjective* referring to an organism that feeds on only one kind of food. Compare **polyphagous** 

monophagy *noun* the practice of feeding on only one kind of food. Compare **polyphagy** 

**monosodium glutamate** *noun* a substance, labelled E621, added to processed food to enhance the flavour. Abbr **MSG** (NOTE: It can cause a bad reaction in some people.)

**monotreme** *noun* a type of mammal that lays eggs but feeds its young on milk in a pouch. The only monotremes are the duckbilled platypus and the spiny anteater.

**monsoon** *noun* **1**. a season of wind and heavy rain in tropical countries **2**. a wind which blows in opposite directions according to the season, especially the wind blowing north from the Indian Ocean in the summer

**monsoon forest** *noun* a tropical rainforest in an area where rain falls during the monsoon season

**montane** *adjective* referring to a plant or animal found in mountainous regions

Montreal Protocol noun an international agreement to control the production and use of chemicals containing bromine and chlorine, such as CFCs, that damage the ozone layer in the atmosphere. It was signed in 1987 and later updated. Full form Montreal Protocol on Substances that Deplete the Ozone Layer

**Moon** *noun* a natural satellite that orbits the Earth every 27 days

**moor** noun an area of often high land that is not cultivated, and is formed of acid soil covered with grass and low shrubs such as heather

moorland noun a large area of moor

**mor** *noun* a type of humus found in coniferous forests, which is acid and contains few nutrients. Compare **mull** 

**moraine** noun a deposit of gravel and sand left by a glacier (NOTE: There are various types of moraine: ground moraine, which is a deposit left under a glacier; terminal moraine, which is the heap of soil and sand pushed by a glacier and left behind when it melts; and lateral moraines, which are deposits left at the sides of a glacier as it moves forward.)

**moratorium** noun a period when everyone agrees to stop a specific activity  $\bigcirc$  *They voted to impose a ten-year moratorium on whaling.*  $\bigcirc$  *The conference rejected a motion calling for a moratorium on nuclear reprocessing.* 

morbidity noun a state of being diseased or sick

**morbidity rate** *noun* the number of cases of a disease per 100000 of population

**morph** *noun* an organism with a characteristic shape

**morphology** *noun* the study of the structure and form of living organisms.  $\Diamond$  **geomorphology** 

**mortality** noun the occurrence of death  $\bigcirc$ The population count in spring is always lower than that in the autumn because of winter mortality.

**mortality rate** *noun* same as **death rate mosaic** *noun* a disease of plants that makes yellow patterns on the leaves and can seriously affect some crops. It is often caused by viruses.

**mosquito** *noun* an insect which sucks blood and passes viruses or parasites into the bloodstream (NOTE: The plural is **mosquitoes** or **mosquitos**.)

**mosquitocide** *noun* a substance which kills mosquitoes

**moss** noun a very small plant without roots, which grows in damp places and forms mats of vegetation  $\bigcirc$  Sphagnum is a type of moss.

**moth** *noun* an insect similar to a butterfly that is generally active at night. Order: Lepidoptera.

**mother-of-pearl** *noun* a hard shiny substance, mostly made up of calcium carbonate, which forms the inner layer of some shells such as oyster shells **mother rock** *noun* a main layer of rock. Also called **parent rock** 

**motion** *noun* the act of moving or changing position or place

**mould** *noun* **1.** a fungus, especially one that produces a fine powdery layer on the surface of an organism (NOTE: The US spelling is **mold**.) **2.** soft earth

**moult** noun an occasion of shedding feathers or hair at a specific period of the year  $\blacksquare$  verb to shed feathers or hair at a specific period of the year  $\bigcirc$  Most animals moult at the beginning of summer. (NOTE: The US spelling is **mol**.)

**mount** verb to fix something to a support  $\bigcirc$  to mount a specimen  $\blacksquare$  noun something such as a support or frame to which something else can be fixed

**Mount** *noun* a mountain. Abbr **Mt** (NOTE: used in the names of specific mountains: *Mount Everest.*)

**mouthpart** *noun* a structure close to the mouth of an insect or other arthropod used to gather or chew food

**MRL** *abbr* maximum residue level

**m/s** *abbr* metres per second

MSG abbr monosodium glutamate

MSL abbr mean sea level

mSv symbol millisievert

**MTCE** *abbr* million tonnes of coal equivalent

**mucilage** *noun* slime secreted by some organisms such as seaweeds

**mucin** *noun* a glycoprotein that is a constituent of mucus

muck noun same as manure

**mucus** *noun* **1**. a slimy solution of mucin secreted by vertebrates onto a mucous membrane to provide lubrication **2**. a slimy substance secreted by invertebrates

**mud** *noun* a thick mixture of soil and water

**muddy** *adjective* containing mud, or covered with mud  $\bigcirc$  *a muddy field*  $\bigcirc$  *muddy boots* 

**mud flat** *noun* a wide flat area of mud, usually in a river estuary

**mudslide** *noun* a large amount of mud that slips down a slope

**mulch** noun an organic material used to spread over the surface of the soil to prevent evaporation or erosion, e.g. dead leaves or straw  $\blacksquare$  verb to spread organic material over the surface of the soil to prevent evaporation or erosion

**multicellular** *adjective* referring to an organism composed of several or many cells. Compare **unicellular** 

**multicropping** *noun* the cultivation of more than one crop on the same piece of land in one year

municipal adjective referring to a town or city

**municipal dump** *noun* a place where a town's rubbish is disposed of after it has been collected

**municipality** *noun* a town, city or region that has its own local government

**municipal refuse**, municipal waste *noun* the rubbish collected from homes and businesses in a town

**municipal wastewater** *noun* effluent from wastewater treatment plants that deal with sewage from homes and businesses and excess water after storms

**mushroom** *noun* a common edible fungus, often grown commercially

**muskeg** *noun* a bog in high cold plateau regions, especially in Canada

**mutagen** *noun* an agent that causes mutation, e.g. a chemical or radiation

**mutagenic** *adjective* referring to an agent that causes mutation

**mutagenicity** *noun* the ability of an agent to make genes mutate

**mutant** adjective referring to a gene in which a mutation has occurred, or to an organism carrying such a gene  $\bigcirc$  mutant mice  $\blacksquare$  noun an organism carrying a gene in which mutation has occurred  $\bigcirc$  New mutation has occurred  $\bigcirc$  New mutation have appeared. Also called **mutation** 

**mutate** verb (of a gene or organism) to undergo a genetic change that can be inherited  $\bigcirc$  Bacteria can mutate suddenly and become increasingly able to infect.

mutation noun 1. a heritable change occurring in a gene 2. same as mutant

mutualism noun same as symbiosis

**mutualist** *noun* a species which benefits from symbiosis with another

**MVP** abbr minimum viable population **myc-** prefix same as **myco-** (NOTE: used before vowels)

**mycelium** *noun* a mass of hyphae which forms the main part of a fungus

myco- prefix fungus or fungal

mycology *noun* the study of fungi

**mycorrhiza** noun a mutual association of a fungus with the roots of a plant in which the fungus supplies the plant with water and minerals and feeds on the plant's sugars (NOTE: Many different fungi form mycorrhizas, especially with trees, and many plants such as orchids cannot grow without them.)

**mycotoxin** *noun* a toxic substance produced by a fungus growing on crops in the field or in storage. There are regulations controlling the amount of some mycotoxins such as aflatoxin and ochratoxin permitted in food.

**myiasis** *noun* an infestation of animals by the larvae of flies

**myxomatosis** *noun* a usually fatal virus disease affecting rabbits, transmitted by fleas

national grid noun same as electricity grid

National Nature Reserve noun a nationally important example of a type of habitat, established as reserve to protect the most important areas of wildlife habitat and geological formations. Abbr NNR (NOTE: There are over 200 National Nature Reserves in England, owned or controlled by English Nature or held by approved bodies such as Wildlife Trusts.)

**national park** *noun* a large area of land selected because of its scenic, recreational, scientific, or historical importance for special protection from development, and managed by a local government body for recreational use by the public and the benefit of the local community

National Radiological Protection Board *noun* an agency that monitors radiation risks to the UK population. Abbr NRPB

National Resources Institute noun a specialised research institute of the University of Greenwich, UK, working in the area of the sustainable management of natural and human resources in the developing world and elsewhere. Abbr **NRI** 

**National Rivers Authority** *noun* a former UK statutory body responsible for water management, flood defence and the regulation of water quality. Abbr **NRA** (NOTE: Now part of the Environment Agency.)

National Scenic Area *noun* a national park in Scotland

**National Trust** *noun* **1.** in England, Wales and Northern Ireland, a charitable organisation that preserves historic buildings, gardens, parks, coastline and areas of natural beauty for the benefit of the public **2.** in Australia, an organisation that preserves historic monuments and areas of natural beauty for the benefit of the public

**National Trust for Scotland** *noun* in Scotland, a charitable organisation that preserves historic buildings, gardens, parks, coastline and areas of natural beauty for the benefit of the public

**National Vegetation Classification** *noun* a systemic scheme for classifying types of vegetation in the United Kingdom, covering all natural, semi-natural and major artificial habitats, including derelict urban sites. Abbr **NVC** 

**native** adjective always having lived, grown or existed in a place  $\bigcirc$  *Tigers are native to Asia.* 

**native species** *noun* a species which exists naturally in an area

**Natura 2000** *noun* in the European Union, a network of environmental sites designated by member states as of special interest for protection for their habitats or bird life

**natural** adjective **1**. not made by people  $\bigcirc$ natural materials  $\bigcirc$  areas of natural beauty **2**. usual or expected  $\bigcirc$  It's natural to be concerned about what's in the food you eat.

**natural amenities** *plural noun* features of the landscape that are not made by humans and are regarded as contributing to a pleasant environment, e.g. rivers, lakes or moorland

**Natural Area** *noun* an area of the United Kingdom that is a biogeographical zone with a characteristic association of wildlife and natural features (NOTE: There are both **natural background** *noun* the surrounding level of radiation or substances such as arsenic in a specific location

**natural capital** *noun* natural resources seen in economic terms as stock, goods and services

**natural disaster** *noun* a phenomenon such as a storm, earthquake or flood that destroys property and kills people and livestock

**natural ecosystem** *noun* an ecosystem where humans have had no more local influence than native species

**natural environment** *noun* **1.** same as **natural habitat 2.** the part of the Earth that has not been built or formed by humans. Compare **built environment** 

**natural forest** *noun* a forest that has not been planted, maintained or exploited on a large scale by humans

**natural gas** *noun* a gas often found near petroleum deposits, although it can occur without petroleum, used as a domestic fuel (NOTE: It is mainly formed of methane but also contains small amounts of butane and propane. It contains no sulfur, unlike coal gas, and since it mixes with air it burns completely, creating very little carbon monoxide.)

**natural habitat** *noun* **1.** the usual surroundings in which an organism lives in the wild. Also called **natural environment 2.** an area of land or water where the majority of species are native and there has been very little human activity

natural historian noun same as naturalist

**natural history** *noun* the study of living organisms in their natural environments and of the features of the Earth not formed by humans

**naturalise** verb to introduce a species into an area where it has not lived or grown before so that it becomes established as part of the ecosystem  $\bigcirc$  Rhododendron ponticum has become naturalised in parts of Britain.

**naturalist** *noun* a person who is interested in and studies the natural environment and its organisms. Also called **natural historian** 

**natural pollutant** *noun* a polluting substance that occurs naturally, e.g. ash from a volcano **natural resource** *noun* a naturally occurring material that can be put to use by humans, e.g. wood or oil (*often plural*)

**natural science** noun a science that deals with aspects of the physical world, e.g. biology, chemistry, geology or physics (often plural)

**natural scientist** *noun* a person who specialises in natural science

**natural selection** *noun* the process of evolutionary change, by which offspring of organisms with certain characteristics are more able to survive and reproduce than offspring of other organisms, thus gradually changing the composition of a population

**natural vegetation** *noun* the range of plant communities that exist in the natural environment without being planted or managed by people

**nature** noun all living organisms and the environments in which they live  $\Box$  to go back to nature to return to a state similar to the one that existed before cultivation  $\bigcirc$ They've let the hillside go back to nature.  $\Diamond$ back-to-nature

Nature Conservancy Council noun a former UK organisation (1973–91) that took official responsibility for the conservation of fauna and flora. Abbr NCC (NOTE: Now replaced by English Nature, the Countryside Council for Wales and Scottish Natural Heritage.)

**nature conservation** *noun* the active management of the Earth's natural resources, plants, animals and environment, to ensure that they survive or are appropriately used

**nature management** *noun* the activity of managing a natural environment to encourage plant and animal life. Also called **habitat management** 

**nature reserve** *noun* an area where plants, animals and their environment are protected

**nature trail** *noun* a path through the countryside with signs to draw attention to important and interesting features about plants, animals and the environment

**NAWARAD** *abbr* National Assembly for Wales Agriculture and Rural Affairs Department

NCC abbr Nature Conservancy Council

**NDPB** *abbr* non-departmental public body **Ne** *symbol* neon

**neap tide** *noun* a tide which occurs at the first and last quarters of the Moon, when

the difference between high and low water is less than usual. Compare **spring tide** 

**Nearctic Region** *noun* a biogeographical region, part of Arctogea, comprising North America and Greenland

**necrotroph** *noun* a parasite which only feeds on dead organisms. Compare **bio-troph** 

**nectar** *noun* a sweet sugary liquid produced by flowers, which attracts birds or insects which pollinate the flowers

**nectary** *noun* a plant part that produces nectar, often found at the base of a flower (NOTE: Nectaries are usually in the flowers but may also develop on other plant parts such as the traps of pitcher plants.)

**need** noun something that is necessary or required  $\bigcirc$  the need for clean water  $\blacksquare$  plural noun **needs** something that a person must have for their health or well-being  $\bigcirc$ nutritional needs

**needle** noun **1**. a thin hard leaf of a conifer **2**. a thin metal pointer in an instrument  $\bigcirc$  The needle on the dial indicated zero.

**-needled** *suffix* with needles  $\bigcirc$  *two needled or five-needled pines* 

**NEF** *abbr* noise exposure forecast

**negative** *adjective* having a value of less than  $0 \circ$  *The mechanism enables the propeller to be set to a negative pitch.* Symbol -. Opposite **positive** 

**negative feedback** *noun* a situation in which the result of a process inhibits the action which caused the process

negative ion generator noun same as ioniser

**neighbourhood noise** *noun* the general noise from a local source such as a factory which is disturbing to people living in the area

**nekton** *plural noun* swimming sea animals such as fish, as opposed to floating or drifting animals such as plankton

**nematicide** *noun* a substance which kills nematodes

**nematode** *noun* a type of roundworm, some of which, such as hookworms, are parasites of animals while others, such as root knot and cyst nematodes, live in the roots or stems of plants

#### neo- prefix new

**neo-Darwinism** *noun* a revised form of Darwin's theory of evolution which accounts for modern genetics and other recent discoveries

**Neogea** noun one of the main biogeographical regions of the Earth, comprising Central and South America together with the islands in the Caribbean. Also called **Neotropical Region**.  $\Diamond$  **Arctogea, Noto-gea** 

**neon** noun an inert gas found in very small quantities in the atmosphere. It is used in illuminated signs. (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Ne**; the atomic number is **10** and the atomic weight is **20.18**.)

Neotropical Region noun same as Neogea

**neptunium** *noun* a naturally radioactive element (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Np**; the atomic number is **93** and the atomic weight is **237.05**.)

**NERC** *abbr* Natural Environment Research Council

**neritic** *adjective* referring to an animal or plant which lives in the shallow sea over the continental shelf

**nervous system** *noun* the network of specialised cells that transmit nerve impulses in most animals

**nest** noun **1**. a construction built by birds and some fish for their eggs **2**. a construction made by some social insects such as ants and bees for the colony to live in ■ *verb* to build a nest

**nestling** *noun* a very young bird that has not yet left its nest

net primary productivity noun the rate at which organic matter is incorporated into plants to produce growth.  $\Diamond$  gross primary productivity

**network** noun a complex interconnected group or system of people or things  $\bigcirc A$ network of meteorological stations around the world exchange information.  $\blacksquare$  verb to link people or things together in a network

**neurotoxicity** *noun* the capacity to prevent nerve impulses from working

**neurotoxin** *noun* a substance which prevents nerve impulses from working, e.g. the poison of a snake or insect

**neuston** *plural noun* organisms such as plankton which float or swim in the surface film of a body of water

**neutral** adjective 1. referring to the state of being neither acid nor alkali  $\bigcirc pH 7$  is *neutral*. 2. referring to an electrical charge that is neither positive nor negative

**neutralisation**, **neutralization** *noun* a chemical process in which an acid reacts with a base to form a salt and water

**neutralise**, **neutralize** verb **1**. to make an acid neutral  $\bigcirc$  *Acid in drainage water can be neutralised by limestone*. **2**. to make a bacterial toxin harmless by combining it

with the correct amount of antitoxin **3.** to counteract the effect of something

**neutralising**, **neutralizing** *adjective* referring to a substance which acts against the effect of something

**névé** *noun* the spring snow on high mountains which becomes harder and more like ice during the summer

**new chemicals** *plural noun* the chemicals that were not listed in the European Inventory of Existing Commercial Chemical Substances between January 1971 and September 1981. Compare **existing chemicals** 

**newton** noun an SI unit of measurement of force. Abbr N (NOTE: 1 newton is the force required to move 1 kilogram at the speed of 1 metre per second.)

**NGO** *abbr* non-governmental organisation **Ni** *symbol* nickel

**niche** *noun* a place in an ecosystem which a species has adapted to occupy

**nickel** *noun* a metallic element (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Ni**; the atomic number is **28** and the atomic weight is **58.71**.)

**nicotine** *noun* a harmful substance in tobacco. It is used as an insecticide.

nid- prefix nest

**nidicolous** *adjective* referring to a very young bird that is not well developed when it leaves the egg and remains in the nest for some time

**nidifugous** *adjective* referring to a very young bird that is well developed when it leaves the egg and can leave the nest immediately

**night soil** *noun* human excreta, collected and used for fertiliser in some parts of the world

**nimbostratus** *noun* a grey mass of cloud with precipitation in the form of rain or snow about 1000 m above the ground

**NIMBY** *noun* used to describe people who are willing to accept development and building for various purposes, provided it is not near where they themselves are living. Full form **not in my backyard** 

**nitrate** *noun* **1**. an ion with the formula  $NO_3$  **2**. a chemical compound containing the nitrate ion, e.g. sodium nitrate

**nitrate-sensitive area**, **nitrate-vulnerable zone** *noun* a region of the country where nitrate pollution is likely and where the use of nitrate fertilisers is strictly controlled. Abbr **NSA**, **NVZ** 

**nitric** *adjective* referring to a compound containing nitrogen

**nitric acid** *noun* a corrosive acid. It is a very reactive oxidising agent, used in making fertilisers. Formula: HNO<sub>3</sub>.

**nitric oxide** *noun* a gas that is produced by burning at high temperatures, as in forest fires and internal combustion engines. Formula: NO. Also called **nitrogen monoxide** (NOTE: It converts to nitrogen dioxide in the atmosphere, is a major contributor to photochemical smog and is soluble in water. It contributes to acid rain (nitric acid) deposition, and is important in the catalytic destruction of ozone in the stratosphere.)

**nitrification** *noun* the process by which bacteria in the soil break down nitrogen compounds and form nitrates which plants can absorb (NOTE: It is part of the nitrogen cycle.)

**nitrifier** *noun* a microorganism that is involved in the process of nitrification

**nitrify** *verb* to convert nitrogen or nitrogen compounds into nitrates

**nitrite** noun **1**. an ion with the formula  $NO_2$  **2**. a chemical compound containing the nitrite ion, e.g. sodium nitrite

**nitrogen** noun a chemical element that is the main component of air and an essential part of protein. It is essential to biological life. (NOTE: The chemical symbol is N; the atomic number is 7 and the atomic weight is **14.01**.)

**nitrogen cycle** *noun* the set of processes by which nitrogen is converted from a gas in the atmosphere to nitrogen-containing substances in soil and living organisms, then converted back to a gas (NOTE: Nitrogen is absorbed into green plants in the form of nitrates, the plants are then eaten by animals and the nitrates are returned to the ecosystem through animals' excreta or when an animal or a plant dies.)

**nitrogen deficiency** *noun* a lack of nitrogen in the soil, found where organic matter is low and resulting in thin, weak growth of plants

**nitrogen dioxide** *noun* a brown toxic irritant gas. Formula:  $NO_2$ . (NOTE: It is one of the pollutants produced by vehicle exhausts.)

**nitrogen fertiliser** *noun* a fertiliser containing mainly nitrogen, e.g. ammonium nitrate

**nitrogen fixation** *noun* the process by which nitrogen in the air is converted by bacteria in some plant roots into nitrogen compounds (NOTE: When the plants die the nitrogen is released into the soil and acts as a fertiliser.)

### nitrogen-fixing bacteria

**nitrogen-fixing bacteria** plural noun bacteria such as *Rhizobium* in the soil which convert nitrogen in the air into nitrogen compounds by means of the process of nitrogen fixation in plants

**nitrogen-fixing plant** *noun* a leguminous plant which forms an association with bacteria that convert nitrogen from the air into nitrogen compounds in the soil, e.g. a pea plant

nitrogen monoxide noun same as nitric oxide

nitrogenous adjective referring to a compound containing nitrogen

**nitrogen oxide** *noun* an oxide formed when nitrogen is oxidised, e.g. nitric oxide or nitrogen dioxide. Formula: NO<sub>x</sub>.

'The largest source of nitrogen oxides (NOx) emissions in the UK is the transport sector. (Delivering the evidence. Defra's Science and Innovation Strategy 2003–06)'

**nitrous oxide** *noun* a gas with a sweet smell that is one of the major greenhouse gases. Formula: HNO<sub>2</sub>. (NOTE: It is produced by soil cultivation and fertilisation and by burning fossil fuels and biomass.)

nival adjective growing in or under the snow

NNI abbr noise and number index

NNR abbr National Nature Reserve

**NOAEL** *noun* the highest concentration of a substance that causes no harm which can be detected by existing testing methods. Full form **no-observed-adverse-effectlevel** 

**noble gas** *noun* a gas that does not react chemically with other substances. Also called **rare gas, inert gas** (NOTE: The noble gases include helium, neon, argon, krypton, xenon and radon.)

**noble metal** *noun* a metal such as gold or silver that resists corrosion and does not form compounds with non-metals. Compare **base metal** 

**nocturnal** *adjective* **1.** referring to an organism that is active at night  $\bigcirc$  *Owls and badgers are nocturnal.* Compare **diurnal 2.** happening at night

**nocturnal animal** *plural noun* an animal that is active at night and sleeps during the day

**node** *noun* a point on the stem of a plant where a leaf is attached

**nodule** *noun* a small lump found on the roots of leguminous plants such as peas which contains bacteria that can convert nitrogen from the air into nitrogen compounds **no dumping** *noun* a sign telling people that they are not allowed to throw away waste in that particular place

**NOEL** *noun* the highest concentration of a substance that has no detectable effect on humans. Full form **no-observed-effect-level** 

**noise** *noun* unwanted sound, especially an sound that is unpleasant or too loud

**noise abatement** *noun* measures taken to reduce unacceptable noise or vibrations, or to protect people from exposure to it

**Noise Abatement Society** *noun* an association of people who work to influence others to reduce loud or irritating noises

**noise and number index** *noun* a way of measuring noise from aircraft. Abbr **NNI noise charge** *noun* a fee paid by a company to be allowed to make some amount of

noise in the course of its business **noise criteria** *plural noun* the levels of noise which are acceptable to people who

hear them **noise exposure forecast** *noun* a forecast of the effect that industrial or aircraft noise will have on people. Abbr **NEF** 

**noise level** noun the degree of loudness of a noise, taken as a measurement  $\bigcirc$  The factory has announced plans to keep noise levels down to a minimum.

**noise nuisance** *noun* a noise which is annoying, disturbing or unpleasant to someone

**noise pollution** *noun* annoying or physically dangerous noise to which people are exposed in their work or home environment and over which they often have no control

**noise pollution level** *noun* the degree of loudness of annoying or physically dangerous noise in a person's environment, taken as a measurement. Abbr **NPL** 

**noise zone** *noun* an area which is classified according to the amount of noise that exists in it

**noisy** *adjective* **1**. making a loud noise **2**. referring to a place where there is a lot of noise

**nomad** *noun* an animal that moves from place to place without having a fixed range. Compare **migrant** 

**nomadic** *adjective* referring to nomads **nomadism** *noun* a habit of some animals that move from place to place without having a fixed range

**nomenclature** *noun* a system for giving names to organisms  $\bigcirc$  *taxonomic nomenclature* 

# non- prefix not or no

**non-biodegradable**, **non-degradable** *adjective* referring to an object or substance that cannot be decomposed into environmentally safe waste materials by the action of soil bacteria

**non-degradation** *noun* the prevention of the pollution of clean air

**non-departmental public body** *noun* an organisation set up to carry out a specific role within government responsibilities, but which is not a government department or part of one. Abbr **NDPB** 

**non-disposable** *adjective* referring to a product that is not thrown away after use, but can be recycled

non-ferrous adjective not containing iron

**non-flammable** *adjective* referring to a material that is difficult to set on fire

**non-genetically modified** *adjective* referring to an organism with a genetic composition that has not been altered by genetic modification. Abbr **non-GM** 

**non-governmental** organisation *noun* an organisation which is not funded by a government and which works on a local, national or international level, e.g. a pressure group, charity or voluntary agency. Abbr NGO

**non-indigenous** *adjective* referring to a plant, animal or person that is not native to a place

**non-metal** *noun* a chemical element that lacks the physical and chemical properties of a metal, e.g. carbon or oxygen

**non-native** *adjective* relating to a species that did not originate where it is now found. Also called **alien, exotic** 

**non-organic** *adjective* **1**. referring to a compound that does not contain carbon **2**. referring to crops that are not produced according to guidelines restricting the use of fertilisers and other practices

**non-persistent** *adjective* referring to a chemical, especially a pesticide, that decomposes quickly after it has been applied so that it does not enter the food chain

**non-point source** *noun* a source of pollution not associated with a specific discharge point. Compare **point source** (NOTE: Non-point sources include rainwater and runoff from agricultural land and industrial sites, as well as escaping gases from pipes and fittings.)

**non-renewable** *adjective* **1.** not able to be replaced when used up because a supply is limited  $\bigcirc$  *non-renewable fuels* **2.** not able

to be extended for a longer period  $\bigcirc$  non-renewable contract

**non-renewable energy** *noun* power generated from a resource such as coil or oil that cannot be replaced once it has been used

**non-renewable resource** *noun* a natural resource which cannot be replaced once it has been used, e.g. coal or oil

**non-resistant** *adjective* referring to an organism that is not resistant to a disease, antibiotic, pesticide, herbicide or other agent

**non-selective weedkiller** *noun* a weedkiller that kills all plants

non-till adjective 
no-till agriculture

**non-toxic** adjective referring to a substance that is not poisonous or harmful to humans or other organisms or the environment

**non-woody** *adjective* referring to plants that do not form woody stems

**normal environmental lapse rate** *noun* the rate at which the temperature of the air falls with height above the Earth (NOTE: This is about  $6.4^{\circ}$ C per thousand metres, under conditions where there are no upward air currents or wind.)

**normal room temperature** *noun* the temperature regarded as comfortable for usual daily human activity

North Atlantic Conveyor noun an ocean current system carrying warm surface waters to the North Atlantic, where they cool and drop to a deeper level before flowing south again. Also called Atlantic Conveyor Belt (NOTE: Because it transfers heat to the atmosphere, it gives northwestern Europe a more temperate climate than other countries on a similar latitude such as Canada.)

**North Atlantic Drift** *noun* a current of warm water flowing north along the east coast of the USA from the Gulf of Mexico, then crossing the Atlantic to northern Europe (NOTE: It is part of the North Atlantic Conveyor.)

North Atlantic Oscillation noun an atmospheric mass that alternates between the North and South Poles and affects the strength and route of storms crossing the Atlantic from America to Europe as it changes in mass and pressure. Its effects are most obvious in November to April. Abbr NAO

**northern hemisphere** *noun* the upper half of the Earth

# Northern Lights

**Northern Lights** *plural noun* a spectacular illumination of the sky in the northern hemisphere caused by ionised particles striking the atmosphere. Also called **Aurora Borealis** 

North Sea noun the sea to the north of the Netherlands and Germany, east of the UK and west of Scandinavia

**North Sea oil** *noun* oil extracted from the rocks under the North Sea

**no smoking area** *noun* a part of a public place such as a restaurant or airport where smoking is not allowed

**notifiable disease** *noun* a serious infectious disease of plants, animals or people that has to be officially reported so that steps can be taken to stop it spreading

**notify** *verb* to inform someone about something officially

**no-till agriculture, no-till farming** *noun* a system of cultivation in which mechanical disturbance of the soil by ploughing is kept to a minimum to reduce soil erosion. Also called **non-till**.  $\Diamond$  **minimum tillage** 

Notogea noun one of the main biogeographical regions of the Earth, comprising Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific Islands. b Arctogea. Neogea

**noxious** *adjective* harmful to people or animals

**noy** noun a unit of measurement of perceived noise

Np symbol neptunium

**NPK** *noun* nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium, used in different proportions as a fertiliser

NPL abbr noise pollution level

**NRA** *abbr* National Rivers Authority

**NRI** abbr National Resources Institute

NRPB abbr National Radiological Protection Board

NSA abbr nitrate-sensitive area

**nuclear** *adjective* **1**. referring to an atomic nucleus, especially to the production of energy by fission or fusion of nuclei **2**. referring to a cell nucleus

**nuclear accident** *noun* an unexpected event in a nuclear power station which results in release of radiation into the environment above permitted safety levels

**nuclear contamination** *noun* the damage done to an object, person or substance because of contact with nuclear radiation

**nuclear energy** *noun* the energy released during a nuclear reaction **nuclear fallout** *noun* the radioactive material which falls from the atmosphere after a nuclear explosion

**nuclear-free** *adjective* without nuclear reactors or nuclear weapons  $\bigcirc$  *While some countries remain nuclear-free, nuclear reactors supply about 15% of all electricity generated in the world.* 

**nuclear-free zone** *noun* an area in which the use of nuclear reactors or the use of nuclear weapons is not allowed

**nuclear power** *noun* the power generated by a nuclear reactor

**nuclear power plant**, **nuclear power station** *noun* a power station in which nuclear reactions are used to provide energy to run turbines which generate electricity

**nuclear waste** *noun* the radioactive waste from a nuclear reactor, including spent fuel rods and coolant

**nuclear winter** *noun* a period expected to follow a nuclear explosion, when there would be no warmth and light because dust particles would obscure the Sun and most life would be affected by radiation

**nucleating agent** *noun* a substance such as solid carbon dioxide that is scattered on clouds to make them release rain

**nucleic acid** *noun* a complex organic acid, either DNA or RNA, that exists in the nucleus and protoplasm of all cells

**nucleus** *noun* **1**. the central core of an atom, formed of neutrons and protons **2**. the central body in a cell, containing DNA and RNA, and controlling the function and characteristics of the cell **3**. a central part or focus round which something gathers

**nué ardente** *noun* a cloud of burning gas that flows downhill during a volcanic eruption

**nuisance** *noun* something annoying, disturbing or unpleasant

**nuisance threshold** *noun* the point at which something such as a noise or smell becomes annoying or unpleasant

**nursery** *noun* a place where plants are grown until they are large enough to be planted in their final positions

**nut** *noun* a hard indehiscent fruit with one seed

nutraceutical, nutriceutical noun same as functional food

**nutrient** *noun* a substance that an organism needs to allow it to grow, thrive and reproduce, e.g. carbon, hydrogen, oxygen, nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, calcium, magnesium or sulfur. Plants obtain their nutrients from the soil, while humans and other animals obtain them from their food, including plants.

**nutrient budget** *noun* the calculation of the amount of a nutrient taken up by an individual and the amount lost by an individual to the environment

**nutrient leaching** *noun* the loss of nutrients from the soil caused by water flowing through it, which deprives the soil of nutrients and may pollute water courses

**nutrient requirement** *noun* the type and amount of nutrients needed by an organism

**nutrient source** *noun* the source of a nutrient for an individual or community

**nutrition** *noun* the process of taking in the necessary food components to grow and remain healthy.  $\Diamond$  **soil nutrition** 

**nutritional** *adjective* referring to nutrition  $\bigcirc$  *the nutritional quality of meat* 

nutritional requirement noun the type and amount of food needed by an organism nutritious adjective referring to food that provides the nutrients that are needed for growth and health **nutritive** *adjective* **1.** referring to a substance that provides the necessary components for growth and health  $\bigcirc$  *plants grown in a nutritive solution* **2.** referring to nutrition

**nutritive value** noun the degree to which a food is valuable in promoting health  $\bigcirc$  *The nutritive value of white flour is lower than that of wholemeal flour.*

**obligate** *adjective* referring to an organism that exists or develops only in a particular set of circumstances  $\bigcirc$  *an obligate parasite*  $\bigcirc$  *an obligate anaerobe* Compare facultative

**obliterative shading, obliterative countershading** *noun* the grading of the colour of an animal, such as a dark back dark shading towards a light belly, which minimises shapes and gives a flat appearance

**obscure** verb 1. to make something difficult to see or prevent something from being seen  $\bigcirc$  The ice forming on the window obscured vision. 2. to make something difficult to realise or understand  $\bigcirc$  The low temperatures in the years after the volcanic eruption obscured the general trend of gradual global warming.  $\blacksquare$  adjective not clearly expressed and therefore difficult to understand  $\bigcirc$  an obscure explanation

**observation** *noun* the process of watching or studying someone or something carefully to find out information ○ *The type of cloud is established by observation and comparison with cloud photographs.* □ **under observation** being watched carefully

**observations** plural noun the pieces of scientific information gathered by using any of the five human senses, but especially sight  $\bigcirc$  observations of feeding patterns

**observe** verb **1**. to watch or study something carefully to find out information  $\bigcirc$ *They observed the birds' behaviour for several weeks*. **2**. to obey something such as an agreement or a guideline  $\bigcirc$  *We expect everyone to observe the safety guidelines.*

**occidental** *adjective* referring to the west **occluded** front *noun* a weather front where warm and cold air masses meet and mix together, the warm air rising away from the surface of the ground

**occlusion** *noun* the forcing of air upwards from the Earth's surface, as when a cold front overtakes and flows under a warm front

occupational asthma noun asthma caused by materials with which people comes into contact at work, e.g. asthma in farm workers (farmer's lung), caused by hav

occupational exposure *noun* the situation of experiencing a health hazard while at work

**ocean** *noun* the body of salt water which covers the Earth (NOTE: American English prefers to use **ocean**, British English prefers to use **sea**.)

**oceanarium** *noun* a large saltwater aquarium where marine animals are kept for display

**ocean dumping** *noun* the discharging of waste, solid, liquid or radioactive, into the ocean, now banned

**oceanic** *adjective* **1.** referring to an ocean, especially to deep water beyond the continental shelf **2.** living in the ocean

**ocean incineration** *noun* the burning of toxic waste in special ships at sea, now banned

**oceanography** *noun* the study of all the physical aspects of the ocean, including the fauna and flora living there

**oceanology** *noun* the study of the geographical distribution of the ocean's economic resources

Ocean Thermal Energy Conversion noun the process whereby the difference in temperature between the upper and lower layers of water in tropical seas is used to generate electricity and fresh water. Abbr **OTEC** (NOTE: Warmer water from the upper layer is converted to steam to drive turbines and then condensed to provide fresh water.)

octa noun another spelling of okta

**octane** noun a liquid hydrocarbon that exists in 18 structurally different forms. Formula:  $C_8H_{18}$ .

COMMENT: Petrol without the addition of hydrocarbons will make the engine knock. Hydrocarbons, such as octane or aromatic hydrocarbons, or lead tetraethyl can be added to the petrol to give better performance, while increasing the octane rating Unleaded petrol has a relatively low octane rating and leaded petrol, which contains an antiknock additive, has a high rating. Leaded petrol produces more atmospheric pollution than unleaded.

**odour** noun a smell, especially an unpleasant smell (NOTE: The US spelling is **odor**.)

odour nuisance noun a smell which is annoying or unpleasant

**ODP** *abbr* ozone-depleting potential *or* ozone-depletion potential

**ODS** abbr ozone-depleting substance

**oestrogen** *noun* a steroid hormone belonging to a group of hormones that controls the reproductive cycle and the development of secondary sexual characteristics in female primates (NOTE: The US spelling is **estrogen**.)

**offpeak** adjective referring to a period during which the consumption of something is low  $\bigcirc$  Offpeak electricity costs less.  $\bigcirc$  By using thermal storage we can move 50% of electricity demand into offpeak hours.

offshore adjective, adverb 1. in sea water near a coast 2. at a distance from a coast

offshore island *noun* an island situated up to 12.5 km or 20 miles from a coast

offshore windfarm noun a collection of wind turbines for the production of electricity situated in the sea at some distance from a coast (NOTE: Britain's first offshore windfarm is situated 1 km off the coast of Blyth, Northumberland.)

**offspring** *noun* a child, the young of an animal, or a descendant of a plant (NOTE: The plural is **offspring**: *The birds usually produce three or four offspring each year.*)

**ohm** *noun* the SI unit of measurement of electrical resistance. Symbol **&#937**;

**oil** noun **1**. a liquid compound which does not mix with water, occurring as vegetable or animal oils, essential volatile oils and mineral oils **2**. mineral oil extracted from underground deposits, used to make petrol and other petroleum products

COMMENT: Oil is made up of different types of hydrocarbon together with sulfur compounds, and usually occurs in combination with natural gas or water. When these are removed it is called crude oil or crude petroleum. Refined crude oil gives products such as petrol, LPG, diesel oil, paraffin wax and tar. Crude oil is found in geological deposits, mainly in the Middle East, in the North Sea, Central America and Asia.

**oil-bearing** *adjective* referring to rock, sand or shale that contains oil

**oil crop** noun a crop grown for extraction of the oil in its seeds, e.g. sunflower or oilseed rape

**oil-exporting country** *noun* a country which produces enough oil from underground deposits for its own use and to sell to other countries

**oilfield** *noun* an area of rock under which lie one or more pools of oil that can be extracted  $\bigcirc$  *The search is on for new oilfields to replace fields which have been exhausted.* 

**oil-fired** *adjective* using oil as fuel  $\bigcirc$  *oil-fired central heating* 

**oil-importing country** *noun* a country which buys the fuel and industrial oil it uses from other countries

**oil pollution** *noun* damage to an area caused by oil, e.g. pollution of the sea by oil from a damaged oil tanker

**oil sand** *noun* a geological formation of sand or sandstone containing bitumen, which can be extracted and processed to give oil. Also called **tar sand**, **bituminous sand** 

**oilseed rape** *noun* a plant of the cabbage family with bright yellow flowers, grown to provide an edible oil and animal feed from the processed seeds. Latin name: *Brassica napus*. Also called **rape** (NOTE: Oil produced from oilseed rape is often called 'vegetable oil'.)

**oilseeds** *plural noun* crops grown for the oil extracted from their seeds, e.g. oilseed rape or linseed

**oil slick** *noun* oil which has escaped into water and floats on the surface

**oil spill** *noun* an escape of oil into the environment, especially from a damaged ship, vehicle or pipeline

oily adjective containing oil

**okta**, **octa** *noun* a unit of visible sky equal to one eighth of total area visible to the horizon

**old growth** *noun* a long-established forest or woodland with some large old trees which supports a relatively stable and diverse community of plants and animals

**old-growth forest** *noun* a forest that has never been affected to any great extent by human activity

olefin, olefine noun an aliphatic hydrocarbon

olfactory adjective referring to the sense of smell

oligo- prefix few or little

oligohaline adjective (of water) having traces of salt. ◊ mesohaline, polyhaline

oligophagous *adjective* referring to animals that feed on only some types of prey oligophagy *noun* the practice of feeding

on only some types of prey

**oligosaprobic** *adjective* referring to an organism that is unable to survive in polluted water

**oligotrophic** *adjective* (*of water*) referring to water that contains few nutrients.  $\Diamond$ **dystrophic**, eutrophic, mesotrophic

**oligotrophy** *noun* the state of being oligotrophic

**olive** *noun* a Mediterranean tree with small yellowish-green edible fruit from which an edible oil can be produced. Latin name: *Olea europaea*.

**ombrogenous** *adjective* referring to an area of land, such as a bog, or a plant that receives water only from rain and is therefore low in nutrients

**ombudsman** *noun* an official who investigates complaints by the public against government departments or other large organisations

**omnivore** *noun* an animal that eats both plant and animal foods. ¢ **carnivore, detritivore, frugivore, herbivore** (NOTE: Humans and pigs are examples of omnivores.)

**omnivorous** *adjective* referring to an animal that eats both plant and animal foods

**onshore** *adjective*, *adverb* **1**. situated on land  $\bigcirc$  *onshore oil and gas exploration* **2**. towards the coast  $\bigcirc$  *an onshore breeze* 

**ontogeny** *noun* the development of a living organism from its earliest stage to maturity

**OOZE**, **OOZE mud** *noun* soft mud, especially at the bottom of a lake or the sea. Also

called **ooze mud** ■ *verb* (*of liquid*) to flow slowly

**opacity** noun the characteristic of not allowing light or other rays to pass through  $\bigcirc$  Sometimes it is possible to estimate the depth and opacity of the layer of mist or fog from ground observations.

**opaque** *adjective* referring to something that does not allow light or other rays to pass through it

**OPEC** *abbr* Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries

**open-air** *adjective* referring to the environment outside buildings

**open burner** *noun* an outdoor site where waste such as automobile tyres or rags is destroyed by fire, thereby causing atmospheric pollution

**open burning** *noun* the burning of waste matter in the open air, creating pollution with smoke

**open-cast mining** *noun* a form of mining in which the mineral is dug from the surface instead of from under the ground. Also called **open-cut mining**, strip mining

**open country, open land** *noun* **1.** an area of land that is not built on **2.** an area of land that does not have many trees or high mountains **3.** any area of land that is mountain, moor, heath or down or is registered as common land

open-cut mining noun same as opencast mining

**open dump** *noun* a place where waste is left on the ground and not buried in a hole **open land** *noun* land with no trees or

bushes and no buildings

**open ocean, open sea** *noun* the ocean or sea well away from the coast

**operation** noun an organised activity designed to achieve something  $\bigcirc$  The cleanup operation after the oil spill lasted for months.

**opportunist**, **opportunistic** *adjective* referring to an organism that quickly colonises an available habitat

opportunistic weed noun a weed that grows in a wide range of conditions

optic adjective referring to the eye or to sight

optimal adjective best or most effective optimal foraging theory noun the theory that through evolution predators have adapted to maximise energy gain and minimise energy loss when foraging

**optimise**, **optimize** *verb* to make something as efficient as possible **optimum** *adjective* referring to the point at which the condition or amount of something is the best  $\bigcirc$  *optimum height*  $\blacksquare$  *noun* the point at which the condition or amount of something is best

**optimum sustainable population** *noun* the number of individuals that are needed to maintain the existence of the species

oral adjective referring to the mouth, or to speech

**orbit** *noun* the curved path of a planet or satellite around another astronomical object

**orbital** *adjective* referring to the movement of an object around something

**orbital road** *noun* a road which goes right round a town, at some distance from the built-up areas. Compare **ring road** 

**order** *noun* **1**. a command or instruction **2**. a classification of animals or plants, formed of several families (NOTE: Orders of animals have names ending in -a; orders of plants have names ending in -ais.) **3**. the way in which things are arranged so that one comes before another □ in order in the correct order □ in order of according to ○ *in order of importance / priority / frequency* □ in ascending order with the lowest number or letter of the alphabet first □ in descending order with the highest number or letter of the alphabet first □ in reverse order in the opposite order from what is usual □ out of order in the wrong order

**ore** noun a mineral found in the ground containing a metal which can be extracted from it  $\bigcirc$  *Iron ore deposits were found in the mountains.*  $\bigcirc$  *The ore is heated to a high temperature to extract the metal.* 

**ore-bearing** *adjective* referring to rock that contains ore

**organ** *noun* a part of an organism that is distinct from other parts and has a particular function, e.g. an eye or a flower

**organic** *adjective* **1**. referring to a compound containing carbon **2**. referring to food produced using only a restricted number of permitted pesticides and fertilisers, or to the production of such food **3**. referring to organs in the body

COMMENT: Organic is a term that is used loosely in the media and elsewhere to mean 'natural' or 'wholesome' with reference to food. In fact, in the UK organic food can only be labelled as such if it meets various official criteria controlling the way in which it has been produced.

organic agriculture noun same as organic farming **organically** *adverb* using only a restricted number of permitted pesticides and fertilisers in growing a crop

organic carbon *noun* carbon that comes from an animal or plant. Abbr OC

**organic conversion** *noun* the process of converting from conventional agriculture to organic production

**organic farming** noun a method of farming which does not involve the use of artificial fertilisers or pesticides  $\bigcirc$  Organic farming may become more economic than conventional farming.

**organic fertiliser** *noun* a fertiliser made from dead or decaying plant matter or animal wastes, e.g. leaf mould, farmyard manure or bone meal

organic material, organic matter noun carbon-based material derived from organisms, e.g. decomposed plant material or animal dung

organic matter noun 1. a combination found in soil of plant material that is decomposing, microorganisms such as fungi, and humus. Also called soil organic matter 2. same as organic material

**organics** *noun* **1**. the practice of managing the land and growing food according to organic principles **2**. organic material of all types including waste

organic waste noun substances consisting of material containing carbon compounds and disposed of as waste, e.g. plant or animal remains. Compare inorganic waste

**organism** *noun* any individual life form that is able to reproduce and grow, e.g. a plant, animal or microorganism

Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries noun an association set up in 1960 to represent the interests of the major oil-exporting nations, to fix the price of oil and the amounts which can be produced. Abbr OPEC

**organochlorine** *noun* **1.** a chlorinated hydrocarbon **2.** a chemical compound containing chlorine, used as an insecticide

**organophosphate** *noun* a synthetic insecticide that attacks the nervous system, e.g. chlorpyrifos

organophosphorus compound noun an organic compound containing phosphorus

**organo-tin paint** *noun* a toxic paint based on tin that is used on ships' hulls to prevent the growth of marine organisms

**origin** *noun* **1.** a point where something starts or comes from  $\bigcirc$  *the origin of life*  $\bigcirc$ 

An air mass takes on the characteristics of its place of origin. **2.** a base from which a map projection is drawn  $\bigcirc$  The value of convergence used is correct at the parallel of origin.  $\Diamond$  centre of origin

**ornamental** *adjective* **1**. for use as decoration **2**. referring to a plant that is grown for its appearance rather than for food or other use  $\blacksquare$  *noun* an ornamental plant, e.g. a rose or orchid

ornithological adjective referring to ornithology

ornithologist noun a scientist who studies birds

ornithology noun the study of birds

**orographic effect** *noun* an atmospheric disturbance that is caused by, or relating to, the existence of mountains or other high land

**orphan site** *noun* an area of contaminated land for which both polluter and owner reject responsibility

orthotropism noun growth directly towards or away from a stimulus

**oscillation** *noun* a regular movement from side to side

osmoregulation *noun* also called osmotic regulation

**osmosis** *noun* the movement of molecules from a solution of one concentration to a solution of a higher concentration through a semi-permeable membrane until the two solutions balance in concentration

**osmotic pressure** *noun* the pressure required to prevent the flow of a solvent into a solution through a semi-permeable membrane

**osmotic regulation** *noun* the control of osmotic pressure within cells and simple organisms, by which they maintain a balance between the fluid inside them and that outside in their environment. Also called **osmoregulation** 

**OSPAR** *noun* an international agreement to prevent pollution of the northeast Atlantic and its coasts by continuously reducing discharges, emissions and losses of hazardous substances, with the aim of eventually achieving very low or zero concentrations. Full form **Oil Spill Preparedness and Response** 

**OTEC** abbr Ocean Thermal Energy Conversion

**outback** noun a large area of wild or semi-wild land in the centre of the continent of Australia  $\bigcirc$  Many wild animals which used to live in the outback are becoming rare as the land is reclaimed for farming.

**outbreak** noun the sudden start of something  $\bigcirc$  an outbreak of disease  $\bigcirc$  Showers are local outbreaks of precipitation from detached cumulus or cumulonimbus.

**outbreeding** noun 1. breeding between individuals that are not related 2. fertilisation between two or more separate plants, rather than within a flower or between flowers of the same plant  $\bigcirc$  *Outbreeding occurs in broad beans.*  $\blacktriangleright$  compare inbreeding

**outcompete** *verb* to be more successful than other organisms of the same or different species in obtaining access to the same limited resources such as food, light or a mate

**outcrop** noun an area of rock that stands out above the surface of the soil  $\blacksquare$  verb (of rock) to stand out above the surface of the soil

**outer** adjective furthest away from the centre  $\bigcirc$  The outer coating of the seed is very hard.

**outer suburbs** *noun* a residential part of a town, a long way from the centre, but still within the built-up area

**outfall** noun a pipe from which sewage, either raw or treated, flows into a river, lake or the sea. Also called **outfall sewer** 

**outflow** noun a flow in an outward direction  $\bigcirc$  *The outflow valve is controlled by the cabin pressure controller.* 

outgrowth noun something that is growing from a main part

**outlet** noun a passage or pipe through which something can leave  $\bigcirc a$  water outlet **outlier** noun 1, an organism that occurs

aturally some distance away from the principal area in which its species is found **2**. an area in which younger rocks are completely surrounded by older rocks

**outline** noun **1**. a summary  $\bigcirc$  an outline of the latest research results **2**. a line that shows the external shape of something  $\bigcirc$ The drawing shows the outline of the coast.  $\blacksquare$  verb to form or draw round the shape of something  $\bigcirc$  The additional material is outlined in red.

**outline planning permission** *noun* permission in principle to build a property on a piece of land, but not the final approval because further details must be submitted

**output** noun the product of a process  $\bigcirc$  *Air density will affect the output of the engine.* 

**outwash** *noun* the water which flows from a melting glacier and creates deposits of silt

outwash deposit, outwash fan noun a silt deposit formed by a melting glacier ova plural of ovum

**ovary** *noun* **1.** one of two organs in a woman or female animal that produce ova or egg cells and secrete the female hormone oestrogen **2.** the part of a flower that contains the ovules, at the base of a carpel

over- prefix 1. above 2. excessively

**overburden** *noun* **1**. in strip mining, the soil and rock lying on top of a layer of coal **2**. a mineral which is dug away from the surface of the land to expose the coal or mineral below

**overcropping** *noun* the practice of growing too many crops on poor soil, which has the effect of greatly reducing soil fertility

**overcultivated** *adjective* referring to land that has been too intensively cultivated and has reduced fertility

**overexploit** *verb* **1**. to work mineral deposits or use other resources in an uncontrolled way until there is very little left **2**. to cultivate soil too intensely

**overexploitation** *noun* the uncontrolled use of natural resources until there is very little left  $\bigcirc$  *Overexploitation has reduced herring stocks by half.* 

**overfertilisation** *noun* the application of too much fertiliser to land (NOTE: Excess fertiliser draining from fields can cause pollution of the water in rivers and lakes.)

**overfish** *verb* to catch so many fish that the fish do not reproduce quickly enough and become rare

**overfishing** *noun* the practice of catching so many fish that the fish do not reproduce quickly enough and become rare  $\bigcirc$  *Herring stocks have been reduced by overfishing.* 

**overflow** noun excess liquid that flows over the edge of a container  $\blacksquare$  verb to flow over the edge of a container  $\bigcirc$  The floods made the reservoir overflow.  $\bigcirc$  The river overflowed its banks and flooded hundred of hectares of farmland.

**overgraze** *verb* to graze a pasture so much that it loses nutrients and is no longer able enough to provide food for livestock

**overgrazing** noun the practice of grazing a pasture so much that it loses nutrients and is no longer able to provide food for livestock  $\bigcirc$  Overgrazing has led to soil erosion and desertification. **overland flow** *noun* a movement of rainwater or water melting from snow or ice over the surface of the ground in a broad thin layer

**overnutrition** *noun* **1**. the eating of too much food, or food containing too many calories **2**. same as **eutrophication** 

**overpopulate** *verb* to increase the population of a place so much that available space, food, water or other resources are not adequate to support it

**overpopulated** *adjective* referring to a place containing too large a population to be adequately supported by the available resources

**overproduction** *noun* the production of more of something than is wanted or needed

**overshot wheel** *noun* a type of waterwheel where the water falls on the wheel from above. It is more efficient than an undershot wheel, where the water flows underneath the wheel.

**overstorey** *noun* the topmost vegetation layer in a forest, formed by the tallest trees. Also called **overwood** 

**OVERUSE** noun the excessive use of something  $\bigcirc$  The overuse of pesticides is contaminating the rivers.  $\blacksquare$  verb to use something too much  $\bigcirc$  Farmers are warned against overusing synthetic fertilisers.

**overwinter** verb **1.** to spend winter in a particular place  $\bigcirc$  *The herds overwinter on the southern plains.* **2.** to remain alive though the winter  $\bigcirc$  *Many plants will not overwinter in areas that have frost.* 

overwood noun same as overstorey

**ovicide** *noun* a substance, especially an insecticide, that kills eggs

**oviparous** *adjective* referring to an animal that carries and lays eggs. Compare **viviparous** 

**ovule** *noun* an immature egg or an unfertilised seed

**ovum** *noun* a female egg cell which, when fertilised by a spermatozoon, begins to develop into an embryo (NOTE: The plural is **ova**.)

**ox-bow lake** *noun* a curved lake formed when a large curve of a river becomes cut off from the main body of the river by silt

oxidant noun same as oxidising agent

**oxidation** *noun* a chemical reaction in which a substance combines with oxygen with loss of electrons

**oxidation ditch**, **oxidation pond** *noun* a ditch or pond where sewage is purified by

allowing biochemical reactions to take place in it over a period of time

**oxidation-reduction** *noun* a reversible chemical reaction between two substances where one is oxidised and the other is reduced

**oxide** *noun* a chemical compound of oxygen

**Oxidise**, **oxidize** *verb* to form an oxide by the reaction of oxygen with another chemical substance  $\bigcirc$  *Over a period of time, the metal is oxidised by contact with air.* 

**oxidising agent** *noun* a substance that forms an oxide with another substance. Also called **oxidant** 

**oxidising atmosphere** *noun* a mixture of gases that contains oxygen and converts elements into oxides through chemical reactions

**oxychlorination** *noun* the process of neutralising bacteria in water intended for drinking

**oxygen** noun a colourless, odourless gas, essential to human life, constituting 21% by volume of the Earth's atmosphere  $\bigcirc$  Our bodies obtain oxygen through the lungs in respiration. (NOTE: The chemical symbol is O; the atomic number is 8 and the atomic weight is 16.00.)

oxygenate verb to become filled with oxygen

**oxygenation** *noun* the process of becoming filled with oxygen

**OZONE** noun poisonous form of oxygen found naturally in the atmosphere, which is toxic to humans at concentrations above 0.1 parts per million. Formula:  $O_3$ .

**ozone-depleting substance** *noun* a substance that is known to have unfavourable effects on the ozone layer in the atmosphere. Abbr **ODS** 

**ozone depletion** *noun* the loss of ozone from the atmosphere

**ozone-depletion potential, ozonedepleting potential** *noun* a measurement of the effect of a substance on reducing the amount of ozone in the atmosphere. Abbr **ODP** 

**ozone-friendly** *adjective* not harmful to the ozone layer in the atmosphere

**ozone hole** *noun* a thin part in the ozone layer in the atmosphere, which forms over Antarctica each year at the end of winter

**ozone layer** *noun* the layer of ozone in the atmosphere between 20 and 50km above the surface of the Earth. Also called **ozonosphere** 

#### ozone monitoring device

COMMENT: The ozone layer in the stratosphere acts as a protection against the harmful effects of the Sun's radiation, and the destruction or reduction of the layer has the effect of allowing more radiation to pass through the atmosphere with harmful results such as skin cancer in humans. The first ozone hole was detected over Antarctica.

**ozone monitoring device** *noun* a device which measures the levels of ozone in the atmosphere

**ozone precursor** *noun* a chemical which contributes to the formation of ozone, e.g. nitrogen oxide

ozonosphere noun same as ozone layer

#### P symbol phosphorus

**pack** *noun* a group of predatory animals which live and hunt together (NOTE: **Pack** is especially used of animals of the dog family such as wolves, but also of other animals such as killer whales.)

**package** noun **1**. an object or set of objects wrapped in a covering **2**. a group of different items brought together  $\bigcirc$  a package of measures designed to reduce consumption

**packaged** *adjective* referring to items wrapped in a covering

**packaging** *noun* the set of coverings used to wrap an object, especially a product that is going to be transported, displayed and sold (NOTE: Packaging may be paper, cardboard, plastic, polystyrene or some other material.)

**packaging material** noun a type of covering such as paper or plastic used to wrap an object, especially a product that is going to be transported, displayed and sold  $\bigcirc$  Many of the packaging materials we used to throw away may now be re-used or recycled to save energy and raw materials.

**packaging waste** noun material such as paper or plastic used as packaging that is thrown away

COMMENT: In the European Union, member states must have systems for the return and/or collection of used packaging to attain the following targets: recovery 50% to 60% and recycling 25% to 45%, with a minimum of 15% by weight for each packaging material. There are also requirements covering the composition and the re-use, recovery and recycling of packaging.

**paddy, padi** noun a rice crop growing in shallow water  $\bigcirc$  Paddies can be breeding grounds for mosquitoes.

**paddy field** noun a field filled with shallow water, in which rice is grown  $\bigcirc$  It is thought that paddy fields may contribute to the methane in the atmosphere.

**PAH** *abbr* polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbon

**paint** noun a liquid substance put on a surface to give it colour or to protect it  $\bigcirc$  Antifouling paint used on ships' hulls kills marine organisms.

**Palaearctic Region** *noun* a biogeographical region, part of Arctogea covering Europe, North Asia and North Africa

**palaeo-** *prefix* ancient or prehistoric (NOTE: The US spelling is **paleo-**.)

**palaeoecology** *noun* the study of the ecology of fossils

**palaeomagnetism** *noun* the study of the magnetism of ancient rocks

**palm** noun a large tropical plant like a tree with branching divided leaves, that produces fruits which give oil and other foodstuffs

**palmate** *adjective* referring to leaves that split from a central part like the fingers on a hand. Also called **digitate** 

**palm oil** *noun* an edible oil produced from the seed or fruit of an oil palm

**paludal** *adjective* relating to or living in swamps or marshes

**palynology** *noun* the scientific study of pollen, especially of pollen found in peat and coal deposits. Also called **pollen analysis** 

**pampas** *noun* a wide area of grassy plains found in South America

PAN abbr peroxyacetyl nitrate

**pan-** *prefix* affecting everything or everywhere

**pandemic** adjective, noun referring to an epidemic disease which affects many parts of the world.  $\Diamond$  endemic, epidemic

**panemone** noun a type of windmill in which flat surfaces spin round a vertical axis

**panicle** *noun* a flower head (**inflorescence**) with many branches that carry small flowers, e.g. the flower head of a rice plant

**paper** noun a substance made from the pulp of wood, rags or fibre rolled flat into sheets, used for writing on, printing, wrapping objects and other purposes

para- prefix 1. similar to 2. changed or beyond

**paraben** noun a chemical used in toiletries and as a food preservative (NOTE: It is reported as a possible cause of reproductive or developmental problems because its action is similar to that of the hormone oestrogen.)

**paraffin** *noun* **1**. a saturated aliphatic hydrocarbon **2**. same as **paraffin oil** 

**paraffin oil** *noun* oil produced from petroleum, used as a fuel in aircraft engines, for domestic heating and lighting, and as a solvent. Also called **paraffin**

parapatric speciation noun the development of new species in areas which are next to each other and so not completely isolated

**paraquat** *noun* a herbicide that destroys a wide range of plants by killing their foliage and becomes inert on contact with the soil

**parasite** noun a plant or animal which lives on or inside another organism, the host, and derives its nourishment and other needs from it  $\bigcirc$  a water-borne parasite

**parasitic** *adjective* referring to animal or plant parasites  $\bigcirc$  *a parasitic worm*  $\bigcirc$  *Dodder is a parasitic plant.* 

**parasiticide** *noun* a substance that kills parasites

**parasitise**, parasitize verb to live as a parasite on another organism  $\bigcirc$  Sheep are parasitised by flukes.

**parasitism** *noun* a state in which one organism, the parasite, lives on or inside another organism, the host, and derives its nourishment and other needs from it

**parasitoid** *noun* an organism that is a parasite only at one stage in its development

**parasitoidism** *noun* the state of being a parasite only at one stage of development, as when an insect lays eggs inside the body of a host

parasitology noun the scientific study of parasites

**parcel** *noun* **1**. a package **2**. a plot of land **3**. a quantity of wood, either growing in a forest or cut down, which is sold

**parent** *noun* a male or female that has produced offspring

parent rock noun same as mother rock

**park** *noun* an area of open land used as a place of recreation

**parkland** *noun* grazed grassland or heathland with large individual trees or small groups of large trees, usually part of a designed and managed landscape

**parthenocarpy** *noun* the production of seedless fruits without fertilisation having taken place

**parthenogenesis** *noun* a form of reproduction in which an unfertilised ovum develops into an individual

**particle** noun **1**. a very small piece of a substance  $\bigcirc$  soil particles  $\bigcirc$  Particles of volcanic ash were carried into the upper atmosphere. **2.**  $\blacklozenge$  elementary particle

**particulate** *adjective* made up of separate particles **■** *noun* a tiny solid piece of a substance

COMMENT: The finest particulates in the air are the most dangerous pollutants as they are easily inhaled into the bronchioles in the lungs. Fine particulates from volcanic eruptions can enter the stratosphere and have a cooling effect by preventing the heat from the Sun reaching the Earth's surface, i.e. the opposite of the greenhouse effect.

**particulate matter** *noun* any matter in the atmosphere except water, including dust particles, pollen or particles produced by internal combustion engines. Abbr **PM** 

**parts per billion** *noun* a measure of the concentration of a substance in a gas, liquid or solid. Abbr **ppb** 

**parts per million** *noun* a measure of the concentration of a substance in a gas, liquid or solid. Abbr **ppm** 

**passage** *noun* **1**. a long narrow channel or corridor **2**. a movement from one place to another

**passerine** *noun* a bird belonging to an order of birds which typically come to rest on branches. Order: Passeriformes. ■ *adjective* referring to a passerine

**passive** *adjective* not actively participating. Opposite **active** 

**passive smoking** *noun* a situation in which someone breathes in tobacco smoke from the atmosphere around them. This process may cause lung cancer.

**pastoral** *adjective* **1**. referring to agriculture based on grazing animals **2**. referring to land available for pasture

**pastoralist** noun a farmer who keeps grazing animals on pasture  $\bigcirc$  The people most affected by the drought in the Sahara are nomadic pastoralists.

**patch dynamics** *noun* a process in which the disturbance of a community creates gaps which are then colonised by the same or another species

**path** noun **1**. a way from one place to another, especially one travelled on foot. ◊ **bridle path, cycle path, footpath 2**. a way to achieve something

pathogen noun an agent, usually a microorganism, that causes a disease

pathogenesis *noun* the origin, production or development of a disease

pathogenetic adjective referring to pathogenesis

pathogenic adjective able to cause or produce a disease

pathogenicity noun the ability of a pathogen to cause a disease

pathogenic organism noun an organism responsible for causing a disease **pathological** *adjective* **1**. referring to a disease **2**. caused by a disease **3**. indicating a disease

**pathologist** *noun* **1**. a scientist who specialises in the study of diseases **2**. a person who checks tissue and other samples for evidence of disease **3**. a doctor who examines dead bodies to find out the cause of death

**pathology** *noun* the study of diseases and the changes in structure and function which diseases can cause

**pathway** *noun* **1**. a path, especially a footpath, or a route **2**. the route by which a contaminant can reach a receptor and cause harm

**peak** noun **1**. the top of a mountain **2**. the highest point of something  $\bigcirc$  *The intensity of solar radiation reaches a peak around noon.* 

**peak average** *noun* the average of all the highest points on a graph or in a series of figures

**peak traffic** noun the largest number of vehicles that travel in an area within a specific period  $\bigcirc$  The hours of peak traffic at the junction are 8–9 a.m. and 5–7 p.m.

**peasouper** noun a type of thick dark yellow fog caused by sulfur particles from burning coal, formerly common in the winter time in London before the 1960s (*informal*)

**peat** noun the accumulated partly decayed mosses and other plants which form the soil of a bog, often forming a deep layer (NOTE: Peat was used as a fuel in some areas and was widely used in gardens to improve the texture of the soil or mixed with soil or other materials to grow plants in pots. These practices are now discouraged in order to prevent the overuse of peat bogs.)

**peat bog** *noun* an area of wet acidic land, low in nutrients, in which peat has formed

**peat-free** *adjective* referring to material that does not contain peat

**peat-free compost** noun material in which plants can be grown in pots that does not contain peat  $\bigcirc$  Coir fibre from coconut shells can be used as a peat-free compost.

**peneplain** *noun* a plain formed after mountains have been completely eroded

**peninsula** *noun* a long narrow piece of land, surrounded on three sides by sea

**pentad** *noun* a five-day period (NOTE: This term is used especially in meteorological forecasting and recording.)

**per** preposition for each or every  $\bigcirc$  the recommended daily dose per person **perceived noise level** *noun* a measurement of the loudness of a sound as heard by the human ear. Abbr **PNL** 

perceived noise level in decibels *noun* a measurement of sound pressure in decibels. Abbr **PNdB** 

**percentage** noun **1**. the proportion or rate equivalent to a total divided by a hundred  $\bigcirc$  Some 20% of infected plants died, a much higher percentage than expected. **2**. an inexact proportion or amount  $\bigcirc$  Developing countries possess the largest percentage of the world's rainforest.

**percentile** *noun* one of a series of 99 figures below which a particular percentage of the total falls

**percolate** *verb* to move slowly through a quantity of solid particles  $\bigcirc$  *Water percolates through the soil.* 

**perennial** adjective lasting for many years ■ noun a plant that lives for a long time, flowering each year without dying. ¢ annual, biennial (NOTE: In herbaceous perennials the parts above ground die back in winter, but the plant persists under the ground and produces new shoots in the spring. In woody perennials, permanent stems remain above the ground in the winter.)

**perfluorocarbons** *plural noun* a group of synthetic chemical compounds that are potent greenhouse gases. Abbr **PFCs** 

**perform** verb to carry out an action or role  $\bigcirc$  to perform a biological experiment  $\bigcirc$  The kidneys perform the function of eliminating nitrogenous waste.

**perianth** *noun* the outer parts of a flower, made up of a calyx, corolla or both

**pericarp** *noun* the part of a fruit that encloses the seed or seeds

**period** noun **1.** a length of time  $\bigcirc a \ 24$ hour period  $\bigcirc a$  period of 3 minutes **2.** an interval of geological time, the subdivision of an era and itself divided into epochs  $\bigcirc$ the Cretaceous period

**periodic** adjective happening from time to time  $\bigcirc$  a periodic review of the company's performance

**periphyton** *noun* a dense mass of strands of algal growth that covers the water surface between emerging aquatic plants

peri-urban adjective on the edge of a built-up area

**permaculture** *noun* a system of permanent agriculture, which involves carefully designing human habitats and food production systems

**permafrost** *noun* ground that is permanently frozen, as in the Arctic regions (NOTE: Although the top layer of soil melts and softens in the summer the soil beneath remains frozen.)

permanent adjective lasting or remaining without change

permanent grassland, permanent pasture *noun* land that remains as grassland for a long time and is not ploughed

**permeability** *noun* **1**. the ability of a rock to allow water to pass through it **2**. the ability of a membrane to allow fluid or chemical substances to pass through it

**permeable** *adjective* with a degree of permeability (NOTE: The US term is **pervious**.)

**peroxyacetyl nitrate** *noun* a substance contained in photochemical smog, which is extremely harmful to plants. Abbr **PAN** 

**persist** verb 1. to continue to exist  $\bigcirc$ Snow cover tends to persist on north-facing slopes of mountains. 2. (of a chemical compound) to remain active without breaking down in the environment for a period of time  $\bigcirc$  The chemical persists in the soil. 3. (of a plant) to grow for several seasons

**persistence** noun **1**. the ability to persist O The persistence and movement of cols is governed by the movement of the adjacent pressure systems. **2**. the ability of a chemical to remain active without breaking down in the environment for a period of time **3**. (of a plant) the ability to grow for several seasons

**pesticide** *noun* a chemical compound used to kill pests such as insects, other animals, fungi or weeds

**pesticide residue** *noun* the amount of a pesticide that remains in the environment after application

**Pesticides Trust** *noun* a group that works to minimise and eventually eliminate the hazards of pesticides

**pesticide tax** *noun* a proposed tax to restrict the use of pesticides

**PET** *abbr* polyethylene terephthalate

**petal** noun a single part of the corolla of a flower  $\bigcirc A$  buttercup flower has yellow petals.

petiole noun the stalk of a leaf

**petrifaction** *noun* the process of turning a substance into stone

**petrify** *verb* to turn a substance into stone **petrochemical** *noun* a chemical derived from petroleum or natural gas

**petrochemistry** *noun* **1**. the scientific study of the chemical composition of petroleum and substances derived from it **2**. the scientific study of the chemical composition of rocks

**petrol** noun a liquid made from petroleum, used as a fuel in internal combustion engines  $\bigcirc$  We are looking for a car with a low petrol consumption. (NOTE: The US term is **gasoline**.)

**petroleum** *noun* oil that is extracted from the ground

**petrology** *noun* the study of rocks and minerals (NOTE: Petrology has no direct connection with **petrol**.)

**PFA** *abbr* pulverised fuel ash

**PFBC** *abbr* pressurised fluidised-bed combustion

PFCs abbr perfluorocarbons

**pH** noun a measure of the acidity of a solution, determined as the negative logarithm of the hydrogen ion concentration, on a scale from 0 to  $14 \circ soil pH$  (NOTE: A pH less than 7 is acid, and a pH more than 7 is alkaline.)

**phalanx** *noun* a plant species that invades a community as a dense mass. Compare guerrilla

**phase** noun a stage or part of a larger process  $\bigcirc$  the vegetative phase  $\bigcirc$  A result may occur during any phase of the experiment.

**phenology** *noun* the effect of climate on annually recurring phenomena such as animal migration or plant flowering **phenomenon** noun an event that exists and is experienced  $\bigcirc$  Chemical reactions in the atmosphere generate phenomena such as acid rain and photochemical smog. (NOTE: The plural is **phenomena**.)

**phenotype** *noun* the physical characteristics of an organism, produced by its genes. Compare **genotype** 

phenotypic adjective relating to a phenotype

**phenotypic plasticity** *noun* the ability of a phenotype to vary as a result of environmental influences on its genetic makeup

**pheromone** noun a chemical substance produced and released into the environment by an animal, influencing the behaviour of another individual of the same species  $\bigcirc$ *Some insects produce pheromones to attract mates.*

**phosphate** *noun* a salt of phosphoric acid which is formed naturally by weathering of rocks (NOTE: It is an essential plant nutrient.)

COMMENT: Natural organic phosphates are provided by guano and fishmeal, otherwise phosphates are mined. Artificially produced phosphates are used in agriculture and are known as superphosphates because they are highly concentrated. Phosphates escape into water from sewage, especially waste water containing detergents, and encourage the growth of algae by eutrophication.

phosphorous adjective containing phosphorus

**phosphorus** *noun* a chemical element that is essential to biological life (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **P**; the atomic number is **15** and the atomic weight is **30.97**.)

**photochemical oxidant** *noun* a substance which is produced by a chemical reaction with light, e.g. ozone

**photochemical pollution** *noun* pollution caused by the action of light on chemicals in the lower atmosphere

COMMENT: When the atmosphere near ground level is polluted with nitrogen oxides from burning fossil fuels together with hydrocarbons, ultraviolet light from the Sun sets off a series of reactions that result in photochemical pollution, containing, among other substances, ozone.

photochemical reaction noun a chemical reaction started by the absorption of light (NOTE: Photosynthesis and photochemical smog are examples of such a reaction.)

**photochemical smog** *noun* air pollution caused by the effect of strong sunlight on nitrogen dioxide and hydrocarbons emitted by motor vehicles, creating a harmful haze of minute droplets in the air

**photochemistry** *noun* the study of chemical changes brought about by light and other forms of radiation

photoconverter noun a device that converts energy from light into electric energy photodecomposition noun the break-

ing down of a substance by the action of light

**photoelectric cell** *noun* a cell in which light falling on the cell is converted to electricity. Also called **photocell** 

**photogenic** *adjective* **1**. produced by the action of light **2**. referring to an organism producing light

**photolysis** *noun* the breakdown of a chemical by light or other electromagnetic radiation

photonastic adjective referring to photonasty

**photonasty** *noun* a response of plants to light without movement towards the light source.  $\Diamond$  **phototaxis** 

**photo-oxidant** *noun* a chemical compound produced by the action of sunlight on nitrogen oxides and hydrocarbons

**photo-oxidation** *noun* a change in the chemical constitution of a compound by the

## photoperiod

action of sunlight  $\bigcirc$  *Photo-oxidation* breaks down polluted air and converts the gases to sulfur dioxide.

**photoperiod** noun the period in every 24 hours when an organism is exposed to daylight  $\bigcirc$  Short-day plants require a photoperiod of less than 12 hours for flowering. (NOTE: Photoperiod has an effect on activities such as flowering and mating.)

**photoperiodicity** *noun* the degree to which plants and animals react to changes in the length of the period of daylight from summer to winter

**photoperiodism** *noun* the response of an organism in its growth and behaviour to the amount of daylight it receives in every 24 hours

**photophilic, photophilous** *adjective* referring to an organism that grows best in strong light

photorespiration noun a reaction that occurs in plants, alongside photosynthesis, in which the plant fixes oxygen from the air and loses carbon dioxide (NOTE: Photorespiration reduces the production of sugars by photosynthesis. Some crop plants have been bred to reduce their photorespiration rate.)

**photosensitive** *adjective* **1**. sensitive to light **2**. stimulated by light

**photosensitivity** *noun* the state of being sensitive to or stimulated by light

**photosynthesis** *noun* the process by which green plants convert carbon dioxide and water into sugar and oxygen using sunlight as energy

**photosynthesise**, **photosynthesize** *verb* to carry out photosynthesis  $\bigcirc$  *Acid rain falling on trees reduces their ability to photosynthesise*.

photosynthetic *adjective* referring to photosynthesis

**photosynthetic capacity** *noun* the calculation of the efficiency of conversion of solar energy by photosynthesis

**phototaxis** *noun* a movement of all or part of an organism in response to light either towards or away from it

**phototroph** *noun* an organism that obtains its energy from sunlight. Compare **chemotroph** 

**phototrophic** *adjective* obtaining energy from sunlight. Compare **chemotrophic** (NOTE: Plants are phototrophic.)

**phototropic** *adjective* referring to a plant or a cell that turns or grows towards or away from light **phototropism** *noun* the response of plants or cells to light by turning or growing towards or away from it (NOTE: Most plant shoots show positive phototropism, i.e. they grow towards the light.)

**photovoltaic** *adjective* converting the energy from electromagnetic radiation such as light into electricity

photovoltaic cell, photovoltaic panel noun a device that converts the energy from light into electricity. Also called photovoltaic, photovoltaic panel (NOTE: As light strikes the cell the electrons in it become mobile and create electricity.)

**phreatic** *adjective* referring to the water table

**phreatophyte** *noun* a plant whose roots go down into the water table

**phthalate** *noun* a chemical compound used to soften plastics and in many toiletries (NOTE: It is reported as a possible cause of reproductive or developmental problems because its action is similar to that of the hormone oestrogen.)

phycology noun the scientific study of algae

**phylogenesis**, **phylogeny** *noun* the evolutionary history of an organism or group of organisms

**phylum** *noun* a major subdivision in the classification of organisms, below kingdom (NOTE: The plural is **phyla**.)

**physical** *adjective* **1.** referring to matter and energy or the sciences dealing with them, especially physics **2.** referring to the body rather than the mind  $\bigcirc$  *physical discomfort*  $\bigcirc$  *describe its physical appearance* **3.** being touched or able to be touched or felt  $\bigcirc$  *physical contact* 

**physics** *noun* the scientific study of matter, including electricity, radiation, magnetism and other phenomena that do not change the chemical composition of matter **physio-** *prefix* physiology

physiological adjective referring to physiology

**physiological ecology** *noun* the study of the physiology of an individual and the effects on function and behaviour in its habitat

**physiological specialisation** *noun* a phenomenon whereby some members of a population look identical but differ biochemically

**phytochemistry** *noun* the study of the chemistry of substances found in plants

**phytochrome** *noun* a pigment molecule in plants which is sensitive to slight changes in day length and controls the plant's growth timetable

**phytoextraction** *noun* the absorption by plants of metal contaminants through their roots and subsequent storage in their upper parts, allowing the decontamination of land. Also called **phytoaccumulation** 

**phytogeography** *noun* the study of plants and their geographical distribution **phytome** *noun* a plant community

**phytonutrient** *noun* a substance in plants that is beneficial to human health, e.g. a vitamin or antioxidant

**phytophagous** *adjective* referring to an animal that eats plants

**phytoplankter** *noun* a single microscopic plant that floats in the sea or in a lake

**phytoplankton** *plural noun* microscopic plants that float in the sea or in a lake (NOTE: Phytoplankton, formed mainly of diatoms and using the sunlight in the surface layers of the water to photosynthesise, are the basis of the food chain of almost all aquatic animals.)

**phytoplankton bloom** *noun* a large mass of plankton that develops regularly at different periods of the year and floats on the surface of the sea or of a lake

phytoplanktonic adjective referring to phytoplankton

**phytoremediation** *noun* the decontamination of land by growing plants to absorb heavy metals or other soil contaminants

**phytosociology** *noun* the branch of ecology concerned with the identification, analysis, and classification of the species composition of plant communities or plant associations

**pine cone** *noun* a hard scaly structure bearing the seeds of a pine tree

**pine forest** *noun* a large wooded area containing mainly pines

pine tree noun same as pine

**plain** *noun* a level area of land with few trees ■ *plural noun* **plains** a large area of flat country with few trees, especially in the middle of North America

**plane** *noun* a deciduous hardwood tree, frequently grown in towns because of its resistance to air pollution. Genus: *Platanus*.

**planet** *noun* a large body in the solar system, e.g. Earth, Mars or Mercury

COMMENT: Plastics are moulded by heating a substance under pressure and they retain their shape after being formed. Thermoplastics are heated while being shaped and can be heated and shaped again for re-use. Thermosetting plastics are heated while being shaped but cannot be reheated for recycling. Waste plastics containing chlorine can produce hydrogen chloride when incinerated. Plastics formed from ethylene or propylene (i.e. polyethylene and polypropylene) are not degradable and must be recycled or destroyed by incineration.

**plastic foam** *noun* same as **foam plastic plasticiser**, **plasticizer** *noun* a substance, usually a synthetic organic chemical, that is added to a material to make it more flexible

**Pleistocene**, **Pleistocene** epoch noun the period in the Earth's evolution that lasted until about ten thousand years ago, including the main Ice Ages

**plough** noun an agricultural implement used to turn over the surface of the soil in order to cultivate crops ■ *verb* to turn over the soil with a plough (NOTE: [all senses] The US spelling is **plow**.)

**plug** *noun* a round block of igneous rock forming the central vent of an old volcanic opening

**plumbism** *noun* lead poisoning caused by taking in lead salts

**plume** noun **1**. a tall cloud of smoke or gas escaping from a factory chimney  $\bigcirc$  a gas plume **2**. a tall cloud of smoke or gas escaping from a volcano **3**. a long expanse of pollution in ground water or an aquifer **4**. a cloud of powdered snow blowing from a mountain crest **5**. a large feather

**plumule** *noun* the tiny structure in a plant embryo from which a shoot will develop

**plutonium** *noun* a toxic and carcinogenic radioactive element extracted from uranium ore (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Pu**; the atomic number is **94** and the atomic weight is **244**.)

**PNdB** *abbr* perceived noise level in decibels

**pneum-** *prefix* same as **pneumo-** (NOTE: used before vowels)

**pneumatophore** *noun* a root growing down from a branch in plants such as mangrove growing in wet ground

**pneumo-** *prefix* air, the lungs or breathing **pneumoconiosis** *noun* a lung disease in which fibrous tissue forms in the lungs because the patient has inhaled particles of stone or dust over a long period

PNL abbr perceived noise level

Po symbol polonium

**Poaceae** noun a very large family of plants, the grasses, including bamboo and cereals such as wheat and maize. Former name **Gramineae** 

**poach** *verb* to catch animals, birds or fish illegally on someone else's land

**poacher** noun a person who catches animals, birds or fish illegally on someone else's land

**poaching** *noun* the illegal activity catching animals, birds or fish on someone else's land

**pod** *noun* **1**. a container for several seeds, e.g. a pea pod or bean pod **2**. a small group of whales, dolphins, or seals

**poison** noun a substance which can kill or harm a person or animal when eaten, drunk, breathed in or touched ■ verb to expose an organism to a poison  $\bigcirc$  They were poisoned by toxic fumes.

**polar** *adjective* referring to the North Pole or South Pole  $\bigcirc$  *polar air*  $\bigcirc$  *a polar region* 

**polar ice cap** *noun* a large area of thick ice covering the regions around the North or South Pole, which is slowly disappearing as the Earth warms

**polder** noun a piece of low-lying land which has been reclaimed from the sea and is surrounded by earth banks, especially in the Netherlands

political adjective concerning politics

**politician** *noun* a person actively involved in politics, especially a member of a parliament or assembly

**pollard** noun a tree of which the branches have been cut back to a height of about 2 m above the ground  $\blacksquare$  *verb* to cut back the branches on a tree every year or every few years to a height of about 2 m above the ground. Compare **coppice** 

**pollen** *noun* the mass of small grains in the anthers of flowers which contain the male gametes

pollen analysis noun same as palynology

**pollen count** *noun* a measurement of the amount of pollen in a sample of air (NOTE: A high pollen count is bad for people who have hay fever.)

**pollinate** *verb* to transfer pollen from anther to stigma in a flower

**pollination** *noun* the action of pollinating a flower (NOTE: There is no English noun 'pollinisation'.)

**pollinator** noun **1.** an organism which helps pollinate a plant, e.g. a bee or bird  $\bigcirc$ *Some apple trees need to be planted with pollinators as they are not self-fertile.*  $\bigcirc$ *Birds are pollinators for many types of tropical plant.* **2.** a plant from which pollen is transferred by bees to pollinate another plant, especially a fruit tree, that is not selffertile  $\bigcirc$  *Some apple and pear trees need to be planted with pollinators.*

**polybrominated biphenyl** noun a highly toxic aromatic compound containing benzene and bromine. It is used in plastics, electrical equipment and fire-retardant materials and is either banned or very restricted in use in many countries. Abbr **PBB** 

polychlorinated biphenyl, polychlorobiphenyl *noun* one of a group of compounds produced by chlorination of biphenyl. Abbr **PCB** 

COMMENT: PCBs are stable compounds and formerly were extensively used in electrical fittings and paints. Although they are no longer manufactured they are extremely persistent and remain in large quantities in landfill sites. They are not water-soluble and float on the surface of water where they are eaten by aquatic animals and so enter the food chain. PCBs are fat-soluble, and are therefore easy to take into the system, but difficult to excrete.

**polycondensed plastic** *noun* a type of plastic which can be recycled, e.g. nylon **polycrystalline silicon** *noun* silicon used to manufacture photovoltaic panels **polyculture** *noun* the rearing or growing of more than one species of plant or animal on the same area of land at the same time

**polyphagous** *adjective* referring to an organism that eats more than one type of food  $\bigcirc$  *a polyphagous animal* Compare **monophagous** 

**polyphagy** *noun* the practice of eating more than one type of food. Compare **monophagy** 

**polypropylene** noun a type of plastic used to make artificial fibres, bottles, pipes, and other articles, which is not degradable and must be recycled or destroyed by incineration

**polysaprobe** *noun* an organism which can survive in heavily polluted water

**polysaprobic** *adjective* referring to organisms that can survive in heavily polluted water

**polystyrene** noun a type of plastic which can be made into hard lightweight foam by blowing air or gas into it, used as an insulating and packaging material

**polythene** *noun* a type of plastic used to make artificial fibres, packaging, boxes and other articles. Also called **polyethylene** 

polyvinyl chloride noun full form of PVC

**pome** *noun* a fruit with a core containing the seeds enclosed in a fleshy part that develops from the receptacle of a flower and not from the ovary (NOTE: The fruit of apples and pears are pomes.)

**pomology** *noun* the study of fruit cultivation

**pond** *noun* **1**. a small area of still water formed artificially or naturally. ◊ **dew pond 2**. an open storage area for liquids used in industrial processes

**pond life** *noun* the community of organisms that live in a pond

**pond scum** *noun* a layer of green freshwater algae on the surface of stagnant water

**pondweed** *noun* a small plant that grows in a pond

**pool** *noun* **1.** a small area of still water, especially one formed naturally **2.** an area of oil or gas which collects in porous sedimentary rock **3.** a group or combination of things or people.  $\Diamond$  **gene pool** 

**POP** *abbr* persistent organic pollutant

**populate** verb to fill an area with organisms  $\bigcirc$  Starlings soon populated the whole eastern seaboard of the USA.

**population** noun **1.** a number of people living in a country or town  $\bigcirc$  The government has decided to screen the whole population of the area.  $\bigcirc$  Population growth is a major threat to conservation efforts. **2.** a number of individuals of the same species living and breeding in a specific area  $\bigcirc$  The fish population has been severely reduced.

**population age structure** *noun* the numbers of individuals of each age in a population

**population change** *noun* the change in a population caused by births and deaths

**potash** *noun* any potassium salt (NOTE: Potash salts are crude minerals and contain much sodium chloride.)

**potash fertiliser** *noun* a fertiliser based on potassium, e.g. potassium sulfate

**potassium** *noun* a soft metallic element, essential to biological life (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **K**; the atomic number is **19** and the atomic weight is **39.10**.)

**potent** *adjective* having a strong effect  $\bigcirc$  *a potent drug* 

**potential evapotranspiration rate** *noun* the amount of water transpired from a site assuming that there is no soil water limitation and complete vegetation cover

**potentially renewable resources** *plural noun* resources that could be replaced by natural environmental processes if they are depleted

**potentiate** verb (of two substances) to increase each other's toxic effects

**potentiation** *noun* the degree of probable increased damage caused by the combined action of toxic substances compared with their individual effects

**precipitate** *noun* the mass of solid particles that separate from a solution during a chemical reaction **ureb** to make solid dissolved particles separate from a solution

precipitation noun 1. water which falls from clouds as rain, snow or hail O Annual precipitation is high in the mountain areas.
2. the action of forming solid particles in a solution

**precipitation scavenging** *noun* the removal of particles of polluting substances from the air in the form of acid rain

precise adjective exact or accurate

**pressurised fluidised-bed combustion** *noun* an economic method of burning low-grade coal in a furnace in which air is blown upwards through the burning fuel. Abbr **PFBC** 

**pressurised water reactor** *noun* a type of nuclear reactor in which water is heated to steam under high pressure to turn turbines to generate electricity. Abbr **PWR** 

**prevailing wind** noun the wind direction that is most frequent in a specific place  $\bigcirc$  The prevailing wind is from the south.

**prevalence** noun frequency of occurrence  $\bigcirc$  the prevalence of malaria in some tropical countries  $\bigcirc$  the prevalence of cases of malnutrition in large towns

**prevalent** adjective occurring frequently  $\circ$  a fungus which is more prevalent in deciduous forests  $\circ$  The disease is prevalent in some African countries.

**prevention** *noun* an act or process of stopping something from happening

**prey** noun an animal which is killed and eaten by another  $\bigcirc$  Small mammals are the prey of owls. Opposite **predator**  $\blacksquare$  verb **prey on** to kill and eat another animal  $\bigcirc$ Water snakes prey on frogs and small fish.

**primary** *adjective* **1.** first, basic or most important **2.** being first or before something else.  $\Diamond$  **secondary, tertiary** 

primary commodity noun a basic raw material or food

**primary consumer** *noun* an animal that eats plants, which are producers in the food chain.  $\Diamond$  **secondary consumer** 

**primary forest** *noun* a forest which originally covered a region before changes in the environment brought about by human activity

primary host noun a host which a parasite settles on finally

**primary particulates** *plural noun* particles of matter sent into the air from fires, industrial processes, vehicle emissions, especially diesel, volcanic eruptions, sandstorms and similar phenomena

**protected** *adjective* referring to a species that has been legally identified as in danger of extinction, or an area of sea or land that has special value for the maintenance of biological diversity and natural resources

**protection** *noun* the act or an instance of keeping something from harm, injury or damage

**protective** *adjective* intended or able to keep something else from harm, injury or damage

**protein** *noun* a nitrogen compound formed by the condensation of amino acids that is present in and is an essential part of living cells

**province** *noun* a biogeographical area within a region that is defined by the plants and animals that inhabit it

proximal *adjective* nearer to the centre or point of attachment. Compare **distal** 

**pseudo-** *prefix* similar to something, but not the same

**pseudokarst** *noun* a terrain like karst, but not in limestone country and not due to weathering

Pt symbol platinum

**pteridophyte** *noun* a plant that does not produce flowers or seeds and reproduces by means of spores, e.g. ferns or some mosses. Division: *Pteridophyta*.

**Pu** *symbol* plutonium

**public** *adjective* concerning or available to all people in general

**public amenities** *plural noun* facilities that make the surroundings more pleasant and are open to the general public

**public amenity point** *noun* a place where people can take their household waste for recycling or safe disposal

**public domain** *noun* the condition of not being protected by copyright and available to all people in general  $\bigcirc$  *The information is now in the public domain.*

**pupate** verb (of an insect) to move from the larval to the pupal stage

**pure** adjective uncontaminated or unmixed  $\bigcirc$  Magnesium does not possess sufficient strength in its pure state for structural uses.

**purebred** *adjective* referring to an animal which is the offspring of parents which are themselves the offspring of parents of the same breed

**pure strain** *noun* a group of plants bred by self-fertilisation whose characteristics remain always the same

**purification** noun the action of making something pure or of removing impurities  $\bigcirc$  Activated sludge speeds up the process of purification.

**purify** *verb* to make something pure or remove impurities from something

**purity** *noun* the state of being pure

**putrefaction** *noun* the decomposition of dead organic substances by bacteria **putrefy** *verb* to decompose or rot

Also called **pyramid** (NOTE: The biomass at each level is about 10% of that of the level beneath.)

**pyramid of energy** *noun* a graphical representation of the amounts of energy consumed at each trophic level

**pyramid of numbers** *noun* a graphical representation of the structure of an ecosystem in terms of what eats what (NOTE: The base is composed of producer organisms, usually plants, then herbivores, then carnivores.)

**pyrethrum** *noun* an organic pesticide, developed from a form of chrysanthemum, which is not very toxic and is not persistent

**pyrite**, **pyrites** *noun* a gold-coloured form of iron sulfide. Formula: Fe<sub>2</sub>S.

pyro- prefix burning

**pyroclastic flow** *noun* the flow of lava from a volcano

**pyrolysis** *noun* the decomposition or conversion of one substance into another by heat

**quadrant** *noun* a device for measuring the height of stars, formerly used in calculating direction at sea

quadrantal adjective referring to a quarter of a circle

**quadrat** noun an area of land measuring one square metre, chosen as a sample for research on plant populations  $\bigcirc$  The vegetation of the area was sampled using quadrats.

**quake** noun same as **earthquake** (informal)

**quality assurance** *noun* the system of procedures used in checking that the quality of a product is good

**quango** *noun* a group set up by a government to investigate or deal with a specific problem. Full form **quasi-autonomous non-governmental organisation**.  $\Diamond$  **nondepartmental public body** 

**quantifiable** adjective able to be shown in figures  $\bigcirc$  The effect of the change in the waste disposal systems is not easily quantifiable.

**quantify** verb to state something as a quantity or in figures  $\bigcirc$  to quantify the effect of the new legislation on pollution levels  $\bigcirc$  The environmental benefits are difficult to quantify.

quantitative adjective referring to quantity

**quantity** noun an amount or number of items  $\bigcirc$  He bought a large quantity of spare parts.  $\square$  to carry out a quantity survey to estimate the amount of materials and the cost of the labour required for a construction project

**quarantine** *noun* the period when an animal, person, plant or ship just arrived in a country is kept separate in case it carries a serious disease, to allow the disease time to develop and so be detected **quarry** *noun* a place where rock is removed from the ground for commercial purposes **verb** to remove rock from the ground for commercial purposes

**quartile** *noun* one of three figures below which 25%, 50% and 75% of a total falls

**quartz** *noun* a mineral form of silica, often found as crystals in igneous rocks (NOTE: Pure quartz is known as rock crystal.)

**quasi-** prefix almost  $\bigcirc$  a quasi-official body

quaternary adjective consisting of four parts

**Quaternary period** *noun* the geological period which is still currently in existence

**quicklime** *noun* a calcium compound made from burnt limestone (NOTE: It is used in the composition of cement and in many industrial processes.)

quicksilver noun same as mercury

**quiescent** *adjective* **1**. referring to a volcano that is not active **2**. referring to a seed that is not germinating because the conditions for germination are unsatisfactory

**quota** noun a fixed amount of something which is allowed  $\bigcirc A$  quota has been imposed on the fishing of herring.

**race** noun a group of individuals within a species that are distinct, especially physiologically or ecologically, from other members of the species  $\Box$  **the human race** all people

**raceme** noun an inflorescence in which flowers are borne on individual stalks on a main flower stem with the youngest flowers at the top of the main stalk

**rachis** *noun* the main stem that supports an inflorescence or a compound leaf

**rad** *noun* a former unit of measurement of absorbed radiation dose.  $\Diamond$  **gray, becquerel** (NOTE: The gray is now used for 100 rad.)

**radar** *noun* a method of detecting distant objects and establishing their position, velocity or other characteristics by analysis of radio waves reflected from their surfaces.

Full form radio detection and ranging

radiant adjective sent out in the form of rays

**radiate** verb 1. to spread out in all directions from a central point 2. to send out rays  $\bigcirc$  Heat radiates from the body.  $\bigcirc$  Beta rays are radiated from a radioactive isotope.

**radiation** *noun* **1**. the process or state of spreading out in all directions from a central point **2**. the waves of energy which are given off when heat is transferred **3**. the waves of energy which are given off by a radioactive substance

radiation ionisation noun same as ionising radiation **radiation pollution** *noun* the contamination of the environment by radiation from a radioactive agent

radiation sickness noun an illness caused by exposure to a radioactive agent

**radiation zone** *noun* an area that is contaminated by radiation and which people are not allowed to enter

**radiative forcing** *noun* a change in balance between incoming solar radiation and outgoing infrared radiation

**radicle** *noun* the tiny structure in a plant embryo from which the root will develop

**radio-** *prefix* **1.** radiation **2.** radioactive substances

**radioactive** *adjective* referring to a substance whose nucleus disintegrates and gives off energy in the form of radiation that can pass through other substances

COMMENT: The most common naturally radioactive substances are radium and uranium. Other substances can be made radioactive for industrial or medical purposes by making their nuclei unstable, so forming radioactive isotopes. Radioactive wastes are classified as low-level, i.e. not considered to be very dangerous, intermediate and high-level, i.e. emitting dangerous levels of radiation.

radioactive isotope noun a natural or artificial isotope which gives off radiation

**radioactive waste** *noun* used radioactive materials produced by nuclear power stations, industrial plants, hospitals and other installations radioactive waste conditioning noun the processing of radioactive waste to use it again or to make it safe for disposal

**radioactive waste isolation** *noun* keeping radioactive waste separate so that it does not contaminate other things

**radioactivity** *noun* the energy in the form of radiation emitted by a radioactive substance

radiobiologist noun a scientist who specialises in radiobiology

radiobiology noun the scientific study of radiation and its effects on living things

**radiocarbon** *noun* a radioactive isotope of carbon with an atomic number of 14

**radiodermatitis** *noun* an inflammation of the skin caused by exposure to a radioactive agent

radio detection and ranging noun full form of radar

radiogenic heat *noun* the heat generated by the decay of a radioactive substance

**radium** noun a naturally radioactive metallic element (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Ra**; atomic number is **88** and the atomic weight is **226**.)

**radon** noun an inert naturally radioactive gas formed by the radioactive decay of radium that occurs naturally in soil, in construction materials and ground water. It can seep into houses and cause radiation sickness. (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Rn**; the atomic number is **86** and the atomic weight is **222**.)

**rain** *noun* **1**. water that falls from clouds as small drops (NOTE: Rain is normally slightly acid, about pH 5.6, but becomes more acid when pollutants from burning fossil fuels are released into the atmosphere.) **2**. a period of wet weather **■** *plural noun* **rains** in some countries, repeated heavy falls of rain during a season of the year

**rainbow** *noun* a natural phenomenon that occurs when light strikes water droplets, especially when sunlight hits rain or spray from a waterfall, creating a semicircle of rings of each of the colours of the spectrum **raincloud** *noun* a cloud that carries mois-

ture in droplet form which can fall as rain **raindrop** *noun* a drop of water that falls from a cloud

**rainfall** *noun* the amount of water that falls as rain on an area over a period of time  $\bigcirc$  *an area of high/low rainfall* 

**rainforest** *noun* a thick tropical forest which grows in regions where the rainfall is very high **rainmaking** *noun* the attempt to create rain by releasing crystals of salt, carbon dioxide and other substances into clouds

**rainstorm** *noun* a period of heavy rain accompanied by wind

**rainwash** *noun* the erosion of soil by rain **rainwater** *noun* the water which falls as rain from clouds

rainy season *noun* the period in some countries when a lot of rain falls. Also called wet season. Compare dry season

**ramet** *noun* a single cloned organism such as one produced by tissue culture

**Ramsar site** *noun* a site designated by the Ramsar convention on the conservation of wetland habitats and species

**ranching** *noun* the raising of cattle on large grassland farms

range noun 1. a series of different but similar things  $\bigcirc$  a range of books on biology 2. the difference between the lowest and highest values in a series of data O The temperature range is over  $50^{\circ}C$ . **3.** an area within two or more points  $\bigcirc$  The geographical range of the plant is from the Arctic Circle to southern Europe. 4. a large area of grass-covered farmland used for raising cattle or sheep **5.** a group of mountains verb 1. to vary between limits  $\bigcirc$  The temperature ranges from 13°C to 18°C in that *month.* **2.** to include many things  $\bigcirc$  *The lec*ture ranged over the whole area of medical and agricultural genetic modification. 3. to move over a wide area

rare gas noun same as noble gas

rarity noun the state of being rare

**rate** *noun* **1.** an amount or proportion of something compared to something else **2.** the number of times something happens

rate of natural increase noun the difference between the crude birth rate and the death rate

**rate of population growth** *noun* the increase in population in a specific area divided by the initial population

rating noun a classification according to a scale

**ratio** noun a relationship between two quantities expressed as the quotient of one divided by the other  $\bigcirc$  The air/fuel ratio is 15:1.  $\bigcirc$  Chart scale is the ratio of the chart distance to Earth distance. (NOTE: The ratio of 7 to 4 is written 7:4 or 7/4.)

ration noun an amount of food given to an animal or person

**RDA** *noun* Recommended Daily Amount

**RDF** *abbr* refuse-derived fuel

RDZ abbr resource depletion zone

**REACH** *abbr* Registration, Evaluation, Authorisation and Restrictions of Chemicals

**react** verb 1. to act in response to an action 2. to change chemical composition on contact with a substance ○ Ozone is produced as a result of oxides reacting with sunlight. □ to react with something to change because of the presence of another substance ○ ozone is produced as a result of oxides reacting with sunlight

**reaction** *noun* **1.** an action that takes place because of something that happened earlier **2.** an effect produced by a stimulus **3.** a chemical change that occurs when two substances come into contact and cause each other to change **reactive** *adjective* referring to a chemical that reacts easily with other substances

**reactivity** *noun* the degree to which a substance reacts

**reading** *noun* a piece of information indicated by an instrument or gauge

**reafforest** *verb* to plant trees again in an area which was formerly covered by forest

**reafforestation** *noun* the planting of trees in an area which was formerly covered by forest

**reagent** *noun* a chemical substance which reacts with another substance, especially one used in an experiment, test or process

**realised niche** *noun* the portion of a fundamental niche that is actually occupied by a species, resulting from the sharing of resources in an ecosystem

**real time** noun  $\Box$  in real time happening at the same time as something else, without a time delay  $\bigcirc$  The scan allowed us to watch the baby moving in real time.

**real-time** *adjective* referring to something that happens at the same time as something else, such as the processing of data as soon as they are received

**rear** verb to look after young animals until they are old enough to look after themselves

**receiving waters** *plural noun* rivers, lakes, oceans, streams or other bodies of water into which waste water or treated effluent is discharged

**receptacle** *noun* **1**. the top part of a flower stalk that supports the flower (NOTE: In some plants such as strawberry it develops into the fruit.) **2**. the plant part that carries the reproductive organs in lower plants such as mosses and liverworts

**receptor** noun **1**. a nerve ending which senses a change such as cold or heat in the surrounding environment or in the body and reacts to it by sending an impulse to the central nervous system **2**. a site on a cell surface to which a specific molecule such as an antigen binds **3**. someone or something adversely affected by a pollutant  $\bigcirc$  *The ground water is the receptor in this case of land contamination.*

**recombination** *noun* any process that results in offspring that have combinations of genes different from those of either parent, e.g. the crossing-over and independent assortment of chromosomes during gamete formation

**recommend** verb to suggest that something should be done  $\bigcirc$  The report recommended excluding deer from the woodland in order to protect the young growth of plants.

**recommendation** noun a strong suggestion that something should be done  $\bigcirc$ The council accepted the committee's recommendations about disposal of waste.

**reconstitute** verb to put something back into its original state  $\bigcirc$  The mining company should reconstitute the site after the open-cast mining operation has closed down.

**record** noun a written account of facts and information for future reference  $\blacksquare$  verb to write down information or data  $\bigcirc$  Record the results in this column.  $\bigcirc$  Measure the angles and distances and record them in a log.

**recover** verb 1. to return to a more usual condition  $\bigcirc$  *The fish populations may never recover from overfishing.* 2. to obtain metals or other useful materials from waste by separating and purifying it

**recovery** noun **1**. a return to a more usual condition  $\bigcirc$  The area has been overfished to such an extent that the recovery of the fish population is impossible. **2**. the process of obtaining metals or other useful materials from waste

**recrystallisation** *noun* the purification of a substance by repeatedly forming crystals from a solution

**rectification** *noun* the purification of a liquid by distillation

**rectify** verb to purify a liquid by a repeated process

**recyclable** *adjective* referring to waste that can be processed so that it can be used again

**recycle** verb to process waste so that it can be used again  $\bigcirc$  *The glass industry recycles tonnes of waste glass each year.* 

**recycled** *adjective* made from waste  $\bigcirc$  *recycled aluminium* 

recycled paper noun paper made from waste paper

**recycling** *noun* the activity of processing waste so that it can be used again

'Waste production in the UK continues to rise at 3% per year – faster than GDP growth. Defra's target is to enable 25% of household waste to be recycled or composted by 2005/6. (Delivering the evidence. Defra's Science and Innovation Strategy 2003–06).'

**red** *adjective* referring to a colour like the colour of blood

**Red Data Book** *noun* a catalogue formerly published by the IUCN, listing species which are rare or in danger of becoming extinct. The information is now available in a searchable database.  $\Diamond$  **Red list** 

**redevelop** verb to demolish the buildings on an area of land and build new ones  $\bigcirc$ *The company has put forward a plan to redevelop the area around the railway station.* 

**redevelopment** *noun* the act of redeveloping an area of land  $\bigcirc$  *The council's planning committee has approved the redevelopment plan for the town centre.* 

**redistribution of land** *noun* the practice of taking land from large landowners and splitting it into smaller plots for many people to own **red lead** *noun* a poisonous red oxide of lead, used as a colouring in paints. Formula:  $Pb_3O_4$ .

**Red list** *noun* **1.** a searchable database maintained by IUCN that records the conservation status of different organisms in throughout the world. Full form **IUCN Red**

### redox noun same as oxidation-reduction

**redox potential** noun **1.** a measure of the ability of the natural environment to bring about an oxidation or a reduction process **2.** the cell potential required relative to a standard hydrogen electrode to cause oxidation at an anode and reduction at a cathode  $\blacktriangleright$  abbr **rH** 

**reduce** *verb* **1.** to make something less, smaller or lower, or to become less, smaller or lower. Opposite **increase 2.** to add electrons or hydrogen to a substance

**reducer** *noun* an organism that breaks down dead organic matter, e.g. an earthworm, fungus or bacterium

reducing atmosphere noun an atmosphere that does not contain free oxygen gas and in which compounds combine chemically with hydrogen

**reduction** noun **1**. the process of making something less, smaller or lower, or of becoming less, smaller or lower ○ The key to controlling acid rain must be the reduction of emissions from fossil-fuelled power stations. Opposite **increase 2**. the addition of electrons or hydrogen to a substance

**redundancy** *noun* the situation of not being needed because other similar things exist

**redundant** *adjective* no longer useful  $\bigcirc$  *recycling redundant containers* 

**redwood** *noun* a tall North American conifer. Latin name: *Sequoia sempervirens*.

**reed** *noun* a grass that grows in water near the shores of lakes (NOTE: The common reed *Phragmites communis* is used for thatching roofs. The Spanish reed *Arundo donax* has been used in musical instruments for more than 5000 years.)

**reedbed** *noun* a mass of reeds growing together

**reedbed filter** *noun* a reedbed used as part of a system of cleaning sewage or dirty water

**reef** noun a series of low rocks or coral near the surface of the sea

re-emerging adjective starting to reappear

**refine** verb **1.** to process something to remove impurities  $\bigcirc a$  by-product of refining oil **2.** to make changes in order to improve something  $\bigcirc$  We've refined the procedures. **refined** adjective having had impurities removed  $\bigcirc$  refined oil

refinement *noun* the process of removing impurities in something

**refinery** *noun* a processing facility where impurities are removed from raw materials such as ore, oil or sugar

**reflection** *noun* the process of light, sound or heat being transmitted back towards its source

**reflex** *noun* a rapid automatic reaction to a stimulus

**reflux** *noun* a backward flow of a liquid from a boiler in the opposite direction to normal flow, collecting vapour and condensing it so that it can return to the boiler again

reforest verb same as reafforest

### reforestation noun same as reafforestation

**refract** verb to cause a wave such as light or sound to change direction or turn as it passes from one medium into another of different density  $\bigcirc$  On reaching the ionosphere, a direct wave is refracted and returns to the Earth's surface.

**refuse dump** *noun* a place where waste is thrown away

**regenerate** verb to grow again, or grow something again  $\bigcirc$  A forest takes about ten years to regenerate after a fire.  $\bigcirc$  Salamanders can regenerate limbs.

**regeneration** *noun* the process of vegetation growing back on land which has been cleared or burnt  $\bigcirc$  *Grazing by herbivores prevents forest regeneration.* 

**regenerative** *adjective* **1**. restoring or renewing  $\bigcirc$  *regenerative capacity* **2**. allowing new growth to replace damaged tissue

**regressive** *adjective* (of a water level) getting lower

**regrowth** *noun* the growth that occurs after a cut or harvest, or after accidental damage or fire

**regulate** verb 1. to control a process or activity 2. to change or maintain something by law  $\bigcirc$  Development is regulated by local authorities.

**regulation** noun **1**. the control of a process or activity **2**. a rule  $\bigcirc$  The pamphlet lists the regulations concerning visits to nature reserves.

**regulator** noun **1**. something or someone controlling a process or activity **2**. a device used to limit the current and voltage in a circuit  $\bigcirc$  Regulators allow the correct charging of batteries from solar panels and wind generators.

**regulatory** *adjective* controlling a process or activity according to specific rules  $\bigcirc$  *a regulatory body* 

**rehabilitation** *noun* reclaiming and redeveloping land and buildings which have been abandoned

**reheater** *noun* a section of a power station where steam which has been used to turn the first turbine is heated again to create enough pressure to turn the second turbine

**reintroduce** *verb* to help a species to live successfully again in an area it had formerly inhabited

**reintroduction** *noun* the process of helping a species to live successfully again in an area it had formerly inhabited

**relate** verb to make a connection or link between two things  $\bigcirc$  Orientating the chart relates the direction of land features to their representation on the chart and aids recognition.

**-related** *suffix* connected to  $\bigcirc$  *a heat-related change* 

**relationship** noun the way in which someone or something is related to another **relative** noun something such as a species that has developed from the same origin as another similar thing  $\bigcirc$  *onions and their wild relatives*  $\blacksquare$  *adjective* describing how one thing is compared with another

**relative abundance** *noun* the number of individual specimens of an animal or plant seen over a period in a specific place

relative biological effectiveness noun a measure of the different degrees of effectiveness of different types of radiation in producing effects in biological systems, used in radiation protection contexts. Abbr RBE

**relative humidity** *noun* a ratio between the amount of water vapour in air and the amount that would be present if the air was saturated, shown as a percentage

**release** verb **1.** to let something go that has been contained  $\bigcirc$  Acid rain leaches out nutrients from the soil and releases harmful substances such as lead into the soil.  $\bigcirc$  Using an aerosol spray releases CFCs into the atmosphere. **2.** to allow a bird or other animal that has been reared or kept in captivity to live freely in the environment  $\bigcirc$  They released 93 birds and there are now 177 breeding pairs. **3.** to make something available, especially for the first time **1** noun **1**. the act of letting something out from where it is contained  $\bigcirc$  The report points out the danger of radiation releases from nuclear power stations. **2.** the act of making something available for the first time

**relief** *noun* a difference in height between points on the Earth's surface

**rely on** verb to trust someone or something  $\bigcirc$  He relies on his skill and experience to identify poisonous fungi. (NOTE: relies – relying – relied)

rem abbr roentgen equivalent man

**remedial investigation** *noun* investigation of a polluted site, including taking samples of soil or water, to determine what sort of action needs to be taken to improve it. Abbr **RI** 

remediation *noun* a course of action intended to reverse environmental damage. ◊ bioremediation

**remote sensing** *noun* the collection of information via satellite observation and aerial photography about physical aspects of the Earth such as the location of mineral deposits, or the movement of water or pests

renew verb to replace something

**renewable** *adjective* referring to something that can be replaced or can renew itself by regrowing, reforming or breeding ○ *Herring stocks are a renewable resource if the numbers being caught are controlled.* □ **renewable sources of energy** energy from the sun, wind, waves, tides or from geothermal deposits or from burning waste, none of which uses up fossil fuel reserves

renewable resource noun a natural resource that replaces itself unless overused, e.g. animal or plant life, fresh water or wind energy

**renewables obligation** *noun* the requirement for power generators to reduce their use of fossil fuels and replace them over time with sources of energy that can be renewed

**repel** verb to push something away by force, or to resist something (NOTE: **repelling – repelled**)

**repellent** *adjective* referring to a substance that causes something to which it is applied to resist something  $\bigcirc$  *a repellent insecticide*  $\blacksquare$  *noun* a substance that causes something to which it is applied to resist something  $\bigcirc$  *The coating of wax on the leaves acts as a repellent to pollutants.*

**replicate** verb **1**. to do something again in the same way  $\bigcirc$  *The routine will replicate* your results with very little effort. **2**. (of a cell or microorganism) to reproduce

**replication** noun **1**. the process in the division of a cell during which DNA makes copies of itself **2**. the process of reproduction of a cell or microorganism  $\bigcirc$  virus replication **3**. the repetition of an experiment several times in order to achieve a reliably consistent result

**report** noun a document giving an account of something, stating what action has been taken, what the current state is or what the results of a test or experiment are  $\bigcirc a$  report on global warming  $\blacksquare$  verb to give an account of something

**repository** *noun US* a place where something can be stored  $\bigcirc$  *a nuclear waste repository* 

**repower** verb to rebuild an old power station, converting it to a more modern combustion system

**reprocess** *verb* to process something into another form

**reprocessing** *noun* the processing of something such as spent nuclear fuel and subjecting it to chemical processes which produce further useful materials such as plutonium **reproduce** verb **1**. to produce offspring **2**. (of bacteria) to produce new cells **3**. to do a test again in exactly the same way

reproduction noun the production of offspring

**reproductive** *adjective* referring to the production of offspring  $\bigcirc$  *Pollination is a reproductive process.* 

reproductive cloning noun the use of cloning techniques to produce new individuals

**reproductive value** *noun* the number of offspring an individual can be expected to produce during a lifetime

**reptile** *noun* a cold-blooded animal that lays eggs and has a scaly skin, e.g. a crocodile, tortoise or snake. Class: Reptilia.

**requirement** noun something that is needed  $\bigcirc$  a change in water requirements  $\bigcirc$  The regulations contain a requirement for regular monitoring.

**research** noun a scientific study that investigates something new  $\bigcirc$  recent research into the relationship between skin cancer and exposure to sunlight  $\bigcirc$  environmental research  $\bigcirc$  a research programme

**reservation** *noun* an area of land set aside for a special purpose

**reserve** noun **1**. an amount stored or kept back for future use **2**. an area of land maintained for the benefit of plant or animal life where no commercial exploitation is allowed.  $\phi$  game reserve, nature reserve, wildlife reserve

**reservoir** noun **1**. an artificial or natural area of water, used for storing water for domestic or industrial use  $\bigcirc$  The town's water supply comes from reservoirs in the mountains.  $\bigcirc$  After two months of drought the reservoirs were beginning to run dry. **2**. a natural hole in rock that contains water, oil or gas

**reservoir rock** *noun* rock that is porous and permeable, from which oil or natural gas may be extracted

**residence time** *noun* the amount of time during which something remains in the same place or in the same state until it is lost or transformed into something else

**resident** adjective referring to an organism or a person living in a place, especially for a long time  $\bigcirc$  The introduced species wiped out the resident population of flightless birds.  $\blacksquare$  noun a bird, insect or other animal that does not migrate  $\bigcirc$  The birds are year-round residents in this particular area.

**residential environment** *noun* an area characterised principally by the presence of houses and apartment blocks

**residual** *adjective* referring to the amount of something that is left behind

**residual risk** *noun* a risk which still remains after pollution-prevention measures have been applied

**residue** *noun* the material left after a process has taken place or after a material has been used

**resilience** *noun* **1**. the ability of an organism to resist or recover from adverse conditions **2**. the ability of an ecosystem to return to its usual state after being disturbed

**resin** *noun* **1**. a sticky oil secreted by some conifers or other trees, especially when they are cut **2**. a solid or liquid organic compound used in the making of plastic

resinous adjective referring to resin

resistance noun the ability of an organism not to be affected by something such as a disease, stress factor, process or treatment ○ Increasing insect resistance to chemical pesticides is a major problem. ○ Crop plants have been bred for resistance to disease.

**resistant** *adjective* referring to something which is unaffected by a disease, stress factor, process or treatment  $\bigcirc$  *Some alloys are less resistant to corrosion than others.*  $\bigcirc$ *The plants were not resistant to mildew.* 

**-resistant** suffix not adversely affected by something  $\bigcirc$  heat-resistant  $\bigcirc$  a DDT-resistant strain of insects  $\bigcirc$  disease-resistant genetic material  $\bigcirc$  a new strain of virus-resistant rice

**resorption** *noun* **1**. the absorption of a substance already produced back into the organism that produced it **2**. the melting of solid rock which falls into magma

**resource** noun **1.** a useful source of something  $\bigcirc$  reference resources such as encyclopaedias **2.** anything in the environment which can be used  $\bigcirc$  Fossil fuel resources are being depleted.  $\bigcirc$  Woodland is a valuable resource.  $\diamondsuit$  **natural resource** 

**resource depletion zone** noun an area where a resource is depleted, e.g. where water is removed from the soil around a plant. Abbr **RDZ** 

**resource economics** *noun* the study of the economics of an ecosystem, showing the value of the services provided by that system in financial terms

resource partitioning noun the way in which resources in an ecosystem are divided up by the species who need them, each using them in a different way

**respiratory heat** *noun* the energy lost to a community in plant respiration

respond verb to react to something

response noun a reaction to a stimulus

**responsibility** *noun* the state of being answerable for something, or in charge of something  $\bigcirc$  *the responsibility of using limited resources wisely*  $\bigcirc$  *take responsibility for stewardship of the countryside* 

**responsible** *adjective* answerable for something or in charge of something  $\bigcirc$  *responsible for safety checks* 

**responsible care** *noun* an initiative of the chemical industry which requires member firms to follow codes of conduct on such matters as toxic materials, waste reduction, chemical-accident minimisation, worker safety and community consultation

**restock** verb to provide another supply of something that has been used up, or provide somewhere with a new supply  $\bigcirc$  We'll restock next year.  $\bigcirc$  So many animals died that they had to restock the farm in the spring.

**restoration** *noun* the act or process of giving something back, or putting something back to a previous state or position

**restore** verb to give something back, or put something back to a previous state or position

**result** noun a consequence or outcome  $\bigcirc$ The abundance and diversity of flowers in the meadow was the result of careful management.

**returnable** *adjective* referring to something such as a bottle which can be taken back to the place where it was bought and then be reused or recycled

**reuse** noun the use of a product or a material for an additional time or a different purpose, usually as an alternative to throwing it away ■ verb to use a product or a material for an additional time or a different purpose, usually as an alternative to throwing it away

**reverse** adjective referring to an object or a process going backwards or in the opposite direction  $\blacksquare$  verb to change a decision and do the opposite of what was done before  $\bigcirc$  The decision of the planning committee was reversed and the planning application went ahead.

reversed fault noun same as thrust fault

**reverse osmosis** *noun* a process in which water is forced through a membrane which removes impurities

rH abbr redox potential

**rhino** *noun* same as **rhinoceros** (NOTE: The plural is **rhinos**.)

rhinoceros noun a very large herbivorous animal with thick skin and either one horn or two horns, one behind the other, on a projecting part of its head above the nose and mouth (NOTE: The plural is rhinoceroses or rhinoceros.)

COMMENT: There are five species of rhinoceros, three found Asia (two of which have only one horn) and two in Africa, and all are in danger of extinction. Although they have few natural predators, 97% of rhinos have been lost in the last 30 years and is believed there are only about 11000 wild rhinos in existence. Rhinos have been hunted especially for their horn which is used in traditional Chinese medicine and for carving.

**rhizobium** *noun* a bacterium that lives in soil and forms nodules on plant roots, taking up nitrogen from the atmosphere and fixing it in the soil

**rhizofiltration** *noun* the use of plants to absorb or precipitate ground-water contaminants in their roots

**rhizoid** *noun* a thin structure in lower plants such as mosses and liverworts that resembles a root

**rhizome** *noun* a plant stem that lies on or under the ground and has leaf buds and adventitious roots

**rhizosphere** *noun* the soil surrounding the roots of a plant

**Rhodophyta** *plural noun* a phylum of red algae, mainly found on the seabed

RI abbr remedial investigation

**ria** noun a valley that has been filled by the sea

**ribonucleic acid** *noun* full form of **RNA rice** *noun* a plant that is the most important cereal crop and the staple food of half the population of the world. Latin name: *Oryza sativa*.

**rich** *adjective* **1.** (*of soil*) having many useful nutrients for plant growth **2.** (*of food*) having a high calorific value **3.** (*of a mixture of fuel and air*) having a high ratio of fuel to air **4.**  $\Box$  **rich in** having a lot of something  $\bigcirc$  *Green vegetables are rich in miner*- als.  $\bigcirc$  The forests are rich in mosses and other forms of moisture-loving plants.

**-rich** suffix having a lot of something  $\bigcirc a$ nutrient-rich detergent  $\bigcirc$  a protein-rich diet  $\bigcirc$  a species-rich habitat  $\bigcirc$  oil-rich seeds

richness noun the quality of having a lot of something. b species richness

Richter scale noun a scale of measurement of the force of an earthquake from 0 to 10, earthquakes of 5 or more causing damage  $\bigcirc$  There were no reports of injuries after the quake which reached 5.2 on the Richter scale. (NOTE: The Richter scale measures the force of an earthquake: the damage caused is measured on the Modified Mercalli scale. The strongest earthguake ever recorded was 8.9.)

**ridge** noun **1**. a long raised section of ground, occurring as part of a mountain range, in a field, on a beach or on the ocean floor 2. a long narrow band of high pressure leading away from the centre of an anticyclone  $\bigcirc$  A ridge of high pressure is lying across the country.

rift valley noun a long valley with steep walls, formed when land between two fault lines sinks or possibly when a fault widens as plates forming the Earth's crust move apart

right of common noun the right to walk on land, graze animals on it, or gather wood

rigid adjective hard or stiff and not easy to bend  $\bigcirc$  rigid pipes  $\bigcirc$  a rigid structure

rigidity noun 1. hardness or stiffness and an inability to bend O Extra strength and rigidity must be provided in the tail section for aircraft with a tail wheel unit. 2. strictness of control or adherence to a way of doing something  $\bigcirc$  the rigidity of the guidelines

rill noun a very narrow stream

**rime** noun the feathery ice formed when freezing fog settles on surfaces

**ring** verb to attach a numbered ring to the leg of a bird so that its movements can be recorded

**Ringelmann chart** *noun* a chart which uses numbers from 0 to 5 to identify the blackness of smoke

ring road noun a road which goes round a town centre, usually quite close to builtup areas, allowing traffic to bypass the town and not go through the middle. Compare orbital road

**Rio Declaration** noun a statement laying down the broad principles of environmentally sound development adopted at the Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro in 1992

riparian adjective referring to the bank of a river O riparian fauna

### rip current noun same as riptide

**ripple** noun a little wave on the surface of water  $\bigcirc$  *Ripple marks can be seen in some* sedimentary rocks showing where the sand was marked by the movement of water.

**riptide** noun 1. an area of rough water in the sea where currents meet 2. a current that flows against the flow of the incoming waves also called rip current

**risk** noun 1. a combination of the likelihood of injury, damage or loss being caused by a potentially dangerous substance, technology or activity, or by a failure to do something, and the seriousness of the possible consequences 2. something that is regarded as likely to cause injury, damage or loss  $\bigcirc$  a fire risk  $\bigcirc$  a health risk Compare hazard

COMMENT: A substance or practice may have the potential to cause harm, i.e. may be a hazard, but risk only arises if there is a likelihood that something will be harmed by it in a specific set of circumstances. A highly dangerous thing may in fact present only a small risk. Risk assessment is used to decide what the degree and nature of the risk, if any, may be so that measures to reduce or avoid it can be taken.

risk assessment noun a process used to determine the risk from a substance, technology or activity

risk management *noun* the activity of controlling the factors affecting risk

**river** noun a large flow of water, running from a natural source in mountains or hills down to the sea  $\Box$  river in flood a river that contains an unusually large amount of water

river authority noun an official body which manages the rivers in an area

**riverine** adjective referring to a river O The dam has destroyed the riverine fauna and flora for hundreds of kilometres.

river terrace noun same as alluvial terrace

Rn symbol radon

**RNA** noun a nucleic acid chain that takes coded information from DNA and translates it into specific proteins. Full form ribonucleic acid. DNA

**RO** *abbr* renewables obligation

roadside verge noun 
verge

road user noun a person who drives on public roads

**rock** *noun* a solid mineral substance which forms the outside crust of the Earth

**rock pool** *noun* a pool of salt water left in rocks by the sea

**rodent** *noun* a mammal that has sharp teeth for gnawing, e.g. a rat or mouse

**roentgen**, **röntgen** *noun* a unit of measurement of the amount of exposure to X-rays or gamma rays. Symbol **R** 

**roentgen equivalent man** *noun* a unit of measurement of ionising radiation equivalent to the effect of absorbing one roentgen. Abbr **rem** (NOTE: It has been replaced by the sievert.)

**role** *noun* the set of characters, chemical, physical and biological, that determine the position of an organism or species in an ecosystem, e.g. aquatic predator or terrestrial herbivore

**root** noun a part of a plant which is usually under the ground and absorbs water and nutrients from the surrounding soil  $\blacksquare$  verb (of a plant) to produce roots  $\bigcirc$  The cuttings root easily in moist sand.

**root crop** *noun* a plant that stores edible material in a root, corm or tuber and is grown as food (NOTE: Root crops include carrots, parsnips, swedes and turnips. Starchy root crops include potatoes, cassavas and yams.)

**root cutting** *noun* a piece of root cut from a living plant and put in soil, where it will sprout and grow into a new plant

**rootstock** *noun* a plant with roots onto which a piece of another plant is grafted. ♢ **scion** 

**root system** *noun* all the roots of a plant **rot** *verb* (*of organic tissue*) to decay or become putrefied because of bacterial or fungal action

**rotate** verb **1.** to turn around on an axis or fixed point  $\bigcirc$  *The Earth rotates on its axis approximately every 24 hours.* **2.** to grow different crops from year to year in a field (NOTE: The advantages of rotating crops include: different crops utilising soil nutrients differently, pests specific to one crop being discouraged from spreading, and some crops such as legumes increasing the nitrogen content of the soil if their roots are left in the soil after harvesting.)

**rotation** noun the process of turning around an axis or fixed point  $\bigcirc$  the rotation of the Earth  $\bigcirc$  The speed of rotation determines the frequency of the generator output.

rotation of crops noun same as crop rotation

**rotenone** *noun* the active ingredient of the insecticide derris

**rotor** *noun* **1**. a rapidly turning mass of air, surrounded by clouds **2**. the central shaft of a generator, which turns inside the stator

rough adjective having an irregular surface or action

**roughage** *noun* fibrous matter in food, which cannot be digested. Also called **die-tary fibre** 

rough fish noun fish which are not used for sport or food

**roundworm** *noun* a type of worm with a round body, some of which are parasites of animals, others of roots of plants

ROW abbr rest of the world

**Royal Society for Nature Conser**vation noun a UK charity that supports environmental projects and coordinates the activities of Wildlife Trusts. Abbr **RSNC** 

Royal Society for the Protection of Birds noun a UK charity that works to ensure a good environment for birds and wildlife. Abbr RSPB

**RSNC** *abbr* Royal Society for Nature Conservation

**R** strategy *noun* a form of reproduction where the mother produces large numbers of offspring which need little attention. Compare K strategy

**rubber** noun a material which can be stretched and compressed, made from a thick white fluid (**latex**) from a tropical tree **rubbish** noun things that are of no longer of any use and are thrown away

ruderal adjective growing in rubbish or on wasteland

ruminant noun an animal that has a stomach with several chambers, e.g. a cow

**rumination** *noun* the process by which food taken to the stomach of a ruminant is returned to the mouth, chewed again and then swallowed

**runoff** noun **1**. the removal of water from a system by opening sluices **2**. the flow of rainwater or melted snow from the surface of land into streams and rivers **3**. the flow of excess fertiliser or pesticide from farmland into rivers  $\bigcirc$  *Nitrate runoff causes pollution of lakes and rivers.*  $\bigcirc$  *Fish are extremely susceptible to runoff of organophosphates.* 

**runoff rate** *noun* the amount of excess fertiliser or pesticide from farmland that flows into rivers in a specific period

**rural** adjective referring to the country, as opposed to the town  $\bigcirc$  Many rural areas have been cut off by floods.

rural affairs *noun* the activities and concerns of rural communities

**rural area** *noun* an area in the countryside where the main activities are farming or forestry and where relatively few people live

**rural development** *noun* a programme of activities undertaken to ensure that rural areas remain economically and socially sustainable

**rural economy** *noun* farming and other businesses in rural areas

**Rural Enterprise Scheme** *noun* a system of government support for the adaptation and development of the rural economy, community, heritage and environment. It is part of the England Rural Development Programme.

rural environment noun the countryside

**rural migration** *noun* a movement of people away from the country and into towns in order to find work

rural planning noun same as country planning

rural recreation noun same as countryside recreation

**Rural Stewardship Scheme** *noun* in Scotland, a scheme of payments to encourage farmers to be involved in the protection and enhancement of the environment, to support sustainable rural development and to maintain the prosperity of rural communities

rural tourism *noun* holiday and leisure activities carried out in the countryside

**rurban** *adjective* referring to areas that combine the characteristics of agricultural activities found in rural zones with those of suburban living areas and industrialised zones

COMMENT: Rapid extension of urbanisation the world over has created areas that have both urban and rural characteristics. Land planning specialists talk about 'rurban areas' and the 'rurbanisation' process.

**rurbanisation** *noun* the process of rural areas becoming more like urban areas in the type of housing and activities that develop

**rust** *noun* **1.** a reddish powder that forms on the surface of iron and iron compounds on contact with damp air **2.** a fungal disease that gives plants a reddish powdery covering **I** *verb* to become covered with reddish powder through contact with damp air

**R-value** *noun* a unit of measurement of resistance to the flow of heat (NOTE: An insulated outside wall has an R-value of R-11, while an internal ceiling has a value of R-19.)

**rye** *noun* a hardy cereal crop grown in temperate areas. Latin name: *Secale cereale*.

**safe** adjective not likely to hurt or cause damage  $\bigcirc$  It is not safe to drink the water here.

**safety** *noun* the condition of being safe or without danger  $\Box$  **to take safety precautions** to take measures which make your actions or condition safe

**safety guidelines** *plural noun* a series of recommendations indicating appropriate practices and procedures to ensure safe conditions

**safety zone** *noun* an area in which people are not at risk

**Sahara** *noun* a large desert region in North Africa

**Saharan** *adjective* referring to the Sahara **Sahel** *noun* a semi-desert region south of the Sahara where desert conditions are spreading

**Sahelian** *adjective* referring to the Sahel **salination** *noun* a process by which the salt concentration of soil or water increases, especially as a result of irrigation in hot climates. Also called **salinisation** 

saline adjective referring to salt

saline lagoon noun an area of water partially or completely separated from the sea by sandbanks, shingle, rocks or sea defences and containing a mixture of sea water and freshwater. It may be tidal or non-tidal, but always contains water even at very low tide.

**saline lake** *noun* a low-lying inland lake with water that contains a lot of salt because of evaporation and a lack of fresh water flowing into it. Also called **salt lake**

**salmon** *noun* a large sea fish that returns to a freshwater river to lay its eggs

**salmonid** *noun* a fish belonging to a family that is sensitive to pollution in water and whose presence indicates that the water is pure, e.g. a trout

**Salt** noun **1**. a chemical compound formed from an acid and a metal **2**. sodium chloride as part of the diet  $\bigcirc$  a salt-restricted diet  $\bigcirc$  He should reduce his intake of salt.  $\blacksquare$  adjective same as salty

**salt dome** *noun* an area where salt from beneath the surface of the soil has risen to form a small hill

**salting** *noun* an area of land that is regularly flooded with salt water

salt lake noun same as saline lake

**salt lick** *noun* **1**. a naturally occurring deposit of salt which animals lick **2**. a block of salt given to animals to lick

**salt marsh** *noun* an area of land over which the sea flows at high tide

**saltpan** *noun* an area where salt from beneath the soil surface rises to form crystals on the surface

salt water noun water which contains salt, e.g. sea water. Compare fresh water

**saltwater** *adjective* **1.** containing salt water

**salty** adjective 1. containing salt  $\bigcirc$  *Excess* minerals in fertilisers combined with naturally saline ground to make the land so salty that it can no longer produce crops. 2. tasting of salt

**sample** noun a small amount which is representative of the whole  $\bigcirc$  A sample of water was taken from the lake for analysis.  $\bigcirc$  A seed sample was tested for germination.  $\bigcirc$  Factories were asked to provide samples from outflow pipes.  $\blacksquare$  verb to take a small quantity of something to test

**sanctuary** noun an area where the wildlife it contains is protected  $\bigcirc A$  bird sanctuary has been created on the island.

**sand** *noun* fine grains of weathered rock, usually round grains of quartz, found especially on beaches and in the desert

sand bar noun a long bank of sand in shallow water either in a river or the sea

sand beach *noun* same as sandy beach sand dune *noun* an area of sand blown by the wind into a small hill or ridge, often crescent-shaped in the desert and sometimes covered with sparse grass when near the sea

**sandpit** *noun* a place where sand is extracted from the ground

**sandstone** *noun* a sedimentary rock formed of round particles of quartz

**sandstorm** *noun* a high wind in the desert, which carries large amounts of sand with it

**sandy beach** *noun* a beach covered with sand rather than pebbles or shingle. Also called **sand beach** 

**sandy soil** *noun* soil containing a high proportion of sand particles

sanitary adjective referring to hygiene or to health

**sanitary landfill, sanitary landfilling** *noun* a method of disposing of solid waste on land in lined pits to avoid contaminating surface or ground water and other public health and environmental risks

**sanitation** noun the systems of waste disposal and water provision that are the basis of public hygiene  $\bigcirc$  Poor sanitation in crowded conditions can result in the spread of disease.

**sap** *noun* a liquid carrying nutrients which flows inside a plant

SAP abbr Species Action Plan

**sapele** *noun* a fine African hardwood, formerly widely exploited but now becoming rarer. Genus: *Entandrophragma*.

sapling noun a young tree

**sappy** *adjective* referring to tree trunks or branches, or wood, that are full of sap

sapro- prefix decay or rotting

**saprobe** *noun* a bacterium that lives in rotting matter

**saprobic** *adjective* referring to a classification of organisms according to the way in which they tolerate pollution. ¢ **mesosaprobic**, **oligosaprobic**, **polysaprobic** 

**saprogenic**, **saprogenous** *adjective* referring to organisms that grow on decaying organic matter

**sapropel** *noun* a layer of decaying organic matter at the bottom of a body of water

**saprophagous** *adjective* referring to organisms that feed on decaying organic matter

**saprophyte** *noun* an organism that lives and feeds on dead or decaying organic matter, e.g. a fungus

**saprophytic** *adjective* referring to organisms that live and feed on dead or decaying organic matter

**saproplankton** *plural noun* plankton that live and feed on dead or decaying organic matter

**saproxylic** *adjective* referring to invertebrate animals, fungi and other organisms that live in the rotting wood of dead trees

**sapwood** *noun* an outer layer of wood on the trunk of a tree, which is younger than the heartwood inside and carries the sap. ◊ **heartwood** 

**sarcoma** *noun* a cancer of connective tissue such as bone, muscle or cartilage

**Sargasso Sea** *noun* an area of still water in the North Atlantic Ocean, which is surrounded by currents and contains drifting weed

**satellite** noun **1**. an astronomical object that orbits a larger body in space  $\bigcirc$  *The Moon is the Earth's only satellite.* **2**. a manmade device that orbits the Earth, receiving, processing and transmitting signals and generating images such as weather pictures

saturnism noun same as plumbism

**savanna**, **savannah** *noun* a dry grasscovered plain with few trees, especially in South America or Africa, where growth is abundant during the rainy season but vegetation dies back during the dry season

**save-all** noun a container for keeping waste products so that they can be reused or recycled

**scale** noun **1**. a series of marks at fixed intervals used as a reference standard in measurement  $\bigcirc$  *This rule has scales in inches and centimetres*. **2**. a small overlapping plate of tissue on the skin of reptiles and fish **3**. a hard white calcium layer that forms in containers and pipes carrying hot water in areas where the water supply contains a lot of calcium

**Scottish Natural Heritage** *noun* an official body responsible for the conservation of fauna and flora in Scotland

**scrap** noun **1.** waste material  $\bigcirc$  scrap paper  $\bigcirc$  scrap metal  $\bigcirc$  Some 50% of steel is made from recycled scrap. (NOTE: no plural)

COMMENT: Sea level is taken as the base for references to altitude: a mountain 300 m high is three hundred metres above sea level. The Dead Sea is 395 m below sea level. Sea levels in general have risen over

### sea loch

the past 100 years and much more rapid rises are forecast if the greenhouse effect results in the melting of the polar ice caps. Sea level is also used as a basis for measuring barometric pressure.

seismologist noun a scientist who studies earthquakes

seismology noun the scientific study of earthquakes

seismonasty noun a response of plants to a physical stimulus such as touch

**select** *verb* to identify plants or animals with desirable characteristics such as high yield or disease resistance as part of the activity of breeding new varieties

**selection** *noun* **1**. the process of identifying plants or animals with desirable characteristics such as high yield or disease resistance as part of the activity of breeding new varieties **2**. an individual chosen from a group in a breeding programme on the basis of distinctive characteristics

**selective herbicide**, **selective weedkiller** *noun* a weedkiller which is designed to kill only plants with specific characteristics and not others

**selenium** noun a non-metallic trace element, used in photoelectric cells. Symbol **Se** (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Se**; the atomic number is **34** and the atomic weight is **78.96**.)

**self-seeded** *adjective* referring to a plant that grows from seed that has fallen to the ground naturally rather than being sown intentionally  $\bigcirc$  *Several self-seeded poppies have come up in the vegetable garden.* 

**self-sterile** *adjective* referring to a plant that cannot fertilise itself from its own flowers

**self-sterility** *noun* the inability of a plant to fertilise itself

**self-sufficiency** *noun* a simple traditional way of farming with little use of modern technology that provides only enough food and other necessary materials for a family

**self-sufficient** *adjective* **1**. able to provide enough food and other necessary materials for a family, often by means of a simple traditional way of farming with little use of modern technology  $\bigcirc$  *We're self-sufficient in salad crops from the garden in the summer time.* **2**. referring to provision of the required quantity of a product locally or for yourself, without needing to purchase or import it  $\bigcirc$  *The country is self-sufficient in barley.* 

**self-thinning** *noun* a process by which only a few individuals survive in a group of plants of the same age, since plants cannot escape competition by moving away to a different place

**sell-by date** *noun* a date on the label of a food product which is the last date on which the product should be sold and be guaranteed as of good quality

**selva** *noun* tropical rainforest in the Amazon basin

**semeloparity** *noun* a form of reproduction where the animal or plant reproduces once only, as in the case of salmon

**semi-arid** *noun* receiving very little rain **semiconductor** *noun* a material with conductive properties between those of a conductor such as a metal and an insulator **semi-desert** *noun* an area of land which has very little rain

**semi-natural forest** *noun* a wooded area that contains mainly native trees and shrubs which have not been planted

**semiochemical** *adjective* a chemical released by animals, especially insects, as a means of communication, e.g. a pheromone

**semi-parasitic** *adjective* referring to an organism living as a parasite but also undergoing photosynthesis

**semi-permeable** *adjective* referring to something such as a membrane that allows a liquid to pass through but not substances dissolved in the liquid

senescence noun the process of growing older

**sensitise**, **sensitize** *verb* to make someone sensitive to a substance such as an allergen or drug

**sepal** *noun* a part of the calyx of a flower, usually green and sometimes hairy

**separate** *adjective* **1**. distinct and not related **2**. not joined or together  $\blacksquare$  *verb* **1**. to move or keep something apart **2**. to distinguish one thing from another **3**. to divide or split something into its parts

separate collection, separated collection noun the collection of different types of solid waste separately, often in containers of different colours, so that they can be recycled, reused or disposed of in different ways

**separate system** *noun* a drainage system where sewage and rainwater are not collected together but drain through different channels

**separator** noun a device which removes a component from a mixture or combination  $\bigcirc$  The water separator will extract a percentage of free moisture from the air. **septic** *adjective* referring to the process of decomposition of organic matter

**septic tank** *noun* **1**. an underground tank for household sewage that is not connected to the main drainage system and in which human waste is decomposed by the action of anaerobic bacteria **2**. a tank at a sewage treatment works in which sewage is collected to begin its treatment by anaerobic bacteria

**sere** *noun* a series of plant communities which succeed one another in an area

**sewage** *noun* waste water and other material such as faeces, carried away in sewers. Also called **sewage waste** 

**sewage disposal** *noun* the removal of sewage from houses and other buildings for processing

sewage effluent noun liquid or solid waste carried away in sewers

**sewage lagoon** *noun* a pond used to purify sewage by allowing sunlight, oxygen and bacteria to act on the mixture of sewage and water

sewage sludge noun the solid or semisolid part of sewage

sewage treatment plant *noun* a place where sewage from houses and other buildings is brought for processing. Also called sewage farm, sewage works COMMENT: A modern sewage treatment plant works by passing the sewage through a series of processes. It is first screened to remove large particles, then passed into sedimentation tanks where part of the solids remaining in the sewage settle. The sewage then continues into an aerator which adds air to activate the bacteria. The sewage then settles in a second sedimentation tank before being discharged into a river or the sea and the resulting sludge is digested anaerobically by bacteria in digestion tanks before being put on the land as biosolids, burnt, or otherwise disposed of.

sewage waste noun same as sewage

sewage works noun same as sewage treatment plant

**sewer** *noun* a large pipe or tunnel which takes waste water and material such as faeces away from buildings

**sewerage** *noun* a system of pipes and treatment plants which collect and dispose of sewage in a town

**shade plant** *noun* a plant which tolerates and grows in shade

**shading** *noun* the action of cutting off the light of the sun  $\bigcirc$  *Parts of the field near tall trees suffer from shading.* 

**shale** *noun* sedimentary rock formed from clay, which cracks along horizontal straight lines

**shear wave** *noun* a type of slow seismic wave that alters direction as it passes through different types of rock

**shed** verb to let something fall off as part of a natural process  $\bigcirc$  Deciduous trees shed their leaves in autumn.  $\bigcirc$  Deer shed their antlers after the mating season.

**sheep** *noun* an animal farmed for its wool, meat and milk

**sheet lightning** *noun* lightning which lights up the sky rather than producing a single visible flash

**shelf** noun a layer of rock or ice which juts out

**shelf-life** *noun* the number of days or weeks for which a product can stay on the shelf of a shop and still be good to use

shell noun a hard outer covering of an animal, egg or seed

**shellfish** *noun* a sea animal that has a hard shell and is used as food

**shelter** *noun* a structure or feature providing protection from wind, sun, rain or other weather conditions ■ *verb* to protect something from weather conditions

**shelter belt** *noun* a row of trees planted to give protection from wind

**shelterwood** *noun* a large area of trees left standing when others are cut, to act as shelter for seedling trees

**shield** *noun* a large area of very old rocks O the Canadian shield

**shifting cultivation** *noun* **1.** an agricultural practice using the rotation of fields rather than crops, short cropping periods followed by long fallows and the maintenance of fertility by the regeneration of vegetation.  $\Diamond$  **fallow 2.** a form of cultivation practised in some tropical countries, where land is cultivated until it is exhausted and then left as the farmers move on to another area

**shingle** *noun* the small pebbles found on beaches, 1–7 cm in diameter

shock noun a sudden violent impact

COMMENT: The shore is divided into different zones. The upper shore is the area which is only occasionally covered by sea water at the very highest tides. The middle shore is the main area of shore which is covered and uncovered by the sea at each tide. The lower shore is the area which is very rarely uncovered and only at the lowest tides.

**shorebird** *noun* a bird which lives and nests on the shore

**shoreline** *noun* an area of land at the edge of the sea or a lake

**shoreline management plan** *noun* a official plan for flood and coastal defence for a specific area of coast, taking into account local social and economic issues as well as environmental concerns

**short-day plant** *noun* a plant that flowers as the days get shorter in the autumn, e.g. a chrysanthemum. Compare **long-day plant** 

short ton noun US same as ton

**shower** *noun* a brief fall of rain or snow

**shrivel** verb to become dry and wrinkled  $\bigcirc$  The leaves shrivelled in the prolonged drought.

**shrub** *noun* a perennial plant with several woody stems

**shrubby** *adjective* growing like a shrub **Si** *symbol* silicon

SI noun the international system of metric measurements. Full form Système International

**sib**, **sibling** *noun* one of the offspring of the same parents  $\bigcirc$  *Brothers and sisters are all siblings.* 

SIC abbr Site of Community Importance

### sick building syndrome

**sick building syndrome** *noun* a set of symptoms that affect people when they are in a building and not when they leave the building, but that cannot be traced to specific pollutants or sources within the building. Compare **building-related illness** 

COMMENT: Symptoms of sick building syndrome include headaches, sore throats, dry skin, general tired feeling and depression. Some features that seem to be common to the buildings causing these symptoms are artificial ventilation systems with windows that do not open and energy-efficient heating, bright lighting and carpeting on floors.

**side effect** noun a secondary often undesirable effect  $\bigcirc$  Draining the marsh has had several unexpected side effects.

**sievert** *noun* a unit of measurement of the absorbed dose of radiation, calculated as the amount of radiation from one milligram of radium at a distance of one centimetre for one hour. Symbol **Sv** 

**significant** *adjective* **1.** important, considerable or notable  $\bigcirc$  *There has been a significant reduction in the amount of raw sewage being released into the sea.* **2.** too closely linked statistically to be the result of chance  $\bigcirc$  *The difference is not statistically significant.* 

**significant figures** *plural noun* the figures in a decimal number that express accuracy, beginning with the first non-zero figure on the left and ending with the figure on the right *O* shown to three significant figures

**significantly** adverb **1**. to any considerable or notable degree  $\bigcirc$  *The amount has not been significantly reduced.* **2**. in a way that is linked statistically

**silage** *noun* food for cattle formed of grass and other green plants, cut and stored in silos

**silencer** *noun* a device to reduce noise, fitted to a machine

**silica** *noun* a mineral which forms quartz and sand, and is used to make glass. Also called **silicon dioxide** 

**silicate** *noun* **1**. a chemical compound of silicon and oxygen, the most widespread form of mineral found in most rocks and soils **2**. particles of silica found in clay

**silicon** noun an element with semiconductor properties, used in crystal form as a base for the manufacture of integrated circuits (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Si**; the atomic number is **14** and the atomic weight is **28.09**.)

silicon dioxide noun same as silica

silicosis noun a type of pneumoconiosis caused by inhaling silica dust from mining or stone-crushing operations, which makes breathing difficult and can lead to emphysema and bronchitis

**silo** noun a large container for storing grain or silage

**silt** noun 1. soft mud which settles at the bottom of water 2. particles of fine quartz with a diameter of  $0.002-0.06 \text{ mm} \blacksquare \text{ verb} \square$  to silt up (of a harbour or river) to become full of silt, so that boats can no longer sail

**siltation, silting** *noun* the action of depositing silt at the bottom of water, or the state of having a silt deposit  $\bigcirc$  *increased sedimentation and siltation in backwaters* 

**silver** noun a white metallic element which is not corroded by exposure to air (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Ag**; the atomic number is **47** and the atomic weight is **107.87**.)

silvicide noun a substance which kills trees

**silvicolous** *adjective* living or growing in woodland

**silvicultural** *adjective* referring to the cultivation of trees

silviculture noun the cultivation of trees as part of forestry

**simazine** a herbicide that kills germinating seedling, used as a ground spray (NOTE: It is under review for withdrawal from use in the European Union.)

**similarity coefficient** *noun* the degree to which two things such as areas of vegetation are alike

**sink** verb to fall to the bottom of water  $\bigcirc$  sank to the river bed (NOTE: **sinks – sank – sunk**) **\blacksquare** noun **1**. a place into which a substance passes to be stored or to be absorbed.  $\Diamond$  **carbon sink 2**. a low-lying piece of land where water collects to form a pond

sinkhole noun same as sink noun 2

**sirenian** *noun* a large marine animal living in warm estuaries, e.g. a manatee. Order: Sirenia.

**sirocco** *noun* a dry wind blowing from the desert northwards in North Africa

**site** noun **1**. a place or position of something  $\bigcirc$  The rare orchid grows on only two sites.  $\bigcirc$  Hazardous chemicals found on the site include arsenic, lead mercury and cyanide.  $\Diamond$  honeypot site, landfill site **2**. a geographically defined area whose extent is clearly marked

**Site of Community Importance** *noun* a place recognised by the European Commission as important in maintaining or restoring the conservation status of the region in which it occurs. Abbr **SCI** 

Site of Special Scientific Interest noun in England, Wales and Scotland, an area of land which is officially protected to maintain its fauna, flora or geology. Abbr SSSI

**siting** noun the act of putting something or being in a particular place  $\bigcirc$  Siting the windfarm offshore has attracted criticism from bird conservation groups.

**Sitka spruce** *noun* a temperate softwood coniferous tree, that is fast-growing. It is used for making paper. Latin name: *Picea sitchensis*.

**skyline** noun a line of hills or buildings seen against the sky  $\bigcirc$  They want to protect mountain skylines from the planting of conifers.

**slack** *noun* a valley with a high water table between sand dunes

**slack water** *noun* the part of the tidal cycle occurring between the ebb and flood tides at the point when the flows are reversing direction

**slag** *noun* waste matter which floats on top of the molten metal during smelting, used to lighten heavy soils, e.g. clay, and also for making cement

**slag heap** *noun* a large pile of waste material from an industrial process such as smelting or from coal mining

slash and burn agriculture noun a form of agriculture in which forest is cut down and burnt to create open space for growing crops. Also called swidden farming (NOTE: The space is abandoned after several crops have been grown and then more forest is cut down.)

**slate** *noun* a hard metamorphic rock which splits easily along cleavage lines, used especially for making roofs

**slaughter** noun the killing of a large number of animals  $\blacksquare$  verb **1**. to kill animals for food **2**. to kill large numbers of animals  $\bigcirc$  Thousands of seals were slaughtered annually.

sleet noun icy rain ■ verb to fall as icy rain

**sludge digestion** *noun* a final treatment of sewage when it is digested anaerobically by bacteria

**sludge gas** *noun* methane mixed with carbon dioxide which is given off by sewage

**sludge gulper** *noun* a large truck which removes sludge from cesspits and septic tanks

**sludge processing** *noun* treatment of the solid or semi-solid part of sewage so that it can safely be dumped or used as a fertiliser

**slug** *noun* an invertebrate animal without a shell. It causes damage to plants by eating leaves or underground parts, especially in wet conditions.

**slug pellet** *noun* a small hard piece of a mixture containing a substance such as metaldehyde which kills slugs. Slug pellets are usually coloured blue-green.

**sluice** *noun* a channel for water, especially through a dam or other barrier

**sluice gate** *noun* a mechanism for controlling the amount of water that passes through a channel

**slum** noun an area of a city where the buildings are in bad condition and often where a lot of people live very closely together  $\blacksquare$  adjective referring to a slum  $\bigcirc$  slum housing  $\bigcirc$  slum conditions

**slurry** *noun* liquid or semi-liquid waste from animals, stored in tanks or lagoons and treated to be used as fertiliser

small-scale adjective small in size or limited in scope. Compare large-scale

**smelt** *verb* to extract metal from ore by heating it

**smelter** *noun* a processing facility where ore is heated and metal extracted from it

**smelting** *noun* the process of extracting metal from ore by heating

**smog** *noun* a form of air pollution in towns, caused by warm damp air combined with exhaust fumes from cars. ◊ **photochemical smog** 

**smoke** noun a white, grey or black mass of small particles in the air, produced by something which is burning  $\blacksquare$  verb to emit smoke  $\bigcirc$  The volcano is still smoking.

**smoke control area** *noun* an area of a town where it is not permitted to produce smoke from chimneys or fires

**smokeless** *adjective* **1.** referring to a place where there is no smoke or where smoking is not allowed **2.** referring to a fuel which does not produce smoke when it is burned

**smokeless zone** *noun* an area of a town where it is not permitted to produce smoke from chimneys or fires

**smokestack** *noun* a very tall industrial chimney, usually containing several flues

**social carnivore** *noun* a meat-eating animal that lives and hunts in a group, e.g. a lion or wolf. Compare **herbivore**, **omnivore** 

**social cost** *noun* the full cost to society of an activity, including hidden costs as well as direct costs

**social insect** *noun* an insect such as an ant or termite that lives in a large group

**social responsibility** *noun* concern for the effects upon society of activities that are undertaken, such as a concern for the effects on people's health of environmental pollution and industrial processes

**society** *noun* **1**. a group of people or animals that live together in an organised way **2**. a group of plants within a larger community

**sociology** *noun* the study of human or other societies

soda noun same as sodium hydroxide

**soda lake** *noun* a salt lake with a high concentration of sodium in the water

**sodium** noun a chemical element which is a constituent of common salt and essential to animal life (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Na**; the atomic number of **11** and the atomic weight is **22.99**.)

**sodium chloride** *noun* common salt. Formula: NaCl.

**sodium hydroxide** *noun* a compound of sodium and water which is used to make soap and to clear blocked drains. Formula: NaOH. Also called **caustic soda, soda** 

**softwood** *noun* **1**. the open-grained wood produced by pine trees and other conifers **2**. a pine tree or other conifer that produces such wood. Compare **hardwood** 

soil noun the earth in which plants grow. ◊ chernozem, loess, podsol, subsoil, top-soil

COMMENT: Soil is a mixture of mineral particles, decayed organic matter and water. Topsoil contains chemical substances which are leached through into the subsoil where they are retained. Soils are classified according to the areas of the world in which they are found, according to the types of minerals they contain or according to the stage of development they have reached.

**Soil Association** *noun* a UK organisation that certifies organically grown food **soil compaction** *noun* the process of developing a close, densely packed soil structure, as a result of pressure or heavy loads, or the state of being densely packed

**soil conservation** *noun* the use of a range of methods to prevent soil from being eroded or overcultivated

**soil creep** *noun* a slow movement of soil downhill

**soil erosion** *noun* the removal of soil by the effects of rain, wind, sea or cultivation practices

soilless gardening noun same as hydroponics

**soil map** *noun* a map showing the different types of soil found in an area

**soil nutrition** *noun* **1.** the condition of soil in terms of the plant nutrients it contains **2**. the application of fertilisers to soil  $\bigcirc$  *use muck and some seaweed for soil nutrition* 

**soil organic matter** *noun* decayed or decaying vegetation that forms part of soil. Abbr **SOM** 

**soil profile** *noun* a vertical section through the soil showing the different layers.  $\phi$  **soil horizon** 

**soil salinity** *noun* the quantity of mineral salts found in a soil (NOTE: High soil salinity is detrimental to most agricultural crops, although some plants are adapted to such conditions.)

**soil sample** *noun* a small quantity of soil used for testing

**soil science** *noun* the scientific study of all aspects of soil, including its formation, distribution and structure

**soil sterilant** *noun* something used to remove microorganisms from soil, e.g. a chemical or steam

**soil structure** *noun* the arrangement of soil particles in groups or individually, giving a loose or firm texture

**soil texture** *noun* the structure of soil based on the relative proportions of particles of different sizes it is composed of (NOTE: There are four main classes of soil texture: clay, silt, sand and loam. Loam, which contains a mixture of soil particles, is the most suitable for growing crops.)

**solar** *adjective* **1**. referring to the Sun **2**. using the energy of the Sun or driven by power from the Sun

**solar cell** *noun* a photoelectric device that converts solar energy into electricity

solar collector noun same as solar panel

**solar eclipse** *noun* a situation when the Moon passes between the Sun and the Earth during the daytime and the shadow of the Moon falls across the Earth, so cutting off the Sun's light. Compare **lunar eclipse solar energy** *noun* electricity produced from the Sun's radiation. Also called **solar power**, **solar-generated energy**, **solargenerated power** 

COMMENT: The Sun emits radiation in the form of ultraviolet rays, visible light and infrared heating rays. Solar energy can be collected by various methods, most often by heating water, which is then passed into storage tanks. Although solar energy is easy to collect, the problem is in storing it in order to make sure that power is available for use during the night or when it is cloudy.

**solar gain** *noun* the amount of heat in a building derived from solar radiation through windows or transparent walls

solar-generated energy, solar-generated power noun same as solar energy solar heating noun the use of the Sun's energy to heat water as it passes through heat-absorbing panels

**solarisation**, **solarization** *noun* exposure to the rays of the Sun, especially for the purpose of killing pests in the soil, by covering the soil with plastic sheets and letting it warm up in the sunshine

**solar panel** *noun* a device with a dark surface which absorbs the sun's radiation and uses it to heat water. Also called **solar collector, collector panel** 

**solar power** noun same as **solar energy solar-powered** adjective powered by energy derived from the Sun's rays  $\bigcirc a$  solar-powered steam pump

**solid** *adjective* not liquid or gaseous  $\bigcirc a$  *lump of solid matter*  $\bigcirc a$  *solid object*  $\bigcirc$  *Visibility is reduced by the presence of solid particles such as dust or sand in the atmosphere.*

solidification noun the process of becoming solid

**soluble** *adjective* referring to a substance that can be dissolved  $\bigcirc$  *fat-soluble*  $\bigcirc$  *water-soluble* 

**solum** *noun* soil, including both topsoil and subsoil

**solute** *noun* a solid substance which is dissolved in a solvent to make a solution

**solution** noun **1**. the act or means of solving a problem or difficulty  $\bigcirc$  The solution was to protect the plants from trampling. **2**. the answer to or a way of removing a problem or difficulty  $\bigcirc$  found a solution **3**. a change of a solid or gas into a liquid by dissolving in water or some other liquid **4**. a mixture of a solid substance dissolved in a liquid  $\bigcirc$  a dilute solution of sodium bicarbonate

**solvent** *noun* a liquid in which a solid substance can be dissolved

**SOM** *abbr* soil organic matter

**sonar** *noun* a method of finding objects under water by sending out sound waves and detecting returning sound waves reflected by the object

**sonde** *noun* a device attached to a balloon or rocket, for measuring and taking samples of the atmosphere

sonic adjective referring to sound waves

**soot** *noun* a black deposit of fine particles of carbon which rise in the smoke produced by the burning of material such as coal, wood or oil

**sorghum** *noun* a drought-resistant cereal plant grown in semi-arid tropical regions such as Mexico, Nigeria and Sudan. Latin name: *Sorghum vulgare*.

**sound** *noun* something that can be heard and is caused by vibration of the surrounding air

**sound insulation** *noun* preventing sound escaping or entering

**source** noun **1.** a substance or object which produces something  $\bigcirc$  Hot rocks are

a potential energy source.  $\bigcirc$  Plants tend to turn towards a light source. **2.** the place where a river starts to flow  $\bigcirc$  The source of the Nile is in the mountains of Ethiopia.

**southern hemisphere** *noun* the lower half of the Earth

**Southern Lights** *plural noun* a spectacular illumination of the sky in the southern hemisphere caused by ionised particles striking the atmosphere. Also called **Aurora Australis** 

**SOW** *verb* to put seeds into soil so that they will germinate and grow

**soya** *noun* a plant that produces edible beans which have a high protein and fat content and very little starch. Latin name: *Glycine max*. Also called **soya bean, soybean** 

**soya bean**, **soybean** *noun* **1**. a bean from a soya plant **2**. same as **soya** 

**sp.** *abbr* species (NOTE: The plural, for several species, is **spp**.)

**sparse** adjective having only a small number of items or individuals in a specific area  $\bigcirc$  a few sparse bushes in the desert  $\bigcirc$ a sparse population

**spate** noun  $\Box$  in (full) spate very full of water and overflowing its banks  $\bigcirc$  *The river was in full spate.* 

**spathe** *noun* a large funnel-shaped bract, often coloured, around a flower head

**spawn** noun a mass of eggs produced by a fish or reptile ○ *Frog spawn develops into tadpoles.* ■ *verb* (of a fish or reptile) to produce a mass of eggs

**SPEC** *abbr* Species of European Conservation Concern

**Special Area of Conservation** *noun* a site designated to meet the requirements of the Habitats and Species Directive of the European Union. Abbr **SAC** 

**specialisation**, **specialization** *noun* **1**. the activity of being concerned with one particular area of knowledge in detail **2**. a particular area of knowledge

**specialise**, **specialize** *verb* to be concerned with one particular area of knowledge in detail  $\bigcirc$  *She specialises in the study of conifers*.

**Species Action Plan** *noun* a scheme aimed at protecting species that are at risk by collecting all the available ecological data and listing appropriate conservation actions

**species barrier** *noun* the inability of members of different species to produce healthy offspring if they mate or cross

**species diversity** *noun* the range of species found in an area

**species of conservation concern** *noun* a species that is in decline, rare or scarce in the wild. Abbr **SoCC** 

**species of European concern** *noun* a species that is in decline, rare or scarce in Europe. Abbr **SPEC** 

**species pool** *noun* the group of all members of a species

**species richness** *noun* the number of species found in an area

**species richness map** *noun* a map showing the distribution of species in an area

**specific** *adjective* **1.** clearly defined and definite ○ *The plants have specific requirements for growth.* **2.** characteristic of something **3.** referring to species. ◊ **interspecific, intraspecific** 

# **specificity** noun the characteristic of having a specific range or use $\bigcirc$ Parasites show specificity in that they live on only a limited number of hosts.

**specific name** *noun* the scientific name by which a species is differentiated from other members of the genus (NOTE: It is the second name in the binomial classification system, the first being the name which identifies the genus. It is written with a small letter.)

**specimen** noun **1**. a representative of a group, especially an animal or plant  $\bigcirc a$  rare double-flowered specimen **2**. a small quantity of something given for testing  $\bigcirc$ 

Scientists have taken away soil specimens for analysis.

**spectrography** *noun* the recording of a spectrum on photographic film

**spent fuel** *noun* fuel which has been used in a nuclear reactor but which is still fissile and can be reprocessed  $\bigcirc$  *Tonnes of spent fuel are sent for reprocessing.* 

**spent nuclear fuel** *noun* radioactive material that has undergone one year of decay since being taken from a nuclear reactor but has not been separated into its components by reprocessing. Abbr **SNF** 

**sperm** *noun* same as **spermatozoon** (NOTE: The plural is **sperm**.)

**spermatogenesis** *noun* the formation and development of spermatozoa

**spermatophyte** *noun* a seed-producing plant such as an angiosperm or a gymnosperm

**spermatozoon** *noun* a mature male sex cell, which is capable of fertilising an ovum (NOTE: The plural is **spermatozoa**.)

**sperm whale** *noun* a large toothed whale with a massive head inside which is a cavity containing sperm oil for which it was formerly hunted

**sphagnum** *noun* a type of moss which grows in bogs

**spider** *noun* one of a large group of animals, with two parts to their bodies and eight legs. Class: Arachnida.

**spike** *noun* a tall pointed flower head (**inflorescence**) in which small flowers without stalks grow from a central flower stem

**spill** *noun* a quantity of liquid which has escaped from a container or confined area

**spillage** noun **1**. the process of escaping from a container or confined area  $\bigcirc$  spillage of the river onto the adjacent land **2**. a quantity of liquid which has escaped from a container or confined area

**spillway** *noun* a channel down which water can overflow from the reservoir behind a dam

**spray** noun **1**. a mass of tiny drops of liquid **2**. special liquid for spraying onto a plant to prevent insect infestation or disease  $\blacksquare$  verb **1**. to send out a liquid in a mass of tiny drops  $\bigcirc$  They sprayed the plants with water at regular intervals. **2**. to send out a special liquid onto a plant to prevent insect infestation or disease  $\bigcirc$  Apple trees are sprayed twice a year to kill aphids.

**sprayer** *noun* a machine which forces a liquid through a nozzle under pressure, used to distribute liquids such as herbicides, fungicides, insecticides and fertilisers

**stator** noun a fixed part of a rotary machine  $\bigcirc$  The low pressure compressor has large rotor blades and stator blades.

**steady state** *noun* a situation where the input, output and properties of a system remain constant over time

**steam** *noun* vapour that comes off boiling water and condenses in the atmosphere

**stearic acid** *noun* a colourless insoluble fatty acid found in animal and vegetable fats. It is used for making candles and soap. Formula:  $C_{18}H_{36}O_3$ .

**steel** *noun* an alloy mainly of iron and carbon

**steelworks** *noun* a factory where steel is produced from iron ore

**stele** *noun* the core of roots and stems, consisting of vascular tissue arranged in different patterns in different types of plant **stem** *noun* **1**. the main stalk of a plant that holds it upright **2**. a subsidiary plant stalk, branching out from the main stalk or attaching a leaf, flower or fruit

steno- prefix narrow or constricted

**stenohaline** *adjective* **1**. referring to an organism that cannot tolerate variations in salt concentration in its environment **2**. referring to an organism that cannot survive variations in osmotic pressure of soil water

**stewardship** *noun* the protection of the environment for the future benefit of generations of human beings by developing appropriate institutions and strategies

**stigma** *noun* the part of a flower's female reproductive organ that receives the pollen grains (NOTE: It is generally located at the tip of the **style**.)

stimulate verb to make an organism or organ react or respond

**stimulus** *noun* something that makes an organism or organ react or respond, e.g. light, heat or noise (NOTE: The plural is **stimuli**.)

**sting** noun **1**. an organ with a sharp point, used by an insect or scorpion to pierce the skin of its victim and inject a toxic substance into the victim's bloodstream **2**. the action of using a sting **3**. a raised area on the skin produced by a sting **4**. a small itchy lump that is the result of touching a plant such a nettle that irritates the skin  $\blacksquare$  verb **1**. **stoma** *noun* a pore in a plant, especially in the leaves, through which carbon dioxide is taken in and oxygen is sent out. Each stoma in a leaf is surrounded by a pair of guard cells, which close the stomata if the plant needs to conserve water. (NOTE: The plural is **stomata**.)

**stone** *noun* **1**. a single small piece of rock **2**. a mineral formation **3**. a hard endocarp that surrounds a seed in a fruit such as a cherry

**stoneground** *adjective* referring to flour which has been made by grinding between flat heavy stones

stony adjective with many stones

**storage** *noun* the act of keeping something until it is needed

**storage organ** *noun* a plant part that stores food from the previous growing season and allows the plant to survive without leaves over winter, e.g. a potato tuber or a daffodil bulb

**storage tank** *noun* a large tank for storing a liquid

**store** verb to keep something until it is needed  $\bigcirc$  Whales store energy as blubber under the skin.

**storm** noun a period of violent weather, with wind and rain or snow  $\bigcirc$  There was a storm during the night.  $\bigcirc$  Storms swept the northern region.  $\diamondsuit$  Beaufort scale

storm cloud noun a dark-coloured cloud in which vigorous activity produces heavy rain or snow and sometimes other pronounced meteorological effects such as squalls of wind **storm drain** *noun* a specially wide channel for taking away large amounts of rainwater which fall during heavy storms

storm sewage noun sewage mixed with storm water after a heavy rainfall

**storm sewer** *noun* a specially large pipe for taking away large amounts of rainwater

**storm surge** *noun* a rise in sea level as a hurricane or other severe storm moves over water, causing flooding when the storm comes ashore

**storm swell** *noun* a long, often massive and wave or succession of waves without crests caused by a hurricane

**stratigraphy** *noun* the science of studying rock strata

stratocumulus noun a layer of small cumulus clouds below 3000m

**stratopause** *noun* a thin layer of the Earth's atmosphere between the strato-sphere and the mesosphere

**stratosphere** *noun* a layer of the Earth's atmosphere, above the troposphere and the tropopause and separated from the mesosphere by the stratopause

COMMENT: The stratosphere rises from about 18 km to 50 km above the surface of the Earth. It is formed of nitrogen (80%), oxygen (18%), ozone, argon and trace gases. The ozone in it forms the ozone layer.

**stratospheric** *adjective* referring to the stratosphere  $\bigcirc$  *CFCs are responsible for damage to the ozone in the Earth's stratospheric zone.* 

**stratum** *noun* a layer of rock (NOTE: The plural is **strata**.)

**streamflow** *noun* the amount and speed of water flowing in a stream

**stress** noun a condition where an outside influence changes the composition or functioning of something  $\bigcirc$  *Plants in dry environments experience stress due to lack of water.* **up** *verb* to subject something to stress

**stress-tolerant** *adjective* referring to a plant which can survive some degree of stress

**striation** *noun* **1.** a pattern of parallel lines or grooves **2.** a narrow groove or scratch on rock, caused by the action of a glacier

**strip** *noun* a long narrow piece, usually of the same width from end to end  $\bigcirc a$  *strip of paper*  $\bigcirc a$  *strip of land*  $\blacksquare$  *verb* to remove a covering from something  $\bigcirc$  *Spraying with defoliant strips the leaves off all plants.* 

**strip cropping** *noun* a method of farming in which long thin pieces of land across the contours are planted with different crops in order to reduce soil erosion

**strip cultivation** *noun* a method of communal farming in which each family has a long thin piece or several long thin pieces of land to cultivate

**subclass** *noun* a division of a class in the scientific classification of organisms

**subclimax** *noun* a stage in the development of a plant community where development stops before reaching its final stable state or **climax** 

**subcontinent** noun a very large land mass, that is a distinct part of a continent  $\bigcirc$  *the Indian subcontinent* 

**subculture** *noun* a culture of microorganisms or cells that is grown from another culture ■ *verb* to grow a culture of microorganisms or cells from another culture

**subdivision** noun a group within a division in the scientific classification of organisms

**subdominant** *adjective* referring to a species that is not as important as the dominant species

**subduct** verb to pull something underneath  $\bigcirc$  The oceanic crust is being subducted under the continents which surround it.

**subduction** *noun* the process by which a tectonic plate such as the oceanic crust is slowly being pulled under another plate

**subgroup** *noun* a small group distinguished in some way from the larger group to which it belongs

**sublimate** verb to transform directly from the solid to the gaseous state or from the gaseous to the solid state without becoming a liquid  $\bigcirc$  At low temperatures water vapour is directly sublimated into ice crystals.

sublime verb same as sublimate

**sublittoral** *adjective* further inland from a shore than the littoral zone

**submarine** *adjective* situated or existing beneath the sea  $\bigcirc$  *Shellfish collect round warm submarine vents.* 

**submerge** verb to cover something with water or to become covered with water ○ *The coast is dangerous, with rocks submerged at intervals along it.* 

**submicroscopic** *adjective* too small to be seen with a light microscope

**sub-Saharan** noun referring to the area south of the Sahara  $\bigcirc$  Rural supplies of wood for fuel are falling in many countries of sub-Saharan Africa.

**subsere** *noun* the development of a plant and animal community after destruction of an existing community by fire, flood or human action

**subside** verb 1. to go down or to become less violent  $\bigcirc$  After the rainstorms passed, the flood waters gradually subsided. 2. to sink or fall to a lower level  $\bigcirc$  The office block is subsiding owing to the shrinkage of the clay it is built on.

**subsidence** noun **1.** (of a piece of ground or a building) the process of sinking or falling to a lower level  $\bigcirc$  Subsidence caused by the old mine shaft closed the main road. **2.** a gradual downward movement of a mass of air

**subsidy** noun money given by a government or organisation to help an industry, charity or other organisation  $\bigcirc$  The reform will result in subsidies for farming being replaced by payments for caring for the environment.

**subsistence** *noun* the condition of managing to live on the smallest amount of resources including food needed to stay alive **subsistence** farming *noun* the activity of growing just enough crops to feed the farmer's family and having none left to sell **subsoil** *noun* a layer of soil under the topsoil (NOTE: The subsoil contains little organic matter but chemical substances from the topsoil leach into it.)

**substitution effect** *noun* the effect on the environment of substituting one form of action for another

**substrate** *noun* **1**. a substance that is acted on by a catalyst such as an enzyme **2**. the matter or surface on which an organism lives

**substratum** *noun* a layer of rock beneath the topsoil and subsoil (NOTE: The plural is **substrata**.)

subterranean adjective below the ground

**subtropical** adjective referring to the subtropics  $\bigcirc$  The islands enjoy a subtropical climate.  $\bigcirc$  Subtropical plants grow on the sheltered parts of the coast.

**subtropics** *plural noun* an area between the tropics and the temperate zone

**suburb** *noun* a residential part of a town, away from the centre, but still within the built-up area

suburban adjective referring to the suburbs

**succession** *noun* a series of stages, one after the other, by which a group of organisms living in a community reaches its final stable state or **climax** 

successive adjective referring to events or things following on one after another

**succulent** *noun* a plant that has fleshy leaves or stems in which it stores water, e.g. a cactus

**sudden oak death** *noun* a serious disease caused by the fungus *Phytophthora ramorum* that affects many tree species (NOTE: It has killed various species of oak in the US states of California and Oregon, but European species of oak appear to be less at risk.)

**sufficiency** *noun* a large enough amount of something

**suffrutescent**, **suffruticose** *adjective* referring to a perennial plant that is woody at the base of the stem and does not die down to ground level in winter

sugar noun any chemical of the saccharide group

**sulfate** *noun* a salt of sulfuric acid and a metal

**sulfide**, **sulphide** *noun* an ion of sulfur present in chemical compounds and mineral ores

**sulfite**, **sulphite** *noun* a salt of sulfuric acid that forms part of several chemical compounds and is used in processing paper

**sulfonation**, **sulphonation** *noun* the incorporation of sulfonic acid into an organic substance

**sulfonator**, **sulphonator** *noun* an apparatus for adding sulfur dioxide to water to remove excess chlorine

**sulfur**, **sulphur** *noun* a yellow non-metallic chemical element that is essential to biological life. It is used in the manufacture of sulfuric acid and in the vulcanisation of rubber. (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **S**; the atomic number is **16** and the atomic weight is **32.06**. The usual and recommended scientific spelling of sulphur and derivatives such as sulphate, sulphide and sulphonate is with an -f-, though the spelling with -ph- is still common in general usage.)

COMMENT: In the United Kingdom, the removal of sulfur from the atmosphere means that some crops such as oilseed rape are deficient and sulfur needs to be added to fertilisers.

**sulfur cycle**, **sulphur cycle** *noun* the process by which sulfur flows from the environment, through organisms and back to the environment again

**supercell** *noun* the centre of a very large tornado or thunderstorm

**superheated** *adjective* referring to steam that is heated to a high temperature in a power station

**superorganism** *noun* a group or community of individual organisms that functions as a single unit (NOTE: A forest, a termite colony and even human society can all be viewed as superorganisms.)

**superphosphate** *noun* a chemical compound formed from calcium phosphate and sulfuric acid, used as a fertiliser

**supersaturated** *adjective* referring to air which contains more moisture than the amount required to saturate it

**superweed** *noun* a weed resistant to herbicides that might develop in future as hybrid of a weed and a genetically modified plant

**supply** noun **1**. the provision of something that is needed  $\bigcirc$  safeguard the generation and supply of power **2**. a stock of something that is needed  $\bigcirc$  a year's supply of food

**surface evaporation** *noun* the evaporation of water from the surface of a body of water

**surface runoff** *noun* a flow of rainwater, melted snow or excess fertiliser from the surface of land into streams and rivers

surface soil noun same as topsoil

**surface water** *noun* water that flows across the surface of the soil as a stream after rain and drains into rivers rather than seeping into the soil itself. Compare **ground water**

systemic adjective affecting a whole organism

**systemic fungicide** *noun* a fungicide that is absorbed into a plant's sap system through its leaves or roots and protects the plant from infection by fungi without killing the plant itself.  $\Diamond$  **systemic pesticide** 

**systemic herbicide** *noun* a herbicide that is absorbed into a plant's sap system through its leaves or roots and is transported through the plant to kill the roots. Also called **systemic weedkiller**

thermal storage noun same as heat storage

thermo- prefix heat or temperature

thermocline *noun* same as metalimnion. • epilimnion, hypolimnion

thermodynamic temperature noun temperature measured on a scale that is independent of the substance being used, expressed in kelvin

**thermograph** *noun* an instrument that records changes in temperature on a roll of paper

**thermolysis** *noun* a reduction in body temperature, e.g. by sweating

**thermometer** *noun* an instrument for measuring temperature

thermometry noun the science of measuring temperature

thermonasty noun a response of plants to heat

**thermoneutral zone** *noun* a range of environmental temperatures in which an endotherm can easily maintain a constant body temperature

thermonuclear energy noun energy produced by fusion of atomic nuclei

**thermoperiodic** *adjective* referring to an organism that reacts to regular changes in temperature

**thermoperiodicity**, thermoperiodism *noun* the effect on an organism of regular changes in temperature

**thermophilic** *adjective* referring to organisms such as algae living in the hot water of thermal springs that need a high temperature to grow

**thermoplastic** *adjective* able to be recycled by heating and cooling  $\bigcirc$  *thermoplastic materials* 

**thermoregulation** *noun* the control of body temperature by processes such as sweating and shivering

**thermosphere** *noun* the zone of the atmosphere above 80km from the surface of the Earth, where the temperature increases with altitude

**therophyte** *noun* an annual plant that completes its life cycle rapidly in favourable conditions, growing from a seed and dying within one season and then surviving the unfavourable season in the form of seeds (NOTE: Many desert plants and plants growing on cultivated land are therophytes.)

**Third World** *noun* the developing countries of Africa, Asia and Latin America (NOTE: This term is now less-often used.)

**thorium** *noun* a natural radioactive element which decomposes to radioactive radon gas (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **Th**; the atomic number is **90** and the atomic weight is **232.04**.)

**thorn** *noun* a sharp woody point on plant stems or branches

**thornbush** *noun* a shrub or bush which has sharp woody points on its stems and branches

**thorn scrub** *noun* an area of land covered with bushes and small trees which have sharp woody points on their stems and branches

thorn woodland *noun* an area of land covered with trees which have sharp woody points on their stems and branches

**threat** *noun* something dangerous which may cause harm or damage  $\bigcirc$  *Water pollution is a threat to public health.*  $\square$  **under threat (of)** likely to be harmed or damaged  $\bigcirc$  *under threat of flooding* 

**threaten** verb to be a danger or harmful to something  $\bigcirc$  Plant species growing in arid or semi-arid lands are threatened by the expansion in keeping livestock. threatened

**threatened** *adjective* in danger of being harmed, damaged, or reduced in numbers  $\bigcirc$  *a threatened habitat* 

**threatened species** *noun* a species which is in danger of becoming extinct and needs protection

COMMENT: IUCN defines three categories of threatened species, in order of danger of extinction: critically endangered, endangered and vulnerable.

**Three Mile Island** *noun* a nuclear power station in Pennsylvania, USA, where an accident in 1979 almost caused the release of large quantities of radioactive substances

**threshold** *noun* **1.** a point or limit at which something changes **2.** the limit below which a significant adverse effect is not expected

**thrive** verb (of an animal or plant) to develop and grow strongly  $\bigcirc$  These plants thrive in very cold environments.

**throw** *noun* the amount of up or down movement of rocks at a fault line

**thrust** *noun* a force in the crust of the Earth that squeezes and so produces folds

**thrust fault** *noun* a fault in which the upper layers of rock have been pushed forward over the lower layers

**thunder** noun a loud sound generated by lightning in the atmosphere  $\bigcirc$  *The storm* was accompanied by thunder and lightning.

thunderstorm *noun* a storm with rain, thunder and lightning

Ti symbol titanium

**tick** *noun* a tiny parasite that sucks blood from the skin. Order: Acarida.

tidal adjective referring to the tide

**tidal energy, tidal power** *noun* electricity produced by using the force of the tides to drive turbines. Also called **wave power** 

**tidal prism** *noun* a model of water flow in an estuary or other tidal area, used to assess the way in which pollutants are flushed through the area and dispersed

**till** noun a boulder clay soil mixed with rocks of different sizes, found in glacial deposits ■ *verb* to prepare the soil, especially by digging or ploughing, to make it ready for the cultivation of crops

**tillage** *noun* the activity of preparing the soil for cultivation

**tilth** *noun* a good light crumbling soil prepared to be suitable for growing plants  $\bigcirc$ *Work the soil into a fine tilth before sowing seeds.* 

**timber** *noun* trees which have been or are to be cut down and made into logs

**timberline** noun US same as **treeline**  $\bigcirc$  The slopes above the timberline were covered with boulders, rocks and pebbles.

tin noun 1. a metallic element, used especially to form alloys (NOTE: The chemical symbol is Sn; the atomic number is 50 and the atomic weight is 118.69.) 2. a metal container for food or drink, made of iron with a lining of tin or of aluminium. Also called tin can (NOTE: The US term is can.)

**tip** noun **1**. the end part of a plant stem where growth takes place  $\bigcirc a$  shoot tip **2**. a place where rubbish or waste is thrown away  $\bigcirc$  The siting of the council refuse tip has caused a lot of controversy.  $\blacksquare$  verb to throw away rubbish

**tissue** noun a group of cells that carries out a specific function, of which the organs of an animal or plant are formed  $\bigcirc$  photosynthetic tissue in leaves  $\bigcirc$  Most of an animal's body is made up of soft tissue, with the exception of the bones and cartilage.

**titanium** noun a light metal used to make strong alloys (NOTE: The fatigue resistance of titanium is greater than that of aluminium or steel. The chemical symbol is **Ti**; the atomic number **22** and the atomic weight is **47.90**.)

titration *noun* a process for measuring the concentration of a solution

**titre** *noun* a measurement of the concentration of a solution, as determined by titration (NOTE: The US spelling is **titer**.)

**toadstool** *noun* a poisonous fungus that resembles an edible mushroom

**TOE** *abbr* tonnes of oil equivalent

**TOID**, toid *noun* the unique 16-digit number attached to buildings and each feature of the landscape on a digital map. Full form **topographical identifier** 

tolerable daily intake *noun* the amount of a substance that it is estimated can be taken in without risk to health on a daily basis. Abbr **TDI** 

**tolerance** noun **1**. the ability of an organism to accept something, or not to react to something  $\bigcirc$  plants with frost tolerance **2**. an allowable variation in something which can be measured  $\bigcirc$  a tolerance of  $2^\circ \bigcirc$  a tolerance of 1mm

**tolerant** *adjective* not reacting adversely to something  $\bigcirc$  *a salt-tolerant plant* 

tolerate verb not to react adversely to something

**toleration** *noun* the ability to tolerate something, or the act of tolerating something  $\bigcirc$  *poor toleration of high temperatures* 

**ton** *noun* **1.** a unit of measurement of weight, equal to 1016kg. Also called **long ton 2**. *US* a unit of measurement of weight, equal to 907kg. Also called **short ton** 

tonne noun a unit of measurement of weight, equal to 1000kg. Also called metric ton

tonnes of oil equivalent *noun* a unit of measurement of the energy content of a fuel, calculated by comparing its heat energy with that of oil. Abbr **TOE** 

**toothed** *adjective* **1**. having teeth **2**. having many small indentations around the  $edge \bigcirc$  *toothed leaves* 

**toothed whale** *noun* a whale that has teeth, e.g. a sperm whale, killer whale, porpoise or dolphin. Suborder: Odontoceti.

**top-down control** *noun* the system of regulation of trophic levels by which the abundance of herbivores in the lower trophic levels is determined by factors such as predators in the higher levels. Compare **bottom-up control** 

**topographic**, **topographical** *adjective* referring to topography

**topography** *noun* the study of the physical features of a geographical area

**topotype** *noun* a population which has become different from other populations of a species because of adaptation to local geographical features

topset bed *noun* a layer of fine-grained sediment in a river delta

**topsoil** *noun* the top layer of soil, often containing organic material, from which chemical substances are washed by water into the subsoil below

**tor** *noun* a pile of blocks or rounded granite rocks found on summits and hillsides

**tornado** *noun* a violent storm with a column of rapidly turning air at the centre of an area of very low pressure, giving very high winds and causing damage to buildings

**torrent** *noun* a violent rapidly flowing stream of water or lava

**torrential** *adjective* referring to very heavy rain  $\bigcirc$  *The storm brought a torrential downpour of rain.* 

**total** adjective complete or entire  $\bigcirc$  The total world population of the animal is no more than four or five hundred pairs.

total allowable catch *noun* the maximum amount of fish permitted to be caught. Abbr TAC

**total fertility rate** *noun* an average number of children expected to be born to a female during her lifetime

**town** *noun* a collection of buildings, an urban area smaller than a city and larger than a village

**town hall** *noun* a building in a town where the administrative offices of the town are situated and where the local council has its meetings

town planner noun a person who supervises the design of a town and the way the streets and buildings are laid out and developed

town planning noun the process of designing a town or city, including the way the streets and buildings are laid out and developed

**townscape** *noun* the appearance of a town, the way in which the streets and buildings are laid out

tox-, toxi- prefix poison

**toxic** *adjective* referring to a substance that is poisonous or harmful to humans, animals or the environment

toxic emissions plural noun poisonous chemicals discharged into the air, water or land

**toxicity** *noun* the degree to which a substance is poisonous or harmful  $\bigcirc$  *They were concerned about the high level of toxicity of the fumes.* 

toxico- prefix poison

**toxicological** adjective referring to toxicology  $\bigcirc$  Irradiated food presents no toxicological hazard to humans.

toxicologist noun a scientist who specialises in the study of poisons

**toxicology** *noun* the scientific study of poisons and their effects on the human body

toxicosis noun poisoning

**toxic site** *noun* land contaminated with one or more toxic substances, usually not suitable for human habitation

toxic substance *noun* a substance that is poisonous or harmful to humans, animals or the environment

**toxic waste** *noun* industrial or chemical waste that is poisonous or harmful to humans, animals or the environment

toxin *noun* a poisonous substance produced by microorganisms. ◊ **mycotoxin TPO** *abbr* tree preservation order **trace** noun **1.** a very small amount of something  $\bigcirc$  *There are traces of radioactivity in the sample.* **2.** a line or pattern made on a screen or piece of paper by a device recording an electrical signal

**trace element** *noun* a chemical element that is essential to organic growth but only in very small quantities

COMMENT: Plants require traces of copper, iron, manganese and zinc. Humans require the trace elements chromium, cobalt, copper, magnesium, manganese, molybdenum, selenium and zinc.

**trace gas** *noun* a gas that exists in the atmosphere in very small quantities, e.g. xenon or helium

**tracer** *noun* a substance inserted into an organism so that its movements may be tracked from its colour, radioactivity, fluorescence or other characteristic

**tract** noun a wide area of land  $\bigcirc$  Large tracts of forest have been destroyed by fire.

**trade wind** *noun* a wind that blows towards the equator, from the north-east in the northern hemisphere and from the south-east in the southern hemisphere

**traffic** noun **1**. the vehicles that are travelling in an area at the same time  $\bigcirc$  rush-hour traffic **2**. aircraft, train and ships that travel from one place to another  $\bigcirc$  Lower fares have resulted in a large increase in air traffic.

**traffic-calming measure** *noun* a means of reducing the number and speed of motor vehicles using a road, e.g. speed humps or a speed limit

traffic concentration *noun* a large number of vehicles in one place

traffic congestion, traffic jam noun a blockage caused by too many vehicles on a road. ¢ congestion charging

**trail** noun **1**. a path or track  $\bigcirc$  created a new nature trail in the forest **2**. a mark or scent left by an animal  $\bigcirc$  on the trail of a badger

trait noun a genetically controlled characteristic

trans- prefix through or across

**transboundary pollution** *noun* airborne or waterborne pollution produced in one country which crosses to another. Also called **transfrontier pollution** 

**transect** *noun* a line used in ecological surveys to provide a way of measuring and showing the distribution of organisms

**transform** *verb* to change the structure or appearance of something

**transformation** *noun* a change in structure or appearance

transfrontier pollution *noun* same as transboundary pollution

**transgenic** *adjective* **1.** referring to an organism into which genetic material from a different species has been transferred using the techniques of genetic modification **2.** referring to the techniques of transferring genetic material from one organism to another **E** *noun* an organism produced by genetic modification

**transhumance** *noun* the practice of moving flocks and herds up to high summer pastures and bringing them down to a valley again in winter

transition *noun* a change from one state to another

**transitional waters** *noun* the area of surface water in a river mouth that is partly salty

**translocate** *verb* to move substances through the tissues of a plant

**translocated herbicide** *noun* a herbicide that kills a plant after being absorbed through its leaves

translocation *noun* a movement of substances through the tissues of a plant

**transmissible disease** *noun* a disease which can be transmitted to other individuals

**transmit** verb 1. to send something somewhere else  $\bigcirc$  *The charts are transmitted from one station to another by fax.* 2. to pass on a disease to another animal or plant  $\bigcirc$  *Some diseases are transmitted by insects.* 

(NOTE: transmitting – transmitted)

**transpiration** *noun* the loss of water from a plant through its stomata

**transpire** verb (of a plant) to lose water through stomata  $\bigcirc$  In tropical rainforests, up to 75% of rainfall will evaporate and transpire into the atmosphere.

**transplant** noun a plant taken from one place and planted in the soil in another place  $\blacksquare$  verb to take a growing plant from one place and plant it in the soil in another place

**transport** noun **1**. a system of moving things from one place to another  $\bigcirc$  road and rail transport  $\bigcirc$  an integrated transport policy Also called **transportation 2**.

the activity of moving something from one place to another

transportation noun same as transport transuranic element noun an artificial radioactive element which is beyond uranium in the periodic table

**trash** *noun US* unwanted material or household waste

**trawl, trawl net** *noun* a very long net with a wide mouth tapering to a pointed end, towed behind a fishing boat at any depth in the sea

**treat** verb to apply a chemical or physical process to something in order to get a specific result  $\bigcirc$  The fabric has been treated to make it waterproof.

**treatment** *noun* the application of a chemical or physical process  $\bigcirc$  *anti-corrosion treatment*  $\bigcirc$  *heat treatment*  $\bigcirc$  *the treatment of sewage* 

**tree** noun a plant typically with one main woody stem that may grow to a great height **tree cover** noun the percentage of an area occupied by trees

treehugger noun somebody who is regarded as devoted to environmental protection in an extreme or foolish way (informal)

**treeline** noun **1**. a line at a specific altitude, above which trees will not grow  $\bigcirc$ *The slopes above the treeline were covered with boulders, rocks and pebbles.* **2**. a line in the northern or southern hemisphere, north or south of which trees will not grow

tree preservation order *noun* an order from a local government department that prevents a tree from being cut down. Abbr **TPO** 

tree ring noun same as annual ring

tree savanna noun a dry grass-covered plain with some trees

**tree-sit** *noun* a protest carried out by spending a period in shelter built in a tree in an effort to prevent tree-felling or construction activities

**treeware** *noun* paper and paper products such as books made from wood pulp

**tremor** *noun* **1.** a slight shaking movement **2.** a minor earthquake

trench noun a long narrow hole in the ground

**trend** noun a gradual development  $\bigcirc$  a trend towards organic farming

**tributary** *noun* a stream or river flowing into a larger river

**tributyltin** *noun* a very toxic organic compound containing tin that is a component of the paint used on ships' hulls and

structures that stand in seawater to prevent organisms growing on them. Abbr **TBT**.  $\Diamond$  **antifouling paint** 

**trifuralin** a commonly used herbicide incorporated into the soil before planting a wide range of crops (NOTE: It is under review for withdrawal from use in the European Union.)

**trigger** verb to cause something to operate or come into effect  $\bigcirc$  The indicator triggers an aural warning if specific limits are exceeded.  $\bigcirc$  It is not known what triggered the avalanche.

**triple bottom line** *noun* the three criteria of environmental sustainability, social responsibility and sound financial performance, used in making ethical investment decisions

tritium noun a rare isotope of hydrogen trophic adjective referring to nutrition

**trophic cascade** *noun* the effect that a change in the size of one population in a food web has on the populations below it

trophic chain *noun* same as food chain trophic level *noun* one of the levels in a food chain

COMMENT: There are three trophic levels. Producers, organisms such as plants, take energy from the Sun or the environment and convert it into matter. Primary consumers, organisms such as herbivores, eat producers. Secondary consumers are carnivores that eat herbivores; tertiary consumers eat only other carnivores.

**trophic pyramid** *noun* a chart showing the structure of an ecosystem in terms of trophic levels

trophic structure noun the structure of an ecosystem, shown by food chains and food webs.  $\Diamond$  dystrophic, eutrophic, mesotrophic, oligotrophic

**tropho-, troph-** *prefix* referring to food or nutrition

-trophy *suffix* 1. nourishment 2. development of an organ

-tropic suffix turning towards

**tropical** adjective referring to the tropics O The disease is carried by a tropical insect.

tropical desert noun same as hot desert

**tropics** plural noun the region between the Tropic of Cancer and the Tropic of Capricorn, where the climate is hot and often humid  $\bigcirc a$  disease which is endemic in the tropics

**tropism** *noun* the action of a plant organ turning towards a stimulus

**tropopause** *noun* a layer of the atmosphere between the troposphere and the stratosphere

**troposphere** *noun* the lowest region of the atmosphere, extending to about 12km above sea level

tropospheric adjective referring to the troposphere

**tropospheric ozone** noun the ozone that is located in the troposphere and plays a significant role in the greenhouse gas effect and urban smog

**trough** noun **1.** a low point in a cycle  $\bigcirc$ The graph shows the peaks and troughs of pollution over the seasons. **2.** a long narrow area of low pressure with cold air in it, leading away from the centre of a depression

**trunk** *noun* **1**. the main woody stem of a tree **2**. the long muscular tube at the front of the head of an elephant, used for grasping things and taking up water

**tuber** noun a swollen underground stem or root, which holds nutrients and which has buds from which shoots develop  $\bigcirc A$  potato is the tuber of a potato plant.

**tuberous** *adjective* **1**. like a tuber **2**. referring to a plant that grows from a tuber

**tufa** *noun* a form of calcareous deposit found near hot springs

**tundra** *noun* a cold Arctic region without trees which may be covered with low shrubs, grasses, mosses and lichens

**turbid** *adjective* referring to a liquid which is cloudy because of particles suspended in it

**turbidity** *noun* cloudiness of a liquid, because of particles suspended in it

**turbine** *noun* a mechanical device which converts moving liquid, steam or air into energy by turning a generator

**turbocline** *noun* the lower layer of water at the base of the seasonal boundary layer

**turgor** *noun* the normal state of a plant cell when the vacuole is full of water

**twin** *noun* one of two babies or animals born at the same time from two ova fertilised at the same time or from one ovum that splits in two

twister noun US a tornado (informal)

**ultraplankton** *plural noun* plankton in the size range 0.5–10 µm

**ultrasonic** *adjective* referring to the frequencies in the range of 20000Hz which cannot be heard by the human ear

**ultrasonics** *noun* the study of ultrasound **ultrasonic waves** *plural noun* sound waves in the range of 20000Hz

**ultrasound** *noun* sound in the range of 20000 Hz which cannot be heard by the human ear

**ultraviolet** *adjective* referring to the range of invisible radiation wavelengths just greater than those of the visible spectrum. Abbr **UV** 

**ultraviolet rays** *plural noun* the short invisible rays, beyond the violet end of the colour spectrum, which form the tanning and burning element in sunlight

COMMENT: UV rays form part of the highenergy radiation which the Earth receives from the Sun. UV rays are classified as UVA and UVB rays. UVB rays form only a small part of radiation from the Sun but they are dangerous and can cause skin cancer if a person is exposed to them for long periods. The effect of UVB rays is reduced by the ozone layer in the stratosphere

**unconfined** *adjective* referring to ground water or an aquifer of which the upper surface is at ground level

**uncontaminated** *adjective* not having been contaminated

uncontrollable adjective unable to be controlled

**uncontrolled dumpsite** *noun* a place where waste is left without permission or control

**uncontrolled fire** *noun* a fire which has ignited accidentally and burns out of control

**uncoordinated** *adjective* not joined together or working together

**uncropped land** *noun* land on which crops are not currently being grown or have never been grown

**underwood** *noun* the small trees in a wood, below the canopy

**UNFCCC** *abbr* United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change

**ungulate** *adjective* having hoofs (NOTE: Ungulates are divided into two groups, oddtoed such as horses or even-toed such as cows.) ■ *noun* a grazing animal that has hooves, e.g. a horse

unicellular *adjective* referring to an organism formed of one cell. Compare multicellular

**unit** noun **1**. a component of something larger **2**. a quantity or amount used as a standard, accepted measurement  $\bigcirc$  The internationally agreed unit of pressure is the millibar.  $\bigcirc$  The higher the Sun is in the sky, the more intense is the radiation per unit area.

United Kingdom Atomic Energy Authority noun the official organisation in the United Kingdom responsible for all aspects of atomic energy, both commercially and in research. Abbr UKAEA

Únited Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change noun an agreement by nearly all world governments to act on issues affecting climate. Abbr UN-FCCC

unlawful adjective not permitted by law

**unleaded petrol** *noun* petrol with a low octane rating, which has no lead additives such as tetraethyl lead and therefore creates less lead pollution in the atmosphere

**unlined** *adjective* referring to something with no lining, such as a landfill site from which waste liquids can leak out into the surrounding soil

**unnatural** *adjective* not found in nature **unneutralised**, **unneutralized** *adjective* not having been made neutral

**unpolluted** *adjective* not affected by pollution  $\bigcirc$  *the relatively unpolluted atmosphere in mountain areas* 

**unsettled** *adjective* referring to weather which changes frequently from rainy to fine and back again

**unsightly** *adjective* not pleasant to look at  $\bigcirc$  *The company is proposing to run a line of unsightly pylons across the moors.* 

**unspoilt** adjective referring to a landscape which has not been damaged by development  $\bigcirc$  an area of unspoilt woodland  $\bigcirc$  The highland region is still unspoilt.

**unstable** *adjective* not stable and liable to change easily

**unsterilised**, unsterilized adjective not free from microorganisms  $\bigcirc$  unsterilised bottles

**upland** noun an inland area of high land ○ The uplands have different ecosystems from the lowlands. ■ adjective referring to an upland ○ upland farming

upland farm noun same as hill farm

uplands *plural noun* an inland region of high land

**upstream** adverb, adjective towards the source of a river  $\bigcirc$  The river is contaminated for several miles upstream from the estuary.  $\bigcirc$  Pollution has spread into the lake upstream of the waterfall.  $\bigcirc$  Upstream communities have not yet been affected. Compare downstream

**upwelling** *noun* the process by which warmer surface water in the sea is drawn away from the shore and replaced by colder water from beneath the surface

**uranium** *noun* a naturally radioactive metallic element which is an essential fuel for nuclear power (NOTE: The chemical symbol is **U**; the atomic number is **92** and the atomic weight is **283.04**.)

urban adjective referring to towns

**urban area** *noun* a town or city, area which is completely built up

**urban blight** *noun* an unattractive, dirty and dilapidated area in a city or town

**urban decay**, **urban erosion** *noun* the condition where part of a city or town becomes old, dirty or ruined, because businesses and wealthy families have moved away from it

**urban design** *noun* the process of deciding how to lay out a town and what type and style of buildings to have

**urban fringe** *noun* land at the edge of a city or town

**urban growth** *noun* an increase in the size and number of towns

**urbanisation**, **urbanization** *noun* the spread of built-up areas into the surround-ing countryside

**urban landscape** *noun* the visual appearance of a town

**urban redevelopment**, **urban regeneration**, **urban renewal** *noun* the process by which large areas of derelict and industrial land and rundown housing areas are restored to become thriving communities once more

**urban sprawl** noun the uncontrolled spread of new houses and other buildings on the edges of towns and cities into the countryside  $\bigcirc$  There is a need to protect the remaining open spaces from urban sprawl.

**urban wastewater** *noun* water from homes, or the total of water from homes, businesses and rainfall, that flows into the sewage system

**urea** noun a crystalline solid produced in the liver from excess amino acids and excreted by the kidneys into the urine (NOTE: It is made commercially from carbon dioxide and ammonia and is used as a fertiliser and in other products.) **urine** *noun* a liquid secreted as waste from an animal's body

**user-pays principle** *noun* the principle that a user of a service or resource pays directly for the amount they use, rather than the cost being shared by all the users or a community equally.  $\Diamond$  **polluter-pays principle** 

utilitarian justification *noun* a reasoning for conservation based on the idea that the environment should provide direct economic benefits to the population

**utility** *noun* a company that organises an essential public service such as electricity, gas or public transport

**vadose** *adjective* referring to an area which lies between the surface of the ground and the water table

**vagrant** *noun* a bird which only visits a country or region occasionally

**vale** noun same as **valley** (used especially in place names)

**value** noun a quantity shown as a number **vaporise**, **vaporize** verb to turn into vapour, or to turn something into a vapour  $\bigcirc$ *Water vaporises when heated.* 

**vapour** *noun* a gaseous form of a liquid (NOTE: The US spelling is **vapor**.)

**variable** *adjective* changing or changeable  $\bigcirc$  *Winds are more variable in the northern hemisphere than in the southern hemisphere.* 

**variant** *noun* a specimen of a plant or animal that is different from the usual type

**variation** noun **1**. the existence of a difference in amount, concentration, number or other feature **2**. a difference within a possible range or from a standard **3**. something that is slightly different from other similar things

**variety** noun **1**. a number of different things  $\bigcirc$  a wide variety of reasons why people like and dislike cities **2**. a type of some-Green vegetables are a source of dietary fithing **3.** a named cultivated plant  $\bigcirc$  *a new* variety of wheat Also called **cultivar** 

**vascular bundle** *noun* a strand of plant tissue containing the xylem and phloem tubes that transport water and food to and from different parts of the plant

**vascular plant** *noun* a plant that has specialised tubes within it for transporting sap (NOTE: All flowering plants, conifers, ferns, clubmosses and horsetails, but not mosses and liverworts, are vascular plants.)

**vascular system** *noun* **1.** (*in animals*) a system of tubes that carry liquid, e.g. blood **2.** (*in plants*) a system of conducting tissues that carry nutrients from the roots to the upper parts of the plant

vascular tissue noun a specialised plant tissue consisting of phloem and xylem, which transports dissolved sugar, water and dissolved minerals throughout the plant

**vector** noun an insect or animal which carries a disease or parasite and can pass it to other organisms  $\bigcirc$  *The tsetse fly is a vector of sleeping sickness.* 

**veer** verb (of wind) to change in a clockwise direction, in the northern hemisphere  $\bigcirc$  Winds veer and increase with height ahead of a warm front. Opposite **back** 

**vegetable** *noun* a plant grown for food, especially plants grown for leaves, roots or pods or seeds that are usually cooked  $\bigcirc$ *bre.* 

#### vegetable farming

vegetable farming noun the activity of growing vegetables for sale

vegetable kingdom noun the category of all organisms classed as plants

vegetarian noun, adjective a person who does not eat meat

**vegetation** noun **1.** plants that are growing  $\bigcirc$  The vegetation was destroyed by fire.  $\bigcirc$  Very little vegetation is found in the Arctic regions. **2.** the set of plants that is found in a particular area  $\bigcirc$  He is studying the vegetation of the island.

vegetation loss noun the loss of plants from an area by processes such as pollution or clearing

**vegetation map** *noun* a map showing the pattern of vegetation in an area

**vegetative** adjective **1**. referring to plants O The loss of vegetative cover increases the accumulation of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. **2**. referring to the process of growth and development **3**. referring to reproduction that does not involve sex cells

vegetative propagation noun the artificial reproduction of plants by taking cuttings or by grafting, not by seed

**vegetative reproduction** *noun* a form of reproduction in which a plant reproduces itself from parts such as bulbs or tubers rather than from seed

**veil** noun a thin layer of cloud or mist **vein** noun a thin tube that forms part of the structure of a leaf or the circulation system of an animal, allowing the flow of liquids

**vent** *noun* **1.** a hole through which air, smoke or gas can leave a building or other structure **2.** a hole through which gases or lava escape from a volcano

ventilate verb to cause air to pass in and out of a place freely

ventilation *noun* the process of air passing in and out of a place freely

ventilation system noun a system that allows fresh air to move around a building ventilator noun a device that causes fresh air to pass into a room or building

ventral adjective referring to the abdomen or the front of the human body

**venturi effect** *noun* the rapid flow of a liquid or a gas as it passes through a narrower channel

**Verge** noun **1.** the edge or boundary of something **2.** an area of grass and other plants at the side of a road  $\bigcirc$  Roadside verges, especially motorway verges, offer security from human disturbance, and the wildlife quickly adapts to the noise and wind generated by passing vehicles.  $\square$  on

**the verge of** at the point where something starts to happen

vermicide noun a substance that kills worms

**vermiculite** *noun* a substance that is a form of silica processed into small pieces. It is used instead of soil in horticulture because it retains moisture.

**vermin** noun an organism that is regarded as a pest  $\bigcirc$  Vermin such as rats are often carriers of disease.  $\diamondsuit$  **pest** (NOTE: Usually treated as plural.)

vernacular adjective limited to a specific area

**vernacular building** *noun* a building built in the distinctive local style of the place where it is found

**vernacular material** *noun* a building material found in an area and not brought from elsewhere

vernal adjective referring to the spring

**vernalisation**, vernalization *noun* **1**. a requirement by some plants for a period of cold in order to develop normally **2**. the technique of making a seed germinate early by refrigerating it for a time

**vertebra** *noun* one of the ring-shaped bones which link together to form the backbone (NOTE: The plural is **vertebrae**.)

**vertebrate** noun an animal that has a backbone  $\blacksquare$  adjective referring to animals that have a backbone  $\triangleright$  compare (all senses) **invertebrate** 

vertical-axis wind turbine noun a type of wind turbine with a vertical main shaft

vertical-looking radar noun radar equipment used for analysis of features such as insect populations and movement. Abbr VLR

vertical stratification *noun* an area in water or soil where layers are found on top of each other

**vessel** *noun* **1**. a container for liquids **2**. a tubular structure which carries liquid around the body of an animal or plant **3**. a ship or boat

**vestigial** adjective existing in a simple and reduced form  $\bigcirc$  Some snakes have vestigial legs.

veteran tree noun same as ancient tree victim noun a person or animal that is injured, harmed or attacked

**vigorous** *adjective* growing strongly  $\bigcirc$  *Plants put out vigorous shoots in a warm damp atmosphere.* 

**viral** *adjective* referring to or caused by a virus  $\bigcirc$  *a viral disease* 

**virgin** *adjective* in its natural state, untouched by humans  $\bigcirc$  *Virgin rainforest was being cleared at the rate of 1000 hectares per month.* 

#### viscid adjective same as viscous

**viscosity** *noun* the internal resistance of a liquid to flowing

**viscous** *adjective* referring to a liquid which is thick, sticky and slow-moving. Also called **viscid** 

**visibility** noun the degree to which unlit objects can be seen by day and lighted objects can be seen by night  $\bigcirc$  Measurement of visibility by day is made by direct observation of objects at known distances and is therefore an estimated value.

**visible** adjective referring to something that can be seen  $\bigcirc$  *The Sun will be clearly visible through cumulus cloud.* 

**visitor**, visitant *noun* a bird that comes to a region regularly when migrating  $\bigcirc$  *Flycatchers are summer visitors to Britain.* 

**vital** adjective important, or essential for life  $\bigcirc$  Vital nutrients are leached from the topsoil.  $\bigcirc$  Oxygen is vital to the human system.

vitamin *noun* a substance not produced in the body, but found in most foods, and needed for good health

viviparous adjective 1. referring to an animal such as a mammal or some fish that give birth to live young. Compare oviparous (NOTE: Birds, reptiles and some fish lay eggs and are oviparous.) 2. reproducing by buds that form plantlets while still attached to the parent plant or by seeds that germinate within a fruit

vivisection *noun* the dissection of a living animal under experimental conditions VLR *abbr* vertical-looking radar

VOC abbruelatile ergenie compo

**VOC** *abbr* volatile organic compound **volatile** *adjective* referring to a liquid which easily changes into a gas or vapour

volatile oil noun same as essential oil volatile organic compound noun an organic compound which evaporates at a relatively low temperature. Abbr VOC (NOTE: Volatile organic compounds such as ethylene, propylene, benzene and styrene contribute to air pollution.)

**volcanic** *adjective* referring to volcanoes **volcano** *noun* a mountain surrounding a hole in the Earth's crust, formed of solidified molten rock sent up from the interior of the Earth

COMMENT: Volcanoes occur along faults in the Earth's surface and exist in well-known chains. Some are extinct, but others erupt relatively frequently. Some are always active, in that they emit sulfurous gases and smoke, without actually erupting. Volcanic eruptions are a major source of atmospheric pollution, in particular of sulfur dioxide. Very large eruptions cause a mass of dust to enter the atmosphere, which has a noticeable effect on the world's climate.

**voltage** *noun* an electrical force measured in volts

**voltage drop** *noun* the voltage lost along a wire or conductor due to the resistance of that conductor

**volume** noun **1**. the amount of space occupied by a solid, a liquid or a gas  $\bigcirc$  *If the* pressure of a given mass of gas is maintained constant, the volume of gas increases as its temperature is increased. **2**. the loudness of a transmission

-vore *suffix* an organism that eats a particular diet

-vorous suffix eating a particular diet

**vortex** noun a flow of a liquid in a whirlpool or of a gas in a whirlwind  $\bigcirc$  The most destructive winds are in the vortex, where the rotation of the whirlwind produces very high wind speeds.

**VU** abbr vulnerable

**vulcanism** *noun* a movement of magma or molten rock onto or towards the Earth's surface

**vulnerability** *noun* the degree to which a person, organism, environment or system is likely to be caused harm by an activity

**vulnerable** *adjective* **1**. liable to be easily harmed **2**. referring to a species that is likely to become endangered unless protective measures are taken. Abbr **VU** 

**vulture** *noun* a large bird of prey that feeds on carrion

## W

wader noun a bird that feeds on organisms or plants found in shallow water

**wadi** noun a gully with a stream at the bottom, found in the desert regions of North Africa. Compare **arroyo** 

Waldsterben *noun* same as forest dieback (NOTE: From a German word meaning 'the dying of trees'.)

**Wallace's line** *noun* a line dividing the Australasian biogeographical region from the Southeast Asian region

**wane** verb (of the Moon or a planet) to appear to grow smaller as less of the illuminated face is visible. Compare **wax** 

**warfarin** *noun* a substance used to poison rats, to which many rats in some areas are now resistant

**warm** adjective pleasantly hot  $\bigcirc$  These plants grow fast in the warm season.  $\blacksquare$  verb to make something hotter  $\bigcirc$  The greenhouse effect has the result of warming the general atmospheric temperature.

warm-blooded *adjective* referring to an animal such as a mammal that can control its body temperature.  $\Diamond$  endotherm

warm desert noun same as mid-latitude desert

washland noun an area of land that is regularly flooded

**wash out** verb to remove a mineral by the action of running water  $\bigcirc$  Minerals are washed out of the soil during heavy rains.

**washout** *noun* a process in which drops of water form in the atmosphere and then collect pollutant particles as they fall. Compare **rainout** 

**wastage** noun the act of wasting something  $\bigcirc$  There is an enormous wastage of mineral resources.

waste noun material that is thrown away by people or is an unwanted by-product of a process ○ household waste ○ industrial waste ■ adjective without a specific use and unwanted ○ Waste products are dumped in the sea. ○ Waste matter is excreted by the body in the faeces or urine. ■ verb to use more of something than is needed

'There are estimated to be 300000 tonnes of nonnatural wastes produced on agricultural holdings in England and Wales each year. These include a wide range of materials such as waste packaging, silage plastics, metal, tyres, oils and animal health products. (Agricultural Waste: Opportunities for Change. Information from the Agricultural Waste Stakeholders' Forum 2003)

waste disposal *noun* the process of getting rid of household or industrial waste

waste disposal site noun same as waste dump

**waste disposal unit** *noun* a device that fits into the hole in a kitchen sink and grinds household waste into very small pieces so that it can be flushed away

waste dump *noun* a place where household or industrial waste is left. Also called waste disposal site

waste ground *noun* an area of land that is not used for any purpose

**wasteland** *noun* an area of land that is no longer used for agriculture or for any other purpose O Overgrazing has produced wastelands in Central Africa.

waste management *noun* the action of controlling and processing household or industrial waste

**waste neutral** *adjective* relating to activities designed to reduce waste and lead to a balance between the production of waste to be recycled and the amount of recycled products used

wastepaper noun paper that has been thrown away after use

waste processing *noun* the activity of treating waste material to make it suitable for reuse or safe disposal. Also called waste treatment

waste processing plant noun a facility where waste material is treated to make it suitable for reuse or safe disposal

waste product *noun* a substance which is produced in a process but is not needed waste site *noun* same as waste dump

waste sorting *noun* the process of separating waste into different categories of material such as glass, metal, paper or plastic

**waste stream** *noun* a quantity of separated waste that is all of the same type, e.g. paper or glass (NOTE: A major obstacle to recycling is the accidental contamination of waste streams – plastic wrapping thrown in a paper bin and so on.)

## waste treatment noun same as waste processing

**wastewater** noun water that is part of effluent or sewage, especially from industrial processes  $\bigcirc$  There is considerable interest in the anaerobic treatment of industrial wastewaters.  $\bigcirc$  Wastewater will add small but significant quantities of heavy metals to the aquatic environment.

**wastewater treatment** *noun* the processing of wastewater to make it suitable for reuse or safe disposal

wastewater treatment plant noun a place where liquid waste is processed

water noun a liquid which forms rain, rivers, lakes and the sea and which makes up a large part of the bodies of organisms. Formula:  $H_2O$ .  $\blacksquare$  verb to give water to a plant

water balance *noun* a state in which the water lost in an area by evaporation or by runoff is replaced by water received in the form of rain

waterborne adjective carried in water waterborne disease, waterborne in-

**fection** noun a disease or infection that is spread by water  $\bigcirc$  After the floods diarrhoea, dysentery and other waterborne diseases spread rapidly.

water closet *noun* a toilet in which the excreta are flushed into the sewage system by running water. Abbr WC

water column *noun* the open water of the ocean between the surface and the sea bed

watercourse *noun* a stream, river, canal or other flow of water

water cycle noun the circulation of water between the atmosphere, land and sea (NOTE: The Sun causes water to evaporate from seas, other bodies of water and land; it condenses in clouds and then falls back to the Earth's surface as rain.)

water dispersal noun the spreading of plant seeds by water

waterfall noun a place where a river or stream falls over a steep vertical drop (NOTE: Some waterfalls only appear in very wet weather.)

waterfowl *plural noun* birds which live on water, e.g. ducks

Water Framework Directive noun a basis for future policy decisions in the European Union, setting objectives for water use and management and waste water disposal. Abbr WFD

**waterhole** noun **1**. a place where water rises naturally to the surface  $\bigcirc$  In the evening, the animals gather round the wa*terholes to drink.* **2.** a pool of water created by boring holes in the ground

waterlogged adjective referring to soil that is saturated with water and so cannot keep oxygen between its particles (NOTE: Most plants cannot grow in waterlogged soil.)

water management *noun* the careful and appropriate use of water

water meadow *noun* a grassy field near a river, which is often flooded

water mill noun a mill powered by water water plant noun a plant that grows in water. Also called aquatic plant

water pollution *noun* the introduction of pollutants into watercourses or the sea, rivers, lakes or canals

water pollution abatement *noun* a reduction of pollution in watercourses or the sea

water power *noun* power derived from a descending water supply that is converted to electricity by hydraulic turbines

waterproof adjective not allowing water to pass through

water purification *noun* the removal of impurities from water

water quality noun the suitability of water for human consumption and bathing and for animals to live in  $\bigcirc$  Fish have returned to many rivers because of the improvement in water quality.

water resources *plural noun* rivers, lakes and other surface waters that supply water for human use

water-salt balance noun a state where the water in the soil balances the amount of salts in the soil

watershed *noun* a natural dividing line between the sources of river systems, dividing one catchment area from another

waterside adjective referring to a plant which grows next to a river, lake or other area of water

water solubility *noun* the degree to which something is able to be dissolved in water

water-soluble adjective able to dissolve in water

waterspout *noun* a phenomenon caused when a rapidly turning column of air forms over an area of water, sucking water up into the column

water table *noun* the area below the soil surface at which the ground is saturated with water

watertight adjective not leaking water or other fluid

water turbine *noun* a device that converts the motion of the flow of water into the turning movement of a wheel  $\bigcirc$  *Water turbines are often used to drive generators or pumps.* 

water vapour noun air containing suspended particles of water

waterway noun a river or canal used as channel for moving from one place to another

waterwheel noun a wheel with wooden steps or buckets that is turned by the flow of water against it and itself turns machinery such as a mill wheel or an electric genera-

tor. \$ overshot wheel, undershot wheel

**waterworks** *noun* a plant for treating and purifying water before it is pumped into pipes for distribution to houses, factories, schools and other places for use

**watt** *noun* an SI unit of measurement of electrical power. The work done by an electrical circuit or the power consumed is measured in watts. Symbol **W** 

**watt-hour** noun a measurement of power with respect to time. One watt-hour is equal to one watt being used for a period of one hour.

**wave** noun **1**. a mass of water moving across the surface of a lake or the sea, rising higher than the surrounding water as it moves **2**. the form in which heat, light, sound or electric current is spread

wave power noun electricity produced by using the force of waves (NOTE: In harnessing wave power, the movement of waves on the surface of the sea is used to make large floats move up and down. These act as pumps which supply a continuous flow of water to turn a turbine.)

wave refraction *noun* the tendency of wave crests to turn from their original direction and become more parallel to the shore as they move into shallower water

**Wax** noun a semi-solid or solid substance of animal, plant or mineral origin  $\blacksquare$  verb (of the Moon or a planet) to appear to grow bigger as more of the illuminated face becomes visible. Compare **wane** (NOTE: The Moon waxes between its new and full phases.)

**waxy** *adjective* **1.** smooth and shiny **2.** covered with wax

**waymarking** *noun* the practice of indicating the direction of a public path by special signs

WC abbr water closet

weather noun daily atmospheric conditions such as sunshine, wind and precipitation in an area ■ verb to change the state of soil or rock through the action of natural agents such as rain, sun, frost or wind or by artificially produced pollutants

weather chart *noun* a chart showing the state of the weather at a specific moment or changes which are expected to happen in the weather in the near future. Also called weather map

weather front *noun* the edge of mass of air where it meets another of different temperature or density. Also called **front** 

weathering *noun* the alteration of the state of soil or rock through the action of natural agents such as rain, sun, frost or wind or by artificially produced pollutants

weather map noun same as weather chart

**web** *noun* a structure of threads secreted by a spider in the form of a net

**webbed** *adjective* with skin between the toes  $\bigcirc$  *Ducks and other aquatic birds have webbed feet.* 

**weed** *noun* a plant that grows where it is not wanted, e.g. a poppy in a wheat field (NOTE: Some weeds are cultivated plants, for example oilseed rape growing in hedgerows.)

weedkiller noun same as herbicide

weedy *adjective* **1**. like a weed **2**. weak and not growing well

weedy habit *noun* the tendency of some species of plant to spread onto wasteland

**well** *noun* a hole dug in the ground to the level of the water table, from which water can be removed by a pump or bucket

**wellhead** *noun* the top structure of a well above the ground

**Wentworth-Udden scale** *noun* a scale for measuring and describing the size of grains of minerals

COMMENT: The scale runs from the largest size, the boulder, down to the finest grain, clay. The approximate diameters of each grain are: boulder, up to 256 mm; cobble, above 64 mm; pebble, between 4 and 64 mm; gravel, between 2 and 4 mm; sand, between 0.06 and 2 mm; silt and clay are the finest sizes.

wet adjective with a lot of moisture

wetfall *noun* the fall of polluting substances in rain or snow. Compare dryfall

**wetland** *noun* an area of land where the soil surface is almost level with the water table and where specially adapted vegetation has developed (*often plural*)

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wetland hydrology *noun* the study of periodic flooding or soil saturation which creates anaerobic conditions in the soil of wetlands

wet season *noun* same as rainy season WFD *abbr* Water Framework Directive

whale *noun* a very large mammal living in the sea. Order: Cetacea.

COMMENT: Whales are the largest mammals still in existence. There are two groups of whales: the toothed whales and the baleen whales. Baleen whales have no teeth and feed by sucking in large quantities of water which they then force out again through their baleen, which is a series of fine plates like a comb hanging down from the upper jaw. The baleen acts like a sieve and traps any plankton and krill which are in the water. The toothed whales have teeth and eat fish. They include the sperm whale, the killer whale and porpoises and dolphins. Whales are caught mainly for their oils, though also in some cases for food. Some species of whale have become extinct because of overexploitation and the population of many of the existing species is dangerously low. Commercial whaling is severely restricted.

whaler noun a boat which is specially equipped for catching whales. Also called whaling boat

**whaling** *noun* the catching of whales to use as food or for their oil and other commodities

whaling boat noun same as whaler

whaling fleet *noun* a group of boats specially equipped for catching whales

wheat noun a cereal crop grown in temperate regions. Genus: *Triticum*. (NOTE: Wheat is one of the major arable crops.)

wheatgerm *noun* the central part of the wheat seed, which contains valuable nutrients

wheatmeal *noun* brown flour with a large amount of bran, but not as much as is in wholemeal

whirlpool noun a rapidly turning eddy of water

whirlwind *noun* a column of rapidly turning air at the centre of an area of very low pressure (NOTE: Over water a whirlwind becomes a waterspout and over desert a dust devil.)

wholefood *noun* food such as brown rice or wholemeal flour that has not been processed and so contains the vitamins, minerals and fibre that are removed by processing

**wholegrain** *noun* a cereal grain containing the whole of the original seed, including the bran **wholemeal** *noun* flour that contains a large proportion of the original wheat seed, including the bran

wild adjective not domesticated

**wilderness** *noun* an area of wild uncultivated land, usually a long way from human habitation

wilderness area *noun* an area of undeveloped land that is protected, as a national park or other conservation area

Wildfowl and Wetlands Trust noun full form of WWT

**wildland** *noun* uncultivated land in its natural state, especially considered as a habitat for wildlife

**wildlife** noun wild animals of all types, including birds, reptiles and fish  $\bigcirc$  *Plantations of conifers are poorer for wildlife than mixed or deciduous woodlands.*  $\bigcirc$  *The effects of the open-cast mining scheme would be disastrous on wildlife, particularly on moorland birds.* 

Wildlife and Countryside Act noun in the UK, the main legislation under which native wildlife is protected





### **Beaufort scale**

The Beaufort scale was devised in 1805 by Sir Francis Beaufort, a captain (later admiral) in the British Royal Navy, to measure the observable effects of wind force at sea. It was later adapted to include effects on land, and wind speed equivalents were officially incorporated in 1926.

Sailors and forecasters use the Beaufort scale as a standardised way to rate wind speed. Warnings of potentially dangerous conditions for people in small boats are usually issued at a rating of six on the scale. The Beaufort number is also referred to as a 'Force' number, for example 'Force 10 Gale'.


### **Richter scale**

The Richter scale measures the magnitude of an earthquake based on how much the ground shakes at a distance of 100 km (60 miles) from the epicentre of an earthquake (the site on the earth's surface directly above its origin). Other systems used by seismologists to measure earthquakes include the Modified Mercalli scale, a 12-point scale that measures intensity at different locations.

#### **Natural Disasters**

**Jul 1979-May 1981** Drought. *China (Hebei).* Worst for sixty years. Much of area normally one of the most fertile in China, became a virtual desert. 14 000 000 peasants left dependent on government grain rations. It was estimated 2 000 000 children were suffering from malnutrition.

Aug-Sept 1980 Hurricane David. *Dominican Republic*. 20 killed. 60 000 homeless. Banana and grapefruit crops destroyed.

**May 1980** Volcanic eruption. USA (Washington State). 2 000 people evacuated. Large quantities of volcanic ash blanketed communities to a depth of several feet in parts of Washington, Idaho and Montana.

**Oct 1980** Earthquakes. *El Asnam, Algeria.* 7.5 and 6.5 on Richter scale. 3 600 dead. 8 252 injured. 300 000 homeless. The town had been destroyed in 1954 by another earthquake which killed 1 000. It was rebuilt by the French with supposedly 'quake-proof' structures. These were the worst affected by the 1980 earthquake.

**Nov 1980** Earthquake. *Southern Italy*. 6.8 on Richter scale. Aftershocks continued for 10 days. 200 towns and villages affected: Naples, Salerno, Avellino worst affected. 4 500 dead. 8 000 injured. 350 000 homeless.

**Jul 1981** Floods. *China (Sechuan)*. 1 385 dead. 14 109 injured. Affected 10 million people in 135 of the province's 212 counties, threatened the Gezhouba dam and destroyed more than 1 000 000 acres of crops.

Late 1982-1983 Floods. *Eastern Bolivia*. 40 500 hectares (100 000 acres) of prime agricultural land destroyed. In the high valleys of Bolivia and in southern Peru drought conditions devastated the potato crop affecting about 2 million people.

**Dec 1982** Earthquake. *Northern Yemen (Dhamar)*. 6.0 on Richter scale. 1 588 killed. 1 604 injured. 200 000 homeless.

**Feb 1983-Jul 1984** Drought. *Northeastern Brazil*. Fifth year of drought. 850 000 sq kms affected. 70% of population suffering from malnutrition.

May 1985 Cyclone and tsunami. *Southeastern Bangladesh*. 11 000 killed. 250 000 homeless.

Sept 1985 Earthquake. *Mexico City, Mexico*. 8.1 on Richter scale. More than 7 000 dead. 30 000 injured. 10 000 seriously. 100 000 homeless.

**Nov 1985** Volcanic eruption. *Colombia*. The Nevado del Ruiz volcano erupted leaving 22 000 dead, 4 000 injured and 20 000 homeless. The village of Armero was totally engulfed by a torrent of mud when La Lagunilla river burst its banks. 11 000 hectares of agricultural land ruined.

**Aug 1986** Toxic gases following volcanic eruption. *Cameroon.* Toxic gases (a mixture of carbon dioxide and hydrogen sulphide) were released from volcanic Lake Nyos, near the Nigerian border, killing 1 746 and injuring 3 000, though exact numbers of casualties will probably never be known. In Nyos village only 2 out of a population of 700 survived.

**10 Oct 1986** Earthquake. *San Salvador, El Salvador.* 7.5 on Richter scale. 1 500 killed. 300 000 homeless. On the outskirts of the city a landslide buried 100 people.

**Mar 1987** Earthquake. *Ecuador*. 7.3 on Richter scale. Followed by 1 300 aftershocks. 2-4 000 killed. 50 000 homeless. Mudslides entombed whole villages.

**Aug-Sept 1987** Floods. *Bangladesh.* 70 killed (a very low estimate). 24 000 000 homeless and without food (from a total population of 100 000 000. 2 000 000 homes, 2 600 kms of road and 4 300 000 acres of land devastated.

**Sept 1987** Heavy rains and mudslides. *Medellin, Columbia*. Shanty town of Villa Tina buried by mud. 355 people dead. 200 seriously injured. 2 100 homeless.

**Feb 1988** Mudslides. *Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.* In a shanty town in Rio after weeks of torrential rain. 300 killed. 735 seriously injured. 11 000 homeless.

Mid 1988 Drought. USA. Farming lands were turned into disaster areas and world food production fell.

Aug-Sept 1988 Floods. *Bangladesh*. Widespread flooding on a similar scale to the floods of 1987.

**Sept 1988** Hurricane Gilbert. *Jamaica*. Over 200 mph winds. Left a trail of destruction across Jamaica, Grand Cayman, the Yucatan Peninsula, Mexico, Texas. At least 240 killed, most of those in Yucatan.

Nov 1988 Earthquake. China. 7.6 on Richter scale. 900 people killed.

**Dec 1988** Earthquake. *Armenia*. 6.7 on Richter scale. 55 000 dead. 250 000 left homeless. 80% were still living in makeshift huts and tents in April 1991.

Apr 1989 Tornado. Bangladesh. 1 000 people killed and many villages destroyed.

**Sept 1989** Hurricane Hugo. *USA*. Widespread devastation in the northeastern Caribbean and southeastern USA. Winds reached up to 140 mph. Guadeloupe and Leeward Islands: 6 killed, 10 000 homeless and many crops destroyed. Montserrat: 10 killed, hospital and houses destroyed and airport runway blocked. Puerto Rico: 25 killed, 100 000 homeless. Dominica: much of banana crop destroyed. South Carolina: 5 killed, houses damaged, services disrupted.

**Oct 1989** Earthquake. *San Francisco, USA*. 6.9 on Richter scale. About 100 people killed, mostly when the elevated section of Interstate 880 highway collapsed crushing people in their cars.

Feb 1990 Mudslide. *Peru*. The village of San Miguel de Rio Mayo, 800 km north of Lima, was buried. 200 people killed or missing.

May 1990 Earthquake. *Peru*. 5.8 on Richter scale. About 200 people killed, villages flattened by landslides.

**Jan 1991** Epidemic. *Latin America*. Cholera broke out in Peru and spread to Brazil, Colombia, Chile and Ecuador. WHO estimates 42 000 people could die unless steps are taken to combat malnutrition and lack of basic sanitary and medical facilities. Famine. Still critical in Sudan, Ethiopia, Somalia, Mozambique and Angola, all countries in which armed conflict exacerbated food distribution problems.

**2** Feb 1991 Earthquake. *Afghanistan*. 6.5-6.8 on Richter scale. 1 000 killed, many more injured. Resulting floods killed 200 and left 3.000 people homeless.

Mar 1991 Floods and mudslides. *Malawi*. 516 people dead or missing. 40-50 000 homeless.

**Apr 1991** Earthquake. *Peru*. Three earthquakes, the worst of which was 6.9 on the Richter scale. 35 killed. 750 injured.

**Apr 1991** Earthquake. *Costa Rica, Panama*. 7.5 on Richter scale. About 80 people killed, 800 injured, thousands of homes destroyed.

**Apr 1991** Cyclone. *Bangladesh*. Winds up to 145 mph. 139 000 killed and thousands more threatened by epidemic. Up to 10 000 000 people homeless, 4 000 000 at risk from starvation. Toll would have been worse but for 300 cyclone shelters built under Cyclone Preparedness Programme set up by Red Crescent.

Apr 1991 Earthquake. *Georgia, Russia.* 7.2 on Richter scale. 100 people killed, several villages totally destroyed.

**Jun 1991** Volcano. *Philippines*. After lying dormant for 600 years Mount Pinatubo suffered several eruptions, some shooting volcanic ash and rock 19 miles into the air. At least 343 people were killed and 100-200 000 made homeless. 600 000 Filipinos lost their means of livelihood.

Dec 1991 Earthquake. Romania. 5.7 on Richter scale. 1 700 people made homeless.

**Dec 1991** Floods. *Texas, USA*. 13.3 inches of rain fell in six days. At least 14 people were killed.

Late Dec 1991 Cyclone. Hanoi, Vietnam. 220 people killed.

**Feb 1992** Avalanche. *South Eastern Turkey*. Avalanches smothered remote villages killing at least 167 people, most of them soldiers.

**Aug 1992** Hurricane Andrew. *USA (Bahamas, Florida and Louisiana)*. Winds up to 264 km/hr. Hurricane Andrew caused extensive damage to property, estimated at \$20 000 million in Florida. 38 people killed. Up to 200 000 people homeless.

**Sept 1992** Flooding. *Pakistan*. Floods engulfed thousands of villages and vast acres of cropland especially in Punjab, the worst affected province. More than 2 000 people killed. At least 3 000 000 homeless.

**Sept 1992** Tidal wave. *Nicaragua*. Coastal settlements devastated by tidal wave up to 15 metres high, triggered by earthquake beneath Pacific Ocean. Over 200 people dead. 4 200 homeless.

**Oct 1992** Earthquake. *Cairo, Egypt.* 5.9 on Richter scale. 552 people killed. About 3 000 injured. Hundreds made homeless.

**Dec 1992** Mudslide. *Bolivia*. Town of Caranavi engulfed. Homes pushed into Tipuani River. Around 350 people killed. 135 injured.

**Dec 1992** Earthquake. *Indonesia (Nusa Tenggara).* 6.8 on Richter scale. As many as 2 000 people killed. Created a 24 metre-high tidal wave, devastating the coastal town of Maumere, killing over 1 000 and damaging a third of the buildings.

Feb 1993 Floods. *Yemen, Iran.* Widespread damage. At least 500 people killed. More than 1 500 people displaced.

**Mar 1993** Severe storms. *USA*. Heavy snow and floods caused widespread destruction from the Florida Keys through the Deep South to northern New England. 50 tornadoes hit Florida. At least 163 people killed.

Mar 1993 Earthquake. *Erzincan, Turkey.* 6.8 on Richter scale. More than 500 people killed. Over 1 000 injured.

**Apr 1993** Floods and landslides. *Colombia*. At least 59 people killed in north-west area. Thousands homeless.

May 1993 Floods and mudslides. Tadjikistan. At least 200 people killed.

**May 1993** Landslide. *Ecuador*. Over 200 people killed in a village in south Ecuador as 15 000 tonnes buried the community.

**Jun 1993** Floods. *Bangladesh.* About 100 people killed. More than 1 million displaced. Worst affected area was Sylhet district.

Jun 1993 Mudslide. Kabul, Afghanistan. 115 people reported killed.

**Jul 1993** Torrential rains and mudslides. *India, Nepal, Bangladesh.* Worst hit areas of India in Assam and West Bengal. More than 3 700 people killed, and millions made homeless.

**Jul 1993** Flooding. USA. Midwest affected as Mississippi-Missouri river system burst its banks. 40 000 sq km flooded. At least 45 dead. 30 000 homes ruined.

**Jul 1993** Earthquake. *Japan.* 7.8 on Richter scale. Ensuing tidal waves struck parts of Hokkaido, Honshu and devastated coastal regions of Okushiri. Triggered landslides and fires. Over 150 people killed.

Aug 1993 Tropical storm. *Venezuela*. Torrential rain and high winds caused mudslides in shanty towns above Caracas. At least 150 killed. More than 400 injured.

**Sept 1993** Earthquake. *India*. 6.5 on Richter scale. Devastation in states of Maharashtra, Karnataka and Andhra Pradesh. Over 9 000 people killed. Umarga and Khilari worst hit towns. More than 30 villages flattened.

**Jan 1994** Earthquake. *Los Angeles, USA.* 57 people killed, thousands injured and about 25 000 homeless. Damage estimated at costing up to \$20 000 million.

Feb 1994 Earthquake. *Indonesia*. Struck southern Sumatran province of Lampung, killing 200 people and injuring 2 700.

May 1994 Cyclone. *Bangladesh*. 165 people officially reported killed as cyclone hit southeastern coast.

**Jun 1994** Earthquake. *Colombia*. 250 people killed as earthquake triggered mudslide in southwestern region. 11 000 homeless.

Aug 1994 Earthquake. Western Algeria. 5.6 on Richter scale. 149 people killed.

**Jan 1995** Flooding. *North Western Europe*. More than 300 000 people fled their homes in Belgium, France, Germany and The Netherlands. 40 people killed. Immediate natural cause of flood was heavy rain and snow-melt.

**Jan 1995** Earthquake. *Kobe, Japan.* 7.2 on Richter scale. About 5 000 people killed. 250 000 homeless. Widespread damage estimated at \$50 000 million.

Jan 1995 Avalanches and snowstorms. Kashmir, India. More than 200 deaths.

**Feb 1995** Earthquake. *Colombia*. 6.4 on Richter scale. 37 people killed and 200 injured in south-west region.

Mar 1995 Landslide. *Afghanistan*. 354 people killed in village of Qara Luk, in the northern province of Badakhshan.

**May 1995** Earthquake. *Sakhalin Island, Russia.* 7.5 on Richter scale. Estimated 2 000 people killed. Many thousands homeless.

Jun 1995 Earthquake. *Greece*. 6.1 on Richter scale. 25 people killed and 60 injured in western Greece.

Jun-Jul 1995 Flooding. China (Hunan). 1 200 people killed, 1 200 000 displaced.

**Jul 1995** Flooding. *Pakistan*. Floods caused by heavy rains in provinces of Baluchistan, Punjab and Sind killed more than 120 people.

mid-Jul 1995 Flooding. *Bangladesh*. More than 200 people died amid spread of disease following devastating floods which engulfed 38 districts.

**Jul 1995** Typhoon. *Southern Korea*. Southern coast hit by Typhoon Faye. Winds of 154 mph caused a 140 000-ton oil tanker to run aground off city of Yeosoo, spreading an oil slick over a 50-km area which caused considerable damage to marine life.

**Jul-Aug 1995** Flooding. *North Korea*. More than 5 000 000 people affected in Pyongyang. Damage estimated at \$15 billion.

**Sept 1995** Hurricane Ismael. *Mexico*. Pacific states of Sinaloa and Sonoro hit by Hurricane Ismael. 107 people killed and 52 000 homeless. 20 000 hectares of agricultural land devastated.

**Oct 1995** Earthquake. *Turkey*. 6.0 on Richter scale. Hit South Western town of Dinar. 84 people killed and at least 200 injured.

**Oct 1995** Tropical storm. *Philippines*. Widespread destruction throughout country caused by Tropical Storm Sybil. More than 100 people killed. At end of Oct at least 100 more people killed by Tropical Storm Zack.

**Oct 1995** Hurricane Opal. USA. 17 people killed by Hurricane Opal in Florida and neighbouring states.

**Oct 1995** Earthquake. *Sumatra, Indonesia.* 7.0 on Richter scale. Triggered landslides and killed at least 70 people. About 10 000 buildings destroyed.

**Oct 1995** Flooding. *Vietnam*. Severe floods followed torrential rains in central province of Quang Ngai. 85 people killed. 176 000 houses covered by flood waters.

**Oct 1995** Earthquake. *Mexico*. 7.6 on Richter scale. 66 people killed, hundreds injured and thousands homeless in western coastal states of Jalisco and Colima.

**Oct 1995** Earthquake. *China*. 6.5 on Richter scale. At least 29 people killed and 20 000 homeless in Southwestern Yunan. More than 12 000 buildings collapsed.

**Dec 1995** Volcanic eruption. *Nicaragua*. Relief efforts focused on clearing town of Leon (94 999 inhabitants) from ash fall to prevent spread of respiratory diseases, notably among children.

**Dec 1995-Jan 1996** Flooding. *South Africa*. At least 147 people killed in Kwazulu-Natal when Umsunduzi River and its main tributary burst their banks following heavy seasonal rains. 4 000-5 000 homeless.

Jan 1996 Flooding. *Indonesia*. Affected 50 600 households. 24 600 people evacuated. 480 seriously injured and 18 killed.

Jan 1996 Forest fire. *Argentina*. Thousands of hectares of ancient forests destroyed in national parks in southern Chebut and Rio Negro provinces.

**Jan 1996** Snowstorm. USA. Major disruption caused to transport services in northeastern region. At least 59 people killed.

**Feb 1996** Flooding. *USA*. Melting snow and heavy rain produced severe flooding in the North Western region. Mudslides blocked roads and 16 000 people forced to flee their homes. At least 3 people killed in Oregon.

**Feb 1996** Earthquake. *China (Yunnan)*. 7.0 on Richter scale. 322 people killed and about 4 000 seriously injured. 319 600 homeless. 358 000 housing units collapsed. Total economic loss estimated at \$47.1 million.

Feb 1996 Earthquake. *Eastern Indonesia*. 7.5 on Richter scale. 108 people killed, over 400 injured and 1 018 houses destroyed. Generated tsunami that hit Irian Jaya.

Mar 1996 Cyclone. *Madagascar*. 100 000-150 000 people affected by Cyclone Bonita. 9 killed.

Mar 1996 Avalanche. *India (Kashmir)*. 36 people killed and 27 injured in remote village in Pakistan-ruled part of disputed Kashmir.

**Mar 1996** Earthquake. *Ecuador*. 5.7 on Richter scale. 21 people killed, 66 injured and 3 000 homeless in central Ecuador.

**Apr 1996** Forest fire. *Mongolia*. 30 000 sq km of forests and 50 000 sq km of pasture destroyed. 8 people killed, 20 injured.

**May 1996** Earthquake. *China*. 6.4 on Richter scale. At least 18 people killed and 297 injured. 50 000 buildings damaged or destroyed around city of Baotou, 540km north-west of Beijing.

May 1996 Tornado. *Northern Bangladesh*. More than 600 people killed. Jan 1997 Snowstorms. *China*, 34 deaths and 100 000 cut off in their homes.

Jan 1997 Storms. *Brazil.* 65 people killed and nearly 20 000 homeless in states of Minais Gerais and Rio de Janeiro.

Feb 1997 Earthquake. *Iran.* 965 people killed and more than 2 600 injured in north-west province of Ardabil.

**Feb 1997** Earthquake. *Pakistan*. 7.3 on Richter scale. At least 100 people killed in Harnai, Balushistan province.

**May 1997** Earthquake. *Iran.* 7.1 on Richter scale. More than 1 600 people killed, 2 200 injured and 50 000 homeless in northeastern province of Khorasan.

May 1997 Cyclone. Bangladesh. 112 people killed in coastal areas.

**May 1997** Earthquake. *India*. 6.0 on Richter scale. At least 38 people killed and over 1 000 injured in Madhya Pradesh state in central India.

May 1997 Tornadoes. *Texas, USA*. Series of tornadoes killed 27 people, most of them in the town of Jarrell, 40km north of Austin.

**Jun 1997** Volcanic eruption. *Montserrat*. Eruption of Soufriere Hills volcano devastated two-thirds of the island. At least 23 people killed. 5 000 evacuated from island. Disaster compounded by huge eruption of Chance's Peak volcano.

**Jul 1997** Flooding. *Eastern Germany, Poland, Czech Republic.* Thousands affected by worst floods in central Europe in 20th century. Heavy rain destroyed vast areas in eastern Germany. Many people homeless after dyke holding back torrential Oder river burst. At least 48 people killed.

**Jul 1997** Earthquake. *Cariaco, Venezuela.* 6.9 on Richter scale. At least 59 people killed and 320 injured.

Aug 1997 Flooding. *India*. Heavy rains in northern state of Pradesh led to rivers flooding. At least 135 people killed.

Sept 1997 Drought. *Papua New Guinea*. Nationwide drought affected over 700 000 people.

**Sept 1997** Earthquakes. *Central Italy*. Two earthquakes, the most powerful measuring 5.7 on Richter scale. 11 people killed and more than 120 injured.

Sept 1997 Cyclone. *Bangladesh*. At least 47 killed and hundreds injured on islands off south-east coast.

Sept 1997 Earthquake. *Sulawesi, Indonesia*. 6.0 on Richter scale. At least 14 killed and 30 injured.

**Oct 1997** Hurricane Pauline. *Mexico*. Acapulco devastated and widespread damage caused to state of Guerro. More than 111 people killed and 8 000 homeless.

Oct 1997 Earthquake. *Chile*. 6.8 on Richter scale. 8 killed, 98 injured, 15 000 left homeless.

**Nov 1997** Earthquake. *Bangladesh*. 6.0 on Richter scale. Killed 11 people in port city of Chittagong. Thousands homeless.

Jan 1998 Flooding. Peru. 70 people killed and 22 000 homeless.

**Jan 1998** Storms. *Canada*. Up to 100mm of freezing rain fell across eastern Ontario and Quebec. Ice load brought down about 1 000 power transmission towers and 30 000 wooden utility poles. Around 3 million people lost electricity and at least 25 people were killed. Over 700 000 insurance claims filed for property damage.

Apr 1998 Storms. USA (Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi). 60 people killed.

May 1998 Forest fires. Central America. Vast tracts of land destroyed.

**22 May 1998** Earthquakes. *Central Bolivia*. Series of earthquakes measuring up to 6.8 on Richter scale. At least 100 people killed.

30 May 1998 Earthquake. Northern Afghanistan. 3 000 killed.

27 Jun 1998 Earthquake. Adana, Turkey. More than 120 people killed.

**30 Jun-2 Jul 1998** Storms and flooding. USA (Wisconsin, Minnesota, Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia, Vermont). More than 20 people killed.

**17 Jul 1998** Tidal wave. *Papua New Guinea*. 10 metres high. Generated by off-shore earthquake. Swept 2 km inland in Aitape district of north coast. At least 2 000 killed.

**Jul-Aug 1998** Flooding. *China*. 21 million hectares of land damaged by severe floods following heavy monsoon rainfall. 13 million hectares suffered total crop loss. Extensive damage to road and rail networks. Almost 250 million people affected. 13.4 million relocated. Official death toll: 3 004. More than 5.5 million houses destroyed. A further 12 million homes damaged.

**22 Sept 1998** Hurricane Georges. *Dominican Republic, Haiti.* 300 killed, mostly in floods and landslides.

**Nov 1998** Hurricane Mitch. *Central America.* Wind speeds of up to 190 mph (300 km per hour). Widespread devastation of roads, homes and crops. In Honduras, 6 500 people killed, 11 000 reported missing and up to 2 million suffered loss of property. In Nicaragua, 1 000 people killed and 1 900 missing. Also deaths and extensive damage in El Salvador and Guatemala.

**2-6 Jan 1999** Snow storm. USA. About 90 people killed as a result of severe storm on the eastern seaboard and in mid-western states.

14 Jan 1999 Landslide. *Tacabamba, Peru*. 40 killed. Several dozen village homes buried after volcanic activity caused landslide.

**Jan 1999** Earthquake. *Colombia*. 6.0 on Richter scale. More than 900 people killed and 250 000 homeless.

**11 Feb 1999** Earthquake. *Afghanistan (Wardak)*. 5.5 on Richter scale. 50 killed and more than 500 injured. Over 5 000 buildings destroyed.

**23-24 Feb 1999** Avalanches. *Austria (Tyrol)*. Killed 38 people. Tens of thousands of people evacuated from the Alpine region.

**29 Mar 1999** Earthquake. *India (Uttar Pradesh)*. 6.8 on Richter scale. At least 110 people killed and hundreds injured in foothills of Himalayas.

**3 May 1999** Tornadoes. *USA (Oklahoma, Kansas)*. At least 47 killed and hundreds injured after dozens of tornadoes struck, some of which were 5km wide. Caused extensive property damage.

7 May 1999 Earthquake. *Shiraz, Iran.* 6.5 on Richter scale. At least 26 people killed and 100 injured. 20 villages damaged.

**20 May 1999** Cyclone. *Pakistan (Sind)*. Winds of up to 275 km per hour caused widespread crop damage and submerged thousands of villages. At least 400 deaths.

15 Jun 1999 Earthquake. Southern Mexico. At least 19 people killed.

**Jul 1999** Flooding. *Central and Southern China*. Widespread flooding along banks of Yangtze river following weeks of torrential rain. 725 people killed. 5.5 million evacuated. Caused US\$8 billion worth of damage.

**13 Jul 1999** Landslide. *Western Romania*. Caused by heavy rains and floods. 13 killed and 23 injured.

**Jul-Aug 1999** Heatwave. USA (Missouri, Iowa, Illinois, New York, Ohio, West Virginia). At least 20 people killed. Agricultural disaster areas declared in 15 states. Losses in West Virginia exceeded \$80m.

Aug 1999 Typhoon. *North & South Korea, Philippines*. Typhoon Olga killed more than 165 people and made at least 100 000 homeless. Severe flooding left thousands of hectares of farm land submerged and infrastructure damaged.

Aug 1999 Earthquake. *Northwestern Turkey*. 7.4 on Richter scale. 14 095 people killed, 27 000 injured, 200 000 homeless and more than 72 000 buildings damaged.

Sept 1999 Flooding. *Central America*. 70 people killed and 100 000 homeless in Honduras, Guatemala and Nicaragua.

**Sept 1999** Hurricane Floyd. USA (Florida, Georgia, Carolina). A storm system the size of Texas brought heavy rains, severe flooding and high winds. Massive mandatory evacuation took place in preparation. 60 people killed.

Sept 1999 Earthquake. *Greece*. 5.9 on Richter scale. More than 120 people killed and 60 000 homeless.

**Sept 1999** Typhoon. *Hong Kong*. Winds of up to 150km per hour. One person killed and 494 injured. Caused a cargo ship to sink.

**Sept 1999** Earthquake. *Taiwan*. 7.6 on Richter scale. 2 256 people killed, 8 713 injured, 100 000 homeless and 404 000 homes left without water supplies. Temporary power cut throughout island. Most affected were Taichung, Taiwan's 3rd largest city, and mountain towns of Puli and Tungshi.

Sept 1999 Typhoon. *Honshu, Japan*. At least 26 people killed and 350 injured. 1 million homes left without power.

Sept 1999 Earthquake. *Oaxaca, Mexico*. 7.5 on Richter scale. At least 33 people killed.

Oct 1999 Flooding. Mexico. At least 341 people killed and 271 000 homeless.

**Oct 1999** Cyclones. *Orissa, India.* Wind speeds of between 200 and 300 km per hour caused widespread destruction. More than 10 000 people killed, 1.5 million homeless and 323 000 hectares of land inundated by tidal wave that followed.

**Oct-Nov 1999** Floods. *Vietnam*. At least 470 people died in floods following torrential rainstorms.

**Nov 1999** Earthquake. *Northwestern Turkey*. Towns of Düzce, Kaynasli and Bolu devastated. Over 737 people died, 5 000 injured and tens of thousands left homeless.

**Nov 1999** Flooding. *Southern France*. Torrential storms caused floods. Killed 31 people. Within 48 hours about 600 litres of water fell per square metre – the average rainfall for a whole year in southern France.

**15-18 Dec 1999** Floods and mudslides. *Venezuela*. Up to 50 000 people killed after flash floods and mudslides struck 150km of coastline. Telecommunications and power supplies collapsed.

**26-27 Dec 1999** Storms. *France*. Hurricane-force winds of over 150km per hour killed 88 people and severely damaged country's infrastructure.

**15 Feb 2000** Tornadoes. *USA (Southwestern Georgia)*. Series of tornadoes killed 22 people and injured 100 in town of Camilla.

**27 Feb 2000** Cyclone Steve. *Australia (Queensland, Northern Territory).* Tropical cyclone Steve caused widespread damage. Two-thirds of the area's annual rainfall fell in just 36 hours.

**Feb 2000** Flooding. *Mozambique, Botswana, Zimbabwe, South Africa*. Situation worsened by cyclone Eline hitting Mozambique on 21 February. Limpopo river rose 7 metres. Save and Sabi rivers also swollen. Thousands of people stranded in trees and on rooftops. Infrastructure severely affected; thousands of hectares of farmland washed away; 28 000 ha of crops destroyed; 800 000-1 million people homeless; 30 000 cattle drowned; official total of 640 deaths. In South Africa, 95 killed. Dams overflowed and 60 000 homeless in Botswana. 62 killed in Zimbabwe and 250 000 affected by floods.

**Feb-Apr 2000** Cyclones. *Madagascar*. Cyclone Eline in February killed 7 people and left thousands homeless. On 27 February, Cyclone Gloria killed 130, left 10 000 homeless and 12 000 stranded. Cyclone Hudah hit in early April. Widespread cropland devastation.

**Apr 2000** Drought and forest fires. *Ethiopia, Kenya.* Widespread crop devastation following 3 years of drought. Hundreds died daily through starvation.

**5-10 Apr 2000** Flooding. *Hungary, Romania*. Flooding along several rivers. In Hungary 230 000 ha of arable land made unusable. In Romania 60 000 ha of agricultural land destroyed and 489 towns and villages cut off. At least 7 people killed.

**May 2000** Flooding. *Indonesia*. Severe floods on border of East and West Timor, caused by monsoon rain and tidal surge. At least 148 people killed. About 20 000 homeless. Thousands of tons of harvested crops destroyed.

Jan 2001 Earthquake. El Salvador. Over 800 people killed, thousands homeless

Jan 2001 Earthquake. *India*. More than 20 000 people killed and hundreds of thousands homeless in a severe earthquake in the western state of Gujarat.

Jan 2001 Earthquake. El Salvador. 7.6 on the Richter scale. At least 844 deaths

Jan 2001 Earthquake. *India*. 7.9 on the Richter scale. Resulted in 13 805 deaths in western India, thousands more injured and devastating damage to property

Jan 2001 onwards Flooding. *Mozambique*. At least 115 fatalities with around 230 000 people displaced

Feb 2001 Landslides, flooding and storms. Indonesia. A minimum of 122 fatalities

**Feb 2001** Earthquake. *El Salvador*. 6.6 on the Rochter scale. Resulted in at least 315 deaths and 3 400 people being injured

May 2001 Landslide. *China (Chongqing)*. At least 74 people died when a landslide destroyed a multi-storey residential building

**Jun 2001** Earthquake. *Peru*. An estimated 145 fatalities, including 64 people reported as missing (an unknown number died following a resultant tsunami)

Jul 2001 Typhoons. *The Philippines, China and Taiwan*. An estimated 270 fatalities and widespread displacement

Jul-Aug 2001 Flooding. India (Orissa). At least 100 fatalities as a result of heavy monsoon season rains

Jul 2001 onwards Heatwave. USA. At least 54 fatalities by the end of July

Jul 2001 Typhoon. *Taiwan*. Mudslides and floods killed more than 70 people and forced nearly 300 000 to abandon their homes

Aug 2001 Flooding. Northeastern Iran. At least 240 fatalities

Aug-Oct 2001 Flooding. *Vietnam (Mekong Delta)*. At least 322 fatalities, the majority of them children

**Oct 2001** Storms, Tidal Wave. *North Korea*. At least 110 fatalities with thousands of homes, roads and factories destroyed

Oct 2001 Cyclone. Andhra Pradesh, India. An estimated 170 fatalities

Oct 2001-Spring 2002 Cold weather. Poland. At least 129 fatalities

Nov 2001 Flooding. Algeria. At least 764 people killed and more than 400 injured

Winter 2001-2002 Cold weather. Russia. At least 232 fatalities

Winter 2001-2002 Wildfires. Australia (New South Wales). Many homes destroyed.

Jan 2002 Earthquake. Vanuatu. 7.2 on Richter scale, many buildings were devastated

Jan 2002 Storms. *Senegal*. Much damage inland and many fishermen drowned off the coast

Jan 2002 Volcano. *Democratic Republic of Congo*. Mount Nyiragongo erupted, engulfing the town of Goma and killing more than 40 people

Feb 2002 Earthquake. *Western Turkey*. 6.0 on Richter scale, caused many deaths and much damage

Feb 2002 Storms and flooding. Bolivia. The capital was particularly badly hit

Mar 2002 Earthquake. Central Asia (Hindu Kush). 7.2 on the Richter scale. Resulted in many deaths

Mar 2002 Earthquake. Northern Afghanistan. 6.0 on Richter scale, it caused over 600 deaths

Apr 2002 Landslides. Papua New Guinea. Caused several deaths

Apr 2002 Earthquake. Northern Afghanistan. 5.8 on Richter scale, causing several deaths

Apr 2002 Storms. Bangladesh. More than 50 people killed

Apr 2002 Flooding and landslides. *Rwanda, Kenya*. More than 100 people killed and crops destroyed

**May 2002** Storms. *Bangladesh*. More than 350 people killed when the Salahuddin-2, a passenger ferry, sank

May 2002 Tropical cyclone. *Madagascar*. More than 40 people killed and widespread property damage

May 2002 Red tide. *China*. Large areas of sea affected by unnaturally large algae population growth

May 2002 Flooding and landslides. Haiti, Jamaica. Over 30 people killed

May 2002 Storm. Lake Victoria, Africa. At least 30 dead when a boat capsized

Jun 2002 Heatwave. Nigeria. At least 60 people died

Jun 2002 Storm. Lake Victoria, Africa. At least 70 dead when a ferry capsized.

**Jun 2002** Flooding. *Southern Russia*. Over 100 people drowned in floods **Jun 2002** Earthquake. *Northern Iran*. Over 200 people killed in an earthquake registering 6.8 on the Richter scale

Jun 2002 Flooding. India. At least 150 people drowned in floods in Gujarat

Jul 2002 Snowstorms. Peru. At least 60 people died, many of them children

Jul 2002 Explosion. Ukraine. A coal-mine blast killed 20 miners

Jul 2002 Typhoon and mudslides. India, Bangladesh, Nepal. Over 800 people killed

Jul 2002 Mudslides. Ecuador. At least 60 people killed

Aug 2002 Typhoons, mudslides and flooding. *China (Hunan), South Korea, Iran.* Hundreds of people died

Aug 2002 Flooding. *Vietnam*. Many people killed when the Mekong river flooded Sept 2002 Flooding. *Thailand*. Many people killed

Sept 2002 Storm. Senegal. Almost 2000 people drowned when a ferry capsized

**Oct 2002** Cold weather. *Moscow, Russia*. Many people died who could not cope with the sudden drop in temperature

Oct 2002 Earthquake. Italy. A school collapsed, killing at least 23 7 and 8 year olds

**Dec 2002** Cold weather. *Warsaw, Poland*. Hundreds of people were unable to cope with the cold weather

Jan 2003 Flooding and drought. *Malawi*. Thousands are displaced by floodwaters during a time of severe drought and famine

Feb 2003 Storms. Democratic Republic of Congo. At least 2 500 people killed

Feb 2003 Earthquake. *China (Xinjiang)*. Over 260 people are killed and 10 000 homes destroyed

Mar 2003 Hail storms. India. More than 500 people killed by hail

**Apr 2003** Earthquake. *Western Turkey*. Over 5.5 on the Richter scale. More than 100 people killed.

**Apr 2003** Flooding. *Argentina*. More than 50 000 people are displaced when rivers rose by 50cm in 12 hours

May 2003 Earthquake. Algeria. More than 2 200 people killed near Algiers

May 2003 Tornado. Oklahoma, USA. Over \$100 million worth of damage

Jun 2003 Heatwave. Southern India. Thousands die in temperatures of over 50C

Jul 2003 Floods. Southern China. 600 die with half a million homes destroyed.

**Jul 2003** Forest fires. *France, Portugal, Spain, Greece.* Serious fires, some thought to be the result of arson, with many people evacuated and some deaths

Aug 2003 Heatwave. *Europe*. Many elderly people die during extremely hot weather; crops are devastated

**Oct-Nov 2003** Heatwave. USA (California). Droughts and forest fires rage, thousands of homes destroyed

**Nov 2003** Flooding. *Sumatra, Indonesia*. The village of Bukit Lawang is practically wiped out and an estimated 200 people killed

**Dec 2003** Earthquake. *Iran.* At least 40 000 are killed and a large part of the historic city of Bam destroyed

**Dec 2003** Storms. *Phillippines*. Mudslides and stormy seas killed around 270 people **Dec 2003** Natural gas explosion. *China*. 233 killed, thousands taken to hospital or evacuated

Jan 2004 Explosion. Algeria. A natural gas plant exploded killing 23 with 74 injured

Feb 2004 Drowning. *Morecambe Bay, UK.* 19 cockle-pickers drowned while working in a notoriously dangerous area of sea with no safety equipment

Feb 2004 Drought. Southern Africa. Hundreds of thousands of people in need of food aid

**Feb 2004** Earthquake. *Morocco*. Remote areas were devastated with nearly 600 people killed. Many were trapped in villages with rescue missions unable to get to them easily

# **Manmade Disasters**

**Dec 1984** Gas Leak. *Bhopal, India*. Gas leak from pesticide plant. At least 2 000 killed and 220 000 treated for various ailments.

**Apr 1986** Nuclear Explosion. *Chernobyl, Ukraine*. A hydrogen explosion caused radioactive debris to be showered 1 500 metres into the air. Operational errors blamed. All Eastern Bloc countries, much of Scandinavia and all of Western Europe except Spain and Portugal are known to have been affected in varying degrees. At least 30 people at Chernobyl died almost immediately from burns or acute radiation sickness. The number of people finally affected will never be known.

**Nov 1986** *River Rhine.* Following a fire at a chemical plant over 30 tons of pesticides, fungicides and other chemicals were washed into the river by firemen dousing the flames. Mercury was the main chemical involved. For almost two days none of the governments along the Rhine knew the true nature of the chemicals flowing down Europe's largest waterway. 200 miles of Upper Rhine practically irrecoverable and it is estimated that it will take 10-30 years to restore it to life.

**Sept 1987** Radioactive pollution. *Goiana, Brazil.* Radioactive caesium chloride powder from a cylinder stolen from a hospital radiotherapy unit and sold for scrap found on a rubbish dump. It was handled casually by children and others ignorant of its dangers. Only four people died but this does not take into account longer-term effects from radioactive pollution of area.

**Mar 1989** Oil slick. *Alaska, USA*. The tanker "Exxon Valdez" ran aground off Alaska causing massive damage to the coastline, wildlife and habitat.

**Aug 1989** Oil slick. *Liverpool, UK.* 156 tonnes of crude oil emptied into the Mersey estuary from a Shell oil pipeline causing a 10-mile slick, killing at least 300 birds and affecting 2 000 others.

**Sept 1990** Explosion. *Kazakhstan*. An explosion and fire at a factory making nuclear fuels at Ulba in East Kazakhstan contaminated a large area with highly toxic compounds of beryllian metal. The health of up to 120 000 people potentially at risk.

**Sept 1990** Gas Explosion. *Bangkok, Thailand.* 58 people died and 100 were injured when a truck carrying two tanks of liquefied petroleum gas crashed and exploded in the centre of the capital.

**Early 1991** Oil Slick. *Persian Gulf.* During the Gulf War Iraqi forces allegedly released 5-10 000 000 barrels of oil into the Gulf creating a vast oil slick affecting 400 miles of coast and endangering both the marine environment and the livelihoods of local fishermen.

**Early 1991** Oil well fires. *Kuwait.* 600 oilwells allegedly set on fire by Iraqi troops causing massive air pollution and contamination of agricultural land and water supplies especially in the fertile, well-populated Tigris and Euphrates valleys in Iraq. 'Black rain' damaged crops in Iran, Pakistan. Bulgaria and Afghanistan. The final well fire was capped in late 1991.

**Apr 1991** Oil slick. *Genoa, Italy.* A Cypriot-registered tanker "Haven" exploded during a routine pumping operation in the Ligurian Sea off Genoa. The resulting oil slick caused pollution along the Mediterranean coast westwards towards Nice. The 40 km slick was broken up by gale-force winds which diminished damage potential.

**Jun 1991** Pollution. *Chile.* The government ordered 40% of all cars off the streets in the capital. Santiago, one of the most polluted cities in the world. At least 1 465 children had been treated for breathing problems by 10 June.

**Jul 1991** Oil slick. *USA (Washington State).* After a collision with a Chinese ship, a Japanese fish-processing ship sank, disccharging 100 000 gallons of oil into the sea creating a slick threatening the Olympia National Park. Hundreds of birds were killed and rare species such as the bald eagle, peregrine falcon and sea otter endangered.

**Aug 1991** Pesticide spill. *USA (California).* A tanker rail car spilled 19 500 gallons of metam sodium pesticide into the Sacramento River. It drifted 45 miles downstream, killing wild life. 200 people were admitted to hospital suffering from fume inhalation and skin irritation.

**Dec 1991** Nuclear accidents. *Russia*. The then environment minister, Victor Danilov-Daniliyan, admitted that large parts of Russian territory had been made uninhabitable for decades to come by nuclear accidents and waste.

**Jan 1992** Pollution. *Athens, Greece.* When smog in the capital exceeded emergency levels, the government banned all cars from the centre, industrial production was cut and central heating was turned off in public buildings except hospitals.

**Jan 1992** Water pollution. *Turkey, Greece*. Hundreds of dead or dying dolphins were washed up on beaches, the victims of a virus linked with water pollution. The rare monk seal, of which only about 300 remain, is also at risk.

**Dec 1992** Oil slick. *Spain*. A Greek-owned oil tanker ran aground and exploded off the northwestern Spanish port of La Coruna, spilling an estimated 70 000 tonnes of oil into the sea, with serious ecological consequences. Strong winds and heavy seas helped disperse much of the oil.

**Jan 1993** Ozone layer. *World*. NASA research showed ozone levels lower than ever before. Levels were measured up to 14% below normal in the mid-latitudes of the northern hemisphere. In the second half of 1992, ozone levels were 2-3% lower than in any previous year. Global thinning of the ozone layer means a widespread threat to human health.

**Jan 1993** Oil slick. *Malaysia*. A supertanker fully laden with almost 2 million barrels of crude oil collided with another tanker and started spilling oil into the sea off the northern tip of Sumatra.

**Jan 1993** Oil slick. *Shetland Islands, UK.* The oil tanker "Braer", carrying 84 000 tonnes of light crude oil, was driven ashore. Less damage than originally feared as hurricane winds were effective in breaking down and dispersing the spill. Salmon farms, fisheries and wildlife adversely affected.

**Apr 1993** Radioactive explosion. *Tomsk, Russia.* Explosion at the Tomsk-7 nuclear reprocessing plant released a cloud of radioactive gas over western Siberia. Reported to have contaminated 120 sq km of forest, although official reports claimed the amount of plutonium released was negligible.

**Summer 1993** Toxic algae. *Europe*. Toxic green algae choked parts of the Mediterranean. Clumps of the weed, which grows following the pollution of the sea by chemicals that fertilize the water, stretched over 4.2 sq km. There were colonies as far apart as Majorca and Livorno, on the Italian coast. Holidaymakers in France, Spain and Italy were warned not to uproot it.

**Feb 1994** Oil slick. *Russia (Komi Republic)*. Oil spill polluted wide areas of tundra. Estimates of the leak from the 47km-long pipeline ranged from 14 000 to 200 000 barrels. It was initially contained by an earth dam but this was breached by heavy rains in August.

**Jun 1994** Oil slick. *South Africa*. Large oil slicks covered 16km of beaches near Cape Town. Many seabirds including an estimated 10 000 rare Jakass penguin chicks were killed. The crude oil is thought to have come from a Spanish supertanker that caught fire and sank 60 km off Cape Town in 1983.

**Oct 1994** Oil slick. *Portugal*. The tanker Cercal hit rocks off Oporto and spilled up to 1 300 tonnes of crude oil, which washed ashore on Portugal's northern beaches.

**Oct 1994** Oil slick. *UK*. A Russian fish factory ship, the "Pionersk", carrying 550 tonnes of diesel and fuel, ran aground on rocks south of Lerwick off the coast of Shetland. A 1.6km line of oil was reported stretching southwards from the ship.

**Early 1995** Oil slick. *Russia*. A damaged pipeline leaked 3 500 tonnes of crude oil near the Siberian town of Tulun. The spill spread over the frozen Kurzanka River, which feeds into the Bratsk reservoir, an important source of fresh water and hydro-electricity for the whole region.

**Summer 1995** Pollution. *Athens, Greece.* A morning-to-evening ban on cars was imposed on the centre of the city for three months to alleviate the severe pollution.

**Jul 1995** Fuel spillage. *Australia*. Ore-carrying vessel ran aground off north coast of Tasmania, spilling over 300 tonnes of fuel. At least 8km of shoreline to east of Tamar river reported to have been polluted.

**Jul 1995** Chemical spillage. *UK*. An estimated 20 tonnes of toxic acid spilled from a chemicals factory into a stream, feeding the Cuckmere River, near Hailsham, East Sussex. As the acid evaporated it left a 0.8km stretch of the stream completely lifeless. Hundreds of fish were killed.

**Aug 1995** Chemical spillage. *Guyana*. Large area along Esseqibo river declared a disaster area after more than 4 000 000 cubic metres of cyanide-contaminated slurry seeped out from a gold mine at Omai into a tributary upstream.

**Feb 1996** Oil slick. *UK*. The tanker "Sea Empress", carrying about 128 000 tonnes of light crude oil, ran aground near Milford Haven, SW Wales (an area of major wildlife significance). 72 000 tonnes of oil were spilt into the sea, most of it during the course of efforts to refloat the tanker and transfer its cargo to other vessels.

Apr 1996 Coral damage. *Egypt*. The cruise liner "Royal Viking Sun" hit and damaged the protected Red Sea coral reef off the Egyptian coast.

**Nov 1996** Oil slick. *UK.* 4 000 leaking bottles of suntan oil contaminated Camarthen beach in the Bristol Channel after being lost from a container ship.

May 1997 Chemical spillage. *UK*. Thousands of fish killed by contamination of Medway estuary in Kent.

**Jul 1997** Oil spillage. *Japan*. State of emergency declared after oil supertanker "Diamond Grace" ran aground in Tokyo Bay.

**Aug-Sept 1997** Forest fire. *South-East Asia*. Thousands of forest fires generated a giant smog cloud covering countries from Malaysia and Indonesia to the Philippines, Brunei and Thailand. Despite warnings of a prolonged dry season, fires were lit as a cheap and convenient means of clearing land. Health of tens of millions of people jeopardised; long-term effects of smoke inhalation may be devastating.

Jan 1998 Industrial contamination. *Grand Canal, Eastern China*. A 40km stretch of canal was contaminated by industrial waste, mostly from paper mills.

Jan 1998 Oil slick. *UAE*. Barge ran aground, spilling thousands of tonnes of oil which affected over 80km of coastline.

**Apr 1998** Toxic waste. *Aznalcóllar, Spain.* Toxic waste from a mine flooded 40km of the River Guadimar in Doñana national park. Caused widespread loss of wildlife and natural habitats.

**1999** Toxic weaponry. *Yugoslavia*. In March 2000, NATO admitted to widespread use of depleted uranium (DU) weapons during 1999 bombing campaign. DU shells were used routinely throughout Kosovo in about 100 missions. Each mission might have used between 10kg and 100kg of DU, which amounted to a 'toxicity risk'.

**Jan 2000** Chemical spillage. *Northern Romania*. 100 000 tonnes of sludge contaminated by cyanide and heavy metals spilled over a dam at a gold mine in Baia Mare. Polluted the Somes river, which then carried pollution to the Tisza river in Hungary and the Danube. By 15 February more than 100 tonnes of dead fish had been recovered from the rivers. Environmentalists warned of serious long-term effects of heavy metals on the river system.

**Sept 2000** Ozone layer. *Antarctica*. NASA reported the largest ozone hole ever seen over Antarctica, covering 11 million square miles (three times larger than the area of the USA) and stretching to the southern tip of South America. It is evidence that ozone-destroying chemicals continue to increase in the stratosphere, where the hole forms. Although production of these chemicals has been reduced by international agreement, they remain in the atmosphere and will continue to do so for years.

**Jan 2001** Oil slick. *Galapagos Islands*. An ecological disaster was narrowly averted when a ship laden with oil ran aground on the Galapagos Islands.

Feb 2001 Train crash. *Selby, UK.* Ten people killed when their train collided with a goods train

Mar 2001 Train crash. Belgium. 8 people are killed in a head-on collision

Jul 2001 Plane crash. *Siberia*. 143 are killed in a Russian plane headed to Vladivostock

**11 Sept 2001** Plane crash. *USA*. Terrorists hijacked 2 planes and crashed them into the World Trade Centre in New York, a 3rd into the Pentagon and a 4th outside Pittsburgh. Over 3 000 people were killed

**Oct 2001** Plane crash. *Milan, Italy*. Two planes crashed on a runway in heavy fog killing 118

**Nov 2001** Plane crash. *New York, USA*. A plane crashed just after take-off, killing all 260 people on board.

Jan 2002 Pollution. *Cornwall, UK* Oil tanker "Willy" grounded with the possibility of explosion

Jan 2002 Pollution. Djibouti. Shipment of pesticide leaking in port

Jan 2002 Pollution. Australia (Queensland). Water contaminated with uranium leaking into aquifers

Jan 2002 Pollution. Thailand. Huge oil slick from grounded tanker

Feb 2002 Pollution. Spain. Tonnes of oil leaked into the Ebro river

Feb 2002 Train crash. Cairo, Egypt. At least 300 killed in fire on train

**Spring 2002** Pollution. USA. Huge oil slick appeared off the coast of California, and traced to an old wreck

Apr 2002 Pollution. USA. Coal waste spilled into rivers in Kentucky

Apr 2002 Pollution. *Pacific Ocean*. An abandoned oil tanker leaked oil near mid-ocean atolls

May 2002 Train crash. *Potter's Bar, UK* Seven people were killed and dozens more injured when a train derailed and smashed into a station

May 2002 Pollution. Brazil. Crude oil leaked into Ilha Grande harbour

Jun 2002 Train crash. *Dodoma, Tanzania*. At least 200 killed in a head-on train collision

Jul 2002 Pollution. *Kyrgyzstan and Uzbekistan*. Radioactive waste leaked into the Maylisu River

Jul 2002 Pollution. *Australia*. A tanker carrying diesel oil and fuel oil ran aground on the Great Barrier Reef

Aug 2002 Pollution. *Romania*. Crude oil flowed into the Prahova River, a tributary of the Danube

Aug 2002 Pollution. Nigeria. Oil pipeline ruptured in the Niger River delta

Sept 2002 Ferry sinking. *Senegal*. The state-run ferry, the Joola, sank off the coast of Gambia killing around 1 000

Sept 2002 Pollution. Australia. Oil run into the Maribyrnong River, near Melbourne

**Oct 2002** Building collapse. *Syria*. Several people killed when a building collapsed in Aleppo

**Nov 2002** Pollution. *Spain, France.* Oil tanker "Prestige" sank off Galicia, spilling more than 60 000 tonnes of oil and devastating local wildlife

**Nov 2002** Explosion. *Bali, Indonesia.* A bomb in the holiday resort of Kuta killed at least 190, most of whom were tourists

Dec 2002 Pollution. Falkland Islands. Many penguins killed by an oil slick

Jan 2003 Pollution. Saigon River, Vietnam. Tanker damaged in a collision

Jan 2003 Plane crash. Turkey. 76 killed when the plane lost control coming in to land

**Jan 2003** Train crash. *New South Wales, Australia*. A train derailed, possibly sabotaged, near Sydney killing 8.

Feb 2003 Fire. *Korea*. At least 125 people died in a deliberate fire set on the subway in Daegu

**Feb 2003** Pollution. *Pacific Ocean*. Oil contaminated the sea round Midway Atoll after a pipeline valve broke

Feb 2003 Plane crash. Iran. All 276 people on board are killed

Feb 2003 Pollution. Nigeria. An old oil well exploded in the Niger Delta

Feb 2003 Space shuttle Columbia broke up on re-entry killing the 7 astronauts on board

Mar 2003 Pollution. Australia. A ruptured pipeline contaminated beaches near Brisbane

**Mar 2003** Pollution. *UK* Seabirds covered with oil found on the Devon coast which had probably been dumped into the English Channel

**Apr 2003** Ferry crash. *Bangladesh*. 2 separate ferries capsized in the same storm, killing more than 150 people with hundreds more unaccounted for

May 2003 Plane crash. *Democratic Republic of Congo*. The rear ramp of the plane came loose sucking out the 120 passengers and crew

May 2003 Earthquake. *Turkey*. 6.4. on Richter scale. A school dormitory collapsed, killing more than 80 children.

May 2003 Train crash. *Hungary*. 33 were killed when a train hit a coach at a level crossing

**Jun 2003** Chemical fire. *Nigeria*. A fuel line split and burst into flames while local people were trying to collect the spilling fuel. Over 120 died

Jun 2003 Train crash. Spain. At least 19 people died when a passenger train hit a freight train

Jul 2003 Plane crash. Sudan. 115 passengers were killed with only one survivor, a small child

Jul 2003 Pollution. *India*. Oil tanker MV Tasman Spirit ran aground discharging more than 30 000 tonnes of oil onto beaches near Karachi.

**Oct 2003** Ferry crash. *New York, USA*. A passenger ferry crashed into Staten Island Pier killing 10 and injuring a further 34

**Dec 2003** Plane crash. *Benin*. 135 people killed on Christmas Day en route to Lebanon

Jan 2004 Plane crash. *Uzbekistan*. A passenger plane crashed killing all 37 people on board

Jan 2004 Plane crash. *Red Sea*. All 141 passengers are killed on board an Egyptian charter flight.

Feb 2004 Train crash. *Nayshabur, Iran.* Carriages packed with volatile chemicals and fuel crashed leaving at least 295 dead, hundreds injured.

Feb 2004 Plane crash. United Arab Emirates. An Iranian plane crashed killing 40 people
