

NOTE

W E have had presented to us a cabinet consisting of antique and medieval intaglios and cameos, the result of some thirty years' research of a gentleman who has resided abroad during that period. It was given to us with a view of having it sold for the benefit of The Charity Organization Society and The Provident Relief Fund.

The cabinet consists of about one thousand gems, one hundred of which are from the celebrated collection of the late Prince Poniatowski (see note on page 111). A portion are mounted in gold, as rings, medallions, pins, etc. These gems are the work of the antique Greek, Roman, and Oriental masters, with a sprinkling of the medieval and modern.

They are guaranteed to be stones of the hardest quality, such as can be cut only by the aid of the diamond and of other appliances known to the lapidary.

We have had the collection catalogued by Mr. George N. Olcott, Professor of Roman Archaeology of Columbia University of New York City.

It is the intention of the society to sell them piece by piece, which sale the well-known house of Messrs. Tiffany & Co. has kindly offered to undertake.

To those not familiar with gems, we would say: After the revival of civilization and literature in Europe, there arose among men of learning and rank a rivalry for the preservation of the relics of ancient art. The enlightened family of the Medici acquired early eminence in this noble pursuit. Among the most valued

treasures bequeathed by antiquity, engraved gems were prominently distinguished, and justly, because the ancient pictures had all perished, except some frescoes, and few of the statues had escaped the wreck of time and barbarism. Engraved gems, therefore, were held in the highest estimation—not merely for the purity, brilliancy, rarity, and costliness of the stones, but from their constituting the connecting link between the rival and sister arts of painting and sculpture, preserving the excellencies of both. While they present to us the delicacy, the animation, and the various shadows of pictures (for the artists often adapted, with great taste and judgment, the execution of their subjects to the various shades and colors of the stones), they possess the boldness and the material palpability of statues. and thus exhibit the most unerring criterion of the artistical talent, grace, and skill of the ancients. Pliny thus bears testimony to their great value and perfection (lib. xxxvii., c. 1): "Hic in unum coacta rerum naturae majestas"-"Here we see nature in all her majesty developed within a narrow compass."

- I Armed warrior resting. Exquisite Roman cutting of the best period, on a perfect sard. \$7.00.
- 2 Fortune seated upon a rudder, holding a cornucopia. Symbol of prosperity. Roman. \$5.00.

- 9 EYTHYCES, a personal seal. Chalcedony; late ancient workmanship. \$2.00.
- The return from the hunt, an interesting group. Black agate; early Roman; shows traces of fire; found near Naples. \$3.00.

- 12 Heads of Minerva and a Greek philosopher curiously combined. A fine amethyst.
- 13 Roman lady of the first or second century, a beautiful portrait. Yellow sard; containing three faces; one of the most valuable of the collection. \$20.00.
- 14 Nude warrior with helmet, shield and spear. Inscribed BIT: SOS; sard. \$4.00.
- 15 Sphinx scratching her ear with her hind-paw, an action chosen by the artist from the archaic love for the representation of constrained attitudes. Opaque green jasper flecked with red. This most curious type is found on a gem in the Vienna cabinet, and on a fine sard scarabaeus in the British Museum; figured in King's "Antique Gems and Rings," p. 406. \$20.00.
- 16 Warrior, or Mars, beautifully cut on a lucid chalcedony. Greek; seen to great advantage as a transparency; found near Palermo, Sicily.

- 17 Sphinx. Skilful workmanship; nicolo; Greek; brilliant when seen as a transparency. \$12.00.
- 18 Mercury, the messenger of the gods. Beautiful light sard; showing great life and vigor; Roman.
- 19 Portrait head of the Cinque-cento period. Sardonyx. \$7.00.
- 20 Mercury, with caduceus, resting upon a rock, a type found in ancient statues. Roman (second or third century); on a large dark sard; this quality of stone now extinct.

- 53 Hermes Psychopompus, advancing with caduceus. Roman cutting on a dark sard. \$6.00.

- 55 Fine portrait of one of the Diadochi, successors of Alexander the Great, on a brown agate. A remarkably fine gem.
- 56 An ancient warrior, with shield and spear, inspecting his helmet. On the ground before him, his cuirass. Sard; Roman; found on the Appian Way, Rome. \$8.00.
- 57 A bee, symbol of Artemis, and signet of her town of Ephesus. Large garnet; a late Roman gem. \$25.00.

- 77 Double bearded head (Janus), under a single conical cap. Small sard; a valuable antique; brilliant when seen as a transparency. \$9.00.

- 125 A Roman emperor of the third century A.D., probably Trajan Decius, the persecutor of the Christians. A characteristic portrait of this degenerate period; on a dull yellow chalcedony. \$4.00.

- Portrait of a bearded man, seventeenth or eighteenth century. Sard. \$3.00.
- 127 Greek portrait-bust. Striped chalcedony; slightly chipped at the back, but uninjured.
- 128 An African negro. Cut in black through a white layer; very curious. \$10.00.

- 130 Youthful head, crowned with a wreath of ivy. Banded chalcedony; a Greek work; exquisitely cut. \$20.00.

- 140 Roman bust of the first century A.D., quite certainly one of the family of the emperor Augustus, and betraying the family likeness. Beautifully cut on a large, rich, dark agate; found at Amalfi. \$20.00.
- 141 Portrait of an elderly bearded man, one of the Greek philosophers. Brownish-black agate. \$8.00.
- Note: The following Oriental stones form a small but very interesting series of a class not commonly met with in collections.
- 142 A symbolic signet of the Sassanian, or later Persian, Empire. At the left stands the Sassanian monarch, filleted and clad in a short embroidered Persian tunic, holding behind his back a dagger, which he is about to plunge into a lion that rears upright before him; a typical conception of the ancient Zoroastrians. Hard, darkgreen stone. \$7.00.

- 143 Dainty clear-red sard, engraved with an inscription in two lines in Arabic characters:

 Mohammed ibn Abdullah wa lo ba afu ullah, i. e. "Mohammed the son of Abdullah, may God forgive him." \$5.00.

- 171 Curious symbolic signet. Above, a bearded male bust, crowned, like Jupiter-Serapis, with the *modius*, to which a small flying Victory on each side offers a wreath. Be-

low, an eagle with wings outspread, and two Roman military standards. A curious and interesting subject on a large Egyptian jasper; found at Athens; very valuable. \$25.00.

- 172 Cupid advancing. Late Roman work; sard; spirited. \$5.00.
- 173 A Roman spearman of the later Empire, mounted upon his horse. Yellow sard. \$6.00.
- 174 Victory presenting a wreath. Roman; sard; with one edge chipped. \$4.00.
- 175 Romano-Egyptian seal. A female bust with the asp over her brow. Nicolo; this is a very fine, rare, and valuable antique, and to a collector it should be priceless; found at Herculaneum. \$30.00.
- 176 Opaque yellow chalcedony. An actor; Etruscan; a valuable gem found near Pompeii. \$12.00.
- 177 Curious subject, beautifully cut on a large, lustrous sard. Upon a bearded head in the archaic Greek style sits Cupid playing upon Apollo's lyre. \$12.00.
- 178 Jupiter, resting upon a spear, and holding his eagle upon his extended palm. Neat Roman work, unfortunately chipped, upon a translucent chalcedony. \$3.00.

III. SCARABS

Note: The scarabaeus was a symbolic amulet of the ancient Egyptians, representing the sacred beetle (Scarabaeus coprophagus), in hard porcelain or green jasper, pierced longitudinally for wearing, and having on the under (or flat) side a cartouche or other design. From Egypt the fashion was carried to Etruria by the Carthaginian or Phenician travelers. The Etruscans of the seventh and sixth centuries before Christ raised the art of cutting scarabs to a

very high level. With them the beetle-form was no longer a sacred symbol, but a mere traditional ornament; and while often retained, was frequently transformed so as to be scarcely recognizable. The material, too, was changed, the hard carnelian, chalcedony, and agate being the favorites. Finally the subjects chosen (mostly animal figures and warriors) were drawn almost wholly from the Greek mythology, often shown in the reflected light of Etruscan mysticism. Scarabs were not made in Etruria after the early fifth century B.C., and only for a short time in Rome, during the antiquarian revival under Augustus Caesar. The large collection of scarabs here described includes fine specimens of the various classes and periods, from the ancient Egyptian to the modern cuttings.

PONIATOWSKI INTAGLIOS

These one hundred gems, which formerly belonged to Prince Poniatowski, are, we believe, the only remnant of that famous collection

which now exists in America.

Among the most ardent admirers and indefatigable collectors of rare gems were the kings of Poland. Their collections went on accumulating during successive reigns until the fall of that dynasty. The Prince Poniatowski to whom the cabinet descended by inheritance was unceasing in his endeavors to augment the series. Endowed with a fine perception of the arts and a correct critical judgment, he succeeded, at great expense, in adding many valuable specimens that had been dispersed through Europe, and thus formed the most extensive and splendid collection known in modern times.

For the identification and illustration of these gems we would refer to an essay on ancient gems by James Prendeville, B.A., editor of "Livy," "Paradise Lost," etc. (London, 1841), and which is to be found at the Astor Library

of this city.

We would quote an article from the London "Times," dated December 30, 1841, upon a

cabinet of Poniatowski gems sold early in the last century in London, which reads as follows:

"We recently took an opportunity to describe this collection of gems, and we, on that occasion, expressed our opinion of its merits. then we have had further opportunities of examining the collection more in detail, and we do not see any reason to alter our opinion or to think less highly of these works of art. The collection consists of twelve hundred intaglios, containing an immense variety of figures, groups, and heads cut on carnelians, sardonyx, etc., and inscribed with names of Greek artists. It is most probable, indeed almost a matter of certainty, that a certain portion of these specimens are the works of genuine Greek art and another portion are copies, or rather specimens, of what more modern artists could do in imitation of Greek art. These imitations, however, are not servile repetitions of suppressed originals; they are the works of artists, whether Greek or not, at all events imbued with the excellence of Greek art, and most difficult it is to discern which of this large collection of gems is or is not a Greek gem, and which are not of more modern workmanship. All, with few exceptions, are beautiful, evidently of extraordinary beauty."
