

Peter Carl Fabergé's name conjures up a fantasia of exquisite jewellery, objects of vertu, hardstone animals and trompe l'oeil vases of flowers. The magic he distilled from his workshops in St Petersburg and Moscow caught the fascination of patrons throughout Europe but above all of our own Royal family. Edward VII and Queen Alexandra, the Tsarina Marie Feodorovna's sister, commissioned a farmyard of hardstone animals, portraits of the pets and stock at Sandringham. The discerning Oueen Mary preferred imaginative objects of vertu such as a miniature desk, whilst the Queen Mother, our Oueen, her children and sister continue to collect the best of Fabergé.

For the first time this very personal royal collection is on view at the Victoria and Albert Museum. Kenneth Snowman, chairman of Wartski, is the greatest world expert on Fabergé's craft. He has assembled the most comprehensive exhibition yet staged, of about 500 pieces, many from famous private collections and never previously shown. In this catalogue there are 28 colour plates and over 100 black and white details with a clear description and history of the pieces which will both satisfy the connoisseur and entrance the amateur.

In these more austere times it is a welcome distraction to lose oneself in the study of these exquisite objects which evoke a world inhabited by Tsarinas and Grand-duchesses, troikas and sleigh bells. The superlative craftsmanship of



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Foreword




In 1949 and again in 1953, on the occasion of the Queen's Coronation, Kenneth Snowman organised the first comprehensive exhibitions ever held in this country of the work of the great goldsmith Carl Fabergé. On those occasions the exhibitions were held at Wartski, then in Regent Street, and included many loans from the Royal Collection. The growth of interest in Fabergé since then is accurately reflected in the fact that Mr Snowman's definitive account of his work, which originally appeared in 1953, went into a second edition in 1955, an enlarged edition in 1962, and a fourth edition in 1964, with reprints both in 1968 and 1974. Nothing, therefore, would seem more appropriate than that Mr Snowman should organise a major loan exhibition of Fabergé to mark the Silver Jubilee of Her Majesty The Queen. The conception, choice and arrangement of exhibits and catalogue we owe entirely to his knowledge and enthusiasm. The design of the exhibition, a challenging task, has been the responsibility of Paul Williams of our Design Section and many others in the Museum have also been involved, principally members of our Exhibition Section and of the Department of Metalwork.

The choice of Fabergé for Jubilee Year is also appropriate because of the sustained interest in his work by the Royal Family. Initiated by the direct patronage of King Edward VII and Queen Alexandra, who introduced Queen Victoria to the work, it flourished under Queen Mary who made her own remarkable collection and is continued in the

present generation by those contemporary collectors, Her Majesty The Queen, Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother, and H.R.H. The Prince of Wales. Their objects form the core of the present exhibition. We wish to express our very real gratitude to Her Majesty The Queen and Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother for their generosity and to Geoffrey de Bellaigue, Surveyor of The Queen's Works of Art for his ready co-operation at all points of the enterprise. For some the art of Fabergé may well seem trivial, a pandering to fin de siècle decadence as epitomised by late Victorian and Edwardian England and the last years of Tsarist rule in pre-revolutionary Russia. Such an attitude is understandable in a more egalitarian age with its dismissive regard toward objets de luxe. But such a position, if applied consistently to the decorative arts, would rob us of a vast number of its most remarkable creations.

Fabergé is almost the last expression of court art within the European tradition which brings with it a passionate conviction of the importance of craftsmanship and inventiveness of design, aligned to a celebration of the virtues of wit and fantasy applied to everyday objects, that still has a relevance to the design of today.

Introduction

The impact of a restless imagination expressing itself in a variety of exotic materials in a remote city on the very fringe of Europe was to prove irresistible to an Edwardian society which was always ready to accept any addition to the accountrements of good living.

The spell was finally cast in 1900 when, for the first time, Paris, and thus Europe, saw for itself at the Exposition Internationale Universelle, the magic that was being distilled in St Petersburg by the diligent and enterprising Carl Fabergé. The world has not emerged from this spell and the potion is as heady today and far more widely absorbed than ever before.

The Jubilee has provided a happy occasion to examine again and ask ourselves just why these confections prepared for a pampered society still obstinately retain their hold on our imagination.

There are those who do not find it possible to accept some of the more frankly prettified pastiches of mainly the French eighteenth century, but there stands nevertheless a core of individual achievement which holds a merited place in the history of the applied arts of the nineteenth century. *Edelkitsch* some of it may be, but it is not to be dismissed and has become a significant part of our European heritage.

We can now recognize in his considerable repertoire many examples which, it is difficult to believe, were not designed and made a generation later. His was very much a pioneering spirit.

Enough years have passed to appreciate the stir that the objects he made must have aroused when they were first seen. Far more ambitious because more varied than any jeweller since the eighteenth cen-

tury, his position has become, in our own time, unassailable. A house-style is now distinctly recognizable throughout his *oeuvre*.

This present offering, including as it does a generous part of Queen Alexandra's own collection, affords us a rare opportunity to admire a very personal anthology assembled with affection and in a climate entirely free from economic or speculative pressure.

It will, I hope, help to demonstrate the affable spirit in which these objects were originally created – an uncomplicated desire to give pleasure.

Queen Alexandra was the sister of the Dowager Empress Marie Feodorovna and it was largely through this relationship of two Danish Princesses that the custom grew of finding a small animal carving in natural stone, or a flower study poised in a rock crystal pot, which appears, by a stratagem of the lapidary, to be filled with water, to add to the collection at Sandringham House.

As Henry Bainbridge has said, we had in England 'just the right King on the throne, with just the right experience behind him, just the right Queen with just the right love of simple things, such as animals and flowers'.

During the opening years of the century when the craftsmen were actually producing these objects, the cost was such that, though never cheap, the articles would not offend by a noisy display of too much money spent – that, I believe, is why this very personal collection makes such a seemly and cared-for impression. In this context I should like to recall the words of Sir Sacheverell Sitwell who, in his Foreword to the catalogue of the Coronation Exhibition of Fabergé's

work held at Wartski in 1953, and which included many of the Sandringham objects, wrote:

But it is to the Sandringham Collection that one returns again. There are the objects belonging to the beautiful Queen Alexandra, no longer, then, a young woman, during the decade when she was Queen. They are not, even, objects in the most precious materials, but little toys and objets de virtu. The whole reason of the collection must lie in the fact that the Dowager-Empress was her sister. It was on visits to Russia that King Edward VII and Queen Alexandra saw objects from Fabergé's workshops and conceived a taste for them. Later, King Edward fell a victim to the Russian habit and commissioned presents from Fabergé, yearly, for Queen Alexandra. They are a perpetuation of Queen Alexandra's charm and humour which made her so beloved by all who knew her. These particular Fabergé objects are of no tragic significance at all, which makes them all the more delightful. It is a privilege to be allowed to enter the privacy of this Royal Collection of King Edward and Queen Alexandra and see the familiar objects that surrounded them. If they have a Russian flavour, then we remember that, large or small, as works of Fabergé the great craftsman and jeweller, they deserve to be remembered beside the Russian music and Russian novels of their day.

Henry Bainbridge managed what one hesitates to call the London branch of Fabergé's; one should perhaps find a more exalted word for what was in effect a private salon opened for the personal convenience of the Royal Family and their immediate entourage of friends. It was up in this eyrie in 48 Dover Street that the King's friend Mrs George Keppel actually suggested making portrait models of some of the favourite animals and pets for the Queen's collection 'if the King will give his permission'. The following day Bainbridge received a telegram from Sandringham 'The King agrees'.

Thus it was that Mr Bainbridge (concealed for some obscure reason, like a latterday Polonius, behind a hedge!) was able to record




The interior of the St Petersburg shop.

how on December 8th 1907, he observed His Majesty, encased in a tight-fitting overcoat and beneath what appeared to be a mini cricket cap, leading his guests after luncheon from Sandringham House across the lawnto Queen Alexandra's Dairy.

The purpose of this pilgrimage was to examine the display of wax models which a group of artists from St Petersburg had been preparing during the previous month. Included in this working party was Boris Froedman-Cluzel together with the Swiss, Frank Lutiger.

When the *maquettes* arrived at St Petersburg, careful selections were made as to the most suitable materials for the final carving.

These studies of animals, birds, insects and fish can be clearly divided into two types. Some are taken directly from nature and are very carefully finished with every hair in place so to speak. The others

are conventionalized essays designed to bring out some particular characteristic such as the chubby bulk of an elephant or a pig, the nervous watchful agility of a frog or the sheer clumsiness of a pelican.

Inevitably, the most successful of the conventionalized figures portray subjects which manifest some sort of oddity or quirk in real life, subjects which in fact would attract the cartoonist in any medium.

The purpurine elephant in this exhibition was clearly a source of enormous pleasure to the sculptor who designed it and indeed, before close examination, it appears simply to be a heavy bright crimson ball (C15). Quality was sought at all times. So much so, it is safe to assume

that an object wanting in this respect cannot be from the hands of the Fabergé workmasters.

We know how stern a critic he was and that a substantial proportion of the pieces made were never allowed to see the light of day.

Fabergé's contribution to the decorative arts of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries was the result of his own private Russian Revolution. He decreed that the emphasis previously concentrated on the sheer value of the material used should be shifted, without compromise, on to the craftsmanship devoted to a given object.

Looking back upon this personal credo, he has referred, with disdain, to the leading European jewellers as merchants and not artist-jewellers. He is reported in *Stolitza y Usadba* (Town and Country), St Petersburg, January 15th, 1914, to have said 'Expensive things interest me little if the value is merely in so many diamonds or pearls.'

The late Queen Mary, a redoubtable and highly informed connoisseur, added many of the more dramatic subjects to the Royal Collection, such as the Colonnade Egg (F3) and the miniature éscritoire in Louis xVI taste (K4), and Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother, who always shared with the late King George VI, a very lively enthusiasm for this work, has assembled her own beautiful group of objects, among which the bunch of wild flowers in a vase with an enamelled gem-set honey bee is outstanding (F9).

The Queen herself continues this family tradition as the Exhibition vividly demonstrates and has readily and generously made the Royal Collection available so that all those interested may examine and enjoy the best work of one of the world's last great artist-designers.

There are, in this exhibition, several objects with which Fabergé must have been particularly pleased – not necessarily the most elaborate or costly, but ones exemplifying the sort of glamour we have come to associate with his name. I have in mind the exquisitely carved agate pumpkin box (J 10) with its echoes, some distance away, of eighteenth-century Dresden, the blue enamelled cigarette case wound round by its glittering diamond snake, designed with all the concentration of a Beardsley drawing, and having in addition such a fascinating history



The Sandringham birds, sketches made by A. Kenneth Snowman during his work on the Royal Collection for this exhibition.


(K2), the score of flower studies which together present a twinkling green-house-cum-Schatzkammer, the aviary of fifty-nine sculptured birds, the sherry-agate negro head in the form of a bowl (R25) and too many of the animal carvings to enumerate here. Perhaps a passing reference should be made to the lively little carving of an owl in carrot-coloured agate and which stands only five eighths of an inch high. Two greatly enlarged coloured photographs in the catalogue give an idea of just how much observed detail it was possible for a talented sculptor to concentrate into a work on even such a tiny scale (D38).

It is a special pleasure to see again the sensational basket of lilies of the valley (M9) formerly the favourite possession of that very considerable human being and friend, Matilda Gray. How gratifying also to have once again, under the same roof, the Imperial Presentation Box in the Forbes Magazine collection (014) and the Coronation Egg (01) which were the gifts exchanged by the Tsar and Tsarina on Easter Day 1897.


Apart from these two important private collections, the museums of America have been extremely generous and visitors to the exhibition will acknowledge a deep debt of gratitude to the Cleveland Museum of Art, the Virginia Museum, Richmond and the Walters Art Gallery in Baltimore.

In setting out this exhibition I have included a great deal of material, recognizing that these Victorian and Edwardian souvenirs were never intended to be regarded as holy relics, to be displayed individually and with formal reverence. On the contrary they are at their best when viewed in groups – a glance at any of the photographs of the period which show the tables and bureaux in the Russian Palaces and Sandringham, laden with rows of enamelled miniature frames, amply confirms this view. Nineteen small carvings of dogs of varied species for example are shown as an independent group representing, as it were, Fabergé's essay on the dog.

My only regret is that my father, Emanuel Snowman, MVO, OBE, did not live to enjoy this, the first comprehensive exhibition of Fabergé's work to be held in a national museum, having himself done








so much, so enthusiastically, to bring it before the public. He would have been especially happy to have seen again the enchanting Peacock Egg which he brought over from Russia, with so many other treasures, in the twenties (0 10).

I should like to express my thanks to Dr Roy Strong for having wholeheartedly and unhesitatingly accepted the idea of this exhibition in the first place.

I am grateful to the lapidaries George Bull-Diamond, Brian Lloyd and Peter Rome and to Dr Michael Brambell and Peter Olney, the Curators of respectively, Mammals and Birds at the London Zoo, and to Michael Boorer of the Zoological Society of London, for their invaluable advice. Chronology

- Firm established by Gustav in Bolshaya Morskaya Street in St Petersburg.
- 1846 Peter Carl Fabergé born in St Petersburg on 30th May. Baptized in the Protestant Church.
- 1870 Fabergé takes control of the firm at the age of twenty-four. New ground-floor premises taken opposite original basement, now closed.
- 1872 Fabergé marries Augusta Julia Jacobs.
- Fabergé's younger brother Agathon arrives from Dresden to join the firm at the age of twenty.
 The House exhibits for first time at Pan-Russian Exhibition in Moscow, and wins a Gold Medal.
- First Imperial Easter Egg presented to the Empress Marie Feodorovna.
 Alexander III grants his Royal Warrant to the House of Fabergé in 1884 or 1885.
- 1885 House awarded Gold Medal at Nuremberg Fine Art Exhibition for gold replicas of Scythian Treasure.
- 1886 Michael Perchin joins the firm.
- 1888 Special Diploma received at Northern Exhibition in Copenhagen; the House was *hors concours*, being represented on the jury.

- 1890 St Petersburg premises doubled in size. Branch opened in Odessa.
- 1893 Death of Gustav Fabergé in Dresden on his seventy-ninth birthday. Art Nouveau movement now launched in Europe.
- Death of Alexander III on 1st November.
 Marriage of Nicholas II on 7th December.
 Eugène Fabergé joins the firm.
- 1895 Death of Fabergé's brother Agathon at age of thirty-three.
- 1896 Coronation of Nicholas II.
 House awarded State Emblem at Pan-Russian Exhibition at Nijny-Novgorod.
 The Kokoshnik was almost certainly adopted as State mark for gold and silver throughout Russia in 1896.
- 1897 Granted Royal Warrant by Court of Sweden and Norway.
- 1898 Premises bought at 24 Morskaya Street and reconstruction started.
- Imperial Eggs exhibited for first time at the Paris 'Exposition Internationale Universelle'. Carl Fabergé, member of jury, acclaimed *Maître* and decorated with Légion d'Honneur.
- 1901 Death of Eric Kollin.
- 1903 Arthur Bowe sent from Moscow to London to start up business for Fabergé from Berners Hotel.

 Death of Michael Perchin; workshop taken over by his chief assistant, Henrik Wigström.

 Death of August Holmström, succeeded by his son Albert.

- 1904 Birth of Tsarevitch.
 Fabergé invited to visit King Chulalongkorn of Siam.
 London branch removes to Portman House, Duke Street,
 Grosvenor Square. Objects by Fabergé exhibited for first time in England by Lady Paget at an Albert Hall bazaar in aid of Royal Hospital for Children.
- London branch removes to 48 Dover Street under Nicholas
 Fabergé and H. C. Bainbridge.
 Beginning of business connections with Siam, India and China.

Baron Foelkersam's *Inventaire de l'Argenterie* published, in which he writes: 'This firm (Fabergé), which is one of the best and most famous in the world, is renowned above all for its *objets d'art*. Articles made in Fabergé's workshops are known for their technical excellence, especially as regards enamelling, stone polishing and engraving.'

- 1908 Carl Fabergé arrives in London from St Petersburg to see

A Note on the Metals, Enamels and Stones used by Fabergé

Taking the precious metals first, it is clear that to Fabergé the colour of the gold or silver, as well as the precise shade of the enamel or stone, was a matter of the most deliberate consideration.

Coloured Golds There are two methods of obtaining coloured golds, and Fabergé employed both. The metal used by goldsmiths is generally an alloy because pure 24 carat gold, although used occasionally for small trinkets, is much too soft for ordinary practical purposes. In the gold most often used by Fabergé (56 corresponding to our 14 carat), the nature of the metal added to complete the alloy (10 parts to 14 in the case of 14 carat) determines the final colour of the gold.

The colour of the gold alloy is controlled by the precise proportions of pure gold, and mainly pure copper and fine silver; for some special shades other metals, such as pure nickel or palladium, may be introduced. Pure gold combined with fine silver gives a green gold, and with pure copper, a red gold.

The numerous variations of the alloy enable the goldsmith to produce yellow, green, red and white golds in very many degrees of intensity, as well as certain even more *recherché* effects such as blue, orange and grey golds. In the main, however, Fabergé confined his attention to the more usual colours.

The other method of colouring gold, less frequently employed in Morskaya Street, is simply to tint it after the work is finished. It is sometimes difficult to discern which technique has been adopted without disturbing the surface of the metal.

The quatre-couleur technique of the eighteenth-century goldsmiths

in France was developed to a surprising extent in the St Petersburg ateliers, and this was often combined with the use of enamels or stones to give increased point to the subtle variations between the differently-coloured golds.

Fabergé very effectively combined dull or matt golds with polished gold of another colour; for instance a chiselled swag would be executed in matt green gold and the small bows and ties in polished red gold.

Other Metals As well as making a great deal of polished silverware, mostly in the Moscow House, Fabergé was one of the first to make extensive use of oxidized silver, and produce a large quantity of *surtouts-de-table*, *bratini*, bowls and samovar sets in this medium. The tea service (S 4) provides a good example of the technique.

Enamels Fabergé's superb enamelling techniques are perhaps the most important aspect of his work. Enamelling is a complex process, fraught with difficulties and it is necessary for the layman to understand the ancient technique before being able to comprehend the extent to which Fabergé stretched and embroidered on the process. He thus subjected his workmasters to a continuous rigorous test of their skills in order to achieve more exotic and subtle effects in a manner only attempted by French eighteenth century goldsmiths.

Enamelling in the simplest sense is 'a semi-opaque variety of glass, applied by fusion to metallic surfaces'. The word 'fusion' is the key to the whole operation. For enamel to become malleable, it has to be

heated to a certain temperature, and it is precisely this heating that creates the problems that so consistently defeat the modern craftsman. The finest translucent enamel has to be brought up to a heat of about 600 degrees centigrade – Fabergé's enamellers normally worked at temperatures varying between 700 and 800 degrees; at such tremendous heat, it is obvious that if there has been any slight error or miscalculation in the preparation of the actual enamel or flux, or if the alloy of the metal plate used is not entirely suited to the enamel covering it, disaster, swift and sure, will undoubtedly follow.

In practice, it is astonishing to learn how much heat 14 carat gold, for example, can withstand without coming to grief. It is usually necessary to apply enamel to a part of an object already worked by the goldsmith, and even if the temperature inside the 'muffle' of the kiln were raised to 1,000 degrees centigrade, the metal would emerge from its ordeal by fire unscathed, as about 1,200 degrees would be needed to affect a gold of this hardness. It is seldom necessary to risk passing gems through the fire, the technique being to cut out the raised settings in advance, then, when the enamel has been applied, the stones may be inserted and the settings closed round to secure them.

Characteristics of Fabergé enamelling are the even quality and smoothness of its texture. He specialised in what is known as *en plein* enamelling; this means the smooth covering of comparatively large surfaces or fields. This type of work allows for no margin of error. But perhaps the key to Fabergé's use of enamel was his subtle combination of techniques. Rather in the way he used matt and burnished coloured gold surfaces together, so he contrasted opaque and translucent enamel, the latter with patterns engraved underneath.

Opaque enamel usually requires a lower temperature than translucent, about 300 degrees sufficing. This lower temperature firing is known as 'petit feu' as opposed to 'grand feu'.

Translucent enamelling involves the firing of transparent layers of enamel, the fusibility of each carefully matched, on a prepared metal surface. In Fabergé's work this area is generally engine-turned (or sometimes engraved by hand), and is Known as a guilloché surface.

Each layer of enamel, and there may be as many as five or six, has to be baked separately. Sometimes gold leaf patterns known as *paillons* or painted decorations or scenes appear beneath the surface of such enamels: this lovely effect is obtained by applying and firing the gold leaf or the enamel on to an already fired enamel surface before the top sealing layer of enamel is in turn applied and fired. When the enamel has been baked, it requires careful polishing with a wooden wheel in order to smooth down any irregularities on the surface; this is a highly specialized and extremely laborious operation and one without which the finished article will lack that distinction we have come to connect with Fabergé's work. The enamel is then finished off with the buff.

The characteristic milky quality of some of the translucent enamels, and especially the white, a rich fullness difficult to describe on paper but easy to recognize in reality, was obtained by a mixture made up in the proportion of four to six parts of transparent, to one part of opaque enamel, producing a semi-opaque material. This enamel is generally described as *opalescent*.

Another feature of some of his enamel pieces is the way the colour appears to alter as the object is turned very slightly; this effect was brought about by simply varying the colours of the layers of enamel. A pale flame-coloured layer of semi-transparent enamel beneath one or more layers of white transparent enamel imparts a particularly enchanting lustre - the round box in the Sandringham Collection (H8) is an excellent instance of this technique. Also the effect of the light on the separate crystals of which the enamel is composed often gives the impression of a second colour. This variation in colour combined with painting beneath the top surface of enamel is illustrated very well in the Easter Egg made for Barbara Kelch (FI). Add to these variations in colour, the colour and engraved pattern of the gold guilloché field - the carcass of the Egg itself, which can be seen through the layers of warm semi-transparent enamel, sometimes indistinctly, at other times very clearly, depending upon the angle of vision and the light, and we begin to get some conception of the thought and careful planning that went into the creation of such an object.

Cloisonné Enamel: Fabergé decorated many silver and silver-gilt pieces with cloisonné enamels. He preferred a pastel palette to the cruder blues and reds chosen by most Russian nineteenth century silversmiths. A network of raised metal enclosures is soldered to the body of the object which is to be treated. The enamels are poured into these cloisons, the metal tops of which remain exposed, allowing the different colours in each one to be distinctly shown, serving as jewels in separate settings or collets. There are several examples in case s.

Stones The lapidaries working in Russia found everything in their favour; the richest imaginable variety of natural resources was, practically speaking, on their doorstep, from the vivid Siberian emerald to the grey jasper of Kalgan. This astonishing abundance of mineral deposits to be found in the Urals, the Caucasus, Siberia, and elsewhere, must have been a source of great satisfaction to Fabergé, and time and time again he is able to transmit to us his own pleasure in some particularly choice stone by means of an animal carving, or a dish or box.

As far as *precious stones* were concerned, he rarely used these unless the purely decorative demands of the particular object called for them. Sapphires, rubies and emeralds were most frequently used *en cabochon*, and nine times out of ten the diamonds he used were rose-cut; he confined his use of brilliant diamonds to specially commissioned and Imperial pieces. Rose-cut diamonds set next to enamel or stone become part of the whole, whereas there is sometimes a danger that brilliant-cut stones, being so much brighter, might appear out of tone unless steps were taken, such as specially designed settings, to prevent this.

Semi-precious gem stones were used a great deal, especially moonstones, cabochon garnets, olivines and stained chalcedonies cut cabochon known as Mecca stones.

The other *hardstones* for carving to which he seems to have been most attracted were rock crystal, jade, bowenite, agate, jasper, rhodonite and quartz, aventurine, lapis lazuli and pale green flecked and opalescent amazonite.

A word or two about the special properties of some of these stones might be useful in this context. There are, strictly speaking, only two varieties of jade, nephrite and jadeite; both were used by Fabergé, nephrite a very great deal, jadeite only very occasionally. The nephrite he used was the dark green stone found in Siberia. The pale yellow-green stone usually described as 'pale jade' is not a jade at all, but a hard form of serpentine known as bowenite; known, that is to say, since 1822 when G. T. Bowen published his findings in the American fournal of Science. Until that time, this stone was erroneously thought to be nephrite. Apart from Rhode Island, U.S.A., where Bowen found it, this form of serpentine is also present in Afghanistan, from which source, doubtless, Fabergé had the stone imported.

Rhodonite or orletz, to give it its Russian name, is one of the most beautiful of all the natural stones; it was mined at Ekaterinburg and is characterized by its warm rose colour.

Obsidian, a natural volcanic glass of a grey-black colour which imparts a soft velvety sheen when polished, was peculiarly suited to the carving of animals.

Aventurine quartz, a tawny material mined in the Altai Mountains, also has a particularly attractive surface owing to the gold spangles which become evident when it is polished.

Besides the many natural stones available to the firm, a deep crimson material known as *purpurine* was frequently used with great effect. A worker in the Imperial Glass Factory in St Petersburg, named Petouchov, discovered the secret of its manufacture. A similar process was known in the eighteenth century to the lapidaries of Murano, to whom also must go the credit for the invention of aventurine glass or 'goldstone'.

The purpurine-like substance found in Italian work however, is considerably lighter both in colour and weight; this is probably due to a smaller proportion of lead in its composition than that used by Petouchov.

The manufacture of purpurine would appear to have been brought about by the crystallization of a lead chromate in a glass matrix. It is a

material of great beauty both on account of the intensity and depth of its sang de boeuf colour and its spangled glassy texture. The Fabergé workshops seem to have had the exclusive use of this attractive material.

Maquettes: before starting up with the wheel on a freshly ground piece of stone, the sculptor would generally have before him a wax or plaster model of the subject from which to work. The lapidaries would not necessarily carry out their own ideas; there were about twenty artists and designers in Fabergé's drawing-studio, and it was here that these preliminary wax figures were modelled.

In the case at the back the original wax models used for the animal carvings are seen.





A wax model, typical of the studies from which the Fabergé artists carved the hardstone animals.

In some cases – the Sandringham series is an obvious example – the original modelling from nature would be done on the spot and the carving carried out in the St Petersburg workshop.

Woods He had a nice appreciation of the different woods to be found in and around Russia. Karelian birch, palisander, and holly wood in particular were used for many diverse objects including cigarette-cases, miniature frames, and even bell-pushes.

The cases in which Fabergé pieces were delivered were generally made of wood – for the most part, polished white holly wood; they were beautifully made and provided a worthy setting for a precious gift.

Marks and Standards

State marks Up to the year 1896, St Petersburg and Moscow each had their own separate cyphers which are easily distinguishable. St Petersburg, where the bulk of Fabergé's vitrine objects were made, had as the gold mark of the city, two crossed anchors intersected vertically by a sceptre.



Moscow, where a much more commercial business was carried on, had as the city gold mark a Saint George and Dragon.



In 1896 both St Petersburg and Moscow, and for that matter the other manufacturing centres in Russia, abandoned their separate gold marks and adopted a woman's head seen in profile wearing the traditional head-dress known as a *Kokoshnik*.



Gold and Silver Standards The Russian gold standards in general use at this time were reckoned in *zolotniks* in the same way as ours are expressed in carats. The gold alloy of 96 parts, contains in Fabergé's objects, either 56 or 72 *zolotniks* of pure gold, just as our alloy of 24

parts, or carats, contains a certain proportion of pure gold, 9, 18 or 22 parts being the most common. It is useful to remember that the 96 parts of the Russian alloy correspond to the 24 parts of the English alloy – a ratio of 4 to 1. Hence, if the Russian gold standards (56 and 72 zolotniks, for instance) are divided by 4, the results given represent the English standard equivalents (14 and 18 carats respectively).

The Russian standards for silver are also indicated by the number of zolotniks of pure silver out of 96 zolotniks of alloy. The most frequently found proportions are 84 and 88, although it is not altogether uncommon to find objects stamped 91. The English 'sterling' standard requires that at least 925 parts out of a total of 1000 parts of silver alloy be pure silver. By proportional calculation it thus becomes clear that while the Russian standards 84 and 88 are below the English standard for sterling silver, the standard 91 is above.

See p. 25 for identification of gold and silver marks on objects in the exhibition.

Makers' Marks Most, but by no means all, Fabergé objects bear some sort of mark of the House. The first obvious exceptions to this rule are the carvings in stone; a mark, even if practicable, would almost always disturb the surface beauty of such pieces, and when a signature of some sort is found, for example on the under-surface of a stone animal, this is tantamount to a proclamation that this carving is not by Fabergé at all.

The form of the signature stamped or engraved on an object usually reveals its origin of manufacture; those pieces made in St Petersburg simply bear the name Fabergé in Russian characters, 'ФАБЕРЖЕ', without any initial, usually followed, or preceded, by the workmaster's initials. Sometimes a piece will be found to bear only the House name or only the workmaster's initials. Objects made in St Petersburg are sometimes marked. К.Ф. Most workmasters' initials appear in Roman letters but some are stamped in Russian characters, for example 'I.P.' for Julius Rappoport.

The pieces made in Moscow are marked with the signature

K. Φ ABEPKE beneath an Imperial double-headed eagle, or, as in St Petersburg, they too are simply stamped with the initials K. Φ . as are those made in Odessa and Kiev, where Fabergé had branches and small workshops.

The full Moscow mark signifies that the firm held the Royal Warrant of Appointment and was entitled to stamp the Imperial cypher above the House name.

Pieces made in St Petersburg, however, were treated differently. Fabergé felt that credit should be given to the particular workmaster responsible for the work and that, in fact, it was not an anonymous product of the House, but the original work of the man whose initials it bore, and that man, whether he was Perchin, Wigström or any of the others, was clearly not a Warrant holder.

It was in this characteristically generous way that the workmaster was recognized by Fabergé, as being in charge of a carefully selected group of talented craftsmen, who was entitled to sign his own creation.

When the maker of an object is known, the workmaster's initials are given under the catalogue description. For example:

Signed $M\Pi$

Gold marks are identified if they are those in use before the *Kokoshnik* was adopted and if the purity of the metal exceeds the normal 56 zolotniks. For example:

Gold marks 72 and crossed anchors.

Silver marks are treated in the same way and only noted if the purity exceeds the more usual 84 and 88 *zolotniks*. For example:

Silver marks 91 and St George and dragon.

Where no acknowledgement is made below a catalogue entry in cases κ and M to S, it is to be assumed that this item forms part of a private collection.



A silver-gilt cupid, an allegorical representation of the Tsarevitch, surmounts the gold Egg, which is enamelled opalescent pale pink on an engraved ground and is encircled by the broad band of a translucent white enamelled dial set with rose diamond numerals; a diamond-set pointer projects from a colonnade in pale green bowenite, which supports the Egg. The base of this colonnade, which is made up of six gold-mounted Ionic columns, is set with coloured gold chiselled mounts and a broad band of pale pink enamel. Four silver-gilt cherubs, representing the Tsar's four daughters, are seated at intervals around this elaborate base and are linked by floral swags chiselled in quatre-couleur gold. Two cast and chased platinum doves are perched on a white enamel plinth raised within the circle of columns.

Sir Sacheverell Sitwell has suggested that

the design for this Egg derives from Eisen's illustrations to Les Baisers of Dorat. (See Carl Fabergé, Wartski Coronation Exhibition 1953.)

LI Standing double-sided MINIATURE-FRAME in the form of a fire-screen with chased floral swags and trophies in five colours of gold. The framework, enamelled opaque white *champlevé*, is set with two oriental pearl finials; the rectangular frame itself is enamelled opalescent oyster on one side against a scalloped ground, with an oval photograph of Nicholas II within a half-pearl border. The reverse, enamelled opalescent pale rose, holds a photograph of the Tsarina, similarly framed.

Heavy chased green gold laurel swags hang from a circular pierced gold grille at the top, and a line of pearls within borders of chased green gold leaves and berries forms a belt around the centre of the Egg; this belt is interrupted by the opalescent white enamelled dial of the clock set in gold within a ring of pearls. The hands are of gold and the numerals are painted in blue enamel. The Egg is mounted on a four-sided pedestal decorated with applied

red and green gold devices of the Arts and Sciences. The fourmain concave panels are enamelled translucent blue while the remaining one bordering them and the fluted shaft supporting the Egg, are opalescent white.

The diamond-set cockerel in gold and varicoloured enamels which rises from the interior of the Egg, flapping its wings and crowing, does not do so at the pressure of a button, but automatically at each hour. When it has announced the time, it disappears beneath the grille which closes down over the top of the Egg. [81]

L3 Imperial presentation FRAME with a photograph of Nicholas II in gold set with rock crystal panels engraved with entwined trails of laurel, the borders chased in high relief with enamelled translucent emerald crossed at intervals by opaque white-enamelled ties. The four square panels and six roundels between them, enamelled opalescent pink over sunray engraving, are applied with four-colour gold chased motifs set with rose diamonds; those at the corners, the Imperial Crown; at the top, the cypher of Marie Feodorovna; below, the Romanov double-headed eagle; the sides each with two trophies. L4 ORANGE-TREE EGG, presented to the Dowager Empress Marie Feodorovna by Nicholas II. Date 1911. In the form of an orange tree growing in a tub, this Easter Egg is a remarkable example of the jeweller's art. Set upon a solid block of nephrite and surrounded by four gold-mounted nephrite pillars connected by swinging chains of translucent emeraldenamelled gold leaves half covering pearls. A white quartz tub, set with cabochon rubies and pearls, trellised in gold and decorated with chased gold swags, is filled with hammered gold soil. As if growing from this soil, a naturalistically modelled gold tree trunk sup-

ports the egg-shaped foliage composed of single carved nephrite leaves, each engraved to show the veining. White opaque enamel flowers with brilliant diamond centres and various green stones including topaz, amethysts, pale rubies and champagne diamonds representing fruit, are set at random amongst the leaves. Within this nephrite foliage, four main limbs, branch from the trunk, and a complex network of smaller branches grows from these, each finally passing through tiny drilled collets concealed behind each leaf. When a small button is pressed, the top leaves spring up and a feathered gold bird rises from the interior of the tree, sings and then automatically disappears. The key to the mechanism is hidden among the leaves and may be located only by the gem set in the top disguised as another fruit. [81]

L7 FIFTEENTH ANNIVERSARY EGG, presented to Alexandra Feodorovna by Nicholas II, dated 1911. The following is based on a translation of the description given with a photograph of this egg, printed in *Stolitza y Usadba* (Town and Country), 'The Journal of Elegant Living', a magazine published in what was then Petrograd. This particular issue, dated 1st April, 1916, gave special prominence to a series of photographs of nine of the Tsarina's Easter Eggs:

Red gold Egg commemorating the fifteenth anniversary of Nicholas II's Coronation; it is enamelled opalescent oyster with heavy carved husk borders enamelled translucent emerald green with diamond ties at the intersections. The surface is covered with a series of miniature paintings on ivory by Zuiev depicting notable events of the reign; these are set under carved rock crystal panels and represent:

- I The ceremonial procession to the Uspensky Cathedral.
- 2 The actual moment of the Holy Coronation.
- 3 The Alexander III bridge in Paris at the opening of which His Imperial Majesty was present.
- 4 The House in the Hague, where the first Peace Conference took place, Huis ten Bosch.

- 5 The ceremonial reception for the members of the first State Duma in the Winter Palace.
- 6 The Emperor Alexander III Museum.
- 7 The unveiling of the Peter the Great monument in Riga.
- 8 The unveiling in Poltava of the monument commemorating the 200th year of the founding of Poltava.
- 9 The removal of the remains of the sainted Serafim Sarovski.

The paintings are framed by narrow opaque

white enamelled borders with oval portrait miniatures of the Imperial Family are set in opalescent oyster enamelled mounts over *guilloché* fields and rimmed by rose diamonds.

Fabergé's signature appears twice in pale blue enamel in three parts (ΦA , EP, EP) on a ribbon on the plaques showing the dates 1894 (the date of the wedding) and 1911, below pink bouquets. The chased acanthus mounts encircling the rose diamond cluster at the culot of the Egg, and the portrait and rose diamond

cluster at the top, under which is the Imperial Cypher A Φ beneath the crown, are in dull green gold. Height $5\frac{1}{6}$ inches No gold marks

L8 SPRING FLOWER EGG, presented to Marie Feodorovna by Alexander III, made between 1885 and 1890. Supported on a circular carved and fluted bowenite base, mounted with red and green gold scrolls and chased acanthus leaves and set with rose diamonds, the gold

Egg is enamelled translucent strawberry on a guilloché field. It is richly embellished with chased green gold rocaille decoration in the Louis xv manner and the red gold rim which bisects the Egg is set with rose diamonds, as are the two surmounting fasteners. When these are divided the Easter Egg opens to reveal the surprise, a basket of spring flowers on a small gold circular plinth. The flowers are carved in milky chalcedony with olivine centres set in green gold, and the gold leaves are enamelled translucent green over an engraved ground. The basket, which is chased in platinum, is elaborately pierced and set with a profusion of rose diamonds, as is the handle.

This flower-basket motif was used again much later by Fabergé in his Winter Egg of 1913. As in the case of all the early Imperial Easter Eggs, this example is smaller than those which were made in 1896 and after.



In opalescent white enamel, the surface of this silver Egg is trellised with a simple laurel pattern forming panels within which military crosses of St George are painted. The Egg is encircled by the black and orange-striped ribbon of the Order of St George, which was awarded in recognition of outstanding courage; from two of the bows of this ribbon, which is carried out in enamel, hang silver medallions which may be raised upwards by pressing small buttons set beneath them, to reveal painted miniatures set in the main shell of the Egg. One medallion, showing the Tsar's head, covers the portrait of the Tsarevitch and the other, showing the Cross of St George, the portrait of the Tsar. The crowned initials of the Dowager

Empress appear raised within a round carved border at the top of the Egg, while the year is similarly applied to the base.

A scalloped border in rose diamonds at the top of the cover encloses a strawberrycoloured translucent enamel medallion with the year in diamonds. The Egg, which is mounted horizontally on an enamelled gold base, is richly decorated with a trellis pattern and numerous other gold motifs enamelled strawberry, emerald green, cerulean blue, opaque white and is set with an abundance of rose diamonds and cabochon rubies. The clasp is set with rose diamonds. Chased gold lions' heads holding rings in their mouths are mounted at either end of this. The last Easter Egg given to Marie Feodorovna by her husband. The surprise has been lost.

In comparing Fabergé's work with Le Roy's, note how carefully the modern goldsmith has carried out an almost identical composition in a far lighter vein, by means of a subtle appreciation of the basic egg shape and a careful adjustment of the scales as instanced by the gentle curve added to the trellis pattern, and the more substantial base in relation to the casket as a whole. When he saw the new box, the Tsar was so impressed that he ordered both the original and the 'copy' to be exhibited side by side in the Hermitage.

Elaborately chased floral garlands with ribbons in four colours of gold form a pendant within which a rose diamond bordered frame hangs, containing a miniature painting of the Tsarina Alexandra Feodorovna. M2 RED CROSS EGG WITH RESURRECTION TRIP-TYCH, presented to Alexandra Feodorovna by Nicholas II. Dated 1915. In white opalescent enamel on an engraved silver-gilt ground, this gold-mounted Egg is emblazoned with a bold red translucent enamel cross on either side. The centre of each cross is set with circular painted miniature portraits of respectively the Grand Duchess Olga and Tatiana in Red Cross uniform. The front cross with the portrait of Tatiana serves as a clasp securing the doubleopening doors, which reveal within a triptych painting by Prachov, with the Resurrection of Christ in the centre, and the Saints Olga and Tatiana painted on the side panels. The two remaining panels of the doors are inscribed, one with the crowned monogram of the Tsarina, and the other with the year 1915. The indifferent painting of the two unsigned exterior miniatures does not prepare one for

the rather impressive triptych concealed within the Egg, thus, in this case, the 'surprise' is a double one. In order to save the Tsar money, the cost of this war-time 'austerity' egg was kept down to about £200.

A star sapphire within a cluster of rose diamonds and chased gold laurel leaves surmounts this trois-couleur gold Egg which is enamelled a translucent pink on a guilloché pattern of repeated crosses. The Egg is divided into twelve panels by broad bands consisting each of a line of rose diamonds within continuous laurel leaf borders chased in gold; an emerald is set at each intersection of the lines of rose diamonds.

A folding screen of miniature paintings framed in vari-coloured gold is recessed within the Egg. Painted on mother-of-pearl by Krijitski and dated 1891, eight of the ten panels depict, palaces and residences in Denmark where the Dowager Empress, as Princess



Dagmar, spent her childhood; the paintings at either end of the screen show the Imperial yachts *Standart* and *Poliarnaya Svesda*. The natural mother-of-pearl is vividly revealed when the miniatures are held up to the light. The date 1895 is written in ink on the outside of the velvet case containing this Egg. MIO NAPOLEONIC EGG, presented to the Dowager Empress Marie Feodorovna by Nicholas II, dated 1912. In the Empire style, this green and yellow gold Egg commemorates the hundredth anniversary of the War of the Motherland waged against Napoleon. Military emblems and double-headed eagles chased in gold decorate the translucent emerald green with which the guilloché surface of the Egg is enamelled, and these are framed by broad bands of chased gold leaves and rosettes applied to translucent strawberry enamel. In addition to the profusion of rose diamonds



with which this magnificent Egg is set, portrait diamonds at either end cover the crowned monogram of the Dowager Empress and the date 1912.

Within the Egg is a folding screen of six signed miniatures by Vassily Zuiev, each showing members of the regiments of which Her Imperial Majesty was honorary Colonel; the back of each panel bears an inscription identifying these, and is set with her monogram and crown in rose diamonds on a green enamel plaque in the centre of a translucent white enamel sunburst pattern. It was here that the Grand Duke George Alexandrovitch, the younger brother of Nicholas II, was obliged to spend the greater part of his life owing to his ill health. When the Egg is held to the light, through portrait diamonds at the top and base. a miniature of the Grand Duke in naval uniform is seen. [82]



Supported on a spiral twist of silver-gilt leaves and twigs set with rose diamonds, this carved nephrite Egg, designed in the *art nouveau* style, is decorated with opaque violet enamelled pansies, symbols of remembrance and affection. Inside is a gold easel surmounted by a diamond-set Star of Bethlehem within a wreath over the date;

the easel is fluted and embellished with chased gold floral and torch motifs and is set with gems and pearls. On it rests a heart-shaped plaque enamelled opalescent white on a sunray guilloché background and bordered by rose diamonds set in silver and surmounted by the Romanov crown also in diamonds. Eleven tiny translucent strawberry enamelled gold covers, each bearing its own monogram, are connected by a large diamond 'M' to form a decoration for the front of this plaque. When a button is pressed, the enamelled covers open simultaneously to reveal eleven miniatures of the immediate Imperial Family. Reading vertically, those in the first row are: Grand Duke George, younger brother of the Tsar, Grand Duke Alexander, husband of the Grand Duchess Xenia, the Tsar's sister. In the second row are Tsar Nicholas II and Grand Duchess

MI4 CUCKOO EGG, presented to Alexandra Feodorovna by Nicholas II, dated 1900. Easter egg clock in dull yellow, green and red golds, enamelled opalescent white and trans-

The dial, which is encircled by pearls set in red polished gold, is enamelled with translucent emerald green trefoils, and the rose diamond numerals are set on pale greenish white opalescent enamel within opaque white enamel rings. A yellow gold leaf pattern surrounds the central pivot on which the red gold hands revolve. The egg is supported on an elaborate base set with three large rose diamonds by a central shaft and three struts enamelled opalescent white. When a button at the back of the clock is pressed, the circular pierced gold grille which surmounts it opens and a cuckoo, plumed with natural feathers, set with cabochon ruby eyes and standing on gold legs,







M20 GATCHINA PALACE EGG, probably presented to the Dowager Empress Marie Feodorovna by Nicholas II, circa 1902. Enamelled opalescent white on a gold guilloché carcass, this superb egg is divided into twelve panels by lines of pearls. Portrait diamonds are set at either extremity, but unfortunately both the monogram and the year which, presumably, they once covered, have disappeared. Classical motifs painted in enamel in each of the segments refer to the various fields of endeavour actively and consistently encouraged by Marie Feodorovna. When the egg is opened, a wonderfully detailed model of the Gatchina Palace, near St Petersburg, is revealed; it is executed in four colours of gold,

OI CORONATION EGG, presented to Alexandra Feodorovna by Nicholas II, dated 1897. This superb red gold Egg, enamelled translucent lime vellow on an engraved field, is enclosed by a green gold laurel leaf trellis, work cage mounted at each intersection by a yellow gold Imperial double-headed eagle enamelled opaque black, and set with a rose diamond. A large portrait diamond is set in the top of the egg within a cluster of ten brilliant diamonds; through the table of this stone, the monogram of the Empress is seen, the crowned 'A' described in rose diamonds, and the Russian 'F' in cabocohon rubies set in an opaque white enamel plaque. Another, smaller, portrait diamond is set within a cluster of rose diamonds at the end of the Egg, beneath which the date is inscribed on a similar plaque.

The surprise concealed inside this elaborate shell is an exact replica of the Imperial coach used in 1896, at the Coronation of Nicholas and Alexandra in Moscow. In yellow gold and strawberry coloured translucent enamel, the coach, one of the most splendid achievements of the goldsmith's art, is surmounted by the Imperial Crown in rose diamonds and six double-headed eagles on the roof; it is fitted with engraved rock crystal windows and platinum tyres, and is decorated with a diamond-set trellis in gold and an Imperial eagle in diamonds on either door. It is perfectly articulated in all its parts, even to the two steps which may

be let down when the doors are opened, and the whole chassis is correctly slung. The interior is enamelled with pale blue curtains behind the upholstered seats and footstool, and a daintily painted ceiling with a turquoiseblue sconce and hook set in the centre. The meticulous chasing of this astonishing piece was carried out with the naked eye without even the aid of a loupe. George Stein, who made the coach while he was employed in Perchin's workshop, explains that at that time, when he was a young man of twenty-three, his sight was so good that he could easily detect a flaw in a diamond by simply holding it up to the light. He evidently spent about fifteen months on this model, paying many exploratory visits to the famous Coach Museum in St Petersburg before starting the work. His pay was considered lavish at the rate of 5 roubles (or 10 shillings) a day - days which were sometimes sixteen hours long; Stein only earned three roubles a day at Kortmann's, his previous place of employment, but the conditions were better there than at Fabergé's before the removal to new premises in 1900. The yellow and black shell of the Egg is a reference to the sumptuous Cloth of Gold robe worn by the Tsarina at her Coronation.

The name Wigström, Perchin's assistant, is roughly scratched on the inner surface of the shell. [101]



O2 LILIES OF THE VALLEY EGG, presented to the Dowager Empress Marie Feodorovna by Nicholas II, dated 5th April 1898. Gold Egg enamelled translucent rose on a guilloché field and supported on four dull green gold cabriolet legs composed of overlapping leaves veined with rose diamonds. The Egg is surmounted by a rose diamond and cabochon ruby Imperial Crown set with two bows and quartered by four lines of rose diamonds and decorated with lilies of the valley in pearls and rose diamonds. the stalks lightly engraved green gold and the leaves enamelled translucent green on gold. The 'surprise' consists of three oval miniatures of Nicholas II in military uniform, and the Grand Duchess Olga and Tatiana, his first two children, signed by Zehngraf within rose diamond borders which are drawn out of the top of the egg by means of a geared mechanism and spread into a fan when a gold-mounted pearl button at the side is turned; a turn in the opposite direction automatically folds and returns the miniatures back to the interior of the egg. The date is engraved on the reverse of the miniatures. [101]

o3 THE FIRST IMPERIAL EASTER EGG, presented to Marie Feodorovna by Alexander III, probable date 1884. This was the first of the Fabergé Imperial Easter Eggs, and the pleasure that it gave to both the Tsar, who presented it, and the Tsarina, who received it, established a custom which was to continue without interruption until the violent end of the Romanov dynasty.

The shell of the Egg is gold, enamelled opaque white, and polished to give the effect of a hen's egg. The two halves are held together by a bayonet fitting; when these are opened, a yellow gold yolk with a dull sandblasted surface is revealed. Inside this yolk, which opens in the same way as the shell, sits a yellow and white tinted gold hen as though in a nest. Each feather is most carefully engraved, and two cabochon ruby eyes are set in the head; the

beak and comb are in red gold. By lifting the head, the hen opens on a hinge at the tail. Originally, a diamond replica of the Imperial Crown was contained within the hen, and when this was opened, a tiny ruby pendant was found hanging inside.

O4 RESURRECTION EGG, presented to Marie Feodorovna by Alexander III, made between 1885 and 1890. In the form of a monstrance, this Resurrection Egg is one of Fabergé's masterpieces; exquisitely made in the manner of the Italian Renaissance, it is essentially a jewel.

The three gold figures in the group are

naturalistically enamelled en ronde bosse with white drapery and lilac-coloured wings. The grass and the ground upon which the group is arranged are enamelled pale green and brown with yellow flecks, and this base is surrounded by a narrow belt of rose diamonds. The door of the Tomb is enamelled to simulate marble with a coral-coloured handle. The whole Resurrection scene is contained within a carved rock crystal Egg, the two hemispheres held together by a line of rose diamonds. The plinth supporting the Egg is enamelled translucent strawberry, green and opaque white with opaque black-painted enamel motifs, and opaque cerulean blue. The gold used is yellow, and the piece is set with eight brilliant diamonds in opaque black enamel collets; an Indian pearl is set on each of the four main panels of the base which is richly set with rose diamonds, and a large pearl serves as the shaft for this Egg.

05 Red gold shaped miniature STRUT-FRAME, with domed top with an outer border of chased dull green gold acanthus running along an opalescent oyster enamelled path over engraving, applied with chased green gold leaves interrupted by red gold chased rosettes. The main area of the frame is enamelled translucent pink over guilloché sunrays and is overlaid with dull green gold chased swags and a garland of berried laurel with burnished red gold bows of ribbon. 08 TWILIGHT EGG, designed for either the Tsarina or the Dowager Empress, dated 1917. A gold Easter Egg encrusted with a mosaic of lapis-lazuliand conceived as a night-sky studded



with inalaid paillons cut as stars. In the front, a pair of pierced gold gates fashioned to resemble wrought iron, are supported on either side by carved lapis pilasters, the capitals of which are inlaid with gold. When opened, these gates, which are surmounted by a double-headed eagle and the Imperial Crown in gold, reveal a gold panel engraved with a garden view of Peterhof. The back of the Egg is set with a lapis Romanov eagle carved in relief beneath which the year 1917 is inlaid in engraved gold. Rose diamond and faceted moonstone clusters have been applied to the egg to act as push-piece and finial respectively. The interior is fitted with three gold loops clearly intended to secure a surprise which is now missing.

There is no evidence that the 1917 Eggs were ever completed, and the uncharacteristic jewels in their heavy claw settings, the engraved panel and the marks may well have been later additions to the original lapis lazuli body with its stars and date. Moonstones, normally cut *en cabochon*, with their special significance in this particular context, may well have been in Fabergé's mind, but they would then, one may assume, have been set flush with the body of the Egg as was the custom of the House. This fascinating object, with a Chinese provenance, made its appearance at an auction in Geneva in November 1976.

Mr Bainbridge has left an illuminating note on page 74 of his book based on the testimony of Fabergé's eldest son Eugenè:

Fabergé continued with the making of the two eggs for Easter 1917, but by the time Easter arrived the Tsar, with the Tsarina and their five children, were prisoners in the Alexander Palace, in Tsarkoe Selo, and it is to the everlasting shame of the Pro-

visional Government that delivery of them was not allowed. Where they are today and what they were made of I have not been able to find out, but Eugenè Fabergé tells me that so far as his memory goes, one of them was in Karelian birch.

A water-colour design for an Easter Egg in the form of a rotary clock incorporating a globe scattered with stars, signed *C. Fabergé* and dated 1917, is illustrated in AKS plate 386, indi-

cating that this particular theme was exercising his imagination at the time. That this Egg should symbolise the twilight of the Romanovs may seem to us today a little far fetched, but it would have been seen as singularly appropriate by the Imperial couple, especially the Tsarina, who regarded herself and her spouse as little short of holy objects. Perhaps the starry night sky painted above the Throne Room in the Bavarian alpine retreat of Neuschwanstein in the early 1880s, under which the eccentric

Ludwig II relived the drama of his ungracious idol's Götterdämmerung, may have provided the true inspiration for this undeniably romantic egg.

Despite the initials HW stamped on this Egg, it seems far more likely that it is in fact the product of Hölmstrom's jewellery workshop, as is certainly the case with Fabergé's other more lavish Mosaic Egg of 1916 (F5) which, curiously enough, also bears an unconvincing signature.

Within the Egg a mechanical gold enamelled peacock, one of Fabergé's most ingenious creations, is perched in the branches of an engraved gold tree with flowers in enamel and precious stones. The Egg

falls into two halves, each with a heavily chased silver-gilt rococo mount, when opened at the top by means of a clasp. The peacock, when lifted from the branches, wound up and placed on a flat surface, struts proudly about, placing one leg carefully before the other, moving its head and, at intervals, spreading and closing its vari-coloured enamel tail. Eugène Fabergé has written in a letter dated March 19th 1952:

Of the many clever craftsmen I would single out Dorofeev, a self-taught mechanic. It was he who made the mechanical peacock for a rock crystal egg. It took him three years to make it.

Despite his miserly reputation, it is traditionally held that he nonetheless gave alms to the poor.



A bust of Queen Alexandra in marble by H. Garland and kindly lent by the National Portrait Gallery, stands in a niche at the entrance to the Exhibition.




Group of Faberge cases in helly wood and the velvet covered case for the Lilies of the Valley Egg (02).

Fabergé and his workmasters in gold, silver, complex enamel and intricate hardstone carving is rivalled only by the French eighteenth century goldsmiths. The spectator's intellect is continuously stimulated by the restless imagination of this man who drew on sources eclectic to engage the enthusiasm of his indulged patrons.

The exhibition includes some of the legendary Easter Eggs presented to the Tsar and Tsarina each of which contained a fabulous 'surprise'. Also jewellery, gemset comical frogs, miniature pianos, an automaton bird which emerges from an orange tree, miniature sedan chairs, carved hardstone Russian characters, clocks, boxes and cigarette cases.

Perhaps most startling about Fabergé was his mastery of many styles. Whilst his ideas were often derived from the Renaissance, Louis xvi, Old Russian traditional silver, and contemporary art nouveau, he was not insensitive to the changing climate in Russia. The chic but severer lines of his later pieces interpreted the post-war severity of the Bauhaus and Art Deco. This catalogue raisonné of the exhibition, published at the time of the Queen's Silver Jubilee, must be seen as the most important work on Fabergé to date.

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
