A JEWEL AND OBJECT OF ART

'Mont Saint Michel and Its Bay' and 'The Star of Kimberley'

Rising forth from the waters on the northern coast of France is the magical island of Mont Saint Michel. The magnificent abbey that crowns the geological sugarloaf mount is a majestic medieval structure. The quiet, restrained strength of the Romanesque evolving into the graceful curves and ribbed vaulting of the Gothic represents the finest example of French architecture during the middle ages. Built between the eleventh and sixteenthcenturies, the abbey was originally a simple sanctuary honouring the Archangel Michael who appeared to Bishop Aubert of Avranches in the early eight-century, commanding the abbott to build a church atop the rocky islet. Over the centuries, this modest and unadorned church grew into a colossal scheme of elaborate stonework that was gradually piled round the conical mass of rock. forged into its natural granite. This matrimony between the heavenly and earthly set a great fortified monastery amidst jagged, craggy slopes, evoking one of the most romantic sights of the world. Besieged by powerful tides,





the waters surrounding the island rises and recedes 'as swiftly as a galloping horse' (Victor Hugo), so that the island appears like a floating castle in a fairytale, ethereal and dream-like. And on its summit, standing high above the world, with wings upspread and sword uplifted, is the golden statue of Saint Michael watching over this sacred realm.

Known as the 'Wonder of the West' for its artistic and cultural importance, 'Mont Saint Michel and Its Bay' was declared a World Heritage Site by UNESCO in 1979. Like many, Mitsuo Kaji (a Japanese art-jeweller), was also drawn to this solitary island for its breathtaking, illusory beauty, and thereafter sought to create a miniature of this distinctive historical site. Lot 1633 is a sculpture of the monument and island, cast in over 2 kg of platinum and 450 pieces of diamonds. The production of this object entailed a period of two years and is unquestionably a labour of love. From the textured rugged terrain to the delineation of the masonry and diamond-studded windows, church tower and ramparts, the model of 'Mont Saint Michel and Its Bay' is lavish and beautifully articulated. However, the more delightful and charming features of the object are the eleverly-concealed compartments (storage for jewels) echoing the numerous secret chambers, corridors and passageways of a monastery. While the right compartment consists of a trapdoor that can be lifted up, the back compartment slides out like a drawer. The left compartment opens to reveal the abbey's medieval refectory and an interior filled with diminutive furniture, chandelier and ruby lamps. The overwhelming wealth of fine architectural detail is remarkable with the arched doorways, vaulted halls, rounded pillars and columns, as well as a spiralled staircase. The statue of Saint Michael is erected above the abbey tower (which can be lighted), his right wing suspending a 1.00-carat diamond that serves as a striking contrast to the larger diamond stationed just below.

Sitting upon a three-claw support secured to the abbey spire is 'The Star of Kimberley', offered as Lot 1632 - an immense and exquisitely chiseled diamond weighing 40.86 carats, whose 82.55-carat crystal rough was found in 1999. The present specimen is a fine example of the type of large yellow gems uncovered at the diamond mines near the town of Kimberley in South Africa. Its discovery led to the immediate purchase by William Goldberg, the world-renowned New York-based diamond purveyor famed for cutting the 137-carat 'Premier Rose' and the 89-carat 'Guinea Star'. With their expert cutters, 'The Star of Kimberley' emerged as a gleaming light yellow diamond. The gem is classified as Type Ia - its yellow colour due to the presence of nitrogen atoms in its carbon structure, resulting in the pleasing yellow hue of this jewel. Fashioned into a cushion-shaped brilliant style, an 'old mine-cut' that dates back to the seventeenth-century, the diamond displays a four-fold symmetry - square-shaped with rounded corners, high crown and larger culet. The change in popular tastes favouring the modern round brilliant with its circular outline, thinner crown, negligible sized culet and eight-fold symmetry began at the turn of the twentieth century. Yet today, there are many who seek the older cushion brilliant for that rare charm and romanticism of the old world.


Mitsuo Kaji is a Tokyo-based jewellery designer whose creativity stems from his love of blending the antique with the modern. 'Mont Saint Michel and Its Bay' and 'The Star of Kimberley' forms part of *The World Heritage Collection*, a series of bejewelled objects that depict World Heritage Sites. Produced in conjunction with the twentieth anniversary celebration of Kaji's jewellery firm, the collection is symbolic, expressing the precious value of cultural heritage, their historical importance and legacy to the world.

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Biographies

AUDEMARS PIGUET

Audemars Piguet was founded in 1875 by Jules Audemars (1851-1918) and Paul-Edouard Piguet (1853-1919) in Le Brassus, Switzerland. They opened a branch in Geneva in 1889. Their first achievement was the creation of the 'Grande Complication', a pocket watch comprising three complicated mechanisms. They went on to develop the thinnest manual winding and repeating watches ever made, the first skeleton watch and the ultra-thin automatic Perpetual calendar watch. Since 1992, Mrs. Jasmine Audemars, a descendant of the Audemars family, has been Chair of the Board of Directors. The president of the company is Mr. Georges-Henri Meylan.

BULGARI

The firm of Bulgari was founded by Sotirio Bulgari, who was born in 1857 in Greece and was descended from a family of silversmiths. In 1884 he opened his first shop in Rome on the Via Sistina, and then in 1905, he moved to the Via dei Condotti. Upon Sotirio's death in 1932, his sons, Giorgio and Costantino, took over the business. They are credited with creating the highly distinctive 'Bylgari' style, inspired by Greek and Roman classicism, the Italian Remaissance, and the 19th century Roman school of goldsmiths. The 1970s marked the beginning of Bulgari's international expansion with the opening of stores in New York (the first overseas), Paris, Geneva, and Monte Carlo, building towards more than 155 international stores open today. It was also in this decade that Bulgari introduced the 'Bylgari-Bulgari' which was to become a successful watch classic. Bulgari Time was established in the early 1980s in Neuchâtel, Switzerland for the creation and production of all Bulgari watch lines.

CARTIER

Cartier was founded in Paris in 1847 by Louis-François Cartier. It was his three grandsons, Louis, Pierre and Jacques, who were responsible for establishing the famous world-wide empire. Louis retained responsibility for the Paris branch, moving it to the rue de la Paix in 1899. Jacques took charge of the London operation in 1906, which had opened in 1902, eventually moving it to the current location on New Bond Street. Pierre established the New York branch in 1909, relocating it in 1917 to the current location at 653 Fifth Avenue. Branches were opened in Moscow and the Persian Gulf in were opened in Moscow and the Persan Gulf in 1910, followed by openings in Cannes and Monte Carlo. Prominent amongst Cartier's gifted team, were Charles Jacqueau who joined Louis Cartier in 1909 for a lifetime and Jeanne Toussaint who was appointed Director of Fine Jewellery from 1933. In 1964, following the death of Pierre, Cartier Paris, London and New York were sold by the family. In 1972, a group of investors led by Joseph Kanoui bought Cartier Paris whose President became Robert Hocq, originator of the concept Les Must de Cartier' in collaboration with Alain Dominique Perriin. In 1974, Cartier London was bought back and Cartier New York in 1976. In 1983, the 'Art of Cartier Collection' was initiated by Eric Nussbaum Today, Cartier is part of the Richemont group.

CARVIN FRENCH

André Chervin descends from a family of French jewellers. He learned his profession by studying jewellery in Paris and working as a model maker. After emigrating to New York in 1951, he and a friend, Serge Carponcy, started their own atelier

located at 16 East Fifty-Second Street in 1954. Using only the finest materials they have created pieces for such jewellers as Raymond C.Yard, R. Esmerian Inc.,Verdura, as well as for Donald Claflin and Angela Cummings during their tenures at design for Tiffany & Co. Soon Carvin French became referred to as a Jeweller's jeweller'. After Serge Carponcy retired in 1983, André Chervin maintained control of the firm, moving it to the current address at 515 Madison Avenue in 1987. His nephew Sylvain Chervin, who trained in Paris and in New York as a lapidary and a jeweller, joined the firm in 1984.

WALLACE CHAN

Having completed his training as a sculptor, Wallace Chan enrolled in formal art courses. In the 1980s, his next creative stage was gem carving and faceting the knowledge base from which he developed the Wallace Cut': a technique of reverse carving on gemstones reminiscent of ancient cameo and intaglio work. In this decade Wallace acquired fame integrity work. In this decade watare acquired rame for his work first in Japan, Singapore, Taiwan, Germany and then the rest of Europe. Since 2001 Wallace has dedicated himself to the creation of jewels as art. He is known to destroy completed pieces if they are not perfect in his eyes. Wallace has achieved international acclaim as a designer and exhibits at jewellery fairs and museums around the world.

CHAUMEI

Chaumet was founded in 1780 by Marie-Etienne

Nitot who, with his son, François Regnault Nitot,
became the official jeweller to Napoleon during the

Consulate and the Empire. Among their
achievements were the Consular Sword, the papal
tiars of Pius VII and the grand parures ordered by
the Empressey Josephine and Marie-Louise. After the
fall of Napoleon, the business continued under the
direction of Jean-Baptiste Fossin and his son, Jules,
both artiss, who succeeded in capturing the spirit of both artists, who succeeded in capturing the spirit of both artists, who succeeded in capturing the spirit of Romanticism in jewellery just as Nitot & Fils had done for the Empire. In 1848, Jules Fossin set up a London branch in partnership with JV. Morel who was assisted by his son, Prosper. On his return to Paris in 1854, Prosper Morel joined Jules Fossin whom he succeeded in 1868. Prosper Morel's daughter married Joseph Chaumet in 1875. Chaumet had begun his jewellery career at the age of fifteen, working in his parents' jewellery shop in Bordeaux. Upon moving to Paris, he was hired by his future father-in-law. By 1885, he assumed management of the firm. In 1889, Chaumet took over the company, simultaneously changing the name. Under his direction, the firm won prizes at al of the international exhibitions and supplied jewellery to many of the royal houses of Europe. In 1907, he moved the company to 12, Place Vendême. He also opened boutiques in London, in 1905, and in New York in the 1920s. The latter closed in 1934 due to the Depression. In 1999, the firm was acquired by the luxury group LVMH.

CHOPARD

Chopard was founded in 1860 by Louis-Ulysse Chopard in Sonvilier, Switzerland, as creators of high precision pocket watches. Under the direction of Louis-Ulysse's son, André, the firm transferred its head office to Geneva in 1920. Not having any heirs, André's son, André-Paul, sold the company in 1963 to Karl Scheußele III. The German Scheußele family had already established a four-generation reputation

in the jewellery and watch business, since 1904, under the brand name Eszeha. The first Chopard boutiques were opened in Hong Kong, Geneva and Vienna in the 1980s. By 2008 boutiques were open across the United States, in New York, Beverly Hills, Costa Mesa California, Palm Beach, Puerto Rico, Boston and San Francisco. Chopard continues to manufacture all their own watches and jewellery in their workshops Geneva. In 1998, the firm partnered with the International Cannes Film Festival, and is regularly associated with Hollywood stars and celebrities. The Chopard collection consists of classic ladies' and gentlemen's watches as well as a wide range of jewellery products with many famous lines such as 'Casmir', 'Happy Diamonds' and 'Happy Sport'.

DELANEAU

The Swiss watchmaker Delaneau was founded in 1880 by Mr. Delano. The firm has developed an international reputation under Managing Director, Louis Ferran, who relocated Delaneau to Geneva at the end of 1997, when it was acquired by a private syndicate of Genevan investors from the previous owners, Rolf and Yolande Tschudin, who had run the firm for thirty years. The wristwatches are distributed worldwide.

The London firm Garrard was founded by George Wickes in 1735, a talented silversmith who supplied many aristocratic patrons. He also sold jewellery, buttons, buckles and seals. The firm's name derives from one of Wickes' successors, Robert Garrard, from one of Wickes' successors, Robert Garrard, who took the company over in partnership with John Wakelin in 1792. In 1843, Queen Victoria bestowed upon the firm the title of Crown Jewellers, a title they held through six successive monarchs until 2007. Among other important commissions, they created the Imperial State Crown in 1937 for the Coronation of King George VI, and then in 1933 set it with the Koh-i-Noor for the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II. In August 1990, Garrard was acquired by the Asprey Group, whose numerous companies were purchased in 1995 by Prince Jeffrey Bolkish of Brune In 1908, he Prince Jeffrey Bolkish of Brunei. In 1998, he merged Garrard with the other famous name of Asprey, forming Asprey & Garrard, located at Asprey's premises on New Bond Street. In 2000, this company was sold to a private partnership who subsequently demerged the two names in 2002. Garrard has returned to the premises of 52 Albermarle Street, London, the site it occupied prior to 1952, with international showrooms including Dubai, Moscow and New York.

WILLIAM GOLDBERG

William Goldberg began his career as a diamond merchant in New York. In 1973, he opened his own jewellery company as a De Beers sightholder. In 1988, he registered the motto 'The Magic is in the Make', which referred to Goldberg's preference to cutting down gems in order to achieve the perfect cut, where most would fear a loss of weight. William Goldberg brand has been associated some of the most renowned gemstones, notably the 137.02 ct D Flawless 'Prennier Rose', the 'Guinea Star', an 89.01-carat D Flawless Shield and the rare 5.11-cart 'Red Shield'. William Goldberg also cut the 102.23 ct Beluga', the largest flawless oval diamond in history and a 75.31 ct D Internally Flawless Briolette. The company is famous for the patented Ashoka Cut, named after the enlightened 3st

century B.C. Indian ruler, King Ashoka, William Goldberg Co. also creates jewellery collections. William Goldberg passed away in 2003. His wife Lili, son Saul, daughter Eve and son-in-law Barry Berg now head the company. In 2006, the City of New York honored his memory by officially naming 48th Street at Fifth Avenue, William Goldberg Way.

GRAFE

Graff was founded in Hatton Garden, London, in 1960 by Laurence Graff, and has grown to become one of the world's leading jewellery manufacturers and dealers of the rarest and finest gems. Over the years Laurence Graff has handled more important gem quality diamonds than any other dealer and many of the world's most famous and treasured gemstones including The Begum Blue, The Emperor Maximilian, The Hope of Africa and The Idol's Eye. In 1973 Graff became the first jeweller to be presented with the Queen's Award to Industry and Export, with two further Awards in 1977 and 1994. As a true diamond company, working from the rough through to the finished product, Graff not only has one of the largest facilities in the world for polishing and cutting diamonds in Johannesburg, but also buys sources rough diamonds from mines all around the world, including Australia, Canada, Russia, South Africa and South America. This has given Graff a leading edge in the industry, and a more exclusive selection of the finest stones to offer his clients worldwide. He is considered a world leader in the field and one of the most significant forces in the market. Graff's UK flagship store on London's prestigious New Bond Street and the Sloame Street boutique have counterparts all around the world, at locations including Dubai, Geneva, Kuwait, Hong Kong, Monte Carlo, Moscow and New York.

MITSUO KAJI

Born in 1944 into a watch and jewellery-making family, Mitsuo Kaji was a successful pop singer and film star for seven years before following in his family's footsteps to found his own jewellery design business in 1983. Inspired by the Art Nouveau decoration of the nineteenth century. Kaji enjoys blending the antique with the modern as his principal design theme. His signature pieces include the 'Unity of Antique and Modern' line, featuring enamels of historical and religious figures; 'The Best Collection', composed of the finest gemsones; and The World Heritage' series, produced with the help of UNESCO, who received a part of the proceeds. Kaji organises approximately 80 exhibitions annually throughout Japan.

Ј. КОО

Founded in 2000, KCS Group Ltd launched its jewellery brand J. Koo under the helm of Hong Kong-based Jason Koo, whose career in both designing and manufacturing jewellery began in 1988. The jewellery of J. Koo is recognised for its delicate appearance due to creative imagination and craftsmanship. His jewellery is characterised by the use of unusual materials such as titanium, signalling a modern and fashionable trend in the art of jewellery making.

MAUBOUSSIN

In 1827, Mr. Rocher and his cousin, Baptiste Noury, established a jewellery shop in Paris which, by 1850, had been taken over by Noury. His nephew, George: Mauboussin, joined the firm, assuming control in 1896. In 1922, the business was named 'Mauboussin, Successeur de Noury', and later, simply 'Mauboussin'. The house of Mauboussin contributed to all major international exhibitions in the first half of the 20th century including Milan in 1923 and 1924; New York in 1924 and 1939; Strasbourg in 1924; and Paris in 1925, 1931 and 1937. They were awarded the Grand Prix at the 1925 Exposition des Arts Décoratifs in Paris and, for his contributions to the world of jewellery, Georges Mauboussin was awarded the Légion d'Honneur'. The firm opened branches in London and Buenos Aires which have subsequently closed. In October 1929, they opened an office in New York, but following the stock market crash less than one month later, a merger was negotiated with the American jeweller, Irabert & Hoeffer took over the location and stock, and all jewellery retailed under this contract was signed 'Trabert & Hoeffer Inc. — Mauboussin'. This agreement lasted until the 1950s. In 2002, Dominique Frémont, a Swiss businessmann, acquired a majority of the firm with Patrick Mauboussin remaining involved in the creation of the jewellery.

FRANCK MULLER

Of Italian and Swiss origin, Franck Muller, born in 1958, studied at the Ecole d'Horlogerie in Geneva. Contracted by collectors, private museums and auction houses to restore old watches, he was able to further his technical expertise and establish himself as a fine watchmaker. In 1984, he designed his own first tourbillon wristwatch, and in 1991, the House of Franck Muller opened. His first boutique opened in Tokyo in 1992 and later several other boutiques worldwide, including Osaka and Hong Kong and the Tour de L'Ile and Noga Hilton, both in Geneva. The combination of intricate, complicated movements, along with a unique and recognisable style has earned his brand the slogan 'Master of Complications' and ranked him as one of the most fashionable watchmakers of today.

PIAGET

Georges Piaget established his workshop in 1874 at La Côte-aux-Fées, Switzerland. He specialised in lever escapements before his rapidly growing company became a manufacturer. Supplier of watch movements to many world-famous brands, the family introduced watches under its own name in the late 1940s, launching the brand world-wide in 1957, and opening the first showroom at 40 rue du Rhône, Geneva, in 1959. Piaget rapidly became the specialist of the world's thinnest watches, creating them exclusively in gold and platinum, many enriched by precious stones. Pioneer of the stone dial in 1965, Piaget is regarded as a synonym for innovation in the luxury watch business. Since 1988, when Piaget joined the Vendöme Luxury Group, the company has upheld and consolidated its position as one of the main players in the field of top class horology, as well as jewellery.

SUWA

Established in Tokyo in 1908, Suwa & Son Inc. has had a reputation for high quality gems and jewellery since 1945. They won the De Beers International Design Award in 1977. The company philosophy is to convey a gemstone's maximum beauty and unique character. Yasukazu Suwa, the third

generation owner of Suwa & Son Inc., has developed a comprehensive system for judging gemstone quality based on a scale of beauty and tone, and his books Censtones: Quality and Value, Volumes 1-3, have become favourites of jewellery professionals and enthusiasts.

TIFFANY & CO.

On September 21, 1837, Charles Lewis Tiffany and John P.Young opened a stationery and fincy goods store known as Tiffany & Young a t259 Broadway in New York City. Within ten years, jewellery and silver items were added to their stock. By 1853, Tiffany had assumed complete ownership of the business and the name was changed to Tiffany & Co. During the 19th century designers such as Edward C. Moore and G. Paulding Farnham, as well as renowned genmologist George Frederick Kunz, propelled Tiffany & Co. to the forefront of the international jewellery world. From 1907, the firm manufactured and sold the jewellery designs of Louis Comfort Tiffany, son of the founder. Upon taking over the management of Tiffany & Co. in 1955, Walter Hoving invited several talented designers to join the firm. Among them were Jean Schlumberger and Donald Claffin. In 1974, they added Elsa Peretti as an exclusive designer, followed by Paloma Picasso in 1980. In 1979, Avon Products purchased Tiffany & Co. After the management-led buyout of Tiffany in 1984, headed by then chairman William R. Chaney, and a successful public offering of stock in 1987, the company has successfully expanded into key domestic and international markets. Today they comprise more than 100 locations worldwide.

VAN CLEEF & ARPELS

The history of the famous Parisian jewellery house began in 1896 with the marriage of Estelle Arpeb to Alfred Van Cleef. The company was founded in 1906 by Alfred and his brother-in law, Charles Arpels at 22, Place Vendôme, Julien Arpels joined the family business in 1908, and Louis Arpels in 1913. The design collaboration between René Sim Leaze and René Puissant, the daughter of Estelle Arpels and Alfred Van Cleef, began in 1926, marking the start of two decades of highly creative design for the firm. The oldest son of Julien Arpels, Claude, joined in 1932, followed by his brothers Jacques and Pierre in 1936 and 1944. An American boutique was opened by Claude in Rockefeller Center in New York in 1939, soon relocating to its definitive address at 744 Fifth Avenue, and the first of six boutiques in the US today. The 1930s saw some of the company's most iconic designs: the house's arguable trademark, the Mystery Setting - where the mounting of the gemstones is cleverly hidden behind the continuous calibré-cut ruby and supphire surface of the jewel - was invented in 1933; and the concept of the Minaudière, made in honour of Florence Jay Gould, was invented in 1930 by Charles Arpels. The versatile Passe Partout' range was also developed at this time. In the following decades, the firm upheld is reputation for innovation with the snowflake jewels of the 1940s, the zip necklace of the intene of the 1970s. The Boutique Des Heures' was inaugurated in 1972 to house the new watch designs launched by Pierre Arpels. Today, Van Cleef & Arpels is part of the Richemott Group with more than 45 boutiques around the world.
