

## INTRODUCTORY REMARKS.

THOUGH this Collection of MODERN and ANTIQUE GEMS, which may justly be entitled a Fancy Scrap-Book, as it contains precious morsels and curious symbols in miniature, was originally designed for the use of Seal-Engravers; yet, when completed, it was judged to be a work of general utility; and little doubt remained that when it had attained sufficient publicity, it would be found on every library table. and an extensive sale remunerate the considerable pains and expense which have attended the Compiler's researches and the Publisher's endeavours to execute the undertaking in the most elegant manner. To the Admirers of the Fine ARTS this work will be a great acquisition, as it contains many subjects for the application and exercise of the mind. The Antiquary must also derive great satisfaction from an examination of this work, as it contains Antiques from the Elgin Marbles, some fine Grecian Heads, and a few plates of Hieroglyphics. The Sportsman will also be entertained with sporting subjects; and, as Scrap-Books are now the rage, the MAN OF PLEASURE will find a fund of amusement in this little volume, on account of the multiplicity of designs chiefly relative to Love. As the subjects are accompanied with appropriate Mottos and Quotations, the MAN OF LETTERS will have, in a small compass, a great deal of food for the mind. Indeed our little volume deserves itself the motto of Multum in Parvo:

> So full our Scrap-Book, as premised, That Much in Little is comprised.

By the Mythology, or History of Fabulous Deities, which this work tends to illustrate, the SCHOLAR and his PUPIL

will be enabled to explain the mysteries of the Pagan Religion, and the Hieroglyphical plates will greatly assist their study.

Hieroglyphs, which, in the Greek language, signify sacred engravings or carvings, because originally carved on walls or obelisks, are emblems or picturesque representations. This being the first method of writing, it was generally understood by every one; but when characters were introduced instead of pictures, the meaning of hieroglyphics became at length unintelligible and gave rise to idolatry. The Egyptian priests made use of them to keep the mysteries of their religion from the knowledge of the vulgar, and thence they were called Sacred Characters. We are told by Sir Isaac Newton that the writings of the Thebans and Ethiopians were in hieroglyphics, and that this mode of writing was prevalent in Lower Egypt before the days of Moses; for thence came the worship of their Gods in the various shapes of birds, beasts and fishes. Instead of certifying names, hieroglyphical figures were employed to signify their conquering kings and princes, in the days of Samuel, David, Solomon and Rheoboam. Thus Ammon was painted with Ram's horns to signify a king who conquered Lybia, a country abounding with sheep. His father, Amosis, was represented with a scythe, as emblematical of having conquered Lower Egypt, a country abounding with corn. His son, Orsiris, showed by an ox, that he taught the conquered nations to plough with oxen. Bacchus had Bull's horns for the same reason, accompanied with grapes, as he taught the nations to plant vines, and bestriding a tiger, because he subdued India. Orus, the son of Psirus, had a harp to denote a prince who was eminently skilled on that instrument. Jupiter was seated on an eagle, with a thunderbolt in his hand to be peak the sublimity of his dominion and his power as a warrior. Venus appeared in a chariot drawn by doves,

to represent her amorous inclinations. Neptune displayed a trident, as an emblem of being a Commander of a Fleet composed of three squadrons. Pan had a pipe and the legs of a Goat, to signify a man delighted with piping and dancing. Hercules was seen with a pillar and club, because Sesostris set up pillars in all his conquests, and fought the Lybians with clubs. There were various other symbols: and upon the division of Egypt into nomes, the great men of the kingdom, to whom the names were dedicated, were represented in their sepulchres in the Temples of the nomes by various hieroglyphics, viz. an ox, a cat, a dog, a goat, a lion, an ichneumon, a crocodile, an hippotamus, a crow, a hawk, &c.: and were worshipped by the people in the shape of those animals.

There were hieroglyphical letters as well as characters, as may be seen from one of our plates. A human eye was used for the verb to see. Be watchful was written by the figures of a bee, and a watch. Use me well was written by two yew trees (yews) and the figure of a well: but of this, many readers, particularly ladies, must be already aware; as, about forty years ago, Hieroglyphical letters of this description were given in Magazines and other periodical publications (particularly the Humourist's Magazine), for the entertainment of the juvenile class of both sexes, who

were thus accustomed to exercise their genius.

Hence must be apparent the utility of the present little volume; which will not only gratify the admirers of the Fine Arts, the Antiquary, the Sportsman, the Man of Pleasure, the Man of Letters, the Scholar and the Pupil, but it will be of essential service to painters, carvers, cabinet-makers (as well as seal-engravers), &c. and to all those, who, in their labours, are occasionally obliged to display any taste or fancy-work.
