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


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Even the most cursory glance at the history of style down the ages reveals how often one particular fashion seems to develop as a direct reaction against the one immediately preceding it. So indeed it was with Art Nouveau. During the Victorian period, the style of everything from furniture to dress had become progressively heavier, darker, more constrained, and often laden with fussy, ponderous decoration in the same way that the Victorians cluttered their parlours with ornaments and geegaws. Basic forms too were a mere cold academic repetition of famous styles of the past.

Into this stuffy atmosphere, in the last decade of the 19th century, the principles of Art Nouveau burst like a breath of fresh air. The artists and practitioners of Art Nouveau claimed to base their art not on the past, but on present reality or a vision of a future to come. Youth and vitality were the keynote, and, where they did borrow from past styles, it was from so far back, notably the medieval period, that the results still seemed fresh and modern.

Art Nouveau, however, was not a naturalistic style. While it borrowed heavily from nature for forms and decoration (for example basic plant forms were a favourite motif), these were not naturalistically presented but stylised in flowing lines, extended and convoluted and integrated with the design of the object as a whole. The aim was not to portray the outward form of nature but to capture the essential vitality of the endless process of natural creativity.

Art Nouveau style permeated almost all branches of arts and crafts. In the case of furniture design, its influence was typified by long, undulating curves following sculptural patterns. Wood was often treated almost as a malleable material, and again there was much use of plant-inspired decoration. In glassware, the movement coincided with the emergence of such great names as Daum, Tiffany and Gallé, all of whom designed, and, more importantly perhaps, decorated, in Art Nouveau style. There was much use of iridescent surface effects, and cameo glass.

All the great ceramics producers were also affected by Art Nouveau principles, again chiefly in terms of decoration, though Art Nouveau-inspired elongated and contorted shapes were also popular. Silver showed a rather more restrained expression of the style, mainly through the influence of the Arts & Crafts movement. The Liberty designer Archibald Knox was a key figure in this field.

In Germany, however, WMF produced some of the most outrageous curvilinear metalwork which came to be known as the spaghetti or whiplash style, while Charles Rennie Mackintosh was rather less complimentary in describing it as "resembling melted margarine".

Jewellery too was a prime medium for expressing Art Nouveau principles, and artists such as Mucha and Lalique used a wide range of semi-precious stones and enamels to make pieces in the form of flowers, leaves, insects and female heads.

Finally, Art Nouveau was not a mass movement, though it flourished right across Europe, for while many Art Nouveau artists had a high degree of social awareness, they believed their duty was not to reflect what was an often wretched reality, but to create an image of a world of universal happiness and beauty. It was indeed their ideal to create that beauty for as wide a public as possible, but their concern with complexity of design and their use of varied materials inevitably meant that it appealed to a somewhat restricted and essentially upper middle class public.

The Art Nouveau movement reached its apogee around 1900, when the Universal Exhibition was held in Paris. It was to a degree doomed by its rejection of the machine, and when attempts were made to adapt its forms for industry the results were catastrophic. Its more austere and abstract variations were, however, adopted by the succeeding movement, which might be said to owe much to the rapturous reception given in Paris in

1909 to Diaghilev's Ballets Russes. The costumes and sets for these were reduced to a few stark lines and employed unusually brilliant colours, and enthusiasm for them carried on right up to the outbreak of war in 1914.

By 1918, in the wake of the holocaust, perceptions of life had changed drastically. Advances in communications and transport meant that life appeared to be lived now at a much higher speed, and a style attempting to reflect the dynamism of the new environment was emerging. This comprised simple, bold forms, in the cult of the 'machine' aesthetic, and lines often typifying speed. The opening of Tutenkhamun's tomb in the 1920s led to an increased interest in things Egyptian, and there was much use of Egyptian motifs such as scarab and palmetto forms. Many designs too reflected the geometric forms of Cubism.

The movement, like Art Nouveau before it, was a pan-European one. In the German speaking countries, the Bauhaus, Deutsche Werkbund and the Wiener Werkstatte were primary sources of inspiration, while in France Lalique, Puiforçat and Daum were amongst those influenced by Cubism.

With its simple angular lines and bright, uncompromising colours, the Art Deco style was fully in tune with the somewhat frantic and frivolous spirit of the time, when those who counted themselves lucky to be alive at all tended to live for the day. Unlike Art Nouveau it was a style with mass appeal, and designers furthermore took full advantage of the many new technological developments on offer. The first synthetic resin, Bakelite, had been introduced in 1909, and was followed by others such as perspex. All were remarkably cheap and cheerful, in comparison with many traditional materials, and also very adaptable, and leading craftsmen of the time were perfectly happy to incorporate them in their repertoire. For example, some really stunning 1920s plastic jewellery by leading designers can be found today.

The Depression of the 1930s struck the first blow at the Art Deco style, and its bright defiance was finally killed off by the austerity and shortages which the Second World War imposed. Nevertheless, there can be few households today where some Art Deco object, however humble, is not still lurking. They are worth seeking out, given the enormous upsurge of interest in the period today.

#### **ADVERTISING**

Street Jewellery is the thoroughly apt term now coined for the wonderful enamel advertising signs of the past. So sought after have they become that old railway stations and other places that they once adorned have to lock them up now for fear of theft. They breathe instant nostalgia and speak of an age of comparative innocence, a far cry from the high powered media advertising to which we are all subjected today.

The most valuable signs are enamel on metal from the Art Nouveau or Art Deco periods, though cardboard ones in good condition are also popular. Famous artists like McKnight Kauffer, Nerman and Harry Rountree designed signs for brand name firms like Oxo, Fry's, Nestle's, Rowntree's, petrol and oil companies. Car manufacturers' signs are very collectable - especially those for Lagonda, Bentley, Rolls Royce and Bugatti.

#### **ASHTRAYS**

The Art Deco period. following the First World War, coincided with the universal acceptance of smoking, and the ashtray became a versatile medium for embellishment. Many were designed as advertising giveaways and are cheap and cheerful, if interesting as a reflection of the times. Others were whimsical in tone, such as those produced by Goss and other Crested china manufacturers. Occasionally. however, craftsmen such as Tiffany and Lalique would turn out something special, and the prices which such examples fetch reflect their status as an objet d'art, rather



#### MABEL LUCIE ATTWELL

The English artist and author Mabel Lucie Attwell (1879-1964) was born in London and studied at Heatherley's and other art schools. She married the cartoonist Harold Earnshaw. She was noted for her child studies, both humorous and serious, with which she illustrated her own and other authors' children's stories. Her 'cherubic' style had immediate and lasting appeal, and was perpetuated in annuals and children's books by her daughter, who worked under her mother's name.



#### **BAKELITE**

It was in 1909 that an American research chemist, Leo Baekeland, mixed phenol with a derivative of methyl alcohol to produce an astonishing synthetic resin, which, it was found, could be moulded and used for a huge variety of purposes. Not only that, it was inexpensive to produce. Bakelite, the forerunner of modern plastic, had arrived.

Its original colour was amber, but later the most usual colours were cream or black. Bakelite's only real drawback was that it was brittle and could be easily cracked.







#### **BRASS & COPPER**

The rich warm tones of brass and copper have made these popular metals throughout the ages for a wide variety of household items. As media, too they appealed to the craftsmen of the Art Nouveau period, and in particular to the Arts & Crafts Movement, as they lent themselves so well to hand hammering and working. Many fine pieces date from this time, and those by Gustav Stickley are perhaps particularly sought after.







### **BRONZE FIGURES**

France had been one of the leading countries in bronze figure production throughout the nineteenth century, and was to adopt a major role also during the Art Nouveau/ Deco periods. The medium lent itself particularly well to the flowing lines and themes of Art Nouveau, while the Art Deco period saw the increasing use of bronze in combination with ivory, or chryselephantine as it came to be known. The figures conceived in this medium have a character which is all their own.

#### CHIPARUS

Of the many figurine artists who emerged during the years following the First World War one of the most important was Dimitri (Demetre is the Gallicised form) Chiparus. Chiparus was a Rumanian who came to Paris to study under A Mercié and J Boucher. He started exhibiting at the Salon des Artistes Français in 1914, when he received an Honourable Mention, and continued to do so until 1928.

His figures include realistic reproductions of nudes and women in everyday clothes, as well as columbines and pierrots, and dancers, some in amazing postures and obviously influenced by the Ballets Russes.

Much of his work was executed in chryselephantine. a medium encouraged at the time by the Belgian government who were anxious to create a European market for Congolese ivory.



#### COLINET

Claire Jeanne Roberte
Colinet was born in Brussels
and studied sculpture there
under Jef Lambeaux. After
moving to Paris she was
elected a member of the
Société des Artistes Français.
She exhibited at their Salon
from 1914, and at the Salon
des Indépendants between
1937 and 1944.

It is noteworthy that Colinet was the only woman among the figurine artists who emerged in the years after the First World War. She worked in the hieratic style which was quite close to that of the artists of the 1890s, featuring mysterious dancers dressed in flowing garments of costly fabrics, laden with jewels at wrist and ankle. Colinet's best works show athletic dancers, beautifully proportioned, arranged in strange balletic poses and obviously much influenced by the Ballets Russes.

### **FAGUAYS**

Pierre le Faguays was a native of Nantes in France. A member of the Société des Artistes Français, he exhibited at their salons, where he gained an Honourable Mention in 1926. He was also a member of the La Stèle and Evolution groups, where artist craftsmen exhibited bronzes, ceramics, lamps and other decorative objects.

Le Faguays worked in the 'stylised' mode, which combined elements from many contemporary

influences.



# **GERDAGO**

Gerdago (this may or may not even be a name) is one of those producers of Art Deco bronzes about whom absolutely nothing is known. His pieces, while set firmly within the mainstream tradition of the period, i.e. having as subjects exotic dancers in wildly balletic poses, are nevertheless highly distinctive. The figures are always dressed in extravagant, angular costumes, often with tall. pointed hats, and are cold painted in the most brilliant and magnificent colours.


Who is, or was, Nam Greb, the impudent sculptor of these erotic bronze figurines? You won't find the answer in any of the reference books, for the simple reason that no one by that name existed. Nam Greb is, in fact, Bergman spelt backwards!

Little enough, indeed, is known about the Franz
Bergman foundry, save that it flourished in Austria during the first two decades of this century. Bergman, spelt the right way round, is known for fairly conventional cold painted bronze groups, notably of Arabs on carpets or Arabs with camels.

It is always the erotic pieces that are signed Nam Greb. These were, in fact, designed by a man called Thuss, about whom absolutely nothing more is known. It has been suggested, perhaps a little tongue in cheek, that he signed them thus because he didn't want his mother to know what he was up to!



# GUERANDE, JAEGER

It seems amazing today that so little should be known about so many of the sculptors whose bronzes are quite commonly sold at auction. After all, we are not talking about the dark ages, but only about sixty or seventy years back into the past. Sketchy biographical details are available on a few of the most illustrious figures, such as Chiparus and Colinet, for example, but for others, such as Guerande and Jaeger, not even as much as their dates or nationalities are freely available. Even the auction houses who regularly feature their works have little information to give. Why should this be? One possible explanation is that many were just foundry workers, turning out pieces in a current fashion, or sometimes in imitation of more notable artists. Also, many worked in Germany or Austria, which the Second World War would shortly leave largely in ruins, and where many records must have been destroyed. It seems a shame that the history of these bronze designers should be lost for ever, and it is certainly a subject which would amply repay some intense investigation.

## **KAUBA**

Carl Kauba worked in Vienna in the interwar period, producing bronzes which stand a little apart from the mainstream subjects of dancers, sportsmen etc. Fairly conventional Art Nouveau type maidens do figure among his output, but he also tackled more offbeat themes such as amusing groups of children. Commonest of all, however, are his Red Indian figures, which show little Art Deco influence.

### LORENZL

K Lorenzl was a German Art Deco figurine modeller, who also designed ceramics for the Austrian firm of Goldscheider. He often copied well known Preiss figures, though his carving was not as skilled.

He did succeed however in capturing in bronze the 'new woman', slender and boyish, with bobbed hair, dressed either in floppy pyjamas or as an Amazon. Some of his figures are signed *K Lor* and *Ronr*.


Philippe was an Austrian by birth, who created stylish models and dancers characterised by their theatrical and extravagant gestures. His treatment of the clothes is particularly striking, and often is a pure product of the new Machine Age.

# PROF OTTO POERZL

As with many of the sculptors of the Art Deco period, very little is known about Professor Otto Poerzl. Where did his title come from, for example? Such sketchy details as are available tell us that he was born in Scheiben, and worked out of Coburg, both in Germany. He produced figures which in many cases are so similar to those produced by Preiss that speculation has abounded that they are one and the same person. However, their respective interpretations of some examples, Bat Dancers, for instance, do show significant differences in treatment. The confusion has not been helped by the fact that both appeared to use the same foundry, and a founder's mark with the initial PK are found on both Poerzl and Preiss figures.

#### **PREISS**

Art Deco found one of its most vivid expressions in the bronze and ivory, or chryselephantine, figures of F Preiss. Virtually nothing is known about Preiss, save that he was probably born in Vienna. Even his forename is in doubt, though an Ideal Home Exhibition Catalogue of the time refers to him as Frederick, which is probably simply an anglicisation of Friedrich. His work, which appeared in the 20s and 30s, was closely copied by one Professor Otto Poerzl of Coburg, so closely in fact that there has been speculation that they may be one and the same. His figures were distributed in Britain by the Phillips and MacConnal Gallery of Arts, which published an illustrated catalogue with model numbers. They chiefly featured classical and modern nudes, children, some nude and some clothed, and a few dancers. The ivory is always beautifully carved, and the subjects have sweet, pretty faces, and graceful arms and hands. The bronze is usually cold-painted in cool colours such as silver, blue and grev. and while the classical nudes can be somewhat stilted, the modern counterparts are lithe and vibrant.

Most lively of all are, however, the Olympic figures, a series including golfers, tennis players, skaters and javelin throwers. They glorify physical prowess and the body beautiful, enthusiasms which came to be hijacked by the Nazis in their preoccupation with the physical superiority of the Aryan master race. Preiss captured this so well that, rightly or wrongly, suspicion has always abounded that he was an adherent of the movement.

### **VILLANIS**

No biographical details are available for Emmanuele Villanis. His work, however, is set firmly in the Art Nouveau period and also has strong links with traditional 19th French century bronze casting. His subject matter is drawn very often from Classical mythology, and simply given an Art Nouveau treatment. Busts, another very traditional form, figure largely among his output.

### **BRUNO ZACH**

Bruno Zach was the post World War One artist in bronze who is generally associated with an overtly erotic style. His insolent, leather or scantily clad women, girls in slips or stockings holding a whip or naked beneath fur coats reflect the decadence of interwar Berlin with its sadomasochistic, often downright bizarre tendencies. Zach worked mostly in bronze, but he made the occasional figure in chryselephantine, and these are now particularly sought after.





#### CANE HANDLES

Canes, walking sticks and parasols have been an important fashion accessory for both men and women for several hundred years, and one which has only comparatively recently gone out of vogue. Certainly their popularity lasted well into the periods covered by this book, and leading designers such as Cartier and Tiffany were responsible for cane handles which could be either opulent, stylish or whimsical. Some came with extra embellishments or gadgets such as concealed snuff boxes or coin holders, or even, in the case of the toper's stick, a secret compartment for spirits!



# CAR MASCOTS

The best known car mascots must surely be Charles Sykes' Spirit of Ecstasy for Rolls Royce, and the wonderful glass offerings by Lalique, quintessentially Art Nouveau in spirit, with their fluid, streamlined forms.

Later, mascots became less concerned with glorifying the speed of the new transport medium, perhaps as it in turn became more commonplace, and reflected the mood of Art Deco by becoming often more whimsical, even impudent in theme.







### **CARLTON WARE**

Carlton ware was the name given to the Staffordshire earthenware produced from 1890 at the Carlton Works, Stoke on Trent, by the firm which traded until 1957 as Wiltshaw & Robinson. From January 1958 it was retitled Carlton Ware Ltd.

The factory produced ornamental ware such as vases, characterised by bright enamelling and gilded floral and fanleaf decoration, black very often being used as the base colour. Early products normally bear a circular printed mark with W & R Stoke on Trent enclosing a swallow and surmounted by a crown.

## **CLARICE CLIFF**

The legendary Clarice Cliff was born in 1899 in, perhaps inevitably, Staffordshire, where she started work at 13 in one of the local potteries, painting freehand onto pottery.

Her formal training comprised a year, when she was 16, at the Burslem School of Art, and a later year at the Royal College of Art, where she studied sculpture. At 17, she had gone to work at the firm of A.J. Wilkinson, and she remained with them, and their subsidiary the Newport Pottery, for the next two decades, ending up as Art Director and marrying the boss, Colley Shorter, when she was forty.

During the 1920's she painted Tibetan ware, large jars painted with floral designs in bright colours and gold, and she also transferred on to pottery designs by such distinguished artists as Paul Nash and Laura Knight.

In 1928, however, she painted 60 dozen pieces of her own design to test the market at a trade fair. These proved so popular that by 1929 the whole factory was switched to producing her Bizarre ware.

Cliff's style is characterised by combinations of bright colours, such as orange, blue, purple and green, or black, yellow, orange and red. Her pieces are often angular in shape and strongly Art Deco in style. Major ranges, besides Bizarre, include Crocus, Fantasque, Biarritz and Farmhouse.

At the beginning of the Second World War, the factory was commandeered by the Ministry of Supply, and Wilkinson produced only a few white pieces. After the war, the market had changed and production was not resumed.







## **DE MORGAN**

William Frend de Morgan (1839-1917) was an English ceramic designer, perhaps now particularly remembered for his tiles. His designs were much influenced by his friend William Morris and include, birds, fish, flowers and mythical beasts. He established his own pottery in Chelsea in 1872, producing his own tiles, and experimented with lustre decoration in an attempt to reproduce the red lustre of maiolica painted in Gubbio. He also designed dishes in cream earthenware decorated in red lustre, and the Sunset and Moonlight suites decorated in gold, silver and copper. With Morris at Merton Abbey he continued to make tiles and dishes, and also established a factory at Fulham with Halsev Ricardo producing tiles and murals. He retired in 1905 and the factory closed in 1907

#### DELLA ROBBIA

The Della Robbia pottery was established in 1894 at Birkenhead by H. Rathbone and the sculptor, Conrad Dressler. It produced vases, bottles, jars, plates and dishes with sgraffito decoration and sometimes elaborate modelled relief with a strong Italian maiolica influence. The factory closed in 1901, but reopened and continued until 1906. Their mark consists of Della Robbia with a ship device and the decorator's initials.

# DOULTON **FIGURES**

The first Doulton figures were made by George Tinworth, one of the original group of art potters who came to the company via the Lambeth School of Art. His output was small, however, and it was not until Charles Noke joined the firm in 1889 that figure making really became big business. Noke was inspired by the figures produced by Derby, Bow, Meissen and also, nearer home, by the Staffordshire figure making industry. Initially, the colours used tended to be rather dull, and the figures did not sell well, so their production was suspended until 1912, when a new range, including the famous 'Bedtime/Darling' by Charles Vyse, was introduced. (This was originally entitled Bedtime, but was rechristened after Queen Mary, seeing it while on a visit to the factory, exclaimed 'What a darling!') The new figures benefited from brighter colours, and a talented team of modellers now set to work. These included Leslie Harradine, Harry Tittensor and later Peggy Harper.

### EUROPEAN CHINA

Flamboyance perhaps best characterises European china of the early part of this century. ## **FOLEY**

The Foley pottery was established in Fenton, Staffordshire in the mid 19th century and was operated from 1903 by E Brain & Co. Its porcelain is noted for the simplicity of its design. That said, in the 1930's work was commissioned from leading contemporary artists such as Graham Sutherland and Laura Knight and is marked with the maker's name and the signature of the artist and decorator. The Foley marks include the brand name Peacock Pottery, with a peacock in a rectangle and Staffordshire knot.

#### **GOLDSCHEIDER**

It was in 1886 that Friedrich Goldscheider founded his factory in Vienna. After his death in 1897, production continued there under the direction of his widow and brother Alois, until, in 1920, the business was taken over by his two .sons Marcel and Walter. In 1927, however, Marcel broke away to form the Vereinigte Ateliers für Kunst und Keramik.

While such things as vases were produced, the factory is best known for the figures and wall masks which epitomised the Art Nouveau and perhaps even more, the Art Deco styles.


The Lenci pottery was active in Turin during the 1930's, and produced three distinctive types of wares. The first, consisting of wall plaques in the form of female heads in scarves, as if going to Mass and figures of the Madonna and Child, were aimed at the domestic market. In stark contrast was the second group, made up of female figures, either nude or clad in contemporary costumes.

The third, and less well-known type, consists of vases and dishes decorated with Cubist-style painted scenes.

#### MOORCROFT

When Macintyre's art pottery department closed in 1913, Moorcroft established his own pottery at Cobridge, employing his old colleagues. There, they made a wide range of items from pen travs to toastracks, from vases to brooches.

His flambé glazes were developed in the 1920s, and by the 1930s his range of motifs included fruit, birds, fish and boats. Matt glazes were introduced and his designs became increasingly simple. Moorcrofts signature always appears on his products, often painted in green until the 1920s and

## POOLE POTTERY

The firm of Carter & Co was established in Poole, Dorset in 1873 to manufacture earthenware and tiles. The latter it often supplied for subsequent decoration, by, among others, William De Morgan. In 1895 they took over the nearby Architectural Tile Co.

Their range of earthenware, notably ornamental pottery, was developed principally by Owen Carter, the son of the proprietor. His experiments with glazes led to the creation of the matt, cream glaze which came to be associated with Carter Stabler and Adams. This amalgamation took place in 1921, when Owen Carter went into partnership with Harold Stabler and John and Truda Adams.

It was out of this partnership that the Poole Pottery, as it was renamed in 1963, grew. Poole Pottery products from all periods are much in vogue as collectables today.

# CHARLOTTE RHEAD

Charlotte Rhead (1885-1947) came from a distinguished ceramics family. Her brother, for example, Frederick Rhead, made a name for himself in the States, designing for Samuel Weller and later for the Roseville Pottery. Charlotte worked as a decorator for three companies, Wood & Sons of Burslem, Burgess & Leigh, (Frederick also designed for a time for them) and, perhaps most notably, A G Richardson, where she was responsible for many designs in their Crown Ducal range.

Charlotte Rhead's work is highly characteristic. While the shapes she used were for the most part fairly conventional, consisting of standard vase, jug, bowl and plate forms, her decoration was very striking. Her main themes were floral or geometric, but painted big and bold in bright and interesting colour combinations.

A further feature which characterises much of her output was her predilection for tube lining. This technique consisted of thin outlines of slip trailed on the ceramic surface to control colour glazes, and had been in use from the late 19th century.

## **ROYAL DUX**

Royal Dux is the tradename of the Duxer Prozellanmanufaktur, which was established in 1860 in Dux, Bohemia, now Duchov, Czechoslovakia. It was noted at first for its portrait busts and extravagantly decorated vases, many of which were destined for the American market. From the 1920s onwards it produced Art Deco style figures, of single ladies, dancing couples etc. Marks include an E (for the proprietor Eichler) in an oval surrounded by Royal Dux Bohemia set on an embossed

#### RUSKIN

The Ruskin Pottery was founded at West Smethwick, Birmingham, in 1898 by William Howson Taylor (1876-1935) who had trained at the Birmingham School of Art. Throughout his career he was constantly experimenting with glazes and it is these which give his work its principal interest.

Initially, he made 'Soufflé' ware, where the predominant colours were blues, greens, purples, greys and celadons with a glaze in a single colour or mottled, clouded or shaded with a harmonising

tone.

Lustre wares were also made in a wide range of colours and shades, and a pearl lustre was introduced, sometimes with a blistered texture and often with a kingfisher blue glaze. Flambé glazes with scattered viridian spots derived from the use of copper salts were produced, and after 1929 matt and crystalline glazes were added to the range. Taylor's High Fired wares featured dramatic colour contrasts, for example purple and black streaking on sea green, or black and green on cream.

With regard to the wares produced, many vases were made, some of which could be heavily potted and covered with blue, green, orange or crystalline blue with a frosted effect. The shapes were often based on Chinese styles. Other products included useful tableware, buttons, hatpins and cufflinks, some silver mounted.

Unfortunately Taylor took the secrets of his glazes with him to his grave, determined that his work should not be imitated. Production stopped at the factory in 1933.

Marks include Taylor's name up to 1903, after which Ruskin becomes usual, and the pieces are often dated.

#### WEDGWOOD

Wedgwood moved with the times during the Art Nouveau/Deco periods to produce some pieces a world away from the traditional concept of typical Wedgwood. The fey quality of Daisy Makeig Jones's Fairyland lustre pieces are a case in point, as are some of the uncompromisingly stylised shapes and designs of the later Art Deco period.






#### **ZSOLNAY**

The Zsolnay earthenware pottery was established in 1862 at Pécs in Hungary by Vilmos Zsolnay, with the aim of shaping a characteristic national style.

Most of the output consisted of practical ware for everyday use, though some ornamental pieces were produced, often with Persian inspired motifs. Vases and bowls were made in Art Nouveau style with boldly coloured glazes and lustre decoration. These were the achievements of an experimental workshop under the direction of Vinsce Wartha which was operational around the turn of the century. Around that time too, vases with painted decoration designed by Josef Rippl-Rónai, also in Art Nouveau style, were produced.

The marks consist of versions of five churches with *Zsolnay*, and sometimes also with *Pécs*.



#### CHROMIUM PLATE

Chromium plate is a thin sheet of chromium which is electrolytically deposited on metal to increase its resistance to corrosion. It further imparts a brilliant silver sheen.

From its invention it was used for a wide variety of quality goods, such as car lamps and wristwatches. It also found favour with Modernist designers during the 1930s after its use for furniture was pioneered by such as Le Corbusier, Mies van der Rohe and Marcel Breuer in the 20s.



## CIGARETTE CASES

Cigarette smoking became popular in the late 19th century, and was at first essentially a male pastime. Thus early cigarette cases were quite weighty, and, many Continental examples also featured erotic scenes. It was not until after the First World War, when smoking had become socially acceptable for both sexes. that lighter, slimmer ladies' cases began to be made. Leading designers seized on this new accessory and Art Deco and Modernist examples from the 20s and 30s can be particularly attractive.



# CIGARETTE LIGHTERS

The first cigarette lighters were introduced around 1900. Up to 1920 they worked on the flint principle. Dunhill and Orlik were notable early makers, and Dunhill examples are perhaps the most collectable of all. In the 1920s table lighters became popular, many of which were highly decorative and showed clear Art Deco inspiration. Some were even surmounted by dancing figures reminiscent of Chiparus and Preiss.


#### **CLOCKS**





#### **FANS**

The day of the fan as an essential fashion accessory has, for the present at least, passed away. It lasted, however, into the first years of this century, long enough for some pretty Art Nouveau examples to be produced, and these now fetch hundreds of pounds.

Later examples tend to take the form of gimmicks, often for advertising purposes, rather than the real thing, and their relative inferiority is reflected in the prices which they fetch.


#### ALVAR AALTO

Hugo Alvar Henrik Aalto was born in 1898 in Finland and became one of the leading designers of the Art Deco movement. He worked in various media, designing for example asymmetrical vases in clear green glass for the Iittala Glass Works. It was however for his furniture that he is probably best remembered. His first important design, executed about 1930, was a sofa bed with a thick upholstered seat and adjustable back on a tubular steel frame. His was a seminal influence on 1930s design, particularly in his use of bent laminated birchwood.

#### **ARTS & CRAFTS**

The original inspiration behind the Arts & Crafts movement which flourished in late 19th century England was undoubtedly William Morris, who urged a return to medieval standards of design and craftsmanship in the face of their usurpation by industrialisation and mechanical processes.

The movement was characterised by craftsmen and designers organising themselves into cooperative associations rather in the style of the old Guilds. Indeed, The Century Guild and Charles Ashbee's Guild and School of Handicraft were both formed in the 1880s.

The ideas of the movement were much aired and documented in contemporary lectures, essays and books, and the firms of Morris Marshall, Faulkner & Co and later Morris & Co were formed to design and produce decorative objects in the Arts

and Crafts style.

In the case of furniture, the ideals of the movement were reflected in simple, solid construction, using the natural beauty of the wood as the main decoration. Favoured woods were the traditional English oak, walnut and elm. More elaborate pieces were produced by the Guild of Handicraft.

The principles of the movement spread to influence designers both in Europe and America. In Europe, Serrurier-Bovy, Muthesius and the Deutsche Werkbund were among those so inspired, while in the US the work of Gustav Stickley, the Prairie School and Elbert Hubbard showed clear Arts and Crafts influence.

Charles Voysey saw the movement into the 20th century.



# MHBAILLIE SCOTT

Mackay Hugh Baillie Scott (1865-1945) was an English architect who also designed furniture, ceramics and metalwork. His furniture tended to be simple and linear in form often with colourful inlays in such materials as pewter, ivory, woods and copper and with elaborate metal mounts. One of his major commissions was to design pieces for the Palace of the Grand Duke of Hesse in Darmstadt, and these were executed by the Guild of Handicraft in 1898.









#### MARCEL BREUER

Born in 1902, Marcel Breuer was a Hungarian architect and designer who joined the Bauhaus in 1920. He specialised in industrial and interior design and became 'Master of Interiors' there in 1926. He was influenced by Gerrit Rietveld, and designed wooden furniture and then the first tubular steel chair which was manufactured in 1925 by Thonet Brothers.

In 1930 he left the Bauhaus for Berlin, and then, as that became too uncomfortable with the rise of Nazism, came to Britain in 1935. He designed coffee tables and a noteworthy chaise longue for the firm of Isokon in bent plywood with latex foam upholstery.



#### **CARLO BUGATTI**

Carlo Bugatti (1855-1940) was a Milanese furniture designer and craftsman, who was notable for the originality of his designs. His early pieces, dating from around 1888, often featured diagonal back panels, asymmetrical uprights, tassels, fringes, stamped brass and vellum covered wood. He was also influenced by Japanese styles and decorated his pieces with asymmetrical stylized motifs and floral medallions.



Charles Eames was a leading American furniture designer whose work was much influenced by Bauhaus designs. In the 1940s he specialised in combining Bauhaus functionalism and new materials, such as plastics, to produce modern works which were typically American in spirit. Plywood too readily adapted itself to his designs, which tended to be moulded to follow the shape of the human body. Eames was one of several American designers working for pioneering manufacturers such as Herman Miller and Hans Knoll.

## **EMILE GALLE**

While Emile Gallé is first and foremost associated with glass, from the 1880s he was also designing furniture. His pieces are often based on 18th century forms, and are characterised by their simple lines and naturalistic decoration. Plant forms are much in evidence, even for limbs and cross-section mouldings and Gallé also made much use of marquetry decoration in natural fruitwoods. His work is also sometimes inlaid with inscriptions, such as quotations from Baudelaire,





#### HEAL'S

While William Morris and his Arts & Crafts movement favoured a return to traditional handcraftsmanship, the middle classes also now wanted access to fashionable furniture, and this meant mass production. Their requirements were met by, among others, the firm of Heal's, whose head, Ambrose Heal (1872-1959) had begun to design furniture himself. It was Heal more than anyone who married the ideals of the Arts & Crafts movement with commercial expertise, and while Morris & Co's elegant designs were beyond the reach of all but the wealthiest. Heal featured good design at affordable prices in his Tottenham Court Road store.

His wares were publicised by means of illustrated catalogues, the first edition of which, Plain Oak Furniture, appeared in 1898. He named his styles after English seaside towns, and they had often a freshness and simplicity lacking in other commercially produced items. His beds, for example, were generally uncanopied, with plain, almost austere headboards and feet.

In 1900 Heal won a silver medal at the Paris Exhibition for a bedroom suite, and his success was assured. He was assisted by the fact that his furniture was eminently suitable for the growing number of suburban villas and houses which were being built in the new garden cities. His cottage bedsteads and later painted beds continued to couple simplicity of design with excellence of workmanship and he succeeded in his ambition to be remembered as having revived the true craftsmanship inspired by the ideals of Morris.








# LIBERTY FURNITURE

Furniture featured largely in the stock of Arthur Lazenby Liberty's London store.

He had formerly been manager of the Farmer & Rogers oriental warehouse in Regent Street, and it was therefore appropriate that he should continue to import eastern, Egyptian and Moorish furniture. He also commissioned designs for Moorish style smoking rooms, which owed much to the elaborate style of William Burges.

He later came under the influence of the Arts & Crafts movement and many Liberty pieces came to incorporate Quaint style features, such as unvarnished wood, or coloured wood inlays. The Quaint designer E G Punnett worked for Liberty, and some pieces were made by the noted chair makers, William Birch.

Liberty furniture was exported throughout Europe — in Belgium, for example, it was distributed by Serrurier-Bovy in Liège. Pieces were usually stamped or labelled Liberty & Co.



#### LIMBERT

Charles Limbert was a furniture designer and maker, working in Grand Rapids, Michigan, around 1900–10,. He must have been well acquainted with the two Stickley brothers, George and Albert, who were also active in the town at that period, and Limbert's output owes much to the inspiration of Gustav Stickley.

Limbert worked mainly in the Mission style, named from the furniture supposedly found in the Franciscan missions in California. His work is characterised by its simple, sturdy design, with exposed pegs and tenon ends



# CHARLES RENNIE MACKINTOSH

Charles Rennie Mackintosh (1868–1928) was one of the seminal figures of the Art Nouveau/Deco period. He was apprenticed as an architect in Glasgow, during which time he also studied at the Glasgow School of Art, winning a scholarship to visit France and Italy in 1890. After this, he also began to design furniture. In 1897 he won the competition to design and furnish the new Glasgow School of Art.

Mackintosh became the leading figure in what came to be known as the Glasgow School. Other members of the group were Francis Newbery, the headmaster of the School of Art, and his wife, Mackintosh's own wife Margaret MacDonald and her sister Frances who married the remaining member, the architect Herbert MacNair.

Mackintosh strongly influenced the Vienna Secessionist movement, and his work generally found more acclaim abroad. especially in Germany and Austria, than it ever did in his own country. The keynote of Mackintosh's designs was simplicity of form, with long straight lines complementing gentle curves. Chairs have long attenuated backs and low seats; tables have slender tapering legs. Decoration was never allowed to dominate a piece, as was often the case with Continental Art Nouveau. His colour schemes tended to be light and delicate, and pieces were often painted white. He used stylized decorative motifs again and again so that they became almost a hallmark of his work. His favourite was a stylized rose inlaid in glass or ivory; groupings of small squares of coloured glass were also common.

Mackintosh also designed metalwork.

# LOUIS MAJORELLE

Louis Majorelle was born in France in 1859. He trained as a painter in Paris, but at the age of twenty took over his father's cabinet making business in Nancy, which had made 18th century reproduction furniture.

Majorelle however came under the influence of Emile Gallé, and began to produce Art Nouveau furniture in the Ecole de Nancy style, characterised by fluid, sculptural forms and often embellished with marquetry decoration and using local woods. He accepted many commissions for bedroom. dining room and drawing room suites, sometimes with ormolu decoration, and also produced some giltwood pieces. One characteristic feature of his designs is that flat surfaces such as table tops etc often curve upwards at the rim. After 1906 his furniture became much heavier in design.



# MISSION FURNITURE

The Mission Style of furniture which was immensely popular around the beginning of the 20th century was essentially the major American expression of the Arts & Crafts style which had recently evolved in England.

Its name derives from the fact that it was supposed to reflect the style of furniture found in the old Franciscan missions of California, and it was seen as a revival of medieval and functional designs.

Most pieces were made in oak, and the forms were rectilinear and as simple and functional as possible.

Obvious signs of handiwork, such as exposed mortice and tenon joints were characteristic of the style.

Mission furniture was often used in furniture schemes alongside Tiffany glass,







#### GERRIT RIETWELD

Gerrit Rietweld (1888–1964) was a Dutch furniture designer whose ideas revolutionised 20th century chair design. He used only rectangular, circular and cubic forms painted in primary colours and believed that design should reflect structure uncluttered by ornamentation. His Red and Blue Chair of 1917 was one of the landmarks of modern style.

From 1919 he joined De Stijl Group, whose theories were set out in De Stijl magazine.

He went on to design the asymmetrical chair (1923), with a flat arm rest on one side and an upright board on the other, and the Zigzag chair in 1934.

#### ROYCROFT

Elbert Hubbard (1856–1915) was an American soap manufacturer who became fired with enthusiasm for the Arts & Crafts movement after a visit to Britain in 1894. In 1895 he established the Roycroft shops, a craft community based in East Aurora, NY, to produce pieces in the Arts & Crafts style.

Thus they were one of the major manufacturers of Mission style furniture, mainly in oak and mahogany, often with leather seats and copper studs on armchairs. They also produced, between 1905-12, a kind of deck chair, with three slats in the back, which was known as the Morris chair. Their pieces were known as Aurora colonial furniture from 1905. In 1908 a copper workshop was set up, making bookends, trays, inkwells etc. Following his visit to England, Hubbard also bought a printing press, on which he printed some fine books, such as The Song of Songs, on handmade paper.



#### **GORDON RUSSELL**

Sir Sydney Gordon Russell (b. 1892) was a famous English furniture designer and master craftsman, who established the Russell Workshops in Broadway, Worcs. making machine made versions of such traditional English designs as rush-seated, ladder backed chairs.

He specialised in the use of English woods such as oak and yew with the wood grain emphasising the linear design. From c 1930 onwards his work had a major influence on the styles of the 50s and 60s.









# GEORGE & ALBERT STICKLEY

Two of the famous Stickley family, George and Albert, set up their furniture workshop in Grand Rapids, Michigan in 1901. There, they produced furniture which owed much to the Craftsman style. (The Craftsman was a magazine published by their brother Gustav, which advocated the principles of the Arts & Crafts movement).

It was marketed as Quaint Furniture, and is generally inferior in terms of material, workmanship and design, to that turned out by their elder brother.

The Quaint, or Fanciful style was the name also given to the British trade version of the Art Nouveau style which flourished between c. 1895–1905. It combined elements of Anglo-Japanese, Arts & Crafts, Glasgow School and continental Art Nouveau furniture and was characterised by painted and inlaid floral motifs, heartshaped apertures and ornate hinges.

With regard to decoration, 18th century forms were often used as the basic inspiration. Cabinets and armchairs had thin legs, and often six or eight of them, with low stretchers.

Especially popular were versions of the Windsor chair and asymmetrical sofas. The woods used were mainly polished rosewood, fumed oak and cheap woods stained green or purple.

At its best Quaint furniture was restrained in form and decoration, whereas cheaper imitations tended to be over elaborate. Names of designers and manufacturers associated with the style include William Birch, George Ellwood, J S Henry and E G Punnett.



# GUSTAV STICKLEY

The Arts & Crafts Movement found one of its greatest exponents in the USA in Gustav Stickley (1857–1942). He was the eldest of six brothers who all went into furniture making, though he at first trained as a mason.


In his youth he designed mainly chairs in the American Colonial style, but in 1898 he founded the firm of Gustav Stickley of Syracuse, New York, which specialised in the Arts & Crafts or Mission style of furniture (from the furniture supposedly found in the old Franciscan missions in California). He also published a magazine "The Craftsman' which popularised this new style.

Like Art Nouveau, of which this was the American version, the style was seen as being a return to the simple functional style of the medieval period. Oak was the most popular wood, and construction was simple, often with obvious signs of handiwork, such as exposed mortice and tenon joints. Chairbacks were usually constructed as a series of flat vertical or horizontal boards.

Interestingly five of the brothers went into the same line of business, and the relationship between them seems to have been a highly political one. George and Albert worked in Grand Rapids, Michigan from 1891, and formed the firm of Stickley Bros. Co. around 1901. Their furniture is similar to the Craftsman style, often characterised by through tenons, but it was generally inferior in quality in terms of wood, design and finish. It was marketed as Quaint Furniture. They also produced independent designs similar to English cottage furniture.



The other two brothers. Leopold and J. George, were at first employed by Gustav but left his employment to found L. & J.G. Stickley at Fayetteville, in 1900. They too based their designs on Craftsman furniture. sometimes using veneers and laminated members, and their pieces are identifiable by the name L. & J.G Stickley in red. They were open to other influences, however, which may help to account for their survival, and made furniture designed by Frank Lloyd Wright, the Morris chair, and by 1914 were turning out reproduction furniture as well.


When one refers to 'Stickley' it is undoubtedly Gustav who springs most readily to mind. Certainly he was the most original designer of the family, he was also the purist, and his pieces are often austere in their unadorned simplicity. His brothers were perhaps more realistic in seeing that their products also had to find a market, and they were readier to compromise in terms of putting some embellishments on the basic style. It may have been Gustav's unwillingness to compromise his ideals that led to the break with Leopold and J. George, and it may also be why, by 1915, he was bankrupt. He attempted to soldier on, selling new lines based loosely on 18th century styles, or in bright colours, but to no avail. It was left to L. & J.G. to buy him out in 1916, when the business became the Stickley Manufacturing Co. Under this name it is still active, chiefly producing American Colonial reproduction furniture in cherrywood.






#### L & J G STICKLEY

Leopold and J George Stickley were younger brothers of the famous Gustav, with whom they obviously enjoyed a somewhat complicated relationship. They were at first employed by him in his firm at Syracuse, New York, but in 1900 left to found their own establishment, L & J G Stickley at Fayetteville. Like Gustav, they based their designs on Craftsman furniture, sometimes using veneers and laminated members, and their pieces are identifiable by the name L & J G Stickley in red.


Unlike Gustav, however, they were also open to other influences, and were perhaps more realistic in seeing that their products also had to find a market. They were certainly readier to compromise in terms of putting some embellishments on the basic style. They later made furniture designed by Frank Lloyd Wright and by 1914 were turning out reproduction pieces as well.

They bought out their elder brother in 1916, when the firm, still in existence today, became the Stickley Manufacturing Co.




L. & J.G. Stickley davenport bed, circa 1912, no. 285, seat rail slides out opening to a bed, 77in. (Skinner Inc.)

# GERALD SUMMERS

Gerald Summers (1899-1968) trained originally in London as an engineer. He first ventured into furniture design when he made some pieces for his wife's bedroom, and then, in the early 1930s, in partnership with her, formed the company known as The Makers of Simple furniture. They had a workshop off Tottenham Court Road and a showroom in Charlotte Street, and supplied such leading stores as Harrod's. Heal's and Fortnum's. Summer's bent plywood armchair is now seen as something of a milestone in English furniture design.










# ROBERT (MOUSEMAN) **THOMPSON**

It was in the early years of this century that Robert Thompson went to work in his father's joinery in Kilburn, Yorkshire, serving the needs of the local

In the local churches and abbeys, however, Robert saw the magnificent work of the medieval craftsmen in wood. and became convinced that work of similar quality and style could be made for domestic use.

Only seven miles from Kilburn is the Abbey and College of Ampleforth, and when Father Paul Nevill wanted some furniture, he commissioned Robert Thompson to make it. It was the opportunity which was to make him famous.

Thereafter Thompson worked exclusively in English oak. He insisted on natural, out-of-doors seasoning, maintaining that kiln drying would destroy its character. His work is also characterised by the frequent use of the adze, used to produce the fine ripple effect on the surface of many of his pieces.






Charles F Annesley Voysey (1857-1941) was an architect and prolific designer of furniture, textiles, carpets, tapestries, wallpapers, ceramics and metalwork. He set up his own practice in 1882 and the following year designed his first wallpapers and textiles. He was much influenced at this time by Arthur Mackmurdo of the Arts & Crafts Exhibition Society and the Century Guild. Voysey also exhibited at the former in 1893.

Voysey's furniture was much in the spirit of the Arts & Crafts Movement, rectilinear in form, with little embellishment, and executed mainly in oak.







#### PETER WAALS

Peter Waals (1870-1937) was a Dutch cabinet maker who worked mainly in England. He was employed first by S & E Barnsley and then, from 1901, by E W Gimson. Both of these were leading exponents of the Cotswold School, an association of furniture designers and craftsmen in Gloucestershire. which flourished from 1893. Their aim was to link traditional rural craftsmanship with the Arts & Crafts Movement, Waals rose to become foreman in charge at Gimson's establishment at Daneway House, Sapperton, and carried on the traditions after Gimson's death.

#### LAMPS

## LALIQUE

Réne Lalique (1860-1945) was one of the most versatile designers of the Art Nouveau/Deco periods, working in the varied media of jewellery, glass and silver.

As an apprentice in 1876 he studied at the École des Arts Décoratifs in Paris and became a leading Art Nouveau jeweller, receiving his first important commission from no less a person than Sarah Bernhardt. He became a freelance designer, and worked for Cartier and Boucheron, His favourite motifs were flower and insect forms, and he produced pieces using semiprecious stones, glass, gold, ivory, horn and enamel.

His interest in glass dated from the 1890s, when he first started to incorporate it into his jewellery. By 1914 he had all but abandoned jewellery and moved on to glass as his major medium. His work was strongly influenced by Gallé, and he experimented with unpolished statuettes and vases. In 1908 Coty commissioned him to design a range of perfume bottles, and shortly after this he acquired a glass factory. The 1920s and 1930s marked the period of his greatest success.

Lalique was noted for his innovative techniques. He developed an opalescent glass, first in milky white and then also in brown, blue and a soft peach. His designs often incorporated nude figures and animal forms and his predilection for flower and insect motifs continued throughout his career.

His marks include Lalique France, and R Lalique France, either engraved or stamped and etched.

#### LAMPS

#### LOETZ

The Loetz glass factory was established at Klostermühle in Bohemia in 1836, and was bought by Johann Loetz in 1840. During the 1880s it produced glass imitating onyx, jasper and other hardstones and cameo glass with simplified plant forms in blue and black.

It was in the following decade however, that it sprang to fame, when it started to produce glass in the Jugendstil (literally youth style) which was the German speaking world's equivalent of Art Nouveau.

Under the direction of Max Ritter von Spaun, Loetz's grandson, who was director from 1879–1908, this took the form of an iridescent glass which fell into two types. The first, Papillon, consisted of pearly spots covering a vessel, and the second, Phenomenon, consisted of glass threads undulating across a pearly surface. These Loetz pieces were noted for their rich colours and sensuous forms.

Shapes were often novel, twisted, pinched or goosenecked vases, three handled vessels, or some with applied decoration in the form of snakes or mounted in silver and bronze. Many were made in imitation of the Favrile glass which Tiffany were producing in the USA at that time. Many Loetz pieces found their way across the Atlantic, and at times were even more popular there than the home-grown examples on which they were based.

The factory ceased production on the outbreak of war in 1939.

Marks include various forms of two crossed arrows with stars in each intersection, and Lötz, Lötz Austria or Klostermühle.





The Hagenauer workshop flourished in Vienna between 1898 and 1958. A definite house style began to emerge after the proprietor's son Karl joined the enterprise in 1919, and from the 1920s onward they produced figures, often either sporting or with a sporting motif, in metal and/or wood.

These were given a highly stylised, abstract, often whimsical interpretation, and their unique style makes them easily identifiable.





#### HAT PINS

The heyday of the hat pin was during the last few years of the last century, when the wearing of large, heavily decorated hats, perched on top of elaborate coiffures. made them indispensable. They were sold in pairs or in sets, and could be up to twelve inches long. (In America, at one time, a licence had to be obtained for any over 9" long, as they were classed as offensive weapons.) After the First World War, however, shingled heads and small. close fitting hats made the hat pin largely redundant, and examples produced after that time were generally of inferior quality to the exotic examples which had gone before.

# IRON AND STEEL

Iron and steel tend to be thought of as practical, rather than decorative materials, and the fireplace is about the only site which springs to mind where they are in common decorative use. Certainly the hearth was still the central point of the home in Art Nouveau period, and some very fine cast iron fire surrounds, screens and fireplace sets were produced in that style, both in Europe and America. Some iron and steel furniture was also produced and this in a way presaged the tubular chairs of Breuer, Aalto, and the like.

#### IVORY

Ivory became a hugely popular medium during the Art Nouveau period, thanks largely to the aggressive marketing policy of the Belgian government. The Congo was the personal possession of the King of the Belgians and ivory flooded the market as its resources were ruthlessly exploited. From 1894 artists were offered material free if they would work in the medium. and in 1897 the Brussels Exhibition featured a new 'chryselephantine' section to publicise their work.

#### **JEWELLERY**

Jewellery is such a versatile medium, providing scope not only for jewellers themselves, but for others like silversmiths and glass artists as well. There was of course no shortage of such talents in the Art Nouveau/ Art Deco period and most of them had a go at producing jewellery in the characteristic style. The result was that the period gave rise to some of the most charming pieces ever produced, which were further notable for their incorporation of relatively new materials, such as enamels and even plastic.

#### **LAMPS**

Lamps have always provided an ideal medium for artistic expression, and the Art Nouveau/Deco periods were no exception. Some great generic types emerged at this time, such as the Tiffany lamp, and most great craftsmen in such varied media as sculpture, metalwork, art glass and ceramics produced characteristic forms. These ranged from the beauty of the cameo and acid-etched offerings of Daum and Gallé, through to the outré and whimsical products of Art Deco craftsmen such as Frank Clewett.





## ARGY ROUSSEAU

Gabriel Argy Rousseau (b. 1885) was a French artist in glass who worked in the Art Deco style. His favoured medium was pâte-de-cristal. a version of pâte-de-verre, having a higher lead content. It is almost transparent and gives a clear ring when sounded. In this, Argy Rousseau made a variety of objects, figurines and decorative ware such as vases, perfume burners. lamps and cigarette boxes. Many were decorated with motifs of poppies, gazelles, wolves and stylised female heads. His mark was usually G Argy Rousseau, impressed.

# BENEDICT STUDIOS

The Benedict Studios flourished in East Syracuse, New York State in the early years of the 20th century.

Their lamps are often unsigned, but are characterised by the frequent use of copper and mica, a mineral often used as a substitute for glass.

# BRADLEY & HUBBARD

The American glass makers Bradley & Hubbard worked out of Meriden, Connecticut, in the early 20th century. Their table lamps often feature metal pedestal bases with domed shades of iridescent or painted glass.

Their mark is usually Bradley & Hubbard Mfg Co within a triangle, set round an oil lamp.

# LAMPS DAUM

Auguste (1853-1909) and Antonin (1864-1930) Daum were French glass craftsmen who were much influenced by Gallé and became members of the Ecole de Nancy. They made great use of cameo glass enamelling and later also worked in pâte de verre. Acid etched pieces are also common. Their lamps are highly characteristic for their frequent use of the mushroom shade. Stems are also of glass, and these are decorated to form a uniform whole with the shade.



# **LAMPS** EMILE GALLÉ

Emile Gallé was born in 1846 and started his career as a ceramicist. In 1874 he established a small workshop in Nancy, where during 1890s he was to become the inspiration for what became known as the Ecole de Nancy, a group of French Art Nouveau artists who followed his techniques and decorating style. He made earthenware and later also experimented with stoneware and porcelain. His pieces were decorated with heraldic motifs and plant designs, and featured flowing, opaque glazes.

His forms were for the most part simple, sometimes even a little clumsy, though some of his shapes were borrowed by the Rookwood pottery in the USA, who acknowledged their debt to him.

In the early 1870s he also started experimenting with glass, and this is the medium with which he is now most associated. In fact, he revolutionised its manufacture by going completely against the traditional ideal of crystalline purity and aimed instead for an opaque, iridescent effect. He experimented with the addition of metal oxides to the glass melt, colouring glass in imitation of semiprecious stones, and also even exploited the impurities to give glass the quality of a fabric or the suggestion of mist or rain.

Gallé was much influenced by Japanese and Chinese arts and his close friendship with a Japanese botanist who was studying at the Ecole Forestière in Nancy further accentuated this. Such influence is particularly noticeable in his cameo glass pieces.

clair de lune glass had a wonderful translucent glow like moonlight, and he was also notable for having developed the technique of marquêterie de verre, in which coloured pieces were pressed into semi-molten glass before it was cooled. His most complicated vases were made up of several separately coloured layers of glass, which were wheel engraved to different depths, to reveal each layer below. These would then be finished with marquetry and patination. He also used acid to bite into the glass surface, to create delicate bark or web like effects

From the mid 1880s Gallé had further diversified into furniture design. His creations show restrained lines with the inevitable naturalistic ornamentation. Here again there was much use of plant motifs and the use of marquetry on flat surfaces.

It was around 1900 that Emile Gallé began the decorative application of glass to lighting, when he began producing lamps in the form of flowers, the bulbs being shaded by the half open petals. He used all the immense range of techniques which he had mastered in producing his lamps, and cameo, carved and acidetched examples abound. He favoured the mushroom shades which were so to influence the Daum brothers. and the thematic and decorative integration of base and shade.

Gallé signed all his his creations, and after his death in 1904 a star was added to the signature. His factory continued in operation until 1931 under his friend and assistant Victor Prouve.

## LAMPS GRUEBY

Lamps did not feature largely in the short lived pottery venture launched by William Grueby in Boston Mass. in 1897, tiles and vases forming his principal lines. Some were produced in the early years of this century, and these feature the typical Grueby glazes, matt. opaque and mainly in shades of yellow brown, and of course dark green. Shades, and sometimes also parts of the base, were produced by other manufacturers.

# GUSTAV STICKLEY

Gustav Stickley, the noted Arts & Crafts furniture designer, also ventured into lamp production. His offerings are very much what one would expect – frequent use of hammered copper, with clear signs of hand craftsmanship, simple lines, with little in the way of embellishment.

# **HAMPSHIRE**


The Hampshire Pottery was founded in 1871 at Keene, New Hampshire, by J S Taft, and produced earthenware for domestic use and souvenirs for tourists. There was also some majolica production. Decoration often consisted of transfer printing in black. Lamp bases figured among their output and these can often be found teamed up with glass shades from other stables.

# LAMPS HANDEL

The Handel Company was established by Philip Handel at Meriden. Connecticut around 1885, and from 1900-1930 a branch also operated in New York City. The company produced Art Nouveau and other styles of art glass vessels, but came to be known principally for their leaded glass shades for gas and electric lighting. Many styles closely followed the designs of Tiffany, but were very much less expensive.

# LAMPS LALIQUE

René Lalique's work is characterised by the use of milky opalescent glass and also glass so richly coloured as to give the impression of precious stones. He used both of these in his lamp production, together with his favourite decorative motifs, dragonflies and female faces and forms. Later, he also made lamps of circular or semi-circular sheets of glass.

# LE VERRE FRANÇAIS

Charles Schneider (1881-1962) opened his Cristallerie Schneider at Epiny-sur-Seine in 1913, and it is here that Le Verre Français is now recognised as having been produced. This was Art Deco glassware, cameo cut with stylized flowers, fruit and insects, chiefly in rich tones of crimson, orange, ultramarine and purple. It was produced between 1920-33, mainly for sale in large stores. Principal products were vases, bowls and lamp bases, sometimes with shade en suite. These usually consisted of a marbled glass core, with a superimposed layer of thin clear, or sometimes speckled glass.

# LEGRAS

The Legras glasshouse was established in 1864 by Auguste Legras at St Denis, near Paris. It is noted for its Art Nouveau style ornamental ware, often featuring cameo snowscapes or autumn scenes. Later, Art Deco cameo glass was also produced. In 1920 the company merged with the Pantin glasshouse to become Verreries et Cristalleries de St Denis et de Pantin Réunies.

# LAMPS LOETZ

It was the firm of Loetz, founded at Klostermühle in Austria in 1836, which became one of the leading manufacturers of Jugendstil glass in the last years of the 19th century. Particularly striking was their iridescent glass and of all his European imitators, it was Loetz who succeeded in reproducing most closely the Favrile glass of Tiffany. Many Loetz products were in fact exported to the US.

## MULLER FRERES

The brothers Henri and Desiré Muller, who were active during the first third of the 20th century, trained under Gallé at Nancy, before setting up their own businesses in Luneville and Croismare in 1895. Their vases and lamps, which often combine up to seven layers of glass, are usually beautifully carved. They also developed the technique of fluorogravure, using hydrofluoric acid to bite into glass painted with deep coloured or iridescent enamels. They made much use of landscape and floral motifs and sometimes applied glass cabochons.



## LAMPS PAIRPOINT

The Pairpoint Manufacturing Co. started out as electroplaters in New Bedford Mass. in 1880. In 1900, they merged with the mount Washington Glass Co. to become the Pairpoint Corp., making glass only.

Their products were not much influenced by the innovations of Tiffany and Frederick Carder of the Steuben Glassworks, and they continued producing Victorian inspired floral designs.

# LAMPS QUEZAL

Quezal glass derives its name from the brightly coloured Quezal bird of Central America. It was produced between 1901 and 1920 by Martin Bach Sr. at Brooklyn, New York with the avowed intention of imitating Tiffany's iridescent glass. A notable case is the twelvelight lily lamp, available in both Tiffany and Quezal versions.

# LAMPS ROYAL DOULTON

Royal Doulton figural lamp bases set out purely as figures, and were later mounted and modified. This was done by Doulton themselves, and their catalogues from the 1930s, for example, show pages of 'Modern Decorative Electric Lamps of Royal Doulton' showing various figures beneath an assortment of shades.

# ROYCROFT

The Roycroft Craft Community was established in East Aurora NY in 1895 by Elbert Hubbard, following a visit to England in 1894, when he was much influenced by the Arts & Crafts Movement. A copper workshop was opened in 1908, and here many copper lamps were produced, their simplicity of form showing a distinct Art & Crafts influence. Shades, sometimes produced elsewhere by, eg. Steuben, also reflect the stark simplicity of the Arts & Crafts ideal.

# LAMPS

## SABINO

Marius Ernest Sabino or Sabino-Marino, was a French glass artist who flourished in the 1920s and 30s. He produced Lalique inspired pieces, composed of units of pressed glass moulded on an invisible foundation and also made lampshades and vases in smoky-coloured glass.

His mark is Sabino, Paris, engraved or moulded.

## **STEUBEN**

The Steuben Glass Works were founded in 1903 in Corning, New York by Frederick Carder (1864-1963). Here he produced Aurene, his own version of the Peachblow glass originally produced by the New England Glass Co. in imitation of Chinese peachblow porcelain. Fine iridescent glass was also produced and lamps were made in both of these materials. In 1918 the firm merged with the Corning glass works. Steuben glass is still made today.

## LAMPS TIFFANY

Art glass and lamps really come together in Louis Comfort Tiffany (1848-1933) and his favrile iridescent glass shades and designs set the standard to which all other manufacturers aspired. One of his typical designs was a cast bronze stem in the shape of a stylized plant, and a shade of multicoloured opaque favrile glass, set in irregular lozenges in a bronze mounting of overall tree or flower form.

## LAMPS UPSTATE NEW YORK

Copper and mica table lamps, signed Upstate New York, were produced in the early years of this century. Their simple lines, hammered copper finish, and lack of fancy decoration make them very much in tune with the Arts & Crafts Movement which was flourishing at the time.

#### **WEBB**

The English glasshouse of Thomas Webb & Sons was established at Stourbridge, Worcs. It is well known for its fine engraved glass and for its cameo glass, dating from the late 19th century. From 1902, Burmese glass, an American art glass shading greenish yellow to delicate pink, in matt or glossy finish was made, and was much used for lamp production. The firm continues in production today.



#### **MARBLE**

Marble is surely the archetypal sculptural material, and it is perhaps inevitable that it should be somewhat neglected in a period which was so preoccupied with the discovery of new materials. There is little marble statuary from the period which shows clear Art Nouveau or Deco influence – the sculptors of the day preferred to work in other media, notably heavily subsidised chryselephantine.

## MIRRORS

Some very fine mirrors are to be found particularly from the Art Nouveau period, in both silver and pewter. Many of these are of the dressing table variety, and Liberty, with their Cymric and Tudric ranges, Mackintosh, and in Germany WMF, all created popular and typical designs.

Art Deco examples, often featuring a number of different materials, are also easily distinguishable for their angularity and starkness.

#### **MOTORING ITEMS**

The Art Nouveau/Art Deco periods cover what is probably now regarded as the Golden Age of motoring, when the activity still retained a great deal of glamour. Art Nouveau style perhaps found its expression typically in the Lalique car mascot. In the succeeding period however, chrome was a very favoured medium, and there was plenty of chrome about motor cars. Headlights, radiator grilles therefore, as well as badges etc., all received the Art Deco treatment, and are very collectable today.

#### PEWTER

Pewter, an alloy of tin and other metals, usually copper or lead, has been used for domestic items since Roman times. During the medieval period it became the favoured metal for tableware, as a relatively cheap substitute for silver, and in 1348 the Pewterers' Company was established to set standards of workmanship and register craftsmen. By 1503 all pewterers had to register their 'touches' with the company. These marks were impressed on the handles or rims of pieces, and the system continued to operate up to 1820.

About this time pewter fell from favour. As a material associated with the Middle Ages, however, it was ripe for revival when the Arts & Crafts movement came along to extol all things medieval.

Its use in Art Nouveau settings was perhaps first taken up by the German firm of Kayser Sohn, whose pewter wares or Kayserzinnwaren designed by Hugo Leven, were sold from 1896 in the Atelier Englebert Kayser in Cologne. His tea wares with their elegant flowing decoration were the counterpart of the Liberty Tudric range in the UK.

# PEWTER KAYSERZINN

The firm of Kayser Sohn was founded in 1885 at Krefeld-Bochum, near Dusseldorf, by Jean Kayser (1840-1911). From 1896 they manufactured Jugendstil, or Art Nouveau, items such as ashtrays, beakers, vases, lamps, etc. known as Kayserzinnwaren, or Kayser pewter wares. Their principal designer was Hugo Leven (b. 1874). Pieces were characterised by their flowing floral decoration and they were sold at the Atelier Englebert Kayser.



## PEWTER – LIBERTY

In the 1890s in England, the Art Nouveau style was championed above all by Arthur Lazenby's Liberty store, so much so that in Italy, for example, it came to be known simply as 'il Stile Liberty'. In the late 1890s Liberty appointed the Manxman Archibald Knox as their chief metalwork designer, and he set to work on a range of silverware, 'Cymric', and pewterware, 'Tudric', which epitomised everything that was Art Nouveau and which continued to be produced until 1938.

Tudric ware is characterised by the combination of Celtic motifs with the stylized natural decoration which was the essence of Art Nouveau. The range included functional items such as tankards, spoons and plates, while applied decoration was often added to vases, trays, candlesticks and clocks. Sometimes, too, pieces were decorated with applied plaques of green or blue enamel, mother of pearl or copper, and some fruit bowls were pierced and lined with coloured glass.





#### W.M.F. PEWTER

These letters stand for the Württembergische Metallwarenfabrik (Württemberg Metalware Factory) which was situated at Geislingen, about 30 miles from Stuttgart. Here they produced Art Nouveau and Art Deco style tableware in a stainless steel alloy of their own manufacture known as Cromagen, and also in a type of German silver which they

patented as Ikora metal.

With regard to decorative pieces, mirrors, candlesticks, decanters etc, under the direction of Carl Haegele and their chief designer Beyschlag, WMF pushed the curvilinear style of Art Nouveau metalwork to its extreme. It was described variously as the Whiplash style, the Spaghetti style or, as put by Charles Rennie Mackintosh, 'resembling melted margarine! Art Nouveau flowing-haired and flowing-robed maidens are also very prevalent on WMF pieces. A combination of pewter and green glass was a favourite medium.

A glass studio was also attached to the factory in 1921, with teaching workshops for glass and gem cutting. This was under the direction of Wilhelm von Eiff.

Ikora glass was developed in 1925 and used to make usually heavy glass objects with airbubble decoration in organised patterns and encrustations in colour. Some diatreta glass vases were also produced after 1932. This technique, which dates from Roman times, involves a double layered glass vessel with the outer layer cut away to form a delicate, intricate trellis over the lower layer, to which it remains attached by means of small decorated struts.





#### PLASTER

Plaster is a very versatile medium, and a number of interesting sculptures appeared during the Art Nouveau/Deco periods, some disguised, for example silvered, to make them look like something completely different. Richard Garbe produced many classical/Art Nouveau figures, of naked maidens with flowing hair and drapery.

#### PLASTIC

Plastics are the great revolutionary material of the 20th century. Celluloid came first, followed by bakelite and perspex. Much early plastic tended to be brittle. however, and it was not until the late 50's and 60's that such huge technological advances were made in terms of pliability and durability that there is now a plastic suitable for just about every purpose under the sun.


One of plastic's main attractions has always been its cheapness. As such, plastic items therefore appear an unlikely choice for collectables. However, many early plastic items are now being keenly collected, perhaps as much for their





There was a great revival of interest in Art Nouveau posters in the early Seventies when no student bedroom was complete without its Toulouse Lautrec or Mucha print. 



#### **PRINTS**

The most notable prints of the Art Deco period more often than not have distinctly erotic overtones, and the artist who most immediately springs to mind in this connection is the Frenchman Louis Icart. His sinuous female figures in their drifting skirts, often accompanied by equally sleek greyhounds, have a fantasy quality. Often his message is less subtle and on occasion borders on the pornographic, reflecting the hedonism and decadence of the times.

# **RADIOS**

By the 1930s, radio production had become more sophisticated. The wireless was coming to be seen as an essential item for most homes, in every sense 'part of the furniture' and it began to be designed as such. Large Art Deco sets in bakelite or wood veneers are now among the most sought after examples for their fascinating designs and immense character.

Many are still in good working order, which is an added bonus, and some connoisseurs insist that they produce a mellowness of tone which has never been equalled by the modern transistor.





#### RUGS

A surprising number of major designers of the Art Nouveau/Deco period turned their attention to rug design, Charles Rennie Mackintosh. Gustav Stickley and Archibald Knox, to name but three. By and large, the results were very much in keeping with the overall style of each - Celtic influence being clearly visible in Knox's output, while Mackintosh's showed his usual clean lines and favourite motifs. Stickley, on the other hand favoured, for him, surprisingly detailed patterns.

# **STOVES**

Before central heating became the norm, many homes and offices boasted a wood or paraffin burning stove. These were both efficient and decorative, and are becoming very fashionable again today.

Examples from France, Germany and in particular Scandinavia, as well as North America, can readily be found, but, interestingly, the stove maker's art does not appear to have flourished much in the UK.

The Art Nouveau period by and large covers the heyday of the stove's popularity. The metalwork is often extremely fine, the overall shape elegant, and further embellishment and Art Nouveau touches were achieved by the use of coloured tiles.

Some stoves are freestanding, while others are designed to be 'plumbed in'. Some, too, are equipped with useful baking ovens or warming compartments.

Stoves were still popular well into the 1920s, although by then the style was becoming by and large more functional and austere.



#### SILVER

The Art Nouveau/Deco periods coincided with the burgeoning talents of some remarkable practitioners of the silversmith's art. Among the best known names are Puiforcat, Jensen, Knox, Dresser, Ramsden, Ashbee & Tiffany. Some details of these craftsmen are given below, and examples of their work appear frequently in the following pages.

# CHARLES ROBERT ASHBEE

(1863-1942) was a leading figure in the Arts & Crafts movement and founded the Guild & School of Handicraft between 1887-8, which later continued as the Guild of Handicraft. He aimed to revive medieval craft skills, and produced simple silver designs, often incorporating semi-precious stones and enamel decoration. Another characteristic feature was his use of silver wire. Celtic and naturalistic motifs are also common in the jewellery which he designed.

#### CHRISTOPHER DRESSER

Dr Christopher Dresser (1834-1904) was a Glasgow born botanist, designer and writer. He studied first at the London School of Design before training as a botanist and becoming a lecturer at the Department of Science and Art. The two strands of his training combined happily when he started to design silver in the early 1860s. His work was characterised by the simplicity of its design and the careful adaptation of form to purpose.

Dresser was also an enthusiastic collector of Japanese arts, and the influence of the Japanese style is often clear in his own pieces. He designed for leading silver manufacturers such as Hukin and Heath and for J Dixon.

#### GEORG JENSEN

Georg Jensen was born in Denmark in 1866. After an initial apprenticeship with a goldsmith, he studied under Mogens Ballin and at the Royal Academy in Copenhagen. He opened an unsuccessful porcelain factory with Joachim Petersen in 1900, before joining Ballin as foreman of their jewellery enterprise in 1901. In 1904 he opened his own workshop in Copenhagen and first exhibited his silver the following year.

In 1908 he opened a shop in Berlin which sold mainly silver pieces such as hand hammered coffee pots and milk jugs, and gained international recognition following his award of a gold medal at the Brussels International Exhibition in 1910.

His company expanded, becoming a Limited Company in 1916, and he employed such craftspeople as Inger Møller and Mrs Just Andersen, and designers such as H Nielsen, with whom he marketed Nielsen's Pyramid cutlery.

Following the First World War, further shops were opened in London, Paris and Stockholm, and Jost Lunning opened a Jensen shop in New York in 1920.

ARCHIBALD KNOX (1864-1933) was born and educated on the Isle of Man. He moved to London in 1897 and became silverware designer for Liberty. In this capacity he supplied over 400 designs for the Cymric range of silverware and Tudric pewter. Often these employ the interlaced decoration of 9th and 10th century Celtic jewellery known as entrelac. Knox lectured at the Kingston School of Art in Surrey, resigning when his teaching was criticised as being 'over advanced'.

#### JEAN PUIFORCAT

Jean Puiforçat (1897–1945) was born into a family of French silversmiths and followed in the tradition, studying at the Central School of Arts and Crafts in London and under Louis Leieune.

From 1922 he worked independently and exhibited at the Exposition Internationale des Arts Decoratifs in 1925 in Paris, where his products included an important lapis lazuli and silver dish and cover.

During the 1920s he became a champion of the Art Deco style and joined the Union des Artistes Modernes in 1928.


### **OMAR RAMSDEN**


(1879-1933) studied at Sheffield School of Art. There he met Alwyn Carr, with whom he later formed a partnership which lasted until 1918, and in which Ramsden was mainly responsible for design. His early work shows Celtic influence, with hammer mark finish, while his middle period is suggestive rather of Tudor styles. He specialised in ceremonial pieces and received many commissions from the Catholic Church. Later he also produced some work in the Art Deco style.

#### CHARLES L TIFFANY

was an American jeweller and silversmith who established the firm of Tiffany & Co in New York in 1834. Silver was produced from 1850 and won the firm an award at the Paris Universal Exposition in 1867. Tiffany produced many commemorative pieces, and is not to be confused with his son, Louis Comfort, who took over the company in 1902, when his father died.

#### **SPELTER**

Spelter is another name for zinc, especially for impure zinc. It was smelted in England from around 1730, and was much in demand during the 19th century for cheap decorative items such as candlesticks, clock cases and statuettes. The terms lead spelter, aluminium spelter etc indicate alloys of zinc with these metals.

#### **TERRACOTTA**

Terracotta is a fired clay, principally associated with sculpture, and terracotta figures feature among the antiquities of China, Greece & Rome. The art was revived during the Renaissance, and in the 18th century France became a leading centre of production. The popularity of the medium lasted well into the Art Nouveau period, and busts of typical flowing haired maidens were produced.





#### WAR POSTERS

It was during the First World War that advertising took its first steps towards the sophisticated, hard-sell image that it has today. Volunteers were needed as cannonfodder, and the laid-back genteel invitations of prewar advertisements were not going to do the trick. The result was a rash of war posters which appealed unashamedly to the emotions - emotional blackmail, some might say - and which most people are still familiar with today.

#### WOOD

Wood carving is one of the oldest artistic activities known to man, yet apart from some fine Art Nouveau carvings in the medieval style, the Art Nouveau/Deco period produced little of note in this field. Perhaps the kaleidoscope of new materials which were being discovered at the time, and their apparently amazing potential, had something to do with this. Whatever the reason, most wooden carvings of the time are fairly lightweight both in content and quality, and often take the form of humorous caricatures.








