INTRODUCTION.

I

HE custom of giving rings as a personal memorial is, as every student of early Wills is aware, as old as the making of Wills themselves. At first a legacy of intrinsic value to near relations, in the course of time the gift of a ring becomes the especial recognition of friendship or services required of executor and overseer. The unfortunate King Richard II. in making his Will, on the eve of that journey to Ireland, from which he returned to find his kingdom in the hands of another, left "one golden ring" to each of the five bishops and four great nobles he named his executors. Two hundred years later William Shakespeare, in the well known Will signed at Stratford on New Year's Day (25 March 1616), gave and bequeathed "to Hamlet Sadler 26s 8d to buy him a ring," and made similar bequests to three other Stratford friends, and to three of his "fellows," Burbage, Heming and Condell. In the 16th century the custom of giving rings grew apace; sums of money were left to be bestowed in rings and distributed to friends unnamed, and such bequests are found as the following from the Will in 1648 of Jaspar Despotin, a foreign physician settled at Bury St. Edmunds, "ten rings of gold to be made of the value of twenty shillings a peece sterling with a death's head vpon some of them within one moneth after my depture and to be disposed of amongst my friends as my executrices shall thinke meet."

From the plain ring of gold of early times the Mourning Ring had by the middle of the 17th century assumed certain features of a distinctive character, and it is at this period that it becomes the "Memorial" Ring of the present collection; that is to say, a ring bearing a distinct inscription in memory of one who had departed. Indeed, the increase, if not the origin, of Memorial Rings may be said to be due to the rings made for horror-stricken loyalists, and inscribed to

the memory of King Charles with such inscriptions as: "Emigravit Gloria Angli: Ja: the 30 1648"; the earliest ring in this collection bears a date within four years of the king's death.

The custom of giving rings spread rapidly, and the numbers given soon became very great. Pepys records receiving several, generally in his official character, one such instance will suffice. On March 29, 1669, he writes: "At Greenwich I come to Captain Cocke's where the house full of company at the burial of James Temple; here I had a very good ring which I did give my wife as soon as I come home." At his own death in 1703, 123 rings of various value were given away, only eight of which were to near relations. Another significant instance may be taken from the diary of Ralph Thoresby, the historian of Leeds, "15 April 1702. Afternoon at the funeral of my excellent and dear friend Dr Thomas Gale, Dean of York, who was interred with great solemnity; lay in state, 200 rings (besides scarves to bearers and gloves to all) given in the room where I was which yet would not

contain the company."

In the following pages all references in Wills that have been found to Mourning Rings have been given, a few of special interest may be quoted here. It was often customary for the testator to refer to separate lists of persons to whom rings were to be presented, these lists are not always found with the Wills; two are given: William Reynolds (No. 349) names 73 persons, including the ringmaker, and George Hunter (No. 868) gives a list of 36 rings. Mrs. Elizabeth Edwards (No. 47) names her relations, to whom she gives "a ring to be enamelled with the day of my death, and marked E. E. in them severally to be of the value of a Guinea." It may be remarked that, though the rings are enamelled, the initials and date are in accordance with the older custom, engraved inside. Thomas Blake (No. 409) wishes his rings to be "of one guinea value and to be made by Mr Jones." The "immensely proud" Sir Samuel Prime, King's Serjeant-at-Law (No. 529), recommends to his son "to consider of delivering fashionable Mourning Rings of the Value of one Guinea each unto every such person as I shall mention or describe in a List of Names," and we note that the "fashionable" ring was of plain gold enamelled with the name and date of death. Of another mind was another Serjeant-at-Law, James Foster (No. 602), who desires "No Rings to be given but to my Children." The Rev. Daniel Sandford (No. 595) leaves the most precise instructions for every particular of his burial and memorials; the ring to be given is to be "a neat Mourning Ring four pennyweight and an half of Gold without the Enamel the Pattern of that I had for my Mother or some neater Pattern so that the Letters may be large and bought of the very maker and he to be a good hand." William Masterman (No. 708) apologises for possible neglect "It may happen from want of recollection I may have omitted the names of persons to whom I might have wished in point of respect to have paid the same compliment of Rings, My Desire is that my Executors . . . make good any such omission." Sir James Sanderson (No. 901), an ex-Lord Mayor of London, is typical of the views held on such rings during the last years of the fashion, when he desires to give "good and Substantial Mourning Rings" to the Court of Aldermen and others; and the rings given were of good weight and hall-marked.

II.

N the descriptive Catalogue that follows, the rings have been arranged in strict chronological order, and in this way the general change in form and the prevailing fashion at any period can easily be ascertained. Two rings only in this collection are of silver, and these commemorate King George I.

(No. 43), and his distinguished subject

John Gay, the poet (No. 72). All the others are of gold of varying degree of fineness, and for form and ornamentation may be briefly divided into four periods. The earliest period may be taken as ending with the reign of Queen Anne. During this period the rings are as a rule plain gold or gold enamelled in patterns that repeat the accepted emblems of death: skeleton, spade and pick, hour-glass, cross-bones, etc.,

as may be seen in No. 30, and the inscription is engraved deeply on the inside of the

ring as in No. 4. There is seldom a separate head or bezil, but in earlier examples it John Gurdon EJq. ob! 9 Sept: 79 took the form of a scull as in No. 5, or a small box covered with crystal as in the ring made in memory of Queen Anne (No. 14).

This period was followed for some sixty years by one in which the prevailing characteristic is the inscription in raised gold letters surrounded by black or white enamel. The use of these enamelled inscriptions seems to have been introduced from France, and it is supposed was for many years the work of French workmen; the earliest enamelled inscription in this collection is of the year 1717 (No. 17); fine and exacting as is the workmanship required for these inscriptions, in a few cases more difficult tasks were accomplished, thus in Nos. 63 and 274 the shanks are formed of two separate and intertwined inscriptions, and in No. 53 the inscription

The use of white enamel to commemorate the unmarried seems to have originated in this period, the earliest example in the following pages is the ring to Dorothy Tenison (No. 40), daughter of the Bishop of Ossory, who died at the age of 15 in 1726. A further and beautiful feature of the enamelled rings of the 18th century is the division of the ring or shank into scrolls, of which two examples are here given,

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Nos. 129 and 146. The heads as a rule are still small, and where not formed of a single stone, contain crystals covering initials or a death's head. Occasionally, as in No. 66, it is shaped like a coffin, and contains a skeleton in enamel, or an urn in black enamel set with small diamonds, No. 125; perhaps the most beautiful ring of this period is No. 334, the head of which is formed by an amethyst and four rose diamonds in

an openwork setting.

The most ornate period of rings comprises the last twenty-five years of the 18th century, the leading feature of which is the large marquise-shaped head with elaborate devices sometimes painted or worked in hair on ivory, and at times formed in gold wire, seed-pearls, ivory and enamel. These elaborate devices seem to have originated simply in the practice of enclosing hair in the head of the ring. As the head grew in size the small portion of hair was flattened and spread out, gradually taking the form of a tree; in the year 1767 alone there are four such trees formed out of hair. The next step was to introduce an urn or tomb under the tree, which became willow-shaped; and then a figure, at first female, and afterwards male, leaning over or seated by the tomb. From this point the way was open to any device that fancy might dictate, and we have, as in No. 590, an urn standing on a pedestal formed with pearls, gold and ivory, a female figure seated beside it beneath a willow, and above in the clouds a cherub, while the base of the tomb is inscribed: "Heaven has in store what thou has lost"; or with still less congruity a landscape with church, river and boat, as

To this period also belong rings with portraits; the silhouette on ivory of Henry Hance (No. 935), the miniature of Queen Caroline (No. 1011) and the Tassie portraits of Dr. Yonge, Bishop of Norwich (No. 655), and Edward Montague, a Master in Chancery (No. 904).

The final period of rings may be said to begin with the 19th century; its leading characteristic is the size and massive value of its products. The enamelled inscription is largely replaced by the words

"In Memory of," while the individual name is engraved inside. The

large head with elaborate device again disappears, and its place is taken by a small head with enamelled coronet or initials, as



in No. 968. The only new form that this period can claim to have introduced is that of the ring in form of a serpent; but as examples of these are later than the year 1837, they have not been included in this Catalogue.

III.

THE present Collection of Memorial Rings is, we believe, the first that has been made on any extensive scale, and this fact may offer some excuse for calling attention to a few rings that either in form or inscription appear of exceptional interest. No. 23 is the only example of an armorial signet ring with memorial

inscription, and No. 34 also represents alone the large class of decade or rosary rings with engraved head. Of more personal interest is the Ring (No. 164) commemorating the execution of Lord Lovat on Tower Hill; the death of an old man, remarkable alike for his gifted personality and unscrupulous service and betrayal of all parties, had attracted enormous crowds, with the consequent fall of an over-burdened stand and several deaths. "The more mischief the greater sport" was the old man's comment, but before he suffered, with a keener appreciation of what was still possible, he murmured the words "Dulce et Decorum est propatria mori" which are engraved on the ring. One example at least of the rebus ring finds a place in this collection in No. 235, where the arrangement of stones signify "Regard." The inscription on Ring No. 272 is of interest, "E Legge born 3 Sep 1670 aged 84," and

It has been found that in several cases the date given on a ring does not correspond exactly with that arrived at from other sources, nor is it claimed that the ring date is always correct, indeed some instances have been noted where it is obviously at fault, as in Ring No. 756, where the date of Lady Castlehaven's death is given as 29 July 1798 instead of 31 July 1789. On the other hand, William Oswell, sometime Mayor of Shrewsbury, rests in his parish church of

refers to the Honble Elizabeth Legge, second daughter of Admiral Lord Dartmouth; it is only to be supposed that the ring was made in the lifetime of the elderly lady to allow of a personal distribution St. Alkmund, beneath the inscription which tells that he died 15 July 1763 (No. 661), while the Memorial Ring (No. 307) gives the correct date 16 August 1763.

The sense of national loss that overshadowed the glory of Trafalgar finds expression in the Ring that commemorates the great Admiral (No. 963), in addition to the initials N B and Trafalgar, the Ring is inscribed "Lost to his country Octr 21st 1805," and added thereto the proud Nelson motto "Palmam qui meruit ferat."

Of much interest too are rings that commemorate catastrophies in private life. No. 632 with its miniature of seven cherubs' heads speaks still of the Leadenhall Street fire in the City of London, by which seven small children lost their lives, and No. 918 recalls a boating accident on



the lower Thames and the drowning of six persons. More terrible still was another river accident, by which a boat was wrecked at Rochester Bridge in 1816 (No. 999), and all on board, including ten children, were lost.

It will easily be understood that Memorial Rings cannot contend with wedding and engagement rings in variety of posy or motto; in early rings "Memento mori" occurs again and again, and in later times "Not lost but gone before" is most frequent; in this collection however some thirty varieties of motto have been noted; few will

some thirty varieties of motto have been noted; few will commend themselves to modern taste, although in conclusion we would like to dwell on the pathos of the "Remember me"









"The copies of 'De Textibus Bibliorum Originalibus' which remain unsold to be disposed of beyond sea, and none be sold in England besides those perhaps of larger paper." "My wife, the Warden and the six senior fellows of Wadham College to be joint executors, and I allow to the said Warden and six senior fellows a Ring apeice of twenty shillings price." He mentions his brothers Arthur and William Hody, his wife's mother and sister, Ann Daniel and his niece Ann

In the codicil he refers to a settlement made on his sister-in-law, Ann Daniel, by deeds, "and afterwards by advice of Counsell I cancelled the same deeds again, not being valid in law being of my owne makeing and understanding noe forme but my Will standeth yet in being although of my owne makeing, and I now being taken ill and not like to continue long here and not haveing my will by me to revoke or alter the same."



They opened the street-door with difficulty but all attempts to reach the children were defeated by smoke and flame. Mrs Woodmason fainted away and was taken to a house near. York, and dying without male issue was succeeded in the Irish barony by his brother, the Honble Henry Phipps, afterwards created Earl of Mulgrave. Rev. William Nelson, D.D., the eldest son of the Rev. Edmund Nelson, by Catharine Suckling his wife, and grandson of Mary Nelson (see Ring No. 754) and Anne Suckling (see Ring No. 368), was born 20 April, and baptised at Burnham Thorpe, co. Norfolk, 3 May 1757. Educated at Norwich, North Walsham and at Christ's College, Cambridge, B.A. 1778, M.A. 1781, D.D. of Cambridge 15 January 1802, and of Oxford 30 July 1802; he was Rector of Brandon Parva 1784 and of Hillborough 1797, both co. Norfolk, and appointed Prebendary of Canterbury 24 May 1803. He succeeded his brother Horatio (see Ring No. 963) as Baron Nelson of the Nile and Duke of Bronte 21 October 1805, and was created on 20 November following Viscount Merton of Trafalgar and Earl Nelson. He married at Swaffham, co. Norfolk, 9 November 1786, Sarah, daughter of the Rev. Henry Young, Vicar of Great Torrington, co. Devon, and by her, who died 15 April 1828, he left a daughter Charlotte Mary, Lady Bridport, who succeeded as Duchess of Bronte; his other titles passing to his nephew, Thomas Bolton (see "Visitation of England and Wales," Vol. XIII., page 188.)
